




# Safety and General Information

# Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

# **Operational Precautions**

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following instructions.

#### External Antenna Care

If your phone has an external antenna, use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and/or may result in non-compliance with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

#### Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline phone.

## **Body-Worn Operation: Voice Communication**

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting voice communications, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines.

If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

## **Data Operation**

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body.

#### Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries, antennas, and convertible covers, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

# RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

**Note:** Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

**Note:** This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

#### **Facilities**

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

#### Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your device offers a flight mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about use in flight. If your device offers a feature that automatically turns on the phone, then turn off this feature before boarding an airplane or entering an area where the use of wireless devices is restricted.

#### **Medical Devices**

#### **Pacemakers**

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 centimeters (6 inches) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 15 centimeters (6 inches) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

#### **Hearing Aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

# **Use While Driving**

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a phone may be distracting in certain circumstances. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

# **Operational Warnings**

# For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

#### Gas or Petrol Stations

Obey all posted signs with respect to the use of radio equipment in gas or petrol stations. Turn off your wireless device if instructed by authorized staff

## Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

**Note:** The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

#### Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

## **Damaged Products**

If your phone or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center to determine if it has been damaged. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

#### **Batteries and Chargers**

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewelry, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become hot. Take care when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original<sup>TM</sup> batteries and chargers.** 

**Caution:** To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

# **Choking Hazards**

Your phone or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your phone and its accessories away from small children.

# Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone. (The flashing-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms

occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

# Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:


- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

# about this guide

This guide shows how to locate a menu feature as follows:

Find it: Press > Recent Calls > Dialed Calls

This example shows that, from the home screen, you press to open the menu, highlight and select Recent Calls, then highlight and select Dialed Calls.

Press • to scroll to and highlight a menu feature. Press • or the **SELECT** key to select the highlighted menu feature.

# SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries.

**Caution:** Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Slide the SIM card under the retention tabs and into the card slot as shown:





# battery

# battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.


- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

**Warning:** Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

# battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Open the protective cover and plug the travel charger into your phone as shown. Plug the other end into an electrical outlet. The battery charge



indicator light shows when the battery is charging. Your display shows **Charge Complete** when finished.

**Tip:** Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.


# flip

Please Note: Your phone's flip and keypad area contains exposed magnets, which may cause damage to credit cards, magnetic ID cards, and other magnetically encoded materials. Don't place these or other items that are sensitive to magnetic fields in direct contact with the exposed magnets.



To **open** your phone flip:

- 1 Firmly grasp the phone body with the flip facing you, and use your thumb to pull down on the side of the flip.
- **2** Remove your thumb to let the flip spring open.



**Note:** You also can open the flip, without damage, by pulling up at the base like a standard flip phone.

# turn it on & off

**Caution:** On power up, the phone may prompt you to enter your SIM card PIN code to unlock the SIM card. If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your display shows **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn on your phone, press and hold for a few seconds or until the display turns on. If prompted, enter your six-digit SIM card PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.

To turn off your phone, press and hold for two seconds.

#### make a call

Enter a phone number and press • to make a call.

To "hang up," close the flip or press .

**Note:** Closing the flip doesn't end a call when the handsfree speaker is turned on (see page 50).

# answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press to answer.

To "hang up," close the flip or press .

**Note:** Closing the flip doesn't end a call when the handsfree speaker is turned on (see page 50).

# your phone number

From the home screen, press 🔳 ## to see your number.

**Tip:** Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press **> My Tel. Numbers**.

To store or edit your name and phone number on your SIM card, press the **EDIT** key while showing your number. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.

# main attractions

You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls!

## voice commands

You can use voice commands to make calls, and to open and use some phone applications.

**Note:** Not all phone languages suppport voice recognition and voice commands.

# open applications

To open the **Camera** or **Voicemail** applications, **Redial** (dialed calls list), or **Received Calls** list:

- Press and release the voice key.
   Your phone prompts you to say a command.
- 2 Say one of the following commands:
  - "Camera," "Voicemail," "Redial" (dialed calls list), or "Received Calls"

Your phone opens the application.

