Main Features

EOS DIGITAL Solution Disk contains software with the following features and functions for exclusive use with Canon digital cameras.

ImageBrowser (Image Viewing and Editing Software)

- ImageBrowser is software for viewing and editing images and is designed for a wide range of users who mainly shoot JPEG images.
- Together with each software, you can perform standard workflow (procedure) of downloading, viewing, editing and printing images.
- You can display and view 3 types of image lists, display an individual image in enlarged view, display comparisons of multiple images, or display images as a slide show.
- You can sort images by the date on which they were shot, rename multiple files in a single operation, and select and organize images by setting "Rating" or "Keyword".
- You can search for images using various types of information such as the date on which they were shot or by the "Rating" you have set.
- Various types of image editing are available, including JPEG image editing functions, image rotation, RAW image editing using RAW Image Task, and JPEG image merging using PhotoStitch.
- Together with EOS Capture, you can shoot photos remotely.
- With the image transfer function, you can perform image editing using third-party image editing software.
- You can perform various types of printing to suit your needs such as printing one image per page, printing an index of your images, or laying out and printing images.
- You can export images for various purposes such as converting and saving JPEG images or exporting for use as a screen saver or wallpaper.
- You can attach an image to an e-mail and send it.
- ImageBrowser is compatible with Color Management System.
- ImageBrowser is compatible with 2 types of color space (sRGB, Adobe RGB).

CameraWindow (Software for Communication with the Camera)

- Together with ImageBrowser, you can download to your computer images saved on the memory card inside your camera and perform various settings for your camera.
- You can download in a single operation multiple images saved on the memory card inside your camera, display a list of images, and download only selected images.
- CameraWindow is also compatible with image download using a third-party card reader.
- With the EOS-1D Mark II N and EOS 5D, you can set in the camera a Picture Style file saved on your computer. Also, with the EOS-1D series cameras, you can register Personal Functions and various shot settings in the camera.
- Together with EOS Capture, you can shoot photos remotely.

RAW Image Task (RAW Image Processing Software)

- Together with ImageBrowser, you can process and display RAW images, and set and change processing parameters.
- With the high image quality processing and the camera-faithful algorithm of Canon's genuine software, you can process RAW images in the same colors as the camera.
- You can set the same processing parameters as the camera or change the conditions. Also, there is hardly any image deterioration after changing the processing parameters.
- You can convert or save a RAW image as a TIFF or JPEG image, and attach an ICC profile.

- RAW Image Task is compatible with Color Management System.
- RAW Image Task is compatible with 2 types of color space (sRGB, Adobe RGB).

EOS Capture (Remote Shooting Software)

- Together with CameraWindow and ImageBrowser, you can shoot photos remotely where the camera is controlled from your computer.
- You can shoot and set various settings by controlling the camera from your computer.
- EOS Capture can also be used for shooting with the camera's shutter button.

PhotoStitch (Image Merging Software)

 Together with ImageBrowser, you can create panorama images, etc. by merging multiple JPEG images.

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


Software Configuration

The software on the EOS DIGITAL Solution Disk operates together with the software shown below, centering on ImageBrowser.

: Shows the camera control information from the software.



Select RAW image and process

RAW Image Task (RAW Image Processing Software)



- You can process and display RAW images selected in ImageBrowser and change processing parameters
- You can set the same processing parameters as the camera or change the conditions.
- You can convert and save a RAW image as a TIFF or JPEG image.

ImageBrowser (Image Viewing and Editing Software)



- You can display images as a list or display an image in enlarged view on a separate window (p.2-4 to p.2-7).
- You can sort images by the date and time they were shot and organize images by setting "Rating" or "Keyword" (p.2-9). You can search for images by setting conditions (p.2-10).
- You can edit and rotate images (p.2-11).
- You can convert and save a JPEG image into a separate image and export for use as wallpaper, etc (p.2-14, p.2-15).
- You can print one image on one sheet of paper, lay out and print images, or print an index (p.2-16, p.2-17).
- You can attach an image to an e-mail and send it (p.2-17).
- Together with all the software, you can download images from your camera (p.1-4) and perform settings for your camera (p.1-5, p.4-2), process RAW images (p.2-12), shoot photos remotely (p.3-2), and merge images (p.2-11).

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Setting the Communication Mode

You can set the camera's communication mode to [PC connect.], [PC connection] or [Normal].

- The settings on this page are only necessary for the EOS 5D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, EOS 20D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL and EOS 10D.
- With the EOS 10D, you must change the firmware to version 2.0.0 or later. For details on changing, refer to the Canon web site.
- Check that the camera is not connected to the computer and then set the camera's power switch to <ON>.

Set the camera's communication mode to [PC connect.], [PC connection] or [Normal].

Operation window in the EOS 5D

 With the EOS 5D, set [†† Communication] in menu to [PC connect.].

- With the EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, set [Communication] in menu option [§†2] to [PC connection].
- With the EOS 20D and EOS 10D, set [Communication] in menu to [Normal].
- With the EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL, set [Communication] in menu option [§72] to [Normal].

Press the <MENU> button to switch the LCD monitor display off and then set the camera's power switch to <OFF>.

