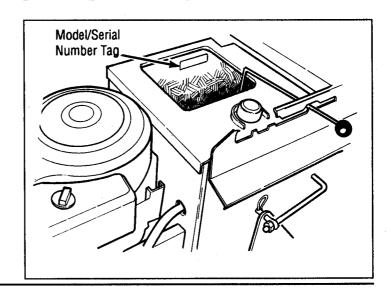
All Bolens® mowers have passed rigid safety standards of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute and an independent testing laboratory.

WARNING TO ALL CALIFORNIA AND OTHER RIDING MOWER OPERATORS



Under California law, and under the laws of several other states, you are not permitted to operate an internal combustion engine using hydrocarbon fuels on any forest covered, brush covered, or grass covered land, or on land covered with grain, hay, or other flammable agricultural crop, without an engine spark arrester in continuous effective working order.

The engine on your riding mower, like most outdoor power equipment, is an internal combustion engine that burns gasoline, a hydrocarbon fuel. Therefore, your riding mower must be equipped with a spark arrester muffler in continuous effective working order. The spark arrester must be attached to the engine exhaust system in such a manner that flames or heat from the system will not ignite flammable material. Failure of the owner/operator of the riding mower to comply with this regulation is a misdemeanor under California law, and may also be a violation of other state and/or federal regulations, laws, ordinances, or codes. Contact your local fire marshal or forest service for specific information about what regulations apply in your area.

SAFETY

IMPORTANT!

Safe Operation Practices for Riding Mowers



This is a safety alert symbol. It is used in this Manual and on riding mower decals to alert you to potential hazards. Whenever you see this symbol, read and obey the safety message that follows it. Failure to obey the safety message could result in personal injury or property damage.

TRAINING

PREVENTING ACCIDENTS IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF EVERY EQUIPMENT OPERATOR. THE OPERATOR IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ACCIDENTS OR HAZARDS OCCURRING TO OTHER PEOPLE OR THEIR PROPERTY. THE FOLLOWING GENERAL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS MUST BE FULLY UNDERSTOOD AND FOLLOWED WHEN OPERATING YOUR RIDING MOWER. REVIEW THEM FREQUENTLY AND NEVER TAKE CHANCES. BE CAREFUL BEFORE, DURING AND IMMEDIATELY AFTER USE OF ANY POWERED EQUIPMENT. ACCIDENTS CAN BE PREVENTED.

- 1. Before operating the unit:
 - Read this owner/operator manual, the separate engine owner's manual, and any other literature you may have received.
 - b. Be thoroughly familiar with the controls and proper use of the unit.
 - c. Read all literature furnished with any attachments used on the unit.
 - d. Know how to stop the unit and disengage its controls quickly in case of an emergency.
- NEVER allow children to operate the unit. Local regulations may restrict the age of the operator.
- 3. Do not allow adults to operate the unit without proper instruction.

- Never allow irresponsible adults to operate the unit.
- 5. Keep the area of operation clear of all persons (particularly small children) and pets.

GENERAL OPERATION

- Thoroughly inspect the area where the unit will be used:
 - a. Remove all stones, sticks, wires, bones, and other foreign objects.
 Tall grass can hide obstacles.
 - Inspect the area for holes, ruts, or bumps. Uneven terrain could overturn the unit.
- 2. Wear proper clothing before operating the unit:

SAFETY (Cont.)

- a. Do not operate the unit when barefoot or wearing open sandals.
 Always wear substantial footwear.
- b. Always wear long trousers.
- c. Do not wear loose-fitting clothing or jewelry that could get caught in moving parts.
- d. Be aware that vines, branches, etc., can snag loose-fitting clothing or jewelry.
- 3. Before attempting to start the engine:
 - a. Apply the parking brake.
 - b. Disengage the mower blade drive.
 - c. Shift into neutral.
- **4.** Mow only in daylight or in good artificial light.
- 5. Never operate the unit in wet grass—reduced traction could cause sliding. Always maintain proper traction. Keep a firm grip on the steering wheel. Never attempt to stabilize the unit by putting your foot on the ground.
- **6.** Use care when pulling loads or using heavy equipment:
 - a. Use only approved drawbar hitch points.
 - b. Limit loads to those you can safely control.
 - c. Do not turn sharply. Slow down before turning. Use care when backing up.
 - d. Use optional counterweight(s) or wheel weights when using attachments which affect the balance of the unit.
- 7. Never attempt to defeat the purpose of guards or other safety devices installed on the unit. Never operate the unit with defective guards or shields, or without safety devices in place.
- 8. Before use, always visually inspect the mower blade(s) and blade bolts and replace if they are worn or damaged. Replace worn or damaged blades and bolts in sets to maintain proper balance. Torque the blade bolts to the correct troque values indicated in this manual.
- **9.** If the unit has a two blade deck, use care when rotating one blade because this can cause the other blade to rotate.

- Use extra care when loading or unloading the unit into a trailer or truck.
- 11. Before attempting to start the engine:
 - a. Apply the parking brake.
 - b. Disengage the mower blade drive.
 - c. Shift into neutral.
- 12. Do not change the engine governor settings or over-speed the engine. Operating an engine at excessive speed may increase the hazard of personal injury.
- 13. Do not put hands or feet near or under rotating parts. Keep clear of the discharge opening at all times. Be aware of the mower discharge direction and do not point it at anyone. Do not operate the unit without either the entire optional bagging attachment or the discharge chute in place.
- **14.** Watch for traffic when operating near, or when crossing roadways.
- 15. Disengage the mower blade drive and wait for the mower blades to come to a stop when crossing gravel drives, walks, or roads.
- 16. After striking a foreign object:
 - a. Disengage the mower blade drive.
 - b. Stop the engine.
 - c. Wait for all moving parts to come to a complete stop.
 - d. Remove the wire from the spark plug.
 - e. Keep the wire away from the plug to prevent accidental starting.
 - f. Thoroughly inspect the unit for any damage, and repair the damage before re-starting and operating the unit.
- 17. If the unit should start to vibrate abnormally, stop the engine and check immediately for the cause. Vibration is generally a warning of trouble.
- 18. Before cleaning the mower deck housing, before cleaning the unit and before making any repairs or inspections:
 - a. Disengage the mower blade drive.
 - b. Stop the engine.
 - c. Wait for all moving parts to come to a complete stop.

- d. Remove the wire from the spark plug.
- e. Keep the wire away from the plug to prevent accidental starting.
- **19.**Stop the engine whenever you leave the unit.
- 20. Do not run the engine indoors.

 Exhaust gases contain carbon monoxide, a deadly gas that is odorless and colorless. Always run the engine outdoors and make sure there is adequate ventilation.
- 21. Stop the blade (move the mower blade drive lever to its disengaged position) whenever you are approached by any child, inattentive person, or pet.
- **22.** Disengage the mower blade drive when you are not mowing.
- 23. Do not touch engine parts which may be hot from operation. Allow the engine to cool before inspecting, cleaning, or repairing the unit.
- 24. Do not operate the unit while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- 25. Use low throttle settings when engaging the drive pedal, especially in high gears.
- 26. Never attempt to carry any passengers on the unit. They could fall off and be seriously injured, or they could interfere with the safe operation of the unit.
- 27. Use extra care when approaching blind corners, shrubs, trees, and any other object that may obscure vision.
- 28. When using any attachments, never direct the discharge of material toward bystanders.
- 29. There is a safety interlock switch which should shut down the engine within a few seconds after the operator leaves the seat. If this switch fails to operate, get the unit serviced immediately by an authorized Bolens® dealer. Severe injury could result from not following this instruction.
- 30. Never leave a running machine unattended. Always disengage the mower blade drive, set the parking brake, stop the engine and remove the keys before dismounting.

SAFETY (Cont.)

SLOPE OPERATION

- Mow up and down the face of a slope—Never across.
- 2. Keep all movement on a slope slow and gradual. Do not make sudden changes in speed or direction. Do not turn on slopes unless necessary, and then, turn slowly and gradually downhill, if possible. Use slow speed. Choose a low gear so you will not have to stop or shift while on the slope.
- Do not stop or start suddenly on a slope. If the tires loose traction, disengage the mower blade drive and proceed slowly straight down the slope.
- 4. Do not mow steep slopes.
- Do not mow near drop-offs, ditches, or embankments. If a wheel goes over the edge, or if the edge caves in, the unit could overturn.
- 6. Use extra care while using the optional model 6028 or 6036 grass collection attachments. These can change the stability of the unit. Use wheel- and/or counter-weights when using these attachments. Do not use them on steep slopes.

