

This section describes how to start using your device after activating your services, how to contact customer support, and how to read this guide.

Install or Remove the Battery

Install the Battery

1. To remove the back cover, with the back of the device facing you, press the release button and lift the back cover.



 Insert the gold-colored contacts of the battery into the battery slot, and push down the other end of the battery to snap it into place.



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3. To replace the back cover, align the cover tabs with the slots in the device, and push down the bottom and side tabs until the cover is securely in place.



Remove the Battery

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- 2. Insert your finger into the finger grip, and lift the battery from its compartment.
- 3. Replace the back cover.



MicroSD Card

Use only compatible MicroSD cards approved by Nokia for use with this device. Your device supports MicroSD cards up to 16GB. Nokia uses approved industry standards for memory cards, but some brands may not be fully compatible with this device. Incompatible cards may damage the card and the device and corrupt data stored on the card.

Insert the MicroSD Card

1. Lift open the microSD holder cover.

2. Slide the card into the holder carefully with the gold-colored contacts facing down, and close the cover.




Switch Your Device On or Off

To switch your device on or off, press and hold the End key ($_{\hbox{\tiny ENO}}$) for at least 3 seconds.

Important: Do not remove the memory card in the middle of an operation when the card is being accessed. Removing the card in the middle of an operation may damage the memory card as well as the device, and data stored on the card may be corrupted.

Charge the Battery

- 1. Plug the charger transformer into a standard wall outlet.
- 2. Open the charging port on the top of the device.
- 3. Insert the charger output plug into the port. The battery strength indicator starts scrolling, showing the battery is charging.
- 4. When the device is completely charged, unplug the charger from the device, then from the wall outlet to save energy.



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Antenna

Your device may have internal and external antennas. As with any radio transmitting device, avoid touching the antenna area unnecessarily while the antenna is transmitting or receiving. Contact with such an antenna affects the communication quality and may cause the device to operate at a higher power than otherwise needed and may reduce the battery life.



Connect the Headset

Warning: When you use the headset, your ability to hear outside sounds may be affected. Do not use the headset where it can endanger your safety.

For hands-free operation, connect a compatible headset with a standard 2.5-mm plug to your device.

- 1. Plug the headset connector into the 2.5-mm headset jack on the left side of your device.
- Position the headset on your ear. With the headset connected, you can make, answer, and end calls as usual.



Wrist Strap

The wrist strap does NOT come in the box. Thread a wrist strap as illustrated, and tighten it.





How to Read This Guide

How to Read This Guide

The following sections illustrate various functions of your device. Familiarize yourself with these sections to understand the instructions that follow. This guide uses certain terms for the steps that you are asked to perform.

- Press refers to pressing and releasing a key quickly.
- Press and hold refers to pressing and holding a key for 2–3 seconds before releasing it.
- Scroll refers to using the Directional key to scroll to a menu item.
- Select refers to scrolling to an item and pressing the Clear key (____).
- Generally, the step-by-step instructions start from the idle screen except when specifically indicated. To go back to the idle screen from your current working screen, press the End key ([ENCO]).
- To return to the previous screen, press the Clear key ([...]).
- When a menu is highlighted, to access a submenu, press the number of the submenu, or scroll to the desired item, and press the (
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 <li)
- To provide a visual representation of your current position in the menu structure, a scroll bar may be displayed on the right side of the screen.
- In this guide, all the operations are instructed in the list (the default) view unless specially indicated.





Idle Screen

The start screen is home base and indicates that your device is in the idle screen.

- Signal strength The strength of the signal received by the device is indicated by the number of bars displayed.
- 2. Message Press the Left Soft key to select this option.
- 3. MENU Press the (□K) key to select this option.
- 4. Contacts Press the Right Soft key to select this option.
- 5. Battery strength Four bars indicate a fully charged battery.
- 6. Location Location information sharing mode.

Indicators and Icons

Depending on your device settings and modes, some or all of the following indicators and icons may appear on the idle screen.

Airplane Mode

Use Airplane Mode in radio sensitive environments - on board aircraft or in hospitals. When Airplane Mode is active, **OFF** is displayed. See "Airplane Mode," p. 60.

Emergency Call in Airplane Mode

Enter the emergency number, and press the Send key ($[]_{\text{SEND}}$). Your device deactivates Airplane Mode and attempts to make an emergency call. Airplane Mode is re-activated automatically after the call.

Find My Phone Number

- To view the ten-digit number assigned to your device:
- 1. Press the $(\bigcirc \times)$ key (MENU), and press $(\bigcirc \times)$ Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (\square) *Phone Info*, and then press (\square) *My Number*.

This section describes how to make, answer and reject a call. It also describes how to use the speakerphone and view call logs.

Make a Call

Use the Keypad

Enter the phone number (including the area code if necessary), and press the Send key ($_{\tt SEND}$).

Use the Contact List

- 1. Press the Right Soft key Contacts.
- 2. Scroll to the desired contact, and press the (ow) key (VIEW) to display the details of the contact.
- 3. If the entry contains more than one number, scroll to the desired number, and press the Send key ((seno) to call the number.
- For information on adding contacts, see "Create New Contacts," p. 40.

