Set up & go

The first time you turn on your phone, a setup wizard guides you through signing in to your existing Google™ account. If you don't have a Google account. you can create one using the wizard.

Tip: Remember to write down your user name and password, and keep them in a safe place.

Turn it on & off 😕 🚄

To turn on your phone, press and hold Power (10) (on top of the phone).

To turn off your phone, press and hold Power (10), then touch Power off on the screen.

Touchscreen & keys

a few essentials

Touch tips

Here are some tips on how to navigate around your phone.

Touch

To choose an icon or option, touch it.



Touch & hold

To open special options, touch and hold an icon or other item. Try it: In the home screen, touch Contacts, then touch and hold a contact to open options.



Drag

To scroll through a list or move slowly, drag across the touchscreen. Try it: In the home screen, touch Contacts, then drag your Contacts list up or down.

Tip: When you drag or flick a list, a scroll bar



a spears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - 7.

Contacts: A-7

Contacts: All contacts

Flick

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

Tip: When you flick a long list, touch the screen to stop it from scrolling.

BACKTRACK

Only one hand free to use your phone? No problem—just use **BACKTRACK** and **BACKTRACK**

Cursor with the BACKTRACK pad, on the back of your phone.

Find it: Menu > Settings > BACKTRACK > BACKTRACK

Find it: Menu 🔠 > Settings > BACKTRACK Cursor

When **BACKTRACK** is enabled, you can navigate screens by using the BACKTRACK pad just like the touchscreen. Touch the pad and flick up and down or left and right.









When **BACKTRACK Cursor** is enabled, you can use a cursor to select an icon or option.





The a cursor appears on the screen when you double-tap the BACKTRACK pad. Use **BACKTRACK** to move the cursor around. When you place the cursor on an icon or option, double-tap the BACKTRACK pad to select it.

Zoom

Get a closer look at maps or web pages. To zoom in, double-touch the screen. To zoom out, double touch the screen again.

Key tips

Menu, home, & back



Touch Home (a) to close any menu or app and return to the home screen. In the home screen, touch and hold Home (a) to show the last few apps you used, then touch an app to open it.

Touch Search Q for text search.

Touch Menu 🔡 to open menu options, or press Back 🕥 to go back.

Sleep & wake up

To save your battery, prevent accidental touches, or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing Power ①. To wake up the touchscreen, just press Power ② again, or open the phone.



To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically, touch Menu 🔠 > Settings > Sound & display > Screen timeout.

Tip: To make the screen lock when it goes to sleep, use "Screen lock" on page 37.

Power key menu

Press and hold Power ① to open the power key menu, where you can turn off the phone (Power off), or turn Airplane mode or Silent mode on or off.

Adjust volume

Press the volume keys to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).



Rotate the screen

The touchscreen can rotate 90 degrees to stay right-side up when you rotate your phone:

Home screen

quick access to the things you need most

Quick start: Home screen

The home screen gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or touch Home from a menu. It's basically like this:



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

You can flick the home screen left and right to see more panels, five in all. You'll have plenty of room for adding shortcuts, widgets, and more.

Widgets

A widget is small app on the home screen that typically displays information such as weather, news, and social networking updates. You can add a widget, such as a clock, music player, or a calendar that shows upcoming appointments. To open a widget, touch it.

To add a widget, touch an empty spot on the home screen. (You can also touch Menu 📳 > Add

> Widgets.) If your home screen is full, you won't see the add option. You'll need to move or delete widgets or shortcuts to make room

You can change a widget's size. Just touch and hold the widget. When the widget's outline turns white, drag one of the corners to make it the size you want.

Note: If you install apps from Android Market that have widgets, touch and hold the home screen, then select a widget to add to the home screen.

Shortcuts

To add shortcuts to the home screen, open the app menu, then touch and hold the shortcut you want. It will be added to the home screen. Or, touch Menu Relation > Add > Shortcuts

App tray

The app tray shows you all of your applications. To open the app tray from the home screen, touch the **Launcher**



Flick up and down to see all of your apps. Any new apps that you download (see "Android Market"" on page 16) are added to the app tray.



