#### Road safety comes first

While driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. A wireless phone can be an invaluable tool, but good judgment must be exercised at all times. Check the local laws and regulations on the use of wireless phones in vehicles. Always obey them, and exercise caution while driving.

The following guidelines are based on recommendations of the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association (CTIA):

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial (page 18).
- Use a hands-free device. You can purchase these online at www.kyocera-wireless.com/store.
- 3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach.
- Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic. If possible, place calls when you are not driving.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting.
- 3. Use your wireless phone to call for help.
- Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies.
- Call roadside assistance or a special nonemergency wireless assistance number when necessary.

#### Air bags

If you have an air bag, DO NOT place installed or portable phone equipment or other objects over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If equipment is not properly installed, you and your passengers risk serious injury.

#### Potentially unsafe areas

Posted facilities—Turn your phone off in any facility when posted notices require you to do so.

Aircraft—FCC regulations prohibit using your phone on a plane that is in the air. Turn your phone off before boarding aircraft.

If the phone gets wet, turn the power off immediately and return it to the dealer for service.

#### Resetting the phone

If the screen seems frozen and the keypad does not respond to keypresses, return it to the dealer for service.

#### Radio Frequency (RF) energy

Your telephone is a radio transmitter and receiver. When it is on, it receives and sends out RF energy, Your service provider's network controls the power of the RF signal. This power level can range from 0.006 to 0.6 watts.



### **Basic functions**

This document describes how to use the basic functions of the QCP 3035 trimode phone, with CDMA digital service at 800 and 1900 MHz, and analog service at 800 MHz.

# To turn on the phone

Press . If and the home screen appear when the phone is turned on and is ready to make or receive a call.

# To turn off the phone

 Hold down until "Powering off" appears (about three seconds).

## To find your phone number

From the home screen, select Menu
 → Phone Info. Your phone number will appear.

#### To make a call

- 1. Extend the antenna.
- 2. Enter the phone number.
- 3. Press

# To turn on the speakerphone

- To turn off the speakerphone

   Press to turn of the speakerphone
- A message appears: "Speakerphone turned off." (Verify with Scott Beith)

# 2 Battery

Your phone comes with an external lithium ion (LiIon) battery. The battery is partially charged when you receive the phone.

Before using your phone, fully charge the battery. Connect the travel adapter to the proper jack on the bottom of the phone as shown below, their connect the adapter's plug to a wall outlet.



Note—You must have at least a partial charge in the battery to make or receive calls, regardless of whether or not the travel charger is connected to the phone. The battery icon is animated as the battery is charging. The battery is fully charged when the battery icon

looks like (777). You can safely recharge the battery at any time, even if it has a partial charge.

# Power-save mode

Your phone switches to power-save mode after several unsuccessful attempts to locate a signal. When the phone is in power save mode, you cannot make or receive calls. "Power Save Mode" and appear on the screen. Press any key to exit.

# **Battery guidelines**

Follow these guidelines to improve battery performance.

- Do not disassemble, puncture, or short-circuit the battery.
- Keep the metal contacts of the battery clean.

 If you have not used a battery for more than a month, recharge it before using your phone.

Avoid extreme temperatures, direct sunlight, and high humidity.

 Never dispose of any battery in or near a fire. It could explode.



# 3 Contacts

Use your phone's Contacts directory like a set of phone index cards to store information about a person or company. Before using the Contacts directory, see "To enter letters, numbers and symbols" on page 20.

The Contacts Directory stores a minimum of 100 cards. On achicard you can store a name and a phone number, as well as street addresses, email addresses. IRLs and notes about the person or company. You can also set up a speed dial humber, designate each card as personal or business to help you find numbers by type, and set up phone numbers and cards as secret so you can only access them with a security code.

# Working with contact cards To save a phone number

- 1. From the home screen, enter the phone number you want to save.
- 2. Press in to Save New
  Note: To add to an existing contact,
  select Add to... after you enter the
  number. Select the contact you want to
  add to, then proceed to step 4.
- Enter a name for the contact. If you need to know how to use the keypad to enter letters, see page 20.
- 4. Press in to Save.
  - Press oright then press on in to select Options. Press up or down to select an option from the list:
  - Save—Save information and return to the home screen.