#### make a call

You can use voice commands to make a call:

• Use **name dial** to dial a phonebook entry by speaking the entry's name.

• Use **digit dial** to dial any phone number by speaking its digits.

**Tip:** Speak numbers at a normal speed and volume, pronouncing each digit distinctly. Avoid pausing between digits.

- Press and release the voice key.
   Your phone prompts you to say a command.
- 2 Say "Name Dial" or "Digit Dial."
- **3** When prompted, say the name of the phonebook entry or speak the digits in the phone number.

If your phone recognizes the name or number, it makes the call.

#### Notes:


- Your phone may prompt you to repeat a name or number. If the name/number isn't valid, the phone doesn't make the call.
- If the phone does not recognize the name or number, the display shows a list of names/numbers, asks, "Did you say ...," and highlights the first item in the list. Say "Yes" to call the highlighted number, or "No" to go to the next list item.
  - To select the name or number manually, scroll to the name/number on the list and press the **SELECT** key.
- You can improve voice dial operations by training the phone to recognize your voice. Press > Settings
   Personalize > Voice Dial Setup > Adapt Digits.

# video clips

## record video clip

Find it: Press > Multimedia > Videos > [New Video]

The display shows the active viewfinder image.




**Note:** You can zoom only before you start recording.

- 1 Point the camera lens at the video subject.
- **2** Press the **CAPTURE** key to begin video recording.
- **3** Press the **STOP** key to stop video recording.
  - To delete the video clip and return to the active viewfinder, press the DISCARD key.
  - To store the video clip, press the STORE key.
     Your storage options are Send in Message or Store Only.

# play video clip

Find it: Press 🔳 > Multimedia > Videos > video clip

The display shows the video clip in the playback screen.



# take & send photo

Press > Multimedia > Camera to see the camera viewfinder.



- **1** Point the camera lens at the photo subject.
- **2** Press the **CAPTURE** key to take a photo.
  - To delete the photo and return to the active viewfinder, press the DISCARD key.
  - To store or send the photo, press the STORE key.

Your storage options are Send in Message, Store Only, Apply as Wallpaper, Apply as Screen Saver, Apply as Phone Entry, or Print and Store.

You can use the **Print and Store** option to print the picture over a Bluetooth® connection (see page 34).

# self portrait

- 1 Press **T** > Multimedia > Camera to activate the camera.
- 2 Press **T** > Auto-Timed Capture.
- 3 Press left or right to set a five or 10 second timer delay, then press the START key.
- 4 Close the flip, and aim the camera lens.
- 5 When you hear the camera click, open the flip to see your photo.

# send a multimedia message

A Multimedia Messaging Service (MMS) message contains pages with text and media objects (including



photos, sounds, or video clips). You can send the multimedia message to other MMS-capable phones, and to email addresses.

#### Find it: Press ☑ > Create Message > New Multimedia Msg

1 Press keypad keys to enter text on the page (for details about text entry, see page 44).

To insert a **picture**, **sound**, **video clip**, **voice record**, **quick note**, or **contact info** on the page, press  $\boxed{\blacksquare} >$ **Insert**. Select the file type and the file.

To insert **another page** in the message, enter text or objects on the current page and press

**I** > Insert > New Page. You can enter more text and objects on the new page.

2 When you finish the message, press > Message Options to set message options:

To enter a **subject** for the message, highlight **Subject** and press the center key  $\hat{\bullet}$ .

To attach a file to the message, highlight Attachments and press • Select the file type and the file.

To set message **priority**, or request a message **delivery report** or **read report**, highlight the option and press ••.

- When you finish setting message options, press the DONE key.
- **4** Press the **SEND TO** key to select one or more message recipients:

To select a **phonebook entry**, highlight the entry and press the center key •. Repeat to add other phonebook entries.

To enter a new **phone number**, highlight [New Number] and press  $\hat{\bullet}$ .

To enter a new **email address**, highlight [New Email Address] and press  $\cdot \hat{\Phi}$ .

