Safety and Regulatory information

Important Safety Instructions

When using your telephone equipment, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock, and injury to persons, including the following:

- This device must be installed and used in strict accordance with manufacturer's instructions as described in the user documentation that is included with the device.

- To prevent fire or shock hazard, do not expose this device to rain or moisture. The device must not be exposed to dripping or splashing. Do not place objects filled with liquids, such as vases, on the device.
- Do not place this product on an unstable surface, such as a table, shelf, or stand. The product may fall, causing serious damage.
- This device was qualified under test conditions that included the use of the supplied cables between systems components. To ensure regulatory and safety compliance, use only the provided power and interface cables and install them properly.
- Different types of cord sets may be used for connections to the main supply circuit. Use only a main line cord that complies with all applicable device safety requirements of the country of use.

- Do not use this product near water for example, near a bathtub, washbowl, kitchen sink or laundry tub, in a wet basement, or near a swimming pool.

Safety Requirements for the SBV5422 Lithium-Ion Battery



You must properly handle the SBV5422 lithium-ion rechargeable battery to ensure your safety. Improper handling can cause leakage, heat, smoke, explosion, or fire resulting in damage to the equipment or the user.

- Use the SBV5422 battery only in the SBV5422 Digital Voice Modem.
- CAUTION: Risk of explosion if battery is replaced by the incorrect type. Use only Motorola approved batteries, Motorola part number 515757-001 and 538043-001. Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions.
- Do not use the battery where static electricity is generated.
- Do not heat the battery or discard into a fire. Keep the battery away from high-temperature locations.
- Properly discard the battery if it exhibits an abnormal condition, such as heat, odor, color, or a change in shape. When discarding, place insulated tape over the battery terminals.
- The battery should be stored out of the reach of children.

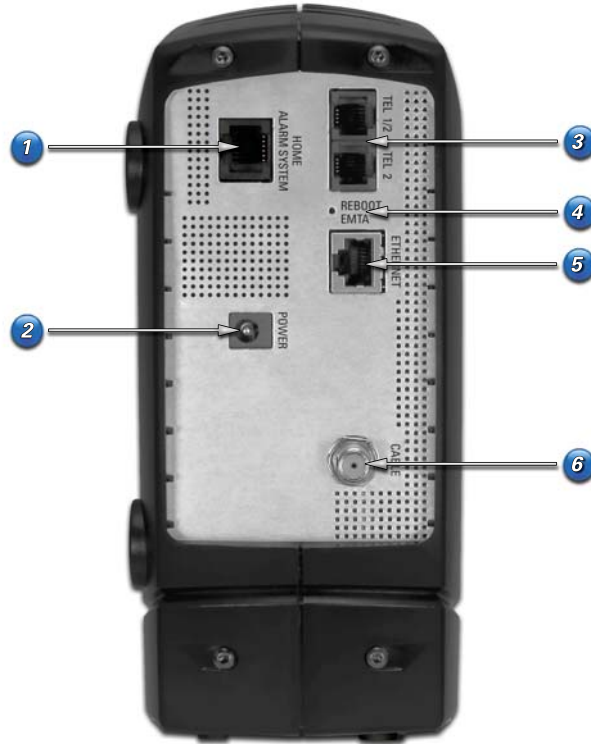

The rear panel provides cabling connectors and the power receptacle:

Key	Item	Description
1	HOMEALARM SYSTEM	Provides the connection to an existing home alarm system using a RJ-31X connector. The factory places a sticker over this port. Remove the sticker only when you are ready to use the port to install a home alarm system. Never insert any other devices into the Home Alarm System port.
2	POWER	Provides AC power to the digital voice modem.
3	TEL 1/2, TEL 2	Telephone ports provide connections for two telephone lines. Currently, the SBV5422 only supports Motorola Handsets
4	ETHERNET	Provides the connection to Ethernet-equipped computers using a cable terminated with an RJ-45 connector.
5	REBOOT EMTA	If you experience a problem, you can push this recessed button to reset the digital voice modem (see “ Front-Panel Lights and Error Conditions ” on page xxix). Resetting may take some time (5 to 30 minutes) because the digital voice modem must find and lock on the appropriate communications channels.
6	CABLE	Provides the connection to the coaxial cable outlet.

