

Safety and General Information

This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.*

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not

complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body.

Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so. These locations include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

Pacemakers

If you have a pacemaker, consult your physician before using this device.

Persons with pacemakers should observe the following precautions:

 ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimeters (8 inches) from your pacemaker when the mobile device is turned ON.

- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital mobile devices may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer or physician to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

Operational Warnings

Automobile Air Bags

Do not place a mobile device in the air bag deployment area.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted, and can include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

When you are in such an area, turn off your mobile device, and do not remove, install, or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

Damaged Products

If your mobile device or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

Choking Hazards

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service center.

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

SIM card

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone

number and phonebook entries. It can also contain your voicemail, text message, and Internet access settings. If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

Insert the SIM card with the gold plate facing down and the notch in the upper right corner as shown:

battery installation

Pull the release button down and hold it there while you lift up the battery door.

battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several



Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

Note: You can charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's mini-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty



- does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.

airplane mode

Airplane mode turns off your phone's calling features in locations where wireless phone use is prohibited. You can use the phone's iTunes® music player and other non-calling features in airplane mode.

To set airplane mode:

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 3\sigma Settings > Profiles > Airplane Mode

When airplane mode is active, the airplane mode indicator >> shows in the top left corner of the display. To reactivate your phones calling features, return to the Profiles menu and select a different profile.

memory card

You can use a removable memory card with your phone to store and retrieve multimedia objects (such as photos and sounds). Your phone can use SD cards with up to a 2 GB capacity.

Note: If you download a copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.

install a memory card

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your memory card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

While lifting the memory card door, press the card into its slot until it clicks into place. Do not remove your



memory card while your phone is using it or writing files on it.

To remove the memory card, push the card in until it clicks. It begins to slide out, and you can slide it the rest of the way out.

see memory card contents

To see files stored on the memory card, press the Main Menu key $> \mathfrak{A}$ Office Tools > File Manager, then choose the memory card icon (\blacksquare).

Tip: Is the memory card icon (**n**) missing? Try turning your phone off, then on again. Then, return to the **File Manager** list.

To refresh the list of items on your memory card, press the Main Menu key > Multimedia > Media Player. If your phone does not prompt you to refresh the list, press the Options key > Refresh

copy files from the phone to the memory card

You can copy files (such as pictures and photos, video clips, and sound files) from your phone to the memory card.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 6 Office Tools > File Manager.

- 1 Select a folder and scroll to the file you want to copy.
- 2 Press the Options key > Send to > Memory Card.
 Note: The Send to option does not appear if the highlighted file is copyright-protected.

Tip: Did your phone say the memory card is not available? Try turning your phone off, then on again. Then, try to copy the file again.

connect the memory card to a computer

You can connect your phone to a computer to transfer files to and from the memory card.

Note: When your phone is connected to a computer, you can access the memory card only through the computer.

On your phone:

Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Connections > USB Settings > Memory Card. The Memory Card option might already be selected.

This directs the USB connection to your memory card. Attach the Motorola Original USB cable to the accessory port on your phone and to an available USB port on your computer. Then follow these steps:

On your computer:

- 1 Find where your phone's memory card displays as a "Removable Disk" icon. On a PC this is the "My Computer" window. On a Mac it's on the desktop.
- 2 Double-click the "Removable Disk" icon to access the files on your phone's memory card.

- **3** To store the desired files onto the memory card, drag and drop them onto the removable disk drive icon.
- 4 When you finish, remove the phone with memory card safely from your computer:

If you are using a PC, right-click the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray at the bottom of your computer screen. Then select "USB Mass Storage Device".

If you are using a Mac, select and drag the "Removable Disk" icon to the "Trash."

file formats that work on your phone Before you copy files to your phone, make sure the files are in a format that your phone recognizes:

H.263 + AAC: video up to 296 Kbps, 320 x 240, 15 fps., 44 kHz, stereo audio in .mp4, 3gp, .pvs, .pvp, .pvx file formats. Real Audio + video: video up to 296 Kbps, 320 x 240, 15 fps., 44 kHz, stereo audio in .rm, .rmvb file formats.

voice commands

You can use voice commands to make calls, open phone applications, and perform basic phone functions.

Note: Not all phone languages suppport voice recognition and voice commands.

voice dial a call

You can dial an entry in your contacts list by speaking the entry's name, or dial any phone number by speaking its digits.

Tip: Speak numbers at a normal speed and volume, pronouncing each digit distinctly. Avoid pausing between digits.

1 Press and release on the right side of your phone.

Your phone prompts you to say a command or name.

2 Say the name of an entry in your contacts list.

or

Say "Dial Number" and speak the digits in the phone number you want to dial.

If your phone recognizes the name or number, it makes the call.