CHILDREN

 Tragic accidents can occur if the operator is not alert to the presence of children. Children are often attracted to the unit and the mowing activity. Never assume that children will remain where you last saw them. Keep children out of the mowing area. Keep them under the watchful eye of an adult other than the person operating the unit.

Be alert and turn unit off if children enter the area.

- 2. Before backing up:
 - a. Look behind you and on the ground immediately behind the unit before backing up and while running in reverse.
 - Be sure to look down and behind you for small children. A large percentage of accidents involving children occur while backing up.
 - c. Disengage the mower blade drive before backing up.

SERVICE

- Handle gasoline with care it is highly flammable:
 - a. Use an approved gasoline container.
 - b. Never remove the fuel cap of, or add gasoline to, a running or hot engine or to an engine that has not been allowed to cool for several minutes after running.
 - Never store the unit or fuel container inside where there is an open flame, such as in a water heater.
 - Keep smoking materials, sparks, and flame away from the gas tank and the fuel container.
- 2. Check the fuel before starting the engine:
 - Do not fill the gasoline tank indoors, when the engine is running or until the engine has been allowed to cool for several minutes after operating.
 - b. Clean off any spilled gasoline before starting the engine.
- 3. Replace any worn or damaged parts.
- Check the blade and the engine mounting bolts at frequent intervals for proper tightness.
- 5. Never store the unit with gasoline in the fuel tank inside a building where gasoline fumes could reach an open flame or spark.
- **6.** When storing gasoline:
 - a. Store gasoline in a cool, wellventilated area, safely away from any spark- or flame-producing equipment.
 - Store gasoline in an approved container, safely out of the reach of children.
- 7. If the fuel tank has to be drained, drain it outdoors.
- 8. Allow the engine to cool before storing this unit in any enclosure.
- To reduce fire hazard, keep the engine free of grass, leaves, or excessive grease.
- 10. Check the (optional) grass catching bag. Under normal use, the bag's material is subject to deterioration and wear. It should be checked frequently and replaced when necessary. Use only a genuine Bolens® replacement bag.

- 11. Use only original-equipment replacement parts. Parts manufactured by others could present safety hazards even though they may fit on the unit.
- Before inspecting, cleaning, adjusting, or repairing the unit:
 - a. Disengage the mower blade drive.
 - b. Stop the engine.
 - c. Wait for all moving parts to come to a complete stop.
 - d. Remove the wire from the spark plug.
 - e. Keep the wire away from the plug to prevent accidental starting.
 - f. Allow the engine to cool.
- 13. Keep all nuts, bolts, and screws tight to be sure the unit is in safe working condition.
- 14. Replace a worn or faulty muffler.
- 15. Do not allow children to be near you when you are serviceing this unit.
- 16. Remove the battery, drain the fuel tank and drain the engine oil if it becomes necessary to tip the unit up on its end or on its side. Fluids can leak from the unit if it is tipped over.
- 17. Chock the wheels (place blocks of wood on both sides of the wheels) whenever you have to perform any maintenance that requires the parking brake to be off.
- 18. Mower blades are sharp and can cut. Wrap the blade(s) or wear gloves, and use extra caution when servicing them.
- Check brake operation frequently. Adjust and service as required (See page 23).

DECALS

For your personal safety and the safety of others, safety message decals have been placed on your riding mower. Make sure these decals are in place, clean and legible at all times. Refer to the separate parts catalog for decal locations, part numbers, and ordering instructions.

ASSEMBLY

Hitch Assembly

1. Cut the ties holding the hitch to the ignition key (No hitch on Model 13000). Secure the hitch (A, Fig. 1) to the rear of the frame with two 1/2-13 x 1 hex screws, lock washers and hex nuts (B). Install the washers and nuts on the inside of the frame.

Column Support Assembly

- 1. Remove the three bolts (C, Fig. 2) from the bottom of the column support.
- 2. Secure the column support to the forward end of the frame with bolts removed in Step 1.

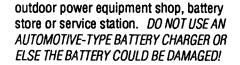
NOTE: The column support shown in Fig. 2 is one of two different supports. Your unit may have a different style of column support.

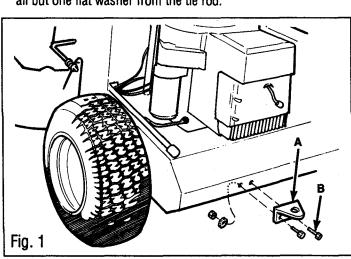
- 3. Attach the rod end assembly (D, Fig. 2) on the bottom of the steering column to the tie rod (E) as follows:
 - A. Remove the top cotter pin (F) and all but one flat washer from the tie rod.

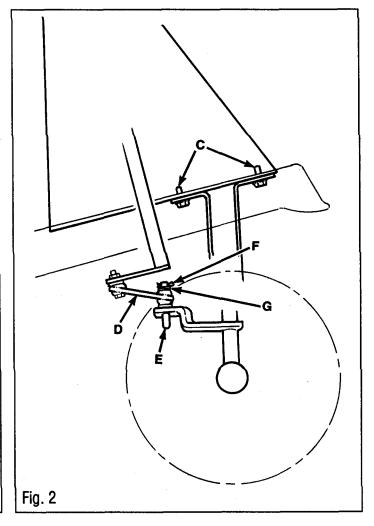
- B. Place the rod end assembly (D) over the tie rod.
- C. Re-install the remaining flat washers
- (G). Re-install the cotter pin.

Battery

- 1. Lift seat support and disconnect first the negative (-) and then the positive (+) cables from the battery terminals.
- Remove two lock nuts and washers from the two "L" bolts and remove battery.
- 4. Fill battery with electrolyte to the level indicated on the battery case.
- 5. Charge battery using a trickle type charger. If a trickle type charger is not available, have the battery initially charged at an







6. Re-install battery after servicing, with negative (-) terminal to the left. Re-install battery hold-down clamps and secure. It may be necessary to hold "L"-Bolts up against the underside of frame, so nuts can be threaded onto the tops of the "L"-bolts.

7. Re-connect first the positive (+) cable to the positive (+) battery terminal and then the negative (-) cable to the negative (-) battery terminal.

Seat Assembly

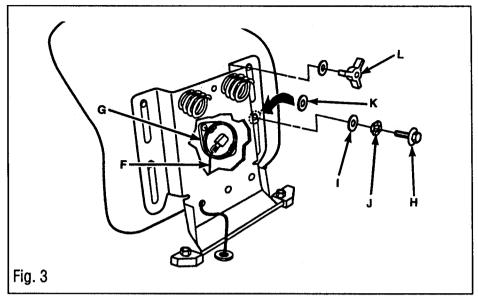
- 1. Locate wiring harness (F, Fig. 3) under seat support and connect to seat interlock switch (G).
- 2. Attach front of seat to seat support using two shoulder bolts (H), nylon washer (I) and wave washer (J). Position nylon washer between wave washer and seat support. Add one 1-1/4" steel washer (K) between seat and seat support on each bolt (H). Secure rear of seat with two flat washers and hand knobs (L).

Seat Adjustment

The seat can be adjusted forward and backward by loosening hand knobs (L). Re-tighten after seat is in desired position.

Engine Oil

Refer to the Engine Owner's Manual supplied for engine oil specifications.





WARNING!

Spark Plug

Unplug spark plug wire from spark plug and keep wire well away from plug until you are ready to use your riding mower. This will help prevent accidental starting.

