## 2 Getting Started

## Key Functions

1. Speaker: The speaker allows you to hear the other caller and the different ring tones and sounds offered by your phone.
2. Signal Strength Indicator: This icon represents the signal strength by displaying bars. The more bars displayed, the better the signal strength.
3. Display Screen: This screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
4. Headset Jack: Allows you to plug in an optional headset for safe, convenient hands-free conversations.
5. Volume Key: Allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the flip open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. The volume key can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.
6. Left Softkey: This key can be used in several different ways.

- In idle mode, press to access the Menu.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the left softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom left corner of the Display Screen.

7. Right Softkey: This key can be used in several different ways.

- In idle mode, press to access your Contacts.
- In text entry mode, press to change the character input type.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browse, the right softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This
action is shown in the bottom right corner of the Display Screen.

8. TALK Key: This key can be used in several different ways.

- Allows you to place or receive a call.
- In standby mode, press the key once to access the Recent Calls list.
- If you press and hold the key down, you will initiate the Voice Recognition feature.

9. Numeric Keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
10. Shift/Asterisk Key: Enters the asterisk [*] character for calling features. In text entry mode, press to change the character input type (ABC, Abc, abc).
11. Accessory Interface Connector: This connector is used to connect any available accessory cables to your phone.
12. Power Interface Connector: The power interface connector is used to plug in the charging accessories.
13. Microphone: The microphone allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
14.Space/Pound Key: Enters the pound [\#] character for calling features. In text entry mode, press to enter a space.
14. BACK Key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
15. END Key: This key can be used in several different ways.

- During a call, press to end the call.
- When you receive an incoming call, press to enter silent mode and mute the ringer. Alternatively, press and hold to send the call directly to voice mail.
- When the phone is off or in standby mode, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off.
- When in the main menu, press to return the phone to standby mode and cancel your input.

17. Navigation Key: This key allows you to scroll through the phone menu options and provides a shortcut to phone functions from standby mode.
18.OK Key: Press $\mathrm{OK}^{\text {K }}$ when navigating through a menu to accept the highlighted choice in the menu.
19.LED Indicator: The LED Indicator flashes when you have an incoming call or other event (such as receiving voicemail). Additionally, the LED indicator indicates when the phone is recharging (red) or is fully charged (green).
18. Menu Bar: The Menu bar displays the current contextsensitive option that is selected when you press either the left or right softkey.
19. Ringer Indicator: This icon indicates that a ringer is set.
20. Battery Indicator: The battery indicator displays the amount of remaining battery charge currently available in your phone. When all bars are displayed in the battery icon, the phone's battery is fully charged. When no bars are displayed, the phone's battery is completely discharged or empty.
23.Signal Type Indicator: This icon indicates whether you are receiving 3G digital service, digital service or analog service.
21. Position Location: This icon indicates that the position location feature is active.

## Viewing the Display Screen

Your phone's interior and exterior display screens provides a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. This list identifies the symbols you'll see on your phone's display screens: tells you a call is in progress.
means there is no service, as your phone cannot find a signal.
displays your current signal strength. More bars indicates a stronger signal, to a maximum of 6 bars. displays your current battery strength at full.
displays your current battery strength at empty. indicates that your phone is receiving 3 G digital service.
indicates that your phone is receiving digital (non 3G) service. indicates that position location is active.
indicates that position location is inactive.
indicates that your phone is in security mode.
indicates that your phone is roaming.
indicates that you have new text messages waiting.
indicates that you have new voicemail messages waiting. Press and hold 10 to dial your voicemail box.

indicates that there is an unread message in your inbox.

indicates that the message has been read.
indicates that there is an unread urgent message in your inbox.
indicates that you have read the urgent message.
indicates that the message was sent.
indicates that the message is marked urgent.
indicates that the message failed to send.

indicates that the message is a draft.
indicates that there is URL text contained in the text message.
indicates that the phone is locked. A passcode must be entered before your phone can be used. indicates that the TTY option is On .
indicates that your web connection is active and data is being transferred. Incoming voice calls go directly to voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate. indicates that a file (ringer, game, java app, etc.) has been downloaded to your phone. indicates that your phone is in vibrate mode.
indicates that the ringer is set at a level between 1-8 or that 1-Beep is selected.
indicates that the ringer is turned Off.
indicates that your phone is set to high ringer plus vibrate mode.
indicates that an alarm is set on your phone.

Tip: Display indicators let you know when you're off the network.

## Turning Your Phone On and Off

To turn your phone on:

- Press to turn your phone on.

Once your phone is On, it displays "Looking for Service" which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode - the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.
If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.
In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned On).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

To turn your phone off:

- Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.
Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).


## Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger

## Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Lilon) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery
provides approximately 3 hours of continuous digital talk time or approximately 8 days of continuous digital standby time.
When the battery reaches $5 \%$ of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the phone sounds an audible alert and then powers down.

Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, playing games, or browser use affect the battery's talk and standby times.

Tip: Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

## Installing the Battery

To install the Lilon battery:

1. Insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone at an angle, making sure the plastic tab on the bottom of the battery is inserted into the matching slot in the phone.
2. Press down until the battery snaps into place.


## Removing the Battery

To remove your battery:

1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
2. Push the battery release latch up completely.
3. Using the side tabs, pull the top of the battery away from the phone and remove.


## Charging the Battery

Your phone's Lilon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.
Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of either of your phone's display screens. U indicates that the battery is full. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon $\square$ blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone.
Always use a Samsung-approved desktop charger, travel adapter, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

Warning! Using the wrong battery charger could cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

## Using the Travel Adapter

Plug the travel adapter into a electrical outlet and into the Power Interface Connector found on the bottom of the handset. If properly connected, the handset indicates that the battery is being charged either by an animated battery icon when the handset is on or the word "Battery Charging" when the handset is off. The LED will be red.

## Displaying Your Phone Number

 Just in case you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.To display your phone number:

- Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 2ncc (300 to display your phone number.

Note: To access the phone's main Menu, press the left softkey © from standby mode. Menu items may be selected by highlighting them with the navigation key and pressing ox, or you can press the number corresponding to the menu item on your keypad.

Note: Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, $\mathbf{3 x 3}$ and List style. By default, your phone is set to List. This user guide also corresponds to the List menu style. The $3 \times 3$ menu style uses a different menu numbering scheme for the top-level menus. For more information, see "Menu Styles" on page 34.

## Making and Answering Calls

## Making Calls

Placing a call from your phone is as easy as making a call from any land-line phone. Just enter the number and press and you're on your way to clear calls.
To make a call using your keypad:

1. Make sure your phone is on.
2. Enter a phone number. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold back to erase the entire number.)
3. Press to call.
4. Press or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last call, press twice.

You can also place calls from your phone by using Voice Command (page 78), Speed Dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 22), and using your Call History listings (page 43).

## Answering Calls

To answer an incoming call:

1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
2. Press to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key. See "Call Answer Mode" on page 110 for more information.) Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates (unless set to Silence All).
- The LED flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the Contacts entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.
The following options are also available to handle an incoming call:

- Press or the volume key to quiet the ringer.
- Press and hold or the volume key to send the incoming call to your voicemail box.

Note: When your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.

## Ending a Call

To disconnect a call when you are finished:

- Close the phone or press


## Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, the Missed Call log is displayed on your screen.
To display the Missed Call entry:

- Highlight the entry and press OK . (To dial the phone number, press $\square$.)


## Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (dial 1 ? 1 and press $\square$ ), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.

Warning: After initiating a 911 call, you must end the call by pressing * \# . This notifies the phone that the 911 call was terminated
intentionally by the user. No other calls can be made prior to terminating the 911 call.

Warning: You can not make 911 calls when the phone is in airplane mode and the icon " phone off " is displayed. Turn the phone back on, by disabling airplane mode. For more details, see "Airplane Mode" on page 109.

## In-Call Options

Select actions by pressing the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options during a call. A list of options is displayed that allows you to perform different actions during the course of a call. The following options are available: (To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press ©K.)

- (1) Mute or UnMute allows you to mute or reactivate your phone's microphone.
- (2) Call History checks your call log for Missed, Outgoing, and Incoming calls. You can also erase the logs from this menu.
- (3) Contacts accesses the Contacts menu options.
- (4) 3-Way Call allows you to talk to two different people at the same time. (For more information, see "Making a Three-Way Call" on page 29.)
- (5) Messaging allows you to check for voicemail and notifications.
- (6) Voice Memo allows you to record the current conversation. (For more information, see "Reviewing and Erasing Memos" on page 87.)
- (7) Tools accesses the Tools menu options.
- (8) Phone Info displays the phone number, icon glossary, the hardware/software version, Preferred Roaming List (PRL), the system and the technology being used.


## End-of-Call Options

After receiving a call from or making a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone number and the duration of the call are displayed. Press the left softkey : to Save the new number in your Contacts. (See below for more information on "Saving a Phone Number.")