Notes:

- Your phone may prompt you to repeat a name or number. If the name/number isn't valid, the phone doesn't make the call.
- If the phone doesn't recognize the name or number, the display shows a list of names/numbers, asks, "Did you say...," and highlights the first item in the list. Say "Yes" to call the

highlighted number, or "No" to go to the next list item.

To select the name or number manually, scroll to the name/number on the list and press the navigation key in ...

voice activate phone functions

You can use voice commands to open some applications (for example, "Open Camera") or perform many basic phone functions (for example, "Send Message To <Name>"). Press and release to see a complete list of voice commands.

To perform a voice command:

Press and release on the right side of your phone.

Your phone prompts you to say a command or name.



photos

take a photo

Press the Main Menu key > Multimedia > Camera to see the camera viewfinder.



Tip: To take photos in low-light settings, press the **Options** key > **Flash** > *flash* option to use the built-in flash.

- 2 Press the *navigation key in* to take a photo.
- **3** Press the **Send** key to send the photo in a multimedia message.

or

Press the Options key to select another option: Save Only, Discard, Send To, Apply To, or Edit.

To see a picture you saved, press the Main Menu key > 😂 Office Tools > File Manager > Pictures.

Note: You can't assign a photo to a phonebook entry stored on the SIM card.





Bluetooth® wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless connections. You can connect your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit to make handsfree calls. You can connect your phone with a phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections to exchange files.



Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

To change your Bluetooth device address, press the Main Menu key > 43 Office Tools

- > Bluetooth, press the Options key > Manage
- > Setup Bluetooth > Properties > Device Address. Your device address is the number that other Blueooth devices use to identify your phone.

turn Bluetooth power on or off

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 43 Office Tools

- > Bluetooth, press the Options key > Manage
- > Setup Bluetooth > Bluetooth Power > On

Note: To extend battery life, use this procedure to set Bluetooth power to **Off** when not in use. Your phone will not connect to another device until you set Bluetooth power back to **On** and connect your phone to the device again.

use a headset or handsfree car kit

Before you try to connect your phone to a handsfree device, make sure the device is on and ready in pairing or bonding mode (see the user's guide for the device). You can connect your phone with only one device at a time.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 43 Office Tools

- > Bluetooth, press the Options key
- > Search For Devices > Headset

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- 1 Scroll to a device in the list.
- 2 Press the Options key > Manage
 - > Bond With Device to connect to the device.

Your phone automatically uses **0000** as the passkey to bond with the device. If **0000**

does not work, your phone prompts you to enter the device's passkey.

When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator **9** shows in the display.

Shortcut: When Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device and move it near the phone.

copy files to another device

You can copy a photo, picture, video clip, sound file, phonebook entry, datebook event, or bookmark to another phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections.

Note: You can't copy some copyrighted objects.

Before you try to copy a file to another device, make sure the receiving device is **on** and **ready** in discoverable mode.

- 1 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press the Options key, then select:
 - **Send To** > **Bluetooth** for a photo, picture, video clip, or sound file.
 - Send Contact Via > Bluetooth for a phonebook entry.
 - Share Event Via > Bluetooth for a datebook event.
 - Share Page Via > Bluetooth for a bookmark.
- 3 Select a recognized device name, or [Search For All Devices] to search for an unrecognized device where you want to copy the object.

Note: Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, that device can start a similar Bluetooth connection with your phone. Your display shows the Bluetooth indicator when there is a Bluetooth connection.

receive files from another device

Before you try to receive a file from another device, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is on (see page 41). For a list of file fomats work on your phone, see page 33.

- 1 Place your phone near the device, and send the file from the device.

 If your phone and the sending device don't recognize each other, place your phone in discoverable mode so the sending device can locate it. Press the Main Menu key > Office Tools > Bluetooth, press the Options key > Find My Device
- 2 Press the **Accept** key to accept a file from another device. Your phone notifies you when file transfer is complete. If

necessary, press the **Save** key to save the file to the appropriate location.

send a photo to a printer

You can send a photo to a printer that supports Bluetooth connections.

Note: You can print 4×6 or 8.5×11 size pages. To print another size, copy the object to a linked computer and print it from there.

On your phone, take a new photo or scroll to a stored photo that you want to print, then press the Options key > Send To > Printer.

Note: If you see Service Not Supported when you try to print, select

Manage > Copy > Bluetooth instead. Always use this option to print 4x6 photos.

- **2** If available, modify print options.
- 3 Select a recognized printer name, or [Search For All Devices] to search for an

unrecognized printer where you want to send the object.

