

Do not cover the area above the touch screen, for example, with protective film or tape.



## Insert the UIM card and battery

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

- 1. With the back of the device facing you. lift up the back cover with your nail from the right side of your device.
- 2. Insert your finger into the finger grip, and lift the battery from its compartment.
- 3. Make sure that the contact area is facing down, and insert the UIM card into the card slot.
- 4. Align the battery contacts with those on the device, and press down on the other end of the battery.





5. Insert the tabs at the top of the cover into the slots in the device, and press down on the other end of the back cover.



## ■ Insert the memory card

Use only compatible microSD cards approved by Nokia for use with this device. Your device supports microSD cards that have a capacity of up to 16 GB. Nokia uses approved industry standards for memory cards, but some brands may not be fully compatible with this device. Incompatible cards may damage the card and the device and corrupt data stored on the card.

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- Make sure that the contact area is facing down, and insert the microSD card into the card slot.



3. Replace the back cover.



Important: Do not remove the memory card in the middle of an operation when the card is being accessed. Removing the card in the middle of an operation may damage the memory card as well as the device, and data stored on the card may be corrupted.

## ■ Charge the battery

Your battery has been partially charged at the factory. If the device indicates a low charge, do the following:

#### Get started

- 1. Connect the charger to a wall outlet.
- 2. Connect the charger to the device.
- When the device indicates a full charge, disconnect the charger from the device, then from the wall outlet.

You do not need to charge the battery for a specific length of time, and you can use the device while it is charging. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made. You can also use USB data cable for charging.

■ Switch your device on or off Press and hold the power key.



## ■ Set the time zone, date and time

When you switch on your device for the first time, you are asked to set the time and date. Fill in the fields, and select Save.

To access date and time settings later, see "Date and time", p. 37.

## ■ Stylus

Some functions, such as handwriting recognition, are designed to be used with a stylus. The pen stylus is located at the left side of the device





Important: Use only a stylus approved by Nokia for use with this device. Using any other stylus may invalidate any warranty applying to the device and may damage the touch screen. Avoid scratching the touch screen. Never use an actual pen or pencil or other sharp objects to write on the touch screen.

#### Access codes

The access code helps to protect your phone against unauthorized use. The default lock code is 1234. You can change the code, and set the device to request the code. Keep the new code secret and in a safe place separate from your device. If you forget the code and your device is locked, your device will require services. Additional charges may apply, and all the personal data in your device may be deleted. For more information, contact a Nokia Care point or your device dealer.

To define the security settings for your device, select Menu > Settings > Security.

## ■ Lock the keys and touch screen

The keyguard locks the keys and the touch screen to prevent accidental presses.

To lock or unlock the keys and the touch screen, slide the lock switch on the side of the device.

To lock the keys and the touch screen automatically when no keys are pressed for a certain length of time, in the home screen, select Menu > Settings > Phone > Automatic keyguard > On, and enter the desired delay time.

#### ■ Touch screen actions

Use the touch screen with your finger or with a stylus (if available).

## Tap and double-tap

To open an application or other element on the touch screen, you normally tap it with your finger or the stylus. To zoom a web page while surfing on the internet, you must tap it twice.

#### Select

In this user documentation, opening applications or items by tapping them once is called "selecting". If you need to select several items in a sequence, the display texts to select are separated by arrows. For example, to select Menu > Settings, tap Menu, and then tap Settings.

## **Drag**

To drag, place your finger or the stylus on the screen, and slide it across the screen. For example, To scroll up or down on a web page, drag the page with your finger or stylus.

## **Swipe**

To swipe, slide your finger or the stylus quickly left or right on the screen. For example, when viewing an image, to view the next or previous image, swipe the image left or right, respectively.

#### Flick

To flick, place your finger on the screen, slide it quickly across the screen, then quickly lift your finger. The content of the screen will continue scrolling with the speed and direction it had at the moment of release. To select an item from a scrolling list and to stop the movement, tap the item.

## Touch screen light

The touch screen light is turned off after a period of inactivity. To turn the screen light on, tap it.