- When setting the communication mode, always ensure that the camera is not connected to the computer beforehand. Setting the communication mode while the camera is connected to the computer will cause camera and software malfunctions.
 - When using the EOS 5D or EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, EOS Capture cannot be used if the camera's communication mode is set to [Print/PTP].
 - When using the EOS 20D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL or EOS 10D, the camera and the software in the Solution Disk cannot communicate if the camera's communication mode is set to [PTP].

About the PTP Setting

You can download JPEG images that use the PTP (Picture Transfer Protocol) function, when the camera's communication mode is set to [Print/PTP] or [PTP] (p.1-6).

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Connecting the Camera to Your Computer


■ Connection Procedure for Cameras other than the EOS-1D Series Cameras

(EOS 5D and EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL etc.)

Before downloading images to your computer or specifying the camera settings, you must connect the camera to your computer with the interface cable supplied with the camera. You can connect the camera while your computer is running.


Plug the dedicated cable into the computer.

- Plug the cable into the USB port.
- Refer to the computer User's Manual for information on the terminal areas.




Plug the dedicated cable into your camera.

- Face the < ← > mark on the plug to the front of the camera and connect the plug to the camera's < DIGITAL> terminal.
- With the EOS D60 and EOS D30, connect by aligning the <▶> mark on the plug with the <▶> mark on the <DIGITAL> terminal.



Set the camera's power switch to <ON>.

- When the [Welcome to iPhoto!] dialog box appears, click the [Decide Later] button. If the iPhoto starts at this time, quit iPhoto.
- The iPhoto is software bundled with OS X.



Click the [CameraWindow] icon registered in the Dock.





→ [CameraWindow] appears, the camera is ready to communicate with your computer. Proceed to "Downloading Images from Your Camera" (p.1-4) continuously.

■ Connection Procedure for EOS-1D Series Cameras

(EOS-1D Mark II N and EOS-1Ds Mark II etc.)

Before downloading images to your computer or specifying the camera settings, you must connect the camera to your computer with the dedicated FireWire (IEEE1394) interface cable supplied with the camera.


You can connect the camera while your computer is running.

✓ Plug the dedicated cable into the computer.

- Plug the cable into the FireWire (IEEE1394) port. Confirm that the shape of the plug and the shape of the FireWire (IEEE1394) port match, and then connect correctly.
- Refer to the computer User's Manual for information on the terminal areas.
- When using the dedicated cable supplied with the EOS-1Ds and EOS-1D, either plug (6-pin type) can be connected.


Plug the dedicated cable into your camera.

- For the EOS-1D Mark II N, attach the cable protector supplied with the camera, and then connect the dedicated cable following the steps below.
 - Make sure the < (=> mark on the plug is facing the top of the camera and then connect the plug to the camera's
 VIGITAL> terminal.
 - When using the dedicated cable supplied with the EOS-1Ds and EOS-1D, either plug (6-pin type) can be connected. Confirm that the shape of the plug and the shape of the camera's < DIGITAL> terminal match, and then connect correctly.
- Set the camera's power switch to <ON>.



Start CameraWindow.

- Click the [CameraWindow] icon registered in the Dock.
- → [CameraWindow] appears, the camera is ready to communicate with your computer. Proceed to "Downloading Images from Your Camera" (p.1-4) continuously.



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- Never perform the following operations while the software installed from the Solution Disk is running after connecting the camera to the computer as a communications error may occur.
- Set the camera's power switch to <OFF>.
- · Open the CF card slot cover.
- Disconnect the dedicated cable, remove the battery, or remove the AC Adapter Kit (optional), DC Coupler or DC Coupler Kit.
- Disconnect the plug and the power cord of the AC Adapter Kit (optional), DC Coupler or DC Coupler Kit.

Before you perform the operations above, be sure to guit all the software.

- You cannot communicate with the camera when you are displaying images through the camera's LCD monitor. Always connect the camera and your computer after turning off the display in the LCD monitor.
- While the camera and your computer are communicating, the camera's LCD panel may blink.
- Use only the dedicated cable.
- With EOS-1D series cameras, if you connect the plug of the dedicated cable into the computer's IEEE1394 port in the reverse direction, the camera or the computer may break down. Confirm that the shape of the plug and the shape of the IEEE1394 port match before connecting.
- With EOS-1D series cameras, you cannot communicate with CameraWindow even if you connect the USB interface cable supplied with the camera.
- Push the plug firmly all the way into the socket. Loose connections can cause faults or malfunctions.
- Do not connect the camera to your computer via a hub. If you do so, the camera may not operate correctly.
- If you connect multiple USB or IEEE1394 devices (excluding mouse and keyboard) to your computer, the camera may not operate correctly. Disconnect from your computer any USB devices and IEEE1394 connection devices other than the camera.
- Operation of the Auto power off function will automatically switch the camera off, disabling to communicate with your computer. Set the Auto power off function to [OFF] in advance. (Refer to the camera's Instruction Manual.)
- Do not connect more than one camera to the same computer. The connections may not operate correctly.
- The camera cannot communicate correctly with multiple softwares. Use one software to communicate with the camera.
- When unplugging the dedicated cable, be sure to grip the sides of the plug as you pull it out.
 - * If you are using the EOS D60 or EOS D30, pull the plug while pressing the PUSH button on it.
- If you do not perform any operation while the camera and computer are connected, a confirmation message may appear on the computer screen asking whether you wish to continue communicating with the camera for some computer systems. If you do not perform any operation even after this message appears, the communication with the camera is terminated. To re-establish the communication, press the shutter button down halfway or set the camera's power switch to <OFF> and then back to <ON>.

