

Your phone has context-sensitive help. To access help when an application is open, select **Options** > *Help*. To switch between help and the application that is open in the background, select and hold \mathfrak{G} , and select from the list of open applications.

To open help from the main menu, select $\S > Tools > Help > Help$. Select an application to view a list of help topics, and select the related help text. To open a keyword list, select **Options** > Search.

Service settings

Before you can use multimedia messaging, instant messaging, push to talk, e-mail, synchronisation, streaming, and the browser, you must have the proper configuration settings on your phone. Your phone may automatically configure browser, multimedia messaging, access point, and streaming settings based on the SIM card used. Otherwise, you can

use *Sett. wizard* application to configure the settings, or you may receive the settings directly as a configuration message, which you save to your phone. For more information on availability, contact your service provider or nearest authorized Nokia dealer.

Insert a SIM card and battery

For availability and information on using SIM card services, contact your SIM card vendor. This may be the service provider or other vendor.

1. To open the back cover, press teh black button on the lower part of the back cover (1), slide the cover forward (2), and lift (3). To remove the battery, lift it as shown (4).

2. To release the SIM card holder, slide it backwards (4), and lift it (5). Insert the (U)SIM card in the SIM card holder (6). Make sure that the gold colored contact area on the card is facing downwards, and the beveled corner faces upwards.

Close the SIM card holder (7), and slide it forward to lock it (8).



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3. Replace the battery (9). Replace the back cover (10, 11).

■ MicroSD card slot

Use only compatible microSD cards approved by Nokia for use with this device. Nokia uses approved industry standards for memory cards, but some brands may not be fully compatible with this device. Incompatible cards may damage the card and the device and corrupt data stored on the card. Keep microSD cards out of the reach of small children.

You can extend the available memory with a microSD memory card. You can insert or remove a microSD card without switching the phone off.

Important: Do not remove the memory card in the middle of an operation when the card is being accessed. Removing the card in the middle of an operation may damage the memory card as well as the device, and data stored on the card may be corrupted.

Insert a microSD card

Note that the memory card may be supplied with the phone, and may already be inserted.

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Open the side door (1). Place the microSD card in the slot with the gold colored area facing down (2). Push the card gently to lock it into place. Close tight the side door (3).

Remove a microSD card

Open the side door. Push the card gently to release it. *Remove memory card and press 'OK'* is displayed. Pull the card out and select OK. Close tight the side door.

■ Charge the battery

1. Connect the charger to the wall socket.

 Open the side door (1), and connect the charger plug to the charger connector in the phone (2)

3. After charging, close tight the side door.

If the battery is completely discharged, it may take a few minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

The charging time depends on the charger and the battery used. Charging a BP-4L battery with the AC-5 charger takes approximately 80 minutes.

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■ Switch the phone on and off

Press and hold the power/call end key.

If the phone asks for a PIN code, enter the PIN code, and select **OK**.

If the phone asks for the lock code, enter the lock code, and select **OK**. The factory setting for the lock code is 12345.

Set time and date

To set the correct time zone, time, and date, select the country you are presently in, then enter the local date.

■ Welcome application

The *Welcome* application starts when you switch on your phone for the first time.

Transfer – Copy or synchronize data from other compatible devices. To open *Welcome* later, select – > *Help* > *Welcome*.

Access codes

Select > Settings > General > Security > Phone and SIM card to set how your phone uses the access codes.

Lock code

The lock code (5 digits) helps to lock your phone. The preset code is 12345. Change the code, and set the phone to request the code.

When the device is locked, calls may be possible to the official emergency number programmed into your device.

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PIN codes

The personal identification number (PIN) code or the universal personal identification number (UPIN) code (4 to 8 digits) help to protect your SIM card. The (U)PIN code is usually supplied with the SIM card. Set the phone to request the code each time the phone is switched on.

The PIN2 code may be supplied with the SIM card and is required for some functions.

The module PIN is required to access the information in the security module. The signing PIN is required for the digital signature. The module PIN and the signing PIN are supplied with the SIM card fithe SIM card has a security module in it.

PUK codes

The personal unblocking key (PUK) code or the universal personal unblocking key (UPUK) code (8 digits) are required to change a blocked PIN code and UPIN code, respectively. The PUK2 code is required to change a blocked PIN2 code.

If needed, contact your local service provider for the codes.


Call restriction password

The restriction password (4 digits) is required when using *Call* restriction. You can obtain the password from your service provider. If the password is blocked, contact your service provider.

Standby mode

When you have switched on the phone, and it is registered to a network, the phone is in the standby mode and ready for use.

To open the list of last dialed numbers, press the call key. To use the voice commands or voice dialing, press and hold the right selection key.

To change the profile, press the power key, and select a profile.

To start a connection to the web, press and hold 0.

Active standby

When active standby is enabled, you can use the display for fast access to frequently used applications. To select whether the active standby is shown, select > Settings > General > Personalisation > Standby mode > Active standby > On or Off.

In active standby the default applications are shown across the top of the active standby area, and calendar, to-do, and player events are listed below. To select an application or event, scroll to it, and select it.

Offline profile

To activate the *Offline* profile, press the power key, and select *Offline*. When the *Offline* profile is active, the connection to the wireless network is turned off. All wireless radio frequency signals to or from your phone are prevented, and you can use your phone without a (U)SIM card. Use the offline profile in radio sensitive environments—on board

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aircraft or in hospitals. You can listen to music using the music player when the offline profile is active.

To leave the Offline profile, press the power key, and select another profile.

Important: In the offline profile you cannot make or receive any calls, or use other features that require cellular network coverage. Calls may still be possible to the official emergency number programmed into your device. To make calls, you must first activate the phone function by changing profiles. If the device has been locked, enter the lockcode.

Menu

In the menu you can access the functions in your phone. To are main menu, press

To open an application or a folder, seroll to it, and press the scroll key.

To change the menu view, selected > **Options** > *Change Menu view* and a view type.

If you change the order of the functions in the menu, the order may differ from the default order described in this user guide.

To close an application or a folder, select **Back** and **Exit** as many times as needed to return to the standby mode, or select **Options** > *Exit*.

To display and switch between open applications, press and hold _____. Scroll to an application, and select it.

To mark or upmark an item in applications, press #. To mark or unmark several consecutive items, press and hold #, and scroll up or down.

Leaving applications running in the background increases the demand on battery power and reduces the battery life.

Volume control

To adjust the earpiece or loudspeaker volume during a call or when listening to an audio file, press the volume keys. To activate or deactivate the loudspeaker during a call, select **Loudspeaker** or **Handset**.

Warning: Do not hold the device near your ear when the loudspeaker is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

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Keypad lock (keyguard)

To lock the keypad in the phone mode, press the left selection key and * within 1.5 seconds. To set the phone to automatically lock the keypad after a certain time, select > *Settings* > *General* > *Security* > *Phone and SIM card* > *Keypad autolock period* > *User defined* and the desired time.

