

# 2 Getting Started

### **Installing the Battery**

To install the battery, do as follows.



### **Charging the Battery**

To charge the battery, do as follows:

1. Connect the travel charger to the charger interface at the bottom of your phone.



- Connect the charger to an AC power socket. During the charging, the (iii) icon on the upper right corner of the screen is in an animated status.
- Wait until the phone is fully charged. If unimbecomes static, the battery is fully charged.
- 4. Disconnect the charger from the AC power socket.

5. Disconnect the charger from the phone.





- · Do not use a damaged battery or charger.
- Before using the travel charger, ensure that the battery is installed in your phone.

## Powering On/Off the Phone

- When the phone is powered off, press and hold for about two seconds to power it on.
- When the phone is powered on, press and hold for about two seconds to power it off.

### Using the Function Menu

To use the function menus, do as follows:

- 1. In the standby mode, press **(Menu**).
- 2. Press to select the desired function menu.
- 3. Press 🗾 (Select) to display the selected menu.
- 4. Display the submenu in either of the ways:
- Press Oto select a submenu and then press (Select) to display the selected submenu.
- Press the number key corresponding to the serial number of a submenu to display the submenu.

5. Press (Back) to return to the previous menu or exit the function menu.

To return to the standby mode, press

# **3** Voice Services

### Making a Call

- 1. In the standby mode, enter the phone number.
- To make an international call, press
   twice to enter the international long distance code of "+". Then enter the number to be dialed in the format of "country code + region code + phone number".
- To call a number with an extension, press three times to insert "P", or press four times to insert "T" between the phone number and the extension.
- 2. Press to dial the number.
- 3. Press or (End) to end the call.
- In the standby mode, press to select the desired number from All Calls. Then press to dial the number.

### **Receiving a Call**

When there is an incoming call, you can press C, C (Answer) or O to answer it; or press C to reject it.

When there is an incoming call, you can press (Silence) to mute the speaker and then press (Reject) again to reject it.

If the phone is in the **Silence** mode, you can just press (Reject) to reject it.

- · If the any-key answer function is enabled, you can press any key except  $\frown$  and  $\checkmark$  to answer an incoming call.
- If the headset auto answer function is enabled, and the headset is connected to the phone, the incoming call is answered automatically.
- m You can set any-key answer function in the Settings > Call Settings > Answer Mode, and set the headset auto answer function in the Settings > Call Settings > Headset Auto Answer

## **Options During a Call**

During a call, you can press or to increase the volume and press  $\bigcirc$  or  $\bigcirc$  to decrease the volume.

Press **C** (**Options**), and you can select the following options:

· Mute/Unmute: Allows you to mute or unmute your voice during a call

At first, the option is Mute. If you select it, the other party during the call cannot hear you any more.

If you access the Options menu again, the option is Unmute. If vou select it, the other party can hear you again.

This function is available only after the call is set up. You cannot mute/unmute the ringtone.

- · Save Number: Allows you to save the phone number to Contacts.
- Contacts: Allows you to enter the Contacts menu.

- · Messages: Allows you to enter the Messages menu.
- Call Memo: Allows you to enter the Call Memo menu.
- Voice Privacy: Allows you to protect your voice information from being overheard. You can choose either of the two modes, Standard and Enhanced. The Voice Privacy function is network dependent.
- You can press  $\odot$  to enable or disable the speaker during a call.

# 4 Text Entry

The indicator of the current input mode is displayed on the upper left corner of the screen. You can press **1** to change input modes.

- Press once to delete the letter on the left of the cursor. Press and hold for about two seconds to delete all letters at a time. You can press (Back) to return to the previous screen.
  - In any text input mode, the current editing status is displayed on the upper right corner of the screen, including the maximum letters for a piece of message and how many letters you can continue to enter.

### **Entering English**

### Alphabetical Text Input ("Abc")

The alphabetical text input allows you to enter English letters. You can press a number key labeled with required letters once to enter the first letter on the key, twice to enter the second letter on the key, and so on.

If the letter you want to enter is on the same key as the previous one, you can enter the latter only after the cursor appears again, or after you move the cursor to the next space.

In the "Abc" input mode:

You can press once to enter a space, twice to enter 0.

m

 You can press <u>1</u> repeatedly to enter the commonly used punctuations.

### Smart English Input ("En")

The "En" input mode recognizes commonly used words according to the numeric sequence of key presses. It requires only one key press for each letter in the word that you are spelling. If more than one word shares the same numeric sequence, the "En" input mode provides the most commonly used words. Among the possible words,

you can press it to select the desired one.