Do not put your computer to sleep while it is connected to the camera. If your computer goes into the sleep mode, never disconnect the dedicated cable while your computer is still in sleep mode. Always wake your computer up while it is connected to the camera. On some types of computer, disconnecting the dedicated cable while your computer is in sleep mode could prevent the computer from waking up correctly. Refer to the computer User's Manual for more information on sleep mode.



When you connect the camera and your computer, it is recommended that you use the AC Adapter Kit (optional) for the EOS 5D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, EOS 20D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL, EOS 10D, the DC Coupler supplied with the camera for the EOS D60 and EOS D30, and the DC Coupler Kit supplied with the camera for EOS-1D series cameras.

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Downloading Images from Your Camera

Downloading All the Images in a Single Operation

You can download to your computer all the images saved on a memory card in the camera, in a single operation. You can follow this same procedure when downloading images using a thirdparty card reader (p.1-5).

Click the [Starts to download images] button.

- → The images are downloaded to the computer.
- → The downloaded images are sorted in folders by shot date, and are saved in the [Pictures] folder on the computer.
- When all the images have been downloaded, the ImageBrowser starts and the downloaded images are displayed. Continue with the procedures in Chapter 2.



You can set the save destination and image type for downloaded images.

In the preferences, only images downloaded for the first time are downloaded and saved in the [Pictures] folder of the logged in user (you cannot download images previously downloaded). You can change the image download type or the save destination in the dialog box that appears when you click the [Preferences] button.


Downloading Selected Images

You can display the images saved on a memory card in the camera, select the images you want and download them to your computer. You can follow this same procedure when downloading images using a third-party card reader (p.1-5).

Click the [Lets you select and download images] button.

→ The images on the memory card are displayed





Select the images to download.

- Click the target image.
- To select multiple images, hold down the <shift> key or <%> key and click the images.
- To select seguential images, click the first image and then hold down the <option> + <shift> key and click the last image.

Click the [Download Images] button.

→ The [Download Images] dialog box appears.

Specify the save destination and then click the [Start Download] button.

- → The images are saved in the specified folder.
- When all the images have been downloaded, the ImageBrowser starts and the downloaded images are displayed. Continue with the procedures in Chapter 2.
- [3] is displayed on images previously downloaded to your computer.
 - [is displayed on images shot with AEB.
 - With the EOS-1D series cameras, a [1] is displayed on images with sound recorded.

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Camera Settings


Cameras other than the EOS 5D and EOS-1D Series Cameras

You can perform settings on the camera, such as setting the camera owner's name and setting the date and time.

- Select the [Set to Camera] tab.
 - → The [Set to Camera] tab sheet appears.
- Click the [Confirms/changes camera settings] button.
 - → The [Camera Settings] dialog box appears.



Specify desired settings.



Click the [OK] button.

- → The settings are applied to the camera
- Initializing a memory card deletes all the data and the data cannot be recovered. Check carefully before initializing.



Downloading Images Using Your Card Reader

You can also download images to the computer using a third-party card reader.

Load the card into the card reader.

→ The card reader icon appears on the desktop.



Click the [CameraWindow] icon registered in the Dock.

→ [CameraWindow] appears, the camera is ready to download images.



Download the images.

 To continue, you can download images using the same procedure as in "Downloading Images from Your Camera" (p.1-4).

Depending on the card reader you are using, you may not be able to download images using the [CameraWindow].

- - For information on connecting the card reader to your computer, refer to the card reader User's Manual.
 - For the functions displayed in the [Set to Memory Card] tab sheet of the [CameraWindow], click each button and refer to the contents of the dialog box displayed or the Help.

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Downloading JPEG Images Using the PTP Function

Cameras other than EOS-1D Series Cameras

(EOS 5D and EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL etc.)

You can use the PTP (Picture Transfer Protocol) function and download JPEG images saved on a memory card in the camera to your computer without having to start the software provided on the Solution Disk, when you set the camera's communication mode to [Print/PTP] or [PTP].

- This function is compatible with the EOS 5D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL. EOS 20D. EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL and EOS 10D only.
- With the EOS 10D, you must change the firmware to version 2.0.0 or later. For details on changing, refer to the Canon web site.
- Check that the camera and the computer are not connected and then set the camera's power switch to <ON>.
- Set the camera's communication mode to [Print/PTP] or [PTP].
 - With the EOS 5D, set [**?†** Communication] in menu to [Print/PTP].
 - With the EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, set [Communication] in menu option [§†2] to [Print/PTP].
 - With the EOS 20D and EOS 10D, set [Communication] in menu to [PTP].
 - With the EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL, set [Communication] in menu option [112] to [PTP].



- Press the <MENU> button to switch the LCD monitor display off and then set the camera's power switch to <OFF>.
- Connect the camera to the computer and set the camera's power switch to <ON> (p.1-2).
 - → The Image Capture or iPhoto starts up.
 - Start the Image Capture or iPhoto manually if they do not start automatically.
 - You can specify which software starts up in Image Capture.




■ EOS-1D Series Cameras

(EOS-1D Mark II N and EOS-1Ds Mark II etc.)


You can connect the USB interface cable supplied with the camera to the camera's direct print terminal, and download to your computer JPEG images saved on the memory card inside your camera using the PTP (Picture Transfer Protocol) function, without having to start the software provided on the Solution Disk.