If the touch screen and keys are locked, tapping the screen does not turn the screen light on. To unlock the screen and keys, slide the lock switch.

## ■ Normal operating position

Your device has an internal antenna. Use the device only in its normal operating position.





Note: Your device may have internal and external antennas. As with any radio transmitting device, avoid touching the antenna area unnecessarily while the antenna is transmitting or receiving. Contact with such an antenna affects the communication quality and may cause the device to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed and may reduce the battery life.

- Close applications and data connections, for example, your Bluetooth connection, when not in use.

- Set the device to enter the power saver mode after the minimum period of inactivity if available in your device.
- Deactivate unnecessary sounds, such as key tones.

## 2. Your device

#### ■ Home screen

Home screen is your starting point where you can collect your important contacts or application shortcuts.

## Interactive display elements

- Clock To open the alarm clock, tap the clock.
- 2. Calendar To open the calendar application, tap the date.
- 3. Contacts bar To add or use the contact, tap the corresponding icon.
- 4. Music player To run the music player, tap the corresponding icon.
- 5. Shortcuts To access a certain application, tap the corresonding icon.
- 6. Go to Press the left selection key to guickly access a certain feature.
- o. Go to Fress the left selection key to quickly access a certain reatur
- 7. Menu Press the middle selection key to access the main menu.
- 8. Web Press the right selection key to access mobile internet service.



## Start using contacts bar

To start using the contacts bar and add your contacts to the home screen, in the home screen, select 
and the desired contact from contacts list.

## Activate and personalise the home screen

To switch the home screen on, select Menu > Settings > Display > Home Screen > Home screen mode > On.

To customise the home screen view, select Menu > Settings > Display > Home Screen > Personalise view.

## ■ Flight profile

Use the flight profile in radio sensitive environments – on board aircraft or in hospital. The flight profile lets you access to such applications as offline games, calendar, media player and more without connecting to the wireless network.



Warning: With the flight profile you cannot make or receive any calls, including emergency calls, or use other features that require network coverage. To make calls, you must first activate the device function by changing profiles. If the device has been locked, enter the lock code. If you need to make an emergency call while the device is locked and in the flight profile, you may be also able to enter an official emergency number programmed in your device in the lock code field and select 'Call'. The device will confirm that you are about to exit flight profile to start an emergency call.

## 3. Call functions

## Proximity sensor

Your device has a proximity sensor. To prevent accidental selections, the touch screen is disabled automatically during calls when you place the device next to your ear.

#### ■ Make or answer a call

- In the home screen, enter the phone number, including the country code and area code, if necessary.
- 2. Press the call key.
- To end the call or to cancel the call attempt, press the end key.To answer a call, press the call key. To reject an incoming call, press the end key.

## Loudspeaker



Warning: Do not hold the device near your ear when the loudspeaker is in use because the volume may be extremely loud.

To activate the loudspeaker during a call, select Loudsp.. To deactivate the loudspeaker, select Normal.

## ■ In-call voice recording

To recording a phone call, during the call, select Options > Record call and the record icon ■. To stop recording, select the stop icon ■. The file is saved in the Recordings folder in Gallery.

## 4. Write text

The input methods described in this section may not be applicable to third-party applications, for example, dictionary.

When the slide is open, you can enter texts with traditional keypad or handwriting mode. When the slide is closed, you can enter texts with virtual keypad or handwriting mode. You may tap the text input field to activate the method used last time. To switch from traditional or virtual keypad to handwriting mode, select . To switch from handwriting mode to traditional or virtual keypad, select .

This phone supports simplified Chinese and English input methods. To switch writing languages or input methods, when writing text, do one of the following:

- For virtual keypad, tap # repeatedly till the desired input method is displayed.
- For traditional keypad, to switch writing language, press and hold #, and select Writing language and the desired language; to change input method, press # repeatedly till the desired input method is displayed.

Not all the methods may be available in all circumstances. Always check the indicator to see which input method is in use.

## ■ Handwriting

Write legible, upright characters on the text input area. Only one character can be recognised at a time. To configure text input settings for the touch screen, see "Touch input", p. 37.