- Number Type— Select work, home, mobile, pager, or fax.
- Voice Dialing—Select Yes to activate, or No to cancel. If you select Yes, see "Voice tags" on page 44.
- **Speed Dialing**—Select a speed dial location from the list.
- Secret—Select Yes to lockabe phone number. If a phone number is locked, you must enter your four-digit lock code to view, edit or call the number. Select No to leave the number unchanged.
- **Primary Number** Classify this number as the primary number for the contact.
- Classify Contact—Classify the contact as business or personal.
- 5. If finished, press in to select Save. A message appears: "Contact Successfully Saved!"

If you want to continue entering information, select another option.

Note—You may also save a phone number through the Contacts directory as follows:

- 1. From the home screen, select Menu

  Contacts → Add New.
- 2. Select Phone Number.
- 3. Enter the phone number up to as many digits as will fit on the screen.
- 4. Select Next.
- 5. Proceed to step 3 in "To save a phone number" on page 15.

#### To edit a contact card

- From the home screen, select Menu
   → Contacts.
- Find the contact you want to edit by selecting either View All or Find Name.

- Select Options to edit the entire contact card, or select the specific information (such as the phone number) you want to edit.
- 5. Enter the new information
- 6. If finished, press in twice to select Save.

# To erase information from a contact card

- 1. From the home screen, select Menu

  → Contacts → View All.
- 2. Press ( ) in to select a card.
- 3. Select **Options** to edit the entire contact card, or select the specific information (such as the phone number) you want to edit.
- 4. To erase the entire contact card, select Erase Contact. To erase specific information, select Erase.
- 5. If finished, press in to select Exit.

# To search the Contacts directory

The Contacts directory lists entries alphabetically. To search, you can look through a list of all contacts, speed dial entries, or cards of a specific type, or you can enter the name you are searching for.

- 1. From the home screen, select Menu Contacts.
- 2. Press down to select a search method:
  - To look through a list of names, select View All, Speed Dial List, Business List, or Personal List.

- To search for a specific name, enter all or part of the name and select Find Name. A list of matching names appears.
- 3. Press odown until you find the name you want.

- To call the contact, select the number and press .
- To display the full contact card, press in.

# To call from the Contacts directory or Recent Calls list

- From the home screen, select Menu
   → Contacts → View All.
- 2. Select a name from the list
- 3. Select the number and press ?

# Speed Dialing and 1-Touch Dialing

Speed Dialing and 1-Touch Dialing allow you to quickly dial a stored phone number by entering the memory location and pressing .

# To set a speed dial location

- 1. Open a saved contact card.
- 2. Select the phone number to assign a speed dial location.
- 3. Select Speed Dialing.

- 4. Select a speed dial location.
- 5. Press in to Assign.

  Note—The speed dial location "1" is reserved for your voicemail.

## To remove a speed dial location

- From the home screen, select Menu
   — Contacts → Speed Dial List.
- 2. Press in to select the speed dial location.
- 3. Press in to select the number to remove.
- 4. Select Speed Dialing.
- 5. Choose the speed dial location and press ( ) right to select Remove.
- 6. Press ir

# To speed dial

 From the home screen, enter the one- or two-digit speed dial number and press

### To call your voice mail number

 From the home screen after receiving a notification, press and hold your voicemail speed dial number. ( is the default.)

# To enable 1-Touch Dialing

- Select Menu → Settings → Extras →
   Touch Dialing → Enabled.
- 2. Press ( ) in.

# To use 1-Touch Dialing

 Enter the one or two-digit speed dial number and hold down the last number. For example, if the speed dial number is 15, press 1, then press and hold 5.

## To redial the last number called

Press twice.

# To change your voicemail speed dial number

Select Menu → Settings →
 Messaging → Voicemail Number →
 Edit.

# Working with the Recent Calls

The Recent Calls list shows the last 15 calls made. Calls are identified by type. (Some types may not be available on all phones. Check with your service provider.)