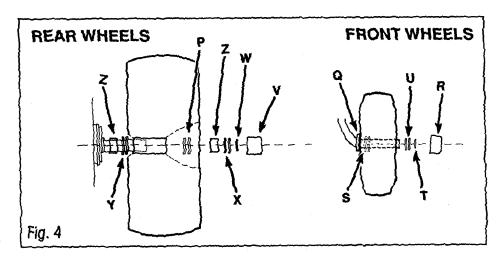
WHEEL ASSEMBLY (If required) Rear Wheels

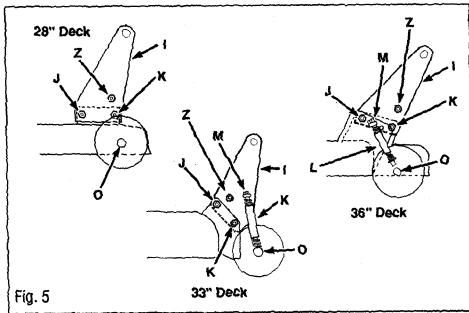
- 1. Grease axle (Never Seize).
- 2. Place spacer (Z, Fig. 4) onto each side of rear axle.
- 3. Place two 1-1/4" flat washerS (Y) on each side of rear axle and install wheels.
- 5. **RIGHT SIDE OF AXLE:** Place two 1-1/4" washers (P) and second spacer (Z) on right axle. Place two 1-1/2" shim washers (X) on the right axle and secure with retaining ring (W).

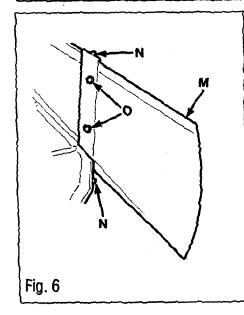
- 5. **LEFT SIDE OF AXLE:** Place two 1-1/4" washers (P) and second spacer (Z) on left axle. Add two or three 1-1/2" shim washers (X) on the axle as required. Place spacer and shims to eliminate play without restricting wheel movement. Secure with retaining ring (V).
- 7. Attach protector caps (V) to both sides of axle.

Front Wheels

- 1. Place one 1-1/4" washer (Q) and two 1-3/8" washers (S) onto front axle. Place wheel on front axle.
- 3. Place two 1-3/8" washers (U) on axle as required to eliminate free play without restricting movement.
- 4. Secure wheel & washers with retaining ring (T).
- 5. Attach protector caps (R) to both sides of axle.







MOWER DECK LIFT PLATE ASSEMBLY (If required)

- 1. 33" DECKS: Place lift plate (I) on **inside** of bracket on mower deck (See Fig. 5).
- 28" & 36" DECKS: Place lift plate (I) on inside of bracket on mower deck (See Fig. 5).
- Secure with flange screws & nuts at (J)
 (K). Nuts should face toward the inside of frame.
- 3. 33" & 36" DECKS: Place pivot (M) into desired height setting hole in lift plate (I) and secure with washer and spring pin. See GAGE WHEEL ADJUSTMENT to determine proper height.

3. Attach shoulder bolts (Z) to lift plates. Insert bolt from the inside. Secure with nut.

GAGE WHEEL ASSEMBLY (If required)

 Slide a spacer, a gage wheel, and a 1/2 flat washer onto a gage wheel axle.
 Secure with a cotter pin. Repeat on the other side.

MOWER DECK INSTALLATION 28" Mower Deck Installation

The 28" mower deck is shipped assembled on your riding mower, with the discharge chute removed (this discharge chute MUST be installed on the deck before using the mower). Some adjustment of the mower deck may also be required (See page 14).

NOTE: FOR SHIPPING PURPOSES ONLY, A TEMPORARY SHIELD HAS BEEN INSTALLED IN THE DISCHARGE OPENING ON THE MOWER DECK.

- 1. Remove bolts holding temporary shield in discharge opening. Remove shield and discard.
- 2. Loosely attach ends of discharge chute (M, Fig. 6) inside discharge opening with two 5/16-18 x 3/4 flange screws and 5/16-18 flange nuts (N). The nuts should be on top.

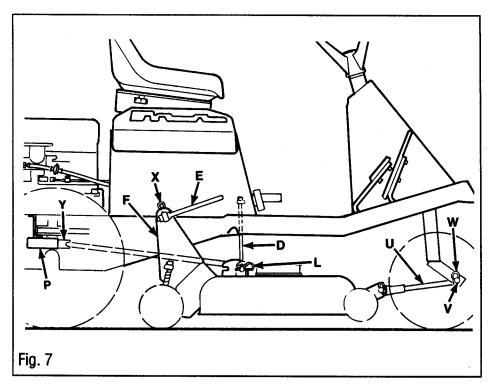
- 3. Loosely attach top of discharge chute with two $5/16-18 \times 3/4$ carriage bolts and two 5/16-18 flange nuts (0). The nuts should be to the outside.
- 4. Tighten all four nuts and bolts installed in Steps 2 and 3.

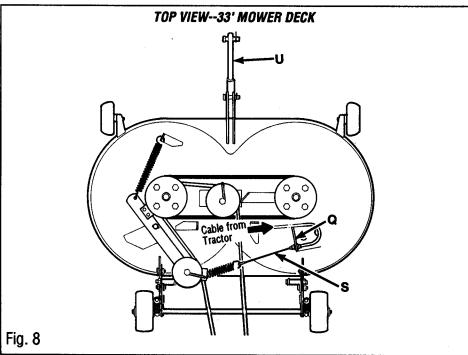
33" & 36" Inch Mower Deck Installation

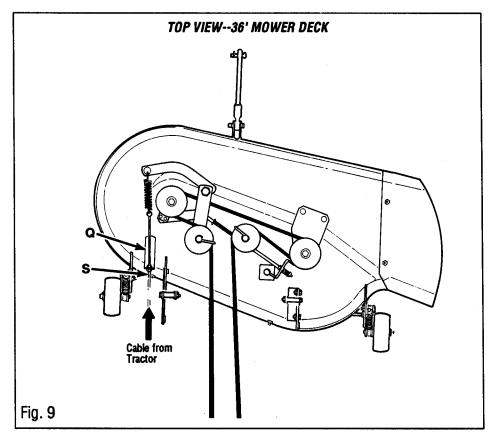
- 1. Lift tractor up and slide mower deck under tractor with gage wheels toward the rear.
- 2. Connect lift rods (D, Fig. 7) to mower decks and secure with spring pins (L).
- 3. Connect pivot rods (E, Fig. 7) to lift plates (F) on mower deck. Secure with spring pins (X).
- 4. Connect front of rod end (U, Fig. 6) to tractor and secure with clevis pin (V) and spring pin (W).
- 5. Remove belt guide (P, Fig. 7)
- 6. Route mower drive belt over sheave (Y). It may be necessary to rotate differential to assemble belt.
- 7. Re-install belt guide (P) as far to the front as possible. Re-tighten belt guide. Check clearance between guide (P) and bolt head on differential. A 1/8" minimum gap should exist.
- 8. Install mower blade drive cable (S, Figs. 8, 9 & 10) from tractor, onto cable support (Q), as shown in Figs. 8, 9 & 10.
- 9. With the mower blade drive lever (F, page 17, Fig. 23) in the disengaged (DOWN) position. Adjust nuts (R, Fig. 10 so all slack has been taken up in cable (S). Tighten nuts (R).

36" Discharge Chute Assembly

1. Secure discharge chute (T, Fig. 11) over discharge opening with two 3/8-16 x 3/4 carriage bolts and 3/8-16 top lock nuts (N). Install so the nuts are on top.





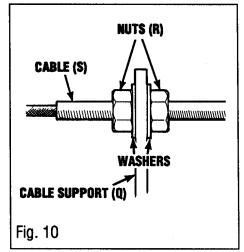


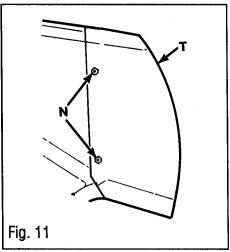

RIDER PREPARATION FOR DIFFERENT SIZED DECKS

28" and 36" decks require a different setup of the riding mower than the 33" deck. Set-up for the two configurations is described below.

