- 2 When available, use a hands-free device. A number of hands-free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to
- 3 Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can grab it without removing your eyes from

- the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- 4 Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
- 5 Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an address book or business card, or writing a "to do" list while driving a car, you are not watching where you are going. It's common sense. Don't get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.
- 6 Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped stop sign, red light or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip— all only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, an continue.
- 7 Do not engage in stressful or emotion conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or notional conversations and driving do not nix— ey are distrating and even dangerous when you are behing the where of a car. Make people you are this large with away are driving and if necessary, such and inversations which have the potential to diverting attention from the road.
- **8** Use your wireless phone to call help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools your can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations—with

- your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard or medical emergency. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- 9 Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a "Good Samaritan" in our comunity. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or cover serious emergency where lives are in onger, cooperations of the local emergency numbers of your ould want others to do for you.
- 10 Call roadside assistance as ial wireless nonemergency, ssistan number when necessary. Certain situations you counter unle driving may require at mion, are turgent enough to merit a call for inergency seices. Lut you still can use your wireless pane to lend hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle post no serius hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic sciriut where no one appears injured or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.
- Ca less, distracted individuals and people driving irr sponsibly represent a hazard to everyone on the road. Since 384, the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association and the wireless industry have conducted educational outreach to inform wireless phone users of their responsibilities as safe drivers and good citizens. As we approach a new century, more and more of us will take advantage of the benefits of wireless telephones. And, as we take to the roads, we all have a responsibility to drive safely. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radiofrequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some plological effects may occur, but such findings have not be an confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies in confirmed the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the sefety of wireles phones?

Under the law, FDA does not eview to safety of adiation-emitting consumer products such as wire. The sold, as it does with the wird with the wird of medical devices. However, the agency has a control to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio aquency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the

health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no long of exits.

Although the existing sc. affic a do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has ned the areless phone industry to take a number of a including the following:

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF). FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization Interna anal Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since it 1996. An influential result of this work have oeen the development of a detailed agenda of rese rch needs the has driven the establishment of new research, rograms around the world. The Project has also he led devel a series i public information documents (EMF issues.) 4 the Cellular Telecommunications & 'nterr' . Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Resea. and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, coming input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations.

CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduc my exp. The to radiofrequency energy from my wireless phone

If you just conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day you conduct place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or us a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna

Ar .in, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless ,nones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and

teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure. Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that handsfree kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the absorption of RF energy in the head because the ne, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not use placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phose is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more argy. Freless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet sale requirements regardless of whether hey are used gainst the head or against the body. Either concurration should result in compliance with the safety fait.

Do wireless phone accertifies the claim to smeld the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risk. On exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no ason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions

reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfer with proper operation of the phone. The phone may after to boost its power to compensate, leading to a licreating in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federating de Colonission (FTC) charged two companies that a device that claimed to protect wireless phone us as from adiation with making false and unsubstantiated the aim. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable losis it substantiate their claim.

H FCc 'udit Cell Phone RF?

After FCC , nts p, mission for a particular cellular telephone to be marke d. FCC will occasionally conduct "post-grant" ting to determine whether production versions of the phe ar Jeing produced to conform with FCC regulatory requirements. The manufacturer of a cell phone that does not meet FCC's regulatory requirements may be required to remove the cell phone from use and to refund the purchase price or provide a replacement phone, and may be subject to civil or criminal penalties. In addition, if the cell phone presents a risk of injury to the user, FDA may also take regulatory action. The most important post-grant test, from a consumer's perspective, is testing of the RF emissions of the phone. FCC measures the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of the phone, following a very rigorous testing protocol. As is true for nearly any scientific measurement, there is a possibility that the test measurement may be less than or greater than the actual RF emitted by the phone. This difference between the RF test measurement and actual RF emission is because test measurements are limited by

instrument accuracy, because test measurement and actual use environments are different, and other variable factors. This inherent variability is known as "measurement uncertainty." When FCC conducts post-grant testing of a cell phone, FCC takes into account any measurement uncertainty to determine whether regulatory action is appropriate. This approach ensures that when FCC takes regulatory action, it will have a sound, defensible scientific basis.

FDA scientific staff reviewed the methodology used by FCC to measure cell phone RF, and agreed it is an acceptable approach, given our current understanding of the risks presented by cellular phone RF emissions. RF emissions from cellular phones have not been shown to present a risk of injury to the user when the measured SAR is less than the safety limits set by FCC (an SAR of 1.6 w/kg). Even in a case where the maximum measurement uncertainty permitted by

current measurement standards was added to the maximum permissible SAR, the resulting SAR value would be well below any level known to produce an acute effect. Consequently, FCC's approach with measurement uncertainty will not result in consumers being exposed to any known risk from the RF emitted by cellular telephones.

FDA will continue to monitor "udies a "literature reports concerning acute effects of cell "one Rilling concerning chronic effects of long-term expose" to cellular telephone RF (that is, the risks from using a sell phone for many years).