**5** To **send** the message, press the **SEND** key.

To cancel or save the message as a Draft, press 🔳.

# receive a multimedia message

When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone plays an alert and the display shows New Message with a message indicator such as  $\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{\ensuremath{\mathbb{R}}}}}$ .



Press the **READ** key to open the message.

- Photos, pictures, and animations show as you read the message.
- A sound file plays when its page shows. Use the volume keys to adjust the sound volume.

**Note:** In a multimedia letter, you may have to highlight an indicator in the text to play a sound file.

 Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open an attachment, highlight the file indicator/filename and press the VIEW key (image), PLAY key (sound), or OPEN key (phonebook vCard, datebook vCalendar entry, or unknown file type).

# Bluetooth® wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless *pairing* (also called *linking* or *bonding*). You can pair your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or pair your phone with another device to exchange and synchronize files.

**Note:** The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

# turn Bluetooth power on or off

When Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically pair with the handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device and move it within range of the phone.

**Note:** To extend battery life, use this procedure to set Bluetooth power to **Off** when not in use. Your phone will not pair with devices until you set Bluetooth power back to **On** and pair your phone with the devices again.

# pair with a headset or handsfree device

**Before you try to pair your phone with a device**, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **on** and the device is **on** and **ready** in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the user's guide for the device). You can pair your phone with only one device at a time.



Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- 1 Highlight a device in the list and press the **SELECT** key.
- 2 Press the YES key to pair with the device.
- **3** If necessary, enter the device passkey (such as **0000**) and press the **0K** key.

When your phone is paired, the Bluetooth indicator ≱ shows in the home screen and the external Bluetooth indicator light flashes.

**Tip:** For specific information about a device, see the instructions that came with it.

# copy objects to another device

You can use Bluetooth pairing to copy a media object, phonebook entry, datebook event, or bookmark from your phone to a computer or other device.



- 1 Highlight the object on your phone that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press and select Copy (for media objects) Send (for datebook events or bookmarks), or Share Phonebook Entry (for phonebook entries).
- 3 Select a recognized device name, or [Look For Devices] to search for the device where you want to copy the object.

# send objects to a printer

You can use Bluetooth pairing to send a picture, message, phonebook entry, or datebook event from your phone to a printer.



**Note:** You can print A4 or US Letter size pages. To print another size, copy the object to a linked computer and print it from there. You cannot print Quick Notes, MMS Templates, or a phonebook Mailing List.

1 On your phone, highlight the object that you want to print, then press **T** > **Print**.

**Tip:** If you see it, you can print it. After you capture a picture in the camera, you can press the **STORE** key and select **Print and Store**.

- **2** If available, choose additional objects or print options.
- 3 Select a recognized printer name listed in the Printers menu, or [Look For Devices] to search for the device to which you want to send the object.



The *home screen* shows when you turn on the phone. To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and **©**.

**Note:** Your home screen may look different, depending on your service provider.




The menu indicator  $\blacksquare$  shows that you can press  $\blacksquare$  to open the menu. Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Your home screen might show scrolling headlines from your service provider. To change this headline view, press S > Settings > Personalize > Home Screen.



Press • up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open basic menu features. You can show or hide menu icons for these features in the home screen, and change the menu icons that are shown. For more information, see page 74.

### iTAP® mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see or or , press > Entry Setup to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your display shows:



 If you want a different word (such as Progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.


- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.
- Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.

### tap mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to tap mode. If you don't see 1 or 2, press  $\boxed{\mathbb{E}}$  > Entry Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

For example, if you press 7 one time, your display shows:



When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog** your display might show:



To enter a different word (such as **progress**), press keys to enter remaining characters.

- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press • down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- Press to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- If you don't want to save your text or text edits, press to exit without saving.
- Tap extended mode cycles through additional special characters and symbols as you repeatedly press a keypad key.

#### numeric mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see 123. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.


### symbol mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see @. Press a keypad key to show its symbols at the bottom of the display. Highlight the symbol you want, then press the **SELECT** key.