Use Speed Dial

Press and hold the corresponding speed dial key.

Use Call Log

- 1. Press the Send key (SEND).
- 2. Scroll to a contact, and press the Send key (send) again.

Answer or Reject a Call

To answer a call, open the flip or, if it is already open, press the Send key ([stree]). To change settings for answering a call, see "Answer Options," p. 64.

Options During a Call

To mute an incoming call, press the Left Soft key (Quiet). To forward the call to your voicemail, press the Right Soft key (Ignore). To reject the call, press the End key ([moo]).

Options During a Call

Select Options for one of the following when you are on a call:

Messaging – Send or retrieve messages.

Contact List – Search your Contact List.

Recent Calls – Check recent calls.

Bluetooth Menu – Utilizing a Bluetooth headset.

The following options are available if a Bluetooth headset is connected. Select *Audio to Phone* to hear the other party on the device, or *Audio to Device* to hear the other party on the Bluetooth headset.

Main Menu – Use Main Menu.

Notepad – Open the notepad.

Voice Record – Record a phone call.

Voice Privacy - Select whether to protect the privacy of the conversation.

Speakerphone

To use the speakerphone, press the Speakerphone key ([])). To turn the speakerphone off, press the Speakerphone key ([]) again.

Recent Calls

Information on missed, received, or dialed calls is stored in the Recent Calls menu. When the number of calls exceeds the limit of call category folders, the oldest call is replaced.

View Call Log

- 1. Press the () key (MENU), and press () Recent Calls.
- Scroll to the call category folder (Missed, Received, Dialed, Blocked, or All), and press the (
 is only available

 Key to view the call log. Blocked is only available

Warning: Do not hold the device near your ear when the speakerphone is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

when *Block All* or *Contacts Only* is set to incoming calls. See "Security," p. 62.

3. In each call category folder, scroll to the desired call record, press the ((ork)) key (OPEN) to view details, or press the Left Soft key (Message) to create a new message, or press the Right Soft key (Options) and select from the available options to perform the corresponding operations.

Call Timers

Call timers record the time of incoming and outgoing calls as well as the volume of data transferred and received.

- 1. Press the (🖂) key (MENU), and press (💙) Recent Calls.
- 2. Press () View Timers.

 - To reset a timer, scroll to the desired timer, and press the Left Soft key (Reset).
 - To reset all timers, press the Right Soft key (Reset All).
- Note: The actual invoice for calls and services from your service provider may vary, depending on network features, rounding off for billing, taxes, and so forth.

Note: Some timers, including the life timer, may be reset during service or software upgrades.

This section describes how to select the desired entry modes and how to use predictive text entry mode.

Entry Modes

Your device offers five entry modes: Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols. The following rules apply:

- To delete a character, press the Clear key (CLR); to delete a word, press and hold the Clear key (CLR).
- To enter a space, or to accept a completed word in Word Mode, press the Space key (_____).
- To change character case in Word, Abc or ABC Mode, press the Shift key (()).
- To change the mode, press the Left Soft key.

Abc and ABC Modes

In Abc and ABC Modes, to enter a letter, repeatedly press a key until the desired letter appears. If you pause briefly, the last letter on the display is accepted, and your device awaits the next entry.

To activate Abc Mode or ABC Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to Abc or ABC, and press the (\frown) key.

Text Entry 23

Word Mode

Word Mode is a predictive text entry method that is based on a built-in dictionary to quickly recognize the most commonly used words for a specific key sequence.

- 1. To activate Word Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to $W\!\!\!\! \text{ord}$, and press the ($[\ _{\text{orc}}]$) key.
- 2. Enter your word with the keypad. In Word Mode, press a key once for each letter until the desired word appears.
 - If the displayed word is not correct, press the Next key () repeatedly to select from other options.
 - If the desired word is not found in the dictionary, delete your entry, press the Left Soft key to switch to Abc or ABC Mode, and re-enter the word.
- 3. When the correct word is displayed, press the Space key (_____) to confirm, and insert a space.

Number Entry

- To enter a number in Abc, ABC, or Word Mode, press and hold the desired number key.
- To switch to Number Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to 123, and press (cx) key.

Symbol Entry

 To insert special characters into your message, press the Left Soft key, scroll to Symbols, and press the (

- Quick text are short, prewritten messages that can be inserted into a message.
- To insert quick text into your message, press the Left Soft key, scroll to <u>*Quick Text*</u>, and press the (

This section describes how to download ringtones, sounds, pictures, games, and extras. It also describes how to take, record and store pictures, sounds, and ringtones with your device.

Media Center

Download charges for Media Center applications vary and airtime charges apply when browsing, downloading, and using certain applications. Media Center can be used anywhere on the Verizon Wireless network, as long as your device has a digital signal available.

This feature shares memory space with other features. You can also view memory information to see how much memory is available.

Music & Tones

You can personalize your device with sounds and ringtones using Music & Tones (network service). A large variety of music styles are available, such as current hits, pop, and hip-hop.

Get New Ringtones

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and press () *Media Center*.
- 2. Press ($[\mathbb{R}]$) *Music & Tones*, and then press ($[\mathbb{R}]$) *Get New Ringtones*.
- 3. Scroll to *Get New Applications* to download new ringtone applications, or use one of the applications to download ringtones from the internet.