## Note: The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted number.

## Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to 500 Contacts numbers. Contacts entries can store up to a total of six phone numbers, and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters. (For more information, see "Adding a New Contact" on page 46.)
To save a number from standby mode:

1. Enter a phone number.
2. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options
3. Press 3 for Save.
4. Press ox to Add a New Entry.
5. Select the Type using the navigation key and press ox

- Home
- Mobile
- Fax
- Work
- Pager
- No Label

6. Enter the name using the keypad and press the left softkey

## : for Next.

7. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done. After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

## Finding a Phone Number

This feature allows you to search for phone numbers saved in your address book by entering 1-4 digits of the last four digits saved. When searching, you must enter the digits in sequential order starting from the last digit. For example; if you have a number saved with " 1234 " as the last four digits, you can enter " 34 " and a match will be found. If you enter " 12 ", no match will be found since the digits do not match the last two digits.
To find a phone number:

1. Enter one to four digits of the last four digits of a phone number and Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options and select Find. (A list of possible matches is displayed.)
2. Use your navigation key to display the desired entry.
3. To dial the number, highlight it and press

## Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.
There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press

2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2 -second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

1. Enter a phone number from standby mode.
2. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options and select Hard pause or 2-sec pause. Hard pauses are displayed as a "P" and 2 -second pauses as a " $\mathbf{T}$ ".
3. Enter additional numbers.
4. Press $\square$ to dial the number.


Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options and select Save to save the number in your internal Contacts.
When dialing a number with a hard pause, press to send the next set of numbers.

## Abbreviated Dialing

Abbreviated dialing allows you to set a five or six-digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. When abbreviated dialing is On, you can enter the last four or five digits of any phone number that matches the five or six digit prefix only. The number is dialed using the prefix numbers plus the last four or five digits entered.
To set up abbreviated dialing:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 7 for Others.
4. Press 1 for Abbrev. Dial.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select $\mathbf{O n}$ and press OK

6. Input the five or six digit prefix and press OX to Save.

## Making an Abbreviated Dial Call

## To make a call:

1. Enter the last four or five digits of the prefix phone number.
2. Press the right softkey ! for Options, followed by 10 for Abbrev. Dial.

## Dialing From Contacts

To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

1. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ to display your Contacts.
2. Scroll left or right to search by Name, Entry, or Group.
3. Highlight the desired option and press the navigation key down.
4. Name: Enter the first few letters of the entry's name to locate the desired entry.

- or -

Entry: Enter the entry number using the keypad.

- or -

Group: Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired group.
5. Scroll to highlight the desired entry and press to make the call.

Tip: If the desired entry contains more than one phone number, scroll left or right to display the number you wish to call and press to make the call.

## Using One-Touch/Two-Touch/Three-Touch Speed Dialing

You can store up to 500 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a few buttons. With this feature, you can dial Speed Dial entries using one key press for locations 1-9, two key presses for locations 10-99, and three key presses for 100-500.
To use One-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 1-9:

- Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)
To use Two-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 10-99:

1. Press the first digit.
2. Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)
To use Three-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 100-500:
3. Press the first digit.
4. Press the second digit.
5. Press and hold the third digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)

| Note: Your phone also supports $1-4$ digit dialing. If you enter a number |

## Entering Text

## Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, symbols, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when sending text messages).
To change the character input mode:

1. When you display a screen where you can enter text, Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options.
2. Select a character input mode:

- T9 (English) to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see page 23).
- Alpha to enter characters by tapping the keypad (see page 24).
- Symbol to enter symbols (see page 25).
- Number to enter numbers (see page 25).


## Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select the $\mathbf{T 9}$ (English) mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" above.)
T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) If the word you want does not display after you have entered all the letters, press $0-$ to scroll through additional word selections. To accept a word and insert a space, press If you make a mistake, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to delete an entire entry. To enter text using T9:

1. From the text entry screen (for example, a new event in
scheduler), Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options and select $\mathbf{T 9}$ (English).
2. Use your keypad to enter the new event. (For example, to enter "Meeting", press 6" once, 3 twice, 8 mow once, 4a once, 6on once, and 40a once.)

## Entering Characters by Tapping the Keypad

To enter characters by tapping the keypad, select the Alpha mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 23). Press the corresponding key repeatedly until the desired character appears. When the Abc icon is shown, the first letter of the first word is capitalized and following letters are lowercase. The ** key can be used to select the case desired.
To enter text using Alpha:

1. From a text entry screen (for example, a Contacts entry), Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options and select Alpha.
2. Use your keypad to enter the contact's name. (For example, to enter "Bill", press 2m twice, 4an three times, 5m three times, and 5 ma three times again.)
Characters scroll in the following order:


After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

## Entering Numbers and Symbols

To enter numbers:

- Select the Number mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 23.) To enter symbols:
- Select the Symbol mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 23.) To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key indicated on the display.


## Using Voicemail

## Setting Up Your Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.
To set up your voicemail:

1. Press and hold
2. Follow the system prompts to create your passcode, record your greeting, and record your name announcement.

Note: You must request this feature from your service provider for it to work correctly.

## Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By the LED blinking red.
- By displaying $\square$ at the top of your screen.


## New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voicemail.
To call your voicemail:
> - Press and hold 10

> To display your Missed Calls:

- Press the left softkey $\AA$, followed by $\square$
Important: When you are roaming off the network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing $1+$ area code + your Phone Number. When your voicemail answers, press \#- and enter your passcode. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voicemail while roaming off the network.

Note: Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on and you are in a digital Service Area.

## Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your phone or from any other touch-tone phone. To dial from your phone, you can either speed dial your voicemail or use the menu keys.
Using One-Touch Message Access

- Press and hold 1 . Follow the system prompts. Using the Menu Keys on Your Phone to Access Your Messages

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 4 for Voicemail.
4. Press 1 to call the voicemail server.

Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your phone.

## Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.
To clear the icon from the display screen:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 4 an for Voicemail.
4. Press 3 ㅇor for Clear Envelope.
5. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press

OK

## Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.
To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

1. Press * 6ma 7 \#
2. Enter the number you want to call.
3. Press

To permanently block your number, call the Customer Service department of your network service provider.

Note: If you have not subscribed to Caller ID, and the back light is set to turn off after a period of time, pressing will switch the back light back on. Either press and hold $\square$ or press $\square$ twice to answer the second call when the LCD is turned off. To avoid this problem, set the back light to "flip open". For more inforamtion, see "Changing the Backlight Time Length" on page 97.

## Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).
To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- Press

To switch back to the first caller:

- Press again.

Tip: For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, you can temporarily disable Call Waiting by pressing
 before placing your call. Call Waiting is automatıcally reactivated once you end the call.

## Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.
To make a Three-Way Call:

1. Enter a number you wish to call and press
2. Once you have established the connection, press the right softkey ! for Option, followed by 4an for 3-Way Call.
3. Dial the second number and press
4. When you're connected to the second party, press again to begin your three-way call.
If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

> Tip: You can also begin a Three-Way Call by displaying a phone number stored in your Internal Contacts, Call History, or Messaging. To call the third party, press

Note: Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling are not available while roaming off the network.

## TTY Use With Handset

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone), is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf or hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone.
Your phone is compatible with select TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it supports digital wireless transmission. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

To turn TTY Mode on or off:

1. Press \# followed by the left
softkey $\vdots$. (A brief explanation of TTY Mode will display.)
2. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ again to continue.
3. Press the navigation key up or down to select Enable TTY or Disable TTY and press OK to save and exit.


#### Abstract

Note: In TTY Mode when your headset is plugged in, your phone will display the TTY access icon. If TTY mode is enabled, the headset cannot be used.

## Understanding Roaming

## Recognizing Icons on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the network. The following chart indicates what you'll see depending on where you're using your phone.

Roaming Indicator
Analog Indicator
Network
Other Digital Networks $\boldsymbol{R}$

Note: You will pay a higher per-minute rate for roaming calls.

## Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on your home network. You may not be able to access certain features, such as web services.

## Roaming on Analog Networks

When you roam on analog networks, you will experience a similar quality provided by other analog carriers today. Although some features, such as Mobile Browser and Voice Command, will be unavailable, you can still make and receive calls and access voicemail. You will experience a few differences:

- You are more likely to experience static, cross-talk, fade-out, and dropped calls.
- Some features which are standard on the network, such as call waiting, web browser, and direct international dialing, are unavailable.
- Though callers can leave voicemail messages while you are roaming, you will not receive notification until you return to the network. While roaming, you can periodically check your voicemail for new messages by dialing 1+area code+your Phone Number. Press \# when you hear your greeting and enter your passcode at the prompt.
- There are security and privacy risks (eavesdropping and cloning) that exist with conventional analog services today.
- Your battery needs recharging sooner when you use your phone in analog mode, whether in network or roaming.

Note: If you're on a call when you leave the network and enter an area where roaming is available, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think service is available, turn your phone Off and On again to reconnect to the network.

## Setting Your Phone's System

Your phone allows you to control your ability to roam. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts. Choose from three different settings on your phone to control your roaming experience:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press for Settings.
3. Press 7 for Others.
4. Press 5 mor Set System.
5. To select an option, highlight it and press

- Automatic: This setting seeks service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- Home Only: This setting allows you to access the home network only and prevents roaming on other networks.
- Digital Only: This setting allows you to access digital service only, preventing access on analog networks.
- Analog: This setting allows you to access analog service only, preventing access on digital networks.
- AMPS Home: This setting allows you to use your carrier's analog service only, preventing access on digital or other analog networks.


## Set NAM

This setting allows you to associate your mobile identification number (MIN) to your phone's electronic serial number (ESN).

