





Installing the Battery







Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

Always use Motorola Original™ batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.

When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.

When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.

Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F).

Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.

It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.


Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Before using your phone, read the battery safety information in the "Safety and General Information" section included in this guide.

Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

 Insert the charger into the USB connector on your phone as shown.



3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, remove the charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the charger connected to the phone after charging is complete. This will **not** damage the battery.

Note: When you charge the battery, the battery level indicator in the upper right corner of the display shows how much of the charging process is complete. At least 1

segment of the battery level indicator must be visible to ensure full phone functionality while charging.

Turning On Your Phone

- 1 Open your phone.
- 2 Press and hold the power key for 3 seconds.


The phone may require several seconds to power on.

3	If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock
	code (the last 4 digits of your phone
	number) and press the OK key to unlock
	the phone.

Adjusting Volume

Press the up or down volume keys to:

• increase or



decrease earpiece volume during a call

- increase or decrease ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible (phone must not be in a call and flip must be open)
- silence an incoming call alert

Making a Call

Dial the number.

Tip: If you make a mistake, press the clear key **to** delete the last digit. Press and hold **to** clear all digits.

- 2 Press 💿 to make the call.
- 3 Press 💿 to end the call.

Tip: Closing the flip also ends the call unless you are using the speakerphone feature (see page 36).

Note: You must dial the phone number from the home screen. See page 24.

Answering a Call

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

- 1 Press 🕑 to answer.
- 2 Press 💿 to end the call.

Tip: You can set the phone to answer calls when you open the flip. (To activate, press MENU $(-\hat{\phi} \cdot) \rightarrow \Re$ SETTINGS & TOOLS \checkmark Call Settings \checkmark In-Call Setup \checkmark Answer Options \checkmark Open to Answer.) **Note:** If the phone is locked, you must first enter your 4-digit unlock code to answer the call.

Changing the Call Alert

Phone Flip Open

In the home screen, press the down volume key to switch to lower call alert volume, then

switch to vibrate and, finally, silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back from silent alert to vibrate and then to the lowest alert volume setting.



Phone Flip Closed



key to scroll through the alert styles: Loud, Soft, Vibrate, Vibe & Ring, and Silent. The alert styles are shown on the external display.

After scrolling to the desired alert style, press the up or down volume key to save the setting and return to the home screen.

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press 🖼 #.

While you are on a call, press the $\ensuremath{\text{Options}}$ key, then select $\ensuremath{\text{My Tel}}$. Numbers.

Highlight Features

You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls! This section describes some of your phone's highlights.

Recording and Playing Video Clips

You can record a video clip with your phone, and send it to other wireless phone users in a multimedia message.


Recording a Video Clip

To activate your phone's video camera:

- 1 Press · ¢· left to open the GET PIX & FLIX menu.
- 2 Scroll to Take FLIX and press OK (.....).

Tip: You can also activate the video camera viewfinder by pressing and holding the camera key @P.

The active viewfinder image appears on your display.



Point the camera lens at the video subject, then:

Press $\hat{\mathbf{\phi}}$ up and down to zoom in and out. Press $\hat{\mathbf{\phi}}$ left and right to control brightness.

Press the **Pause** key to temporarily stop recording, then the **Resume** key to continue.

- 2 Press Stop $(\cdot \hat{•})$ to stop recording.
- 3 Press the Save key to save the video.

or

Press SEND (...) to save the video and go to the CREATE PIX MESSAGE screen.

or

Press the **Erase** key to delete the photo and return to active viewfinder.

Adjusting Video Recording Settings

When the video camera is active, press **Options** to open the **OPTIONS** menu, which can include the following options:

Option Brightness Adjust image brightness. White Balance Adjust for different lighting. Duration Specify standard lengths of video clips of 5, 10, or 15 seconds. Color Effects

Select Normal, Sepia, Black & White, or Negative.

Playing a Video Clip


To play a video clip stored on your phone:

- 1 Press · ¢· left to open the GET PIX & FLIX menu.
- 2 Scroll to My FLIX and press OK (.....).

