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

T300 PHONE OVERVIEW



USING THIS GUIDE

Your dual band/dual mode T300 phone operates on PCS 800 MHz digital/analog and 1900 MHz digital networks. Digital systems provide improved voice quality as well as security and privacy. Dual mode means that if you travel to an area without digital service, your phone will transfer to an analog system with no gap in your connection.

Certain features included in this guide called Network Services are supplied by wireless service providers. Before you can activate or use any of these Network Services, you must subscribe to the services from your home service provider. For a full list and explanation of Network Services, please ask your service provider.

One of the most versatile features of the T300 phone are the softkey functions. They provide immediate access to the actions you are most likely to do next, depending on what you are currently doing. If you are on a call, the Options softkey brings you directly to options such as muting the microphone or entering DTMF tones without fumbling through menus. Softkey actions and labels change with each new screen.





GETTING STARTED

ATTACHING THE BATTERY


- 1 Position the battery onto the phone as shown.
- Push down the opposite end of the battery onto the phone until the battery catch 'clicks' shut. Check that the battery is securely in place



CHARGING THE BATTERY

Note: The battery must be fully charged before using the phone for the first time. To reach full capacity, charge and discharge the new battery three times before use. To charge the battery, follow procedure below. To fully discharge the battery, leave the phone on until you hear a warning tone and the **Low Battery!** warning appears.

Connect the AC Adapter to the phone as shown.



- 1 Make sure the battery is properly installed on your phone.
- 2 Connect the AC Adapter to the socket at the base of the phone.
- 3 Connect the AC Adapter to a standard 120 volt outlet. The battery level indicator first flashes during charging.
- 4 Disconnect the AC Adapter when the Battery Full! message displays.

When the phone is off, battery charging is indicated by **Charging...** message. The LED light will be red. When charging is finished, **Battery Full!** displays and the LED light will change to green.

When the phone is on, charging is indicated by the battery icon flashing 1-2-3 bars continuously. When charging is completed, the battery icon will show three solid bars. If a call is received during charging, the LED light will flash green rapidly.

If the phone is used while charging, the charging time will be longer.

LOW BATTERY WARNING


When the battery power falls to its lowest level, the message **Low Battery!** displays and a low battery warning tone sounds.

If you are on a call, end the call and turn off the phone by pressing and holding down (4). Recharge the battery as described or replace it with a charged one.



REMOVING THE BATTERY

- 1 Ium the phone off. Push up and hold the battery catch.
- 2 Lift the end of the battery up and away from the catch and the phone. Release the catch.



BATTERY USE AND SAFETY INFORMATION

When the operating time (standby and talk time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.


- It is normal for batteries to become warm during charging.
- Do not leave batteries connected to a charger longer than necessary, overcharging will shorten battery life. True for Lithium Ion?
- Disconnect battery chargers from the power source when not in use.
- Do not leave the phone in a closed car during hot summer or cold winter conditions. The phone may temporarily not work with a hot or cold battery.
- Batteries may explode if discarded into a fire.
- Avoid putting the batteries into contact with metal objects which may short circuit the battery terminals (e.g. keys, paper clips, coins, chains etc).
- Do not drop or subject the batteries to strong physical shocks.
- If the battery terminals become soiled, clean them with a soft cloth.
- Old batteries must be returned to the place of purchase or to a battery recycling center. Do not dispose of old batteries together with household waste.

CHANGING THE FACEPLATE

Before changing the faceplate always turn off the phone and disconnect from any charging device or car kit.


REMOVING THE FACEPLATE

- Insert a small blunt instrument, such as a paper clip, into the slot provided and gently but firmly lift up one end of the faceplate.
- 7 Take hold of the raised end of the faceplate and carefully pull up, undipping it from the phone. Gently slide the faceplate downward. The faceplate will unhook from the phone and lift away.



REPLACING THE FACEPLATE

- 1 Place the front faceplate hooks into the hook slots at the top of the phone.
- Slide gently upward.
- 3 Press the faceplate down firmly, clipping it into position.



Do not use excessive force when changing the faceplate. Avoid bending the faceplate.

Do not leave in direct sunlight.

Always use the phone with the faceplate attached.

Do not clean the phone with alcohol, strong chemicals or solvents. Wipe it only with a soft, slightly dampened cloth. Read the **Care and Maintenance** instructions on page 19.


BASIC PHONE OPERATIONS

TURNING ON THE PHONE

- Press and hold O. A picture animation displays and a turn-on tone sounds.
- 2 If the phone is locked, Phone Locked will display. Enter the 3-digit Lock Code
 - > See pages 46 and 56 for more details on Lock Codes.