- 1. Input method indicator
- 2. Text input area
- 3. Close handwriting mode
- 4. Traditional/Visual keypad input

To move the cursor, tap the desired position on the screen.



To clear the character before the cursor, tap \_\_\_ . To enter a symbol, tap \_\_? and select the desired special character.

To insert a space, insert a line feed, clear the character, or repeat the character before the cursor, follow the gestures in the below table.

## ■ Virtual keypad

With the virtual keypad, you can enter characters like you would with a traditional physical keypad.

- 1. Text input area
- 2. Alphanumeric keypad
- 3. Handwriting mode
- 4. Input menu
- 5. Text input indicator
- 6. Symbol key
- 7. Arrow kevs
- 8. Backspace or Cancel key
- 9. Close virtual keypad

To move the cursor to a certain position, tap the desired position directly or use the arrow keys. To clear a character, move the cursor right behind it, and tap the backspace key.

To set predictive input on or off, select  $\equiv$  > Prediction on or Prediction off.

## ■ Traditional keypad

## Pinyin input method

The pinyin symbols are printed on the number keys. You only need to press a key once, regardless of the position of the symbol on the number key. The phone makes logical combinations of the pinyin symbols.

To input a character using the pinyin input method:

- Press the number key once for each pinyin symbol you want to input (use "v" for "u").
- 2. Press 1 repeatedly until you get the desired tone mark.
- If necessary, press \* repeatedly to highlight the desired pinyin combination.
- 4. Scroll to the desired Chinese character, and select OK.

### Stroke input method

The strokes constituting Chinese characters have been divided into five categories: horizontal, vertical, left-falling, dot, and turning. Each category corresponds to a number key from 1 to 5, respectively.

To use the stroke input method:

 In the standard stroke order, press the number keys to input the strokes.



**Tip:** if you are not sure which stroke to use or which category it belongs to, press **6** to substitute that stroke, then continue with the subsequent strokes. A question mark appears in the input area to represent that stroke.

2. Scroll to the desired Chinese character, and select OK.

## Phrase input

You may input a phrase of no more than seven Chinese characters at a time.

- Press the relevant number keys to enter the syllable or pinyin initial, or first strokes for the first character of the phrase.
- Press 0 to enter a separator; or, if in the pinyin mode, press 1 repeatedly to enter the tone mark of the character you want.
- 3. Enter the syllable or pinyin initial, or first strokes of the next Chinese character.
- 4. Repeat step 2 and 3, if necessary, to enter the syllables or pinyin initials, or first strokes of all the characters in the phrase.
- If in the pinyin mode, press \* repeatedly, if necessary, to highlight the pinyin combination you want.
- 6. Scroll through the candidate list to the desired phrase, and select OK.

Not all phrases are stored in your phone. To create a phrase of no more than seven characters, when no input symbol or prediction list is displayed, select Options > User phrases > Add. When the database becomes full, the new phrase replaces the phrase that has not been accessed for the longest time.

Use a separator to separate pinyin strings for syllables of different characters or the strokes of different characters.

When you enter a separator, the phone predicts characters or character strings that can form a phrase with the possible candidates of the combination of pinyin or stroke strings and separators, if any, that you have entered.

## Set predictive English input on or off

When writing in English, press and hold #, and select Prediction on or Prediction off.

## **Traditional English input**

Press a number key (2 to 9) repeatedly until the desired character is displayed.

If the next letter is located on the same key as the present one, wait until the cursor appears, or scroll right, and enter the letter.

Not all characters available under a number key are printed on the key. The available characters depend on the selected Writing language.

The most common punctuation marks and special characters are available under the number key 1. To access the list of special characters, press \*.

## Predictive English input

Predictive English input is based on a built-in dictionary to which you can also add new words

- Start writing a word using the keys 2-9. Press each key only once for one letter.
- 2. To confirm a word, scroll right or add a space.

If the word is not correct, press \* repeatedly until the desired word is displayed, and confirm it.

If the? character is displayed after the word, the word you intended to write is not in the dictionary. To add the word to the dictionary,

select Spell. Enter the word using traditional text input, and select Save.