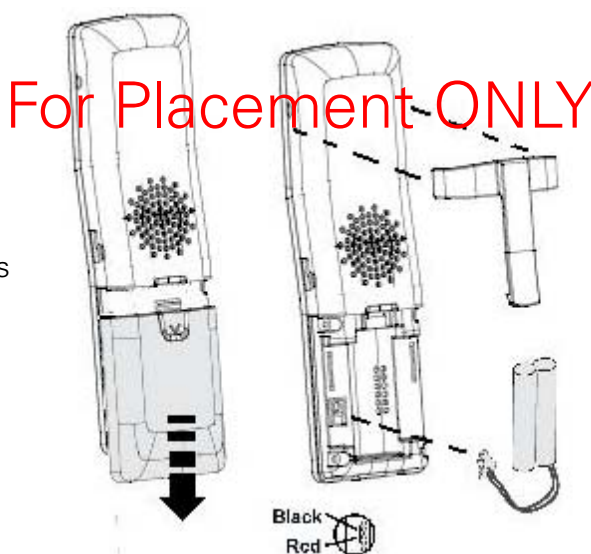
Installation and Configuration

Before you begin the installation, you must first install the battery in your digital voice modem. Please read [“Safety Requirements for the SBV5422 Lithium-Ion Battery”](#) on page vii before proceeding.

NOTE: It may take up to 12 hours to fully charge the battery. After installing the battery, immediately place the handset in the charger.

Handset Battery Installation

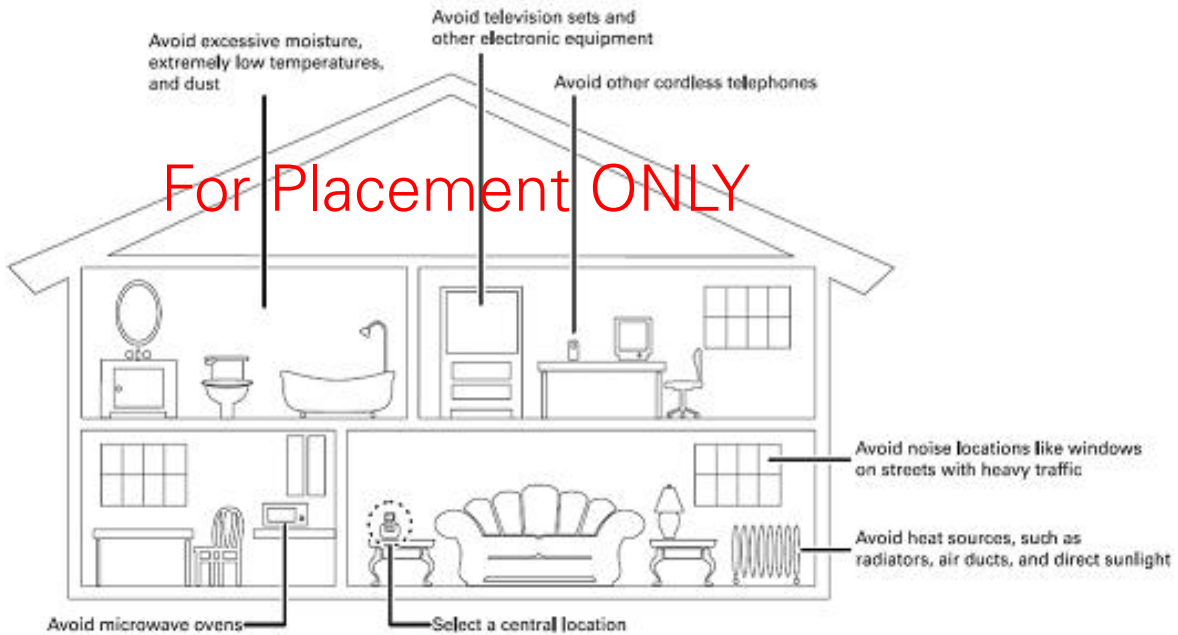
- 1 Remove any stickers or inserts, if present.
- 2 Remove the battery door by pressing down on the indentation and sliding downward.
- 3 Plug the battery connector into the receptacle. (Make sure the black wire is toward the top.)
- 4 Insert the battery into the battery compartment.
- 5 Replace the battery door.
- 6 Attach the belt clip (optional).



