Specific Absorption Rate Data

This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. ¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.98 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 0.49 W/kg.²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

- In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.
- The SAR information includes the Motorola testing protocol, assessment procedure, and measurement uncertainty range for this product.







External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

battery charging



Tip: Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Ring Only**, **Vibrate Only**, **Silent**, **Ring and Vibrate**, or **Vibrate then Ring**, by holding the down volume key while in the main screen.

handsfree speaker

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of

wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

To turn on the handsfree speaker:

- After you dial a number and press the Send key , but before the call connects, press Speaker.
- During an active call, press Options and select Speaker On.

While the handsfree speaker is on, your display shows the speakerphone indicator.

To turn off the handsfree speaker, do any of the following:

- End the call.
- If the slider is open, press Speaker.
- If the slider is closed, press Options and select Speaker Off.

voice commands

You can use voice commands to tell your phone what to do

Note: Not all languages support voice commands.

voice dial

You can dial a contact list entry by speaking its name, or dial any phone number by speaking its digits.

- Press the external voice command key on the side of your phone. The phone loads the voice recognition software, then prompts you to say a command or name.
- 2 Wait for the beep, then say the name of an entry as it appears in your contact list. Your phone confirms the name and makes the call.

or

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Say "Dial Number." Your phone prompts you to speak the digits in the phone number. Speak the digits. Your phone confirms the number and makes the call.

Tips:

- You can say a contact's name and number type together. For example, say "John Smith mobile" to call the mobile number stored for John Smith.
- For voice command help, press the voice command key on the side of your phone, then press Help.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

You can also change your **SIM PIN** codes or call barring password.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Please verify the Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press ## to enter your six-digit security code instead.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock external keys

You can lock the external phone keys **when the slider is closed** to prevent accidental key presses while playing music or carrying the phone in a purse or pocket.

To automatically lock the external keys when the phone is idle and the slider is closed:

Set the time delay for locking the external keys (2 seconds, 4 seconds, or 8 seconds. The keys lock when you close the slider. The keys unlock when you open the slider. To turn off the automatic lock, select Off.

Note: Your phone's WiFi features are not allowed for outdoor operation in France. To avoid unlawful interference with radio signals, do not use the WiFi features in France unless you are indoors.

WiFi setup wizard

When you power on your phone, the WiFi Setup Wizard application automatically launches to help you connect your phone to your home access point. Follow the on-screen prompts to set up a WiFi connection to the access point.

available networks list

To see a list of available access points within range of your phone:

Your phone lists available access points. The orange WiFi signal strength indicator **41** shows the strength of each WiFi connection. Other indicators can include:

Scroll to the network access point you want to use, then press the **Options** key > **Connect**.

create secure network connection

To create and save a secure connection with a network access point:

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Shortcut: Press in the home screen to see the Dialed Calls list.

- 1 Press 'Q' left/right to select a call list: All Calls, Dialed Calls, Answered Calls, Missed Calls, or Frequent Calls.
- 2 Press •Q• up/down to scroll to a phone number.

Icons indicate if the call was incoming \mathfrak{P} , outgoing \mathfrak{P} , or missed \mathfrak{A} . A check mark next to the icon indicates a connected call.

- To call the number, press ②.
- To see call details (like time and date), press the center key ••.
- Press Options to perform other operations on the number (send a message, save to contacts, delete), or to set recent call options.

redial

- 1 Press from the home screen to see the Dialed Calls list.
- 2 Scroll to the number you want to call and press .

If you hear a **busy signal** and see **Call Failed**, press or **Retry** to redial the number. When



the call goes through, your phone shows **Connected** and connects the call

return a call

Your phone keeps a record of calls you did not answer and shows them on a **Notifications** list.

When you see the list, scroll to the call you want to return and press .

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your phone's display.



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your contact list, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

Note: Picture IDs aren't available for contacts stored on the SIM card.

Tip: Want to know who's calling without even looking at your phone? To give one of your contacts a special ringtone, see page 80.