STANDBY SCREEN

When you turn on your phone, a picture animation displays and a turn-on tone sounds, then the name of the network and/or service provider appears. Signal strength, battery level and Digital System (if available) icons appear. The **Quiet** and **KeyLock** softkey functions appear as well.

Press (a) to go to your Phone Book (see page 36).

Press (b) to go to the phone Main Menu (see page 27).

Press (c) to go to volume control (see page 23).

To set time and date, see page 45.

MAKING A CALL

- 1 Enter the telephone number you wish to dial. Correct any mistakes by pressing. Clear @ Press and hold this key to erase the entire entry.
- 2 Press (c) to dial (send) the number
 - > Extend the antenna fully when calling for best results.

To store the dialed number in the Phone Book, press **Store** (a) before pressing (b) to connect the call.

While the call is connecting, the dialed number displays. If the number matches a Phone Book entry, the name displays instead of the number. After connecting, the call timer displays.

If the call does not connect and Auto Redial is activated, the phone will attempt to dial again (see page 39 for details).

MUTING

While talking, to mute the microphone, press **Mute** softkey. On the screen, the **a** icon appears. To turn the microphone back on, press **UnMute** softkey.

VOLUME ADJUSTMENT

During a call, press 🖱 or 🎧 to adjust your caller's voice. Press and hold to continuously increase or decrease volume. The normal conversation screen returns after 3 seconds or press the right softkey.

CONVERSATION OPTIONS

While talking, press **Options** softkey to send **AutoDTMF** tones, use the **Silent Scratch** pad, or **Mute** the microphone. Press to access the Main Menu. If offered by your service provider, press to send a hook-flash request. See **Conversation Options** on page 22 for details.

Answering a CALL

The ringer alerts you to an incoming call and the LED light flashes green. The caller's name and number are displayed if they are stored in your Phone Book. Press the right softkey to mute ring tone.

To answer the call,

Press (C) or any key except End key or the softkeys.

QUIET MODE

The **Quiet** softkey allows you to silence the ringer, turn off DTMF touch tones, and silence any Alert tones with one touch of a key. Use this when entering a meeting or a theater, for example. See page 22 for details.

ENDING A CALL

Press () to end a call while in Conversation Mode If you are in the Menus, the () key will first exit you to the conversation screen.

Press it again to end the call.

KEYPAD LOCK

When Keypad Lock is activated, it prevents accidental key presses or calls being made when the phone is carried in a pocket, briefcase or handbag. Keypad Lock is suspended during incoming calls and resumes when the call ends. Emergency calls can still be made.

To activate Keypad Lock,

Press KeyLock (*), plus (#). The screen will show 🖨 To deactivate Keypad Lock,

Press UnLock (*), then press #

TURNING OFF THE PHONE Press and hold 🗹

A picture animation displays and a turn-off tone sounds (if Silent Mode is not activated). If the keypad is locked, you must unlock it first before turning off the phone.

NETWORK MESSAGES

A Network Message screen will appear when you have missed an incoming call, received a voice message, or received a text message. An alert tone will also play for voice and text messages. If you do not want to view or hear the message at once, press Exit (to go to the standby screen. The appropriate icon will remain on top of the screen to remind you.

- 1 To view the message, press Select (•).
- If more than one Network Message appears, use 🕥 to scroll to the desired message type and press Select (*) to view the message.

SAFETY INFORMATION

EXPOSURE TO RADIO FREQUENCY SIGNALS

Your wireless handheld portable telephone is a low power radio transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and also sends out radio frequency (RF) signals.

In August 1996, the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for hand-held wireless phones. These guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies:

*ANSI C95.1 (1992) *NCRP Report 86 (1986) *(CNIRP (1996)

Those standards were based on comprehensive and periodic evaluations of the relevant scientific literature. For example, over 120 scientists, engineers, and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industry reviewed the available body of research to develop the ANSI Standard (C95.1).

The design of your phone complies with the FCC guidelines (and those standards).

Your phone has been tested and meets the limits for radio frequency (RF) exposure set by the FCC for normal handheld use next to the ear or worn on the body using a Mitsubishi brand belt clip accessory specified for this phone, and used as intended. Operation of the phone in other situations such as in shirt pockets or non-Mitsubishi brand belt clips or holsters, or operation with the back of the phone closer than 13 mm (0.51") to the body, have not been tested. Therefore operation of the phone in non-tested situations may not meet the limits for RF exposure set by the FCC and must be avoided.