Remove Seat Support Cover

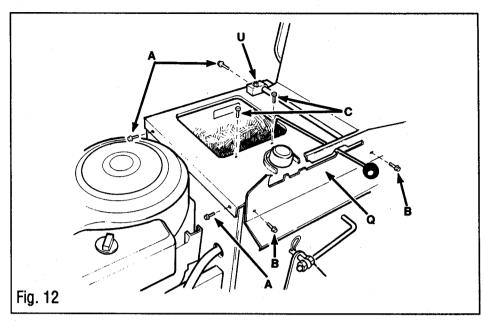
- 1. Lift seat.
- 2. Unscrew and remove shift knob.
- 3. Remove screws (B, Fig. 12) and remove shift quadrant.
- 4. Unplug seat switch.
- 5. Remove screws (U) and pull seat support from seat support cover.
- 6. Remove remaining 3 screws (A) securing seat support cover. Remove 2 screws (C) securing gas tank to seat support cover. Remove seat support cover.

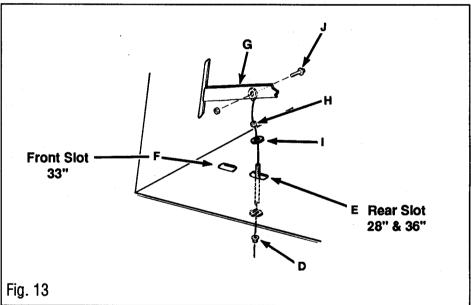
Install Mower Blade Drive Cable

- 1. Thread nut (D, Fig. 13) downward on cable threads until it stops.
- 2. Thread nut (H) and washer (i) upward and off cable assembly.
- 3. 28" & 36" DECKS ONLY: Insert cable, nut (H) and washer (I) upward through rear slot (E) in frame.

33" DECKS ONLY: Insert cable, nut (H) and washer (I) upward through front slot (F) in frame.

- 4. Place nut (H) and washer (I) at top of slot and screw down tightly, securing cable assembly to frame.
- 5. Connect cable to the mower blade drive (PTO) lever (G). Fasten cable to the right side of PTO lever when facing toward front of rider. Secure with screw (J) and nut as shown in Fig. 13. Tighten screw, but allow some play so cable may pivot.





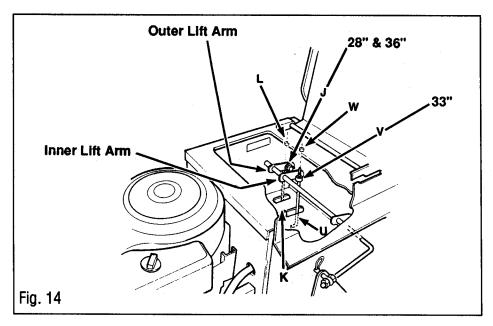
Connect (Left Side) Link to Lift Assembly

28" & 36" Decks Only

1. If swivel (J, Fig. 14) is not attached to OUTER lift arm, remove hair pin and washer. Attach swivel to the OUTER lift arm. Swivel loop should face to the outsde (left), over the OUTER slot. Place

washer and attach hair pin. Hair pin should be on the inside (right) of lift arm.

2. Slide link (K) upward, through the OUTER slot on the frame. Slide link through swivel (J). Thread nut (L) onto link. The position of the nut will determine the height of the mower when set in transport position. See instructions in the DECK ADJUSTMENTS, on page 14.



3. To install mower deck, See the *DECK INSTALLATION* on page 9.

33" Decks Only

- 1. If swivel (V, Fig. 14) is not attached to INNER lift arm, remove hair pin and washer. Attach swivel to the INNER lift arm. Swivel loop should face to the inside (right), over the INNER slot. Place washer and attach hair pin. Hair pin should be on the outside (left) of lift arm.
- 2. Slide link (U) upward, through the INNER slot on the frame. Slide link through swivel (V). Thread nut (W) onto link. The position of nut will determine the height of the mower when set in transport postions. See instructions in the DECK ADJUSTMENTS on page 14.

Replace Seat, Seat Support Cover and Seat Switch

- 1. Position seat support cover in position as shown in Fig. 12. Thread 2 screws (C) into gas tank, but do not tighten. Thread screws (A) into the sides of seat support cover. Tighten all hardware.
- 2. Position seat support on seat support cover as shown in Fig. 12. Secure seat support with screws (U).
- 3. Plug in seat switch.
- 4. Position shift quadrant (Q) as shown. Secure with screws (B, Fig. 11).
- 5. Secure shift knob onto end of shift lever.
- 6. Lower seat.

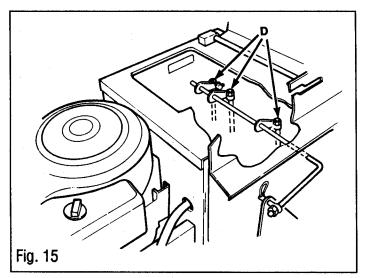

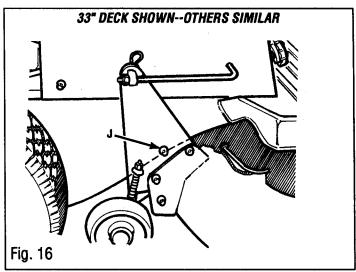

DECK ADJUSTMENTS

All mower decks should be checked and re-adjusted, if necessary, before using the riding mower.

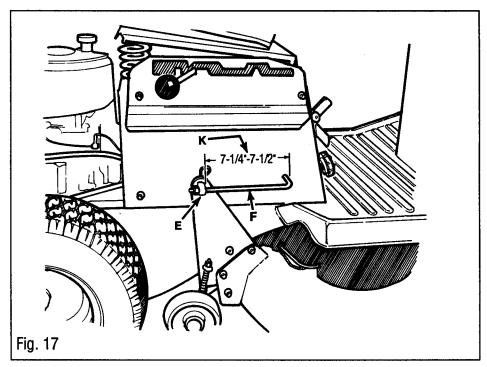
36" decks should be checked after assembly and installation for proper adjustment.

All Decks—Transport Height Adjustment

A 1/2" socket wrench with an extension and a universal joint is recommended for this adjustment. When mower lift lever (See page 18, Item I) is in the raised (UP) position, there should be a gap of no more than 1/8" between shoulder bolts (J, Fig. 16) on the mower deck lifting plates and frame. If adjustment is necessary, lift seat and seat support. Remove lift rod from mower deck and push lift rod up through frame so nuts (D, Fig 15) are accessible. Turn nuts (D) with the socket wrench, reattach mower deck, and check. Repeat as necessary.

28" Decks—Mower Drive Belt Tension Adjustment

Check distance (K, Fig. 17), between center of pivot block and center of pivot. Normal distance should be 7-1/2" (7-1/4" for 36" Decks). NOTE: AFTER THE MOWER HAS BEEN USED FOR A WHILE, THE MOWER DRIVE BELT CAN STRETCH AND BEGIN



SLIPPING. MOVE DECK FORWARD BY ROTATING PIVOT (E) TO THE REAR ON RODS (F) TO PROVIDE ADDED BELT TENSION. RE-ADJUST FRONT LINK TO LEVEL MOWER.

(SEE PAGE 25, MOWER DRIVE BELT REPLACEMENT FOR ADDITIONAL DRIVE BELT ADJUSTMENT INFORMATION).

33" & 36" Decks—Mower Drive Belt Tension Adjustment

Belt tension is controlled by position of idler (M, Figs. 19 & 21) and pivot rods (F, Fig. 17). Distance (K, Fig. 17) should be 7-1/2' for 33" decks 7-1/4" for 36" decks. Adjust position of idler (M, Figs. 19 & 21) by moving it along the slot. If further adjustment is necessary, adjust distance (K, Fig. 17) by rotating pivot (E) to the rear. Re-adjust front center link to level mower. NOTE: AFTER THE MOWER HAS

BEEN USED FOR A WHILE, THE MOWER DRIVE BELT CAN STRETCH AND BEGIN SLIPPING. MOVE DECK FORWARD BY RELOCATING PIVOT (E) ON PIVOT RODS (F) TO ADD BELT TENSION. RE-ADJUST FRONT CENTER LINK TO LEVEL MOWER.