- If you want to use the PTP function, connect with the USB interface cable supplied with the camera
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D Mark II N, EOS-1Ds Mark II, EOS-1D Mark II only.
- ✓ Plug the dedicated cable into the computer.
 - Plug the cable into the USB port.
 - Refer to the computer User's Manual for information on the terminal areas.



Plug the dedicated cable into your camera.

■ Face the plug's <-←> mark towards the bottom of the camera and then connect the plug to the camera's direct print terminal.



Set the camera's power switch to <ON>.

- → The Image Capture or iPhoto starts up.
- Start the Image Capture or iPhoto manually if they do not start automatically.
- You can specify which software starts up in Image Capture.

Download the images as directed.

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
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• You may experience the following restrictions with the PTP function. We recommend downloading shot images using CameraWindow (p.1-4).

- · RAW images cannot be downloaded. (Even if RAW images are displayed, they cannot be downloaded.)
- When a memory card in the camera contains both RAW images and JPEG images, you may not be able to download the JPEG images.
- Shooting information for downloaded images may be altered or deleted.
- Images cannot be downloaded if there is a large quantity of images in the camera (approximately 1,000 images).
- It may take several minutes after connecting the camera and your computer until the PTP function is operational.
- · Vertically shot images become horizontal when downloaded, or an image does not rotate even if you use the Rotate command.

In addition to the above restrictions, you may not be able to download images correctly depending on your OS version and computer environment.



The Image Capture and iPhoto are software bundled with OS X. For detailed information on using these applications, refer to the Help provided in the respective application.

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Working with Images in the ImageBrowser

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
Starting the ImageBrowser

Click the [ImageBrowser] icon registered in the Dock.

- → Browser window appears.
- When you download images with [CameraWindow] (p.1-4), the ImageBrowser starts automatically and the downloaded images are displayed in the browser window.
- Alternatively, you can start the ImageBrowser by double-clicking the [Canon Utilities] folder ▶ the [ImageBrowser] folder ▶ [ImageBrowser].



Main Window



- When sound is recorded in an image shot with an EOS-1D series camera, []] is displayed. For playback of the sound, select the [File] menu ▶ [Sound] ▶ [Play].
- The mark attached to the folder containing the images downloaded with CameraWindow is stored until you guit ImageBrowser.

- [is displayed on images shot with AEB.
- ImageBrowser is compatible with Color Management System (compatible color spaces: sRGB, Adobe RGB). When the [Apply color matching] checkbox in the [Color Management] in the preferences (p.2-17) is checkmarked, sRGB and Adobe RGB images are displayed in the same colors.

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Image Display and Folder Handling

Image Display

The images in the folder selected in the folder area are displayed in the image display area.


Select the folder where the images to be displayed are saved.

Handling the Folders

- Select the [RAW Image Task] menu ► [Quit RAW Image Task].

- Because only the processing parameter settings are changed and they are not added
 to the RAW image, you can change the parameters multiple times or revert to the
 condition when the image was shot. In addition, there is hardly any of the image
 deterioration that accompanies processing parameter changes.
- When the [Preview] is selected, every time you set a processing parameter, the image is processed/redisplayed. To process multiple processing parameters in one operation, deselect the [Preview]. After setting multiple processing parameters, click the [Update] button and the multiple processing parameters will be processed/redisplayed in one operation.
- The time needed after setting of processing parameters for processing and displaying an image is approximately 2 to 4 seconds.
 - The above time is only an estimate. Processing times vary widely depending on the camera model used to take the RAW image, the type of computer, and the subject of the photo.
 - Processing times are based on Canon testing standards.
 (When using the following: OS: Mac OS X 10.3, CPU: 1.6GHz PowerPC G5; RAM 512MB)
- You can attach ICC profiles to TIFF and JPEG images converted and saved from RAW images. An ICC profile contains color information, such as color properties and color spaces of devices which are authorized by International Color Consortium (ICC). With this ICC profile, many Color Management Systems can minimize the color differences between devices.
- RAW Image Task is compatible with Color Management System. In addition, two types of color space are compatible with RAW Image Task, and if the [Apply color matching] checkbox in the [Color Management] in the preferences of ImageBrowser (p.2-17) is checkmarked, sRGB and Adobe RGB images displayed in RAW Image Task are displayed in the same color.

sRGB: Windows standard color space. Also widely used for the standard color space for monitors, digital cameras, scanners and other devices.

Adobe RGB: A wider color space than sRGB. Mainly used for printing for business purposes.

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

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Timer Shooting

- Enter a delay time and click the [Start] button. Enter a value between 0 seconds and 99 minutes 59 seconds in 1-second

- The above window shows information displayable when the EOS-1D Mark II N is connected. The displayed information varies depending on the camera model connected.

→ The settings are applied and the [Camera settings] dialog box closes.


You can set up Personal Functions tailored to different types of photography and apply those function settings to the camera. You can also save the specified settings on your computer and load the saved settings.

- These functions are compatible with the EOS-1D series only.
- Display the [Camera settings] dialog box (p.4-2).
- Select the [Personal functions] tab.
 - → The [Personal functions] tab sheet appears.
 - With the EOS-1Ds and EOS-1D, select the [Detailed Settings] tab and click [Personal Functions] button.