ANTENNA CARE

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna.
Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

PHONE OPERATION

NORMAL POSITION: Hold the phone as you would any other telephone with the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

^{*}American National Standards Institute; National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements; International Commission on Non-Jorizing Radiation Protection

EFFICIENT OPERATION: For your phone to operate most efficiently, do not touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

DRIVING

Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless telephones in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. Also, if using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving driving safely is your first responsibility.
- · Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from RF signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

<u>Pacemakers</u>

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six (6") inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference
- If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, turn your phone OFF immediately

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider (or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives).

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

<u>Vehicles</u>

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Turn your phone OFF in any facility where posted notices so require.

AIRCRAFT

FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while in the air. Switch OFF your phone before boarding an aircraft.

BLASTING AREAS

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone OFF when in a "blasting area" or in areas posted "Turn off two-way radio." Obey all signs and instructions.

POTENTIALLY EXPLOSIVE AREAS

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include fueling areas such as gasoline stations; below deck on boats; fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities; vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders; and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

FOR VEHICLES EQUIPPED WITH AIR BAGS

An air bag inflates with great force. DO NOT place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

CARE AND MAINTENANCE

This telephone is the product of advanced engineering, design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Do not expose the phone to any extreme environment where the temperature or humidity is high.
- Do not expose or store in cold temperatures. When the phone warms up after power on, to its normal temperature, moisture can form inside where it may damage the electrical parts.
- Do not attempt to disassemble the phone. There are no serviceable parts inside that you can replace.
- Do not expose the phone to water, rain or liquids. It is not waterproof.
- Do not abuse this phone by dropping, knocking or violent shaking.
 Rough handling can damage it.
- Do not clean the phone with strong chemicals or solvents. Wipe it
 only with a soft, slightly dampened cloth.
- Do not place the telephone near computer discs, credit or travel cards or other magnetic media. The information contained on discs or cards may be affected by the phone.
- Do not connect incompatible products. The use of third party equipment or accessories, not made or authorized by Mitsubishi Wireless Communications Inc., may invalidate the warranty of your phone and may be a safety risk.
- Do not remove the labels. The numbers on it are important for service and other related purposes.
- Contact an authorized service center if a defect is noticed.

GENERAL FEATURES

DIALING STORED NUMBERS

Any number stored in the phone's memory can be recalled to the display and dialed.

...from the Phone Book

- 1 Press (i) to enter the Phone Book list
- Press Q or O to scroll to the desired number.
- Press () to dial the number.
 - > See Phone Book, page 36.

...from the Last Numbers Dialed List

The last 10 numbers you have dialed are stored in the Call Logs.

- 1 Press (C) to display the Last Numbers Dialed list.
- 2 Press or to scrall to the desired number.
- 3 Press () to dial the number.

...from the Call Logs List

The last 10 numbers dialed, the last 10 received call numbers, and the last 10 unanswered call numbers are stored in the Call Logs.

- 1. Press () to enter the Main Menu. Select Call History.
- 2 Select Call Logs.
- 3 Select Last Dialed Numbers, Received Call List, or Unanswered Call List.
- 4 Press G or 今 to scrall to the desired number
- 5 Press (C) to dial the number

...from SMS text messages

The call-back number on an SMS message header or a phone number included within an SMS message can be dialed directly.

- Press 🕞 to enter the Main Menu. Select Text Messages
- Select InBox
- 3 Press (a) or (a) to scroll to the desired message header
- Press and hold (C) to dial the number.
 - > See Text Messages, page 31.

...from the Memo Pad

- 1 Press n to enter the Main Menu. Select Office Tools.
- Select Memo Pad, then select Read Memos.
- 3 Press (a) or (b) to scroll to the desired memo entry.
- 4 Press and hold to dial the number.
 - > See Memo Pad, page 53.

SPEED DIALING

Speed dialing is an easy way to dial stored numbers. You can choose up to 8 numbers and names for speed dial on your phone with two exceptions: Key 1 is fixed as the Voice Mail Center number and Key 9 will dial an emergency number.

Use either of the following two methods.

- 1 Press and hold the digit key; or
- 2 Press the digit key, then press 🕓
 - > See Speed Dialing on page 38 to set up Speed Dial numbers.
 - > Emergency Key 9 option can be changed. See Emergency Key 9 on page 39.

EMERGENCY CALLS

When Emergency Key 9 is enabled in the Phone Book menu, you can speed dial an emergency number with one key.

To speed dial Emergency Key 9,

Press and hold (a), or press (b) then press (c).

Emergency call speed dialing can be enabled or disabled via the Main Menu. The default setting is Yes (enabled). See **Emergency Key 9** set up on page 39.

Emergency call dialing will override **Auto Lock** and any call restriction setting.