My Ringtones

To set your favorite music as a ringtone, see "My Ringtones," p. 51.

My Sounds

Erase — To erase a sound clip stored in the device (only for self-recorded sounds).

Erase All – To erase all sound clips stored in the device (only for self-recorded sounds).

File Info - To view file information about the highlighted sound.

Picture & Video

Pictures (network service) allows you to view, take, and send digital pictures from your device.

You can take pictures with the built-in camera. After you take a picture, you can attach it to a picture message, or set it as wallpaper or picture ID for a contact. When you attach a picture to an entry in your list of contacts, the

picture is displayed when the contact calls you or when you call the contact. Pictures can be stored in the My Pictures folder or can be uploaded to online album. See "Picture, Video or Voice Messages," p. 33. Your device supports image capture resolution 320 x 240, 640 x 480, 800 x 600, 1280 x 960, and 2048 x 1536 mega pixels.

Take a Picture

- 1. To activate the camera, press the Camera key (
- To take a picture and save it to My Pictures, press the () key (TAKE), and then press the Left Soft key (Save).
 - To view pictures saved in your device, press the Left Soft key (My Pics).
 - To adjust the picture quality, press the Right Soft key (Options), and select from the available options.

Warning: Keep a safe distance when using the flash. Do not use the flash on people or animals at close range. Do not cover the flash while taking a picture.

To adjust the picture quality, press the Camera key (**D**), press the Right Soft key (**Options**), and select from the following:

Resolution **– Choose** 2048 x 1536, 1280 x 960, 800 x 600, 640 x 480, or 320 x 240.

SelfTimer – Choose Off, 3 seconds, 5 seconds, or 10 seconds.

Flash – Choose Off, On, or Only This Shot.

Brightness – Press the Directional key left or right.

White Balance – Press the Directional key left or right to choose *Auto*, *Sunny*, *Cloudy*, *Tungsten*, or *Fluorescent*.

Shutter Sound – Choose Shutter, Silent, Say "Cheez", or Ready! 1 2 3.

Color Effects – Press the Directional key left or right to choose Normal, Antique, Black & White, Negative, or Normal.

Capture Mode – Choose Landscape or Portrait.

1. Press the (\square) key (MENU), and press (\square) *Media Center*.

My Pictures

You can set your favorite music as a ringtone, a contact ID for a particular contact, or as alert sounds for incoming messages.

View a Picture

- 3. Scroll to a picture, and press the (ref.) key (VIEW).

Delete a Picture

Calls while Downloading an Application

While downloading an application, calls are automatically sent to your voicemail, if available.

When using an application, an incoming call automatically interrupts the application and allows you to answer the call. When you complete your call, you can resume using the application.

Security and Functionality

Make an emergency call while online

You can end your data connection to make an emergency call.

- Close your connection by pressing the End key ([ENOO) as many times as needed to clear the display and get the device ready for calls.
- 2. Enter 911 for emergency calls.
- 3. Press the Send key (SEND).

Security and Functionality

Your device supports a digital rights management system to protect acquired content. Content such as ringtones may be protected and associated with certain usage rules.

The security icon (()) does not indicate that the data transmission between the gateway and the content server (or place where the requested resource is stored) is secure. Verizon Wireless secures the data transmission between the gateway and the content server.

This section describes how to send different types of messages. It also describes other messaging features.

Text Messages

If you have subscribed to a message network service, you can send and receive messages between compatible devices that also subscribe to a message service.

When composing text messages (SMS) or enhanced messages (EMS, messages that can contain simple pictures, sounds, animations, or melodies), the number of characters used (out of a maximum per message) appears in the top left corner of the message screen. Segments are created when the message length exceeds the maximum allowed number of characters.

The number of segments used (out of a maximum of 7) appears in the top right corner of the message screen. No additional text can be entered when all segments and characters have been used. Segments are delivered as individual messages.

Your device supports the sending of text messages beyond the character limit for a single message. Longer messages are sent as a series of two or more messages. Verizon Wireless may charge accordingly. Characters that use

accents or other marks, and characters from some language options, take up more space, limiting the number of characters that can be sent in a single message.

Write and Send a Text Message

TXT message options

To customize a new text message, press the Right Soft key **Options** when the cursor is in the *Text:* field, and select from the following:

Insert Quick Text – Insert text from the *Add Quick Text* gallery into your document. See the *Quick Text* option under "Message Settings," p. 38.

Save As Draft – Save your message in the Drafts folder.

Add – Include a graphic, a sound clip, or a signature in your message.

Priority Level – Set the priority level. Select *High*, or *Normal*. If set to high, "URGENT" appears at the top of receiver's message.

Cancel Message – Close the message without sending it. To save it in the Drafts folder, select Yes. To delete the message and exit, select No.

Picture, Video or Voice Messages

Picture messages are multimedia messages that can contain text, pictures, camera pictures, slides, and sound recordings. Video messages are multimedia messages that can contain text, video clips, and name cards. Voice messages are messages that can contain text and sound recordings. Depending upon your network services, you may receive a message that includes an internet address where you can view the picture messages.