To unlock the keypad in the phone mode, select **Unlock**, and press * within 1.5 seconds.

To lock the keypad in the music mode, press the power key quickly, an select *Lock keypad*. To unlock the keypad in the music mode, select **Unlock** > OK.

When the keypad is locked, calls may be possible to the office number programmed into your device.

Normal operating position

Your device has internal antennas.

Cellular antenna (1) Bluetooth antenna

(2)

Use the phone only in its normal operating position (3).

Note: As with any radio transmitting device, avoid touching an antenna unnecessarily when the antenna is in use. For example, avoid touching the cellular antenna during a phone call. Contact with a transmitting or receiving antenna affects the quality of the radio communication, may cause the device to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed, and may reduce the battery life.

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Connect a compatible headset

Do not connect products that create an output signal as this may cause damage to the device. Do not connect any voltage source to the Nokia AV Connector.

When connecting any external device or any headset, other than those approved by Nokia for use with this device, to the Nokia AV Connector, pay special attention to volume levels.

■ Connect a USB data cable

To set the default USB connection mode, select > Settings > Connectivity > USB > USB mode and the desired mode. To set whether the default mode is activated automatically, select Ask on connection > No.

3. Call functions

To adjust the volume during the call, press the volume keys.

Make a voice call

. In the standby mode, enter the phone number, including the area code. Press the clear key to remove a number.

For international calls, press * twice for the international prefix (the + character replaces the international access code), and enter the country code, area code (omit the leading zero if necessary), and phone number.

- 2. To call the number, press the call key.
- 3. To end the call, or to cancel the call attempt, press the end key.

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To make a call from *Addr. Book*, select > *Contacts.* Scroll to the desired name; or enter the first letters of the name, and scroll to the desired name. To call the number, press the call key.

To call a recently dialed number, press the call key in the standby mode.

Speed dialing

Speed dialing is a quick way to call frequently used numbers in the standby mode. You need to assign a phone number to the speed dialing keys 2 to 9 (the 1 key is reserved for the call mailbox), and set Speed dialing to On.

To assing a phone number to a speed dialing key, select *a* > *Settings* > *Speed dial.* Scroll to a key icon, and select **Options** > *Assign* Select the contact and the number for the speed dial. To change the number, select **Options** > *Change*.

To set Speed dialing to On, select Settings Phone > Call > Speed dialing > On.

To call a speed dialing number, press and hold the speed dialing key until the call begins.

Call mailbox

To call your call mailbox (network service), press and hold 1 in the standby mode. You can have call mailboxes for voice calls, video calls, and multiple phone lines.

To define the call mailbox number if no number is set, select > Settings > Callmailbox Scroll to Voice mailbox or Video mailbox, select Define, and enter the corresponding mailbox number. To change the call mailbox number, select **Options** > Change number. Contact your service provider for the call mailbox number.

Voice dialing

A voice tag is added automatically to all entries in *Addr. Book*. Use long names, and avoid similar names for different numbers.

Make a voice dialing call

Voice tags are sensitive to background noise. Use voice tags in a quiet environment.

Note: Using voice tags may be difficult in a noisy environment or during an emergency, so you should not rely solely upon voice dialing in all circumstances.

1. In the standby mode, press and hold the right selection key.

If you are using a compatible headset with the headset key, press and hold the headset key.

 When Speak now is displayed, speak the voice command clearly. The phone plays the voice command of the best match. After 1.5 seconds, the phone dials the number; if the result is not the correct one, before dialing select Next and another entry.

Make a conference call

The phone supports conference calls (network service) between a maximum of six participants, including yourselt.

- 1. Make a call to the first participant.
- 2. To make a call to another participant, select Options > New call.
- 3. To create the conference call when the new call is answered, select Options > Conference.

To add a new person to the conference call, repeat step 2, and select **Options** > *Conference* > *Add to conference*.

4. To end the conference call, press the end key.

Answer or reject a call

To answer a call, press the call key.

o mute the ringing tone, select Silence.

To reject the call, press the end key, or select **Options** > *Reject*. If you have activated *Call divert* > *If busy*, rejecting the call diverts the call.

To send a text message as a reply to the caller instead of answering the call, select **Options** > *Send text message*. To activate the text message reply and edit the message, select > *Settings* > *Phone* > *Call* > *Reject call with SMS* and *Message text*.

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Call waiting

During a call, to answer the waiting call, press the call key. The first call is put on hold. To switch between the two calls, select **Swap**. To end the active call, press the end key.

To activate the *Call waiting* function (network service), select > Settings > Phone > Call > Call waiting > Activate.

Options during a call

Many of the options that you can use during a call are network services. For availability, contact your service provider.

Select **Options** during a call for some of the following options: *Transfer*—to connect a call on hold to an active call and disconnect

yourself

Send DTMF—to send DTMF tone strings (for example a password). Enter the DTMF string or search for it in *Ardr. Book*. To enter a wait character (w) or a pause character (p), press * repeatedly. To send the tone, select **OK**.

■ Video calls

To let the call recipient see your face during a video call, activate the video call mode. Turn the lower part of the phone 90 degrees to the right so that the camera lens is pointing toward you when you look at the display.

Make a video call

To make a video call, you may need to have a USIM card and be in the coverage of a UMTS network. For availability of and subscription to video call services, contact your service provider. A video call can only be made between two parties and when there are not other voice, video, or data calls active. The video call can be made to a compatible mobile phone or an ISDN client.

The recipient is not sending video or the network is not transmitting it.

You have denied video sending from your phone.

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- Enter the phone number in the standby mode; or select > Addr. Book, and scroll to the desired contact.
- 2. Select **Options** > *Call* > *Video call*.

To change between showing video or only hearing sound, select **Options** > *Enable* or *Disable* > *Sending video*, *Sending audio*, or *Sending aud. Et video*.

If you have denied video sending during a video call, the call is still charged as a video call. Check the pricing with your network operator or service provider.

3. To end the video call, press the end key.

Answer a video call

When a video call arrives, sis displayed.

Press the call key to answer the video call. Allow video image to be sent to caller? is shown. If you select Yes, the image captured by the camera in your phone is shown to the caller. Otherwise video sending is not activated.

If you have denied video sending during a video call, the call is still charged as a video call. Check the pricing with your service provider. To end the video call, press the end key.

Call settings

<u>Call.</u> Select > Settings > Phone > Call and from the following:

Send my caller ID (network service)—to display or hide your phone number from the person whom you are calling

Call waiting (network service)-See "Call waiting," p. 24.

Reject call with SMS and *Message text*—See "Answer or reject a call," p. 23.

Image in video call-to select a still image to be shown when you deny a video call

Automatic redial—to set the phone to make a maximum of 10 attempts to connect the call after an unsuccessful call attempt

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Show call duration and Summary after call-to set the phone to display the call duration during a call and the approximate duration of the last call

Speed dialing-See "Speed dialing," p. 22.