Press the **Mute** key while the video clip is playing to mute the video clip sound. Press **Mute** again to turn sound on again.

Taking and Sending a Photo

The active viewfinder image appears on your phone's display.



Point the camera lens at the photo subject, then:

1 Press TAKE (.♠.) to take a photo.

Press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot$ up and down to zoom in and out. Press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot$ left and right to increase and decrease brightness.

2 Press the Save key to save the photo.

or

Press SEND ($\dot{•}$) to save the photo and go to the Create Pix Msg screen.

or

Press the **Erase** key to delete the photo and return to active viewfinder.

Adjusting Camera Settings

When the camera is active, press **Options** to open the **OPTIONS** menu, which can include the following options:

Option

Resolution

Set resolution to High (1280x1024), Medium (640x480), Low (320x240), or Thumbnail (160x120).

Self timer

Set a timer for the camera to take a photo.

Brightness

Adjust image brightness.

White Balance

Adjust for different lighting.

Sending a Picture Message



A picture message contains embedded media objects (possibly including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice records). You can send a picture message to

other Verizon Wireless picture messaging-capable phones and to other email addresses.

Find the MENU (\bullet)) \diamondsuit MESSAGING New Pix Msg Feature

Press keypad keys, then **OK** (...), to enter a phone number.

or

Press Add \checkmark Contacts, then OK ($\cdot \hat{\bullet} \cdot$). For each **Contacts** entry you want to add, highlight the entry and press $OK(\mathbf{\Phi})$. Press **Done** when finished adding Contacts entries.

or

Press Add - Recent Calls, then OK (...). For each call you want to add, highlight the entry and press **OK** (...). Press **Done** when finished adding entries from Recent Calls.

- Scroll to Text. 2
- 3 Press keypad keys to enter message text.
- 4 Scroll to **Pix** and press the **Gallery** key.
- Scroll to highlight a picture to insert, and 5 press OK (...).
- Scroll to **Sound** and press the **Sounds** key. 6
- 7 Scroll to highlight a sound to insert, and press OK (...).
- 8 Scroll to Subject.

or

Press **Options**, scroll to **Add Quick Text**, then press **OK** $(\cdot \hat{•} \cdot)$, to select a **Quick Text** item as the message subject.

10 Press **SEND** $(\mathbf{\bullet})$ to send the message.

or

Press **Options** to send the message later, save the message in the drafts folder, set priority, or specify how long the message is valid for delivery.

Receiving a Picture Message



When you receive a picture message, your phone displays the

☑ (message waiting) indicator and a New Message notification, and sounds an alert.

Open the flip and select to view the message immediately or to save it in your **Inbox** for viewing later.

To view messages in your Inbox:

- **1** Scroll to the desired message.
- 2 Press **Open** to open the message. Your phone first displays the picture, then the message.

Picture messages that you receive can contain different media objects:

- Photos, pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- A sound file begins playing when its slide is displayed. Use the volume keys

to adjust the volume as the sound file plays.

 Attached files are appended to the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/filename and press VIEW (image file type), PLAY (sound file), or OPEN (vObject such as a Contacts or datebook entry, or unknown file type).

Bluetooth Connections

Your phone supports Bluetooth® connections. You can connect your phone to a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or connect to another device to exchange and synchronize files.

Your phone currently supports the following Bluetooth profiles:

 headset (optional Motorola Original[™] accessory) Handsfree Car Kit (optional Motorola Original accessory)

Note: To extend battery life, use the above procedure and set Bluetooth power to Off when not in use. If you turn Bluetooth power Off, your phone will not connect to accessories until you turn Bluetooth power On and reconnect to the accessories.