1. From the Idle screen, press
 followed by ok for Set NAM.
2. Enter the service code provided to you by your service provider.

## Navigating Through Menus

## Menu Styles

Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, $\mathbf{3 x 3}$ and List. By default, your phone is set to the List menu style.

Note: Key commands for the first menu level in the $3 \times 3$ style differ from those in this guide. For more information on changing the menu style between List and 3x3, see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 35.

## List Style

List style displays all the various menu choices in a vertical list. As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. You can use your navigation keys to scroll through menus quickly and easily. The scroll bar at the right of the menu keeps track of your position in the menu at all times.

- To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as Settings, you may also navigate to the next menu by pressing the navigation key left or right.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 1 for Call History.
3. Press $3^{\text {D00 }}$ for Incoming Calls.

## 3x3 Style

$3 \times 3$ style displays the first level menu choices with graphical icons arranged in a grid pattern. In other menu levels, choices are arranged in a vertical list, similar to List style.

- To navigate through a first level menu, simply press the navigation key in the direction towards your desired menu choice. The currently-highlighted menu choice is enlarged and has a text label beneath it. Once the desired menu option is highlighted, press ox.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 m for Call History.
3. Press $3^{\text {Dö }}$ for Incoming Calls.

## Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the menu appears on your display screen.
To select the display's menu style:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 90. for Settings.
3. Press 10 for Display.
4. Press 2acc for Menu Style.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select $3 \times 3$ Style or List Style and press ox to save and exit.

## Call History

## Viewing History

You'll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 20 phone numbers (or Contacts entries) for calls you missed, made, or accepted. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list. Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list. To view a Call History entry:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 1 for Call History.

- Press 1 for Missed Calls.
- Press 2nac for Outgoing Calls.
- Press $3^{0 \times \pi}$ for Incoming Calls.
- Press 40ar for All Recent.

Tip: You can also access your list of recent calls from the idle screen by pressing the key.

## Call History Options

For additional information on a particular call, highlight a Call History entry and press Ox . The time and date of the call is displayed.

Tip: You can also scroll between Call History entries by pressing the navigation key left or right.

Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options to select one of the following options for this entry:

- Send Msg
- Save to create a new Contact for this number -or-
Show Entry to display a saved Contact for this number
- Prepend
- Erase


## Making a Call From Call History

To place a call from Call History:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 1 for Call History.
3. Select Missed Calls 1 , Outgoing Calls 2nact, Incoming Calls 300, or All Recent 4 an.
4. Highlight the entry you want to call and press the number.

Tip: For recent calls, you can also press the key to show your recent calls. Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the number.

Note: You cannot make calls from Call History to entries identified as Unknown or Restricted.

## Saving a Phone Number From Call History

 Your phone can store up to 500 Contacts numbers. Contacts entries can store up to a total of six phone numbers, and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters.To save a phone number from Call History:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 10 for Call History.
3. Select Missed Calls 1 , Outgoing Calls
Incoming Calls $3^{\text {国, }}$, or All Recent 4 an. $\square$
4. Highlight the entry you want to save and press
5. Press the left softkey to Save the number. Follow the onscreen prompts to complete the entry. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 18.)
After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Internal Contacts or from calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted.

## Prepending a Phone Number From Call History

If you need to make a call from Call History and you happen to be outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.
To prepend a phone number from Call History:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 10 for Call History.
3. Select Missed Calls 10 , Outgoing Calls 2acd Incoming Calls 300, or All Recent 4 an.
4. Highlight the entry you want to prepend and press

OK
5. Press the right softkey ! for Options, followed by $3^{\text {ºf }}$ to Prepend the number.
6. Use the keypad to enter the desired numbers.
7. Press $\square$ or the left softkey $\vdots$ to Call.

## Erasing Call History

To erase individual Call History entries, see "Call History Options" on page 42.
To erase Call History:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 1 for Call History.
3. Press 5 for Erase History.
4. Select Missed Calls 1 , Outgoing Calls 2ACC, Incoming Calls $3^{\text {30it }}$, or All Recent 4 .

## Air Time

Air time allows you to check the time of the last call or the total air time since your phone was activated on the network. These times are not meant for billing purposes. To view the air time:

## Adding a New Contact

Your phone can store up to 500 Contact numbers. Each contact entry can store up to a total of six phone numbers, and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters.
To add a new entry:

1. Enter a new phone number and press the right softkey for Options.
2. Press 3ov for Save. Press ox to Add a New Entry.
3. Select the Type using the navigation key and press ox

- Pager
- No Label

4. Enter the name using the keypad and press the left softkey © for Next.
5. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

## Finding Contacts

There are several ways to display your Contacts entries: by name, by speed dial number, by group, and by voice dial recognition. To find an entry from the Contacts menu:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2 aca for Contacts.
3. Press 10 for Find.
4. Press the navigation key left or right to search by Name, Entry, or Group.
5. Once the desired option is highlighted, press the navigation key down.
6. Enter the first few letters or entry \# to locate the desired entry.
7. Scroll to highlight the name and press to make the call.

## Adding a Phone Number to an Existing Contact Entry

To add a phone number to an existing entry:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2 acc for Contacts.
3. Press 1 for Find.
4. Select the desired entry and press ok
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 for Edit.
6. Press the navigation key down until the desired label is selected and press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Edit.
7. Enter the phone number using the keypad and press
8. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

## Editing a Contact Entry's Phone Number

To edit an entry's phone number:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2act for Contacts.
3. Press 1 for Find.
4. Select the desired entry and press
5. Press the right softkey $\quad$, followed by 1 for Edit.
6. Press the navigation key down to highlight the phone number you wish to change and press the right softkey B for Edit.
7. Press and hold to erase the entire number or press once to erase just the last number.
8. Enter the phone number using the keypad and press
ok
9. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

## Selecting a Ringer Type for an Entry

You can assign a ringer type to a Contacts entry so you can identify the caller by the ringer type. (See "Ringer Types" on page 101.)
To select a ringer type for an entry:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2act for Contacts.
3. Press 10 for Find.
4. Select the desired entry and press ok
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 for Edit.
6. Press the navigation key down until Default Ringer is selected and press the right softkey : for Edit.
7. Press the navigation key to the left or right and highlight the desired Ringer Category.
8. Press the navigation key down.
9. Press the navigation key to the left or right to highlight and listen to the desired Ringer and press ok to save.
10. Press the left softkey $;$ for Done to save the entry.

## Secret Contacts Entries

You can hide an entry's phone number(s) and require your lock code to edit the entry by making it secret. The entry name is still displayed, but the entry's phone numbers are replaced with "(SECRET)."
To make an entry secret:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2act for Contacts.
3. Press 10 for Find.
4. Select the desired entry and press
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 for Edit.
6. Press the navigation key down until Secret is selected.
7. Press the navigation key left or right until Secret-ON is displayed in the Secret field.
8. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

To make an entry public:

1. Display a Contacts entry.
2. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 for Edit.
3. Enter your lock code.
4. Press the navigation key down until Secret is selected.
5. Press the navigation key left or right until Secret-OFF is displayed in the Secret field.
6. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your Phone Number, your year of birth, or try 0000. If none of these
work, call Customer Service at the number listed on the User Guide cover.

## Changing the Group Name

You can associate a preset group name to your entries to help you sort them easier in the Contacts. The preset group names already programmed into your phone are:

- Family
${ }^{-}$VIPs
- Friends
- Unassigned
- Colleague

To associate an existing number located in your Contacts:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 2 acc for Contacts.
3. Press 1 for Find.
4. Select the desired entry and press OK
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 for Edit.
6. Press the navigation key down until the Group is selected.
7. Press the navigation key left or right until the desired group name is displayed.
8. Press the left softkey $\AA$ for Done.

## Messaging

Now you can exchange text and email messages right from your phone and stay connected without saying a word. Within the Messaging menu you can also view the number of voicemail messages you have waiting for you. For more information on using your phone's voicemail feature, see "Using Voicemail" on page 25. The following options are available in the Messaging menu:

- Send Message - allows you to send text messages.
- Text Message - allows you to create and send new text messages, as well as check your Text Message Inbox.
- Web Alert - allows you to receive an alert that a new web message is available.
- Voicemail - allows you to view or listen to any voice messages saved in the phone.
- Settings - allows you to configure the messaging options.


## Text Messaging

## Using Text Messaging

With Text Messaging, you can use a person's wireless phone number to send instant text messages from your web enabled phone to their messaging-ready phone - and they can send messages to you. When you receive a new message, you'll automatically be alerted with an onscreen message.
In addition, messaging includes a variety of pre-set messages, such as "l'm running late, l'm on my way," that make composing messages fast and easy.

## To send a text message:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 1 for Send Message.
4. Enter the phone number or email address of the person to whom you're sending a message and press OK.

Tip: If you wish to send your text message to multiple numbers or addresses, repeat step 4. You can send a text message to a maximum of 10 numbers.
5. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Next.
6. Enter your message using the keypad.
7. Press the left softkey for Next when finished.
8. Press the left softkey : to Send. If you wish to change your text message options, press the right softkey : for Options and select one of the following:

- Edit allows you to reenter the message recipients and the message.
- Priority allows you to set the priority level between Normal and Urgent.
- Call Back \# allows you to enter or omit a call back number in your message.
- Save to Drafts stores a copy of the text message in your Drafts folder.


