Driven to distraction

Injured mum of autistic boy grateful for ACC help

When Te Awamutu four-yearold Daniel Hoskin escaped from his well secured house, started the family car and backed out of the garage last week, he made sure he was wearing ear muffs.

Unlike many young boys, he can't stand loud noises.

He also has Autistic Spectrum Disorder and is more like a young Houdini than a four-year-old child.

Mother, Linda Hoskin, says Daniel has unique abilities with locks due to his ASD and can escape easily.

The car is manual so he had to put it into reverse.

"I thought I was hearing an electric can opener, then I looked out the window and realised what he had done," says Ms Hoskin, who is partially deaf.

She made it out to the car as fast as she could and shifted her son into his car seat before driving the car back off the cul-de-sac onto her property, hugely relieved Daniel had come to no harm.

Ms Hoskin says Daniel told her previously that he was going to drive the car.

I was assuming a four-year-old was just interested in cars, I didn't realise he was planning in his mind to actually do it," she says.

At 12 months Daniel was already opening the previously installed gate.

"He had been shimmying up the gates and was climbing into the pool area ... I installed six volt electric fences to keep Daniel out."

Apart from an acute sense of hearing, Daniel also has sensitive smell, he uses his tongue for touch, has pica disorder (inducing nonfood items) and constantly breaks things, which keeps Ms Hoskin more than busy.

Daniel was only officially diagnosed as having Autistic Spectrum Disorder recently — after a long process that can only begin when a child turns three, which saw Ms Hoskin go without ACC assistance for Daniel after she suffered a neck and back injury last year which prevented her from properly caring for him.

"The risk to him was great, he could have electrocuted himself because he was bent on security, he was right into all the electrical

equipment."
"To ACC my child was not autistic; because of no diagnosis.'

Ms Hoskin said she received home help such as vacuuming and laundry assistance for her, but no respite care for Daniel, until she suffered a shoulder injury in September, when ACC came to her aid after the ASD diagnosis.

"Within three hours of Daniel's incident an assessor was here."

Ms Hoskin questions the Government's policies with ACC when someone working can get cover if they are looking after a child with ASD, but not a stay at home mum such as herself.

She believes that if she had had prior respite care for Daniel it may have prevented his car incident.

"The issue we have in the

Waikato is that we don't have enough respite carers coming forward. I suggested to ACC to get a day care service the same as kindergarten for Daniel and they agreed.

Since the ACC assessment, taxis have been provided to get Daniel and Ms Hoskin to and from Rosetown Pre-school.

'It took this accident to get cover," she says.

"I hope in our situation if this sort of thing happens again they will not leave it.

"The scary thing is to think what's happening to other families and single parents."

Ms Hoskin does not blame ACC. and knows that they did all they could for her considering the circumstances. She says she would like to see more respite carers, and for people dealing with ASD to come forward and help expose the current problems surrounding it.

Ms Hoskin says she too was ignorant to the needs of ASD diagnosed pre-schoolers until she had Daniel, and understands that people often mistake the disorder as bad parenting, but is optimistic the public is becoming more aware of the condition.

"Everyone has been great — I want to thank Child Development, Te Awamutu Taxis, Rosetown Preschool for fulfilling our needs; and to ACC — that they came through this time.

"The community is here for us if we have a need.

"The issue is that we don't realise there is a need.

Waipa's RMA performance tops

The results of the annual Resource Management Act local authority survey has revealed Waipa District Council is continuing to be a consistently high performer, exceeding the average performance of other local authorities.

For the purpose of the survey, which assesses individual council performance against statutory requirements and compares that performance across all councils, Waipa was in the same category as many larger councils.

Planning and Regulatory manager Wayne Allan says this year Waipa District Council achieved a rating of 96 percent compliance with resource management timeframes which was a 'fantastic result".

"In addition, our average fees and charges are significantly

lower than most other councils,"

Mr Allan says. In the 2010/11 year Waipa Dis-

trict Council processed 421 resource consent applications. Of those only two of those were declined, four were publicly notified, six were limited notified and

411 were non notified. There were 198 consents for subdivision and 223 for land use activities

Staff under delegated authority decisions on and applications applications were heard by councillors as part of a hearing panel.

There were no appeals to the Environment Court on the resource consent decisions made by Council.

"I am so proud to have been involved with these high achieving athletes."

Green says volunteers give up a lot of family time and don't always get the appreciation they deserve.

"It is nice to be recognised tonight as often both coaches and administrators are providing for other people's children and generally taken for granted.

"We are driven by the good results achieved either by our club or athletes and the fond memories these leave us with."

His coaching highlights include Laura Sinclair winning medals at New Zealand Secondary Schools' and New Zealand Club Championships, Jenna Hansen winning a national title and representing New Zealand at the Oceania Games (placing second) and the Youth Olympics in Singapore.
