

# Use and Care


# SIM card

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and address book entries. It can also contain your voicemail, text message, and Internet access settings. If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

**Caution:** Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

To insert and use a **memory card**, see page 50.

Turn off your phone and remove your battery before you install or remove a SIM card.



### battery



### battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the battery. When finished, your display shows **Charge Complete**.



**Tip:** Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

The battery charger shipped with this device is designed for Motorola 3G mobile phones. Other chargers might take longer to charge your battery, or cause your calls to fail during charging.

### extend battery life

- To make your **backlight** turn off sooner, press •♠• > 🛱 Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight > 5 seconds
- To make your display turn off sonner, press ∲ > ₿% Settings > Initial Setup
   > Display Timeout > 1 minute
- To turn off your screen saver, press ∲ > 8 Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver > Delay > Off
- To turn off Bluetooth® power when you're not using it, press (♠) > ₱ Connection > Bluetooth Link > Setup > Power > Off

### battery use & safety

 Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers.

The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers. **Caution:** Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. Improper battery use, or use of a damaged battery, may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.


- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle

- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool, dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.
- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center before using. Do **not** attempt to dry it with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
- Use care when handling a charged battery—particularly when placing it inside a

pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. Contact with metal objects (such as jewelry, keys, beaded chains) could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), causing the battery to become very hot, which could cause damage or injury.

Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.



### turn it on & off

**Caution:** Some phones ask for your SIM card PIN code when you turn them on. If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times before the correct code, your SIM card is disabled, and your display shows **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn on your phone, press and hold (1) for a few seconds or until the keypad or display lights up. If



prompted, enter your eight-digit SIM card PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.

To turn off your phone, press and hold () for a few seconds.

### make a call

To make a call, enter a phone number and press (). To "hang up," close the flip or press ().

### answer a call

To answer a call when your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press (). To "hang up," close the flip or press ().

### store a phone number

You can store a phone number in your Address Book:

- 1 Enter a phone number in the home screen.
- 2 Press the Store key.

Select Create New Contact, if necessary.

- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press the center key ...
- 4 Press the Done key to store the number.

To **edit** or **delete** a stored **Address Book** entry, see page 67.

To store a new Address Book entry with an **email** address: From the home screen, press (.) > (.) Address Book. Scroll to Create Contact and select it. Enter the new contact's name and Email information.

### call a stored phone number

### Find it: (♠) > ( Address Book

Scroll to the address book entry. 1

> Shortcut: In the address book, press keypad keys to enter the first letters of an entry you want. For example, press **5** three times to go to entries that start with "L."

Press 💽 to call the entry. 2

Note: You can show contacts stored in your phone's memory or on your SIM card. To choose which contacts you see, press  $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{\Phi}$  Address Book, then press Options > View. You can select Phone & SIM Card. SIM Card, or Phone Contacts. Contacts on the SIM card only have a Name and Number. To choose where you store contacts, go back to the home screen and press

> Address Book, then press Options > Setup

> Store Contacts To > Phone or SIM Card

### your phone number

From the home screen, press the clear key (5) then (#), then select Line 1 to see vour number.

Tip: Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press Options > My Tel. Number.

You can edit the name and phone number stored on your SIM card. From the home screen, press 🔄 #, select an entry, press the View key, press the Options key, and select Edit. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.



# display

The *home screen* appears when you turn on the phone.




**Note:** Your home screen might look different from the one shown, depending on your service provider.

To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and ①.

Press  $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$ , up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open basic menu features. To change your home screen shortcuts, see page 33.

Press the *center key*  $\mathbf{\hat{e}}$  to open the menu. *Soft Key Labels* show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Status indicators can show at the top of the home screen:



- Signal Strength Indicator Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when ↑ or ↑Ø appears.
- 2 Network Indicator Shows when your phone is using a network that is 3G (36), *Enhanced Data for GSM Evolution* (EDGE, €), or *General Packet Radio Service* (GPRS, <sup>™</sup>).

3 Data Indicator – Shows connection status.



To set your primary and secondary text entry modes, press Options > Text Setup in a text entry view and select Primary Text or Secondary Text.