Pictures are scaled to fit the display area. Your device has a picture message viewer for playing messages. Incoming messages remain in the inbox until you delete them (when *Auto Erase Inbox* is set to off, see "Message Settings,"

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p. 38). When you save the picture message, you can use the image as wallpaper or use the sound as a ringtone, unless the content is protected by copyright. To check availability and to subscribe to the picture, video or voice messaging service, contact Verizon Wireless.

Note: Only devices that have compatible features can receive and display multimedia messages. The appearance of a message may vary depending on the receiving device.

Important: Exercise caution when opening messages. Messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device.

Write and Send a Picture, Video or Voice Message

- 1. Press the (ok) key (MENU), and press (m) Messaging.
- 3. Select a recipient from the contact list or enter the number.
- 4. To move to the *Text*: field, press the () key. Compose a message using the keypad.
- 5. Add multimedia contents.

To add a new picture using the camera, press the Right Soft key (Options), press () *Take Picture*, press the (or) key (TAKE), and press the Left Soft key (Save).
 - To add a sound clip, scroll down to the Sound: field. Press the Left Soft key (Sounds), scroll to the desired sound clip, and press the (○) key. To record a new sound clip, press () Record New, press the (○) key to begin recording, and press the (○) key (STOP) to stop recording. To select the new recording and return to the message, press the (○) key.



Picture, Video or Voice Messages

Video message

To add a video clip, scroll down to the Video: field. Press the Left Soft key (Videos), scroll to the desired video clip, and press the ($\frac{\circ}{\circ}$) key.

Voice message

To add a new voice clip to a voice message, press the Left Soft key (Record) to begin recording, press the (or) key (STOP) to end recording. The recorded voice clip is attached in *Voice*: field.

- 6. To add a name card in a picture message or voice message, scroll down to the *Name Card* field, and then press Left Soft key (Contacts).
- 7. To add a message title, scroll down to the *Subject:* field. Enter text (up to 80 characters) using the Alphanumeric keypad.
- 8. To send the message, press the (ok) key (SEND).

Picture, Video and Voice Message Options

To customize a new picture, video or voice message, press the Right Soft key (Options) when the cursor is in the *Text:*, *Picture:*, *Sound:*, *Name Card*, *Voice:*, or *Subject:* fields, and you may select from the following:

Preview – View your message.

Save As Draft – Save your message to the Drafts folder.

Add Quick Text – Insert text to your message (in Text: or Subject: field only). Add Slide – Add a slide to the message.

Priority Level – Set the priority level to *High* or *Normal*.

Remove Picture – Remove a picture from the message (if previously added, and when the cursor is in this field).

Remove Sound – Remove a sound file from the message (if previously added, and when the cursor is in this field).

Remove Slide – Remove slide file from the message (if previously added).

Cancel Message – Close the message without sending it. To save it in the Drafts folder, select Yes. To delete the message and exit, select No.

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Message Folders

Inbox

The device saves received messages in the Inbox folder. When you receive an incoming message, an alert is displayed. To immediately view the new picture, video or text message (if *TXT Auto View* is off), select *View Now*. If you select *View Later*, the new message notification icon is displayed.

The text (if *TXTAuto View* is on), picture or video message will be automatically displayed. For details, see "Message Settings," p. 38.

- 1. Press the (ok) key (MENU), and press () *Messaging*.
- Press () *Inbox.* The message list is displayed. Scroll to a message, and select from the following:

Reply – Send a *TXT Message*, *Picture Message*, *Video Message*, or *Voice Message* reply.

Reply w. copy – Send a reply which includes the original message text (text messages only).

Forward – Forward the message to another phone number, or email address or upload the message to Online Album.

Lock – Protect the message from being deleted.

Add To Contacts – Save the contact information to Contacts (if the recipient is not in the Contact List).

Erase Inbox - Delete all messages in your Inbox.

Sent Messages

The Sent folder stores text, picture, or voice messages that have been delivered to their recipients. The number of messages stored in the Sent folder is shown in brackets.

Erase – Delete the selected sent message (for picture messages with sound attached).

Lock – Protect the message from being erased.

Add To Contacts – Add the recipient to Contacts (if the recipient is not in the Contact List).

Draft Messages

The draft folder is used to store drafts of text, picture, or voice messages. The number of messages stored in draft folder is shown in brackets.

Voicemail

When you receive a new voicemail message, the device displays a voicemail notification.

Blogs

Message Settings

This menu allows you to define settings for messages sent or received on your device.

Entry Mode – Change the Default Entry mode for writing text to *Word*, *Abc*, *ABC*, *123*.

Auto Save Sent – Select whether to automatically save all sent messages to the Sent folder. To be asked every time to save a sent message, select Prompt.

Auto Erase Inbox – Select whether to automatically erase the oldest (unlocked) message from the Inbox when the device memory is full. If set to *Off*, you are prompted to delete messages from your Inbox when the memory is full.



Message Settings

Messaging Font Size – Select the character size of messages displayed in the Inbox, Sent and Drafts folders, and when composing a text message.

TXT Auto View – Select whether to display incoming text messages automatically. If set to *Off*, it will display a prompt message to select *View Now* or *View Later* when a message is received.

