
Installing the SIM Card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



Getting Started



Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



 New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.

- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.



Installing the Battery



™ Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories.

Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Getting Started

Action

1 Plug the travel charger into the bottom of your phone.



- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On

Action

1 Press and hold for 2 seconds to turn on the phone.



2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the **OK** key to unlock the SIM card.

Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.

3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press the **OK** key to unlock the phone.

Adjusting Volume

Press up or down on volume keys to:

• increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call



- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press (I) (#).

While you are on a call, press \blacksquare > My Tel. Numbers.

Note: Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 47. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.







Sending a Multimedia Message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service* (MMS) message contains one or more slides with text and media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice records, and/or

video clips). You can send the multimedia message to other wireless phone users, and to email addresses.

Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone displays the $\[mathbb{R}]$ (message waiting) indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.

Press	То
READ key	open the message

Multimedia messages that you receive can contain different media objects:

• Photos, pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message.

• A sound file or video clip begins playing when its slide is displayed. Use the volume keys to adjust the volume as the sound file or video clip plays.

Note: In a multimedia letter, you may have to highlight an indicator in the text to play a sound file or video clip.

• Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/ filename and press the **VIEW** key (image file type), **PLAY** key (sound file or video clip), or **OPEN** key (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).

Using the Phonebook

This section briefly describes basic phonebook operations. For more information about using the phonebook, see page 70.

Storing a Phone Number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press the **STORE** key to create a phonebook entry with that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

Select **MORE** to store another number (for example, a work number) under the same Name.

Recording a Voice Name

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press the **RECORD** key. Press and release the voice key and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted,

press and release the voice key and repeat the name. Press the **DONE** key to store the voice name.



Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

Storing a Picture for Caller ID

You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture appears when you receive calls from the entry.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press the **CHANGE** key. Press $\hat{\phi}$ to select a picture, and press the **SELECT** key to store it for the entry.

Dialing a Number

Press \blacksquare > **Phonebook** > *entry to call* O.

Tip: To quickly highlight entries in your **Phonebook** list: If your entries are sorted by Speed No., press an entry's speed number to highlight it. For example, press 1 5 for entry number 15. If your entries are sorted by **Name**, **Voice Name**, or **Email**, enter the first letter of the entry's name to highlight it. For example, press 5 5 for the first entry that starts with "K".

Voice Dialing a Number

Press and release the voice key, and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds).

Note: To voice dial a phonebook entry you must first record a voice name for the entry (see page 21).

Sorting Phonebook Entries

Press \blacksquare > Phonebook, press \blacksquare > Setup > Sort by, then select whether you want to sort the phonebook list by Name, Speed No., Voice Name, or Email.

When sorting by name, you can view **All** numbers or just the **Primary** number for each name. To set the primary number for a name, see page 72.

Viewing Entries By Category

Press \square > Phonebook, press \square > Categories, then select whether you want to view All entries, entries in a predefined category (Business, Personal, General, VIPs), or entries in a category you created.

To set the category for a phonebook entry, see page 71.

Setting Picture ID View

Press 🗊 > Phonebook, press 🗊 > Setup > View by > Picture.



Using the Display

The *home screen* displays when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the 5-way navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot)$ left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press \bigcirc to return to the home screen.

Note: Your home screen may look different from the display shown above. For example, your service provider may hide the menu feature icons to allow a better view of


the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view. To show or hide the menu icons, see page 74.

The \exists (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (\exists) to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone can display an analog or digital clock in the home screen (see page 73).

The following status indicators can display:



1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the i^{α} (no signal) indicator or $i^{\alpha} \times$ (no transmit) indicator displays.

2. GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:



3. Data Transmission Indicator

Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

4. Roam Indicator



Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

7. Message Indicator



Displays when you receive a new message. Indicators can include:

8. Location Indicator



Your phone may be able to send location information to the network during an emergency call. Indicators show when your phone is sending location information:

9. Ring Style Indicator

Shows the ring style setting.

10. Battery Level Indicator

Using the 5-Way Navigation Key

Use the 5-way navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\phi} \cdot)$ to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system, highlight menu items, change feature settings, and

From the home screen, press 🔳 to enter the main menu.

Selecting a Menu Feature


To select a menu feature, starting from the home screen:



This example shows that from the home screen, you must press (2), scroll to and select (2) **Recent Calls** from the main menu, then scroll to and select **Dialed Calls**. Press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{o}} \cdot$ to scroll, and the left/right soft keys to select the functions displayed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



Press $\hat{\boldsymbol{\diamondsuit}}$ to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.

In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.

In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

When an option has a list of possible values, press $\hat{\phi}$ left or right to scroll through and select a value.

When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information.




Press **CANCEL** key to exit without changes. **DONE** displays after you make changes.

The message center lets you compose and send text messages. A *Character Counter* indicates how many more characters will fit in the message.

Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press *#* in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

Primary	The primary text entry mode (see below to set).
Numeric	Enter numbers only (see page 40).

Symbol	
Secondary	y

Enter symbols only (see page 40). The secondary text entry mode (see below to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry mode in any text entry screen by pressing \blacksquare > Entry Mode.

Setting Up a Text Entry Mode



Press \blacksquare > Entry Setup from any text entry screen. Select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup, and choose:

ITAP	Let the phone predict each word as you press keys (see page 38).
Tap	Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.
Tap Extended	Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.
None	Hide the Secondary setting (only available for Secondary Setup).





Tap Mode Text Entry Rules


- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press < \$\overline{\phi}\$ left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press
 to exit without saving.

Using iTAP™ Mode

iTAP software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **Tap** mode, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.



For example, if you press 7764, letter combinations that match your keypresses display:




If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press # to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which mode is active (see page 35). If **ITAP** mode is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 34.

A space is automatically inserted after the word.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognize, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognized words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

Using Numeric Mode

In a text entry screen, press *#* to switch entry modes until the 123 (numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press # to switch to another entry mode.

Using Symbol Mode

In a text entry screen, press *#* to switch entry modes until the @ (symbol) indicator displays.

Deleting Letters and Words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

Action

Press the **DELETE** key to delete one letter at a time.

Hold the DELETE key to delete all the text.

Using the Smart Key

The smart key (see the diagram on page 1) gives you another way to perform many basic phone functions. It anticipates the next action you are likely to perform. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it. The smart key usually performs the same function as the right soft key.

Using the External Display

When the flip is closed, the external display shows time and phone status information. It also displays messages to notify you of incoming calls and other events. See page 24 for descriptions of the status indicators that may appear in the external display.

Note: You cannot make or receive calls when the phone is closed unless you attach a headset.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's built-in handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **SPEAKER** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from

accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, or PIN2 code if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 55).

If You Forget a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number before you receive your phone.

If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, at the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:



Specific Absorption Rate Data

The model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.40 W/kg , and when worn on the body, as

described in this user guide, is 0.57 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.
