




2.1 Inserting the SIM Card

2.1.1 Remove the back cover(1), remove the battery (2), and insert the SIM card (3)



2.1.2 Install the battery and back cover







2.2 Turning the phone on

To turn the phone on, press and hold the End / Power key. Enter the PIN code if required.

2.3 Charging the Battery

- 1. Ensure the battery is inserted in the handset. To charge the battery, plug in the charger connector at the bottom of your phone (USB interface) and then plug the other end into an AC power socket.
- 2. The battery symbol indicates the charging status. While charging, the charge indicators will scroll. When all the scroll bars are steady, the battery is fully charged.
- 3. Disconnect the charger from the phone.
- 4. Disconnect the charger from the AC power socket.

Note: If the battery is powerless, the battery icon will reappear after a few minutes of charging.

- 2.4 Inserting a T-Flash Card1. Lift up the T-Flash card cover on the right side of the SIM card slot. Pull the cover down if it is locked and then lift. "OPEN" will prompt you in the correct direction.
- 2. With the metal contacts facing down, gently slide the T-Flash card into the slot.
- 3. Press and pull the cover up to lock it. "Lock" will prompt you in the correct direction.



2.5 Important Password

3 Text Entry

3.1 Input Method

During text editing, you can press the # Key to switch input modes or press the Left Soft Key [Option] and select Input Method to select different input modes.

3.2 Smart Input Method

Example: How to enter the word "HOME"

- 4. Press the Left Soft Key [Select] or OK Key to confirm "HOME".

3.3 Multi-tap Input

Using this mode requires you to press a key as many times as needed to enter the desired letter.

To enter the word "casa" in Multi-tap input mode "abc", press key 2 (ABC) three times, press 2 (ABC) once, press key 7 (PQRS) four times, press key 2 (ABC) once.

3.4 Numeric Input

Press the # Key to select "\123" then you can enter the numbers.

4 Calling

4.1 Making a Call

Note: You can make a call only when the network name appears on the screen.

- 1. In idle mode,enter the phone number.
- 2. Press the Dial / Answer Key to dial the number.
- 3. Press the End / Power Key to end the call.



Note: During a call, press the Navigation Key Up/Down to adjust the volume. You can press the Left Soft Key [Option] to choose **Sound Recorder**.

Note: In most countries, recording telephone conversations is subject to legislation. We advise you to notify the caller if you intend to record your conversation and only do so if they agree.

4.2 Making an International Call

- 1. Press the * Key twice quickly until "+" appears on the screen.
- 2. Enter the country code.
- 3. Enter the area code (normally without the 0 before it) followed by the phone number.
- 4. Press the Dial / Answer Key to call directly.

5.2 Messages

5.2.1 Creating a text message

- 1. Select Menu > Messages > Write message > Text message.
- 2. Write a message, please refer to the **Text entry** section of this manual for detailed information.

5.2.2 Creating a multimedia message

- 1. In idle mode, press the Left Soft Key [Menu] to enter the main menu.
- Select Messages > Write Message > Multimedia message. The MMS editing screen will appear.

You are now able to add a picture, sound and attachment into your message.

- 3. After you are finished, select **Options** and then **Send to**.
- 4. Add the recipient by inputting the number manually or searching them in the phonebook.
- 5. Select Options and select the send option to send the message.

5.2.3 Voicemail Server

This menu allows you to set your voice mailbox number and listen to your voice messages.

To set your voice mailbox number, select Messages >Message settings > Text message > Voicemail server

Note: You can forward your calls to your voice mailbox (the phone number for callers to leave a message) via the Call forwarding feature.

5.2.4 Broadcast Message

1. Select Menu > Messages > Broadcast message.

- Press the Left Soft Key [On] to activate this function.

5.3 Games

Your cellular phone provides you with several games.

You can also adjust the game settings when you enter the game menu.

5.4 STK Service



Note: The submenus of this feature depend on the operator and different operators may provide different services (some SIM cards do not support STK), which cannot be modified.

5.5 Call center

5.5.1 View Call History.

- Select Menu > Call center > Call history.
- 2. Press the Navigation Key to view different call logs.

3. Choose a particular number and press the Dial Key to call the number directly.

5.5.2 Adjust Call Settings.

- Select Menu > Call center > Call settings.
- 2. Now you can set the caller ID,call waiting, call divert, call barring etc.

5.6 WAP

5.6.1 Internet service

Your phones support Web Browser. You can obtain various services such as up-to date news, weather, sport, and other information as well as other Internet services. These services are designed and maintained by WAP service providers.

Note: To activate WAP service, you may need to contact your service provider. Do not switch the phone on when the wireless phone use is prohibited or when it may cause interference or danger.