Pic-Video Auto Receive – Select whether to save incoming picture and video messages automatically. If set to *Off*, you can select *Reject* to refuse to receive the message.

Quick Text – View and edit Quick Text entries, which are short, prewritten messages that can be recalled and inserted into a text message. The gallery of preloaded and user-defined Quick Text entries is displayed. To add an entry, select New, enter the text, and the $(\)$ key. To erase a Quick Text entry, scroll to the entry, and select Erase.

Voice Mail # – Change the default speed dialing number for voicemail. Enter the new number, and press the (\circ) key.

Callback # – Change the default callback number. Enter the new number, and press the ($\[] \]$) key.

Signature – Create or edit text that is appended to each outgoing message. If you do not want to add a signature, select *None*. Select *Custom*, enter the signature text, and press the $(\[\] \alpha \])$ key.

- To assign a picture ID to the contact, scroll to the *Picture*: field, and press the Left Soft key (Set). To use an existing image as the picture ID for the contact, scroll to the desired image in the *My Pictures* folder, and press the (
 (c)) key.
- To assign a ringtone to the contact, scroll to the *Ringtone*: field, and press the Left Soft key (Set). Scroll to the desired ringtone, and press the (or) key.
- To add the secondary mobile phone number for the contact, scroll to the *Mobile 2*: field and enter a number.
- To add the fax number for the contact, scroll to the Fax: field and enter a fax number.
- To add the secondary email address for the contact, scroll to the *Email* 2: field and enter an Email address.
- 4. Press the (🔍) key (SAVE).

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Add Pauses

Calls to automated systems often require a password or account number. Instead of manually entering numbers each time, store the numbers to your contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- To add pauses, press the Right Soft key (Options), and press (□) Add 2-Sec Pause or (□) Add Wait, then enter additional digits.

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Backup Assistant

Backup Assistant is a wireless service that saves a copy of your phone's address book to a secure web site. If your phone is lost, stolen or damaged, Backup Assistant restores your saved address book to a new phone.

Contact groups help organize contact entries into categories, and allow you to search your contacts faster and send a message to all contacts in one or more groups.

A Bluetooth connection can be used to send images, gallery files, voice recordings, or to connect wirelessly to other devices using Bluetooth technology, such as computers. You can synchronize your device and your PC using Bluetooth connectivity.

Since devices using Bluetooth technology communicate using radio waves, your device and the other devices do not need to be in direct line-of-sight. However, the connection can be subject to interference from obstructions, such as walls, or other electronic devices.

This device is compliant with Bluetooth specification 2.1 supporting the following profiles: BPP (Basic Printing Profile), SPP (Serial Port Profile), HSP (Headset Profile), HFP (Handsfree Car Kit Profile), DUN (Dial-Up Networking), A2DP (Advanced Audio Distribution Profile), AVRCP (Audio/Video Remote Control Profile), AVCTP (Audio/Visual Control Transport Protocol), AVDTP (Audio/Visual Data Transport Protocol), FTP (File Transfer Profile), BIP (Basic Imaging Profile), PBAP (Basic Imaging Profile), and OPP (Object Push Profile for vCard and vCalendar).

To ensure interoperability between other devices supporting Bluetooth technology, use Nokia approved accessories for this model. Check with the manufacturers of other devices to determine their compatibility with this device.

Features using Bluetooth technology increase the demand on battery power and reduce the battery life.

There may be restrictions on using Bluetooth technology in some locations. Check with your local authorities or Verizon Wireless. For more information, see the Bluetooth Technology organization website: https://www.bluetooth.org/.

Security tips

- Operating the device in hidden mode is a safer way to avoid malicious software.
- · Do not accept Bluetooth connectivity from sources you do not trust.
- Alternatively, switch off the Bluetooth function. This does not affect other functions of the device.

Pair

To send or receive information via Bluetooth connectivity, you must pair with a recognized Bluetooth wireless device.

The audio playback setting lets you control if audio is played out from the speakerphone or earpiece. Select *Audio playback* and then *Automatic* to set the audio playback mode determined by phone settings.

Occasionally, your network may experience heavy traffic resulting in a fast busy signal when you dial. With automatic retry, your phone redials the number (the number of times is specified by the network) and notifies you when the network is available.

Call Settings

TTY Mode

A phone with TTY/TDD (teletype/telecommunication device for the deaf) support can translate typed characters to voice. Voice can also be translated into characters and displayed on the TTY. To attach a TTY enabling you to communicate with parties also using a TTY device.

HAC Mode

Whining or buzzing noise may occur when some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices, such as hearing aids.

One Touch Dial

You can use the one touch dial feature by pressing and holding the designated speed dial key. See "Speed Dials," p. 45.

You can use voice privacy feature to protect the privacy of your phone conversation from other callers placing phone calls on the same CDMA network.

DTMF Tones

Memory

You can monitor the amount of phone memory you are using for file storage.

This section describes how to access the voice commands, calculator, tip calculator, calendar, calendar preview, alarm clock, stopwatch, world clock, notepad, and converter.

Voice Commands

Voice commands transform your device into your own virtual personal assistant, letting you use your voice to make phone calls, look up contacts, and so on.