SBV5422 Battery Installation

- 1 Place the SBV5422 on its side and remove the battery cover on the bottom.
- 2 Slide the battery into the battery compartment until it is fully seated. The battery is keyed so that it cannot be installed incorrectly. Make sure that the pull-tab on the battery is accessible and does not prevent the battery cover from closing properly.
- 3 Re-install the battery cover with the locking tabs seated downward, and then push the cover forward.

Selecting a Location for Your Handset

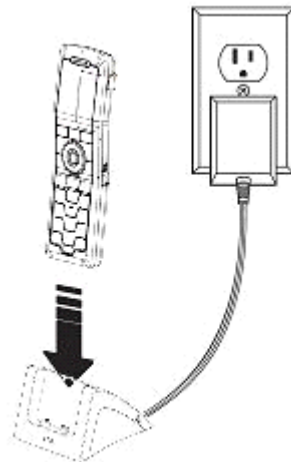


Connecting the Handset Charger and Charging the Handset Battery

1. Insert the power cord into the bottom of the charger.
2. Plug the power cord into an electrical outlet.
3. Place the base on a sturdy surface.

The handset charger does not require a phone line.

To charge the battery, place the handset in the charger's handset cradle. The initial battery charge time is 10-12 hours. After the initial charge, a maintenance charge of eight hours should be sufficient. Be sure to place the handset in its charger when not in use to insure maximum daily performance.

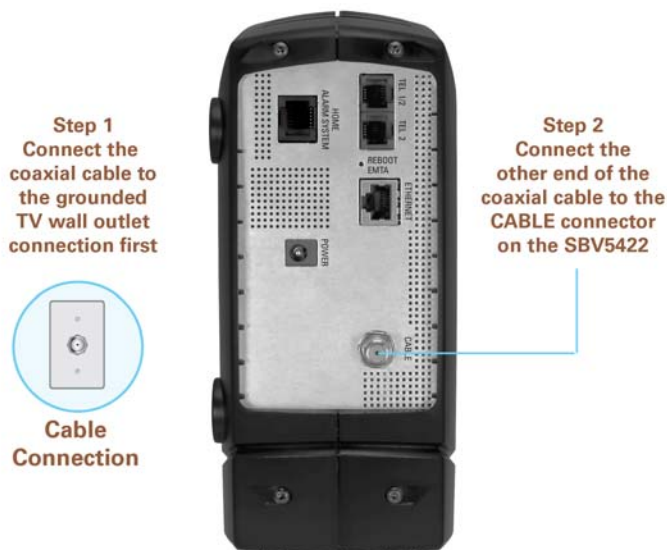


If your handset displays a **LOW BATTERY** message or the handset appears inactive, (the LCD is blank and does not activate when you press the keys), charge the handset.

Cabling and Startup for a Single User

Allow some time (5 to 30 minutes) to power up the first time because the SBV5422 must find and lock on the appropriate channels for communications. Be sure your computer is on and the SBV5422 is unplugged.

- 1 Connect one end of the coaxial cable to the cable outlet or splitter.
- 2 Connect the other end of the coaxial cable to the CABLE connector on the SBV5422. Hand-tighten the connectors to avoid damaging them.



- 3 Connect the DC power connector to the SBV5422.
- 4 Plug the AC power cord into the connector on the SBV5422 and an AC electrical outlet. This turns on the SBV5422. You do not need to unplug it when not in use.
- 5 SBV5422 Connect the Ethernet cable to the Ethernet connector on the SBV5422. Connect the other end to the Ethernet port on your computer.
- 6 Perform the procedures for [“Configuring TCP/IP”](#) on page 11.

- 7 To connect the telephone line, plug a phone wire into the appropriate telephone connector.

CAUTION!!! The Home Alarm System (RJ31X) and Ethernet portals are very similar. NO device, other than a home alarm system with a RJ31X connector should ever be plugged into the Home Alarm System port.



Cabling for Multiple Computers

The SBV5422 supports several multiple-user configurations. Along with an optional hub or router, it can serve as an Internet gateway for up to 31 computers.

Not all service providers support multiple-user service. For information about multiple-user service, contact your cable provider.