<u>Homepage</u>

To access the browser from the standby mode, go to Internet service in Services and select Homepage. Once connected, the homepage is displayed. The content depends on the service provider. To exit the browser, press the End Key.

You can set the homepage address in **WAP > Internet service > Homepage**.

Bookmarks

You can use this menu to save URL addresses to quick access a website.

Recent pages

You can view the recent pages you have visited.

Input address

You can key in the URL address. When you are done, select Options > Done. Your phone will connect the URL you just keyed in. After the address is entered, you may select the URL and select Options > Go to to connect next time.

Service inbox

WAP push messages are saved here.

Settings

GPRS (General Packet Radio Service) is a technology that use for sending and receiving data over the

If the settings have made by the service provider, you may begin immediately. If the accessed profiles have been assigned by your service provider, select a profile and activate it. Otherwise, you may key in setting manually. For appropriate settings, contact your network operator or service provider.

Key in the service settings manually

- From the main menu, select WAP> Internet service > Settings.
- Select the Profiles.
- Select a profile from the list. Select Activate profile to activate the selected profile. You
 may edit the profile in Profile name, Homepage, Data account, Connection type, User
 name and Password. To get more information, you may need to contact your operator.



Note: In most cases, you only need to use one of the default profiles to access the Internet. The settings are different from operator to operator. Please consult your operator or service provider for the correct settings and proceed with care. Wrong settings will cause the connection to fail.

Browser options

You can set Timeout, Show pictures, Cache and Cookies here.

Service message settings

You can choose either receive or reject the service messages which are saved in the service inbox sent by your service provider.

Clear cache

The information or date you have accessed is all stored in the cache of the phone. A cache is a file buffer used to store date only temporarily. You can clear the cache by selecting this option.

Clear cookies

Under the consideration of privacy and security issue, we would suggest you to clear cookies which may contain sensitive information just in case your phone is misplaced, lost or stolen.

Trusted certificates

This function is to indicate your trusted certificate while browsing and allows you to manage your trust list.

5.6.2 Licence manager

In this concent, you can see your Licence list, status and advance options.

5.6.3 Data account

You can access WAP via GSM Data or GPRS. To get the analogue number, ISDN number information or the access point of GPRS, you may need to contact your operator for the service.

5.7 Phonebook

Your phone features two phonebooks, the SIM phonebook and the smart phonebook which is integrated into the phone memory.

5.7.1 Search contact

- . Press Menu > Phonebook.
- 2. Enter the first few letters of the contact name to search.

5.7.2 Add New Contact

To create a new SIM/phone contact:

- Select Menu > Phonebook > Add new contact.
 If you want to change the storage position, press the Left Soft Key [Options] and then select Phonebook settings > Preferred storage to set the storage position.
- 2. Press the **Options > select** to enter the contact information.
- 3. Press the OK Key or **Done** to save the contact.

5.7.3 Phonebook settings

- 1. Select Menu > Phonebook
- 2. If you select a contact, press the Left Soft Key [Options] can call, edit, copy, move, etc.
- 3. Select one item, press the Left Soft Key [Options] and select **Phonebook settings**.

Now you can set the speed dial, view the memory status, copy or move contacts, etc.

5.8 Organizer

This menu contains features and options designed to keep you organized and informed while on the go.

5.8.1 Calendar

This feature allows you to keep track of your schedule and tasks saved in the calendar. You can also switch on the alarm with the task for reminding.

To make a note and reminder in Calendar for the first time:



- 1. In Organizer menu, choose Calendar.
- 2. Select a day in the calendar.
- Select Options > View to view the event. You can also select Options > Add event to add a
 new event
- Choose a type of the event. Input the start and end time of your event, and describe the
 event contents in Subject and Details, after you finish editing the contents of your event,
 select Options > Done to save your description.
- 5. Choose Alarm clock to turn on or off.
- 6. Choose Once/ Everyday/Custom/ Weekly/ Monthly in Repeat.
- 7. Then you can edit other information.
- 8. Press **Done** to save the event.

5.8.2 Create a new task

You can also view, edit or delete the tasks from the options under this feature. For the first-time user, you will need to follow the steps below:

- . Select Add in the Task List. Then choose the task type.
- 2. Edit your Task by entering date, time, subject, alarm, repeat, and other information.
- 3. You can choose to turn the alarm on as the reminder.
- 4. Select **Done** and **Yes** to save your Tasks list.

5.8.3 Set an alarm

- 1. Select Menu > Organizer > Alarm.
- 2. Select an alarm and then press the Left soft Key [Edit] to create.
- 3. Use the **Navigation Key** to turn it on or off.
- 4. Enter other information, such as time, repeat, and so on.

5.8.4 World clock

You can view the local date and time via selecting the GMT and city. When the cross points out a certain city, it will show the local date and time.