Before using voice services, note the following:

- Voice commands are language-dependent. They are not dependent on the speaker's voice.
- For language setting, see "Language," p. 62.
- Very short names are not accepted. Use long names, and avoid similar names for different numbers.

Note: Using voice commands may be difficult in a noisy environment or during an emergency, so you should not rely solely upon voice dialing in all circumstances.



Voice Commands

Tip: To quickly access the voice commands, in the idle screen, press and hold the voice command key (\mathbf{p}_{θ}) .

- 1. Press the (okey (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- Press (
 Tools, and then press (
 Desception) Voice Commands, and from the following:
- Call <Name or #> Say "Call" and then a name or a phone number from your Contact List. For example, "Call Tom Smith", "Call Tom Smith's mobile", or "Call 617 515 212".
- Send <MSG Type> Say "Send Message" and you are asked for the type of message. After choosing the message type, you are asked for the contact name or number.

If you say a full-sentence command, such as "Send text to Tom", you are asked to confirm the message and give the contact number. The corresponding message editor opens.

- Go To <Shortcut> Say "Go To" to open the list of shortcut options on your device and choose the shortcut you want. Or say a full command with the application name (for example, "Go To Contacts").
- Check <Item> Say "Check" and you are asked for a list of items. Or say "Check status" to hear all status information of your device, including phone status, voicemail, messages, number of missed calls, time and date, battery level, signal strength, and volume.
- Contact <Name> Say "Contact" and then a name from your Contact List to view information of the saved contact.
- *Redial* Say "Redial" to call the last dialed number.
- Play <Playlist> Say "Play All Songs" or say "Play" and then an individual playlist to play your songs.
- My Verizon Say "My Verizon" to access your Verizon Wireless account information.
- *Help* Say "Help" to see instructions on how to use these commands.

For detailed instructions on how to use each command, scroll to the command you want and then press the Left Soft key (Info).

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To adjust the settings of your voice commands, press the Right Soft key (Settings). For details, see "Voice Commands Settings," p. 61.

Calculator

Calculator allows you to perform simple mathematical calculations using your device.

- 1. Press the (ok) key (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ($[P_T]$) *Tools*, and then press ($[P_T]$) *Calculator*.
- 3. Press (Pre
- $\mbox{4. Enter the first number of the calculation using the Alphanumeric keypad. } \label{eq:alphanumeric}$
 - To change a number to a negative, press (P).
 - To insert a decimal point, press (
).
- 6. Enter the second number.
- 7. Press the (ok) key to solve your equation.

Note: This calculator has limited accuracy and is designed for simple calculations.

Tip Calculator

Tip calculator allows you to calculate tips.

- 1. Press the (💌) key (MENU), and press (📳) Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ([]) *Tools*, and then press ([]) *Calculator*.
- 3. Press () *Tip Calculator*.
- 4. Enter the amount of your bill using the Alphanumeric keypad.

Calendar

The calendar allows you to document your agenda and keep it convenient and easy to access. You can schedule events into the calendar and set your device to alert you with a reminder.

Add a New Event

- 1. Press the () key (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press () *Tools*, and then press () *Calendar*.
- 3. Scroll to the required event date, press the Left Soft key (Add), and then select from the following:
 - Enter the event title, start and end date, and time using the Alphanumeric keypad.

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- To set a tone, scroll to the *Tone* field, press the Left Soft key (Set), choose a tone, and press the (<u>k</u>) key.
- To turn vibrate on, scroll to the Vibrate field, press the Left Soft key (Set), choose an option, and press the () key.
- To set the alert time, scroll to the *Alert Time* field, press the Left Soft key (Set), choose an option, and press the (
- To set a reminder, scroll to the *Reminder* field, press the Left Soft key (Set), choose an option, and press the (
 key.
- To save the settings, press the (or) key (SAVE). The device will prompt you to turn on Calendar Preview. The date scheduled with events is highlighted in different color.

Delete an Existing Event

- 3. Scroll to the event date, and press the (K) key (VIEW).

Update an Existing Event

- 1. Press the (💌) key (MENU), and press (📳) Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press () *Tools*, and then press () *Calendar*.
- 3. Scroll to the event date, and press the (w) key (VIEW).
- 4. Scroll to the event entry you want to modify, and press the ((w) key (VIEW) again.
- Press the (ok) key (EDIT), edit the event entry fields you want to update, and press the (ok) key (SAVE).

Calendar Preview

Calendar preview reminds you the events of the current date.

- 1. Press the (ok) key (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- Press () Tools, press () Calendar Preview, and select from the following:
 - Home Screen To display the event information in idle screen, select On. To display in idle screen, select Off.

Alarm Clock

- Font Size To set the font size of an event, select Normal or Large.

Set an Alarm

- 1. Press the (K) key (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ($[\mathbb{P}]$) *Tools*, and then press ($[\mathbb{P}]$) *Alarm Clock*.
- 3. Scroll to *Alarm 1*, *Alarm 2*, and *Alarm 3*, and press the (<u>k</u>) key to select from the following:
 - Scroll left or right to activate the alarm in the Set on/Set off field.

When an alarm time is reached, the alarm tone sounds or your device vibrates, depending on the master volume settings.