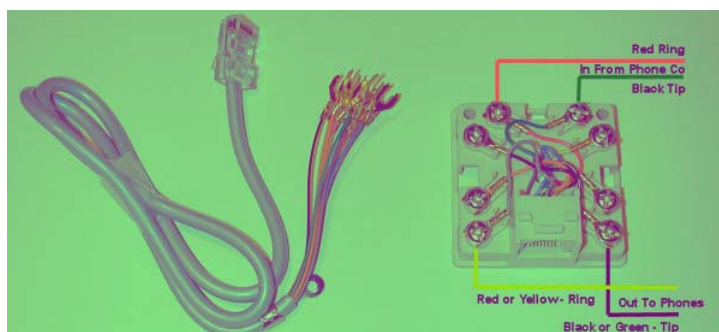
SBV5422 Home Alarm System Configuration (Optional)

Most home alarm systems are wired to traditional telephone service. Home owners can rewire their alarm systems from traditional phone service to VOIP by moving a cable from one jack to another jack.

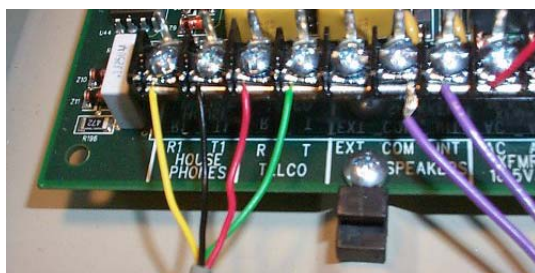
- 1 Purchase a RJ31X cable and RJX31X connector (not included).



- 2 Locate where the traditional phone service enters the house.
- 3 Mount the RJ31X connector to the wall. Place the device close to where the telephone service enters the house.
- 4 Splice in the telephone service to the wall mounted RJ31X as shown in the diagram below.



- 5 Wire the RJ31X cable to alarm panel.



- 6 Plug the RJ31X cable into wall mounted RJ31X connector.

Configuring TCP/IP

The SBV5422 contains all required software. You do not need to configure the SBV5422, but you must be sure that your computer is configured for TCP/IP (a protocol for communication between computers). Perform one of the following:

Configuring TCP/IP in Windows 2000

- 1 Open the **Control Panel** (click Start, select **Settings** and then **Control Panel**).
- 2 Double-click the **Network and Dial-up Connections** icon.
- 3 Double-click **Local Area Connection** *number*. The value of *number* varies from system to system.
- 4 Click **Properties**.

If Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) is in the list of components, TCP/IP is installed. You can skip to step 8.

If Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) is not in the list, click **Install**.

- 5 Click **Protocol** on the Select Network Component Type window and click **Add**.
- 6 Click **Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)** in the Network Protocol section on the Select Network Protocol window.
- 7 Click **OK**.
- 8 Select **Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)** in the Local Area Connection *number* Properties window.
- 9 Click **Properties** to view the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties window.
- 10 Select **Obtain IP address automatically** and **Obtain DNS server address automatically**. Click **OK** to accept the TCP/IP settings, and close the window.

You will need to restart your computer to change the settings.

Configuring TCP/IP in Windows XP

- 1 Open the **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 3 Click **Network Connections** to display the LAN or high-speed Internet connections. Skip to step 5.
- 4 If a Classic view similar to below is displayed, click **Network Connections** to display the LAN or high-speed Internet connections.
- 5 Right-click your network connection. If more than one connection is displayed, be sure to select the one for your network interface.
- 6 Select **Properties** from the pop-up menu. The Local Area Connection Properties window is displayed:
- 7 Select **Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)** and click **Properties** to display the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties window:SBV5422
- 8 Be sure **Obtain IP address automatically** and **Obtain DNS server address automatically** are selected. Click **OK** to accept the TCP/IP settings.
- 9 Click **OK** to close the TCP/IP Properties window.
- 10 Click **OK** to close the Local Area Connection Properties window.

Verifying the IP Address in Your Windows OS

To check the IP address:

- 1 On the Windows Desktop, click *Start*.
- 2 Select **Run**. The Run window is displayed.
- 3 Type **cmd** and click **OK**.
- 4 Type **ipconfig** and press **Enter** to display your IP configuration. A display similar to the one shown below indicates a normal configuration:

If an Autoconfiguration IP Address is displayed as in the window below, there is either an incorrect connection between your PC and the SBV5422 or cable network problems.
SBV5422

Check:

- Your cable connections
- Whether you can see cable TV channels on your television
- After successfully verifying your cable connections and proper cable TV operation, you can renew your IP address.

