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1 GETTING STARTED

WARNING

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture, and low temperature.
- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.

HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the base, the screen shows OUT OF RANGE. If you are on a call, the line will disconnect. Move back within in range of the base. The handset will automatically re-connect to the base.


Setting up IMPORTANT

The base must be plugged into an electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into a power outlet until the handset is fully charged. Only use adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

WHICH POWER ADAPTER

The power adapter with the smaller pin is for the base unit and the power adapter with the larger pin is for the charger unit (only for multi-handset packs).


1.1 Connecting the base



- 1. Plug the power adapter with smaller round pin plug and the telephone line cord into the base. The power adapter with bigger round pin plug is for the charger (only in multi-handset packs).
- 2. Plug the other end of the power adapter into a power outlet and the telephone line cord into a telephone wall jack.
- 3. Use only the provided power adapter.

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1.2 Installing and charging the handset battery pack



- 1. Slide off the battery compartment cover to remove it. Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, with the battery connector plugged in, as shown.
- 2. Slide the battery compartment cover back on.
- 3. Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours. Once charged, the <Batter full icon> will indicate that the handset is fully charged.

IMPORTANT

Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.

1.3 Setting the display language

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP HS.
- 2. Repeat to select LANGUAGE.
- 3. Repeat to select the desired language.
- 4. Press <MENU> to save.

1.4 Setting date and time

- 1. Press <MENU> to select DATE & TIME. If you're a subscriber to your network's Caller ID service, date and time is automatically set when a call is received.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then use the keypad to edit the year and the date.
- 3. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> or <PHONEBOOK> or <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to move between the input fields YEAR and DATE.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then use the keypad to edit the time in 12hr format.


 Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL->to toggle AM/PM settings. And use <PHONEBOOK> or <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to move the cursor to the target input field.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save the settings.

Your phone is now ready for use.

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

3 USING THE PHONE

3.1 Introducing Bluetooth

Your new telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology has the following features:

- Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with the telephone base. Two Bluetooth devices can be paired up and connected.
- Connecting a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to make and receive CELLULAR calls. Two mobile phones can be connected but only one of them can be used at a time.
- Making and receiving calls using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone plan while benefiting from the ease and comfort of your home telephone system.

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Glossary of terms

Below are some terms used in this User's Guide to help you become familiar with using your Bluetooth devices and your new telephone system.

Bluetooth mobile phone - Refers to a Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone.

CELLULAR line - The communications service provided through your Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone. **HOME** line - Your conventional telephone land line.

Pairing - This refers to the process of two Bluetooth devices registering device information with each other. The telephone base must be paired with a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone before the Bluetooth device can be used.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Refer to your mobile phone user's guide for more information about its Bluetooth function.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is between one to twelve feet away from the telephone base in order to maintain a clear and consistent connection between your Bluetooth mobile phone, telephone base and cell tower.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has sufficient signal strength. You may need to move the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone and telephone base to a location where the cellular signal may be stronger.
- Charge your Bluetooth mobile phone while it is connected to the telephone base because your mobile phone's battery will discharge faster while it is connected wirelessly to the telephone base.
- Monitor your mobile phone's usage because airtime is deducted from your cellular plan for the duration of the CELLULAR calls.

3.2 Bluetooth Setup

3.2.1 Setup Cellular

To pair and connect a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone:

- Place your cell phone near the handset and base unit.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUETOOTH.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP CELLULAR.
- Press <MENU> and display will show CELLULAR READY?
- Press <MENU> and display will show DISCOVERABLE MODE. The Bluetooth feature will be activated.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, turn on the Bluetooth feature and search for a new device.
- Once your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has found the Motorola L701BT / L702BT / L703BT / L704BT / L705BT telephone, select it.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, enter the PIN code of the telephone (the default PIN code is 0000) to continue the pairing process.
- Pairing will be confirmed when you hear a tone and the Bluetooth icon appears on the handset. The handset displays COMPLETED.

Refer to the user's manual of your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to learn how to search for or add new Bluetooth devices.

NOTE

- Paired device(s) will be connected automatically and stored into the Paired Devices list.
- When a device is successfully connected, corresponding device #1 or #2 will be displayed.
- If you would like to pair up another Bluetooth device, please repeat the steps as above.

3.2.2 Replacing a paired device

If you have already paired up two Bluetooth devices, you will need to replace one of them if you would like to pair up another device. Follow the below steps to replace and pair up a new device.

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUTOOTH.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP CELLULAR.
- Display will show the two cellular names of the paired devices.
- Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the cellular device you would like to replace.

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- Press <MENU> to confirm. Display will show REPLACE THE CELLULAR?
- Press <MENU> to confirm. Display will show CELLULAR READY.
- Refer to section 3.2.1 to proceed with the next steps.

NOTE

When pairing a new cellular, the connected cellular will be disabled temporarily.