If Keypad Lock is turned on, dial 9-1-1 and press (4) key. Press and hold 9 or press 9 and Send key to speed dial the emergency call will **not** work when Keypad Lock is turned on.

Some service providers may offer a second emergency number instead of 911 as speed dial Key 9. Contact your service provider for details.

QUIET MODE

This instant quiet feature silences all incoming ring tones, turns off DTMF touch tones and silences alert tones with one touch of a key. Use when entering a meeting, library, movie or other places where you do not want your phone to ring.

To turn on or off Quiet Mode,

- Press Quiet (*) at the standby screen. The sounds are immediately turned off.
- 2 When Quiet Mode is turned On, displays. The left softkey is labeled Restore.
- 3 To turn off Quiet Mode, press Restore (*). 🚳 disappears.
 - Quiet Mode overrides current tone settings but does not change them.

To turn on or off Quiet Mode from the menu,

- 1 Press () and select Settings
- Select Tone Settings.
- 3 Select Quiet Mode
- 4 Select On or Off. Press Select ⊙ to activate.

To quickly turn off the ring of an incoming call,

Press Quiet (°).

CONVERSATION OPTIONS MUTE/UNMUTE

To mute or unmute your phone's microphone during conversation,

- To mute, press Mute (•). The microphone turns off.
 displays.
- 2 To unmute, press UnMute (*). The microphone turns back on and (*) disappears
 - > The microphone can also be muted by pressing **Options (9)** and selecting Mute.

ADJUSTING VOLUME

Shortcut to adjust volume during conversation,

- 1 Press 🕾 or 🔾 key. A bar graph appears.
- 2 Press (*), or (*) key again or press and hold the desired key for continuous volume increase or decrease. Press OK (*)
 - > Volume cannot be adjusted to zero. Use Mute 💽 instead.



To adjust the volume of various sounds from the menus,

- 1 press () and select Settings.
- 2 Select Tone Settings, then select Volumes
- 3 Select Ring Valume, Key Volume or Speech Valume.
- 4 Press up or down arrow to adjust sound level from 0 to 7 (Key Volume) or 1 to 8 (Ring or Speech Volume).
- 5 Press OK (to activate

If you are not in conversation while adjusting volumes, a sample tone will sound after each level change to judge the effect of the change.

SENDING DTMF TOUCH TONES

You can send Dual Tone Multi-Frequency (DTMF) touch tones to communicate with computerized systems, such as answering machines, voice mail or banking-by-phone. These tones can also be used for credit card calls or long distance calling cards.

A DTMF touch tone is a digit or string of digits that produces tone signals. DTMF strings can also be stored in the Phone Book. Refer to **Storing Numbers** on page 36.

MANUALLY

To send DTMF touch tones directly from the keypad during conversation,

Press the required DTMF keys (0-9, * and # keys). The tones will be heard in the earpiece and sent immediately.

AUTOMATICALLY

To send a consecutive string of DTMF tones during conversation,

- 1 Press Options @ and select AutoDTMF
- Enter the DTMF numbers by using the keypad or from a number stored in the Phone Book, Press () to enter the Phone Book Press Clear 🕞 to erase a digit or press and hold Clear (-) to erase the entire entry
- 3 Press OK (*) to send the tones. After the tones have been sent the normal conversation screen displays.

SILENT SCRATCHPAD

Use the phone as a memo pad to store numbers during a conversation.

- 1 Press Options (•) and select Silent Scratch On
- Enter numbers you wish to store. Tones will not be heard.
- 3 Press Options (-) and select Store Number
- Number will appear in Phone Book entry screen. Press OK (•) or edit if needed.
- 5 Enter name and press OK (=). Screen will confirm the entry.

CALL WAITING

If your service provider offers Call Waiting, then your phone can receive a second call while one is in progress.

- When a second call comes in during a conversation, the display will be similar to the incoming call display and a short beep sounds. See picture below
- To answer the second call and put the first call on hold, or to switch between calls, press 🕓
- To end the first call, press (). If you do not want to answer the second call, do not press any key.

> Any Key Answer and Auto Answer will not answer a second call.

If offered by your service provider, use the 🕓 key as the Hook-Flash button to switch between active calls or initiate a three-party conference call.

DIALING OPTIONS PAUSE DIALING

Telephone numbers and a sequence of DTMF touch tones can be entered in the display or stored in memory together if they are separated by a "Pause." At each Pause, press () to transmit the DTMF string.