To write compound words, enter the first part of the word, and scroll right to confirm it. Write the second part of the word, and confirm the word.

3. Start writing the next word.

## Tips for writing text

The following functions may also be available for writing text:

- To insert a number when no input symbol is displayed, press and hold the desired number key.
- To insert a space when there is no candidate or prediction list displayed, press 0.
- To enter a special character after you have finished entering a word or character, press \*.
- To end the Chinese character prediction, select Back, or press the relevant keys to start entering new text.

## 5. Menu functions

The device functions are grouped into menus. Not all menu functions or option items are described here.

In the home screen, select Menu, and tap the desired menu item. To exit the current menu level, select Exit or Back. To return to the home screen, press the end key.

To provide a visual representation of your current position in the menu structure, a scroll bar may be displayed on the right side of the screen.

## Messaging

You can only use messaging services supported by your network or service provider.

## Write and send a text message

- Select Menu > Messaging > Text messages > Create message.
- Enter the recipient's phone number in the To field. To retrieve a phone number from the recently used recipient list or contacts list, select Add > Recently used or Contacts, and the recipient. To send to a contact group, select Add > Contact groups and the desired group.
- 3. Write the message in the Message field, and select Send.

## Write and send a multimedia message

Only devices that have compatible features can receive and display multimedia messages. The appearance of a message may vary depending on the receiving device.

The wireless network may limit the size of MMS messages. If the inserted picture exceeds this limit, the device may make it smaller so that it can be sent by MMS.

- Select Menu > Messaging > Multim. Messages > Create message.
- 2. Select Options > Add object, a multimedia folder, and a file.
- 3. To add more files, select Options > Add another object.
- 4. In the To field, enter the phone number or blog site address. To retrieve a phone number from the recently used recipient list or contacts list, select Add > Recently used or Contacts, and the recipient. To send to a contact group, select Add > Contact groups and the desired group. To send to a blog site, select Add > Blog site and the desired site.
- 5. Enter the text for the message, and select Send.

## Read and reply to a message

When you receive a message, a notification and  $\square$  are displayed.

- To read the message, select Show, or to dismiss the notification, select Exit.
- 2. Select Reply and the desired option.
- 3. Enter your reply, and select Send.

### Text message settings

Select Menu > Messaging > Text messages > Message settings.

Select Sending options and from the following:

- Priority Send text messages with normal priority or as urgent.
- Delivery reports Receive confirmation when your message is delivered.
- Message validity Set the period of validity of a messaging request.

Select Other settings and from the following:

- Save rcvd. text msgs. Select where to store received messages.

- Delivery report reject Stop your device sending delivery reports of received messages.
- Message validity Set the period of validity of a messaging request.
- Access points Select access points for MMS.

## Voice messages

The voice mailbox is a network service to which you may need to subscribe. For more information, contact your service provider.

To listen to your voice messages, select Menu > Messaging > Voice messages > Listen to voice msgs., or, in the home screen, press and hold 1.

#### Groups

With groups, you can send a message to several people at the same time.

To add a new group, select Menu > Messaging > Groups > Add (if the list is empty) or Options > Add new group to create another group. Enter the details of the group, and select Save.

#### **Browser messages**

With Browser (network service), you can access web services offered and updated by service providers.

Select Menu > Messaging > Browser msgs..



**Important:** Exercise caution when opening messages. Messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device or PC.

### Save and edit names and numbers

To add a new contact, select Menu > Contacts > Names > Add (if the contacts list is empty) or Options > Add new contact. Enter the name and the phone number, and select Save.

To add details, set a speed dial, or add to a group, select Menu > Contacts > Names, the desired contact, Details > Options, and the desired option.

#### Search for a contact

Select Menu > Contacts > Names > Search, and enter the first characters, or letters of the name you are searching for.

When doing search, to change the input method, press #.

## Personal information management (PIM)

You can back up contacts in your device to China Telecom's PIM website and restore from the website when needed (network service).

Select Menu > Contacts > PIM.