- → The selected window appears.
- In the [Combination] window, you can check the specified Personal Function settings and the status of whether or not the settings are applied to the camera. You can also save and load the Personal Function settings (p.4-9).

Checkmark the box [□] and specify any necessary settings (p.4-4 to p.4-8).



- If you enter a numerical value, values outside the valid range of settings are ignored.
- If the Personal Function settings are saved on your computer, the saved settings can be loaded (p.4-9).
- Check the settings and save them on your computer if necessary (p.4-9).
- Click the [OK] button.
 - → Applies the settings and closes the [Camera settings] dialog box.
 - → When a Personal Function is applied to the camera, <#> appears on the LCD panel.



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Description of Personal Functions

 The shown in this section provides brief descriptions of the Custom Function Settings for the respective camera functions. For more details, refer to "Custom Function Settings" in the camera's Instruction Manual.

P.Fn-01 Disables the shooting modes

- Checkmark the shooting modes you do not want to use.
- Unwanted shooting modes can be skipped while you are selecting the shooting mode.
- This makes selecting the desired shooting mode faster.
- With the EOS-1Ds and EOS-1D, [Disable depth-of-field AE] is also displayed.



At least one checkbox must be left unchecked.

P.Fn-02 Disables the metering modes

- Checkmark the metering modes you do not want to use.
- Unwanted metering modes can be skipped while you are selecting the metering mode.
- This makes selecting the desired metering mode faster.



At least one checkbox must be left unchecked.

P.Fn-03 Specifies the metering mode for manual exposure

- Select the metering mode to be specified.
- You can specify the metering mode to be used in the manual exposure mode.
- When you set the manual exposure mode, the metering mode selected here will be set automatically. In the manual exposure mode, this enables you to use a metering mode different from the one used in the AE modes.

P.Fn-04 Sets the maximum and minimum shutter speeds to be used

- Select the maximum and minimum shutter speeds from the list box. For example, if you set 1/2000 sec. as the fastest shutter speed and 1/60 sec. as the slowest, the shutter speed range will be 1/2000 to 1/60 sec.
- This makes shutter speed selection faster and prevents a slow-speed sync. in aperturepriority AE mode with the flash.



- If you set the maximum and/or minimum shutter speed to one that is not a full-stop increment (such as 1/750 sec.), the controllable and settable shutter speed range might not be as exact as you set it (A slight deviation may occur.). This applies if you also set Custom Function C.Fn-6-1 and C.Fn-6-2 and set the maximum and/or minimum shutter speed to one that is not a full-stop increment (such as 1/3200 sec.).
 - To ensure that a proper flash sync speed is set in the Program AE mode, a shutter speed range of 1/200 sec. to 1/80 sec. cannot be set with the EOS-1D Mark II N. EOS-1Ds Mark II, EOS-1D Mark II and EOS-1Ds, and the range of 1/400 sec. to 1/80 sec. cannot be set with the EOS-1D.
 - If safety shift has been enabled (with C.Fn-16), it will override P.Fn-04's shutter speed range.

P.Fn-05 Sets the maximum and minimum apertures to be used

- Select the maximum and minimum apertures from the list box. For example, if you set 1.4 for the largest aperture and 8.0 for the smallest aperture, the usable aperture range will be f/1.4 to f/8.0.
- You can better control the apertures used by setting the range of usable apertures.



- Specify a minimum aperture value that is smaller than the maximum aperture setting. If you select a minimum aperture value that is larger than the maximum aperture, a warning message appears and the setting reverts to the default value.
 - If you set the maximum and/or minimum aperture to one that is not a full-stop increment (such as f/4.5), the controllable and settable aperture range might not be as exact as you set it (A slight deviation may occur.). This applies if you also set Custom Function C.Fn-6-1 or C.Fn-6-2 and set the maximum and/or minimum aperture to one that is not a full-stop increment (such as f/6.3).
 - If the largest aperture of the attached lens is smaller than the largest aperture you set with P.Fn-05, the largest aperture will be set to the lens' largest aperture. And if the largest aperture of the attached lens is smaller than the smallest aperture you set with P.Fn-05, the aperture will be set and fixed to the lens' largest aperture.
 - If safety shift has been enabled (with C.Fn-16), it will override P.Fn-05's aperture range.

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P.Fn-06 Registers and switches the shooting mode and metering mode

- Only while you press the < (> button, you can switch to the preset shooting mode. exposure setting (such as the aperture for aperture-priority AE), metering mode, and exposure compensation amount.
- Select settings that are appropriate for each shooting mode.
- The modes and settings are preset with the camera. See "Registering the Modes and Settings with the Camera" (see the right description) for information on the camera procedures.
- Convenient when you want to instantly select the preset modes and settings to suit a particular shooting situation such as backlit or front-lit conditions.

P.Fn-07 Repeats bracketing during continuous shooting

- While you hold down the shutter button, bracketing repeats continuously in the currently selected drive mode.
- This function is useful when you want to continuously repeat the bracketing sequence.

P.Fn-08 Sets the number of shots to be bracketed

- Select the number of shots from the list box.
- The usual 3-frame bracketing is changed to 2-, 3-, 5-, or 7-frame bracketing.
- In bracketing shots, if you select 5-frame bracketing with 1-stop increment, the bracketing for the shots is -2. -1. 0. +1 and +2.
- This function is useful for adjusting the range of bracketing.



