This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.79 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.40 W/kg.²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

- In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.
- The SAR information includes the Motorola testing protocol, assessment procedure, and measurement uncertainty range for this product.







This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.*

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in

the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola—or if you hang your mobile device from a lanyard around your neck—keep the mobile

device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body.

Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our Web site at: <u>www.motorola.com</u>.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

Implantable Medical Devices

If you have an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or defibrillator, consult your physician before using this mobile device.

Persons with implantable medical devices should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimeters (8 inches) from the implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your mobile device with your implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

Driving Precautions

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your mobile device while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a mobile device may be distracting. Discontinue use if you can't concentrate on driving.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.
- Do not place a mobile device in the airbag deployment area.

Operational Warnings

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted and can include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain dust, or metal powders. When you are in such an area, turn off your mobile device, and do not remove, install, or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

Batteries and Chargers

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

Discontinue use and consult a physician if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation. It is always a good idea to hold the screen away from your eyes, leave the lights on in the room, take a 15-minute break every hour, and stop use if you are very tired.


SIM card

Battery Use & Battery Safety

 Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers.

The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers. **Caution:** Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. Improper battery use, or use of a damaged battery, may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.

- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:
 - Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;

- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle
- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool, dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.

- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center before using. Do **not** attempt to dry it with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
- Use care when handling a charged battery—particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. Contact with metal objects (such as jewelry, keys, beaded chains) could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), causing the battery to become very hot, which could cause damage or injury.

Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

battery charging



your phone, install and charge the battery as shown in the battery installation and battery charging sections. Some batteries perform best after several full charge and discharge cycles.

- Insert the charger into the connector on your phone as shown.
- 2 Plug the other end of the charger into an appropriate electrical outlet.
- **3** When your phone displays **Charge Complete**, remove the charger.

Tip: Relax, you can safely leave the charger connected to the phone after charging is complete. This will **not** damage the battery.

turn the phone on & off

To turn your phone on, press and hold ⑦ for two seconds. If prompted, enter your four digit SIM card PIN code and/or four digit unlock code.



After entering an incorrect PIN code three times in a row, it will ask you to input PUK1 password. You can contact your service provider if you don't know your PUK1 password.

make a call

Enter a phone number and press 💿 to make a call. To "hang up," press 💿.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press () to answer.

To "hang up," press 💽.

adjust volume

During a call, you can adjust the volume by pressing •• • right to increase and left to decrease the earpiece volume during a call.

To mute a call, press $\mathbf{\Phi}$ and select Mute.

change the call alert

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{A}$ Ring Styles > Style

Available options are Loud Ring, Soft Ring, Vibrate, Vibe and Ring, Vibe then Ring, or Silent.

store a phone number

You can store a phone number in your Phonebook:



set entry modes

iTAP™ method

Press $\mathbf{\Phi}$ in a text entry screen to select and switch to **iTAP** method. **iTAP** method lets you enter words using one key press per letter. The **iTAP** software combines your key presses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 2 7 5, your phone displays a list of word combinations such as Appl, Aspj, Aspk, Aspl, and Asp5.

When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone will guess the word.

TAP method

Press \diamondsuit in a text entry screen and select **Tap English** or **Tap Extended** method. When **Tap** mode is selected, 10 displays on the home screen. To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and numbers on the keypad. **Tap Extended** mode includes all of the letters of **Tap English** mode, but also contains special characters and symbols. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

numeric method

Press $\mathbf{\Phi}$ in a text entry screen and select Numeric method. When Numeric is selected, 12 displays on the home screen. Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want.

symbol method

Press $\mathbf{\Phi}$ in a text entry screen and select **Symbol** method. When **Symbol** is selected, **@** displays on the home screen. Press a keypad key to show its symbols at the bottom of the display.

Highlight the symbol you want and press SELECT.

delete letters & words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

- Press DELETE to delete one letter at a time.
- Press and hold **DELETE** to delete all text.

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

To turn the speaker on, during a call, press **SPKR ON**. To turn the speaker off, press **SPKR OFF**.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or to the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. Your service provider may reset these codes before you get your phone.