Anykey answer—to answer an incoming call by briefly pressing any key, except the left and right selection keys, volume keys, power key, and end key.

Line in use (network service)—to select the phone lines for making calls and sending short messages. Shown only if the SIM card supports two subscriber numbers, that is, two phone lines.

Call forward

- 1. Select > Settings > Phone > Call forwarding (network service).
- 2. Select which calls you want to forward, for example, Voice calls.
- 3. Select the desired option. For example, to forward voice calls when your number is busy or when you reject an incoming call, select *If busy*.
- Select Options > Activate and the phone number to which you want to forward the calls. Several divert options can be active at the same time.

Call restricting and call forwarding cannot be active at the same time.

Call restriction

- 1. Select Settings Phone > Call restriction (network service) to restrict the calls that you make and receive with your phone.
 - Scroll to the desired barring option, and select **Options** > Activate. To change the settings, you need the restriction password from your service provider.

Call restricting and call forwarding cannot be active at the same time.

When calls are restricted, calls may be possible to the official emergency number programmed into your device.

<u>Network</u>

Select SelectSettings > Phone > Network and from the following:

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Network mode—to select which network to use (shown only if supported by the service provider). If you select *Dual mode*, the phone uses the GSM or UMTS network automatically.

Operator selection—To set the phone to search for and automatically select one of the available networks, select *Automatic*. To select the desired network manually from a list of networks, select *Manual*. The selected network must have a roaming agreement with your home network.

Cell info display (network service)—to set the phone to indicate when it is used in a cellular network based on microcellular network (MCN) technology and to activate cell info reception

Video sharing

Use *Video sharing* to send live video from your mobile phone to another compatible mobile phone during a voice call.

Video sharing requirements

Video sharing requires a 3G universal mobile telecommunications system (UMTS) connection. Contact your service provider for questions about network availability and fees associated with this application. To use Video sharing you must do the following:

- Ensure that your phone is set up for person-to-person connections.
- Ensure you have an active UMTS connection and are within UMTS network coverage. If you start the sharing session while you are within UMTS network coverage and a handover to GSM occurs, the sharing session is discontinued, but your voice call continues.
 - Ensure that both the sender and recipient are registered to the UMTS network. Otherwise, they do not know that you are sending an invitation. However, you receive an error message that the recipient cannot accept the invitation.

Video sharing settings

A person-to-person connection is also known as a session initiation protocol (SIP) connection. Before you can use *Video sharing*, ask your

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service provider for the SIP profile settings, and save them in your phone.

If you know a recipient's SIP address, you can enter it on your contact card for that person. Select > *Addr. Book*, the contact, and **Options** > *Edit* > **Options** > *Add detail* > *SIP* or *Share view*. Enter the SIP address in the format sip:username@domainname(you can use an IP address instead of a domain name).

To set your SIP profile settings manually, select > Settings > Connection > Video sharing > SIP profile. To select whether the video sharing is enabled, select Video sharing > Always on. To set whether the live videos are automatically saved, select Video saving > Always save.

Share live video or video clip

 Select Options > Share video > Live video when a voice call is active to share live video you are recording with the phone camera.
 Select Options > Share video > Recorded clip or Image to share a saved video clip or an image. Select a clip or image you want to

share.

2. The phone sends the invitation to the SIP address you have added to the contact card of the recipient.

If necessary, select the SIP address to which you want to send the invitation. If the SIP address of the recipient is not available, enter a SIP address. Select **GK** to send the invitation.

- 3. Sharing begins automatically when the recipient accepts the invitation. The loudspeaker is active.
- Use the toolbar buttons to control the video and image sharing.
- Select Stop to end the sharing session. Press the end key to end the voice call.

Accept an invitation

Your phone must be registered to the UMTS network to receive a share invitation. The invitation shows the sender's name or SIP address. If your phone is not set to *Silent*, it rings when you receive an invitation.

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Write text

When you receive an invitation, select Yes to begin the sharing session. To decline the invitation and to return to the voice call, select No.



To view missed, received, or dialed calls; text messages; packet data connections; and fax and data calls registered by the phone, select > Log.

In the standby mode, you can use the call key as a shortcut to the *Becent* calls log (a network service).

> Note: The actual invoice for calls and services from your services provider may vary, depending on network features, iding off for billing, taxes, and so forth.

Note: Some timers, including the life timer, may be r set during service or software upgrades.

Traditional and predictive text input

When you write text on the display indicates predictive text input and _____ traditional text input. To set the predictive text input on or off, press # repeatedly, or press *, and select Activate predictive text or *Predictive text > Off.*

, . or next to the text input indicator indicates the character case or number mode. To change the character case or tween letter and number mode, press # repeatedly.

elect > Settings > General > Personalisation > Language > Writing language to change the writing language of your phone. The writing language affects the characters available when writing text and the predictive text dictionary used. Not all characters available under a number key are printed on the key.

Write with traditional text input

Press a number key, 2 to 9, repeatedly until the desired character appears. Press the 1 key for the most common punctuation marks and special characters.

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Write text

If the next letter you want is on the same key as the present one, wait until the cursor appears (or scroll forward to end the time-out period), and enter the letter.

Write with predictive text input

- Press a number key, 2–9, only once for one letter. The word changes after every keypress. For the most common punctuation marks, press
 1.
- 2. When you have finished the word and it is correct, to confirm is scroll forward or insert a space.

If the word is not correct, to view the matching words the dictionary has found one by one, press * repeatedly.

If the ? character is shown after the word, the word you intended to write is not in the dictionary. To add a word to the dictionary, select **Spell**. Enter the word (up to 32 letters), and select **OK**. The word is added to the dictionary. When the dictionary becomes full, a new word replaces the oldest added word.

Common functions in traditional and predictive text input To insert a number, press and hold the number key.

To enter punctuation marks and special characters, press and hold *.

To erase a character, press the clear key. To erase more characters, press and hold the clear key.

To insert a space, press 0. To move the cursor to the next line, press 0 three times.

Copy and delete text

- 1. To select letters and words, press and hold #, and at the same time scroll left or right. To select lines of text, press and hold #, and at the same time scroll up or down.
- To copy the text, press and hold #, and at the same time select Copy. To delete the selected text, press the clear key.
- 3. To insert the text, scroll to the insertion point, press and hold #, and at the same time select **Paste**.
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5. Messaging

Before you can receive or send messages or e-mail, you must have the necessary settings and access points defined. Contact your service provider for the settings.

Write and send messages

Your device supports the sending of text messages beyond the character limit for a single message. Longer messages are sent as a series of two or more messages. Your service provider may charge accordingly. Characters that use accents or other marks, and characters from some language options, take up more space, limiting the number of characters that can be sent in a single message.

The wireless network may limit the size of MMS messages. If the inserted picture exceeds this limit, the device may make it smaller sort at it can be sent by MMS.

Only devices that have compatible features can receive and display multimedia messages. The appearance of a message may vary depending on the receiving device.