- Even when the setting is outside the bracketing level display range, the exposure is compensated as specified.
- This function can be used in combination with C.Fn-09-2/3 and P.Fn-09.

P.Fn-09 Changes the bracketing sequence for C.Fn-09-2/3 to increased exposure, standard exposure, and decreased exposure

- The bracketing sequence when C.Fn-09-2/3 is selected (decreased exposure → standard exposure → increased exposure) changes to increased exposure → standard exposure → decreased exposure.
- This function is useful when you want to start the bracketing sequence with a increased exposure.





Registering the Modes and Settings with the Camera (P.Fn-06)


Set the shooting mode and shooting mode settings (for example, aperture setting for aperture-priority AE mode). Then set the metering mode and exposure compensation amount.

Register the modes and settings.

■ First press the < > button, then press the < > > button.



- → < □ > appears in the LCD panel, indicating that the modes and settings have registered.
- The registered modes and settings can be modified any number of times.





- To register the modes and settings, first press the < ≥ > button before the < > > button. If you press the < > button first, the camera will only select the registered modes and settings instead.
- Bulb cannot be preset.
- You cannot select the registered modes and settings during continuous shooting.



- If P.Fn-03 has been set to specify the metering mode for manual exposure, and P.Fn-06 is used to register the manual exposure mode and a metering mode different from the one specified with P.Fn-03, you can select the metering mode specified with P.Fn-03 by pressing the < > button.
- If P.Fn-04 and/or P.Fn-05 has been set, set the shutter speed and aperture within the range specified with P.Fn-04 and/or P.Fn-05.
- If the shooting and metering modes you want to set are excluded by the restrictions in P.Fn-01 and P.Fn-02, those Personal Functions must be disabled. For information on clearing and resetting Personal Functions, refer to "Clearing and Resetting Personal Functions" in the camera's Instruction Manual.
- Even if the shooting and metering modes selected by P.Fn-06 are excluded by the restrictions in P.Fn-01 and P.Fn-02, they are still valid for P.Fn-06.



- If C.Fn-4-1 or C.Fn-4-3 has been set, AF and AE will also take effect when you press the < > > button.
- When C.Fn-18 is set. P.Fn-06 is disabled.

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


P.Fn-10 Retains the shift amount for program shift


- Normally, any program shift amount is canceled after you take the picture. This Personal Function retains the program shift amount.
- This function is useful when you want to shift the standard program line so that priority is given to the shutter speed or to the aperture.

By shifting the program, you can change the shutter speed or aperture and still retain the same exposure level. Under the same brightness, you can shift the program line toward the right to set a faster shutter speed and a larger aperture (lower f/number). Or you can shift the program line toward the left to set a slower shutter speed and a smaller aperture (higher f/number). P.Fn-10 retains the amount of program shift. Select the appropriate amount of shift for the level of priority you want to give to the shutter speed or aperture setting.





With FF50mm f/1 4 USM



• The shift amount is retained even after you change the lens.

P.Fn-13 Executes Al Servo AF continuous shooting giving priority to the drive speed

- During continuous shooting, shutter release-priority takes effect instead of focus-priority.
- Effective when it is more important to capture an image even though it might be slightly out of focus.
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D only.

P.Fn-14 Disables focus detection (search driving) by the lens drive

- Normally, when you press the shutter button halfway and focus cannot be achieved. the lens is driven to search the correct focus. This lens driving operation can be turned off.
- When focus has been achieved once and refocusing fails, the subsequent lens driving operation can result in grossly out of focus. This subsequent lens driving operation is turned off. P.Fn-14 is especially suited for super telephoto lenses.



If autofocusing is attempted while the lens is way out of focus, the lens may stop operating. Focus manually until the subject outline becomes discernable, then autofocus.

P.Fn-15 Disables the AF-assist beam from being emitted

- This disables the external Speedlite's built-in AF-assist beam.
- At a joint photo session, etc., this prevents the AF-assist beam's pattern projected on the subject from being photographed by other photographers.

P.Fn-16 Enables automatic shooting when focus is achieved at the fixed point of focus while the shutter button is pressed fully

- This takes the picture automatically when the subject comes to the preset focusing distance. Focusing detection is performed using the selected AF point.
- Set the lens focus mode switch to <MF> and focus manually at the desired point of focus.
- Keep pressing the shutter button fully.
- Using an accessory such as Remote Controller RS-80N3 which can lock the shutter button relieves you from holding down the shutter button while you wait for the subject.



- Because the camera remains on standby while the shutter button is fully pressed, battery power is used up more quickly. For long periods of photography, use the DC
- When this function is used in combination with a flash, the flash remains on standby at full charge. Consequently, the flash batteries are used up more quickly. (The Speedlite's SE mode is disabled.)
- When you use a flash with this function, set the drive mode to single-frame shooting. If you select continuous shooting, the flash will be unable to charge in time for successive shots and will not fire at full charge.
- If you set the drive mode to continuous shooting, set the number of shots in P.Fn-20. If you do not use P.Fn-20, once the camera focuses on the subject, continuous shooting will continue until the capacity of the memory card is reached.
- P.Fn-16 cannot be used with manual focus lenses or with lenses that are too slow to be used with autofocusing.
- Do not use this function when C.Fn-4-1/3 is set as shots will be taken regardless of whether the image is in focus.



Using an accessory such as Remote Controller RS-80N3 which can lock the shutter button is recommended.