Select *Snooze* to turn the alarm off and have it sound again after 10 minutes. Select *Dismiss* to turn off the alarm.

Stopwatch

The stopwatch can be used to measure elapsed time, such as for a sporting event. You can time up to ten records.

The stopwatch accuracy is not the same as that of a professional instrument. Therefore, Nokia advises against its use for official competitions or any other event in which a high-precision device would be required to establish exact times.

- 1. Press the (ok) key (MENU), and press (N) Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (,) *Tools*, and then press (,) *Stopwatch*.
- 3. Press the (🖂) key (START) to start a time.

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- Press the Left Soft key (Split) to time multiple events and mark the elapsed time for each event you are measuring. This option is only available while the timer is running.
- 5. Press the $(\bigcirc K)$ key (STOP) to stop the watch.
- 6. Press the Right Soft key (Reset) to reset the watch to zero.

World Clock

World clock allows you to determine the current time in another time zone or country.

- 1. Press the (or) key (MENU), and press () Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press () *Tools*, press () *World Clock*, and the world map is displayed.
 - To display the time of a city, scroll left or right on the world map to the desired city.
 - To view a list of cities, press the Right Soft key (Cities).
 - To turn daylight savings time On or Off for a city, select the city and press the Left Soft key (Set DST).

Notepad

Notepad allows you to add, read, edit, or erase notes.

- 1. Press the (\bigcirc) key (MENU), and press (\bigcirc) Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press () *Tools*, and then press () *Notepad*.

 - To view a note, scroll to a note, and press the (ok) key (VIEW).

 - To delete one note or all notes, scroll to a note, press the Right Soft key (Options) and select *Erase* or *Erase All*.
- 3. Press the (or) key.

USB Mass Storage

If a memory card is inserted in your device, you can use your device for USB mass storage.

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Section 15: Battery and Charger Information

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The battery intended for use with this device is BL-4C. Nokia may make additional battery models available for this device. This device is intended for use when supplied with power from the following chargers: AC-10U. The exact charger model number may vary depending on the type of plug. The plug variant is identified by one of the following: E, EB, X, AR, U, A, C or UB.

The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only Nokia approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Nokia approved chargers designated for this device. Use of an unapproved battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

If a battery is being used for the first time or if the battery has not been used for a prolonged period, it may be necessary to connect the charger, then disconnect and reconnect it to begin charging the battery. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

Unplug the charger from the electrical plug and the device when not in use. Do not leave a fully charged battery connected to a charger, since overcharging may shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). Extreme temperatures reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the connecting object.

Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explode. Batteries may also explode if damaged. Dispose of batteries according to local regulations. Please recycle when possible. Do not dispose as household waste.

Do not dismantle, cut, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, or shred cells or batteries. In the event of a battery leak, do not allow the liquid to come in contact with the skin or eyes. In the event of such a leak, flush your skin or eyes immediately with water, or seek medical help.

Do not modify, remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, or immerse or expose it to water or other liquids.

Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard. If the device or battery is dropped, especially on a hard surface, and you believe the battery has been damaged, take it to a service center for inspection before continuing to use it.


Use the battery only for its intended purpose. Never use any charger or battery that is damaged. Keep your battery out of the reach of small children.

Nokia Battery Authentication Guidelines

Always use original Nokia batteries for your safety. To check that you are getting an original Nokia battery, purchase it from a Nokia authorized service center or dealer, and inspect the hologram label using the following steps:

Authenticate hologram

- When you look at the hologram on the label, you should see the Nokia connecting hands symbol from one angle and the Nokia Original Enhancements logo when looking from another angle.
- 2. When you angle the hologram left, right, down and up, you should see 1, 2, 3 and 4 dots on each side respectively.



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Successful completion of the steps is not a total assurance of the authenticity of the battery. If you have any reason to believe that your battery is not an authentic, original Nokia battery, you should refrain from using it, and take it to the nearest Nokia authorized service center or dealer for assistance. If authenticity cannot be verified, return the battery to the place of purchase.

What if your battery is not authentic?

If you cannot confirm that your Nokia battery with the hologram on the label is an authentic Nokia battery, please do not use the battery. The use of a battery that is not approved by Nokia may be dangerous and may result in poor performance and damage to your device and its accessories. 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Care and Maintenance

Your device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The following suggestions will help you protect your warranty coverage.

- Keep the device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and all types of liquids or moisture can contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If your device does get wet, remove the battery, and allow the device to dry completely before replacing it.
- Do not use or store the device in dusty, dirty areas. Its moving parts and electronic components can be damaged.
- Do not store the device in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life
 of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the device in cold areas. When the device returns to its normal temperature, moisture can form inside the device and damage electronic circuit boards.
- Do not attempt to open the device other than as instructed in this guide.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the device. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards and fine mechanics.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the device.
- Do not paint the device. Paint can clog the moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Use a soft, clean, dry cloth to clean any lenses, such as camera, proximity sensor, and light sensor lenses.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the device and may violate regulations governing radio devices.
- Use chargers indoors.
- Always create a backup of data you want to keep, such as contacts and calendar notes.
- To reset the device from time to time for optimum performance, power off the device and remove the battery.