## Speed dials

To activate or deactivate speed dialling, see "Call", p. 40.

To assign a phone number to a speed dialling slot, select Menu > Contacts > Speed dials, an empty speed dialling slot, and Assign. Enter the phone number you want to assign to the slot, or select Search to retrieve the number from your contacts list.

## ■ Log

To view the information of your calls, messages, data, and positioning, select Menu > Log and the approperiate option.

- Backlight time-out Set the length of time after which the backlight is switched off.
- Home screen Activate and personalise the home screen.

## **Touch input**

Select Menu > Settings > Touch input and from the following:

- Screen calibration The screen is calibrated at the factory. If it is necessary to recalibrate the screen, follow the instruction.
- Vibration feedback Set the vibration strength.
- Handwriting settings Set the writing language, handwriting recognition speed and the colour of texts writen.

### Date and time

## Connectivity

# ■ Gallery

Manage multimedia files and received files. These files are stored in the phone memory or on a memory card, and may be arranged in folders.

Digital rights management (DRM) protected content comes with an associated activation key that defines your rights to use the content.

To view the list of folders, select Menu > Gallery.

#### Media

## Camera and Video

You can capture images and record video clips with the built-in 5.0 - megapixel camera.

To capture an image or record a video clip, in the home screen, select Menu > Media > Camera or Video, and select Capture or Record.

The image captured is saved in the Image folder of Gallery in the JPEG format. The video clip recorded is saved in the Video clips folder of Gallery in the 3GP format.

To adjust the camera zoom level, press the volume keys up or down.

To capture another image or record another video clip, select Back. To send the image or video clip, select Send and the desired sending method.

## Media player

The media player supports the following audio formats: MIDI, MP3, AAC, QCELP, AMR-NB, WMA, AAC+, and eAAC+; and the following video formats: MPEG4, H.263, and H.264.



**Warning:** Listen to music at a moderate level. Continuous exposure to high volume may damage your hearing. Do not hold the device near your ear when the loudspeaker is in use, because the volume may be extremely loud.

To play an audio or video playback, select Menu > Media > Media player, a multimedia folder, and the desired playback.

To adjust the volume level, use the volume keys of the device.

Operate the music player with the virtual keys on the display.

To pause playback, tap []; to resume, tap . To fast-forward or rewind, tap and hold for . To go to the next item, tap . To return to the beginning of the item, tap . To skip to the previous item, tap . twice.

To set an automatic switch-off timer within 24 hours, select Options > Auto off timer, enter the time, and select OK.

You may have to refresh the music library after you have updated the song selection in your device. To add all available items to the library, select Menu > Media > Media player > Options > Update library.

To close the media player, press and hold the end key.

#### Radio

The FM radio depends on an antenna other than the wireless device antenna. A compatible headset or accessory must be attached to the device for the FM radio to function properly.

To search for a station, tap and hold or . To go to the previous or next saved station, tap or .

- Stations View or select from the list of saved radio stations.
- Set frequency Enter the frequency of the desired radio station.
- Auto off timer Set an automatic switch-off timer within 24 hours.
- Loudspeaker or Headset Listen to the radio using the loudspeaker or headset.
- Settings Set FM broadcasting as mono or stereo, select to automatically search for a better RDS frequency for the station if the frequency level becomes low, and more.

### Voice recorder

Record speech, sound, or an active call, and save them in Gallery.

To start recording, select Menu > Media > Voice recorder and the record icon ■. To pause recording, select the pause icon ■. To stop recording, select the stop icon ■.

The equaliser enhances the sound quality when using the music player.

To use a preset setting when playing music, select Menu > Media > Equaliser, an equaliser set, and Activate.

#### Alarm clock

Select Menu > Organiser > Alarm Clock.

To set the alarm, enter the alarm time, and select and Save.

To set your device to alart you on selected days of the week, select Settings, set Repeat as On, and select days under Repeat days.

To select the alarm tone or set the radio as the alarm tone, select Settings > Alarm tone. If you select the radio as an alarm tone, connect the headset to the device

To set the length of the snooze period, select Snooze time-out and enter the time.