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P.Fn-17 Disables automatic AF point selection

• When you select beyond the peripheral AF point, the selection stops there. It makes selecting a peripheral AF point faster.



- If C.Fn-11-2 has been set, you can switch to automatic AF point selection by pressing the < : > button during autofocusing. (→ "Selecting the AF Point" in the camera's Instruction Manual)
 - If automatic AF point selection has been preset at [AF frame registration] setting, the preset setting remains valid. (- "Registering and Switching the AF Point" in the camera's Instruction Manual)

P.Fn-18 Enables automatic AF point selection when C.Fn-11-2 has been

- Enables the standard horizonal AF point selection together with automatic AF point selection with C Fn-11-2
- Convenient when you want to use automatic AF point selection while C.Fn-11-2 has been set.



If P.Fn-17 [Disables automatic AF point selection] has also been set, P.Fn-17 will override P.Fn-18 to disable automatic AF point selection.

P.Fn-19 Sets the continuous shooting speed

- In the list box, select the speed of continuous shots during continuous shooting.
- By reducing the maximum continuous shooting speed, Al Servo AF continuous shooting can be more stable.
- With the EOS-1Ds Mark II and EOS-1Ds, only [Continuous Shooting] is displayed.



In Al Servo AF, it may not be possible to complete the selected speed of continuous shots.

P.Fn-20 Limits the number of shots during continuous shooting

- This enables you to enter the maximum number of shots to be exposed during continuous shooting while the shutter button is pressed fully.
- Convenient when you do not want to shoot an unwanted scene that follows.

P.Fn-21 Enables quiet operation when the shutter button is OFF after picture-taking

- When single shooting is selected, this function selects guiet camera operation when you release the shutter button from the fully pressed position to the half way position.
- This is useful when the camera operation noise would be disturbing after you take the picture.



If you select continuous shooting, the camera operates normally.



Setting mirror lockup with C.Fn-12 will further reduce the shooting noise.

P.Fn-23 Changes the timer's time length

- After you press and release a button, the respective function remains active for a specific number of seconds. You can change this number of seconds as necessary.
- The function's activation time can be set from 0 to 3600 sec. (1 hour).
- If the standard activation time is too short or too long, you can adjust it.

6 sec. Timer	 AE lock time after you press the shutter button halfway or the X > button.
16 sec. Timer	FE lock time after you press the < FE L > button.
Post-shutter release timer	 Exposure setting retaining time after the picture is taken. Setting this to a longer time can make it easier to shoot in the same exposure with AE lock. LCD panel illumination time after the picture is taken.



Note that if you set a longer activation time, the battery become exhausted more quickly and the number of possible shots will be reduced.



To turn off the function's activation time midway, press the < MODE > button, < AF > button or < > button.

P.Fn-24 Illuminates the LCD panel during bulb exposures

- After the bulb exposure starts, press the <LCD panel illumination> button to illuminate the LCD panel until the bulb exposure ends.
- Convenient when you want to monitor the elapsed bulb exposure time.

Note that if you take bulb shots for long periods, the battery become exhausted more quickly and the number of possible shots will be reduced.

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P.Fn-25 Sets the default settings when the <CLEAR> button is ON

- You can use this function to select the default mode settings when you press the <CLEAR> button.
- Convenient when you want to instantly switch to frequently-used settings.

P.Fn-26 Shortened release time lag


- Normally, the shutter-release time lag is controlled for stability. This Personal Function. eliminates this control. As a result, the shutter-release time lag can be reduced by as much as about 20 percent when the aperture needs to be stopped down by no more than 3 stops.
- This is effective when a shorter shutter-release time lag is more important than a stable shutter-release time lag
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D Mark II N, EOS-1Ds Mark II and EOS-1D Mark II.



Since the difference is in 10-millisecond increments, the time lag may not feel any shorter.

P.Fn-27 Enables the electronic dial's function to be used in the reverse direction

- The electronic dial's rotational function can be reversed for selecting the AF point and setting the shutter speed and aperture.
- By matching the dial's rotation direction to the particular operation, the operation can feel more intuitive.



P.Fn-28 Prevents exposure compensation with the Quick Control Dial

- The Quick Control Dial cannot be used to set exposure compensation.
- This prevents exposure compensation from being set accidentally while the AF point is being selected.

P.Fn-30 Enables Quick Control Dial switch to turn on/off Main Dial, too

- Setting the Quick Control Dial switch to <OFF> disables the Main and Quick Control Dials.
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D Mark II N, EOS-1Ds Mark II and EOS-1D Mark II.

P.Fn-30 Enlargement mode

- Select which part of an image is enlarged.
- If you take the shot on the camera with this function [ON], you can enlarge an image.
- For more imformation on using this function on the camera, see "P.Fn-30 Enlarging the image" in the EOS-1Ds Instruction Manual
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1Ds only.



- If you wish to enlarge an image, set P.Fn-30 to [ON] during shooting and playback. The image shot on the camera without setting P.Fn-30 to [ON] cannot be enlarged.
 - The image shot on any camera other than the EOS-1Ds cannot be enlarged.

P.Fn-31 Add original decision data

- The data that shows whether or not the image is the original one can be added to the image. When selecting the display format of Shooting information (INFO), the icon showing the captured image with Original image verification data is displayed.
 - For more details, refer to "Shooting Information Display" in the camera's Instruction Manual.
- For the decision of the original image, you will need the dedicated accessory (optional).
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D Mark II N, EOS-1Ds Mark II, EOS-1D Mark II and EOS-1Ds.



