## Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

## Phone Operation

NORMAL POSITION: Hold the phoneas you would any other telephonewith the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

TIPS ON EFFICIENT OPERATION: For your phone to operate most efficiently:

- Extend your antenna fully (where applicable).
- Do not touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phoneto operateat a higher power leve than otherwise needed.


## Driving

- Dial sensibly and assessthetraffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting
- Useyour wirdess phoneto call for help.
- Use your wirdess phoneto help others in emergendies
- Call roadside assistance or a special wireless nonemergency assistance number when necessary.


## Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shieded from RF signals. However, cetain dectronic equipment may not beshied ded against RF signals from your wirdess phone

## Pacemakers

TheH elth Industry Manufactures Association recommends that a minimum separation of six ( $6^{\prime \prime}$ ) inches be maintained between a handhed wirdess phoneand a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pace maker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wire less Technology Reserch.

Personswith pacemakers

- Should ALWAYS kep thephonemorethan six inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON .
- Should not carry the phone in a breest pocket.
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimizethe potential for inteference
- If you haveany reeson to suspect that intefferenceis taking place, tum your phone OFF immediately.


## Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In theevent of such interference, you may
want to consult your service provider (or call the cus tomer sevicelineto discouss alternatives).

## Other Medical Devices

If you useany other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your deviceto determineif it is adequately shieded from external RF energy. Your physician may beable to assist you in obtaining this information.

Turn your phoneOFF in health carefacilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so H ospitals or health carefacilities may be using equipment that could besensitive to external RF energy.

## Vehicles

## Posted Facilities

## Aircraft

## Blasting Areas

To avoid intefering with blating operations, turn your phone OFF when in a "blasting area" or in areas posted: "Turn off two-way radio." Obey all signs and instructions

## Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Arees with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always dearly marked. They indudefueling arees such as gasolinestations, below deck on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storagefacilities, vehides using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); arees wheretheair containschemicals or partides, such as grain, dust, or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally beadvised to turn off your vehideengine

## New Batteries

The battery packaged with your phone is not fully charged. For maximum battery capadity, use your charger to condition thebattery.

## Recycling Your Battery

## Battery Use and Care

A rechargeeble battery has a long service life if treated properly. A new battery, or onethat has not been used for a long period of time, should be conditioned before using your phone Avoid recharging a fully-charged or almost fully-charged battery. If your phoneshuts off due to low battery power, you should charge the battery within 24 hours for the battery to reach full capacity.

- Do not leaveyour battery where it may besubjected to extremely hot or cold temperatures. This could reduce the batterys capacity.
- Do not le the metal contacts on the battery touch another metal object such as keys in your pocket. This could short-circuit and damage the battery.
- Do not attempt to take a battery apart.
- Do not expose a battery to open flame This could cause the battery to explode
- Turn your phone OFF beforeremoving the battery.
- Use only theAC/DC adapter supplied with your battery charger. Using a different adapter could be dangerous and will void your phone warranty.
- Never chargea battery when theambient room temperature is below $50^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$ or above $105^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ $\left(40^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$.
- Do not allow the battery to be placed into the mouth. Battery dectrolytes may betoxic if swallowed.


## Getting Started

## Connecting and Removing Your Battery

1 Place the battery over the back of thephone Thelabel on thebattery should face down. Inseat thetop portion of the battery into the phone Thetab on the bottom of the battery should be pointing toward the bottom of the phone

2 Press down until you hear a dick. Thebattery is now connected.

3 Remove the battery by pushing in on thetab of the battery with your thumb.

4 Then, lift thebattery up and out of the battery cavity.

## Charging Your Battery

## Your Charger

Your phone was packaged with either a rapid or trave charger. It is important that you fully charge your battery before you use your phone Both chargers supply power to chargeyour battery while the battery is attached to your phone If your phone is On, it can receivecalls while using either charger.

Note NEVER attach the charger to a
 phonethat does not have a battery installed.