28" & 36" Decks—Mower Spring Connection Adjustment

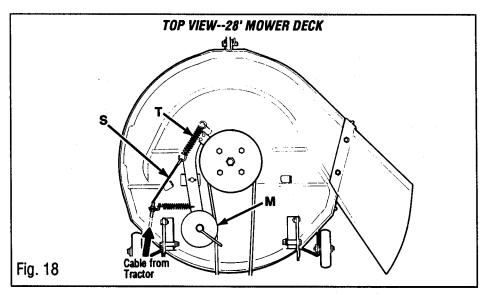
With mower lift lever (See page 18, Item I) in the disengaged position, adjust cable (S, Figs. 18, 20, & 21) at nuts (R, Fig. 20) until all slack in cable has been taken up. WHEN ADJUSTED, SPRING (T) SHOULD NOT BE UNDER TENSION.

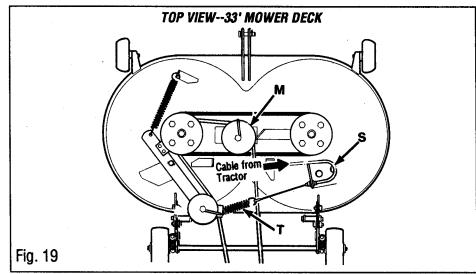
33" Decks—Mower Spring Connection Adjustment

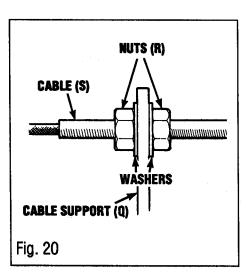
With mower lift lever (See page 18, Item I) in the disengaged position, adjust cable (S, Figs. 19 & 21) at nuts (R, Fig. 21) so there is a slight slack in cable. WHEN ADJUSTED, SPRING (T) SHOULD NOT BE UNDER TENSION.

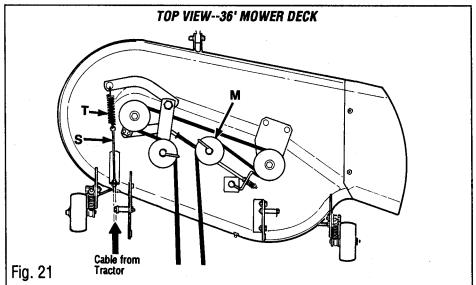
MOWER DECK LEVELING

Park the riding mower on a hard, level surface.









Tire Pressure

1. Use an automotive-type tire gauge to check the air pressure in all four tires.

Front tiresfrom 12 to 15 PSI (82 to 103 kPa) equally inflated.

Rear tiresfrom 8 to 10 PSI (55 to 68 kPa) equally inflated.

DO NOT OVER-INFLATE.

Front to Rear Leveling

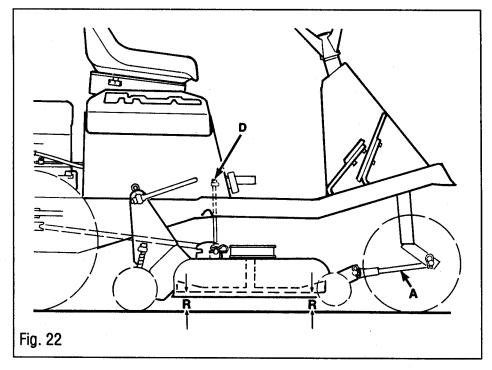
- 1. Check tire pressure as explained above.
- 2. Place mower lift lever (I, page 18) to the lower (DOWN) position so deck is in cutting position.
- 3. Adjust mower height adjusting knob (G, Fig. 23) so the mower blades are approximately 2-1/2" from the ground.
- 4. Align a cutting blade so tips point to the front and rear of the unit. Measure distance from ground to tips of blade. (R, Fig. 22). Both tips should be the same distance from the ground. If they are not, adjust front rod (A, Fig. 22) as necessary. Place mower lift lever into the raised (UP) position to adjust. Lower mower again to recheck level.

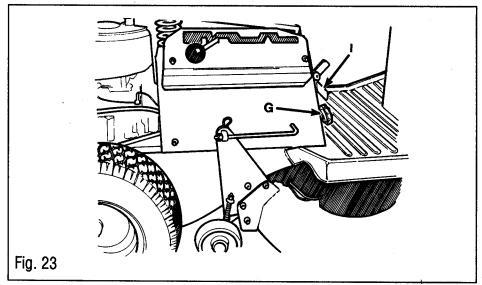
Side to Side Leveling

- 1. Align a cutting blade so tips point from side to side of the unit.
- 2. Measure distance from ground to tips of blade. Both tips should be the same distance from the ground. If they are not, remove lift rod from mower deck and push lift rod up through frame so nuts (D, Fig 22) are accessible. Adjust nuts (D) as necessary. Re-attach lift rods and recheck level. Repeat as necessary.

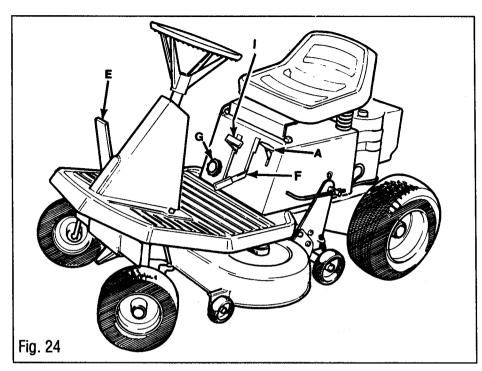

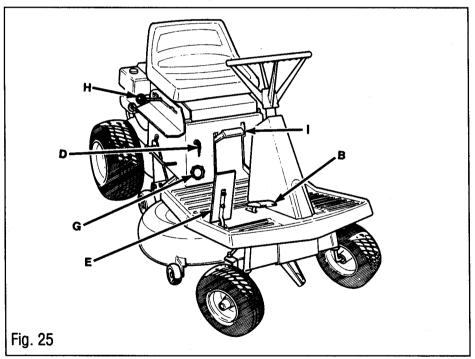

CONTROLS AND OPERATION



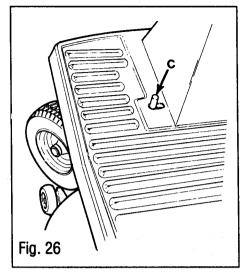


CONTROLS

Know the riding mower before you operate it. Carefully review this manual and become thoroughly familiar with the operating procedures and safety precautions.

Figures 24, 25, 26, 27 & 28 show you the location of all primary controls on your riding mower. See below for descriptions.

A — ENGINE SPEED LEVER. Controls the engine speed. Down decreases engine speed, up increases engine speed, all the



way up places the engine in CHOKE. For best performance, always run the engine at full throttle. USE CHOKE POSITION FOR STARTING ONLY:

B — BRAKE PEDAL. Stops the forward or rearward motion of the mower. IT DOES NOT STOP THE ROTATION OF THE MOWER BLADES.

C — PARKING BRAKE (BRAKE LOCK). Push the brake pedal (B) all the way down and push brake lock (C, Fig. 26) to the right to apply the parking brake. To disengage, push the brake pedal down and release.

D — IGNITION KEYSWITCH. The keyswitch has three positions – OFF, RUN, and START.

E — DRIVE PEDAL. Engages the forward or rearward motion of the riding mower.

F — MOWER BLADE DRIVE LEVER.
Engages drive to the mower deck blade(s).
To engage, lift lever and move it to the left into the detent. To disengage, lift lever, push it to the right, and slowly release.
NOTE: DISENGAGE MOWER BLADE DRIVE WHENEVER THE CUTTING BLADES ARE NOT IN USE.

G — MOWER HEIGHT ADJUSTING KNOB. This knob allows you to select infinitely variable cutting heights for the mower deck. Twisting clockwise raises mower, counter-clockwise lowers mower.

H — TRANSMISSION SHIFT LEVER. Allows you to select either reverse,

neutral, or one of five forward gears. (See SPECIFICATIONS on page 6 for average speeds in some of these gears). Until you become familiar with the riding mower, use only the lower gears—either 1, 2, or 3. See Fig. 27 for detailed shifting pattern.

I — MOWER LIFT LEVER. (Fig. 28) While in the UP position, the mower deck is in transport position. In the DOWN position, the mower deck is in the mowing position. The Mower Lift Lever should be in the UP position whenever the riding mower is not actually mowing.