- Select > Messaging > New message and the message type. To create a text message or multimedia message, select Message. The message type changes automatically based on the content.
- 2. In the *To* field, enter the phone numbers or e-mail addresses of the recipients, or to select recipients from *Addr. Book*, press the scroll key. Separate recipients with a semicolon (;).
- 3. To enter the subject for a multimedia, or e-mail message, scroll down to the Subject field. If the subject field is not visible for a multimedia message, select Options > Message header fields, mark Subject, and select OK.
- 4. Scroll down to the message field and enter the message content.

Wher you write a text message, the message length indicator shows how many characters you can enter in the message. For example, 10 (2) means that you can still add 10 characters for the text to be sent as a series of two text messages.

To insert an object, such as an image, video clip, note, or a business card, to a multimedia, or e-mail message, press the scroll key, and select *Insert*.

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To record a new sound clip for an audio message, select Record. To use a previously recorded sound clip, select **Options** > *Insert sound* clip > From Gallery.

Inbox

Inbox contains received messages except e-mail and cell broadçast messages. To read received messages, select > *Messaging* and the message.

To view the list of media objects that are included in the multimedia message, open the message, and select **Options** > Object

Important: Exercise caution when opening messages. Multim message objects may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device or PC.

Your phone can receive many kinds of messages, such as operator logos, business cards, calendar entries, and ringing tones. You can save the special message content to your phone. For example, to save a received calendar entry to the calendar, select **Options** Save to Calendar.

Note: The picture message function can be used only if it is supported by your service provider. Only compatible devices that offer picture message features can receive and display picture messages. The appearance of a message may vary depending on the receiving device.

Service messages

Service messages (network service) are notifications that may contain a text message or the address of a browser service.

To define whether service messages are enabled and whether the messages are downloaded automatically, select > Messaging > **Options** Settings > Service message.

When you create a new mailbox, the name you give to the mailbox replaces New mailbox. You can have up to six mailboxes.

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IMAP4 and POP3 mailboxes

Select > Messaging and the mailbox. Connect to mailbox? is displayed. Select Yes to connect to your mailbox (network service) or No to view previously retrieved e-mail messages offline.

To connect to the mailbox afterwards, select **Options** > *Connect*. When you are online, to end the data connection to the remote mailbox, select **Options** > *Disconnect*.

Retrieve and read e-mail messages

- Important: Exercise caution when opening messages. E-mail messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device or PC.
- Select Options > Retrieve e-mail and whether you want to retrieve new, selected, or all messages.
- 2. To open an e-mail message, select it.

To view e-mail attachments, indicated with a , select **Options** > *Attachments*. You can retrieve, open, or save attachments in supported formats.

Delete e-mail messages

To delete an e-mail message from the phone and retain it in the remote mailbox, select **Options** > *Delete* > *Phone only*. To delete an e-mail from both the phone and the remote mailbox, select **Options** > *Delete* > *Phone and server*.

To cancel deletion of an e-mail from both the phone and server, scroll to an e-mail that has been marked to be deleted during the next connection, and select **Options** > *Restore*.

Sync mailboxes

Select **Y**> *Messaging* and the sync mailbox.

To synchronize your phone with the remote mailbox, select **Options** > Synchronisation > Start.

To view received messages, select Inbox and the message.

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Outbox

The outbox folder is a temporary storage place for messages that are waiting to be sent. To access the outbox folder, select > *Messaging* > *Outbox*.

To retry sending a message, scroll to the message and select **Options** > *Send*.

To postpone sending a message, scroll to a message, and select Options > Defer sending.

View messages on the SIM card

Before you can view SIM messages, you need to copy them to a folder in your phone. Select > *Messaging* > **Options** > *SIM messages*, mark the messages you want to copy, and select **Options** > *Copy* and the folder to which you want to copy the messages.

Cell broadcast

Check with your service provider whether cell broadcast (network service) is available and what the available topics and related topic numbers are.

Select > Messaging > Options > Cell broadcast. To activate the service, select Options > Settings > Reception > On.

Service commands

To enter and service commands (also known as USSD commands) such as activation commands for network services to your service provider, select > Messaging > Options > Service command. To send the command, select Options > Send.

Messaging settings

Text message settings

To define text message settings, such as the message center and character encoding used, select > Messaging > Options > Settings > Text message.

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Push to Talk

Multimedia messaging settings

To define multimedia message settings, such as which access point is used and whether multimedia messages are retrieved automatically, select > *Messaging* > **Options** > *Settings* > *Multimedia message*.

E-mail settings

Select > *Messaging* > **Options** > *Settings* > *E-mail* > *Mailboxes*, the mailbox and from the following:

Connection settings – to define the connection settings such as the servers and protocol used

User settings – to define user settings such as when messages are sent and whether to include a signature

Retrieval settings – to define retrieval settinge such as which parts of the messages are retrieved and how many messages are retrieved

Automatic retrieval — to define settings for retrieving messages automatically at set intervals or when an e-mail notification is received from the server

Other settings

To define whether a specified number of sent messages are saved to the Sent folder and whether to store the messages in the phone memory or memory card, select **Messaging > Options >** Settings > Other.

Instant messaging

Instant messaging (IM, network service) allows you to converse with others and join discussion forums (IM groups) with specific topics.

Check the availability of IM services, pricing, and tariffs with your service provider.

Select > Applications > IM.

6. Push to Talk

Select Menu > PTT.

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Push to Talk

Push to Talk (PTT) is a two-way radio service available over a GSM cellular network (network service).

You can use PTT to have a conversation with one person or with a group of people having compatible devices and service. While you are connected to the PTT service, you can use the other functions of the phone.

To check availability and costs, and to subscribe to the service, contact your network operator. Service availability may differ from that for normal calls. Visit wireless.att.com/ptt for additional information.

Before you can use the PTT service, you must define the required PTT service settings. See "PTT Settings," p. 39.

Always switch PTT off before switching the phone off or removing the battery.

Switch PTT on and off

To disconnect from the PTT service, select Menu > PTT > PTT settings > PTT Service > Off.

To connect to the PTT service, select Menu PTT. If you have added groups to the phone, you are automatically joined to the active groups. There may be a brief delay while PTT connects.

Connection Indicators

These indicators appear on the standby screen next to the clock.

PTT is connected, your status is Available

Service is disconnected

Information is waiting

Your status is Do Not Disturb

Add Contacts

You can add individual contacts or create contact groups to call several people at once.

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Push to Talk

Add a one-to-one contact

To add a contact to the PTT contacts list, select **Menu** > *PTT* > *Add Contact*. Enter the name and telephone number of the new contact. An invitation is sent to the person.

Add a contact group

You can save a group of contacts so you can call them collectively.

To add a PTT contact group, select Menu > PTT > Add Group and name the group.