### volume

Press the volume keys to:

- · turn off an incoming call alert
- change the earpiece volume during a call
- change the ringer volume from the home screen



**Tip:** Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Vibrate** or **Silent** by pressing the down volume key repeatedly in the home screen.


## navigation key

Press the *navigation key* • • up, down, left, or right to scroll and highlight menu items. When you highlight something, press the *center key* • to select it. The center key usually does the same thing as the right soft key.



## smart key

The smart key gives you another way to do things. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it (instead of pressing the **SELECT** key). The smart key usually



does the same thing as the right soft key. To change what the smart key does in the home screen, see page 76.

## external display

When your phone is closed, the external display shows the time and indicates phone status, incoming calls, and other events. For a list of phone status indicators, see page 39.

**Tip:** To change external display orientation, press > Settings > Initial Setup > External Display > Left Orientation or Right Orientation.

### set phone ring style in external display

- 1 Press a volume key to see Ring Styles.
- **2** Press the smart key repeatedly, until the style you want appears.
- **3** Press a volume key to return to the home screen.

### return unanswered call in external display

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and the external display shows **X Missed Calls**.

**Tip:** Since the microphone and earpiece are hidden when the phone is closed, you'll have to use a headset or other handsfree device to make and receive calls



**Note:** The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

- 1 Press the smart key to see the received calls list.
- 2 Press the volume keys to highlight an unanswered call.
  - To call the number with a headset connected to your phone, press and hold the smart key.
  - To exit without calling, press the smart key briefly.

## handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off. Your display shows **Spkrphone On** until you turn it off or end the call.

#### Notes:

- Closing the flip doesn't end a call when the handsfree speaker is turned on.
- The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset.

## codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

Find it:  $Press \equiv Settings > Security > New Passwords$ 

You can also change your SIM PIN codes.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press and enter your six-digit security code instead.

**If you forget other codes:** If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

## lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

To **manually lock** your phone: Press **> Settings** > **Security** > **Phone Lock** > **Lock Now**.

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press  $\blacksquare$  > Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > On.

**Note:** You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 60). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

## ring style

Each ring style profile uses a different set of sounds or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. The **Silent** profile silences your phone until you set another ring style. Here are the profiles you can choose:

The ring style profile's indicator shows at the top of your home screen. To choose your profile:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Ring Styles > Style > style name

### change alerts in a ring style

You can change the alerts for incoming calls and other events. Your changes are saved in the current ring style profile.

Find it: Press  $\blacksquare$  > Settings > Ring Styles > style Detail

**Note:** *Style* represents the current ring style. You can't set an alert for the **Silent** ring style profile.

- 1 Highlight Calls (or Line 1 or Line 2 for dual line phones), then press the CHANGE key to change it.
- 2 Highlight the alert you want, then press the **SELECT** key.
- **3** Press the **BACK** key to save the alert setting.

### time & date

You need to set your phone's time and date to use the datebook.

Find it:  $Press \square > Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date$ 

To **synchronize** the time and date with the network: Press Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date > Autoupdate > On.

To **manually** set the time and date, turn off **Autoupdate**, then: Press **> Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Time** and **Date** > **Time** and **Date**.

Note: If your home screen shows headlines from your service provider, you must turn off the headlines to see an analog clock. Press > Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Headlines > Off. To choose an analog clock, press > Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Display > Clock > Analog.

## wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

Picture	Select a picture for your wallpaper image, or <b>None</b> for no wallpaper.
Layout	Select <b>Center</b> to center the image in the display, <b>Tile</b> to repeat the image across the display, or <b>Fit-to-screen</b> to stretch the image across the display.

#### screen saver

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image. The screen saver shows in the display when the flip is open and no activity is detected for a specified time.

**Tip:** This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

### themes

A phone theme is a group of image and sound files that you can apply to your phone. Most themes include a wallpaper image, screen saver image, and ring tone. Your phone may come with some themes, and you can download more.

To **apply** a theme: Press  $\blacksquare$  > **Multimedia** > **Themes** > *theme*.

To download a theme, see page 84.