You can press  $\boxed{1 \circ \circ}$  once to enter a full stop and press  $\boxed{0}$  to enter

You can press  $\square \square$  once to enter a full stop and press  $\square \square$  to enter a space.

### **Entering Digits**

In different input modes, you can enter numbers as follows:

- In the "123" input mode, you can directly press number keys labeled with desired digits.
- In the "Abc" input mode, you can press the number key repeatedly until the desired digit appears on the screen.
- In the "En" input mode, you can press the number key and then press until the desired digit appears on the screen.

# **Entering Symbols**

In any input mode, you can enter a symbol as follows:

- Press (\*\*\* once to display a symbol list, and press (\*\*\* twice to display a network symbol list.
- Press it to view the symbols.
- 3. Press the number key to enter the corresponding symbol.

### Writing and Sending a Message

1. Select Menu > Messages > Create Message. You can also access

the **Create Message** menu by pressing and holding of for about two seconds in the standby mode.

2. Write the message.

You can press (Options) for the following options:

- Send: Allows you to send the message. You can choose to the message as an SMS or an E-mail.
- · Save: Allows you to save the message to Drafts.
- Insert Quick Text: Allows you to edit the message based on a template.
- Insert Contact: Allows you to insert the phone number of a contact into a message from Contacts.
- Priority: Allows you to set the priority of messages. The message
  priority function is network dependent.
- Callback Number: Allows you to set the callback number. The callback number is sent to the message recipient by default. You can set it to either your phone number or other numbers. When the recipient receives your message, the callback number can be viewed and provided for calling back. Select On and enter the phone number.
- While entering the number(s) of the recipients, you can select Search > Contacts to select the number of one contact in Contacts, or select Search > Group List to select the numbers of a group of contacts.
- In the text editing screen, press 
   to send the message directly.

### **Reading a Message**

To read a message stored in the inbox, do as follows:

- 1. Select Menu > Messages > Inbox.
- 2. Press to select a message.
- 3. Press to view the message.

- 4. Press (Options) to select the following options:
- · View: Allows you to view the message.
- Reply: Allows you to edit a message and reply the message sender.
- Delete: Allows you to delete the message.
- Delete Multiple: Allows you to delete multiple messages at a time.
- Forward: Allows you to forward the message.
- Extract Number: Allows you to extract the number contained in the message, or the number of the message sender. You can select Edit before call, Call or Save the number.

In the message viewing screen, press  $\bigcirc$  to reply the message directly.

### Adding a Contact

- 1. Select Menu > Contacts > Add New.
- 2. Press  $\odot$  to enter Name, and then press  $\square$  (OK).
- Enter the necessary information in the fields: Mobile Number, Home Number, Office Number, and Fax Number (at least one number field is required.). You can enter the E-mail of a new contact and select a Group, Notes and a Customed Tone for the contact.
- Press (Save) to save the information. The new contact will be saved to Contacts.

## Searching for a Contact

- 1. Select Menu > Contacts > Search.
- 2. Enter the name you want to search, and press **(Search**).

3. Press  $\bigcirc$  to view the contact, or press  $\frown$  (Options) for the following options:

- View: Allows you to view the contact.
- · Edit: Allows you to modify the contact.
- · Add New: Allows you to add a new contact to Contacts.
- Send Message: Allows you to write and send a message to this contact.
- Delete: Allows you to delete the contact.
- Call: Allows you to making a call to the contact.
- Edit Before call: Allows you to modify the number before you call it.

# 7 Alarm Clock

After the alarm clock is enabled, the phone rings and/or vibrates according to the preset mode at the specified time. You can set up to five alarm clocks.

### **Enabling the Alarm Clock**

- 1. Select Menu > Tools > Alarms.
- 2. Press  $[\circ]$  to select an alarm clock, and then press  $(\circ)$  to set the alarm.
- 3. Press  $\odot$  to set the time, and then press  $\odot$  again to confirm.
- Press it to set the time.
- Input the time directly.
- 4. Press  $\bigcirc$  to set the alarm ringtone. Press  $\bigcirc$  to select the ringtone, and press  $\frown$  (select) or  $\bigcirc$  to confirm.
- 5. Press  $(\circ)$  to select the alerting mode:
- Once: The alarm clock alerts once.
- · Everyday: The alarm clock alerts once a day.
- Custom: The alarm clock alerts at a specified time.
- Press (Save) to save the settings, with displaying a prompt to confirm.

- When the alarm clock alerts, press any key (except ) to stop it. Alternatively, press (Snooze) to snooze it for five minutes, after which the alarm alerts again.
- If nothing is done to the alarm clock when it alerts, it stops temporarily and alerts again five minutes later. It alerts for five times before it finally stops.