## To read and reply to a text message:

By default, when you receive a text message, your text message appears on the display screen.

[^3]To reply to the message while the message is open:

1. Select the left softkey $\vdots$ for Reply.
2. Compose your reply or use a pre-composed messages.

- Use your keypad to type a message. Use the right softkey $\vdots$ to select a character input mode.
- To use pre-written messages press the right softkey ! for Options, followed by 6 for Preset Msg. Press the corresponding number on the keypad to enter the preset message response.

3. Press OK .
4. Press the left softkey to Send.

Note: The last preset message used automatically moves to the top of the list when you send a new message.

## Erasing Text Messages

To erase one or more text messages:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Select $2 n$ for Text Message.
4. Press 10 for Inbox.
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by:

- 6"V for Erase. Using the navigation keys select Erase This to delete the currently highlighted message, Erase Old to delete all read messages, or Erase All to delete all messages in your Inbox and press ok
- 7 for Erase Multiple. Scroll through your list of messages and press ok to check or uncheck messages you
want to erase. When you are finished, press the left softkey for Erase.


## Message Setup Options

There are several options associated with text messaging. The Message Setup menu allows you to customize the options to fit your preferences. The message options are divided into the following categories:

- Notifications: Allows you to configure whether new messages will appear with a pop-up message or with an icon.
- Sending Options: Allows you to configure the default Priority level and Call Back number for messages.
- Preset Messages: Allows you to edit or change the default pre-written messages.
- Edit Signature: If the option is On, your signature will be appended to each message you send.
- Message Alerts: Allows you to configure the Volume level, Type, Message Reminder and Alert on Call settings for Message Alerts.
- Save In Outbox: If this option is On, a copy of the message is automatically saved in the Outbox after being sent.
- Auto Delete: If this option is On, old messages are automatically deleted from the mail boxes when they become full. This allows the new messages to be added to a full mail box without having to manually delete old messages to free up space first.
- Alert Setup: allows you to configure to auto-connect web alerts when possible.
- Voice Mail \#: allows you to configure the voicemail number.

To access the Settings menu:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings.

## Notifications

The Notifications options allow you to select how your handset informs you of new messages. There are two choices:

- Message and Icon: a popup message appears onscreen to alert you that new messages are waiting. Additionally, an icon appears near the top of the screen.
- Icon only: an icon appears near the top of screen. For example, $\mp$ appears when you have a new text message.

To change the notifications option:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 1 for Notifications.
5. Select Message and Icon or Icon Only using the navigation key and press ox to select.

## Sending Options

The Sending Options allow you to configure the Priority and Call Back number for outgoing messages. Once configured, these options are the default settings for any new messages that are created.

## Priority

There are two priority levels associated with text messaging. They are:

- Normal: this option sends the message as normal with regular delivery.
- Urgent: this option sends the message at the highest level and alerts the recipient that it is urgent.
This setting allows you to select the default priority level when creating new messages. To select the priority level:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5m for Settings
4. Press $2 n$ for Sending Options.
5. Press 10 for Priority.
6. Select Normal or Urgent using the navigation key and press ok to select.

## Call Back Number

This option allows you to enter a return call back number that is automatically attached to your outgoing messages. To access the call back number option:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press $2 n$ for Sending Options.
5. Press $2 n$ for Call Back \#.
6. Use the navigation key to highlight None, your phone \# or Other for a custom \# and press ok.
7. For Other, press and hold back to erase the existing number. Enter the number using the keypad and press to save.

## Preset Messages

Preset messages are used to enter common responses to questions often received in text messages. A preset message can be selected and automatically entered into the message. Preset messages can also be changed to whatever you want by editing the 20 pre-set entries already stored in your phone. To edit a preset message:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{000}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5m for Settings
4. Press 3 for Preset Messages.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to highlight the desired message or available entry and press ox to edit.
6. Press and hold back to erase the message. Enter your new message or edit the existing one using the keypad and press OK to save.

Note: When you send a message using Preset Messages, the last message selected automatically displays as the first choice when sending a new message.

## Edit Signature

The Edit Signature menu allows you to create a signature of up to 32 characters that is automatically appended to all your text messages. To edit your signature, or to turn signatures on or off:

1. Press the left softkey for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 4a for Edit Signature
5. Press the navigation key up or down to highlight $\mathbf{O n}$ or $\mathbf{O f f}$ and press OK
6. If signatures are on, your current signature is now displayed. Press and hold back to erase the signature. Enter your new signature or edit the existing one using the keypad and press the left softkey $\vdots$ or OK to save.

## Message Alerts

The Message Alerts menu allows you to configure the volume and message reminder default settings for voicemail, text messages, and web alerts.

## Volume

This allows you to select the volume level for message alerts for voicemail, text messaging, and web alerts. The level can be set to Silence All, Vibrate, 1-Beep, or a volume level between 1-8. To set the volume:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 四 for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 5 for Message Alerts.
5. Press 10 for Alert Volume.
6. Press the navigation key left or right to select the desired volume level and press ox to save.

## Type

This allows you to select the ringer type for voicemail, text messaging, and web alerts. Any ringer saved in the phone can be used as the default ringer. Ringers that are downloaded can also be assigned. To set the ringer type:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 5 for Message Alerts.
5. Press 2nac for Alert Type.
6. Press:

- 1 10 for Voicemail
- 2 nac for Text Message
- 3 四 for Web Alert

7. Press the navigation key left or right to select between Ring Tones, Melodies, Downloaded, or Single Tones.
8. Press the navigation key down to preview the first ringer. Press left or right to preview the other ringers associated with the ringer group selected. When finished, press ok to Save the desired ringer.

## Reminder

This allows you to configure how often the reminder for new messages is sounded or displayed on the phone. The available options are:

- Off: No reminder is sounded or heard on the phone.
- Once: A reminder is sounded or displayed once to alert you of new messages.
- Every 2 min: A reminder is sounded or displayed every two minutes until the new message is read.

To set the message reminder option:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5m for Settings
4. Press 5 mm for Message Alerts.
5. Press $3^{\text {ºf }}$ for Reminder.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired duration and press ox to select.

## Alert on Call

This allows you to configure whether you are alerted to new messages while you on call. To set the Alert on Call option:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 5 m for Message Alerts.
5. Press 4. for Alert on Call.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select the Off or On and press ok

## Save in Outbox

This allows you to save a copy of the outgoing text message in the outbox. To turn this option On or Off:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5m for Settings
4. Press 6iv for Save In Outhox.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press OK to select.

## Auto Delete

This option allows you to automatically delete old messages when the memory becomes full. This prevents new messages from being rejected due to the Inbox being too full. To turn this option On or Off:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press $3^{00}$ for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 7 for Auto Delete.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press OK to select.

## Alert Setup

This option allows you to automatically connect to the web when new web alerts are received. If this option is turned Off, you are required to connect before the message can be viewed. To turn this option On or Off:

1. Press the left softkey for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5m for Settings
4. Press 8 fou Alert Setup.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press 0 K to select.

## Voice Mail Number

This option allows you to enter a return voice mail number that is automatically attached to your outgoing messages. To access the voice mail number option:

1. Press the left softkey $:$ for Menu.
2. Press 3 for Messaging.
3. Press 5 for Settings
4. Press 90r Voice Mail \#.
5. Enter the number using the keypad and press the left softkey $\vdots$ to Save.

## Scheduler

## Adding an Event to the Scheduler

Your Scheduler helps organize your time and reminds you of important events. You can schedule events for either the current day, or a specific calendar date.

Tip: Your phone can help organize your life in other ways, with useful tools like a Task List, Memo Pad, and an Alarm Clock. See "Tools" on page 91 for more details.

To add an event to today's schedule:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 4 an for Scheduler.
3. Press 1 for Today.

- If you have no events currently scheduled for today, then the New Event menu is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more events scheduled for today, they are displayed. Press the right softkey for Options, followed by 1 for Add New.

4. Enter the event description using the keypad and press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Next.
5. Enter the Start Time and Date using the keypad. (Press 2 noc for AM or 7 for PM.)
6. Enter the End Time and Date using the keypad.
7. Press the Navigation key left or right and select one of the following:

## - No Alarm

- 30min before
- On Time
- 10min before

8. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ or OK to Save.

To add an event for a specific calendar date:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 4 for Scheduler.
3. Press 2acc for Scheduler.
4. Using the navigation keys, scroll to the desired date.
5. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for View.

- If you have no events currently scheduled for today, then the New Event menu is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more events scheduled for today, they are displayed. Press the right softkey : for Options, followed by 10 for Add New.

6. Enter the event description using the keypad and press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Next.
7. Enter the Start Time and Date using the keypad. (Press

2ach for AM or 7 for PM.)
8. Enter the End Time and Date using the keypad.
9. Press the Navigation key left or right and select one of the following:

- No Alarm
- On Time
- 10min before
- 30min before
- 1Hr before

10. Press the left softkey $:$ or to Save.

## Event Alerts

There are several ways your phone alerts you of scheduled events:

- By playing the assigned ringer type.
- By illuminating the backlight.
- By flashing the LED.

To select the ringer:

1. Press the left softkey $!$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 2act for Ringer Type.
5. Press 300 for Schedule.
6. Press the navigation key left or right to select the desired ringer category.
7. Press the navigation key down and then left or right to select the desired ringer or melody.
8. Press ox to Save.