To insert a Pause,

- 1 Enter the desired telephone number.
- 2 Press (i) and select Insert Pause.
- 3 You will be returned to the entry screen with the P character now at the end of the telephone number;
 Shortcut: Press and hold ← for 1 second to insert P.
- 4 Enter DTMF key sequence you want to send
- 5 Repeat step 2, 3, and 4 to add more DTMF strings.
- 6 Press () to dial the number
- 7 After the call connects, listen for the instruction to send the DTMF tones. Press \(\mathbb{O}\) at that point to transmit each DTMF string. The DTMF digits are displayed on screen.

SECRET PAUSE DIALING

Use Secret Pause Dialing to store secret numbers such as credit card numbers or passwords in the Phone Book which number may be used to access a DTMF system such as Voice Mail, banking by phone, or credit card calls. Secret Pause displays the DTMF digits as ???? on screen to keep the digits hidden.

To insert a Secret Pause,

- 1 Enter the desired telephone number.
- 2 Press () and select Insert Secret Pause.
- 3 You will be returned to the entry screen with the SP character now at the end of the telephone number.
 Shortcut: Press and hold ® for 1.5 seconds to insert. SP.
- 4 Enter DTMF key sequence you want to send
- 5 Repeat step 2, 3, and 4 to add more DTMF strings.
- 6 Press (c) to dial the number.
- 7 After the call connects, listen for the instruction to send the DTMF tones. Press (L) at that point to transmit each DTMF string. The DTMF digits are displayed as ???? on screen.

1+ DIALING MODE

To add 1 to a telephone number in order to make a long distance call,

- While the desired telephone number is displayed, press.

 and select. 1+Dialing.
- The digit 1 is automatically added to the beginning of the telephone number.
- 3 Press (C) to dial the number.

EDITING PHONE NUMBERS

There are two ways to correct or edit digits while entering phone numbers. One way is to press **Clear** (a) to erase each digit from the end of the entry until you reach the incorrect digit. An easier way is to use the Edit dialing option.

To edit a telephone number,

- 1 While the desired telephone number is displayed, press (is and scroll down to select Edit
- You will be returned to the entry screen with a line cursor flashing at the last digit.
- 3 Use () to move the cursor to the incorrect digit.
- 4 Press Clear (to erase the digit before the cursor.
- 5 Enter a new digit which will be inserted at the cursor. You can also press it to move the cursor right if needed.
- 6 Press OK (*) to store the number in the Phone Book.
 Press (c) to dial the number.

MENU SYSTEM


The easy-to-use menu system is where all of the phone's features and functions settings are stored. Access the menu system by using the Express Key and the softkeys. You can also access features and services you have requested from your service provider.

Access to the Menus

- Press ((labeled MEM) to go to all stored telephone numbers in the Phone Book.
- Press (labeled M£NU) to enter the Main Menu at any time.
- All other functions and features are then selected by pressing ③ or Select ②.
- To return to a previous menu, press ① or Exit ④.
- To exit from the menus to the standby screen, press and hold **Exit** (?) or if no call is in progress, press (~).

The display window at the Main Menu screen appears as either of these:

ENTERING TEXT

To store names in the Phone Book, use the Calendar, use the Memo Pad or write SMS text messages, you will enter and edit text in the display.

In the upper right corner of the display, the icon indicates lower case text mode and the icon indicates upper case text mode is active. Text and numbers can be now be entered or edited directly from the keypad.

- To type each letter of a word, press the desired key one, two
 or three times, corresponding to the letter's position on the
 key.
- To enter a space, press ①.
- 3 To enter a number, press and hold the key with the desired number.
- 4 If two characters are on the same key, wait for the cursor to advance or press () or () before pressing the same key again.
- 5 Press Clear to erase a character. Press and hold Clear to delete the entire entry.
- 6 Press ② to toggle between lower and upper case. Press ② to change case for the next character only. Press and hold ③ to toggle and lock the new case mode.
- Use ①, ②, ② or ② to locate the cursor in the text to insert characters or make corrections.

To enter 'Card' in the Memo Pad,

- 1. Press (3), then press (2) three times to select Office Tools.
- 2. Select Memo Pad, then select Write New Memo.
- 3. Press ® to go to upper case mode, icon is displayed. Press D briefly three times, C appears in the display.
- Wait for the cursor to move or press to move to the next position, notice that is displayed. Press briefly once, a appears.
- 5. Press @ briefly three times, r appears.
- Press
 briefly once, d appears. The word Card will now be in the display.
- 7. Press 🖒 to exit from this example.

ENTERING SPECIAL CHARACTERS

Shortcut for entering punctuation marks,

Press ① from one to seven times to enter space . . @ ? ! 1
> Press and hold ① to enter digit 1.