MOTOSYNC with Exchange ActiveSync

Use MOTOSYNC with Exchange
ActiveSync to synchronize your phone's contacts, calendar, and email directly with your corporate Microsoft Exchange Server 2003. You can schedule when synchronization occurs, and select the type

and amount of information that's synchronized.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > Office Tools > MOTOSYNC > Exchange ActiveSync

If no Exchange ActiveSync profile is stored on your phone, the phone prompts you to create a profile. Contact your IT system administrator to obtain the information you need to set up a profile.

Once you store a profile, you can start synchronization. The first synchronization may take several minutes depending on the amount of data in your contacts list, calendar, and email on the Exchange 2003 server.

Note: If your phone cannot connect to the server, verify that your phone's network service provider has data service activated on your account (additional fees may apply for this service).

MOTOSYNC with SyncML

Use MOTOSYNC with SyncML to synchronize your contacts list, phone calendar, and tasks with a SyncML-compliant server.



Find it: Press the Main Menu key > Office Tools > MOTOSYNC > SyncML

If no SyncML profile is stored on your phone, the phone prompts you to create a profile. Contact your synchronization service provider and phone network service provider to obtain the information you need to set up a profile.

Note: If your phone cannot connect to the server, verify that your phone's network service provider has data service activated on your account (additional fees may apply for this service).

tethered sync

You can connect your phone and PC using a Bluetooth wireless connection (see page 40) or a Motorola Original USB cable connected to your phone and PC.



Before you use a USB cable to sync your phone, set Modem as your USB default connection: Press the Main Menu key

> \$\mathbb{S}\$ Settings > Connections > USB Settings > Modem.





Press the **Main Menu** key to open the main menu. *Soft key labels* show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Press the **Options** key in the home screen to take a picture, create a text message, change the alert profile, or customize the appearance of the home screen.

Press • up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open basic features. You can show or hide icons for these features in the home screen, and change the icons that are shown (for more information about changing icons in the home screen, see page 78).

Status indicators can show at the top of the home screen:



Signal Strength/Airplane Mode Indicator – Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when the no signal indicator ♥ or airplane mode indicator ➤ shows. The roam indicator (\$\phi\$ or \$\frac{1}{2}(1)\$) shows when your phone is seeking or using a network outside your home network.

2 GPRS Indicator – Shows when your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. Indicators can include:

3 Bluetooth Indicator – Shows when your phone is connected to another device in a Bluetooth connection.



To change your text entry mode options, press the Main Menu key > \$\mathbb{S}\$ Settings > Phone Settings > Text Entry.

Change text case (° *): Press ① in a text entry screen to change text case to all capital letters (*), next letter capitalized (°), or next letter lowercase (no symbol). Your phone capitalizes the first letter of each sentence, unless you press ① to choose next letter lowercase.

Set text prediction and completion ($_{\mbox{\tiny pi}}$): Your phone can learn the words you enter, to improve text prediction and completion. In a text entry display, press the Options key > Text Entry > Set Text Prediction > Learn My Words. If

Learn My Words is active, you can also activate Offer Completion so that your phone guesses the rest of a word when you enter the first three letters. Your phone shows when Learn My Words is active and when Offer Completion is also active.

Enter punctuation: Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.


Edit or delete text: To edit text, press · • to position the cursor to the right of text you want to edit. Press the *clear key* to delete the character to the left of the cursor. Hold the *clear key* to delete the word to the left of the cursor.

word mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to "word" predictive text entry mode. Your phone shows in the display.

Word mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The phone combines your keypresses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your display shows:





volume

Press the volume keys to:





- change the speaker volume when playing a song or video clip
- change the earpiece volume during a call
- change the ring profile from the home screen

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the **Options** key > **Speaker On** to turn the handsfree speaker on. Your display shows the speakerphone indicator until you turn it off (press the **Options** key > **Speaker Off**) or end the call.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Security > Change Passwords

You can also change your **SIM PIN** or call barring passwords.

If you forget your unlock code: At the **Please Verify the Unlock Code** prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone

number. If that doesn't work, press # and enter your six-digit security code instead.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

To **manually lock** your phone: Press the **Main Menu** key > \$% **Settings** > **Security** > **Phone Lock** > **Lock Now**.

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press the **Main Menu** key

- > By Settings > Security > Phone Lock
- > Lock at Power On > On.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (for more information, see page 64). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

lock & unlock keypad

You can lock your keypad to prevent accidental key presses. Slide the keypad lock switch up to lock it, or down to unlock.



customize

profiles

You can quickly change your phone's alert profile to match your activity, environment, or personal requirements. Each profile uses a different set of sounds or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. The profile indicator shows at the top of the home screen:

To change your profile, press the volume keys in the home screen.

Airplane Mode turns off your phone's calling features in locations where wireless phone use is prohibited. You can use the phone's music player and other non-calling features in airplane mode.

change alerts in a profile

You can change the alerts that a profiles uses to notify you of incoming calls and other events.