To show or hide your phone number:

Find it: • > Settings > Call Settings > In-Call Setup > My Caller ID

- Select All Calls or Next Call Only.
- 2 Select Show ID or Hide ID.

Shortcut: To show or hide your phone number for the next call only, enter the number and (before you press the Send key ①) press Options, then select

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call at any time, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Check with your service provider, as emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues. Do not solely rely on your wireless phone for essential communications such as medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call: Turn your phone on, exit any open application such as games, dial the emergency number, then press the *send key* to call the emergency number.

voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number.



Note: Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone display shows **New Voicemail** and the new message indicator \mathbf{QQ} .

To check voicemail messages:

Find it: •• > ♥ Messages > Call Voicemail

Shortcut: Your service provider may store your voicemail phone number in speed dial location #1. If so, you can press and hold in the home screen to listen to your voicemail message(s).

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set default song format & bit rate on computer

Microsoft® Windows® Media Player 11 lets you adjust format and bit rate settings to optimize sound quality or increase the number of song files you can store on your phone.

Windows Media Audio format offers the optimal balance between file size and sound quality. Song files in this format tend to require more storage space than files that use Windows Media Audio Pro format.

Windows Media Audio Pro format is designed for use in portable devices with limited storage capacity. The format provides improved sound quality at lower bit rates.

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To set the default file format and bit rate:

- 1 Insert the music CD in your computer's CD drive.
- 2 Launch Windows Media Player 11.
- 3 Select the "Rip" tab in Windows Media Player 11.
- 4 Click the "Rip "tab down arrow, select "Format," then select "Windows Media Audio" or "Windows Media Audio Pro."
- 5 Click the "Rip "tab down arrow again, select "Bit Rate," then select the bit rate you want.

convert iTunes® AAC files to MP3 files on computer

Use the iTunes desktop application to convert standard iTunes AAC files to MP3 files that are compatible with Windows Media Player 11.

Note: The iTunes desktop application can only convert AAC files ripped from a music CD. It can't convert music files purchased from the iTunes store.

- Open the iTunes desktop application on your computer.
- 2 Select "Edit" and then "Preferences."
- 3 Click the "Advanced" tab and select "Importing."
- 4 Open the "Import Using" pop-up menu, then select the "MP3 Encoder" option. Click "OK" to save your settings.
- 5 Select one or more songs in your iTunes music library, then select "Advanced" and then "Convert Selection to MP3."

The converted MP3 file copies appear in your computer's music library alongside the original AAC files.

When you load a song, information about the album, artist, genre (type of music), and composer is loaded into the Albums, Artists, Genres, and Composers folders in your music player. If this information is not available for a song, this

information loads into those folders as "Unknown."

manually transfer music to phone or memory card

Without using Windows Media Player 11, you can manually copy or sync music files from the computer to phone memory, or to an optional microSD memory card in the phone. (To insert a memory card, your *Quick Start Guide*).

Before you copy files to your phone, make sure the files are in a format that the phone recognizes. Your phone's music player can play the following types of audio files: AAC, AAC+, MP3, WAV, WMA, Real Audio G2/8/10.

on your phone

Attach the Motorola Original USB cable to the mini-USB port on your phone and to an available USB port on your computer. A Motorola Original USB cable and supporting software may be included with your phone. These tools are also sold separately.

- 1 Find where your phone and memory card appear as "Removable Disk" icons (the "My Computer" window on a Windows PC, the desktop on a Macintosh® computer).
- 2 Double-click the "Removable Disk" icon for your phone or memory card.
- 3 To copy the desired files onto the phone or memory card, drag and drop them onto the appropriate removable disk icon.

- **4** When you finish, remove the phone safely from your computer:
 - If you are using a PC, right-click the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray at the bottom of your computer screen, then select "USB Mass Storage Device."
 - If you are using a Mac, select and drag the "Removable Disk" icon to the Trash.



To take the photo in the viewfinder, press the center key **⁴•**•.



To send the photo in a message, press Send (see page 61).

- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.*
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.*