Pairing with a Headset, Handsfree Device, or PC

Before you try to connect to another Bluetooth device, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **On** and the device is in *pairing*. mode (see the user guide for the device you



are attempting to pair with). You cannot perform pairing while your phone is connected to another device

To pair your phone to a headset accessory, handsfree car kit, or PC that supports Bluetooth wireless connections:

Your phone displays a list of device(s) located within range of the phone. If your phone is already connected to a device, your phone lists that device and identifies it with a (in-use indicator). Once a connection is established with a device, no other device can connect to your phone until the currently connected device is disconnected.

Highlight a device in the list of devices 1 your phone found.

- 2 Press the Select key to connect the device.
- **3** If the device requests permission to bond with your phone, select **YES** and enter the device PIN code to create a secure connection with the device.

Note: The default PIN code is 0000.

When the connection is made, the **(Bluetooth)** indicator or a **Bluetooth** message displays in the home screen.

Tip: For specific information about an accessory, refer to the instructions that came with it.

Synchronize Data



Use a Bluetooth wireless connection or a USB cable connection to transfer and synchronize data between your phone and a PC. To transfer data between your phone and PC, you must install the Motorola Mobile PhoneTools software included with the Motorola Original[™] data kit. See the data kit user's guide for more information.

Motorola Mobile PhoneTools software is designed to synchronize with basic features of many popular Personal Information Management (PIM) software and hardware products. Use Motorola Mobile PhoneTools software to synchronize data between your phone and PC.

To synchronize data between your phone and PC, select the **Sync** option from the Motorola Mobile PhoneTools software running on the PC. See the Mobile PhoneTools user's guide for more information.

TTY Operation

You can use an optional TTY device with your phone to send and receive calls. You must plug the TTY device into the phone's headset jack and set the phone to operate in 1 of 3 TTY modes.

Note: Use a TSB-121 compliant cable (provided by the TTY manufacturer) to connect the TTY device to your phone.

Note: Set the phone to level 4 (middle setting) for proper operation. If you experience a high number of incorrect characters, adjust the volume as needed to minimize the error rate.

Note: For optimal performance, your phone should be at least 12 inches (30 centimeters) from the TTY device. Placing the phone too close to the TTY device may cause high error rates.

Setting TTY Mode

When you set your phone to a TTY mode, it operates in that mode whenever the TTY device is connected.

When your phone is in a TTY mode, the international TTY mode, the international TTY symbol, and the mode setting display during an active TTY call.

Returning to Voice Mode

To return to standard voice mode, select Voice from the TTY Setup menu.




Learning to Use Your Phone

Using the Display

The *home screen* is displayed when you are not on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



The **MENU** label in the bottom center of the display shows that you can press the \bullet key to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone displays indicators in 2 areas:

Indicators are described below.

System Status Indicators

Alert/Indicator

T.II Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection.

Roaming Indicator

Indicates phone is in digital coverage area.

1x-EVDO Indicator

Indicates phone is in 1x-EVDO coverage area (necessary for VCAST services).

1X Indicator

Indicates phone is in 1x-RTT coverage area.

S SSL Indicator

Indicates application verification is via SSL during a download session.

Alert/Indicator

P Voice Privacy Indicator

Indicates Voice Privacy is set to On and is enabled during active call.

In the second secon

Shows during data call, tethered mode, or WAP/BREW application.

Indicates phone is dormant and PPP session is active.

No Service Indicator

Phone is in area with no service coverage.

TTY Indicator

Phone is in TTY mode.

Voice Call Indicator

Shows during an active voice call.

Alert/Indicator

E911 Indicator

Indicates E911 is set to On.

⊕» Location On Indicator

Indicates Location is set to On.

Keypad Lock Indicator

Indicates keypad lock is set to On.

Battery Level Indicator

Shows battery charge level. The more bars, the greater the charge.

Shows number of voicemail messages received.


Shows when an alarm has been set.

Using the 5-Way Navigation Key

Use the 5-way navigation key $(\dot{\mathbf{\Phi}})$ to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system. Press the center key $\dot{\mathbf{\Phi}}$ select a highlighted menu item.

Using Menus

From the home screen, press $\textbf{MENU}~(\boldsymbol{\hat{\phi}})$ to enter the main menu.