To add an existing contact to the group, select From PTT contacts and mark the contacts you want added to the new group

To add a new contact to the group, select *Enter Manually*. En ea the name and telephone number of the new contact. An invitation is sent to the person.

Make and receive a PTC call

Warning: Do not hold the device near your car when the loudspeaker is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

To make a group call, a one-to-one call, or a call to multiple recipients, you must hold the PTT key as long as you talk. To listen to the response, release the PTT key.

You can check the login status of your contacts in Menu > PTT > PTTContacts To add a contact, select Menu > PTT > Add Contact. See "Add a one-to-one contact," p. 37 for more information.

Contact status indicators

These indicators appear next to your contacts and provide information about their connection status.

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Push to Talk

Make a one-to-one call

To start a one-to-one call from the list of contacts to which you have added the PTT telephone number, select **Menu** > *PTT* > *PTT Contacts*. Scroll to a contact, and press and hold the PTT key while talking. Remember that you must release the PTT key to receive their reply.

To start a one-to-one call from the list of PTT groups, select *PTT Contacts*, scroll to the desired group, and select **View**. Scroll to the desired contact, and press and hold the PTT key while talking.

Make a group call

To make a call to a group, select *PTT Contacts* in the PTT menu, scroll to the desired group, and press and hold the PTT key while talking.

Make a PTT call to multiple recipients

To select multiple PTT contacts from the contact list, create a Quick Group. The recipients receive an incoming call. If a recipients phone is set to silent or vibrate, they must accept the call in order to participate.

- 1. Select Menu > PTT > PTT Contacts and mark the desired contacts. The Quick Group is automatically created.
- 2. Press and hold the PTT key to start the call. The group name is shown on the display, as soon as members join the call.
- 3. Press and hold the PTT key to talk to them. Release the PTT key to hear the response.
- 4. Press the end key to terminate the call.

Receive a PTT call

A **Short** tone notifies you of an incoming PTT call. Information, such as the group, the phone number, or the nickname of the caller are displayed.

You can either accept or reject an incoming one-to-one call if you have set the phone to silent or vibrate.

When you press and hold the PTT key while the caller is talking, you hear a queuing tone. Release the PTT key, and wait for the other person to finish; then you can press and hold the PTT key and begin talking.

You can convert a one-to-one or group PTT call to a standard mobile call if you initiated the PTT call. Anytime during the PTT call select **Options** > *Convert to Cellular*. The call recipient(s) can then join your mobile call by pressing the PTT key.

If you make a one-to-one call and do not get a response, you can send a request for the person to call you back.

Send a Call Me Alert

You can send a Call Me Alert in the following ways:

To send a Call Me Alert from the contacts list in the PTT menu, select PTT contacts. Scroll to a contact, and select **Options** Call Me Alert.

To send a Call Me Alert from the group list in the PTT menu, select *PTT* contacts, and scroll to the desired group. Select View, scroll to the desired contact, and select **Options** > Call Me Alert.

Respond to a Call Me Alert

When someone sends you a Call Me Alert, *Please call (sender's name)* is displayed in the standby mode.

To call the sender, press and hold the PTT key.

To send a Call Me Alere to the sender, select **Options** > Call Me Alere.

Voice Messages

You can send a voice message to one of your PTT contacts or groups. From the *PTT contacts* menu, select the individual or group to receive the voice message. Select *Options* > *Voice Messages*. Push and hold the PTT key while speaking. Release the PTT key to deliver the message.

PTT Settings

Select Menu >PTT > PTT Settings.

My Availability — to set your PTT status to Available or Do Not Disturb *Contact Alerts* — to set a notification for when a contact becomes available

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Address Book

Set My Name — to set how your PTT name appears to your contacts and groups

Auto Accept Invites — to set the phone to automatically accept invitations from other PTT users

PTT Service - to switch the PTT service on or off

Save and manage contact information

To save and manage contact information, such as names, phone numbers, and addresses, select > *Addr. Book*. To add a new contact, select **Options** > *New contact*. Fill in the fields

you want, and select Done.

To copy names and numbers from a SIM card to your phone or vice versa, scroll to the contact (or mark the desired contacts), and select **Options** > *Copy* > *Phone memory* or *SnortChipmemory*.

To assign default numbers and addresses to a contact, select it, and select **Options** > *Defaults*. Scroll to the desired default option, and select **Assign**.

To view the list of fixed dialing numbers, select **Options** > *SIM* contacts > fixed dial contacts. This setting is only shown if supported by your SIM card.

When fixed dialing is activated, calls may be possible to the official emergency number programmed into your device.

To view information about the memory consumption of contacts, select Options > Contacts info.

To create contact group so that you can send text or e-mail messages to several recipients at the same time, select > *Addr. Listen to music

In Music player, select Music. Select the category, such as All songs and a song to listen to.

Playback control

To play or pause a song, press the play/pause/stop key.

To stop the playback, press and hold the play/pause/stop key to stop the playback.

To rewind or skip backwards, press the rewind key.

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To fast forward or to skip forward, press the fast forward key.

To control the player, you can also use the scroll key.

To adjust the volume, use the volume key.

To switch random play () on, select **Options** > *Shuffle* > *On*.

To repeat a song () or all songs (), select **Options** > *Repeat* > *Repeat song* or *Repeat all*.

To modify the tone of the music playback, select **Options** > Equalizer To modify the balance loudness or stereo widening, select **Options** > *Audio settings*.

To view a visualisation during playback, select **Options** – St visualisation.

To return to the standby mode and leave the player in the background, press the end key. In *Active standby*, the currently playing song is displayed. To return to the music player, select the currently playing song.

Music menu

To select more music to play in *Now playing* view, select **Options** > *Go to Music menu*. To return to the *Now playing* view, select **Options** > *Go to Now playing*.

The music menu shows the music available in the phone and compatible memory card (if inserted).

To refresh the library after you have updated the song selection in your phone, select Options > *Refresh Music library*.

<u>Playlists</u>

In the music menu, select Playlists.

To view details of the playlist, select **Options** > *Playlist details*.

Create a playlist

- 1. Select **Options** > *Create playlist*.
- 2. Enter a name for the playlist, and select OK.
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- To add songs now, select Yes. To show the song list under an artist title, scroll to the artist, and scroll right. To hide the song list, scroll left. Select the songs to be added, and to add the songs, select Add.
- When you have made your selections, select Done. If a compatible memory card is inserted, the playlist is saved to the memory card.

To add more songs later, when viewing the playlist, select **Options** > *Add songs*.

To reorder songs in a playlist, scroll to the song you want to move select **Options** > *Reorder list* > **Grab**, scroll to a new position, and select **Drop**.

Music shop

To go to the music shop, in the *Music player*, select **Options** • Go to *Music shop*.

In the music shop (network service) you can search, browse, and purchase music for downloading to your phone. You must have music shop settings and valid internet connections to use this service.

The variety and appearance of music shop services and the music shop settings may vary. For more information and availability of the music shop, contact your service provider.

