

Network services

To use the device you must have service from a wireless service provider. Many of the features require special network features. Your service provider can give you instructions and explain what charges will apply. Some networks may have limitations that affect how you can use network services. For instance, some networks may not support all language-dependent characters and services.

Get started

■ Insert and remove battery



Note: Always switch off the power and disconnect the charger and any other device before removing the cover. Avoid touching electronic components while changing the cover. Always store and use the device with the cover attached.

To insert the battery, complete the following:

 To remove the back cover of the device, press the release button on the top, and lift the back cover.



- Insert the gold-coloured contacts of the battery into the battery slot.
- Push down the other end of the battery to snap it into place.
- Align the back cover with the slots in the device, and press down the side tabs to until the cover is securely in place.





To remove the battery, complete the following:

- 1. Remove the back cover of the device.
- Insert your finger into the finger grip, and lift the battery from its compartment.
- 3. Close the back cover.




Insert UIM card

Keep all UIM cards out of the reach of small children.

For more information, contact your UIM card vendor.

- 1. Remove the battery.
- Insert the UIM card into the holder with the gold-coloured contacts facing down.

Insert microSD card

Your phone contains an internal memory of 30 MB or greater, and it has a microSD card slot located above the LIIM card slot.

Use only compatible microSD card approved by Nokia. Nokia uses approved industry standards for memory cards, but some brands may not be fully

compatible with this device. Incompatible cards may damage the card and the device and corrupt data stored on the card.

To insert the microSD card, complete the following:

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- Insert the card into the microSD card slot with the contact surface facing down until the small buldge appears.
- 3. Close the back cover.







Important: Do not remove the memory card in the middle of an operation when the card is being accessed. Removing the card in the middle of an operation may damage the memory card as well as the device, and data stored on the card may be corrupted.

Charge the battery

- Connect the charger to a wall outlet.




When the device indicates a full charge, disconnect the charger from the device, and then from the wall outlet.

You can use the device while it is charging. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take a few minutes before the charging indicator appears or before any calls can be made.

Switch your device on or off

To switch your device on or off, press and hold the power key for 2 seconds.



Get started



Warning: Do not switch on the device when wireless device use is prohibited or when it may cause interference or danger.

■Normal operation position

Your device has an internal antenna. Hold the device with the device pointed up.





Note: As with any radio transmitting device, avoid touching the antenna area unnecessarily while the antenna is transmitting or receiving. Contact with such an antenna affects the communication quality and may cause the device to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed and may reduce the battery life.



Access codes

The lock code supplied with the device helps to protect your device against unauthorised use by turning on keyguard by default. The default code is 1234. Please see "Security settings", p. 60.





■ Active standby mode

Active standby is the default standby mode.

The active standby displays a list of selected device features and information that you can directly access, such as application shortcuts, information from the radio and media player, calendar events and a customisable note.

To switch active standby on or off, select **Menu** > Settings > Display > Active standby > Active standby mode > On or Off.


■ Standby mode and shortcuts

When the phone is ready for use, and no character has been entered, the phone is in the standby mode.

To select a profile from the standby mode, press the end key, and select the preferred profile.

Shortcuts in the standby mode

- To see the dialled numbers, press the call key once.
- To activate the radio function, press and hold the * key for at least three seconds.
- To access the internet, press and hold 0 key for at least three seconds.
- To toggle between Silent and General profile, press and hold # key for at least three seconds.

 To enter into VNET home page, press the middle selection key.

Your device

■ Keyguard

The keyguard function locks the keypad automatically after the device is idle for a certain amount of time. Receiving a call is still available when the keypad is locked. After the call, the keypad is automatically locked. Only Emergency Call can be made when the keypad or the device is locked. The default delay for automatic key lock is 1 minute. To change this delay, see "Phone settings", p. 57.

 To unlock the keypad, select Unlock, and press * within 2 seconds. To lock the keypad, select Menu, and press * within 5 seconds.

Data transfer

Install Nokia PC Suite on your PC before using the USB data cable to transfer data and files between your device and a compatible PC. See "Connecting with a USB data cable", p. 59.

■ Flight profile

With the flight profile, all radio functions are turned off and you can still have access to offline games, calendar, and phone numbers. When the flight profile is on, \Rightarrow is shown on the screen.

3. Call functions

Make a call

- Enter the phone number, including the country code and area code if necessary.
- 2. Press the call key to call the number.

Answer and reject a call

- To answer an incoming call, press the call key or the middle selection key.
- To reject the call without answering, press the end key.

Make a conference call

1. Call the first participant.

- When the first call is answered, press the left selection key to select Options > New call, and call the next participant.
- When the second call is answered, press the call key again.
- 4. To end the conference call, press the end key.