1 If you have a rapid charger, plug the charger into a standard wall electrical outlet. If you have a traved charger, connect the appropriateAC power cord and phonecharging cord to the trave charger.

2 H old the phone with the display and keypad facing up.

3 Hold the small plug on the charger cord so the light-

4 Align the small plug on the charger cord with the connector on the bottom of your phone Theconnector on the phone is above the lightning bolt symbol ( 4 ).

5 Press the plug into the connector until the plug "snaps" into place The icon is alternated with the $r$ icon.


Note Do not twist whileinserting or removing the small plug on the charger cord!

6 Continue charging the phone until the battery is fully charged.

7 To disconnect the charger, lift the plug connected to the phone upwards and pull it out.

## Charge-Only Mode

If your phone is off, attaching the charger will cause the phoneto activatein charge-only mode When this mode is activated the message Charging Only appears in the display. Your phone is now fast (rapid) charging the battery. When your phone isfully charged, Eet.tery Charged appears in the display.

Note You cannot make or receivecalls when your phone is in chargeonly mode

## Slow (Trickle) Charging a Deeply Discharged Battery

The battery may become deeply discharged (for example, when the battery is stored for a long period). As a result, the phonemay not immediately activate chargeonly mode when the charger is connected.

1 Attach the charge to the phonefor several hours to sowly charge (tridkle charge) the battery.

2 After tricklecharging the battery for severd hours the phone should activate the charge only mode automatically.

3 Continue charging the phone until the battery is fully charged.

Note If the phoneis powered On and the phone is charging, the $\qquad$ icon is altemated with theicon. When fully charged, the $-\boldsymbol{m}$ icon remains constant.

Cherged appeers in the display when the battery is
fully charged.

Press YES to select or press Pher to scroll to the menu item you want to choose. You can also press the number associated with the menu item to highlight another menu.

## Making Calls

1 Enter the phonenumber you want to call by pressing thenumeric keys. Thenumber is shown in the display.

You can pressBACK to erase one or more digits in the display, or press and hold BACK to eraseall digits.

2 Press Yes. Calling is shown in the display while your phoneaccesses the wird ess newwork.

3 When thecall is connected, Ongoing Cell will dis play on your screen. The phone number that you dialed will remain on your screen.

4 When you finish your conversation, press NO.

## Redialing the Last Number You Called

Your telephonetemporarily stores numbers you have previously called. To view these numbers, press YES from the Standby screen when no other digits are int he display. The last number you called is shown in the dis play. Press ${ }^{* /}$ or $-{ }^{-1}$ to scroll through the other numbers. You can place acall to a number shown in the display by pressing YES. You can dete a number from the Outgoing Calls by pressing BACK and by pressing YES to confirm dedetion of the number. You can save a phone number from the Outgoing Calls List or Incoming Calls List by pressing and holding YES whilethenumber is shown in the display.

## Stop and Pause Dialing

Stop and pausedialing letsyou enter groups of numbers with stops and pauses between eech group of numbers. Thisfeeture is useful when you need to dial a phone number and then another number, such as an access number for an answering machine or voicemail system.

A stop causes the phoneto stop transmitting numbers until you press Yes. You can enter a stop in a series of digitsby pressing and holding\# until $\square$ isshown in the display. A pausetemporarily suspendstransmitting numbers for approximately two seconds before sending the next series You can enter a pause in a series of digits by pressing and holding* until \|\| is shown in thedis play. For example, if your office has a voice mail system that requires you to dial a phone number, followed by your extension, followed by an access code, you could enter the following: 555-1111 2222\||33333.

When you press YES, your phonedials the number and then stopstransmitting tones. When your voicemail system asks for your extension you would press YES to transmit your extension. Theaccess code is sent after the pause If the timing in your voice mail system does not allow for pauses, you can enter a stop instead of the pause, or use multiple pauses.

You can also store groups of numbers which can indude stops and pauses in a phonebook location. You can then dial the numbers by entering the phonebook location and pressing YES.