Renewing Your IP Address

To renew your IP address:

- 1 On the Windows Desktop, click **Start**.
- 2 Select **Run**. The Run window is displayed.
- 3 Type **cmd** and click *OK*.
- 4 Type **ipconfig /renew** and press **Enter**. If a valid IP address is displayed, as shown below, Internet access should be available.
- 5 Type **exit** and press **Enter** to return to Windows.

If after performing this procedure your computer cannot access the Internet, call your cable provider for help.

Wall Mounting the SBV5422

If you mount your SBV5422 on the wall, you must:

- Locate the unit as specified by the local or national codes governing residential or business cable TV and communications services.
- Follow all local standards for installing a network interface unit/network interface device (NIU/NID).

When using the wall mount on drywall or similar material, use anchors for added stability.

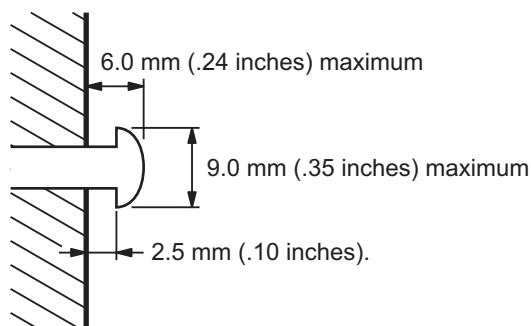
To mount your SBV5422 on the wall:

- 1 If present, remove the four rubber chassis feet on the bottom of the SBV5422.
- 2 Print the "[Wall Mounting Template SBV5422](#)" on page 16 at 100% scale. Measure the printed template with a ruler to ensure that it is the correct size as indicated on the template.
- 3 Use a center punch to mark the center of the holes.
- 4 On the wall, locate the marks for the mounting holes.
- 5 See step 7 for recommended mounting hardware size. Drill holes to a depth and diameter appropriate for the size and type of hardware you have selected.
- 6 If necessary, install an anchor in each hole.

Use M4 x 38 mm (#8 x 1 1/2 inch) screws with a flat underside and maximum screw head diameter of 9.0 mm (0.35 inches) to mount the SBV5422.

Screw in each screw until the head protrudes from the wall, as shown below:

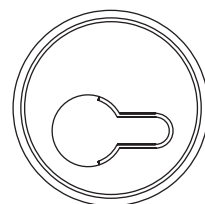
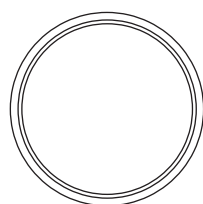
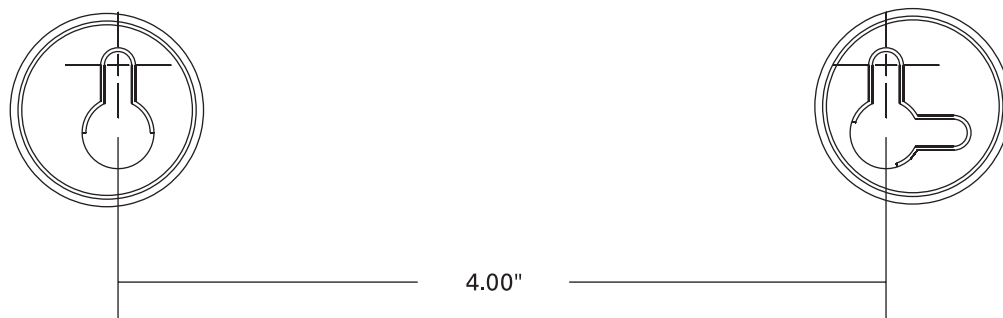
- There must be at least 2.5 mm (.10 inches) between the wall and the underside of the screw head.



Note: The image shown above demonstrates mounting the SBV5422 onto a wood surface.

- 7 Place the SBV5422 so the keyholes are above the mounting screws.
- 8 Slide the SBV5422 down so it stops against the top of the keyhole opening.

Troubleshooting

Frequently Asked Questions

Q What is high-speed cable Internet access?

A Cable Internet access uses cable television wires instead of telephone lines to connect to the Internet. It is extremely fast and affordable and does not tie up telephone lines for incoming or outgoing calls and faxes.

Q What is Voice-over-Internet Protocol (VoIP)?