■ Loudspeaker

To use your device handsfree during a call, select Loudsp.



Warning: Do not hold the device near your ear when the loudspeaker is in use because the volume may be extremely loud.

To deactivate the loudspeaker during a call, select Handset. The loudspeaker is deactivated when a call ends or a headset is connected.

Text entry

To set the writing language while entering text (for example, when writing messages), select **Options** > *Writing language*, and the desired language.

■ Chinese input

Chinese input is available when the writing language is set as Simplified Chinese.

Use pinyin

The pinyin symbols are printed on the number keys.

- Press the number key once for each pinyin symbol you want to input (use "v" for "u").
- Press the key 1 repeatedly until you get the desired tone mark. Search for different matches.

- 3. If necessary, press * repeatedly to highlight the desired pinyin combination.
- 4. Scroll to the desired Chinese character, and select OK.

Use strokes

1. In the standard stroke order, press the number key to input the strokes.



Tips: If you are not sure which stroke to use, press the key 6 to enter a wildcard stroke. A question mark appears in the input area to represent that stroke.

2. Scroll to the desired Chinese character, and select OK.

■ English input

You can enter text using traditional text input \searrow , and predictive text input \trianglerighteq . To switch between upper and lower case, press the # key.

Traditional text input

- To enter a letter, press a number key, 2 to 9, repeatedly until the desired character appears.
- To enter a space, press 0.
- To add a number, press and hold the desired number key.
- To get a list of special characters, press *.

Predictive text input

 To activate predictive text input, select Options > Prediction options > Prediction > On

- To set the prediction type, select Prediction type > Normal or Word suggestions.
- If the displayed word is the one you want, press 0, and start writing the next word.
- To change the word, press * repeatedly until the word you want appears.
- If? is displayed after the word, the word is not in the dictionary. To add the word to the dictionary, select Spell, enter the word (using traditional text input), and select Save.
- To get a list of special characters, press *.

Navigate the menu

The device functions are grouped into menus. Not all menu functions or option items are described here.

- To exit the current level of menu, select Exit or Back.
- To return to the standby mode directly, press the end key.

You can control whether your phone menu is displayed as *List*, *Grid* or *Grid* with *Labels*. By default, the main menu displays in *Grid*.

6. Messaging



The messaging services can only be used when they are supported by your network or service provider.



Important: Exercise caution when opening messages. Messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device or PC.

■ Text messages

Create and send

- Select Menu > Messaging > Text messages > Create message.
- Enter the recipient's phone number in the To: field. To retrieve a phone number from the recently used recipients list or your contacts, select Add > Recently used or Contacts, and

Messaging

- select the recipients. To send to a distribution list, select **Add** > *Distribution list*, and then choose a distribution list created in your device.
- Compose a message using the keypad in the Message: field and select Send to send the message. To use a template, select Options > Use template.



Note: The message sent icon or text on your device screen does not indicate that the message is received at the intended destination.

■ Multimedia messages

Multimedia messaging service (MMS) is a network service.

Create and send

- Select Menu > Messaging > MMS messages > Create message.
- Enter one or more phone numbers in the To: field, or to retrieve a phone number from a memory, select Add > Recently used, Contacts, Distribution list. or Album.
- Enter the text or add objects in the subject field and message field, and select Send to send the MMS.

The wireless network may limit the size of MMS messages. If the inserted picture exceeds this limit, the device may make it smaller so that it can be sent by MMS.

Read and Reply

with a percentage indicates that an MMS is downloading. When the download is completed, a

notification prompts. Select **Show** to view the message or select **Exit** to view it later.

- To view a saved message in the standby mode, select Menu > Messaging > MMS messages > Inbox and select the message.
- Select Options > Reply to reply to a single recipient, or select Options > Reply to all to reply to all recipients.

MMS settings

To edit your multimedia message settings, select Menu > Messaging > MMS messages > Message settings and from the following options:

Save sent messages — to the sent items folder

Message validity — to set the validation period of the message

Delivery reports - send it to your device

Default slide timing — define the default time interval between slides in MMS

Allow MMS receptn. — receive or block all the MMS Incoming MMS msgs. — select Retrieve, Retrieve manually, or Reject your incoming MMS

Allow adverts — receive or reject advertisements

Access points — to choose the matched access point

Distribution lists

- To create a new distribution list, in the standby mode, select Menu > Messaging > Distribution lists > New list or Options > Create new list to create additional lists.
- To use, rename, or modify a distribution list, highlight the distribution list, and select Options
 Send message, Rename list, Clear list, or Delete list.

Voice messages

Voice mail is a part of network service. A voice mailbox will be given to you with a corresponding number by your service provider.

