AN ILL WIND FOR NEW YORK


On August 24th a raging wind attacked SDA New York and sent the New York Mets into a tailspin.

INNING SEVEN (THE FINAL INNING)



EASY MEALS FOR BUSY PEOPLE

Prepare-in-advance Poached Seafood Dishes

Stuffed Fillet of Sole in Lemon Butter

1# small sole fillets 3 tbsp. butter
1/2# small shrimp Juice of 1 lemon
Salt, if desired

Shell, devein and wash shrimp; let drain in colander. Wash fillets and let drain on paper towels. Place the butter and lemon juice in medium-sized frying pan (not cast iron or aluminum) with cover. Place some shrimp in the middle of each fillet, roll up, and place in the frying pan, open side down. Sprinkle with salt, if desired. Cover and refrigerate until just before dinner time. Place on stove and cook for a few minutes until fish becomes flaky. Transfer to serving dish and pour the juices over the fish. Good served with parsley potatoes and a green vegetable or salad.

Stuffed Fillet of Sole in Sherry/Parsley Sauce

Follow the above recipe, but substitute 1 bunch washed, drained and chopped parsley and 1/3 c. dry sherry for the 1emon juice.


WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE

The consultant leaps from the safari train whenever a needful beast has been sighted and, using a vast store of wildlife expertise, tames the lurking




creature, even if it's covered with a dense growth of unfamiliar software.


The consultant zooms over tropical forests of spaghetti logic, marking the spots to come in for the kill, and then, footweary but triumphant, comes in to make the kill.






The consultant dives into reeking and murky lagoons infested by weird and often hostile software, and is able to swim, even if the software turns out to be clumsy relics from prehistoric times.





Yet, for all that, he is absolutely certain that tomorrow will be better and there is nothing he would rather do, anybody he would rather be--than a salesman.




BUG BULLETIN