Shortcut for entering bracket symbols,







TEXT MESSAGES

SMS text messaging is a Network Service that enables you to send or receive short text messages to or from other PCS phones with the same capability. The messages are not sent directly to the other mobile phone but go via your service provider's message center. You can also use the OutBox to store, edit, and forward messages as well as saving any of the numbers they contain.

The message length capacity of the phone is 255 characters, but it may be less depending on the network's capability.

Some service providers support SMS or email text messages receipt only. In this case, the menu options that will appear are InBox, Alert Tone, and Storage Free.

READING A NEW SMS OR EMAIL MESSAGE

An audio alert and Network Message screen signal the arrival of an SMS text message.

- 1 Press (). Select Text Messages
- 2 Select InBox to display the first message header
- Press (g) or select Options (a), then select Read Message to read the message text.
- Each message header displays the sender's call-back number or name if it matches Phone Book entry, date/time stamp, first line of message, message state, message urgency, and number of messages.
- These message state icons in the message header indicate:
 - ☐ Unread (new) message ☐ Read message ☐ Locked message
- Message urgency is indicated by:
 - (!!) Emergency
 - (!) Urgent
 - (blank) Normal
- Use
 and
 to scroll between pages or between messages.
- If
 • appears, the SMS message storage is full. Delete old messages to be able to receive new messages.

MANAGING TEXT MESSAGES

After reading the text message, press **Options** (a) for these options:

Item	Function
Delete Message	Deletes the message
Read Message	Displays the remainder of the text
Lock Message	Locks the message so it will not be auto- matically deleted when memory is full
Caliback Number	Calls or stores the number(s) contained in the SMS header or text. Press Send key to dial number. Press Store (a) to store in Phone Book.

Forward *	Forwards the message to another phone
Delete All Messages	Deletes all SMS text messages

SENDING A NEW SMS OR EMAIL TEXT MESSAGE

- 1 Press (3) Select Text Messages.
- Z Select Create New
- 3 Enter the message text. See Entering Text on page 29. If desired, press Options (a) and select Insert Often Used You will see a list of often-used phrases such as 'Call Me' or 'I'll be late: When the desired phrase is selected, it will be inserted at the cursor. When finished, press Options (a) and select Edit Complete.
- Select Send & Store, Send Message Only, or Store Message Only.
- 5 If you select either Send option, you will have a choice of three options. If Mobile Number is selected, enter the destination phone number. If Recall Phonebook is selected, choose a number from the Phone Book. If E-mail Address is selected, enter the email address.
- 6 Press Send (•). The message is transmitted and the network will send a confirmation.
- 7 If you select either Store option, the message will be stored in the OutBox.

OUTBOX MESSAGES

The OutBox contains unsent draft messages and stored sent messages, identified by their headers. These messages can be selected from the OutBox menu and can be modified and resent as new SMS messages.

To select an OutBox message,

- 1 Press (ij. Select **Text Messages**.
- 2 Select OutBox:
- 3 Use ② or ⑤ to scroll to the desired message header.

 Each message header is marked as either "Sent" 量② or

 numbered along with the total number of messages.

SMS ALERT TONE

To hear a tone (or none) each time an SMS or Email message arrives,

- Press 🕞 Select **Text Messages**.
- 2 Select Alert Tone
- 3 Select None, Tone 1, Tone 2, Tone 3, Tone 4, Tone 5 or
- Press Exit (A or (a) to return to the standby screen.

Default = Tone 2

STORAGE FREE -- AVAILABLE SMS MEMORY

To view the amount of available memory in the InBox and OutBox,

- Press. (g. Select **Text Messages**
- Select Storage Free.
- 3 The percentage of available SMS memory displays
- Press Exit (•) or to return to the standby screen.

VOICE MAIL

You can receive Voice Mail messages if offered by your service provider. Your voice mail box must first be set up with your service provider before receiving voice mail messages.

An audio alert and Network Message screen signal the arrival of a new Voice Mail message.

To dial the voice mail center number to listen to your Voice Mail messages,

1 Press and hold ①

To dial the voice mail center number using the menu,

- 1 Press 🕞 Select Voice Mail.
- Select Listen

If a voice mail center number is not entered, you will automatically go to the Set Voice Mail set up screen.

- Enter the access number. Erase a digit by pressing. Clear (*) or press and hold. Clear (a) to erase entire entry.
- 2 Press OK (*) The call will be placed automatically.

VOICE MAIL ALERT TONE

Choose a tone or no alert tone to announce when a new Voice Mail message is received. If no alert tone is chosen, the standby screen will still display the Voice Mail icon 🚱.