Recent apps

Touch and hold Home (a) to see the last few apps you used, then touch the app you want. Touch Home (b) to return to the home screen.

 Touch the text box & type using the touch keypad. Then touch the icon to begin the search

Phone status & notifications

The status bar at the top of the screen contains icons that tell you about messages and phone status. To view your notifications, touch the status bar and drag it down.

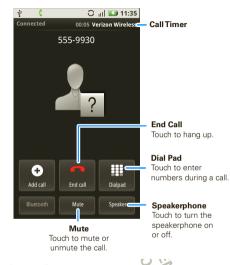

During a call:

- To use the speakerphone, touch Speaker.
- To mute a call, touch Mute.

- To enter numbers during a call, touch **Dialpad**.
- To use a Bluetooth® device, touch Bluetooth (The device must be turned on and previously paired—see "Connect new devices" on page 32).

Tip: You can touch Home or Back to leave the active call display. To reopen it, touch Dialer > Return to call in progress.

To mute a call, touch Mute.

Make & answer calls

To make a call, touch **Dialer**, enter a number, then touch **Call**.

To answer a call, drag (to the right.

To end a call, touch End.

To ignore a call, drag fto the left.

Recent calls

Call a contact

Find it: Dialer > Contacts

To call a number, touch it.

Conference calls

To start a conference call, call the first number. After they answer, touch **Add call** and call the next number. When the next number answers, touch **Merge call**.

Your phone number

Find it: Menu > Settings > About phone > Status > My phone number

Emergency calls

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Touch Dialer (if your phone is locked, touch Emergency Call).
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Touch Call to call the emergency number.

Note: Your mobile device can use GPS and AGPS signals to help emergency services find you. See "GPS & AGPS" in your legal and safety information.



Web

you don't need a PC, surf the web with your phone

Quick start: Browser

Find it: Launcher icon > S Browser



Note: If you can't connect, contact your service provider.

Connect

Your phone uses the mobile phone network (over the air) to automatically connect to the Web.

Note: Your service provider may charge to surf the Web or download data.

To use a wireless network, touch Menu 📆 > Settings > Wireless & networks. Touch Wi-Fi to turn it on and touch Wi-Fi settings to search for nearby wireless networks. Touch a network to connect.

Select web links

When you touch a link, your phone outlines it and goes to that page. If you touch and hold the link, your phone shows options, I Bookmark link



phone shows options, like **Open in new window** or **Rookmark link**

Browser options

Touch Menu 📳 to see browser options:

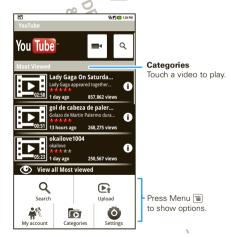

Browse & install apps

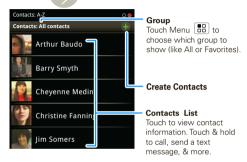

- To open options, touch and hold a message.

Create messages

Enter the recipient and message. In text messages and emails, touch Menu 📆 for options.

Send & receive attachments

To send a file in a message, open a new message and touch Menu [B] > **Insert**.

When you receive a message with an attachment, open the message and touch the file name to download it. Then, touch the name again to open it. Some file formats can be converted to HTML for faster viewing, and your phone will show a button that says **Get HTML version**.

While viewing the attachment, touch it to save it, share it, and more.

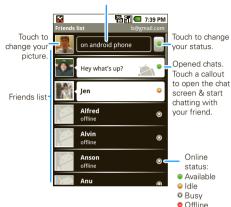

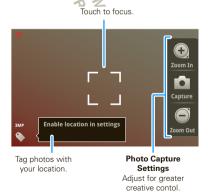
Photos



Take that family photo, and post it online for everyone to see.

Note: To get the clearest photos, wipe the lens clean with a soft, dry cloth before you take a photo.

Find it: Launcher icon O > O Camera



Note: Photos are stored on your microSD memory card. **Picture Resolution** is 3MP, unless you change it.