## Viewing Events

To view your scheduled events:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 4 an for Scheduler.
3. Press 1 for Today or 2 acc for Scheduler.
4. If you selected 2act, use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired date and press the left softkey $\vdots$ for View.

## Erasing a Single Event for a Day

## To delete individual events:

1. View the day that you wish to erase the events for. See "Viewing Events" on page 65 for more details.
2. Press the right softkey for Options.
3. Press $2 n$ to Erase.
4. Highlight Yes using the navigation key and press confirm.

## Erasing All Events for a Day

To erase a scheduled day's events:

1. View the day that you wish to erase the events for. See "Viewing Events" on page 65 for more details.
2. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options.
3. Press $3^{00}$ to Erase All.
4. Highlight Yes using the navigation key and press confirm.

## Erasing All Events in your Scheduler

To delete all scheduled events:

1. Press the left softkey $:$ for Menu.
2. Press 4or for Scheduler.
3. Press $2 n a$ for Scheduler.
4. Press the right softkey $亠$ for Options.
5. Press $3{ }^{00}$ for Erase All.
6. Highlight Yes with the navigation key and press ox to confirm.

## Web Services

## The Wireless Web

Your phone comes equipped with Wireless Web access through your browser. You can view specially designed version of popular sites which includes sports, weather, news, stock quotes etc.... as well as downloadable ringtones, screen savers and games. When you launch the browser, the phone will connect to the Internet and the service indicator icon will display. Any time the service indicator icon is visible on the display, you are connected to the Internet and will be invoiced accordingly.

Note: Rates and pricing vary according to your service plan. Please contact your service provider for additional information.

## Launching the Browser

> Note: The first time you use the Browser, you will be prompted to go through a setup process that takes approximately three minutes.

To launch a web connection:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 600 Web.
3. Press 1 for Start Browser.
4. You are connected to the Mobile Web Home page.

Note: If Web Guard is enabled and displayed (see below), select OK to continue and launch the Web.

If you had a previous web connection, the last page you visited will display when you launch your browser. When this occurs, you may not see the "Connecting as..." message when you launch the session. Though the browser is open, you are not currently in an active data session - that is, no data is being sent or received. As soon as you navigate to another page, the active session will launch and you will see the "Connecting" message.

## Web Guard

When you first connect to the Internet, the Web Guard will appear to confirm that you want to connect. This feature helps you avoid accidental connections. You can disable the Web Guard in the future by selecting Always Auto-Connect when the Web Guard is displayed. To change your Web Guard settings:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 600 for Web.
3. Press 2nact for Web Guard
4. Press the navigation key up or down to select:

- None - To End
- To Start - Both


## 5. Press ox to select.

Note: When enabled, the Web Guard appears only once per session.
The Web Guard does not appear if the phone is merely re-connecting due to a time-out.

## Web Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your web connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

Your web connection is active (data is being transferred).
Incoming voice calls go directly to voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate.

When your web connection is dormant (no data is being sent or received). Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly; voice calls can be made and received.

## Navigating the Wireless Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a web session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

## Softkeys

When browsing the Web, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen. Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.
To use softkeys, simply press the desired softkey button. If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad (if they're numbered) or by highlighting the option and pressing ox.

## Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

- Press the navigation key up and down to scroll line by line or
press the volume buttons on the side of the phone to scroll one page at a time.


## Navigating Between Web Pages

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating Web sites.

- Select on-screen items by using the navigation key to highlight the desired item, then press the desired softkey button (or press ok).
You'll find that the left softkey $\vdots$ is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled "OK."
- If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item.

Links, which appear as underlined text, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

- Select links by highlighting the link and then selecting the appropriate softkey.

Tip: The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the $0-$ key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.

## - To go back one page, press on your phone. (Note that Back is also used like a BACKSPACE key to delete text.)

## Using the Menu to Navigate

By pressing the Menu softkey, you can navigate between web pages.

- Press the Menu softkey and select one of the following options:

1. Home to return to the Bell home page
2. Forward one web page (if you have not returned back from a previous web page, this option is greyed out)
3. Mark this page to create a Bookmark
4. View Bookmarks to see your list of Bookmarks
5. History to see a list of web pages you have browsed this session
6. Go to URL to directly jump to a specific web page
7. Show URL to view the URL of your current webpage
8. Reload this page
9. About Browser to view information about your Mobile Browser
10. Restart your Mobile Browser

Preferences to change your Mobile Browser preferences.

Note: Scroll down the list to select Preferences.

## Downloading Games, Ringers, Screen Savers and Applications

With your new web enabled phone, you have access to a variety of services such as downloadable Games, Ringers, and Screen Savers. While each type of download involves a different file type, the basic method for accessing and downloading files is the same.

## Games

You can play a variety of entertaining and graphically-rich games on your phone. New games are easy to download and play.

## Downloading Games

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 mar Downloads.
3. Highlight Games and press ox
4. Highlight Get New and press ox. The browser will launch and take you to the Games download menu.
5. Use your navigation key to highlight and select a game you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 69.). Follow the online instructions to complete the download.

Note: You may store a limited number of downloaded games on your phone, depending on the file sizes.

## Playing Games

To play a downloaded game on your phone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 m for Downloads.
3. Highlight Games and press
4. Select the game you wish to play.
5. Follow the on-screen instructions to play the game. When you are finished, select Exit (or Quit) or press

## Ringers

## Downloading Ringers

To download an available ringer to your phone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 m for Downloads.
3. Highlight Ringers and press oK
4. Highlight Get New and press ox. The browser will launch and take you to the Ringers download menu.
5. Use your navigation key to highlight and select a ringer you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 69.)
6. From the item information page, select Buy. You will be prompted with the cost of the ringer. Follow the online instructions to complete the download.

## Assigning Downloaded Ringers

Downloaded ringers may be assigned directly from the Downloads menu and are also available through the Settings menu. To assign a downloaded ringer through the Settings menu, see "Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls" on page 101 or "Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls" on page 101. To assign a downloaded ringer:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 m for Downloads.
3. Highlight Ringers and press ox
4. Highlight a ringer and press ox to play the ringer.
5. Press back to return to the Ringers menu.
6. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by $2 \times$ for Set as.
7. Press 1 for Voice Calls.
8. Press 1 for With Caller ID or 2 and for No Caller ID.
9. Press ok to exit.

Note: You may assign a ringer to more than one type of call.

## Downloading Screen Savers

To download an available Screen Saver to your phone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 ma for Downloads.
3. Highlight Screen Savers and press ox
4. Highlight Get New and press ©K. The browser will launch and take you to the Screen Savers download menu.
5. Use your navigation key to highlight and select a Screen Saver you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 69.)
6. From the item information page, select Buy. You will be prompted with the cost of the screen saver. Follow the online instructions to complete the download.

Note: You may store a limited number of downloaded Screen Savers on your phone, depending on the file sizes.

## Assigning Downloaded Screen Savers

Downloaded Screen Savers may be assigned directly from the Downloads menu and are also available through the Settings menu. To assign a downloaded Screen Saver through the Settings menu, see "Changing the Screen Saver" on page 98.
To assign a downloaded Screen Saver from the Downloads menu:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 ma for Downloads.
3. Highlight Screen Savers and press
4. Highlight a Screen Saver and press ©K to view.
5. Press to return to the Screen Savers menu.
6. Press the right softkey ! followed by 2 ncc for Set as.
7. Press 1 for Screen Saver.

Note: You may assign a Screen Saver to more than one task.

## Applications

## Downloading Applications

To download an application to your phone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 5 mar Downloads.
3. Highlight Applications and press ox
4. Highlight Get New and press ox. The browser will launch and take you to the application download menu.
5. Use your navigation key to highlight and select an application you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 69.)
6. From the item information page, select Buy. You will be prompted with the cost of the application.

## Voice Services

## Activating Voice Recognition

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the pre-designated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.
To activate voice recognition:

1. Press and hold . (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
2. Wait for the beep and then say one of the following commands:

- Voice Dial
- Voice Memo
- My Phone \#
- Contacts - Status

When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. If the phone does not hear a command within approximately eight seconds, it de-activates voice recognition without taking any action.

Note: If you want to use another button to activate voice recognition, in addition to , press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by for Settings, followed by for Launch Pad. Though this menu, you can change button assignments, including the button used to launch "Voice Dial," which is the voice recognition application.

## Using voice Dial

Voice Dial allows you to dial any valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number by speaking the number naturally, without pausing between the digits. This feature also supports name dial for names saved as Contacts.
Tips for using Voice Dial:

- Voice Dial works best in quieter environments.
- When saying a number, speak at a normal speed and say each digit clearly. There is no need to pause between digits.
- The phone recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and oh. The phone does not recognize numbers such as "one eight hundred" for "1-800." Instead, say "one-eight-zero-zero."
- The phone recognizes only valid 7,10 or 11 digit North American phone numbers.
- If your phone does not usually recognize you correctly when you are using Voice Dial, try adapting Voice Dial to your voice, which can significantly improve accuracy for some speakers. (See "Changing Voice Dial Sensitivity" on page 83 for details.)