Note: You can't set an alert for the **Silent** profile, or change some settings for some profiles.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 5% Settings > Profiles, scroll to the profile, press the Options key > View

- 1 Scroll to the profile setting you want to change, then press the navigation key in •.
- **2** Select the setting value you want.
- 3 Press the **Save** key to save your profile changes.

create a new profile

You can create a new ring style profile to set alerts for incoming calls and other events.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Profiles, press the Options key > Create New Profile

time & date

Your phone needs to know the current time and date for the **Calendar**.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Phone Settings > Time & Date

To **synchronize** the time and date with the network, > **Auto-Update Local Time** > **On**.

To **manually** set the time and date, turn off **Auto-Update Local Time**, then > **Time** and **Date**.

To change your **time zone**, > **Time Zone**, then select a city in your time zone.

themes

A phone theme is a group of image and sound files that you can apply to your phone. Most themes include a wallpaper image, screen saver image, and ring tones.

To **apply** a theme: Press the **Main Menu** key > **Settings** > **Themes** > *theme*.

modify a theme

You can change the images and sounds that a theme applies to your phone.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 3% Settings > Themes, scroll to the theme, press the Options key > Edit

- 2 Press •• up or down to scroll to the setting you want to change, then press the navigation key in ••.
- **3** Scroll to the image or sound file you want, then select it.
- 4 Press the Save key to save your theme changes.

The **Wallpaper** appears as a background image in your home screen.

The **Screen Saver** shows in the display when no activity is detected for a specified time.

Skins set the look and feel of your phone's display.

To **reset** a theme's default settings: Press the **Main Menu** key > 3% **Settings** > **Themes**, scroll to the theme, press the **Options** key > **Manage** > **Restore To Default**.

create a new theme

You can create a new theme that uses the images and sounds you specify.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Profiles, press the Options key > Create New or Create a Copy.

To **delete** a theme you created: Press the **Main Menu** key > 8% **Settings** > **Themes**, scroll to the theme, press the **Options** key > **Manage** > **Delete**.

display appearance

To set your display **brightness**: Press the **Main Menu** key > **8% Settings** > **Phone Settings** > **Display Settings** > **Brightness**.

To save battery life, the **backlight** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns back on when you press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the backlight turns off:

Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Phone Settings > Display Settings > Backlight Timeout.

To save battery life, the **display** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The display turns back on when you press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the display turns off:

Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Phone Settings > Display Settings > Display Timeout.

To select the delay interval (period of inactivity) before the **screen saver** shows in the display:

Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings

- > Phone Settings > Display Settings
- > Screensaver Timeout.

Tip: This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

answer options

You can set your phone to answer incoming calls when you press any key (not just):

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 8% Settings > Call Settings > In-Call Setup > Answer Options > Any Key Answer

calls

To make and answer calls, see page 22.

turn off a call alert

Press the volume keys to turn off a call alert before answering the call.

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Shortcut: Press from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 📾 Recent Calls

- Press the Options key > View #s to select a call list: All Calls, Dialed Calls, Missed Calls, or Answered Calls
- 2 Scroll to a call. Icons indicate if the call was incoming **(** → or outgoing **(** → , and if it connected ✓.
 - To call the number, press .
 - To see call details (like time and date), press the *navigation key in* ••••.
 - Press the **Options** key to select or adjust recent calls options:

To select or adjust call times and costs, see page 79.

redial

1 Press from the home screen to see the Dialed Calls list.

2 Scroll to the number you want to call, then press ②.

If you hear a **busy signal** and you see **Call Failed**, press ① or the **Retry** key to redial the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, shows **Connected**, and connects the call.

return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and shows **X Missed Calls**, where **X** is the number of missed calls.

- Press the **View** key to see the **Dialed Calls** calls list.
- 2 Press the Options key > View by # > Missed Calls.
- 3 Scroll to the call you want to return, then press ①.

hold or mute a call

To put all active calls on hold, press the **Options** key > **Hold**.

To put all active calls on mute, press the **Options** key > **Mute**.

call waiting

When you're on a call, you'll hear an alert if you receive a second call.



Press to answer the new call.

- To switch between calls, press the Switch key.
- To connect the two calls, press the Link key.
- To end the call on hold, press the Options key > End Call On Hold.

To turn the call waiting feature on or off:

Find it: Press the Main Menu key > 3% Settings > Call Settings > In-Call Setup > Call Waiting

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your contacts list, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

To show or hide **your phone number** for the next outgoing call, enter digits in the display, then press the **Options** key > **Hide ID** or **Show ID**. To show or hide your phone number for all calls, press the **Main Menu** key > **Settings** > **Call Settings** > **In-Call Setup** > **My Caller ID** > **All Calls**.

Tip: You can identify callers without even looking. To give one of your contacts a special ring, see page 70.

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.