To take the photo, touch , or press the Camera Key .

Immediately touch the captured image to view options:

- To send the photo in a message or post it online, touch the image and then touch **Share**. For more info on sharing your photos, see "Share your photo gallery" on page 27.
- To set the photo as a wallpaper or contact photo, touch the image and then touch Set as.
- To delete the photo, touch the image and then touch Delete.

Photo options

In the viewfinder, touch Menu 🔡 > Settings to open the camera menu and adjust these settings:

- Picture Resolution—Large(3MP) for 5" x 7" prints, Medium(2MP) for 4" x 6" prints, or Small(1MP) for wallet photos.
- Video Resolution—For recording video with camcorder, set to Small(QCIF), Medium(QVGA), or Large(CIF).
- Review Time—How long your phone displays a new photo before returning to the viewfinder.

 Shutter Animation— Shutter opens and closes at very fast speeds, allowing you to take multiple photos rapidly.

Videos Record & share videos

Find it: Launcher icon O > @ Camcorder

Note: To get the clearest photos, wipe the lens clean with a soft, dry cloth before you capture a photo.



Tip: To send your video in a message, set the video quality to Small(QCIF) by touching Menu 3 > Settings > Video Resolution.

To record the video, touch . Touch . Touch to stop the recording.

Immediately touch the captured video to see these options:

- To delete the video, touch Delete.

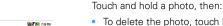

Set up music

What music transfer tools do I need?

To put music on your computer and then load it on your phone, you need:

- A Microsoft[™] Windows[™] PC or Apple[™] Macintosh[™]
- A USB data cable.

You need a memory card

Your music is stored on your memory card. Your phone supports removable microSD memory cards up to 32 GB capacity. To make sure your memory card is installed, go to "Assemble & charge" on page 3.

Tip: To see the available memory on your memory card, touch Menu 📳 > Settings > SD card & phone storage.

What audio file formats can plant

Your phone can play many types of files: AMR-NB/WB, MP3, PCM/WAV, AAC, AAC+, eAAC+, MIDI, OGG, and WMA.

Note: Your phone supports DRM-protected files.

What headphones can I use?

Your phone has a 3.5mm headset jack for wired stereo listening. You can go wireless with Bluetooth® stereo

headphones or speakers (see "Bluetooth® wireless" on page 31).

Get music

You can transfer music from your computer to your phone by using a USB connection.

For more information on transferring music, see "USB connection" on page 34

Tip: You can also use Windows Media Player to sync music from your PC to your phone. To download Windows Media Player, go to http://www.microsoft.com/windowsmedia.

Play music

Music library

Open your music library, then select what you want to play.

Find it: Launcher icon O > Music



Your music is stored by artists, albums, songs, and playlists. Touch a category, then touch the song or playlist you want to play. Touch Menu 🔠 > Party shuffle to randomly play all your songs.

Music player

Just touch a song or playlist to get going.



Music player controls

- Play/pause—Touch
- Fast forward/rewind—Touch and hold

- View playlist—Touch \□.
- Repeat—Touch .
- Volume—Press the side volume keys.
- View library—Touch Menu 🔛 > Library.
- Turn shuffle on/off—Touch Menu 🔡 > Party shuffle.

Exposure to RF Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits

Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines. and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The quidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed for the safety of all persons. regardless of age or health, and to account for any variations in measurements. The exposure standard for mobile devices employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The IEEE SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 watts per kilogram (W/kg), averaged over one gram of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using procedures accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the mobile device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequencies.  incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voicemail answer it for
 you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a
 "to do" list or going through your address book takes attention away from your
 primary responsibility—driving safely.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when your
 car is not moving or before pulling into traffic. If you must make a call while
 moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road.

- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies (wherever wireless phone service is available).
- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto
 accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in
 danger, call 911 or other local emergency number (wherever wireless phone
 service is available, as you would want others to do for you.
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number (wherever wireless phone service is available).

The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience inference noise from mobile phones.