To listen to the voice messages, select **Menu** > Messaging > Voice messages > Listen to voice msgs.

Browser messages

Browser messaging is a part of network service.

Select Menu > Messaging > Browser messages > Connect to browse your messages.

7. Log



The log feature stores missed, received, and dialled calls.

- To view logs, select Menu > Log and the variety.
- To view the contacts of a sent messages, select
 Menu > Log > Msg. recipients.
- To delete a log, select Menu > Log > Clear log lists and the item.
- To view the duration of a call or all calls, select Menu > Log > Call duration.

Reset the timers: select *Clear timers*, enter your lock code.



Note: The actual time invoiced for calls by your service provider may vary, depending on network features, rounding off for billing, and so forth.

8. Contacts



Create new contacts

Select Menu > Contacts > Names > Add (if the contact list is empty) or Options > Add new contact.

Search contacts

In the standby mode, select Menu > Contacts > Names > Options > Quick search (displayed when the phone language is set to Simplified Chinese) or Search.

Settings

Select Menu > Contacts > Settings and Memory in use, Contacts view, Name display, Font size, and Memory status.

Groups

To arrange the names and phone numbers into caller groups, select Menu > Contacts > Groups.

Speed dials

- Select Menu > Contacts > Speed dials, and scroll to a speed dial slot.
- select Assign to assign a phone number to a number key, 2 to 9.

Business card

You can send and receive contact information from a compatible device that supports the vCard standard as a business card.

To send a business card, search a contact and select **Details > Options >** Send business card.

9. VNET



Mobile internet asscess

Select **Menu** > *VNET* to log onto China Telecom's VNET homepage.

The browser configuration is done by your service provider. Contact your service provider if you have problems.

VNET browsing

Your phone has a built–in browser to browse the VNET information.

Calling Secretary — dial the voicemail number of Best Tone secretary

My Subscription — check the services you subscribed or unsubscribe the services you have subscribed

Phone Service Guide — view customer service information, such as customer hotline and web address

13. Gallery



To manage images, video clips, music files, themes, graphics, tones, recordings, and received files, select Menu > Gallery > Images, Video clips, Music files, Themes, Graphics, Tones, Recordings, or Received files.

14. Media



Camera

Your device supports an image capture resolution of up to 1600 x 1200 pixels.

The default format for pictures is .jpg format.

To capture an image, select Menu > Media > Camera > Capture. The picture is saved in Gallery > Images by default and it can also be saved in the microSD card.

To send the saved photo, select **Options** > *Send*.

Video

To set the quality of your video clips, select Menu > Media > Video > Options > Settings > Video clip quality > High, Normal or Basic.

Media

- To record a video clip, select Menu > Media > Video > Record.
- To zoom in or out, press the scroll key right or left.

The video clips are saved as .3qp format by default.

Radio

The FM radio depends on an antenna other than the wireless device antenna. A compatible headset or accessory needs to be attached to the device for the FM radio to function properly.



Warning: Listen to music at a moderate level. Continuous exposure to high volume may damage your hearing. Do not hold the device near your ear when the speaker is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

To listen to the radio, do the following:

- Connect a headset to the device.
- Select Menu > Media > Radio, or press and hold the * key for at least 3 seconds in the stanby mode.

If the headset is not connected, the *Radio* will automatically turn off after 3 minutes.

Voice recorder

- To record a speech or a sound, select Menu > Media > Voice Recorder.
- To start to record, select .
- To pause the recording, select \square .
- To end the recording, select .
- To access the voice record, select Menu > Gallery > Recordings.
- To listen to the latest voice record, select Options
 Play last recorded.

Media

 To send the last voice record, select Options > Send last recorded.

■ Equaliser

Select Menu > Media > Equaliser.

- To activate a set, scroll to one of the equaliser sets, and select Activate.
- To view, edit or rename a selected set, select
 Options > View, Edit or Rename.

■ Media player

- To open the media player, select Menu > Media > Media player > Go to media player.
- To listen to a song or play a video clip, browse through All songs, Playlists, Artists, Albums, Genres, Videos, and select the middle selection key.

- To download a song from the web in the media player or media menu state, select Options > Downloads and select a download site.
- To update the music library in the media player or media menu state, select Options > Update library.

To create a playlist, do the following:

- Select Playlists > Create playlist, and enter the name of the playlist.
- Add songs or video clips to the list, and Select Done to save the playlist.

To play the tracks on an audio accessory with Bluetooth, select **Options** > *Play via Bluetooth*.

The media player supports MP3, AAC, AAC+, and eAAC+ format. You can also transfer files from the computer to your device with Nokia PC Suite. Please see "Connecting with a USB data cable", p. 59.