### iTAP® and tap mode tips

- Press ① in a text entry view to change text case to all capital letters (ABC), no capitals (abc), or next letter capital (Abc).
- To enter numbers quickly, just hold a number key until the number appears. Now, you're in numeric mode. To change back to iTAP or Tap mode, just hold a key again.
- Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.
- Press O to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- Press 🗈 to delete the character to the left of the cursor. Hold 🕒 to delete the word.
- To cancel your message, press 💿.

### iTAP® mode

Press H in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see III or III, press **Options** > **Text Setup** to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words and predicts each word as you enter it. For example, if you press **7 6 4**, your display shows:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.

**Tip:** Don't worry if you forget how iTAP works. In a text entry display, you can press

### tap and tap extended modes

Press # in a text entry view to switch to tap mode. If you don't see **Abc1** or **Abc2**, press **Options > Text Setup** to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

To enter text in **Tap** mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter. The **Tap Extended** mode works the same way, but includes more special characters and symbols. For example, if you press 🚺 one time, your display shows:

The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press  $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$  down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.

### numeric mode

Press # in a text entry view until you see **123**. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.

**Shortcut:** You can press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode from iTAP® or Tap modes. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.


### symbol mode

Press # in a text entry view until your display shows a list of symbols. Scroll to the symbol you want, then press the *center key*  $\cdot \spadesuit$ .

### volume

Press the volume keys to:

- turn off an incoming call alert
- change the earpiece volume during calls



• change the ringer volume from the home screen

**Tip:** Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Vibrate** or **Silent** by holding the down volume key while you are in the home screen. You can also switch to **Vibrate** or back by holding **#** in the home screen.

# navigation key

Press the *navigation key*  $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$ , up, down, left, or right to scroll to items in the display. When you scroll to an item, press the *center key*  $\hat{\mathbf{\Phi}}$  to select it.



### smart key

The smart key gives you another way to do things. For example, when you scroll to a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it (instead of pressing the *center key* (.)). The smart key usually does the same thing as pressing the *center key* (.). To find the smart key, see page 1. To change what the smart key does in the home screen, see page 75.

## close the phone

You can change **what happens** when you close your phone:

To change **the sound** that you hear when you open or close your phone, press  $\hat{•} > \textcircled{2}$  Settings > Personalize > Slide Tone and choose a sound. The volume for this sound is set by the Key Volume in your audio style details (see page 29).

# handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

To turn the handsfree speaker on during a call, press the **Speaker** key (if available), or **Options** > **Speakerphone On**. Your display shows **Spkrphone On** until you turn it off or end the call.

**Note:** The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset, or if your phone is closed.

## codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

### Find it: $\hat{\Phi} > \bigotimes$ Settings > Security > New Passwords

You can also change your SIM PIN2 or Private Entries Code.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press () and enter your six-digit security code instead.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

## lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

To manually lock your phone:

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press  $\hat{\Phi} > 2$  Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > On, then enter your four-digit unlock code.

**Note:** You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 37). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

## lock & unlock keys

When your phone is closed and on the home screen, your keys lock to prevent accidental key presses.

To **change how long** your phone waits before it automatically locks your keys: Press  $\dot{•} > 2$  Settings > Security > Keypad Lock > Timer > a time interval or Off

To unlock your keys, press Unlock, then press OK.

# personalize

## audio style

Each audio style profile uses a different set of sounds or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. Here are the profiles you can choose:

The audio style profile's indicator appears at the top of your home screen. To choose your profile:

Find it: ♠ > ② Settings > Audio > Style: style name

**Shortcut:** To change your audio style profile from the **home screen**, just press the volume keys up or down. With your **phone closed**, press a volume key to see

your audio style profile, press the smart key to change it, then press a volume key to store the change.

Tip: Do you get a lot of text messages? If you don'twant to hear incoming message alerts during phonecalls, press  $\hat{•} > \bigotimes$  Settings > In-Call Setup > MSG Alert> Not in Call.

### change details in an audio style

You can change your keypad volume and the alerts for incoming calls and other events. Your changes are saved in the current audio style profile.

### Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{P}$ Settings > Audio > style Detail

1 Scroll to Calls (or Line 1 or Line 2 for dual-line phones), then press the Change key to change it. **Tip:** To change the volume of your keypress beeps, choose **Key Volume** instead.

- 2 Scroll to an alert type (such as **Sound**, **Music**, or **Vibration Pattern**), then press the **Open** key to see a list of alerts.

## time & date

Your phone can automatically update your time zone, time, and date. It uses the time and date for the calendar.