The settings may also be predefined in your phone. You may be able to edit the settings, select **Options** *Settings*.

Transfer music

You can buy music protected with WMDRM from online music shops, and transfer the music to your phone.

To transfer music from a compatible PC or other compatible devices, use a compatible USB cable or Bluetooth connectivity. You cannot transfer WMDRM protected music files using Bluetooth.

To refresh the library after you have updated the song selection in your phone, in the *Music menu*, select **Options** > *Refresh Music library*.

The requirements of the PC for music purchase and transfer:

- Compatible version of Windows Media Player application

Transfer music from PC

You can use three different methods to transfer music:

- To use Nokia Music Manager in Nokia PC Suite, connect the compatible USB cable or activate Bluetooth connection, and select *PC Suite* as the connection mode.

With RealPlayer, you can play media files such as video clips saved in the phone memory or memory card, or stream media files over the air by opening a streaming link. RealPlayer does not support all file formats or all the variations of file formats.

To play, select a media file or a streaming link in Video clips, Streaming links, or Recently played.

To stream live content, you must first configure your default access point. Select > *Applications* > *RealPlayer* > **Options** > *Settings* > *Streaming* > *Network*. Contact your service provider for more information.

Recorder

Recorded files are saved in the Sound clips folder in Gallery.

Select > Applications > Recorder. To record a sound clip, select **Options** > Record sound clip, or select . To listen to the recording, select



Select > Gallery.

Use Gallery to save and organize your images, videos, music tracks, sound clips, playlists, streaming links, .ram files, and presentations.

To copy files to phone memory or to the memory card, select the folder (such as *Images*), scroll to the file or mark the files, and select **Options** > *Organize* > *Copy to phone mem.* or *Copy to memory card*.

To set an image as a wallpaper or to be shown during a call, select *Images*, and scroll to the image. Select **Options** > *Use image* > *Set as*

To edit images in **Gallery**, scroll to the image, and select **Options** > *Edit*. Select **Options** > *Apply effect* to crop or rotate the image; adjust the brightness, color, contrast, and resolution; and add effects, text, clip art, or a frame to the picture.

Shortcuts in the image editor:

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Camera

- To view an image in the full screen, and to return to the normal view, press *.
- To rotate an image clockwise or counterclockwise, press 3 or 1.
- To zoom in or out, press 5 or 0.
- To move on a zoomed image, scroll up, down, left, or right.

Print images

You can use the phone with a PictBridge-compatible printer using USB cable.

To print images in Gallery, scroll to the image, and select Options > Print.

Transfer videos from PC

To transfer videos from a compatible PC, use a compatible USB cable or Bluetooth connectivity.

The requirements of the PC for video transfer:

To activate the camera mode while in the phone mode, turn the lower part of the phone 90 degrees to the left so that the camera lens is pointing away from you when you look at the display. The display

functions as a viewfinder. To take a self portrait, turn the lower part of the phone 90 degrees to the right so that the camera lens is pointing toward you. On the upper left of the display indicates the still image mode.

Capture an image and record a video

To lock the focus on an object, press the capture key halfway down. To capture an image, press the capture key. The image is saved to *Images* in *Gallery*. To return to the viewfinder, select **Back**. To delete the image press the clear key.

To zoom in or out, press the fast forward or rewind key.

To capture images sequentially, select **Options** > Sequence mode > On. When you press the capture key, the camera captures six images in short intervals.

To turn the flash on automatically when necessary, select **Options** > *Flash* > *Automatic*.

Keep a safe distance when using the flash. Bo not use the flash on people or animals at close range. Do not cover the flash while taking a picture.

In dim lighting, to use night mode, select **Options** > *Night mode* > *On*.

To adjust the white balance or color tone, select **Options** > *Adjust* > *White balance* or *Color tone*.

To record a video, select **Options** > *Video mode*, or scroll right. indicates the video mode. To start the recording, press the capture key. To pause the recording, press the capture key. To stop the recording, press and hold the capture key.

To use the panorama mode, select **Options** > *Panorama mode*, or scroll right. I indicates the panorama mode. Press the capture key to start capturing a panorama image. Turn slowly to the right or left. You cannot change the direction. You turn too fast if the arrow on the display is red. To stop the panorama, press the capture key again.

Camera settings

Your device supports an image capture resolution of 1200 x 1600 pixels.

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Positioning

To change camera settings for still images or videos when in the camera mode, select **Options** > *Settings* > *Image* or *Video* and the desired setting.

To browse web pages, select > *Web*, or press and hold 0 in the standby mode.

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Internet

Check the availability of services, pricing, and tariffs with your service provider.

Important: Use only services that you trust and that offer adequate security and protection against harmful software.

To access web pages, do one of the following:

- Select a bookmark from the bookmarks view.
- In the bookmarks view, enter the address of the web page, and select Go to.

Bookmarks

Your device may have preinstalled bookmarks and links for third-party internet sites. You may also access other third-party sites through your device. Third-party sites are not affiliated with Nokia, and Nokia does not endorse or assume liability for them. If you choose to access such sites, you should take precautions for security or content.

The starting page is indicated with . The automatic bookmarks folder (____) contains bookmarks that are collected automatically when you browse pages.

To add a bookmark manually, in the bookmarks view, select **Options** > *Bookmark manager* > *Add bookmark*, fill in the fields, and select **Options** > *Save*.

Connection security

If the security indicator is displayed during a connection, the data transmission between the device and the internet gateway or server is encrypted.

The security icon does not indicate that the data transmission between the gateway and the content server (or place where the requested resource is stored) is secure. The service provider secures the data transmission between the gateway and the content server.

To view details about the connection, encryption status, and information about server authentication, select **Options** > *Tools* > *Page info*.

Keys and commands for browsing

To open a link, make selections, or check boxes, press the scroll key.

To go to the previous page while browsing, select **Back**. If **Back** is not available, select **Options** > *Navigation options* > *History* to view a chronological list of the pages visited during a browsing session. To choose the desired page, scroll left or right, and select it. The history list is cleared each time a session is closed.

To save a bookmark while browsing, select **Options** > Save as bookmark.

To retrieve the latest content from the server, select **Options** Navigation options > Reload.

To open the browser toolbar, scroll to an empty part of the page, and press the scroll key.

Mini map

Mini map helps you navigate web pages that contain large amount of information. When you stop scrolling, *Mini map* disappears and the area outlined in *Mini map* is displayed.

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Internet

Page overview

With *Page overview*, you can move more quickly to the desired part of a web page. Page overview may not be available on all pages.

To show the page overview of the current page, press 8. To find the desired spot on the page, scroll up or down. Press 8 again to zoom in and view the desired section of the page.

Web feeds

Web feeds are widely used to share the latest headlines or recent

The browser automatically detects if a web page contains web feeds. To subscribe to a web feed, select **Options** > *Subscribe* and a feed, or click on the link. To view the web feeds you have subscribed to, in the bookmarks view, select *Web feeds*.