### **Disabling the Alarm Clock**

- 1. Select Menu > Tools > Alarms.
- 2. Press to select an enabled alarm clock.
- 3. Press (Off) to disable the alarm clock.
- Select Menu > Tools > Alarms > Cancel All to disable all alarm clocks.

# 8 Security

## Enabling/Disabling the Phone Lock

The phone lock protects your phone from unauthorized use. The phone lock function is not enabled when you purchase the phone. You can change the default phone lock code (the last four digits of your phone number) to any numeric string of 4 to 8 digits.

- 1. Select Menu > Settings > Security Settings > Phone Lock.
- 2. Select one of the following phone lock modes:
- · Immediately: Lock the phone immediately.
- Power On: Enable the phone lock when the phone is powered on next time.
- Off: Disable your phone lock.
- In the standby mode, press (Unlock), and input the phone lock code to unlock the phone; or press (SOS) to make an emergency call.

### Changing the Phone Lock Code

You can change the default or the current phone lock code into any numeric string of 4 to 8 digits. Do remember your phone lock code. If you forget it, contact the service center.

- 1. Select Menu > Settings > Security Settings > Change Phone Lock.
- 2. Enter the correct phone lock code and press **(OK**).
- 3. Enter a new phone lock code and press (OK).
- 4. Re-enter the new phone lock code and press (OK).

# 9 Recorder

# **Recording a Sound Clip**

- 1. In the standby mode, select Menu > Tools > Recorder.
- Press (•) to start recording.
- Press (Back) to stop recording, with displaying a prompt to confirm.
- Press (Yes) to save the sound clip to Voice Folder.
   Press (No) to return to the previous menu.
  - When recording a sound clip, you can press 

     to stop recording, and the sound clip saves to Voice Folder automatically.
    - When recording a sound clip, make the microphone of your phone near the sound source for a better recording effect.

# Playing a Sound Clip

- 1. In the standby mode, select Menu > Tools > Recorder.
- 2. Press **•** to view the **Voice Folder**.
- 3. Press to select a sound clip. Then press (Options) for the following options:
- Play: Allows you to play the sound clip.
- Set As Incoming Call Tone: Allows you to set the sound clip as the ringtone.
- Delete: Allows you to delete the sound clip.

m

- · Rename: Allows you to rename the sound clip.
- File Info: Allows you to view the format, size, date and time of the sound clip.
- Delete All: Allows you to delete all sound clips.
- You can also access the Voice Folder by Gallery > Voice Folder.

### Using the TTY Device

The Teletypewriter (TTY) is a typewriting device. By connecting the phone with the TTY device, you can use the TTY functions to send/receive messages.

When you use the TTY function:

- Connect the TTY device to the headset jack of the phone and set the phone to the TTY mode.
- 2. Make or answers calls as normal procedure.
- When the call is put through, use the TTY device to send or receive the letters.
- 4. Press or (End) to end the call.

### Setting the TTY Mode

When you set your phone to the TTY mode, the phone always works in this mode before you disable it.

- 1. In the standby mode, select Menu > Settings > Phone Settings > TTY Setup.
- 2. Press O to select the TTY mode and then press (Select) or • to confirm.
- · Voice: Standard voice speaking and listening mode.
- TTY: Transmit and receive TTY characters.
- VCO: Receive TTY characters but transmit by speaking into the microphone.
- HCO: Transmit TTY characters but receive by listening to the earpiece.

	• Delivery Report: Allows you to receive a message delivery report from the short message service center (SMSC).

# 12 Warnings and Precautions

### Electronic Device

- Power off your phone near high-precision electronic devices. The phone may affect the performance of these devices.
- Such devices include hearing aids, pacemakers, fire alarm systems, automatic gates, and other automatic-control devices. If you are using an electronic medical device, consult the device manufacturer to confirm whether the radio wave affects the operation of this device.
- Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 cm be maintained between a mobile phone and a pace-maker to avoid potential interference with the pace-maker. To achieve this, use the phone on the opposite ear to your pacemaker and do not carry it in a breast pocket.

### Hospital

Pay attention to the following points in hospitals or health care facilities:

- Do not take your phone into the operating room (OR), intensive care unit (ICU), or coronary care unit (CCU).
- Do not use your phone at places for medical treatment where phone use is prohibited.
- When using your phone near someone who is suffering from a heart disease, turn down the ring tone volume or vibration properly so that it does not affect the person.