Care and Maintenance

These suggestions apply equally to your device, battery, charger, or any accessory. If any device is not working properly, take it to the nearest authorized service facility for service.

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Additional Safety Information

Small children

Your device and its accessories may contain small parts. Keep them out of the reach of small children.

Operating environment

This device meets RF exposure guidelines when used either in the normal use position against the ear or when positioned at least 2.2 centimeters (7/ 8 inches) away from the body. When a carry case, belt clip, or holder is used for body-worn operation, it should not contain metal and should position the device the above-stated distance from your body.

To transmit data files or messages, this device requires a quality connection to the network. In some cases, transmission of data files or messages may be delayed until such a connection is available. Ensure the above separation distance instructions are followed until the transmission is completed. Parts of the device are magnetic. Metallic materials may be attracted to the device. Do not place credit cards or other magnetic storage media near the device, because information stored on them may be erased.

Medical devices

Operation of any radio transmitting equipment, including wireless phones, may interfere with the functionality of inadequately protected medical devices. Consult a physician or the manufacturer of the medical device to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy or if you have any questions. Switch off your device in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Implanted medical devices

Manufacturers of medical devices recommend that a minimum separation of 15.3 centimeters (6 inches) should be maintained between a wireless device and an implanted medical device, such as a pacemaker or implanted cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the medical device. Persons who have such devices should:

 Always keep the wireless device more than 15.3 centimeters (6 inch) from the medical device when the wireless device is turned on.



Hearing aids

- Not carry the wireless device in a breast pocket.
- Hold the wireless device to the ear opposite the medical device to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn the wireless device off immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.
- Read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of their implanted medical device.

If you have any questions about using your wireless device with an implanted medical device, consult your health care provider.

Hearing aids

Some digital wireless devices may interfere with some hearing aids. If interference occurs, consult your service provider.

Warning: For hearing aid compatibility, you must turn off the Bluetooth connectivity.

Your mobile device model complies with FCC rules governing hearing aid compatibility. These rules require an M3 microphone or higher value. The M-value, shown on the device box, refers to lower radio frequency (RF) emissions. A higher M-value generally indicates that a device model has a lower RF emissions level, which may improve the likelihood that the device will operate with certain hearing aids. Some hearing aids are more immune than others to interference. Please consult your hearing health professional to determine the M-rating of your hearing aid and whether your hearing aid will work with this device. Setting for telecoil hearing aid users

This device includes a setting for direct connection to telecoil-equipped hearing aids. When both the telecoil hearing aid (T switch) and the phone telecoil are activated, using the device with the aided ear will provide a direct connection for audio through your hearing aid. The quality of sound depends on the type of hearing aid used. You should test the device with the telecoil setting activated to determine whether your audio performance improves. Using the telecoil hearing-aid setting consumes additional battery power.

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Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles such as electronic fuel injection systems, electronic antiskid (antilock) braking systems, electronic speed control systems, and air bag systems. For more information, check with the manufacturer, or its representative, of your vehicle or any equipment that has been added. Only qualified personnel should service the device or install the device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty that may apply to the device. Check regularly that all wireless device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly. Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the device, its parts, or accessories. For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that air bags inflate with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result. Using your device while flying in aircraft is prohibited. Switch off your device before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless teledevices in an aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, disrupt the wireless telephone network, and may be illegal.

Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your device when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Potentially explosive atmospheres include areas where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Switch off the device at refuelling points such as near gas pumps at service stations. Observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots, storage, and distribution areas; chemical plants; or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities and areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders. You should check with the manufacturers of vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) to determine if this device can be safely used in their vicinity.

Emergency calls

Important: This device operates using radio signals, wireless networks, landline networks, and user-programmed functions. If your device supports voice calls over the internet (internet calls), activate both the internet calls and the cellular phone. The device will attempt to make emergency calls over both the cellular networks and through your internet call provider if both are activated. Connections in all conditions cannot be guaranteed. You should never rely solely on any wireless device for essential communications like medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the device is not on, switch it on. Check for adequate signal strength.
- 2. Press the End key as many times as needed to clear the display and ready the device for calls.
- 3. Enter the official emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 4. Press the call key.

When making an emergency call, give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Your wireless device may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident. Do not end the call until given permission to do so.

Certification Information (SAR)

This mobile device meets guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure guidelines for mobile devices employ a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate or SAR. The SAR limit stated in the ICNIRP guidelines is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over 10 grams of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions with the device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. The actual SAR level of an operating device can be below the maximum

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value because the device is designed to use only the power required to reach the network. That amount changes depending on a number of factors such as how close you are to a network base station. The highest SAR value under the ICNIRP guidelines for use of the device at the ear is 0.70 W/kg.

Use of device accessories may result in different SAR values. SAR values may vary depending on national reporting and testing requirements and the network band. Additional SAR information may be provided under product information at www.nokia.com.

Your mobile device is also designed to meet the requirements for exposure to radio waves established by the Federal Communications Commission (USA) and Industry Canada. These requirements set a SAR limit of 1.6 W/kg averaged over one gram of tissue. The highest SAR value reported under this standard during product certification for use at the ear is 1.12 W/kg and when properly worn on the body is 0.61 W/kg.



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
