

Touch

Drag

To scroll through a list or move slowly, *drag* across the touchscreen. Try it: In the home screen, touch

Contacts, then drag your

Contacts list up or down. **Tip:** When you drag or flick a

list, a scroll bar appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - Z.



Flick

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

Tip: When you flick a long list, touch the screen to stop it from scrolling.

Zoom

Get a closer look at maps or web pages. To zoom in, double-touch the screen, or touch the screen with two fingers and then slide them apart. To zoom out, double touch the screen again, or drag your fingers together.

My Sign

If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("TSwitch" or "Telephone Switch") than unratedphones. T4isthebetter/higherofthetworatings. (Notethatnotallhearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Yourhearingdevicemanufacturerorhearinghealthprofessionalmayhelpyoufind resultsforyourhearingdevice. Themore immuneyourhearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.