NOTE: THIS RIDING MOWER HAS INTERLOCK SWITCHES AT THE BRAKE, MOWER CLUTCH, AND SEAT. THE UNIT WILL NOT START UNLESS THE BRAKE PEDAL IS DEPRESSED (OR THE PARKING BRAKE IS SET), AND THE MOWER BLADE DRIVE LEVER IS IN THE DISENGAGED POSITION.

THE ENGINE WILL AUTOMATICALLY STOP IF THE OPERATOR LEAVES THE SEAT WHEN EITHER THE MOWER BLADE IS ENGAGED OR THE BRAKE PEDAL IS NOT DEPRESSED.



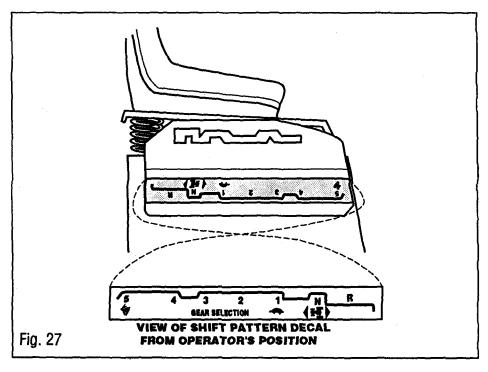

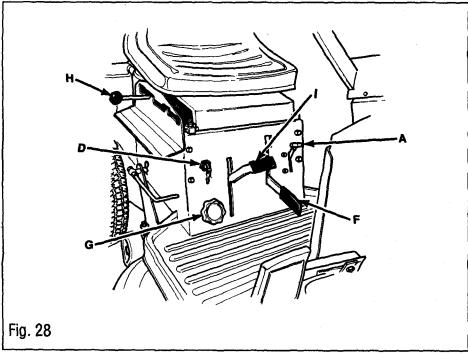

OPERATION

Pre-Start Checklist

- □ 1. Review Section 1: SAFETY.
- □ 2. Check the engine oil level.
- ☐ 3. Fill the fuel tank. (See Filling Fuel Tank, below.)



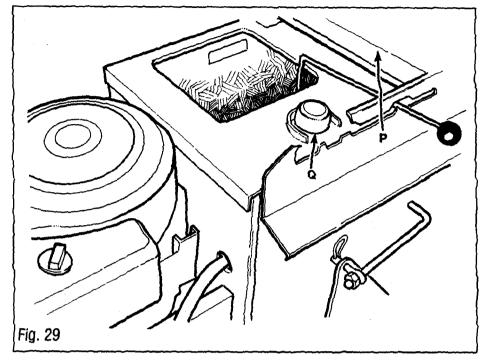


- Check the unit for any loose or missing hardware. Tighten or replace as necessary.
- □ 5. Inspect the battery for:
 - a. Proper electrolyte level.
- b. Clean cables and battery terminals.
- ☐ 6. Clean any debris off engine flywheel screen.

- □ 7. Check tire inflation:
 - Front tires: from 12 to 15 PSI (82 to 103 kPa) equally inflated.
 - Rear tires: from 8 to 10 PSI (55 to 68 kPa) equally inflated.
 - DO NOT OVER-INFLATE.
- □ 8. Re-connect spark plug wire to spark plug.
- Make sure mower discharge deflector shield is securely fastened to the right-hand side of mower deck (28 & 36 inch decks).
- □ 10. Adjust seat to a comfortable position. (See page 8, Seat Adjustment.
- 11. Check area to be mowed. Remove any debris from this area.
- ☐ 12. Set parking brake.
- ☐ 13 Place transmission shift lever into N (Neutral) (Fig. 27).

Filling Fuel Tank

- 1. Disengage mower blade drive.
- 2. Shut off engine
- 3. Set parking brake.
- 3. Allow engine to cool for at least two minutes before filling fuel tank.
- 4. Move transmission shift lever into 4th or 5th gear to allow access to fuel tank filler cap.
- 5. Tilt seat and seat support (P, Fig. 29) forward and upward.
- 6. SLOWLY unscrew fuel tank filler cap (Q).
- 7. Use a good grade of clean, fresh, unleaded gasoline. SLOWLY pour gas into tank. Use a funnel if necessary (make sure that it is clean). Frequently stop and check the level of fuel in tank while filling.





DANGER!

- 8. Do not completely fill the fuel tank. Allow at least 1/4-inch of space at the top of the tank. This allows for fuel expansion.
- 9. Re-install fuel tank filler cap and the cap on the fuel container.
- 10. Wipe up any spilled gasoline.
- 11. Tilt seat and seat support rearward and downward.

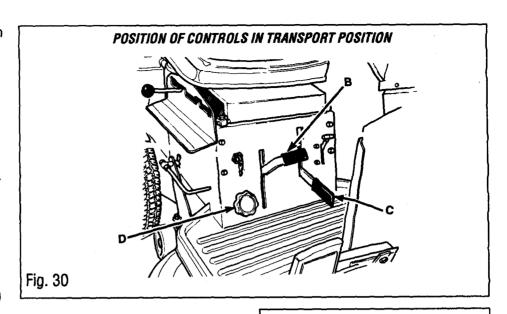
Starting

- 1. Perform Pre-Start Checklist described earlier.
- 2. Set parking brake (C, Fig. 26, page 17). The engine will not start unless the brake pedal is down.
- 3. When starting a cold engine, move engine speed lever (A, Fig. 24, page 17) all the way up to the CHOKE position. When starting a warm engine, set throttle at 3/4 full position.
- 4. Move mower blade drive lever (See F, page 17) all the way down to its disengaged position. (The engine will not start if the mower blade drive is engaged.)
- 5. Sit in the operator's seat.
- 6. Move the transmission shift lever (See Fig. 27, page 18) to N (Neutral).
- 7. Before starting engine, make sure there are no children nearby.

- 8. Place ignition key in keyswitch and turn key to the START position. Release key as soon as the engine starts.
- 9. To manually start engine: (all models except 13000 [2027])
 - A. Place ignition key in keyswitch and turn key to the RUN position.
 - B. Slowly pull recoil starter rope (A, Fig. 31) outward until you feel some resistance from engine compression—then rapidly pull rope outward.
 - C. Allow starter rope to gradually rewind rope. Do not release rope and allow it to snap back.
 - D. Repeat Steps 9B and 9C until the engine starts.
- 10. Move engine speed lever (A, page 17) to the FAST position.
- 11. Allow engine to warm up for a few minutes before you mow.

Interlock System Test

- Before working with the riding mower, always perform an operational check of the riding mower's interlock system as follows:
 - A. Park the unit on a level surface so it does not roll when you release the brake.
 - B. Sit in operator's seat and start the engine. (See *Starting* on the previous page) Depress brake pedal and check to make sure mower blade drive is disengaged.
 - C. Release brake. Raise yourself several inches off the seat. The engine should stop. If it does, go on to the next step. If it does not, have the interlock system adjusted or repaired. DO NOT OPERATE THE UNIT!
 - D. Depress brake pedal again. Re-start engine. Raise mower blade drive lever to its engaged position.





WARNING!

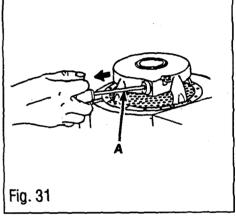
IF THE INTERLOCK SYSTEM DOES NOT FUNCTION PROPERLY, SHUT THE ENGINE OFF, APPLY THE PARKING BRAKE, ALLOW THE ENGINE TO COOL, DISCONNECT THE SPARK PLUG WIRE AND PREVENT IT FROM TOUCHING THE SPARK PLUG, AND REMOVE THE KEY FROM THE KEYSWITCH. E. Again, raise yourself several inches off the seat. The engine should stop. If it does not, have the interlock system adjusted or repaired. DO NOT OPERATE THE UNIT!

Mowing

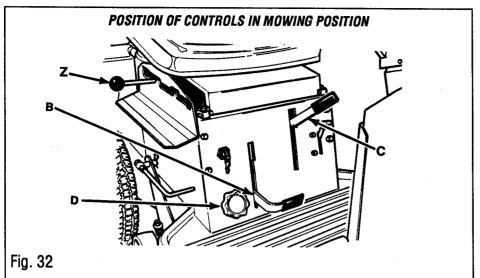
1. After performing the interlock system test on you riding mower, you are now ready to begin actual mowing. Put mower lift lever (B, Fig. 30) up into the raised position, and put the mower blade drive lever (C) down into the disengaged position while transporting your riding mower to the work area.