To **delete** a theme: Press  $\blacksquare$  > Multimedia > Themes, scroll to the theme, and press  $\blacksquare$  > Delete or Delete All.

Note: You can delete only downloaded themes.

## display appearance

To choose a phone **skin** that sets the look and feel of your phone's display: Press **Settings** > **Personalize** > **Skin**.

To set your display **brightness**: Press > Settings > Initial Setup > Brightness.

To save battery life, the **backlight** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the backlight turns off:

Press 🔳 > Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight.

**Note:** To turn the backlight on or off for Java<sup>TM</sup> applications, press  $\square$  > **Settings** > **Java Settings** > **App Backlight**.

To save battery life, the **display** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The display turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the display turns off:

### turn off a call alert

You can press the volume keys to turn off a call alert before answering the call.

### recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

**Shortcut:** Press from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Recent Calls

- 1 Highlight Received Calls or Dialed Calls, then press the SELECT key.
- 2 Highlight a call. A ✓ next to a call means the call connected.
  - To call the number, press .
  - To see call details (like time and date), press the VIEW key.
  - To see the Last Calls Menu, press : This menu can include:

### redial

- Press from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.
- 2 Highlight the entry you want to call, then press .

If you hear a **busy signal** and you see **Call Failed**, **Number Busy**, press • or the **RETRY** key to redial the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, shows **Redial Successful**, and connects the call.

### return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and shows **X Missed Calls**, where **X** is the number of missed calls.

- 1 Press the VIEW key to see the received calls list.
- 2 Highlight the call you want to return, then press .

## notepad

The last set of digits entered on the keypad are stored in *notepad* memory. This can be the last phone number you called, or a number that you "jot down" during a call for later use. To see the number stored in the notepad:

### Find it: Press 🔳 > Recent Calls > Notepad

- To call the number, press .
- To create a phonebook entry with the number in the No. field, press the STORE key.
- To open the Dialing Menu to attach a number or insert a special character, press

### hold or mute a call

To put all active calls on hold, press > Hold.

To put all active calls on mute, press  $\blacksquare$  > **Mute**.

## call waiting

When you're on a call, you'll hear an alert if you receive a second call.



Press • to answer the new call.

- To switch between calls, press the **SWITCH** key.
- To connect the two calls, press the **LINK** key.
- To end the call on hold, press 🗉 > End Call On Hold.

To turn the call waiting feature on or off:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > In-Call Setup > Call Waiting

### caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your phonebook, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

You can set your phone to play a different ringer ID for an entry stored in your phonebook (see page 67).

To show or hide **your phone number** for the next outgoing call, enter digits in the display, then:

Find it: Press > Hide ID/Show ID

## emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

**Note:** Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- **2** Press **©** to call the emergency number.

### international calls

If your phone service includes international dialing, press and hold ① to insert your local international access code (indicated by +). Then, press the keypad keys to dial the country code and phone number.

### 1-touch dial

To call phonebook entries 1 through 9, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for one second.

You can set 1-touch dial to call the entries in your phone's memory phonebook, your SIM card's phonebook, or your fixed dial list:

Find it: Press > Settings > Initial Setup > 1 Touch Dial > Phone, SIM, or Fixed Dial

To add a new phonebook entry, see page 64. To edit the speed dial number for a phonebook entry, press **T** > **Phonebook**, highlight the entry, then press **T** > **Edit**.

### voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number



**Note:** Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone shows the voicemail message indicator and **New Voicemail**. Press the **CALL** key to listen to the message.

To check voicemail messages:

Find it: Press **□** > Voicemail

Your phone may prompt you to store your voicemail phone number. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider

**Note:** You can't store a  $\mathfrak{p}$  (pause),  $\mathfrak{w}$  (wait), or  $\mathfrak{n}$  (number) character in this number. If you want to store a voicemail number with these characters, create a phonebook entry for it. Then, you can use the entry to call your voicemail.

## **Specific Absorption Rate Data**

The model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.65 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as

described in this user guide, is 0.65 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).<sup>2</sup>

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.