5.8.5 Calculator

The calculator applies simple calculator function such as addition, subtraction, multiplications and division.

To start using

- 1. Go to Organizer and select Calculator.
- Enter the number with keypad, and then click the "+" for addition, or click the "-"for Subtraction, or click the "*" for Multiplication, or click the "/" for

- 3. Click Left soft key or Navigation key to calculate.
- 4. To exit calculator, press the End Key or the Right soft Key.

5.8.6 Currency converter

This application allows you to convert currency.

First, input the rate, press the # Key to enter a decimal point, then input the local value. Press the Left Soft Key [OK] to view the foreign value.

5.8.7 Stopwatch

This function is designed to store the timepiece, which is to start or stop for exact timing.

To use stopwatch

- 1. From the main menu select **Organizer > Stopwatch**.
- 2. Select **Typical stopwatch**. You can choose different record methods and view records.
 - Split timing: When you select this, the timepiece will be saved and continue to count when you press Split. The 2nd timepiece is recorded based on the continuous timing. You can stop and resume anytime.
 - Lap timing: When you select this, the timepiece will be saved and start the new timing
 when you press Lap. The 2nd timepiece is recorded in new timing. You can stop and
 resume anytime.
 - View records: You can view those timepieces you have recorded or delete the records.

Select nWay stopwatch. You can make four records.

This menu contains features and options designed to keep you organized and informed while on the go. As most of the features are very simple, here you can only view some important features.

5.8.8 Torch

To light in darkness, you may activate Torch by below operations:

In idle screen, select Menu > Organizer > Torch. Press Left Soft Key / OK Key to switch torch on or off

5.9.1 Image Viewer

This menu lists the picture from **Multimedia > File Manager > Phone/Memory card > Photos** according to its storage setting.

5.9.2 Audio Player

- 4. In the recording screen, you can press the Left Soft Key to pause or continue.
- 5. If you have finished, press the Right Soft Key [Stop] to stop recording.



Note: Saved sound files can be found in the **Multimedia > File Manager > Phone/ Memory card > Audio** menu according to your storage setting.

5.9.4 FM Radio

Note: The radio will not work unless the headset is attached. Attach the headset included with your phone to the USB port located at the bottom of the phone.

To operate the radio:

- 1. Press the Navigation Key Down to activate or deactivate the FM radio.
- 2. Press the * / # Key to adjust the volume.
- 3. Press the Navigation Key Up to activate or deactivate Auto search.
- 4. Press the Navigation Key Right/Left to switch the channels. If auto search is activated, pressing the Navigation Key Right/Left will switch the available searched channels; if auto search is deactivated, pressing the Navigation Key Right/Left will switch to varying channels by 0.1 intervals.
- 5. Press the Left Soft Key [Options] to access FM settings.

5.9.5 File manager

- . Select Menu > Multimedia > File Manager.
- 2. Press the Left Soft Key [Options] and select Open to view different folders.



Note: Some folders may not appear, such as "My Music", if user enters Multimedia > Audio Player, "My Music" folder will automatically be created in File Manager.

5.10 Settings

5.10.1 User profiles

Your phone provides 6 different profiles, including General, Meeting, Outdoor, Indoor, Silent and Headset profile.



Note: If you customize the alert type, the indication icon may be changed. The Headset profile is activated when the headset is plugged in.

To activate a Profile

- 1. In Profile menu, select a profile.
- 2. Select Options > Activate.

To edit the Profile

You can customize Profile settings to meet your preference.

- 1. In Profile menu, select a profile.
- 2. Select Options > Customize.

5.10.2 Phone settings



This menu option allows you to set phone parameters suh as time and date, schedule power on/off, language, Pref. input methods, Display, Dedicated key, Auto update of date and time,Flight mode and Misc.settings.

5.10.3 Network settings

Here you can search the network, set your preferred network and change the GPRS connection.

5.10.4 Security settings

This function allows you to activate password to protect your phone against unauthorized use. **PIN lock:** This function allows you to lock the phone with a specific SIM card. The feature is designed to

prevent the use of your SIM cards by means of another person's phone if your SIM cards lost. You can switch on or off to activate the PIN Lock function.

Phone lock: You can switch on or off to activate the phone lock function to protect your phone. If you switch Phone Lock on, you need to enter the password to set the request on. The default password is "1234"

Auto keypad lock: This allows you to lock the phone's keypad to prevent accidental key pressed. In Auto Keypad Lock submenu, select the time that after the last key press will be disabled.

Fixed Dial: This function dials only the numbers in the fixed dialing list . To save and edit numbers on the list, you need the PIN2 code.

Barred Dial: Allows you to switch on or off restricted call function. However, you need to check if your SIM supports this function.

Change password: This menu allows you to change the phone password.