When the alarm sounds, to postpone the alarm, select Snooze; to deactivate the alarm, select Stop.

#### Calendar

To open the calendar, select Menu > Organiser > Calendar.

#### Menu functions

To switch between month, week, and to-do note view, select Options > Month view, Week view, or Go to to-do list.

To go to a specific date in the calendar view, select Options > Go to date.

To access more options while viewing the calendar, select Options.

#### Lunar calendar

To use the lunar calendar, the device language must be Chinese.

To view lunar details of the highlighted day, in the month view, select Options > Lunar calendar.

To search for a lunar festival, in the lunar day view, select Lunar festival, enter the Gregorian year of the Spring festival, and select the desired lunar festival.

In Dictionary, you can look up a Chinese word for English translation, and look up an English word for Chinese translation.

All accessories for Nokia devices are supplied in an elegant sales package. An accessory bought without a separate package is not an original Nokia accessory.

How to buy Nokia original accessories:

  - For information on the nearest authorised retailer for Nokia accessories, check with a Nokia original accessory distributor.
  - \* When you are buying an accessory, always ask the dealer to issue a separate invoice listing the price and model number, which is helpful in safeguarding your own rights.

Practical rules about accessories

- Keep all accessories out of the reach of small children.
- When you disconnect the power cord of any accessory, grasp and pull the plug, not the cord.
- Check regularly that accessories installed in a vehicle are mounted and are operating properly.

 Installation of any complex car accessories must be made by qualified personnel only.

Why use original accessories?

As key components of your handset, batteries and chargers play a critical role in making sure the handset is operating properly and safely. As shown by our long-term customer surveys and after-sales services, handsets fail in many cases by using unapproved accessories, especially unapproved batteries and chargers.

Dangers of using unapproved batteries and chargers

- Short lifetime, with charging and discharging times noticeably less than those of original batteries.
- Consequent much shorter lifetime of the handset, unstable power supply that prevents the handset circuit from functioning properly, which causes lasting damages.
- Poor performance and reliability of the handset, undermined voice quality and frequent breakdown.
- Potential burning or explosion that endangers consumer's safety.

Benefits of using Nokia original accessories

- Adequate safety.
- High quality after-sales maintenance and services that are available to original accessories only.
- Nokia warranty does not apply to handset failures attributable to the use of non-original Nokia accessories.

False: Handset battery is a simple product that combines a group of linked cells within a single package.

True: A number of high-tech designs and high quality raw materials are necessary for a handset battery to provide stable and lasting performance. A battery manufactured in a slipshod way differs from an original product on process, design, and raw material considerably, hence dramatic difference in performance and safety.

False: All accessories with the Nokia trademark are original ones.

True: Nokia original accessories are supplied in an elegant sales package (complying with national package regulations), and each battery carries a hologram label. It is recommended that consumers are aware of counterfeit Nokia accessories on the market. In particular, some dealers might remove the original battery from the supplied handset, which violates our distribution policies and infringes on consumer's rights.

False: Despite low quality, counterfeit battery is much cheaper and is worthwhile even if it requires frequent replacement.

True: Unapproved batteries and chargers are not only of short lifetime and poor performance, but will noticeably undermine the handset's performance and reduce its lifetime. It is also deprived of comprehensive after-sales maintenance and repair. Most important, unapproved batteries and chargers pose safety threats to consumers. Losses in these regards far exceed the savings on price. In fact, with inferior raw materials and irregular designs, some counterfeit batteries cost less than 1/10 of original products.

# 7. Battery and charger information

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The battery intended for use with this device is BL-5F Li-lon battery. This device is intended for use when supplied with power from the following charger: AC-8C. The exact charger model number may vary depending on the type of plug. The plug variant is identified by one of the following: E, EB, X, AR, U, A,C or UB.

The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only Nokia approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Nokia approved chargers designated for this device. Use of an unapproved battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

If a battery is being used for the first time or if the battery has not been used for a prolonged period, it may be necessary to connect the charger, then disconnect and reconnect it to begin charging the battery. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

Unplug the charger from the electrical plug and the device when not in use. Do not leave a fully charged battery connected to a charger, since overcharging may shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). Extreme temperatures reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the connecting object.

Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explode. Batteries may also explode if damaged. Dispose of batteries according to local regulations. Please recycle when possible. Do not dispose as household waste.

Do not dismantle, cut, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, or shred cells or batteries. In the event of a battery leak, do not allow the liquid to come in contact with the skin or eyes. In the event of such a leak, flush your skin or eyes immediately with water, or seek medical help.

Do not modify, remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, or immerse or expose it to water or other liquids.

Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard. If the device or battery is dropped, especially on a hard surface, and you believe the battery has been damaged, take it to a service centre for inspection before continuing to use it.

Use the battery only for its intended purpose. Never use any charger or battery that is damaged. Keep your battery out of the reach of small children

# ■ Battery information

This section provides information about battery charging times with the travel charger (AC-8C), and talk and standby times. The information in this section is subject to change. For more information, contact your service provider.



Important: Battery talk and standby times are estimates only and depend on signal strength, network conditions, features used, battery age and condition, temperatures to which battery is exposed, use in digital mode, and many other factors. The amount of time a device is used for calls will affect its standby time. Likewise, the amount of time that the device is turned on and in the home screen will affect its talk time.

## **Charging times**

The charging time depends on the charger used. Charging a BL-5F battery with the AC-8C charger takes approximately 3.5 hours while the device is in the home screen.



## ■ Nokia battery authentication guidelines

# Care and maintenance

Your device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The following suggestions will help you protect your warranty coverage.

- Keep the device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and all types of liquids or moisture
  can contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If your device does
  get wet, remove the battery, and allow the device to dry completely before
  replacing it.
- Do not use or store the device in dusty, dirty areas. Its moving parts and electronic components can be damaged.
- Do not store the device in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.

# Additional safety information

#### Small children

Your device and its accessories may contain small parts. Keep them out of the reach of small children

## Operating environment

This device meets RF exposure guidelines when used either in the normal use position against the ear or when positioned at least 1.5 centimetres (5/8 inch) away from the body. When a carry case, belt clip, or holder is used for body-worn operation, it should not contain metal and should position the device the above-stated distance from your body.

To transmit data files or messages, this device requires a quality connection to the network. In some cases, transmission of data files or messages may be delayed until such a connection is available. Ensure the above separation distance instructions are followed until the transmission is completed.

Parts of the device are magnetic. Metallic materials may be attracted to the device. Do not place credit cards or other magnetic storage media near the device, because information stored on them may be erased.

#### Medical devices

Operation of any radio transmitting equipment, including wireless phones, may interfere with the functionality of inadequately protected medical devices. Consult a physician or the manufacturer of the medical device to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy or if you have any questions. Switch off your device in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas

instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

#### Implanted medical devices

#### Hearing aids

#### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles such as electronic fuel injection systems, electronic antiskid (antilock) braking systems, electronic speed control systems, and air bag systems. For more information, check with the manufacturer, or its representative, of your vehicle or any equipment that has been added.

Only qualified personnel should service the device or install the device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty that may apply to the device. Check regularly that all wireless device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly. Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the device, its parts, or accessories. For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that air bags inflate with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Using your device while flying in aircraft is prohibited. Switch off your device before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless teledevices in an aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, disrupt the wireless telephone network, and may be illegal.

## ■ Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your device when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Potentially explosive atmospheres include areas where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Switch off the device at refuelling points such as near gas pumps at service stations. #### ■ Emergency calls



Important: This device operates using radio signals, wireless networks, landline networks, and user-programmed functions. ### Certification information (SAR)

This mobile device meets guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure guidelines for mobile devices employ a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate or SAR. The SAR limit stated in the ICNIRP guidelines is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over 10 grams of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions with the device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. The actual SAR level of an operating device can be below the maximum value because the device is designed to use only the power required to reach the network. The highest SAR value under the ICNIRP guidelines for use of the device at the ear is 0.70 W/kg, which is in compliance with the requirement from the National Standard GB 21288–2007.