3.2.3 Paired devices

The cellular(s) paired up will be displayed in the paired devices list, no matter it(they) is(are) connected or not. You can choose to connect, or remove the cellular from this menu.

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUETOOTH.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select PAIRED DEVICES.
- 3. Display will show the cellular name(s) of paired device(s).

NOTE

Display will show NO PAIRED DEVICE if there is no device paired up.

4. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the desired cellular device.

For connected cellular device:

- Press <MENU> to remove the cellular device.
- 6. Press <MENU> to confirm.

For the cellular phone that is not connected:

- 5. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select CONNECT or REMOVE CELLULAR.
- 6. Press <MENU> to confirm. If you select REMOVE CELLULAR, press <MENU> again to confirm.

NOTE

- When the connected cellular is removed, corresponding device 1 or 2 will be off.
- When the disconnected cellular is connected, corresponding device 1 or 2 will be on.
- When the cellular is removed, the device name will be removed and EMPTY will be displayed instead in the paired device list.

3.3 Making a home call using your landline

1. Enter the phone number and press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the phone number.

3.4 Making a cellular call using your cordless DECT handset

If there is only one Bluetooth enabled mobile phones paired up and connected,

1. Enter the phone number, and then press <CELLULAR> to dial out.

If there are two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones paired up and connected,

- Enter the phone number, press <CELLULAR> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the desired cellular device.
- 2. Press <CELLULAR> to dial out.

NOTE

If the cellular device is paired up but not connected, you should connect the cellular device before making an external Bluetooth call.

3.5 Speed dial calling

1. Press and hold a key from <1> to <9> until the number is displayed and dialed.

3.6 Answering a home call

1. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to answer the incoming home call.

3.7 Answering a cellular call

1. Press <CELLULAR> or <SPEAKER> to answer the incoming cellular call.

3.8 Receiving a cellular call while on a home call

A short beep during a HOME call indicates that there is an incoming CELLULAR call and the screen will display the

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caller ID.

To answer the incoming cellular call:

 Press <CELLULAR> on the handset. The home call will automatically be placed on hold and <HOME LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To swap the line to a home call:

• While talking on a cellular call, press<HOME> on the handset to swap to the home call. The cellular call will automatically be placed on hold and <CELLULAR LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To end the cellular call:

• Press <CELLULAR> on the handset. The home call will be resumed automatically.

3.9 Receiving a home call while on a cellular call

A short beep during a CELLULAR call indicates that there is an incoming HOME call and the screen will display the caller ID.

To answer the incoming home call:

• Press <HOME> on the handset. The cellular line call will automatically be placed on hold and <CELLULAR LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To swap the line to a cellular call:

• While talking on a home call, press <CELLULAR> on the handset to swap to the cellular call. The home call will automatically be placed on hold and <HOME LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To end the home call:

• Press<HOME> on the handset. The cellular call will be resumed automatically.

3.10 Ending a home call

1. During a call connection, press <HOME> or put the handset on the base.

3.11 Ending a cellular call

1. During a call connection, press <CELLULAR> or put the handset on the base.

3.12 Adjusting volume

1. During a call, press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to adjust the volume.

3.13 Muting a call

- 1. During a call, press <MUTE> to mute the microphone and "*MUTED*" will be displayed on the LCD. You can talk to someone else in the room without your caller hearing you.
- 2. Press <MUTE> again to unmute the microphone.

3.14 Dialing from the redial list

- 1. Press <REDIAL/VOL-> and then scroll <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to the entry you want to redial.
- 2. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the selected redial entry from the home line. OR
- 3. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the selected redial entry from the cellular line.

3.15 Dialing from the calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> and then scroll <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to the entry you want to dial.
- 2. Toggle the <#/ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT> key to format the dialing number.
- 3. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the selected call log entry from the home line. OR
- 4. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the selected call log entry from the cellular line.

3.16 Adding an entry to the phonebook

1. Press <PHONEBOOK>.

OR

Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to access the phonebook entry.

- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ADD.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then enter the name.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then enter the number.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save.

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NOTE

Numbers can be up to 24 digits long and names up to 16 characters long. Entries are stored in alphabetical order.

3.17 Storing a phonebook entry as a one touch number

1. Press <PHONEBOOK>.

OR

Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to access the phonebook entry.

- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SPEED DIAL.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the speed dial key from <KEY 1> to <KEY 9>.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll to the entry you want.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save.

3.18 Dialing from the phonebook

1. Press < PHONEBOOK>

OF

- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to access the phonebook entry.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the entry you want to dial.
- 4. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the selected phonebook entry from the home line.
- 5. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the selected phonebook entry from the cellular line.

TIPS

Instead of scrolling to browse the phonebook entries, press the numeric key corresponding to the first letter of the entry you wish to locate. For example, pressing <KEY 2> will show the entries starting with A. Pressing <KEY 2> again will show the entries starting with B, etc.

3.19 Caller ID

If you have subscribed to Caller ID, and provided the identity of the caller is not withheld, the number of the caller will be displayed together with the date and time of the call (if provided by the network).