To update a web feed, select it, and **Options** > Refresh.

To define how the web feeds are updated, select **Options** > Settings > Web feeds.

Saved pages

To save a page while browsing to be able to view it offline, select **Options** > *Tools* > *Save page*.

To view saved pages, in the bookmarks view, select *Saved pages*. To open a page, select it.

<u>Clear privacy data</u>

A cache is a memory location that is used to store data temporarily. If you have tried to access or have accessed confidential information requiring passwords, empty the cache after each use. The information or services you have accessed are stored in the cache. To empty the cache, select **Options** > *Clear privacy data* > **Cache**.

To clear all privacy data, select **Options** > *Clear privacy data* > *All*.

Themes

To change the look of your phone display, activate a theme.

Select > Settings > Personalis. > Themes. To see a list of the available themes, select General. The active theme is indicated by a check mark.

To preview a theme, scroll to the theme, and select **Options** > **Preview**. To activate the previewed theme, select **Set**.

To apply or edit an audio theme, select > Settings > Personalis. > Themes > Audio themes.

In *Themes*, you can also set the menu view type, set a theme for the standby mode, set a custom wallpaper, personalize the look of the power saver, and select an image shown during a call.

Profiles

In *Profiles*, you can adjust and personalize the phone tones for different events, environments, or caller groups. You can see the currently selected profile at the top of the display in the standby mode. If the *General* profile is in use, only the current date is shown.

Select > Settings > Personalis > Profiles.

To activate the profile, select the profile and Activate.

Tip: To quickly change to *Silent* profile from any other profile, in the standby mode, press and hold #.

To personalize a profile, select the profile, *Personalize*, and the desired settings.

To set the profile to be active until a certain time within the next 24 hours, select *Timed* and the time.

When using the *Offline* profile, the phone is not connected to the cellular network. If no SIM card is installed, to use some functions of the phone, start the phone in *Offline*.

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Time management

Important: In the offline profile you cannot make or receive any calls, or use other features that require cellular network coverage. Calls may still be possible to the official emergency number programmed into your device. To make calls, you must first activate the phone function by changing profiles. 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Note: This calculator has limited accuracy and is designed for simple calculations.

Converter

The converter has limited accuracy and rounding errors may occur.

Before you can convert currency, you need to choose a base currency (usually your domestic currency) and add exchange rates. The rate of the base currency is always 1. Select *Currency* as the measurement type, and select **Options** > *Currency rates*. To change the base currency, scroll to the currency, and select **Options** > *Set as base currency*. Add exchange rates, scroll to the currency, and enter a new rate.

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Settings

After you insert all the required exchange rates, you can convert currency. In the first *Amount* field, enter the value to be converted. The other *Amount* field changes automatically.

Packet data—to select the packet data connection settings. The packet data settings affect all access points using a packet data connection.

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Settings

- Select Packet data connection > When available to set the phone to register to the packet data network when you are in a network that supports packet data. If you select When needed, the phone uses a packet data connection only if you start an application or function that needs it.
- Select Access point to set the access point name to use your phone as a modem with your computer.

Install or remove applications

You can install two types of applications to your phone:

- J2M[™] applications based on Java[™] technology with the extension jad or .jar. PersonalJava[™] applications cannot be installed on your phone.
- Other applications and software suitable for the Symbian operating system. The installation files have the .sis or .sisx extension. Only install software specifically designed for your phone.
 - Important: Only install and use applications and other software from trusted sources, such as applications that are Symbian Signed or have passed the Java Verified[™] testing.

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Installation files may be transferred to your phone from a compatible computer, downloaded during browsing, or sent to you in a multimedia message, as an e-mail attachment or by using Bluetooth. You can use Nokia Application Installer in Nokia PC Suite to install an application to your phone or a memory card.

Installed applications are placed in > Applications > My own.

To open Application manager, select Settings > App. mgr.

Install an application

The .jar file is required for installing Java applications. If it is missing, the phone may ask you to download it.

To install an application or software package:

- 1. Select *Not installed*, and scroll to an installation file. Applications on the memory card are indicated with
- 2. Select **Options** > *Install*.

Alternatively, search the phone memory or the memory card, select the application, and press the scroll key to start the installation.

During the installation, the phone shows information about the progress of the installation. If you are installing an application without a digital signature or certification, the phone displays a warning. Continue installation only if you are sure of the origins and contents of the application.

Java applications may attempt to, for example, establish a data connection or send a message. To edit the permissions of an installed lava application and define which access point the application will use, select installed, scroll to the application, and select **Open**.

After you install applications to a compatible memory card, installation files (.sis) remain in the device memory. The files may use large amounts of memory and prevent you from storing other files. To maintain sufficient memory, use Nokia PC Suite to back up installation files to a compatible PC, then use the file manager to remove the installation files from the device memory. See File manager p. 61. If the .sis file is a message attachment, delete the message from the Messaging inbox.

If your insert another password-protected memory card into your phone, you are prompted to enter the password of the card. To unlock the card, select **Options** > Unlock memory card.

Licences

Digital rights management

Content owners may use different types of digital rights management (DRM) technologies to protect their intellectual property, including copyrights. This

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device uses various types of DRM software to access DRM-protected content. With this device you can access content protected with WMDRM, OMA DRM 1.0, and OMA DRM 2.0. If certain DRM software fails to protect the content, content owners may ask that such DRM software's ability to access new DRM-protected content be revoked. Revocation may also prevent renewal of such DRMprotected content already in your device. Revocation of such DRM software does not affect the use of content protected with other types of DRM or the use of non-DRM-protected content.

Digital rights management (DRM) protected content comes with an associated activation key that defines your rights to use the content.

If your device has OMA DRM protected content, to back up both the activation keys and the content, use the backup feature of Nokia PC Suite. Other transfer methods may not transfer the activation keys which need to be restored with the content for you to be able to continue the use of OMA DRM protected content after the device memory is formatted. You may also need to restore the activation keys in case the files on your device get corrupted.

If your device has WMDRM protected content, both the activation keys and the content will be lost if the device memory is formatted. You may also lose the activation keys and the content in case the files on your device get corrupted. To view invalid licences with which the time period for using the file is exceeded, select *Invalid licences*. To buy more usage time or extend the usage period for a media file, select an invalid licence and **Options** > *Get new licence*. It may not be possible to update licences if service message reception is disabled.

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To view licences that are not in use, select *Not in use*. Unused licenses have no media files connected to them.

To view detailed information such as the validity status and the ability to send the file, scroll to a licence, and select it.

Device manager

To open the device manager, select Settings > Data mgr. > Device
mgr.

Update software

The current software version is displayed in the Updatesview.

Warning: If you install a software update, you cannot use the device, even to make emergency calls, until the installation is completed and the device is restarted. Be sure to back up data before accepting installation of an update.