5.10.5 Restore factory settings This function allows you to reset the most of the phone setting to the original setting when it is produced. The phone lock password is needed to access this function.

6 Precautions

Waterproof

Your cellular phone is not waterproof. Please keep it away from water.



Backup

Connect to other devices

Please read the user manual of the device to get more detailed security instructions before connecting to other devices and do not connect to an incompatible product.



SOS emergency calls

Make sure your cellular phone is switched on and in a service area. In idle mode, input the SOS number, then press the Dial Key. Advise where you are and do not hang up without permission.



8 Safety Information and Notices

Using the Cellular Phone and Charger

Danger:

Only use the battery and charger approved by the manufacturer. Using other brands may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire.

Caution:

Keep the phone away from dust, water and damp areas. Dust, water or other liquids may cause overheating, electrical leakage, and/or phone failure.

The phone, battery, charger and AC adapter are not waterproof. Keep them away from rain and liquid. Warning:

Do not bump, shake or tamper with the phone or charger. This may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire.

Do not place the battery, phone or charger near a microwave or high-voltage device. This may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire. Also prevent the phone and AC adapter from overheating, smoking or short circuiting.

Do not use the phone around volatile oil. This may cause fire, breakdown or damage.

To avoid any damage or breakdown, do not disassemble the phone, battery, charger or internal components by yourself.

Using the Cellular Phone

Warning:

Do not use the phone while you are driving. Pull over and stop your automobile to dial or listen to a phone call.

Usage of cellular phones in aircrafts or hospitals is prohibited. Switch the phone off to prevent interference with electronic medical devices. Follow any rules or regulations in such places.

Do not use the phone at a gas station, near fuel or near chemicals.

Do not use the phone near electronic medical devices such as hearing aids, pacemakers and auto-control devices such as fire detectors and automatic doors.

If you have to use your cellular phone near an electronic medical device such as a pacemaker, please contact your manufacturer or dealer for information about preventing interference.

Caution:

Electronic systems in automobiles such as anti-lock brakes, speed control, or fuel spraying systems, are usually not influenced by wireless devices. Manufacturers of these systems will tell you whether they encompass good screening mechanisms. If you suspect that an automobile failure is caused by a wireless wave, please contact your automobile dealer.

Avoid using your phone in crowded places.

Do not store your cellular phone near or with a credit card, disk or other magnetic materials. This may affect information stored on your phone.

Keep your phone away from pins. Pins can be absorbed by the phone's receiver magnet, which may

cause harm.

Using the Battery

Danger:

Do not dispose of the battery into a fire. Doing so may cause battery explosion or even fire.

If you have difficulties installing the battery, do not force the installation. This may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire.

Keep metal objects away so they do not come in contact with the battery or its connectors as it may cause the battery to short circuit, overheat or explode.

Do not weld the polarities of the battery directly together. This may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire.

Battery liquid is severely harmful for your eyes. If battery liquid gets in your eyes, do not rub them. Instead, wash your eyes with water first and then go directly to a doctor for help.

Do not use or store your phone in high temperature areas. This may cause battery leakage, overheating, explosion or even fire.

Warning:

Replace the battery when the normal usage time begins to decrease or if you notice the battery is overheated or has changed shape or color.

If battery liquid leaks onto your skin or clothes, immediately wash the affected parts with water.

If the battery begins to leak or emits a strange odor, properly dispose of the battery according to local

regulations. Do not throw it into a fire.

Caution:

Do not leave the product or its battery inside a vehicle or in places where the temperature may exceed 60°C (140°F), such as on a car dashboard, window sill, or behind a glass that is exposed to direct sunlight or strong ultraviolet light for extended periods of time. This may damage the product, overheat the battery, or pose a risk to the vehicle.

Using the Charger

Danger:

Only use the charger that came with the phone. Using a different charger may cause the phone to break or explode.

If the charger short circuits, a fire may occur.

Do not use a damaged, worn or broken charger. This may cause a fire.

Clean dust away from the power socket to avoid the possibility of a fire.

Do not store the charger near any liquids. If liquids spill onto the charger it may cause it to overheat or break.

If liquid does spill onto the charger, immediately unplug the power cable to prevent overheating, fire or

Do not use the charger in places with high humidity like a bathroom. This may cause a fire or other issue.

Do not touch the charger, power cable or socket with wet hands. This may cause an electric shock.

Caution:

Keep the environment temperatures within the range of 0°C ~40°C while charging. Temperature below

 0°C or higher than 40°C will cause insufficient charging, terminate charging or even cause the battery to explode.

Unplug the charger from its power source before cleaning it.

Do not place heavy objects on the power cord. This may cause electric shock or fire.

Hold the plug while unplugging the power cord. This will avoid any potential damage or even fire.

Requirements for Cellular Phone