Media

Your device can receive an incoming call when playing music. The music stops when you answer the call. After the call is complete, press the middle selection key to restart the music.



Warning: Listen to music at a moderate level. Continuous exposure to high volume may damage your hearing. Do not hold the device near your ear when the speaker is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

Navigation key icons — display the icons of the scroll key shortcuts when active standby is set to off

Screen saver - choose a screen saver

Backlight time-out — adjust the time length of the backlight off

To set the tone of the device, select Menu > Settings > Tones and from the available features.

Date and time

To assign other phone functions from a predefined list to the scroll key, select **Menu** > *Settings* > *My shortcuts* > *Navigation key*.

Connecting with a Bluetooth device

This device is compliant with Bluetooth Specification 2.1 + EDR supporting the following profiles: HFP, A2DP, OPP, FTP, AVRCP. To ensure interoperability between other devices supporting Bluetooth technology, use Nokia approved accessories for this model. Check with the manufacturers of other devices to determine their compatibility with this device.

Security settings

Select Menu > Settings > Security, you can change the lock code, and set your phone to request the code.

Network

The network menu allows you to customise the roaming call ringing tone and the way your device chooses a network in or out of your primary or home network. Your device is set to search for the most effective network by default.

The menu options you see in your device are based on your service provider's network. The network determines which options actually appear in the device menu. For more information, check with your service provider.

Select Menu > Settings > Network and from Set mode, Access points, Gateway settings, Roam call ring. Tone, or Service change tones.

Network services

Select **Menu** > Settings > Network serv. and from the following options:

Call divert — divert incoming call to another phone number

Call waiting — notify by a beep during an ongoing call, press the call key to switch between calls.

Settings

Network feature sett. — activate network services using feature codes received from your network operator

■ Restore factory settings

To reset settings to the default values, select **Menu** > Settings > Rest. factory sett.

Phone details

You can view device-related details. In the standby mode, select Menu > Settings > Phone details and select from User details, Version details, System details, and Icon details.

 To open the calendar, select Menu > Organiser > Calendar

Organiser

- To view a particular date, select Options > Go to date. Enter the date, and press OK.
- To add a note to a specific date, highlight the date and select Options > Make a note > Reminder, Meeting, Call, Birthday, or Memo.
 - The day with appointments appears in bold font.
- To send a note to another compatible device, select from the day view Options > Send note.
- To use lunar calendar, complete the following:
 - Set the phone language as Chinese. Please see "Phone settings", p. 57.
 - Select Menu > Organiser > Calendar >
 Options > Lunar calendar. To view the lunar information, search for Lun. fest. or Solar item.

 To convert between gregorian date and lunar date, select Options > Gregorian to lunar or Lunar to gregorian and enter the date.

Select Settings to view more options.

Calculator

The function of calculator includes adds, subtracts, multiplies, divides, and the square root.

To do a calculation, select **Menu** > *Organiser* > *Calculator*, and the following:

- Enter numbers with keypad
- Select # for a decimal point
- Select Options > Add, Subtract, Multiply, Divide, Square, Square root, or Change sign for operators.
- · Select Equals to obtain result
- Select Clear to clear numbers, and select and hold it to erase the equation.

Dictionary

In *Dictionary*, you can look up a Chinese word for English translation, and look up an English word for Chinese translation.

- 1. Select Menu > Organiser > Dictionary.
- 2. Switch to the desired input mode if necessary.
- 3. Enter the Chinese or English word.
- Scroll to the desired word in the display list of words, and select it to view the translation.

To look up synonyms or antonyms of an English word, select **Options** > *Synonyms* or *Antonyms*.

To view the translation of the previous or next word in the displayed list of words, scroll left or right.

Battery and charger information

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The battery intended for use with this device is BL-4C 860 mAh Li-lon battery. Nokia may make additional battery models available for this device. This device is intended for use when supplied with power from the following chargers: Nokia AC-8C. The exact charger model number may vary depending on the type of plug. The plug variant is identified by one of the following: E, EB, X, AR, U, A, C or UB.

The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only Nokia approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Nokia approved chargers designated for this device. Use of

an unapproved battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

If a battery is being used for the first time or if the battery has not been used for a prolonged period, it may be necessary to connect the charger, then disconnect and reconnect it to begin charging the battery. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

Unplug the charger from the electrical plug and the device when not in use. Do not leave a fully charged battery connected to a charger, since overcharging may shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

Battery and charger information

Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). Extreme temperatures reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. To transmit data files or messages, this device requires a quality connection to the network. ■ Vehicles

■ Certification information (SAR)

This mobile device meets guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines.