To place a call using Voice Dial:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone prompts you for a command.)
2. Say Voice Dial. (The phone prompts you to say the name or number.)
3. Say either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7,10 or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.
4. If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct number, say "Yes." (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing ox on the correct number. The phone will then dial the number.)
5. If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List, and then press ox to dial.)
6. Alternatively, you can call a person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person you want to call, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone plays the name through the earpiece and displays it on the screen.)

- If you said a name listed in your Contacts that has more than one number associated with it, the phone displays the different locations (Home, Work, Mobile, Pager, Fax, No Label) and asks you which one to dial. Say one of the location names and the phone will dial the number for the location you specified.

Note: In some cases, the phone might ask you to repeat a name or number. Make sure that the number is a valid 7 or 10 digit North American phone number, and then say the number again. If the number isn't valid, or if the phone still doesn't understand the number on the second try, it will not place a call.

## Enabling/Disabling Choice Lists

You can customize whether the Voice Dial feature displays the list of top voice recognition choices or automatically dials the first number, without displaying a choice list.
To enable or disable choice lists for Voice Dial:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 4or for Voice Service.
4. Press 1 for Settings.
5. Press $3^{\text {馬 }}$ for Choice Lists.
6. Press 1 for Name Dialing, for 2act Digit Dialing or (30) for Contacts.
7. Press the navigation key up or down to select Automatic, Always On or Always Off and press OK.

## Using Name Lookup

Name Lookup lets you retrieve contact information for any person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.
To retrieve information using Name Lookup:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
2. Say Contacts. (The phone will prompt you to say the name.)
3. Say the full name of the person, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone will play the name it recognized through the earpiece, and then open the contact information for that name.)

- If the phone says, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say $\mathbf{N o}$. The phone then prompts you with the next name, if there is one. If there are no more names, the phone will say "Sorry, No Match Found."


## Phone Status Information

The voice recognition Status option gives you an update on your phone's service, signal strength, and battery level.
To retrieve your phone's status information:

1. Press the navigation key left or press and hold to activate voice recognition. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
2. Wait for the beep and say Status. Your phone's current status information is displayed.

## Customizing Voice Dial

## Adapting Voice Dial

Voice Dialing is speaker independent, which means that no initial training or adaptation is required. Some users with heavy accents or unusual voice characteristics may encounter difficulty in achieving high accuracy with speaker independent Voice Dialing, so the Adapt Digits feature allows users to dramatically improve the digit accuracy through adaptation. Users who get acceptable digit recognition accuracy will find no additional benefit to performing the Adapt Digit adaptation.
After you adapt Voice Dial, your phone will be customized to your voice. Other people will not be able to use Voice Dial on your phone unless they reset the phone to factory defaults.

> Note: ONLY adapt Voice Dial if the system is frequently misrecognizing your speech. You can always restore the system to its original factory setting.

Adaptation involves recording several digit sequences to teach the system your voice. The adaptation process takes about 3 minutes.

Tips for adapting Voice Dial:

- Adapt digits in a quiet place.
- Make sure you wait for the beep before starting to speak.
- Speak clearly, but say each digit sequence naturally.
- If you make a mistake while recording a sequence of digits, or if there is an unexpected noise that spoils the recording, you can say or select No when the prompt asks, "Did the recording sound OK?" You will then be prompted to re-record the sequence.

To adapt Voice Dial to your voice:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by for Settings.
2. Press 4.ar for Voice Service.
3. Press 1 for Settings.
4. Press 1 for Digit Dialing.
5. Press 1 for Adapt Digits. (The phone displays the first digit sequence.)
6. When you are ready to start recording, press ox. (The phone prompts you to say the first sequence of digits.)
7. Wait for the beep, and then repeat the digits using a normal tone of voice. (The phone plays back your recording and asks you if the recording sounds "OK.")

- If the recording sounds OK (no mistakes and no background noises), say Yes.
- If you need to re-record the digits to fix any problems, say No. (The phone then prompts you to say the digits again.)

8. Wait for the beep, and then record the digits again. (Repeat this step until you are satisfied with the recording.)
9. After confirming that the recording sounds OK , repeat the recording process with the next set of digits. In total, there are 10 sets of numbers. When you are finished with a full session, you will reach a screen that reads, "Adaptation Complete."

> Note: It is recommended that you perform the complete adaptation of Voice Dial at least once to achieve the maximum benefit of this feature. If a partial adaptation is performed, you can always return later and resume the process from the half way point.

## Resetting Voice Dial Adaptation

To erase any adaptation and reset Voice Dial to its original state:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by for Settings.
2. Press 4ar for Voice Service.
3. Press 1 for Settings.
4. Press 1 for Digit Dialing.
5. Press $2 n$ for Reset Digits.
6. Press the left softkey $\ddagger$ to select $\mathbf{O K}$ and reset digit dialing.
7. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for $\mathbf{O K}$.

## Changing Voice Dial Sensitivity

You can adjust your phone's sensitivity to sounds when listening for voice commands or names, making it require a more exact or less exact sound match before responding to your command. To adjust your phone's voice dial sensitivity:

1. Press the left softkey Settings.
2. Press 4an for Voice Service.
3. Press 1 for Settings.
4. Press 2 nac for Sensitivity.
5. Press 10 for Commands or 2 necc for Names.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select Reject More or Reject Less and press ox.

- If you select Reject More, your phone will require a more exact sound match and if you select Reject Less, your phone will require a less exact sound match.


## Changing Audio Prompts and Playback

By default, your phone provides audio prompts such as "Please say a command". You can turn these prompts on or off.
To turn audio prompts or playback On or Off:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by for Settings.
2. Press 4ar for Voice Service.
3. Press 10 for Settings.
4. Press 4ar for Sound.
5. Press 1 for Prompts, 2nac for Digits or $3^{\text {000 }}$ for Names.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select On or Off and press 0 .

## Changing Name Playback Speed or Volume

You can adjust the speed and volume of Names playback. To adjust the speed or volume of Names playback:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 9 for Settings.
2. Press 4a for Voice Service.
3. Press 1 for Settings.
4. Press 4an for Sound.
5. Press 4an for Name Settings.
6. Press 1 for Speed or 2 ncc for Volume.

- If you selected Speed, press the navigation key up or down to select Faster or Slower and press
- If you selected Volume, press the navigation key up or down to select Louder or Softer and press ox.


## Changing Voice Launch

By default, the Voice Dial feature is activated by pressing and holding . You can change your phone's settings to activate Voice Dialing whenever you open the flip lid of your phone.
To change your Voice Launch method:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 9 for Settings.
2. Press 4an for Voice Service.
3. Press 1 for Settings.
4. Press 5 mor Voice Launch.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Talk Only or Talk and Flip and press ox.

## Managing Voice Memos

You can use your phone to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or other items.

## Recording Voice Memos

## To record a voice memo:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 7 for Voice Service.
2. Press 2 necc for Voice Memo.
3. Press 1 for Record. (The phone prompts you to start recording after the beep.)
4. Wait for the beep and then start speaking. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)

- Press the right softkey $\vdots$ to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the right softkey : again to Resume recording.)

5. To finish recording, press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done.

To record a conversation during a phone call:

1. During a call, press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options.
2. Press 6wor for Vomo. (A one minute counter is displayed on the screen to indicating the amount of time a single voice memo can be recorded.)

- Press the right softkey $\vdots$ to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the right softkey : again to Resume recording.)

3. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Done to end the recording prior to the countdown completion

Note: A total of 10 minutes in 10 separate memos can be recorded and saved. Individual memos can record up to 60 seconds of audio.

## Reviewing and Erasing Memos

To play the voice memos you have recorded:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 7 for Voice Service.
2. Press 2nac for Voice Memo.
3. Press $2 a c d$ for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
4. Select a memo and press OK
—or -
Press the number corresponding to the memo you want to review. (The phone replays the memo.)

- Press the right softkey $\vdots$ to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the right softkey : again to Resume playing.)
To erase an individual memo:

1. Press the left softkey Voice Service.
2. Press 2acd for Voice Memo.
3. Press $2 a c d$ for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
4. Select the memo to erase.
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ followed by 10 for Erase.
6. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press ox To erase all voice memos:
7. Press the left softkey $\%$ followed by 7 for Voice Service.
8. Press 2acd for Voice Memo.
9. Press 2acd for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
10. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ followed by 2 noc Erase All.
11. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press ok

## Using Text to Speech (TTS)

Your phone is equipped with a Text to Speech (TTS) feature. TTS causes your phone to speak the currently-highlighted menu choice. As you navigate through the menus, TTS informs you what your current selection is, without having to look at the display screen.

Tip: You can even use TTS to go through your list of Contacts. TTS will speak each Contact name as you highlight it.

## Enabling/Disabling TTS

To enable TTS:

1. Press the left softkey for Menu, followed by for Settings.
2. Press 4.a for Voice Service.
3. Press $2 n a d$ for TTS Mode.
4. Using the navigation key, select Enable TTS and press ox To disable TTS:
5. Press the left softkey
for Menu, followed by
 for Settings.
6. Press 4a for Voice Service.
7. Press 2act for TTS Mode.
8. Using the navigation key, select Disable TTS and press

OK

## Adjusting TTS Volume Levels

To increase or decrease your handset's volume for TTS:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu, followed by 9 for Settings.
2. Press 4a for Voice Service.
3. Press $3^{00}$ for TTS Volume.
4. Press the navigation key right to increase or left to decrease the volume.
5. Press oK to save and exit.