#### To view the Recent Calls list

Note—If the number has been saved as "secret," you will need to enter your four-digit lock code to view, edit, or call the number. For more information about making a phone number secret, see page 16.

#### To dial from the Recent Calls list

- 1. From the home screen, select Menu
  - → Recent Calls
- 2. Select the call entry in the list or display the call detail.
- 3. Press. 🕥 .

# To enter letters, numbers and symbols

You can enter letters, numbers, and symbols in a contact card. The default text entry mode is  ${}^{\mathbf{a}}{}^{\mathbf{c}}$ .

- To enter spaces between words, press .
- To move the cursor, press
- To erase characters, press 🕳 .

# To change cases

- Press once to capitalize the next letter. A papears.
- Press twice to capitalize every letter. A papears. Press pagain to return to normal text entry mode.

Press three times to capitalize the first letter of each sentence. A appears. Press again to return to normal text entry mode.

# <sup>abC</sup> To change text entry modes

- 1. From a text entry screen, press in to highlight the options at the bottom of the screen.
- 2. Press oright to find the active text entry mode. Press
- 3. Select the text entry mode you want from the list.

# To use normal text entry

Normal text entry allows you to enter text using one keypress per letter.

- Press the key once for the first letter, twice for the second letter, and so on.
- After you have cycled through the letters, you may enter the number shown on the key. For example, if you press twice, the letter b appears. If you press it four times,

the number 2 appears. Two seconds after you choose a character or number, the cursor moves one space to the right.

# 79) To use rapid text entry

Tegic T9 rapid text entry mode allows you to enter text quickly. For example, to enter the word "how," press keys 4-6-9. The software will suggest words as you type.

- Wait until you have typed the entire word before checking the screen to see if the word shown is correct.
- Press to cycle through words.
- Once you see the correct word, press right to move the cursor and continue entering text.

- 6. Press of down through the list.

  Each character is matched to a number key. Press the number key corresponding to the symbol you want to use. For example, to enter a period, press .

## To select a language

- From the home screen, select Menu
   → Settings → Display → Language.
- 2. Select the language from the list and press ( ) in.
- 3. Press the appropriate keys to enter special characters.

#### To enter pauses

You can include a pause in a phone number. A timed pause causes the phone to stop dialing for two seconds. A hard pause causes the phone to stop dialing until you select Release. When you save the phone number of an automated service, such as voicemail, you may include a pause where you would be required to select an option or enter a password. For example, you could enter a phone number, then a pause, then a voicemail extension or calling card number.

- 1. Enter the first portion of the phone number.
- 2. Press oright through the list of options at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. Press in to select a type of pause.
  - A will appear in the phone number for a timed pause.
  - A will appear in the phone number for a hard pause.

# Silence All

You may silence all phone sounds, including the ringer and all alerts, while leaving the phone on. You can replace the sounds by setting the phone to vibrate or light up and flash.

- Select Menu →Settings → Silence All.
- Highlight and select one of the options. (Normal returns the alert to the ringer.) indicates the phone is in Silence All mode. The flashing indicates the Lights Only option is set.
- 3. Press in to save your selection.

# Keyguard

The Keyguard locks your keypad to protect your phone against accidental keypresses when the phone is turned on and a call is not in progress. Keyguard does not prevent you from answering or silencing an incoming call.

# To turn keyguard on

- 1. Select Menu → Setting → Keyguard.
- 2. Highlight one of the ocking options and press in to save:
  - Guard Now locks the keypad immediately.
  - 15s auto-guard locks the keypad if no keys are pressed for 15 seconds.
  - 30s auto-guard locks the keypad if no keys are pressed for 30 seconds.

- 1m auto-guard locks the keypad if no key is pressed for one minute.
- Auto-guard off unlocks the keypad and restores it to normal.

Shortcut—To turn the keyguard on quickly from home screen, press up and hold for several seconds.

# Security

You must enter your four-digit lock code (typically 0000 or the last 4 digits of the phone number) to set any of the options on the Security menu.

# To lock and unlock the phone

When you lock your phone, you can only call a number set up as an emergency number, a service provider number, or a priority number. You can still receive incoming calls.