Downloading software updates may involve the transmission of large amounts of data through your service provider's network. Contact your service provider for information about data transmission charges

Make sure that the device battery has enough power, or connect the charger before starting the update.

With PC Suite you can synchronize contacts, calendar entries, and notes between your phone and a compatible PC

Bluetooth connectivity

Bluetooth wireless technology enables wireless connections between electronic devices within a maximum range of 10 metres (33 feet). This device is compliant with Bluetooth Specification 2.0 supporting the following profiles: Advanced Audio Distribution, Audio/Video Remote Control, Basic Imaging, Basic Printing, Device Identification, Dial Up Networking, File Transfer, Hands-free, Headset, Human Interface Device, Object Push, Serial Port, SIM Access, Rhanebook Access, Generic Audio/Video Distribution, Generic Access, and Generic Object Exchange. To ensure interoperability between other devices supporting Bluetooth technology, use Nokia approved enhancements for this model. Check with the manufacturers of other devices to determine their compatibility with this device.

There may be restrictions on using Bluetooth technology in some locations. Check with your local authorities or service provider.

Features using Bluetooth technology, or allowing such features to run in the background while using other features, increase the demand on battery power and reduce the battery life.

Charging and discharging

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only Nokia approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Nokia approved chargers designated for this device.

If a replacement battery is being used for the first time or if the battery has not been used for a prolonged period, it may be necessary to connect the charger, then disconnect and reconnect it to begin charging the battery.

shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

Use the battery only for its intended purpose. Never use any charger or battery that is damaged.

Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the connecting object.

Leaving the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a closed car in summer or winter conditions, will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explore. Batteries may also explode if damaged. Dispose of batteries according to local regulations. Please recycle when possible. Do not dispose as household waste.

Do not dismantle or shied cells or batteries. In the event of a battery leak, do not allow the liquid to come in contact with the skin or eyes. In the event of such a leak, flush your skin or eyes immediately with water, or seek medical help.

Important: Battery talk and standby times are estimates only and depend on signal strength, network conditions, features used, battery age and condition, temperatures to which battery is exposed, use in digital mode, and many other factors. Nokia battery authentication guidelines

Successful completion of the steps is not a total assurance of the authenticity of the battery. If you have any reason to believe that your battery is not an authentic, original Nokia battery, you should refrain from using it, and take it to the nearest authorized Nokia service point or dealer for assistance. Your authorized Nokia service point or dealer will inspect the battery for authenticity. If authenticity cannot be verified, return the battery to the place of purchase.

Authenticate hologram

- When you look at the hologram on the label, you should see the Nokia connecting hands symbol from one angle and the Nokia Original Enhancements logo when looking from another angle.
- 2. When you angle the hologram left, right, down a up, you should see 1, 2, 3 and 4 dots on each side respectively.

What if your battery is not authentic?

If you cannot confirm that your Nokia battery with the hologram on the label is an authentic Nokia battery, please do not use the battery. Take it to the nearest

authorized Novia service point or dealer for assistance. The use of a battery that is not approved by the manufacturer may be dangerous and may result in poor nerformance and damage to your device and its enhancements. It may also invalidate any approval or warranty applying to the device.

Care and maintenance

Your device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The following suggestions will help you protect your warranty coverage.

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Care and maintenance

- Keep the device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and all types of liquids or moisture can contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If your device does get wet, remove the battery, and allow the device to dry completely before replacing it.
- Do not use or store the device in dusty, dirty areas. Its moving parts and electronic components can be damaged.
- Do not store the device in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of
 electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the device in cold areas. When the device returns to its normal temperature, moisture can form inside the device and damage electronic circuit boards.
- Do not attempt to open the device other than as instructed in this guide
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the device. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards and fine mechanics.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the device.
- Do not paint the device. Paint can clog the moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Use a soft, clean, dry cloth to clean any lenses, such as camera, proximity sensor, and light sensor lenses.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the device and may violate regulations governing radio devices.
- Use chargers indoors.

Additional safety information

Small children

Your device and its enhancements may contain small parts. Keep them out of the reach of small children.

Operating environment

This device meets RF exposure guidelines when used either in the normal use position against the ear or when positioned at least 2.2centimeters (7/8inches) away from the body. When a carry case, belt clip, or holder is used for body-worn operation, it should not contain metal and should position the device the above-stated distance from your oddy. To transmit data files or messages, this device requires a quality connection to the network. In some cases, transmission of data files or messages may be delayed until such a connection is available. Ensure the above separation distance instructions are followed until the transmission is completed.

Parts of the device are magnetic. Metallic materials may be attracted to the device. Do not place credit cards or other magnetic storage media near the device, because information stored on them may be erased.

Medical devices

Operation of any radio transmitting equipment, including wireless phones, may interfere with the functionality of inadequately protected medical devices. Consult a physician or the manufacturer of the medical device to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy or if you have any

Vehicles

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Using your device while flying in aircraft is prohibited. Switch off your device before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless teledevices in an aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, disrupt the wireless telephone network, and may be illegal.

Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your device when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Potentially explosive atmospheres include areas where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Switch off the device at refueling points such as near gas pumps at service stations. Observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots, storage, and distribution areas; chemical plants; or where blasting operations are in progress. Emergency calls



Important: Wireless phones, including this device, operate using radio signals, wireless networks, landline networks, and user-programmed functions. Because of this, connections in all conditions cannot be guaranteed. You should never rely solely on any wireless device for essential communications like medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call:

1. If the device is not on, switch it on. Check for adequate signal strength.

Some networks may require that a valid SIM card is properly inserted in the device.

- Press the end key as many times as needed to clear the display and ready the device for calls.
- 3. Enter the official emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 4. Press the call key.

If certain features are in use, you may first need to turn those features off before you can make an emergency call. In the offline or flight profiles, you may need to unlock the device and change to the calling profile before making a call. Consult this guide or your service provider for more information.

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When making an emergency call, give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Your wireless device may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident. Do not end the call until given permission to do so.

Certification information (SAR)

This mobile device meets guidelines for exposure to radio waves. Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent spentific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure guidelines for mobile devices employ a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate or SAR. The SAR limit stated in the ICNIRPguidelines is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over 10 g ams of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions with the device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. The actual SAR level of an operating device can be below the maximum value because the device is designed to use only the power required to reach the network. That amount changes depending on a number of factors such as how close you are to a network base station. The highest SAR value under the ICNIRP guidelines for use of the device at the ear is 0.66 W/kg.

Use of device accessories and enhancements may result in different SAR values. SAR values may vary depending on national reporting and testing requirements and the network band. Additional SAR information may be provided under product information at <u>www.nokiausa.com</u>.

Your mobile device is also designed to meet the requirements for exposure to radio waves established by the Federal Communications Commission (USA). These requirements set a SAR limit of 1.6 W/kg averaged over one gram of tissue. The highest SAR value reported under this standard during product certification for use at the ear is 0.92 W/kg and when properly worn on the body is 0..68 W/kg.

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