## Tools

## Using the Task List

You can create and view a list of tasks.
To add a task:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 tuv for Tools.
3. Press 1 for Task List.

- If you have no events currently scheduled for today, then the New Task menu is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more events scheduled for today, they are displayed. Press the right softkey : for Options, followed by 1 for Add New.

4. Enter the task description using the keypad and press the left softkey $\because$ for Next.
5. Enter the Due Time and Date using the keypad. (Press for AM or 7 for PM.)
6. Press the navigation keys left or right to select a Low or High priority.
7. Press the left softkey $\because$ to Save.

To view a task:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 mu for Tools.
3. Press 1 for Task List.
4. Use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired task and press ok to view the task details.

To delete one or more tasks:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 uva for Tools.
3. Press 1 for Task List. If you wish to delete a specific task, highlight it using the navigation keys.
4. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options.
5. Press 2acc to Erase the highlighted task or $3^{\text {00e }}$ for Erase All.
6. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press ox.

## Using the Memo Pad

Your phone comes with a memo pad you can use to compose and store reminders and notes to help keep you organized.
To compose a memo:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 mun for Tools.
3. Press 2nad for Memo Pad.

- If you have no memos composed, then the New Memo menu is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more composed memos, they are displayed. Press the right softkey : for Options, followed by 10 for Add New.

4. Enter up to 64 characters in the memo using the keypad and press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Save.(See "Entering Text" on page 23.)

To view a memo:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 tuv for Tools.
3. Press 2nad for Memo Pad.
4. Use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired memo and press OK to view the memo details.
To delete saved memos:
5. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
6. Press 8 vur for Tools.
7. Press 2nac for Memo Pad.
8. Highlight the task you wish to delete using the navigation keys.
9. Press the right softkey $\vdots$ for Options.
10. Press 2acc to Erase the highlighted task or $3^{000}$ for Erase All.
11. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press ox to confirm.

## World Time

World Time displays what time it is in twenty-four different time zones around the world together with one or more major cities, states, regions, or countries located in the selected time zone.
To access world time:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 tuo for Tools.
3. Press 3 for World Time.
4. Press the navigation key left, right, up, or down to display the different time zones.
5. Press the right softkey $\vdots$, followed by 1 to turn Daylight Savings Time (DST) On or Off.

Note: The DST setting in the handset is not automatically updated due to the calendar date.

## Using the Alarm Clock

Your phone comes with a built-in alarm clock with multiple alarm times. To use the alarm clock:

1. Press the left softkey for Menu.
2. Press 8 mu for Tools.
3. Press 4 an for Alarm Clock.
4. Press 10, 2and, or 300 to select an Alarm.
5. Press the navigation key left or right and select On.
6. Press the navigation key down once and enter the alarm time. (Press 2acc for AM or 7 for PM.)
7. Press the navigation key down once to select the desired ringer. (Cycle through the ringers by pressing the navigation key left or right.)
8. Press the navigation key down once to select the alarm frequency.
9. Press the navigation key left or right and select one of the following options:
Once
10. Press ox to Save.

## Using the Calculator

Your phone comes with a built-in calculator.
To use the calculator:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 un for Tools.
3. Press 5 m for Calculator
4. Enter a number with the keypad. (Press *- to insert a decimal point and/or to make the number negative or positive.)
5. Use your navigation key to select a mathematical function:

- Left to Subtract
- Right to Add
- Up to Multiply
- Down to Divide

6. Enter the next number using the keypad. Repeat steps 4 and 5 as necessary.
7. Press 0 Kk to view the results.

## Countdown

Countdown allows you to enter a future date and time into the phone and then see the amount of days, hours, and minutes until that time is reached.
To set up a new countdown:

1. Press the left softkey $\ddagger$ for Menu.
2. Press 8 tuu for Tools.
3. Press 6wor for Countdown.

- If there are no existing countdowns, the New Countdown screen is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more composed memos, they are displayed. Press the right softkey : for Options, followed by 10 for Add New.

4. Enter a name using the keypad and press ox.
5. Enter the Input Time and Date values and press ox to Save.
To view a countdown:
6. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
7. Press 8 un for Tools.
8. Press 6wor Countdown.
9. Press the navigation key up or down to highlight the desired countdown and press ok

Tip: When viewing an existing countdown, press the navigation key left or right to cycle between the other countdown entries.

## Display Settings

## Changing the Text Greeting

The text greeting can be up to 12 characters and is displayed on your phone's screen in standby mode. You may choose to display a custom greeting or display your User Name on the phone's screen. To display or change your custom greeting:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 10 for Display.
4. Press 4a for Greeting.
5. Select Custom using the navigation key and press
ok
6. Press and hold to clear the existing greeting.
7. Use the keypad to enter a new custom greeting. (See "Entering Text" on page 23.)
8. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ to Save and exit.

Tip: To access the phone's main menu, press the left softkey from standby mode. Menu items may be selected by highlighting them with the navigation key and pressing ox, or you can press the number corresponding to the menu item on your keypad.

## Changing the Backlight Time Length

The backlight setting lets you select how long the display screen and keypad are backlit after any key press is made.
To change the backlight setting:

1. Press the left softkey
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 1 for Display.
4. Press for 5 Backlight.
5. Press 10 for Main Display, 2acc for Keypad, or 30 for Pwr Save Mode.
6. Use the navigation key to select:

- Flip Open, 15 seconds, 30 seconds, 1 minute, or 3 minutes for the Main Display.
- Off, 15 seconds, 30 seconds, 1 minute, 3 minutes or 10 minutes for Keypad.
- On or Off for Pwr Save Mode.

6. Press ox to save and exit.

Note: Long backlight settings reduce the battery's talk and standby times.

## Changing the Screen Saver

Your new phone offers options for what you see on the display screen when in standby mode.
To change the display images:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 1 for Display.
4. Press 10 for Screen Saver.
5. Press 1 for Preset Image or 2 acc for Downloads.
6. Press the navigation key left or right until the desired image is displayed.
7. Press ox to save and exit.

## Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the menu appears on your display screen. For more information, see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 35.

## Changing the Size of your Dialing Font

You can adjust the size of the digits that appear on screen when dialing a phone number.
To change the dialing font size:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 10 for Display.
4. Press 8 tuo for Dialing Font.
5. Press 2ace for Size.
6. Press the navigation keys up or down to select Large or Normal and press ok to save your changes.

## Changing the Color of your Dialing Font

You can adjust the color of your dialing font so that it appears in color or monochromatic.
To change the dialing font color:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 10 for Display.
4. Press 8 nuv for Dialing Font.
5. Press 1 for Color.
6. Press the navigation keys up or down to select one of the following and press ok:

- Basic displays entered digits all in black.
- Rainbow displays each digit in a different color.
- Monochrome displays entered digits as a single color of your choice.
- Hyphenate displays each block of digits separated by hyphens in a different color.

7. A sample of the new Dialing Font color appears onscreen.

- If you selected Monochrome, press the navigation keys left or right to select your desired color and press ox.
- If you selected any other option, press OK to save your changes.


## Sound Settings

## Adjusting the Phone's Volume Settings

To adjust the ringer or key tone volume:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 90~ for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 10 for Ringer Volume.
5. Press 100 for Calls, 2nac for Messages, or 300 for Alarms.
6. Press the navigation key left or right until the desired volume level is selected and press OK to save and exit.

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) by using the volume key on the side of your phone.

## Ringer Types

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, Scheduler entries, and types of messages.

- Single Tones are non-polyphonic traditional style ring tones.
- Ring Tones include a variety of standard ringer types.
- Melodies includes a variety of standard musical melodies.
- Downloaded ringers includes all the ringtones you have previously downloaded. See "Downloading Ringers" on page 73
- Vibrate alerts you to calls or messages without disturbing others. To select vibrate mode, press the volume key down while your phone is in idle mode until Vibrate is selected.


## Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls

Your phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls by the ring.
To select a ringer type for voice calls:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press for Settings.
3. Press 2acd for Sounds.
4. Press 2act for Ringer Type.
5. Press 1 for Voice Calls.
6. Press 1 for With Caller ID or 2 and for No Caller ID.
7. Press the navigation button left or right to select Single Tones, Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloaded ringers.
8. Press the navigation button down and then left or right to select the desired Ringer.
9. Press on to save and exit.

## Selecting Ringer Types for Messages

To select a ringer type for messages:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 2nac for Ringer Type.
5. Press 2ac for Messages.
6. Press 10 for Voicemail, 2nac for Page 300 for Text Message, 4 for Web Alerts.
7. Press the navigation button left or right to select Single Tones, Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloaded ringers.
8. Press the navigation button down and then left or right to select the desired Ringer.
9. Press ox to save and exit.

## Selecting Ringer Types for Scheduled Alerts

To select a ringer type for scheduled alerts:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 2act for Ringer Type.
5. Press 300 for Schedule.
6. Press the navigation button left or right to select Single Tones, Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloaded ringers.
7. Press the navigation button down and then left or right to select the desired Ringer.
8. Press ox to save and exit.