# To lock the phone

- 1. Select Menu → Settings → Security

  → Lock Phone Use.
  - 2. Select an option:
    - Never- Do not lock the phone.
    - On power up- Lock the phone every time you turn it on.
    - Now- Lock the phone immediately.

### To limit calls out

■ Select Menu → Settings → Security → Limit Calls Out. Select No for unlimited calls, or select Yes, to Contacts to allow calls to contacts only.

# To change your lock code

- 1. Select Menu → Settings → Security
  → Change Lock Code.
- 2. A message appears: "Change Lock Code?"
  - Select Yes and effer a new code, then press in. Enter your new lock dide again to verify it.
  - Select Exit to leave your lock code unchanged.

#### To erase all contacts

- Select Menu → Settings → Security
- → Erase All Contacts.

  Select No to leave contacts unchanged.

Select Yes to erase all contacts. A message appears: "Erase ALL contacts?" Select No to cancel or Yes to erase all contacts.

# To erase recent calls

- Select Menu Settings → Security

  Erase Recent Call.
  - Select No to leave the Recent Calls list unchanged
  - Select Yes to erase all recent calls. A message appears: "Erase ALL recent calls list entries?" Select No to cancel or Yes to erase all recent calls.

## To reset the phone

- 1. Select Menu → Settings → Security
  - → Phone Reset.
  - Select No to cancel.
  - Select Yes to reset the phone. A message appears: "Reset ALL phone settings?" Select No to cancel or Yes to reset phone.

Note—Your four-digit lock code, Recent Calls timer, Contacts directory, InBox and OutBox contents, memos, and service programming are **not** reset when you reset your phone.

#### **Call Information**

This setting allows you to view information about calls and alerts.

# **Recent Calls Timer**

This timer displays the total number and duration of recent calls you have made and received. Press in to select Reset. This resets the timer to zero.

#### **All Calls Timer**

This timer displays the total number and duration of all calls you have made and received. You cannot reset this timer.

#### **Browser Timer**

This timer displays the total number and duration of data calls you have

made. Press **Reset** to reset the timer to zero.

#### Network

Use this setting to view or change options such as roaming and privacy alerts. Some settings may not be available on all phones.

# To select digital or analog mode

- \*1. Select Menu → Settings → Network → Digital or Analog.
- 2. Press in to select an option:
  - Automatic automatically switches the phone between digital and analog.
  - Analog only sets the phone to work in analog mode only.
  - Analog call forces a call into analog mode for the duration of the next call.
  - **Digital only** sets the phone to work in digital mode only.

## **Roam Option**

This setting determines which signals your phone will accept.

   → Roam Option.

# Roam/Service Alert

  - Disabled will not alert you if you roam outside your home service area.

- When no service alerts you with three tones, decreasing in intensity, when service is lost. When service is acquired again, you will hear three tones in increasing intensity.
- On roam change alerts you with two tones, decreasing in intensity, when roaming service is acquired. When home area service is acquired again, you hear three tones, increasing in intensity.
- On any change alerts you with three increasing tones if there is a change in roaming service or three decreasing tones if the phone loses service.

# **Privacy Alert**

- 1. Select Menu → Settings → Network → Privacy Alert.
- 2. Press ( ) in to select an option:

- Disabled does not play any alerts.
- Enabled plays an audible alert whenever enhanced privacy is lost or regained and a call is in progress.

Note—An alert message always appears on the screen regardless of these settings.

#### Set Phone Line

This allows you to change what number is displayed on your phone if you have more than one phone number (check with your service provider to see if your phone supports more than one phone number.) For example, you may want to set the phone to use one number when you are at home and one number when you are traveling.

#### Data/Fax Calls in

These settings tell the phone how to handle voice and data calls.

- Select Menu → Settings → Network
   → Data/Fax Calls In.
- 2. Press in to select an option:
  - Voice Only allows only voice calls.
  - Fax, next call sets the phone to fax mode for the next incoming call or the next ten minutes.

  - Fax, until off forces the phone into fax mode until the phone is turned off.
  - Data, until off forces the phone into data mode until the phone is turned off.