To choose a Voice Mail Alert Tone,

- 1 Press (a. Select Voice Mail.
- 2 Select Alert Tone
- Select No Alert, Tone 1, Tone 2, Tone 3, Tone 4, Tone 5 or Tone 6. As you scroll through the list, a sample of each tone will play. Press Select.(*).
- 4 Press Exit (•) or (□) to return to the standby screen.

Default = Tone 1

PHONE BOOK

Names and numbers can be stored directly in the Phone Book or moved from other stored areas such as from Text Messages, Memo Pad, or Last Dialed Number list, etc. The Phone Book stores up to 100 entries, each consisting of Name (up to 16 characters) and Number (up to 32 digits). See page 29 for instructions on entering text.

STORING NUMBERS

There are three ways to store numbers into the Phone Book.

- · Directly from the standby screen
 - 1 Enter the phone number
 - Press Options (*). Select Store Number. The number displays. Press OK (*).
 - 3 Enter the name and press OK 🔊
 - 4 Entry Stored message appears. You will be returned to the standby screen.
 - > Press Clear (A) to erase a digit or press and hold Clear (A) to erase entire entry. Also see Editing Phone Numbers on page 26.
- . Using the menu
 - Press (i). Select Phone Book.
 - 2 Select Store Number.
 - 3 Enter the phone number and press OK (*)

- From other stored locations

Numbers stored in the Last Dialed, Received Call, and Unanswered Call Lists, as well as in the Silent Scratchpad, Memo Pad and Text Message locations can all be stored in the Phone Book.

- Display a number from one of the above, press Options (*) or select Callback Number.
- 2 Follow the display instructions.
- The characters *, #, P (Pause) and SP (Secret Pause) can be stored together with numbers. See Pause Dialing and Secret Pause Dialing on page 25.
- If the Phone Book is full, a warming message appears when selecting the Phone Book.

VIEWING AND DIALING NUMBERS

Phone Book entries can be recalled into the display to be edited, deleted or dialed. There are two ways to view and dial numbers stored in the Phone Book.

Phone Book numbers can be assigned to Keys 2 - 9 which when held down will dial those numbers. Key 1 is reserved for the voice mail center number and cannot be changed.

To assign Phone Book numbers to the speed dialing keys,

- 2 Select Speed Dialing.
- 3 Use Q or O to scroll to the next Empty Key number.

To change or delete assigned speed dial keys,

- When you scroll to Key 9, if Emergency 9 is set to Yes, then Key 9 will be fixed to speed dial Emergency 911.
- If you live in an area that uses a different Emergency number and your service provider has programmed that number to the phone, then Key 9 will speed dial that Emergency number.
- If Emergency 9 is set to No, you can assign any Phone Book entry to Key 9.

EMERGENCY 9 SPEED DIAL SETTING

To control whether Speed Dial Key 9 is automatically set to dial the emergency number,

- Select Emergency 9.
- 3 Select Yes or No. Press Select (*).
- 4 Press Exit (• or (o) to return to the standby screen

Default = Yes

SETTINGS

This menu option allows you to customize your Call Settings, Display Settings, Tone Settings, Time Settings, and lock your phone.

CALL SETTINGS

AUTO ANSWER

When the phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset, the phone will automatically answer an incoming call after 5 or 10 seconds without having to press any keys.

- 1 Press (a) Select Settings, then select Call Settings.
- 2 Select Auto Answer.
- 3 Select After 5 sec., After 10 sec. or Off. Press Select (*)
- 4 Press Exit ⊕ or ⊕ to return to the standby screen.

Default = Off

AUTO REDIAL

When set to On, the phone will automatically redial a failed call up to 10 times, when due to a busy system or unavailable signal from the network.

- 1 Press (i), Select Settings, then select Call Settings.
- 2 Select Auto Redial
- 3 Select On or Off, Press Select (*)
- 4 Press Exit ♠or to return to the standby screen.

Default = Off

• When set to On, **Redialing** appears each time a redial call attempt is made. Press **Cancel** (4) to end dialing for that call.

SEND OWN NUMBER (OUTGOING CALLER ID)

This Network Service allows you to send or disable sending your phone number as Caller ID information when you make a call. If you do not want your phone number to appear on the receiving person's phone, set this feature to No.

To send or disable sending your phone number as Caller ID,

- 1 Press (b. Select Settings, then select Call Settings.
- 2 Select Send Own Number.
- 3 Select Yes (send) or No (disable sending). Press Select (a) If you select No, a screen titled Enter Disable Code appears Enter *67 which is the standard Disable Code Press OK (a) to confirm.
- 4 Press Exit P or to return to the standby screen:

Default = Yes

 When traveling outside of your local network service area, this feature may not work or let you make a call. Set feature to Yes.