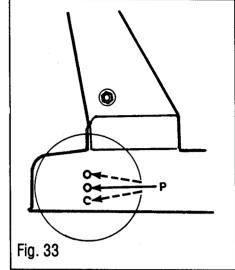


- Once you have arrived at the work area, release the drive pedal and stop the unit. Make sure the throttle lever is in the FAST position.
- 3. Select cutting height (See *Testing height of Cut*, next page.)
- 4. Make sure that no one is in the path of discharge or close to the mower. Slowly engage the mower blade by moving the mower blade drive lever (C, Fig. 32) up to its ENGAGED position.

NOTE: THE MOWER BLADE DRIVE CAN BE DISENGAGED AT ANY TIME BY MOVING THE MOWER BLADE DRIVE LEVER DOWN TO ITS DISENGAGED POSITION.

- 5. Lower mower lift lever (B, Fig. 32) to the lowest (DOWN) position, to position mower deck for cutting.
- 6. Select the gear you want by moving the transmission shift lever (Z, Fig. 32) to the





desired gear. Do not mow in R (Reverse). Here are some general gear selection guidelines:

1st gear: Going up or down moderate hills, travelling on slippery surfaces, high grass.

2nd/3rd gear: Level terrain to mild

slopes, normal grass.

4th gear: Level terrain, light mowing.

5th gear: Travel from storage site

to work location.

Reverse: Moving out of storage site, maneuvering in tight areas.

7. Slowly depress the drive pedal (E, page 17) to begin moving.

NOTE: AFTER YOU BEGIN MOVING, YOU CAN SHIFT TO ANY OF THE HIGHER OR LOWER GEARS "ON THE GO". YOU DO NOT HAVE TO COME TO A COMPLETE STOP — ALL YOU HAVE TO DO IS LET UP ON THE DRIVE PEDAL WHEN YOU SHIFT. HOWEVER, YOU MUST COME TO A COMPLETE STOP WHENEVER YOU SHIFT FROM A FORWARD GEAR TO REVERSE OR FROM REVERSE TO A FORWARD GEAR.

Testing Height of Cut

After mowing a small area, it is recommended that the mower be stopped, the parking brake set, and the height of the cutting area inspected (Make sure there are no small children or inattentive persons around you when this is done). The area can be inspected from the operator's position. If you wish to leave

the operator's position, disengage mower blade drive and stop engine before doing so (See *Stopping*, on next page). Twist the mower height adjusting knob (D, Fig. 32) or clockwise to raise the mower (higher cut), counter-clockwise to lower the mower (shorter cut). A good cutting height to begin with is 2-1/2".

Generally, if the mower is set too low, the grass tends to mat and clump. (This can also happen if the grass is wet. See *Mowing Tips*, on the following page.) If this does happen, raise the mower about 1/4" and test the cut again. Repeat until a clean cut is achieved.

If you have a unit equipped with a 33" mulching deck, cutting height is a very important factor in mulching performance. Set the cutting height high enough so that the deck is not overloaded. Too much grass in the cutting chamber at one time limits the amount of circulation inside the deck and impairs mulching action. An "overloaded" deck will leave grass clumps. Generally, a mulching deck that is set at a slightly higher cutting height will give better performance than one that is set too low. (See also Mowing Tips, on the following page.)

GAGE WHEEL ADJUSTMENT

After proper cutting height has been set, the mower deck gage wheels should be adjusted as well. Before doing this, stop the tractor. (See *Stopping*, Next page.)

The gage wheels are primarily an antiscalp device. Adjust so they are just off the ground. If several cutting heights will be used during a cutting session, set the gage wheels while the mower deck is in the lowest cutting position that will be used

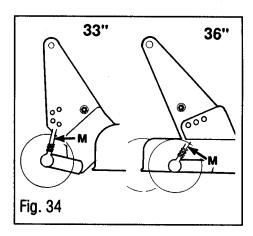
While mowing extremely rough, uneven or hilly terrain, it is best to allow the mower deck to ride directly on the gage wheels. In this case, set the gage wheels so they contact the ground when the mower deck height has been selected.

Rear Gage Wheel Adjustment, 28" Decks

Remove the nuts securing the gage wheels. Place the gage wheels in the desired position (P, Fig. 33) and secure with nuts. Set both gage wheels to the same height.

33" & 36" Decks

Remove spring pin and washer and position swivel (M, Fig. 34, following page) into desired hole. Replace spring pin. Set both gage wheels to the same position.



Front Anti-Scalp Wheel Adjustment, 33" Decks only

Remove the nuts securing wheels. Place wheel in the desired position (Q, Fig. 35) and secure with nuts removed earlier. Set both wheels to the same height. Normally, the lower hole should be used.

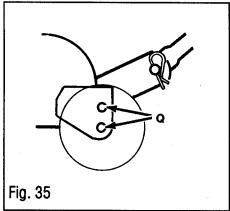
Stopping (See pages 17 & 18 for description of controls)

- 1. Remove your foot from drive pedal.
- 2. Depress brake pedal.
- 3. Move mower blade drive lever down to the disengaged position.
- 4. Move engine speed lever to the slow position.
- 5. Move transmission shift lever out of the N (Neutral) position.
- 6. Shut engine off by turning the ignition key to the OFF position.
- 7. Set parking brake by fully depressing brake pedal and moving brake lock to the right.
- 8. Lower mower lift lever to the lowest (DOWN) position. This will rest the mower deck on the ground.

(Also see Parking, below.)

Parking

- 1. Park the riding mower in a clean, level spot.
- 2. Park the mower out of the reach of children.
- 3. If possible, park the riding mower inside a dry enclosure, after the unit has cooled.



- 4. Set parking brake.
- 5. Move transmission shift lever out of the N (Neutral) position.
- 6. Remove key from key-switch and store it out of the reach of children.
- 7. Do not park the riding mower on a slope. Block the wheels (place blocks of wood on both sides of the wheels) to prevent it from rolling.
- 8. Disconnect spark plug wire from spark plug. Prevent spark plug wire from touching spark plug. This will prevent accidental starting.

Mowing Tips

Never mow in R (Reverse).

The best time to mow your lawn is in the early afternoon. This is usually when the grass is most dry. Avoid cutting the lawn when it is wet—wet grass tends to form clumps. Also, the sensitive newly cut areas will not be exposed to direct sun.

For best performance, always keep the mower deck blade(s) sharp. A dull blade tends to tear grass, not cut it.

Do not cut the grass too short, especially in hot weather. This can kill the grass and may allow weeds to gain a foothold. We recommend a cutting height of 2-1/2".

For best results, adjust mower deck height so the blade cuts off only the top third (or less) of the grass.

If the lawn is overgrown, or if you must use the mower on extremely uneven terrain, use the highest cutting height setting.

Unless a special pattern effect is desired (next column), vary your cutting pattern

from week to week. Alternate mowing the lawn from north to south and from east to west. This will help prevent matting and graining of the grass.

For best results, always mow with the engine speed lever in its FAST position.

Make sure the mower deck is level. If the deck is not level it will cut unevenly.

If you are not using an optional bagging attachment, direct the discharge towards the cut portion of the lawn. This will best disperse the clippings. (See also *Testing Height of Cut*, on the previous page.)

Keep the inside of the mowing deck clean and free from grass buildup. (See STORING YOUR RIDING MOWER, page 31.)

Special Pattern Effects

It is possible to create patterns in your lawn by mowing in specific directions. You can "train" your lawn to "grain" in a specific way by mowing in the same pattern every time. Some patterns are listed below.

To produce a pattern of contrasting stripes. Mow the lawn in parallel strips that run in opposite directions to each other. (For example North to South and then South to North.)

To produce a "diamond" or "checkerboard" pattern, first mow the lawn in parallel strips. Then, within a couple of days, mow your lawn again in parallel strips but at right angles to the first mowing. (For example: The first mowing is done east to west and/or west to east. The second mowing is then done north to south and/or south to north.)