# 112 Scheduler

The Scheduler allows you to sehedule events, such as meetings of appointments. You can then view these events, and use the alarm to alert you of upcoming events.

- 1. Select Menu → Tools → Scheduler.
- 2. Select Add Event and enter the event's name using the keypad.
- 3. Select Next to set the time and date of the event.
  - Press up or down to select an hour and minutes.

- Press left or right to switch between hours, minutes, and a.m./p.m.
- 4. Select Next to set the alarm.
- 5. You can add a note to the event, or select Next to finish.

Once events are entered into the Scheduler, you may edit or erase them as desired.

# Alarm Clock

Use the Alarm Clock to set an alert for a specific time. The alert occurs only if the phone is on.

- Select Menu → Tools → Alarm Clock → Set.
  - Press up or down to select an hour and minutes.
  - Press left or right to switch between hours, minutes, and a.m./p.m.

- Press in to save.
   When the alarm rings, select Snooze to silence the alarm for 15 minutes, or select Off to turn off the alarm.

## Tip Calculator

- 1. Select Menu → Tools → Tip Calculator.
- 2. Enter the amount of your bill and press () in.
- 3. Select the amount you want to include as a tip (15%, 18%, 20% 10%, 5%, 0%, Other) and press in.
  4. Your total bill, including tip, is
- calculated and displayed.

# Calculator

Use the calculator for basic mathematical equations.

- 1. Select Menu → Tools → Calculator.
- 2. Use the keypad to enter numbers.

- 3. Press in to select mathematical operations.
  - Performs the "equals" function.
  - inserts the division character after the last
  - inserts the subtraction character after the ast number entered.
- Inserts the addition character after the last number entered.
- Inserts the multiplication character after the last number entered.
- Inserts the decimal point after the last number entered.
- Clears all numbers entered and displays a zero.
- MR Displays the value currently stored in memory.
- Adds the displayed digit to the value stored in memory.
- MC Clears the value currently stored in memory.
- Changes the sign of the displayed number.

Clears one function or one digit from the screen and returns the calculator to digit entry mode. Hold down to clear all of the digits and operations and display a zero.

Exits the calculator and returns to the home

# Countdown

This timer counts down for a specified amount of time. It beeps, using the volume set for alerts, when that amount of time has elapsed.

- Select Menu → Tools → Countdown Timer. \_\_\_\_
- 2. Press in to Set.
- 3. Press up or down to set the hours, minutes, and seconds. To move the cursor, press left or right.
- 4. Select Start to begin the countdown. Select Stop to pause the countdown.
- **5.** When the alarm rings, press **()** to silence it.

# **(b)** Stopwatch

- 1. Select Menu → Tools → Stopwatch.
- 2. Select Start to have the stopwatch begin counting.
- 3. Select Stop to quit counting.
- 4. Select Reset to set the counter back to zero and have the stopwatch begin counting again.
- 5. Press when finished.

# Text Memos

Text Memos allows you to create and retrieve short text messages.

- Select Menu → Tools → Text Memos.
- 2. Select Add New to create a message.
- 3. Enter text as described on page 20, "To enter letters, numbers, and punctuation marks."
- 4. Select OK to enter a Title.
- 5. Select OK again when finished.

Note- If you do not enter a title, the first line of your text message is used as the default title.

Once you have entered messages in Text Memos, you may edit or erase them as desired.

- 1. Select Menu → Tools → Text Memos.
- 2. Highlight the appropriate message and press in to select it.

  3. Edit or erase the message as desired.
- Brick Attack
- 1. Select Menu Tools → Brick Attack.
- 2. To start the game, press in.
- 3. To pause the game, press , then press in to Resume.

The goal of this game is to eliminate bricks arranged in levels. To do this, you send a moving ball upward using a paddle at the bottom of the screen. To

move the paddle, press ( ) left or right. If an incoming call alert is received, the game is paused and exited. You can return to play once the incoming call alert is ended. The game cannot be paused while the phone is off.

## 6 Web Browser

You can use your phone to browse the Internet if you have obtained phone Internet services from your service provider and if over-the-air Internet access is available in your area.