### Area with Inflammables and Explosives

In any area with inflammables and explosives, power off your phone and do not take out, install or charge the battery, to avoid explosion and fire. Areas with inflammables and explosives include, but are not limited to:

Gas station

- · Area for storing fuels (such as the bunk under the deck of a ship)
- Device/Vehicle for transporting and storing fuels or chemical products
- Area with chemical substances and particles (such as: granule, dust, metal powder) in the air
- · Area with the sign of "Explosives"
- · Area with the sign of "Power off bi-direction wireless equipment"
- Area where it is generally suggested to stop the engine or a vehicle

### Traffic Safety

- Please observe local laws and regulations on phone use. Do not use your phone while driving to avoid traffic accident.
- Secure the phone on its holder. Do not place the phone on the seat or other places where it can get loose in a sudden stop or collision.
- · Use the phone after the vehicle stops at a safe place.
- If your phone supports the hands-free function, or the phone can be used with earphones, or there is any vehicle-mounted equipment with hands-free function, use them in emergency.
- Do not place the phone over the air bag or in the air bag outspread area. Otherwise, the phone may hurt you owing to the strong force when the air bag inflates.
- Observe the rules and regulations of airline companies. When boarding or approaching a plane, power off the phone and take out the battery. In areas where phone use is prohibited, power off the phone. Otherwise, the radio signal of the phone may disturb the plane control signals. Power off your phone before boarding an aircraft.

### Storage Environment

- Do not place magnetic storage media such as magnetic cards and floppy disks near the phone. Radiation from the phone may erase the information stored on them.
- Do not put your phone, battery, or other accessories in containers with strong magnetic field, such as an induction cooker and a microwave oven. Otherwise, circuit failure, fire, or explosion may occur.
- Do not leave your phone, battery, or charger in a very hot or cold place. Otherwise, malfunction of the products, fire, or explosion may occur.
- Keep the ambient temperature between 0°C and 45°C while the battery is being charged. Keep the ambient temperature between -20°C and 60°C for storing the battery. If the ambient temperature is too low (especially below 0°C) or too high, the capacity and life of the battery will be reduced.
- Do not place sharp metal objects such as pins near the earpiece. The earpiece may attract these objects and hurt you when you are using the phone.
- Do not subject your phone, battery, and charger to serious collision or shock. Otherwise, battery leakage, phone malfunction, overheat, fire, or explosion may occur.
- Do not put your phone in the back pocket of your trousers or skirt, to avoid phone damage while seated.

### Children Safety

- Put your phone, battery, and charger in places beyond the reach of children. Do not allow children to use the phone, battery, or charger without guidance.

- Operating Environment
- The phone, battery, and charger are not water-resistant. Keep them dry. Protect the phone, battery and charge from water or vapor. Do not touch the phone with a wet hand. Otherwise, short-circuit and malfunction of the product or electric shock may occur.
- Do not use the phone in dusty, damp and dirty places or places with magnetic field. Otherwise, malfunction of the circuit may occur.
- Do not power on or off the phone when it is near your ears to avoid negative impact on your health.
- When carrying or using the phone, keep the antenna at least one inch (2.5 cm) away from your body, to avoid negative impact on your health caused by radio frequency leakage.
- If you feel uncomfortable (such as falling sick or qualm) after playing games on your phone for a long time, please go to see a doctor immediately.
- On a thunder stormy day, do not use your phone outdoors or when it is being charged.
- Do not touch the antenna when a call is going on. Touching the antenna may affect call quality and cause the phone to operate with more power. As a result, the talk time and standby time are shortened.
- The phone may interfere with nearby TV sets, radios and PCs.
- In accordance with international standards for radio frequency and radiation, use phone accessories approved by the manufacturer only.
- While using the mobile phone, observe the local laws and regulations, and respect others' privacy and legal rights.

### Clearing and Maintenance

- Before you clean or maintain the phone, power off the phone and disconnect it from the charger. Otherwise, electric shock or short-circuit of the battery or charger may occur.
- Do not use any chemical detergent, powder, or other chemical agent (such as alcohol and benzene) to clean the phone and the charge. Otherwise, part damage or a fire can be caused. You can clean the phone and the charger with a piece of soft antistatic cloth that is a little wet.
- Do not scratch the shell of the phone. Otherwise, the shed coating may cause skin allergy. Once it happens, stop using the phone at once and go to see a doctor.
- · Keep the plug dry when you clean it, to prevent fire.
- If the phone or any of its fittings does not work, turn to the local authorize service center for help.
- Do not dismantle the mobile phone or accessories. Only an authorized service center is allowed to maintain the mobile phone.
