Follow the easy steps shown inside to get your Trio Tablet up and running.

STEP 1: CHECK OUT THE CONTROLS

Before you do anything else, take a good look around your TRIO tablet and find out where all the control buttons and other items of interest are.

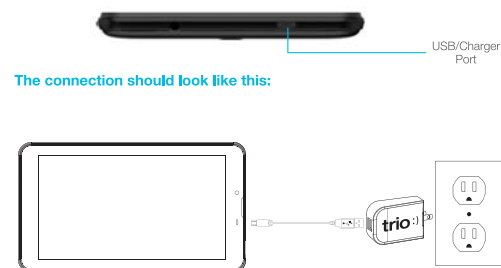

STEP 2: CHARGE THE BATTERY

You need to charge up the battery before you use your TRIO tablet for the first time.

Connect the charger to your TRIO, using the USB/Charger cable. The cable plugs in to the USB/Charger Port at the top of your Tablet.



Plug the charger into a power outlet. The screen will display a flashing battery symbol for a few seconds to show that the battery is charging. Keep the battery on charge for 6 to 8 hours to make sure that it is fully charged.

STEP 3: POWER UP

When the battery is fully charged, switch on your TRIO tablet. To do this, press and hold the power on/off button until the trio :) logo appears:

Proceed through the initial setup steps and login screen.



From the Start screen, tap on a tile to launch an app or utility. Swipe your finger up to see your apps. Swipe in from the right side of the screen to see your charms (shortcuts to frequently used tools). The charms panel is also where the Start button is located – tap it to return to the Start screen at any time.