## Using Your Phonebook

## Creating Phonebook Entries

You can add entriesto your phonebook by doing thefollowing:

1 PressMENU from the Standby screen to access themain menu.

2 Press 1 to display the PHONEBOOK menu
3 Press 1 to select Add Entry.
4 Press ${ }^{\text {*/ }}$ or w to scroll to the name and number line Seethenext section to learn how to enter names in your phonebook.

## Answering Calls

When your phone receives a call, the ring tone sounds, Incoming Call appers in the display, and thedis play and keypad backlight areilluminated (you can dis able the ring tonethrough theSET'TINGS menu). If you haveCaller Number Identification (Calle ID) servicefrom your senvice provider, the calle's phone num ber is shown in the display.

Answer the phoneby pressing YEs. Incoming Cell is replaced by the call timer display. End thecall by press ing NO.

## Call Waiting

If you havecall waiting sevice from your senvice provider, press YES to answer a call when you receivethecal waiting signal. You can switch between thetwo calls by pressing YES. Do not pressNO until you are ready to end both calls.

## Unanswered Calls

Your phone's display shows thenumber of callsyou have received but did not answer. You can deer thenumber of missed callsfrom the display by pressing any key except

YES. If Caler Number Identification is avalablefrom your carrier, unanswered callswill bestored in the Incoming Calls of the CALL INFO menu. Press YES from the Missed CallsIndicator screen to access the Incoming Call Log.

## Temporarily Muting the Ring Tone

To temporarily mute the ring tone without answering thecall, press No, BACK, the UPPER SIDE VOLUME KEY, or the LOWER SIDE VOLUME KEY. Incoming Call is still shown in thedisplay, and you can still answer the call by pressing YES.

## Caller Number Identification

If your senvice provider has Caller Number Identification (Calle ID) service, your phoneshows the phone number of an incoming call in thedisplay. If thenumber is onethat you havestored in your phonebook with a name, the name is shown when your phonerings If the Caller ID information is not available, the messagello ID is shown in the display. The word Fr ivete may be shown if the Caller ID is restricted by the serviceprovider or by thecaller.

## Muting the Microphone During a Call

To mutethe microphoneduring a call, press and hold the BACK key. Mic Muted appeers in the display when thecall ismuted. Repeat this procedureto return to your cal.

## Phone Groups

The Phone Groups submenu allows you to organize the members of your phonebook into categories Each category can then have a distinctive ring sound assodiated with it and can be used for call screening if your network supports Caller ID. Refer to the Sareen Calls section later in this chapter for more information about call screening. The 10 options for Phone Groups are Personal, Family, Friends, Business, Work, Team, School, Group A, Group B, and Group C.

## Increasing or Decreasing Ear Volume

 During a Call

To decreasetheer volumeduring a call, press the lower key on the side of your phone

## Low Battery Power Alert

The low battery alet sounds when your battery is reaching its lowest operational power leve. The words Low Bettery! will appear in thedisplay. When this happens, leeveyour phoneturned on. Thephonedischarges the battery and then automatically turns off. Chargethe battery within 24 hours after a completedischargeso that the battery can chargeto full capacity.

## International Calls

If allowed by your service provider, you can place international calls with your phonejust as you would from any other phone If you have difficulty completing international calls, check with your seviceprovider for information.

8 Press 1 to select 1 Active Gateway and select the gate way to make active (Gateway 1 or Gateway 2). If the Adive Gateway IP address changes, then the browser will restart automatically.

## Launching Your Browser

To launch the browser, do one of thefollowing:

- PressMENU to accessthemenus and press 5 to open the BROWSER Menu
- Press and hold themENU key to switch from Voice Operation to Browser Operation and launch the browser.

## Making Phone Calls in Browser Operation

Whileyou arebrowsing, you can place a phonecall or return to Voice Operation to check voicemail or to receive phonecalls. You cannot receive voicecalls while you are browsing. To return to Voice Operation, do one of thefollowing:

- Pressmenu to access the Local Settings submenu. Then press 2 to select Voice Operation.

- Press and hold theMENU key to switch from Browser Operation to VoiceOperation.