To synchronize the time zone, time, and date with the network: Press (-) > 2 Settings > linitial Setup > Time and Date > Autoupdate > Time & Time Zone. If you don't want your phone to automatically update your time zone, choose Time Only instead. Your phone uses the time zone city to adjust for *Daylight Savings Time* (DST). Some cities have unique DST rules. For example, if you choose "Chicago" and then travel to Mexico City, the phone will still not switch Time Zones because both cities are in the GMT-6 time zone. However, Mexico City has unique DST rules, so you should change **Autoupdate** to **Time Only** and select "Mexico City."

To manually set the time zone, time, and date, turn off Autoupdate, then: Press  $\hat{•} > \textcircled{2}$  Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date > Time Zone, *time* or *date*. To jump to a city in the time zone list, enter the first letter of its name by pressing keypad keys.

Tip: To choose three time zones for easier access, press  $( \mathbf{\hat{\phi}} \cdot \mathbf{\hat{\phi}} ) = \mathbf{\hat{w}}$  My Stuff > Tools > World Clock. When you open World Clock, you can press the Options key to see the Map View of time zones. To choose an **analog or digital** clock for your home screen, press  $\hat{•} > \textcircled{P}$  Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Clock.

## wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

**Note:** Your *theme* can also set your wallpaper (page 32).

Find it:  $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{Personalize} > \mathbf{Wallpaper}$

or vibrates one time, shows **Redial Successful**, and connects the call.

# caller ID

*Calling line identification* (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.

Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your address book, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

You can set your phone to play a different ringer ID for an entry stored in your address book (see page 67).

To show or hide **your phone number** from the next person you call, enter the phone number and press **Options > Hide ID/Show ID**.

# emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

**Note:** Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- 2 Press 🕑 to call the emergency number.

# AGPS & emergency calls

When you make an emergency call, your phone can use Assisted Global Positioning



*System* (AGPS) satellite signals to tell the emergency response center your approximate location.

The AGPS feature has limitations, so always tell the emergency response center your best knowledge of your location. Remain on the phone for as long as the emergency response center instructs you.

AGPS **might not work** for emergency calls if your local emergency response center does not process AGPS location information. For details, contact your local authorities.

For best results:

 Go outside and away from underground locations, covered vehicles, structures with metal or concrete roofs, tall buildings, and foliage. Indoor performance might improve if you move closer to windows, but some window sun shielding films can block satellite signals.  Move away from radios, entertainment equipment, and other electronic devices that might interfere with or block AGPS satellite signals.

If your phone cannot find strong AGPS satellite signals, the location of the nearest cell tower in contact with your phone is automatically provided to the emergency response center.

Your phone can also use your location to help with other programs (such as programs that provide directions). To hide your location from these programs, see page 86.

# voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number.



Note: Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone shows the voicemail message indicator  $\bigtriangledown \mathfrak{D}$  and New Voicemail. Press the Call key to listen to the message.

To check voicemail messages:

Find it:  $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{\Sigma}$  Messaging > Voicemail

Shortcut: From the home screen, press and hold 1 to check your voicemail.

Your phone may prompt you to store your voicemail phone number. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider.

Note: You can't store a p (pause), w (wait), or n (number) character in this number. If you want to store a voicemail number with these characters, create an address book entry for it. Then you can use the entry to call your voicemail.

# video calls

If you call someone who has a 3G video phone. vou can see each other while vou talk. If vour phone is roaming on a **non-3G network**, video calls will not work (see the network indicator on page 20).

## make a video call

- Start a normal voice call
- 2 Press the Share Video key to start sharing video with the caller. During the call:
  - Press Stop Video to change the call to a voice call with the speakerphone on.
  - If you accept another incoming voice call, ٠ your phone changes this video call to a voice call
  - If you accept another incoming video call, your phone ends this video call.



- You can open and close your phone to change what the other caller sees through the camera lens. The camera lens is on the top of your phone.
- 3 To end the call, press 💽.

## record a video call

**Note:** Recording of phone calls is subject to varying State and Federal laws regarding privacy and recording of phone conversations. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of this feature.

You can record a video call as a video clip. During a video call:





For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

Shortcut: From the home screen, you can also press Options > Bluetooth Link > [Add Audio Device] to look for devices.

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

# This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg.<sup>1</sup> Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada.