### Using the Web browser

To learn how to enter text in the Web Browser, see "To enter letters, numbers and symbols" on page 20.

**Note**—You cannot receive incoming calls while you are in the browser and a data call is in progress.

#### To start the browser

Select Menu → Web Browser.

#### To exit the browser

• Press 🍘 .

# **Browser options**

The following options may appear on your screen:

- Home returns you to the main browser window, or home page.
- Mark Site saves the current location as a bookmark for easy access.
- Bookmarks displays a list of your saved web sites.
- Go to New URL allows you to enter a new URL and go to that location immediately. This option may not be available on all phones.
- Setup
- Show URL displays the entire URL.
- Phone.com displays information about your browser version.
- Encryption should not be used unless you are instructed to do so by your service provider.
- Set UP.Link allows you to choose from a list of links. You may use this option if you have more than

one browser account, such as one for business and one for personal use.

- Restart restarts the browser.

#### **Net Alerts**

If your service provider activated Internet services on your phone and you are in an area that provides overthe-air Internet access, you may receive Net Alerts. These short messages allow you to quickly access information on the Internet.



## 7 Voice Features

The Voice features of your QCP 3035 phone allow you to originate calls. To use these functions, you must first train the Voice Recognition (VR) feature.

The following options are available to create and edit your memos:



# **Voice Training**

During Voice Training, you speak a series of commands and the VR "learns" your voice.

You may use the phone's microphone or any accessory microphone. Perform Voice Training in a quiet environment, and speak naturally into the microphone.

If you do not respond to a prompt within 4 seconds, the VR repeats the tone. If you do not respond again, it goes into sleep.

If the voice commands you repeat during training do not match, VR will ask you to repeat the command. Do not speak a command until the prompt is complete. If you speak too soon, you will hear three tones. Repeating this mistake will shut down Voice Training.

- 1. Select Menu → Settings → Extras → Voice Training.
- 2. Select the option you wish to use, and press ( ) in to select it.

- Say the command you hear clearly into the microphone and listen for a tone. Say the command again until you hear two tones.
- 4. Repeat these steps for all commands until Voice Training is completed.

  To end Voice Training at any time, press in. If you do not train the VR teature, the "Yes" and "No" commands can be activated by anyone. You must train the "Wake Up" command.

## Voice tags

You can use the VR to initiate a call to one of your entries in the Contacts directory.

- 1. Insert the number you wish to add a voice tag to, or press in to select an existing contact number.
- 2. Under Options, select Voice Dialing → Yes.
- 3. Follow the voice instructions and wait for a tone. Repeat the name as

instructed. If a word match is completed, you will hear "(Name) added." If a match is not made, you will be instructed to try again.

To view which entries have name tags, select Menu → Contacts → Voice Dial List.

### To activate VR

Once VR training is complete, you can activate the system in one of two ways:

- From the home screen, press 🕥 .
- If you are using your phone with a hands-free car kit or a headset, say "Wake Up" and listen for a tone. Say "Wake Up" again until you hear two tones.

### To make a call

- 1. From the home screen, press 🕥 .
- 2. The VR responds "Name please".
- **3.** Say the name of the person you wish to call.

4. The VR responds "Calling [Name]".

Remain silent to make the call, or
say "No" to cancel the call.

If there are multiple matches to the
name that you requested, the VR will
ask you to verify which name you want
to call. Reply "Yes" or "No" until you
hear the desired name.

#### To receive a call

To use VR to receive incoming calls, the vibrate feature of your phone must be off. See page 27 on how to disable the vibrate feature. If you use a headset with your phone, the Out of Headset setting under Accessories must be enabled. The phone automatically answers after two rings.

The VR alerts you in two ways: "Incoming call, answer?"

-or-

Incoming roam call, answer?"

#### To answer a call

Say "Yes" or press any key except

#### To ignore a call

You may ignore an incoming call in two

- Say "No" or press .

  The voice alert is silenced.
- Remain silent.

The voice alert repeats twice and the phone rings twice, then returns to the home screen.