A VoIP uses cable television wires instead of traditional telephone lines to provide voice and fax service.

Q How fast is a SBV5422?

A A cable modem offers Internet access at speeds up to 100 times faster than a traditional phone modem. Network conditions, such as traffic volume and the speed of the sites you visit, can affect download speeds.

Q Can I still watch cable TV while using my SBV5422?

A Yes, your cable TV line can carry the TV signal while you surf the Internet and talk on the phone.

Q If I have a SBV5422, can I still use my old 28.8 Kbps or 56 Kbps modem?

A Yes! Although once you've experienced the speed of cable Internet access, you'll never again want to wait for traditional dial-up services.

Q I have more than one computer. Do I need more than one SBV5422?

A No, not if your computers are connected on a network. The SBV5422 supports current Internet connection sharing technologies to enable you to connect up to 31 computers to the Internet using a single SBV5422.

Q Do I need to change my Internet service provider (ISP)?

A A broadband connection is required for high-speed Internet access and VoIP telephone service available with your SBV5422. Contact your cable company for your specific information.

Q Do I need to subscribe to cable TV to get cable Internet access?

A No, but you will need to subscribe to cable Internet service. Some systems require that you subscribe to basic service before you can get Internet access and/or offer a discount when you use your own SBV5422. Check with your local cable company for specific information.

Q What technical support is available?

A For questions about your Internet service, connection, or SBV5422, contact your cable provider.

Q What do I do if my SBV5422 stops working?

A Use the information in this section to diagnose and resolve simple problems. If you continue to have problems, contact your cable provider or Motorola as described on the previous page.

Glossary

coaxial cable (coax)	A type of wire consisting of a center wire surrounded by insulation and a grounded shield of braided wire. The shield minimizes electrical and radio frequency interference.
DOCSIS	The CableLabs Data-Over-Cable Service Interface Specification defines interface standards for cable modems and supporting equipment.
download	To copy a file from one computer to another. You can use the Internet to download files from a server to your home PC. A DOCSIS digital voice modem downloads its configuration from a server during start-up.
downstream	In a network, downstream describes the direction of data received by your computer from the Internet.
Ethernet	The most widely used type of local area network (LAN). The most commonly installed Ethernet networks are called 10Base-T. 10Base-T provides transmission speeds up to 10 megabits per second (Mbps), usually over twisted-pair wire. Fast Ethernet (100Base-T) provides transmission speeds up to 100 Mbps.
Euro-DOCSIS	The European version of the DOCSIS standard.
expansion slot	An opening in a computer where a circuit board can be inserted to add new capabilities.
F-type connector	A connector used to connect coaxial cable to equipment.
IP address	An Internet Protocol address is an identifier for a computer or device on a TCP/IP network. Networks using TCP/IP route messages based on the destination IP address. Your cable provider assigns your digital voice modem an IP address to provide a continuous Internet connection.
MAC address	The Media Access Control Address uniquely identifies each device that can be connected to an Ethernet network. It is permanently written to read-only memory (ROM) at the factory and printed on the rear panel of your SURFboard Digital Voice Modem. You need to provide the MAC address to your cable provider.
MHz	Mega Hertz. A measure of frequency - millions of cycles per second. One MHz means one million cycles per second.
PBX	A private branch exchange is a private telephone network usually used within a business. Users of the PBX share a certain number of outside lines for making telephone calls external to the PBX.
PSTN	The public switched telephone network is the traditional circuit-switched, voice-oriented telephone network originally invented by Alexander Graham Bell. It is sometimes referred to as plain old telephone service (POTS).
RJ-11	The most common type of connector for household phones.
RJ-45	The most common type of connector for Ethernet networks.
RJ-31X	The most common type of connector for home alarm systems.
splitter	A splitter is a device that divides the signal power from an input cable equally between two or more signals, each carrying a selected frequency range.
TCP/IP	Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol is a set of standards and rules for communication between networks.
upstream	In a network, upstream describes the direction of data sent from your computer to the Internet.

UPS

An uninterruptible power supply provides a battery backup to enable voice service to continue for some time during a power outage.

VoIP

Voice over Internet Protocol is a method to exchange voice, fax, and other information over the Internet. Voice and fax have traditionally been carried over traditional telephone lines using a dedicated circuit for each line. VoIP enables calls to travel as discrete data packets on shared lines.