NOTE

- If the telephone number is not available for incoming calls, the handset will display UNAVAILABLE.
- If the incoming call is from a withheld telephone number, the handset will display PRIVATE.
- Information about incoming calls will vary by country and network operator. Some operators may charge a subscription for their Caller ID service.

3.19.1 Calls List

The calls list contains details of missed and received calls. Details include the date and time of the call. Entries are displayed in chronological order with the most recent call at the top of the list.

NOTE

- When the calls list is full, a new call replaces the oldest one in the list.
- The received and missed calls log holds details of up to 30 calls.
- If you receive more than one call from the same number, only the most recent call is kept in the calls list. When you have missed calls (incoming calls that you haven't answered) the <NEW icon> will be displayed in the display on all handsets registered to the base. If one handset is used to view the calls log, the icon on the other handsets remains on (For multi-pack use only).

3.19.2 Viewing the calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Scroll <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to browse the calls list.

NOTE

• When reviewing an entry from the calls list, press <#/ ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT> repeatedly to display the number in a different format.

For example, if a caller number is displayed as 888-331-3383, the various formats will be:

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331-3383

1-331-3383

888-331-3383

1-888-331-3383

User can choose the desired number format for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving it into the phonebook.

• The <NEW icon> is removed once the new call has been viewed.

3.19.3 Saving a number from the calls list to the phonebook

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the entry you want.
- 3. Press <MENU> to select SAVE TO PB.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then enter the name.
- 5. Press <MENU> and then edit the number.
- 6. Press <MENU> to save.

3.19.4 Deleting a calls list entry

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll to the entry you want.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select DELETE.
- 4. Press <MENU> to confirm and the entry is deleted.

3.19.5 Deleting the entire calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select DELETE ALL.
- 3. Press <MENU> and DELETE ALL CALL LOG ENTRIES? is displayed.
- 4. Press <MENU> to confirm. All entries will be deleted.

NOTE

You need to review the particular call before you delete the record from the calls list.

- 1. Press <MENU>.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll through the menu.
- 3. Press <MENU> to open a sub-menu or validate an option.

Press <MUTE/CLEAR / BACK/ X > to go back to previous menu level or cancel an action.

If you do not press any button on the handset for 30 seconds, the display will automatically return to standby. It will also return to standby when the handset is placed on the base or charger.

3.21 Intercom

This feature is only available when there are at least two registered handsets. It allows you to make internal calls, transfer external home calls from one handset to another and use the conference option.

NOTE

Cellular call cannot be transferred.

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3.21.1 Calling another handset

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select INTERCOM.

3.25 Registration

3.28.2 Turning on or off the answering machine

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWERER ON or ANSWERER OFF. If the answering machine is turned on originally, ANSWERER OFF will be displayed. If the answering machine is turned off originally, ANSWERER ON will be displayed.
- 3. Press <MENU> to confirm.

3.28.3 Setting the announcement mode

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWERER MODE.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the announcement modes:
 - ANNC & RECORD invites your callers to leave a message.
 - ANNOUNCE ONLY lets callers hear your announcement but they cannot leave a message.

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Press <MENU> to save.

3.28.4 Setting the number of rings

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select RINGS TO ANSWER.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the rings to answer. (4 options are available: TOLL SAVER, 3, 4, or 5 RINGS).

If Toll Saver setting is selected, the answering machine will pick up after two rings if there are new messages, and after four rings if there are no messages.

You can record a memo which is stored on your answering machine and played back like a normal message.

When playing the message, pressing <MUTE/ CLEAR / BACK/ X > or <KEY 5> will delete it permanently.

3.28.7 Call screening on/off

You are able to hear a caller leaving a message. You can then choose to ignore the caller or pick up the call.

- 1. When the answering machine is recording, the handset displays SCREENING?.
- Press <MENU> to listen to the caller through the handset earpiece, the handset displays CALL SCREENING.
- 3. Press <SPEAKER> to listen via the handset loudspeaker.
- Press <MUTE/ CLEAR / BACK/ X > to stop screening and leave the answering machine to record the message.

I cannot pair my mobile phone to the telephone base

- Make sure the Bluetooth function of your Bluetooth wireless technology enabled mobile phone is turned on. See your mobile phone User's Guide for more information.
- Make sure the handset, base unit and mobile phone are located near each other.
- Remove the Motorola L701BT / L702BT / L703BT / L704BT / L705BT from your mobile phone's Bluetooth device history list (see your mobile phone User's Guide for more information).

- Turn off your mobile phone, and then turn it on again.

The <Battery> icon is not scrolling when the handset is placed on the base

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- Incomplete battery contact adjust the handset on the base unit.

- Battery is full -charging is not necessary at this time.

No dial tone

- If there is no base power, check the connections. Reset the phone by unplugging then plugging it back into an electrical outlet.