Interlock System Test

This riding mower is equipped with an interlock system. This system prevents the operator from starting the engine, if:

- 1.) ...there is no one in the seat.
- 2.) ...the brake pedal is not depressed.
- 3.) ...the mower blade drive lever is in the engaged position.

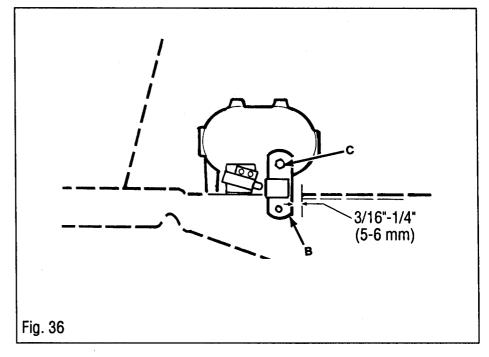

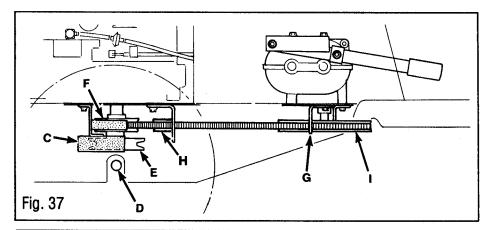

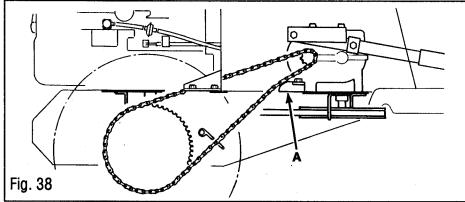
Drive Chain Adjustment

If drive chain appears to have excessive slack, adjust to prevent it from coming off sprockets.

To adjust:

- 1. Lift seat and seat support up.
- 2. Loosen chain tightener (A, Fig. 38).
- 3. Slide the chain tightener until excess slack is removed.
- 4. Re-tighten the chain tightener.

If further adjustment is necessary, move mower ahead by adjusting pivot location on lift arms (E, Fig. 45). Repeat this test until belt does not move. 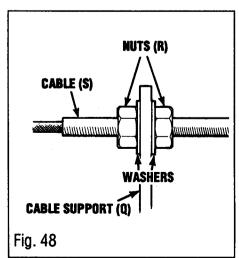

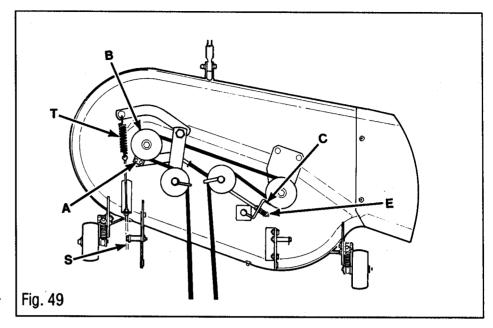

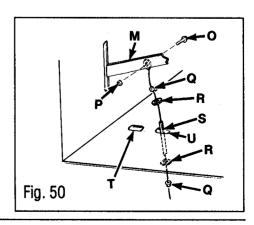

Periodically examine ends of mower blade(s) and area between turned-up and flat portions on the top of blade.

When mowing grass in dry or sandy conditions, abrasive particles wear away the metal connecting these portions of the blade. (A, Fig. 51.on the following page) If a separation starts forming in the blade as shown in (B, Fig. 51), you must replace

If this wear is allowed to continue, the separation will enlarge and eventually allow a portion of the blade to break off.

For best results, always keep blade(s) sharp. A sharp blade will cleanly cut grass. A dull blade tends to tear it. See next page for blade sharpening information.

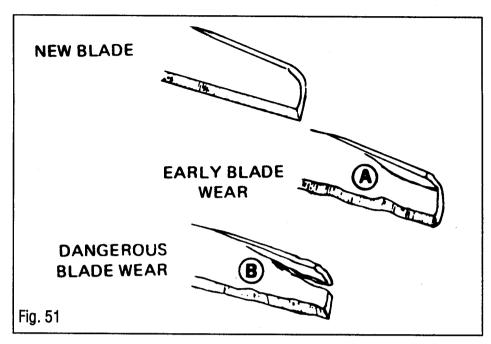

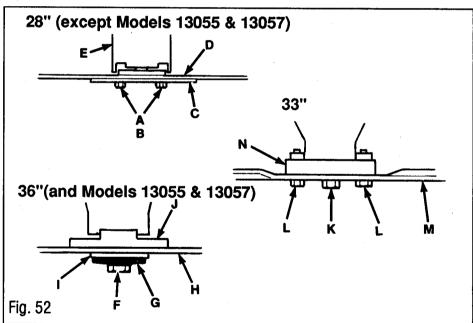

- 1. Re-position blade in blade adapter (J).
- 2. Secure with *new* blade bolt (F), spring washer (G) and spindle washer (I). Torque blade bolt (F) from 50 to 70 footpounds.

Mower Deck Blade Resharpening and Balancing

The deck blade(s) can be sharpened with a file or a grinder. A local sharpening service can also sharpen them.

To sharpen:

- 1. Remove equal amounts of metal from both ends of blades along cutting edges. Sharpen cutting edges at a 25-30° angle.
- 2. Check balance of blade(s) by inserting a nail or screwdriver through center hole. Hold nail level with ground so blade can rotate on it. Grind or file off heavier end, as required, to balance blade.

An unbalanced blade will cause vibration and undue wear on component parts.

STORING YOUR RIDING MOWER

When storing the riding mower for more than 30 days:

- 1. Move unit outside and run engine until it stops from lack of fuel.
- 2. After engine has cooled, store unit in a dry, protected place.
- 3. Remove, clean, and re-gap spark plug. See *Engine Owner's Manual*, supplied with the unit, for the correct gap.
- 4. Pour one ounce of engine oil through spark plug hole into engine. Place a clean rag over spark plug hole and crank engine several revolutions to distribute oil on cylinder walls.
- 5. Re-install spark plug. Leave spark plug wire disconnected.
- 6. Fully charge battery once a month during storage using only a trickle charger (not an automotive-type charger, which could ruin the battery). This will ensure peak battery power.
- 7. Clean underside of the mower deck. Use a hose, a wire brush or a scraper to remove any grass buildup. (Heavy grass buildup can seriously effect the performance of any mowing deck, especially the 33" mulching deck.) To clean deck, remove it, use the optional Model 6957 storage stand (see page 6), available from your local Bolens® dealer, or set the front of your unit on jackstands.

- 8. Thoroughly examine entire unit for loose hardware or any damaged or worn parts. Replace or repair as needed.
- 9. Sand and re-paint any rusted areas.
- 10. Cover your unit with a breathable cover.

11. Block all four wheels. (Place wooden blocks on both sides of wheels.) This helps prevent any accidental movement.

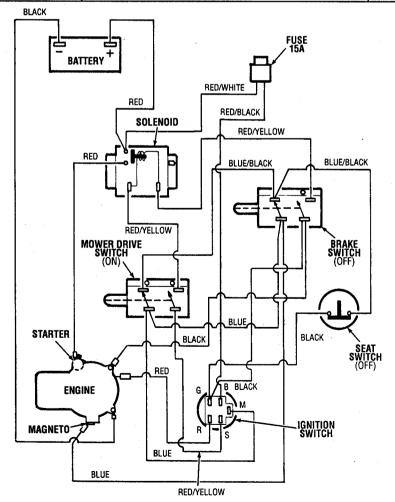

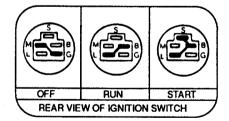

II. PRODUCT WARRANTY: NON COMMERCIAL RESIDENTIAL: THREE YEAR LIMITED WARRANTY

All new Bolens & Troy-Bilt®, and W-W Grinder® equipment specified above is warranted by Garden Way, Inc. to the original retail purchaser only, to be free from defects in material and workmanship, under normal use and service for a period of three (3) years from date of purchase.

Engines manufactured by Briggs & Stratton, Kohler and Tecumseh or transmissions manufactured by Peerless will also be warranted for this three year warranty period through the authorized repair stations of their respective manufacturers.