## Selecting Ringer Type for Roam Ringer

To select a ringer type for incoming roam calls:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 2ad for Ringer Type.
5. Press 4or for Roam Ringer.
6. Select Normal or Distinctive and press ox to save and exit.

## Alert Notification

Your phone can alert you with an audible tone when you change service areas, once a minute during a voice call, or when a call has been connected.
The different actions available are:

- Minute Beep - An alert tone is sounded every minute that you are connected.
- Service - An alert tone is sounded when you come in or out of your coverage area.
- Connect - An alert tone is sounded when you are initially connected.
- Disconnect - An alert tone is sounded when the signal fades and the connection is lost.
- Fade - An alert tone is sounded when your phone partially loses signal due to network conditions.
- Roam - An alert tone is sounded when you are connected to a network other than your home network.
- Power $\mathbf{O n} / \mathbf{O f f}$ - An alert tone is sounded when your phone is powered On or Off.
- Flip Sound - An alert is sounded when the flip is opened or closed.

To enable or disable alert sounds:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press for Settings.
3. Press 2 nac for Sounds.
4. Press $3^{000}$ for Alerts.
5. Press:

- 1 for Minute Beep
- 2 nac for Service
- $3^{000}$ for Connect
- 4 ar for Disconnect
- 5 mar for Fade
- 60. for Roam
- 7 mor for Power On/Off

6. Select On or Off using the navigation key and press ox to save and exit.

## Selecting a Key Tone

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press.
There are three different tones available:

- Normal - Normal key beeps are heard when a button is pressed.
- Piano - Piano polyphonic tones are heard when a key is pressed.
- Beep - Polyphonic beep tones are heard when you press a key.

To select a key tone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 4an for Key Tone.
5. Press 1 for Tone Type.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired tone type.
7. Press ok to save and exit.

## Key Tone Volume

To adjust the key tone volume:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 900 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 4an for Key Tone.
5. Press $2 \wedge a c$ for Tone Level.
6. Press the navigation key right to increase or left to decrease the volume.
7. Press ox to save and exit.

## Selecting Tone Length

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press. Voicemail or other automated systems may require long or short time lengths to activate different features. To select a key tone:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press 5mar for Tone Length.
5. Select Short or Long and press ok to save and exit.

## Application Volume

This setting allows you to control the default volume and vibrate settings in downloaded applications on your phone. When the application is opened, the default setting is enabled and you can adjust the volume setting by using the volume keys located on the side of the handset.
To set up the App. Volume:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 900 for Settings.
3. Press 2nac for Sounds.
4. Press for App. Volume.
5. Press:

- 1 To for Sound.
- 2 and for Vibrate.

6. Press the navigation key left or right to select a desired volume level or up or down to select on or off for vibrate.
7. Press ox to save and exit.

## Silence All

There may be times when you need to silence your phone entirely.
The phone's Silence All option allows you to mute all sounds without turning your phone off.
To activate Silence All:

- With the phone flipped open, press and hold the volume key down in standby mode.
(The screen will display "Silence All.")
To deactivate Silence All:
- Press the volume key up repeatedly to select a desired volume level.


## TTS Volume

You can increase or decrease your handset's TTS volume levels. For more information, see "Adjusting TTS Volume Levels" on page 90.

## Location Settings

Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future.
The Location feature allows the network to detect your position.
Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

[^5]To enable your phone's Location feature:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 7 for Others.
4. Press 600 for Location. (A brief explanation will display. Use your navigation key to scroll through to read the entire text.)
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select On or Off.
6. Press ox to save and exit.

When the Location feature is on, your phone's standby screen will display the icon. When Location is turned off, the icon will display.

## Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Notepad, Voice Memos, etc., when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information. All incoming calls will be sent directly to your voicemail box.
To set your phone to Airplane Mode:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 5m for Airplane Mode. (A brief explanation of Airplane Mode will display.)
4. Press $\bigcirc$ to continue.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select On or Off and press ok to save and exit.
While in Airplane Mode, your phone's standby screen will display "Phone off."

Note: 911 and emergency calls can not be made when the Airplane mode is on.

## Phone Setup Options

## Shortcut

You have the option of assigning the navigation key to an often-used function. The center navigation key cannot be changed. Pressing the navigation key left in standby mode will launch the assigned feature.

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 90r for Settings.
3. Press 6mor Launch Pad.
4. Press 10 for Up Key, 2nac for Down Key, 300 for Left Key, or 4 and for Right Key.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select one of the following functions:

- Contacts
- Voice Memo
- Scheduler
- Messaging
- Ringer Type
- Downloads
- Inbox
- Display
- Send Text
- Alarms - Tools
- Voice Dial - Calculator

6. Press ok to save and exit.

## Call Answer Mode

To set the actions required to answer an incoming call:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 for Settings.
3. Press 7 for Others.
4. Press 2nac for Call Answer and select one of the following:

- Any Key
- Talk Key
- Flip Open

5. Press ox to save and exit.

## Auto-Answer Mode

To answer calls when your phone is connected to an optional handsfree car kit or head set:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 mor Settings.
3. Press 7 for Others.
4. Press $3^{000}$ for Auto Answer.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No.
6. Press ox to save and exit.

## Display Language

Your phone can display text in English or French. Language selection changes all menus and voice message settings.

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 mor fettings.
3. Press 7 for for Others.
4. Press 4 for Language.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select English or French.
6. Press ox to save and exit.

## Accessing the Security Menu

All of your phone's security settings are available through the
Security menu. You must enter your lock code to view the
Security menu.
To access the Security menu:

1. Press the left softkey $\vdots$ for Menu.
2. Press 9 gor fottings.
3. Press $3^{000}$ for Security.
4. Enter your lock code. (The security menu is displayed.)

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of either your Social Insurance Number or Phone Number or try 0000. If none of these work, call Customer Service at 1-800-Samsung.

## Using Your Phone's Lock Feature

## Locking Your Phone

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911, Customer Service, or special numbers.
To lock your phone:

1. From the Security menu, press 10 for Lock Phone.
2. Using the navigation key, select Unlocked, On Power-Up or Lock Now, and press ok.

## Unlocking Your Phone

To unlock your phone:

## Restricting Calls

You can restrict the phone numbers that your phone can call. (The Restrict Calls setting does not apply to 911 or Customer Service.). You can select one of the following options:

- Allow all - Allows all calls to be made without any restrictions. (Default setting.)
- Contacts Only - Allows you to call only the numbers saved in the Contacts. You can receive incoming calls from anyone.
- Special\# Only - Allows you to call only the three numbers stored in the Special\# section in the Security menu. You can receive incoming calls from anyone.

To restrict calls:

1. From the Security Menu, press $3^{\text {Bof }}$ for Restriction.
2. Using the navigation key, select Allow all, Contacts Only, or Special\# Only and press ox

Note: Restricted incoming calls are forwarded to voicemail.

## Using Special Numbers

You can save up to three special numbers in addition to your Internal Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories). You can make and receive calls from special numbers even when your phone is locked. You can save three special numbers in addition to your Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories). To add or replace a special number:

1. From the Security menu, press 4 for Special \#.
2. Select entry one, two, or three and press OK
3. Enter the number using the keypad.
4. Press OK to Save.

Note: There are no Speed Dial options associated with special numbers.

## Erasing the Contacts

To erase all the names and phone numbers in your Contacts:

1. From the Security menu, press 5 mor Erase.
2. Press 1 for Erase Contacts.
3. Using the navigation key, select Yes and press ok
4. Using the navigation key, select Yes again to confirm and press ox to permanently delete.

## Erasing Downloads

This option deletes all saved downloaded content from the phone, including games, ringers, screen savers, and applications.
To erase your downloads:

1. From the Security menu, press 5 mm for Erase.
2. Press 2and for Erase Downloads.
3. Using the navigation key, select Yes and press

## Resetting Your Phone

Resetting the phone restores all the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings. The Contacts, Call History, Scheduler, and Messaging are not affected. To reset your phone:

1. From the Security menu, press 6 for Reset Phone.
2. Using the navigation key, select Yes and press ox
3. Using the navigation key, select Yes again to confirm and press ©K. Your phone will reset.

## Getting the Most Out of Your Reception

## Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

## Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

## Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

## Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below. In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after
reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

## Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended, and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend, or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it's inoperable, return it to a dealer store or call Customer Support for service.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only BMC authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

## Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

Failure to follow the instructions outlined may lead to serious personal injury and possible property damage.

## Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first. When using your phone in the car:

- Get to know your phone and its features, such as speed dial and re-dial.
- When available, use a hands-free device.
- Position your phone within easy reach.
- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when stationary or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may divert your attention from the road.
- Dial 911 to report serious emergencies. It's free from your wireless phone.
- Use your phone to help others in emergencies.
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless number when necessary.


## Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

## Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.
RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.
Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

## Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

## Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn off your phone when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating that two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

> Turn off your phone when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your
phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks could cause an explosion or a fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

## Restricting Children's Access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone, dial 911 by mistake or make calls that increase your phone bill.

## Caring for the Battery

## Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only Samsung approved batteries and desktop chargers. These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from $32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$.
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. When used correctly, the battery can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
- Less than one month:
$-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $140^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.60^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$
- More than one month:
$-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$


## Disposal of Lithium Ion (Lilon) Batteries

For safe disposal options of your Lilon batteries, contact your nearest BMC service center.
Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety. All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety.