DISPLAY SETTINGS

BACKLIGHTING

This option controls the backlighting during key entry and incoming ring tone. The two settings are:

Off -- backlight stays off.

Off after 10 sec. -- Display and key backlight stay on for 10 seconds after the last key press or during an incoming call.

- 1 Press (a. Select Settings, then select Display Settings.
- 2 Select Backlighting.
- 3 Select Off or Off After 10 sec. Press Select ®
- 4 Press Exit (a) or (a) to return to the standby screen.

Default = Off After 10 sec.

CONTRAST

You can adjust the contrast of the display using a 7 level bar scale.

- 1 Press (i) Select Settings, then select Display Settings.
- 2 Select Contrast.
- 3 Use (□) or (□) to adjust the contrast. Press OK (•) to confirm:
- 4 Press Exit (*) or to return to the standby screen.

Default = Middle Level

LANGUAGE

The phone menu screens can be displayed in one of four languages: English, French, Spanish, or Portuguese.

To select the language of your choice,

- 1 Press (). Select Settings, then select Display Settings
- Select Language.
- 3 Use G or O to select a language. Press Select O.
- 4 Press Exit or ⊕ to return to the standby screen.



- 4 Press Exit ⊕ or ⊕ to return to the standby screen.

TONE SETTINGS

RING TONE

Choose the sound of the incoming ring tone from a stored selection of 5 rings, 2 tones and 8 melodies. To hear your chosen ring tone or melody, scroll to a selection. Wait a few seconds and it will play.

To select a ring tone,

- 1 Press (a Select Settings, then select Tone Settings.
- 2 Select Ring Tone
- 3 Use or to scroll to the different ring tones. Wait several seconds to hear the tone. After choosing a tone, press Select ○ to select the tone.
- 4 Press Exit (→ or (→) to return to the standby screen.

ALERT MODE

This feature allows you to set the method or turn off the incoming ring tone, alert and reminder tones.

- If a Vibrate option is chosen, the phone still vibrates in Quiet Mode.

VOLUME ADJUSTMENT

Adjust the volume of the incoming ring tone, key presses, and your caller's voice.

- 1 Press (n. Select: Settings, then select Tone Settings.
- Select Valumes
- 3 Select Ring Volume, Key Volume, or Speech Volume. The screen will name the volume type to be adjusted.



- 4 Use or ○) to move the bar up or down the scale.

 Press OK to confirm.
- 5 Press Exit (•) or (c) to return to the standby screen.

Default = Middle Level

- A sample tone will play after each level change to hear the change in volume (if not in conversation).
- The volume cannot be set to zero, except for Key Volume. Use Silent Alert Mode to silence the ring tone completely. See Alert Mode on page 42.

Shortcut to Key Volume adjustment,

1 Press (*) or (). Continue with step 4 above.

During a call, press (*) or (;) to adjust volume of your caller's voice.

RAMPING RINGER

Ramping causes the incoming ring tone to gradually increase to maximum volume level if the call is not answered after the first ring

- 3 Select On or Off, Press Select (*) to confirm.

VOICE PRIVACY TONE

If your network supports the Voice Privacy feature, your call will be encrypted so that no one can access your call. Your phone always attempts to use voice privacy mode during a call.

If your service provider's system does not support this feature or if the phone is on an analog channel, the Voice Privacy Officon & appears on the left side of the screen and a warning tone sounds. You can turn this warning tone on or off.

- 1 Press (A Select Settings, then select Tone Settings.
- 2 Select Voice Privacy Tone
- 3 Select On or Off. Press Select @ to confirm.
- 4 Press Exit ⊙ or ⊖ to return to the standby screen.

Default = On

QUIET MODE

This instant quiet feature silences all incoming ring tones, turns off DTMF tones and silences alert tones with one touch of a key. Use this when entering a meeting or a theater, for example.

Shortcut to Quiet Mode,

- Press Quiet (*) at the standby screen. The sounds are immediately turned off.
- When Quiet Mode is turned On, displays. The left softkey is labeled. Restore.
- 3 To turn off Quiet Mode, press Restore (*) (**) disappears.
 - Quiet Mode overrides current tone settings but does not change them

To turn on or off Quiet Mode using the menus,

- 1 Press (3. Select Settings, then select Tone Settings.
- 2 Select Quiet Mode.

• Quiet Mode setting is not retained when the phone is turned off.

TIME SETTINGS

You can choose how the time and date appear on the standby screen, as well as the time/date format in Text Messages.



SECURITY