The original decision data cannot be added to the JPEG or TIFF image converted from the RAW image.


- For more information on setting the color matrix on the camera, refer to "Selecting the Color Matrix" in the camera's Instruction Manual.
- This function is compatible with the EOS-1Ds Mark II and EOS-1D Mark II.
- Click the [Color matrix] button (p.4-10).
 - → The [Color matrix settings] dialog box appears.



- Select [CM set1] or [CM set2] from the list box.
 - → This activates the [Color space], [Color saturation], and [Color tone] list boxes.
 - If you select any color matrix setting other than [CM set1] or [CM set2], you cannot register the settings on the camera.



Select desired settings from the list boxes.



Specifying the JPEG Quality


You can specify the JPEG quality for each of the sizes, L (Large), M1 (Middle 1), M2 (Middle 2), and S (Small), and then register the settings on the camera.

- This function is compatible with the EOS-1D Mark II N, EOS-1Ds Mark II and EOS-1D Mark II.
- Click the [JPEG quality] button (p.4-10).
 - The [JPEG quality settings] dialog box appears.



Drag the slider left or right to adjust the JPEG quality.

 Higher values give a lower compression ratio and higher image quality for any size.



Click the [Apply to camera] button.

- → The JPEG quality is registered on the camera.
- Click the [Close] button.
 - → The [JPEG quality settings] dialog box closes.

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Click the [Apply to camera] button.

→ The color matrix is registered on the camera.

Click the [Close] button.

→ The [Color matrix settings] dialog box closes.

Troubleshooting

If you could not complete the installation correctly, or communication between the camera and computer fails, or software doesn't run properly, consult the items described below.

• For instructions on installing, refer to the "Software Guide" supplied with your camera.

Installation failed.

- Are you logged into an account other than the Administrator account?
 - → You cannot install software unless you are logged into an account with Administrator privileges. Log in again into an account with Administrator privileges. For how to log in and how to specify Administrator settings, refer to the User's Manual for the Macintosh computer you are using or for OS X.

I have installed the software but the camera and computer cannot communicate.

- Does your computer comply with these requirements?
 - Cameras other than EOS-1D series cameras
 - \rightarrow A Macintosh with a USB port as a standard feature.
 - * Operation is not guaranteed when connecting to a Macintosh other than the one described above.
 - **EOS-1D series cameras**
 - → A Macintosh with a FireWire (IEEE1394) port as a standard feature.
 - * Operation is not guaranteed when connecting to a Macintosh other than the one described above.
- Are the camera and computer connected correctly?
 - → Connect the camera to your computer correctly using the dedicated cable (p.1-2).
- Have you made the correct communication settings for cameras that require communication settings?
 - → Set the camera's communication mode to [PC connect.] or [PC connection] for the EOS 5D and EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, and to [Normal] for the EOS 20D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL and EOS 10D (p.1-1). With the EOS 10D, you must also change the firmware to version 2.0.0 or later. For details on changing, refer to the Canon web site.
- Is there sufficient charge left in the camera battery?
 - → Your computer does not supply power to the camera. Connect the AC Adapter Kit (optional) for the EOS 5D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL XT/350D DIGITAL, EOS 20D, EOS DIGITAL REBEL/300D DIGITAL and EOS 10D, the DC Coupler supplied with the

camera for the EOS D60 and EOS D30, and the DC Coupler Kit supplied with the camera for the EOS-1D series cameras. Alternatively, insert a charged battery and connect your computer and camera.

- Do you have more than one camera connected to your computer?
 If you connect more than one camera to the same computer, the driver and camera may not operate normally.
 - → Quit the software and disconnect all the dedicated cables. Then connect only one camera to the same computer again.
- Are you using a first-generation iMac without having updated the firmware?
 Update the firmware using the iMac Firmware Update.
 - → Download the iMac Firmware Update from the Apple web site.

The software doesn't run properly or doesn't run at all.

- Is the preferences file for the software corrupted?
 - → The preferences file for your software may be damaged.

Quit all active programs and disconnect all the dedicated cables from your computer, delete the files of the software that is not functioning correctly from the [Preferences] folder, and then restart the software.

Open the hard disk drive where the system is saved ▶ the [Users] folder ▶ Folder for the logged in user ▶ the [Library] folder ▶ the [Preferences] folder and then delete the target file.

For Macintosh OS X 10.2, double-click the hard disk drive where the system is saved ► click the [Home] button ► the [Library] folder to open the [Preferences] folder and delete the target files.

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Uninstalling the Software

- Log into the account used when installation was performed.
- Before beginning the software uninstallation, guit all programs you are using and disconnect the dedicated cable from your computer.
- When you have moved the folders and the software to be deleted to the Trash, select the [Finder] menu ▶ [Empty Trash] and empty the Trash. You cannot reinstall the software until you have emptied the Trash.
- Display the folder in which the software is saved.
 - Open the [Canon Utilities] folder.



- Drag the folder for the software to be uninstalled to the Trash.
- Select the [Finder] menu on the desktop ▶ [Empty Trash].
 - → The software is deleted.
 - When uninstallation ends, restart your computer.
- You cannot retrieve data that you have emptied into the Trash and deleted, so be particularly careful when deleting data.

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