#### To end a call

To end a call, press ( ). You cannot use voice recognition to end a call.

#### **Voice Memo**

The Voice Memo tool provides you with one minute of voice recording time. You can record and name multiple memos. You can also record

and play back memos during a voice call.

#### To record a memo

- Select Menu → Tools → Voice Memo.
- 2. Press in to select Record New. The screen will show the duration of the current memo, as well as how much time is available.

Select II to pause or to stop recording at any time.

## To name a memo

Once you finish recording a memo, you may give your memo a name.

- 1. Press in to select Name.
- 2. You may enter up to 12 characters for your memo.
- **3.** Press in to select **Done** when finished.


- The phone's Electronic Serial Number (ESN). To find the ESN, remove the battery as follows:
  - 1. Hold the phone in your hand with the home screen facing away from you.
  - **2.** Place your finger on the upper ridge of the battery door.
  - 3. Push down with your finger and pull the battery door toward you until it dislodges from the phone.
  - 4. The ESN is visible after the battery is removed. It is on the sticker on the inside of the phone, and should start with "179-" or "B3-."

To replace the battery:

- 1. Realign the battery door to the groove on the bottom of the phone.
- 2. Rotate the battery towards the top of the phone.

**3.** Push the battery in until it clicks closed.





# Glossary

AC adapter	A cable that connects the phone to a wall outlet and charges the phone battery.
analog mode	A state in which a phone communicates at 800 MHz and sends voices and key beeps as analog sounds.
CDMA	Code Division Multiple Access, a technology that digitally encodes the sound of voices and key beeps to ensure callers' privacy.
call forwarding	A programmable phone option that sends incoming calls to another phone number.
call waiting	A service-provider feature which causes your phone to beep if another call comes in while you are on the phone.
contacts directory	A feature of your phone that works like a set of phone index cards, allowing you to save phone numbers and other information.
digital mode	A state in which a phone communicates at 1900 MHz and sends voices and key beeps as digitally encoded signals instead of analog sounds. See CDMA.
domain name	The address of a network connection, often in the format server.business.com
dual band	Able to operate in two frequency ranges, the 800 MHz band and the 1900 MHz band.
User's Guide for the	OCP 3035 Phone 51

dual-mode Able to operate in either CDMA digital service or analog

cellular service at 800 MHz, and able to switch between digital

mode and analog mode.

enter To save information in the phone's memory. Press keys to enter

information.

home screen The screen that appears when the phone is first turned on.

keyguard A feature which can be turned on to protect the phone from

accidental keypresses when a call is not in progress.

lock code A four-digit sequence (usually 0000 or the last four digits of

your phone number) that lets you restrict access to certain

phone numbers or all phone numbers.

menu A list of choices on the phone screen.

menu item A choice within a menu on the phone screen.

power-save A low energy consumption state indicated by the message mode "Power Save Mode." Press any key to exit.

when the phone number is available.

roaming Using telephone services outside of the area covered by

your home service provider. When you are roaming, the cost of

phone calls and level of service may vary.

service area An area in which a service provider's terms of use apply

uniformly.

service provider A company which provides certain phone services, such as

basic phone service, long distance, call waiting, and three-way calling. Phones may have the ability to perform these functions, but they cannot do so unless the service provider makes them

available.

signal strength The degree of radio frequency energy available to the

phone. Both weather and distance affect signal strength. If signal strength is weak, call quality may decrease or the call may be disconnected.

may be disconnected.

Silence All mode A state in which all phone sounds are silenced, including the

ringer and alerts. You can set the phone to vibrate or light up.

Smart Sound A feature which allows the phone to automatically adjust the

earpiece volume based on the amount of noise around you or the voice volume of the person to whom you are speaking.

talk time The amount of time that you can talk on a wireless phone when

the battery is fully charged.

three-way calling A service-provider feature which allows phone calls between

three people instead of two.

trimode Able to operate in CDMA digital service at 800 and 1900 MHz,

and analog cellular service at 800 MHz.

URL Uniform Resource Locator, the address of an Internet location.

A URL typically takes the form http://www.locationname.com

web browser A tool which allows you to browse the Internet.