Press $\hat{\mathbf{o}}$ to scroll down to a menu feature icon in the main menu. The following icons represent features that may appear in the main menu, depending on your service provider and service subscription options.

Menu Shortcuts

Your phone displays 4 menu icons in the middle of the home screen.



Press $\dot{\mathbf{\varphi}}$ left, right, up, or down to open the menu represented by the icon you select. You can change the menu icons that appear in the home screen, or set your phone not to display icons in the home screen (see "Show or Hide Menu Icons" on page 61).

Selecting a Menu Option

This guide uses the following format to show you how to select a menu feature, starting from the home screen.


Find the	MENU (•♠•) ▶ '' RECENT CALLS
Feature	🗸 Dialed

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press **MENU** ($\hat{•}$), scroll across to **RECENT CALLS** on the main menu, then scroll down to and select **Dialed**. Press $\hat{•}$ to scroll across and down, and the center select key $\hat{•}$ to select a menu option.

Tip: From the main menu, you can quickly select a menu feature by pressing the number key associated with that feature. For example, from the **SETTINGS & TOOLS** menu, press **(4)** to select **Display**.

Selecting a Feature Option


When you select certain features, your phone displays a list of items or options that you can select. For example, when you view the dialed calls list, you can select an entry and perform additional tasks on that entry:




- Press + to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option
- When an option has a list of possible values, press •o. left or right to scroll through and select a value.
- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information. The following is a sample of a screen for **Contacts** entry information.



The message center lets you compose and send text messages.



Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry mode make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode. Press the left soft key in any text entry screen to select 1 of the following entry modes:

- iTAP Let the phone predict each word (in English) as you press keys.
- iTAP Let the phone predict each word
- Spanish (in Spanish) as you press keys.
- Abc Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key 1 or more times, 1st character in in uppercase.
- ABC Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key 1 or more times, all characters in in uppercase.
- 123 Enter numbers only.
- Symbols Enter symbols.

Capitalization and Numbers

Press K in any text entry screen to cycle through entry methods:

abc = no capital letters

ABC = all capital

iTAP= predictive text entry

Abc = capitalize next letter only

123 = all numbers

Using Tap Mode

From a text entry screen, specify Tap mode by pressing the Abc key, then selecting Abc or ABC.


This is the standard method for entering text on your phone. Regular Tap mode cycles through the letters and numbers of the key you press, as shown in the "Character Chart" on page 33.

- 1 Press a keypad key 1 or more times to select a letter, number, or symbol.
- 2 Enter the remaining characters.

Tip: Press $\hat{\phi}$ right to accept a word completion, or \blacksquare to insert a space.

3 Press the **OK** key to store the text.

When you enter text with Tap mode, the soft key functions change.



When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog**, you might see:



If you want a different word (such as **progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Note: This chart shows lowercase letters, which are produced in ABC mode. Select ABC mode to produce the capitalized versions of the letters shown.

Note: This chart may not reflect the exact character set available on your phone. In a URL editor, ① first shows common characters for that editor.

Tap Mode Text Entry Rules

• Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.

- Press • left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press •• down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press
 to exit without saving.

Using iTAP Mode

From a text entry screen, specify iTap mode by pressing the Abc key, then selecting iTAP English or iTAP Spanish.

iTAP software provides a predictive text entry method that lets you enter a word using 1 key press per letter. This can be faster than Tap mode, because your phone combines the key presses into common words.

For example, if you press **[7] [7] [6] [4]**, you see the letters **Program**. If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

- 1 Press keypad keys (1 press per letter) to show possible letter combinations at the bottom of the display.
- **2** Scroll left or right to highlight the combination you want.
- **3** Press the **SELECT** key to lock a highlighted combination. You can press keypad keys to add more letters to the end of the combination.

or

Press $\hat{\phi}$ up to enter the highlighted combination when it spells a word. A space is automatically inserted after the word.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognize, the phone stores it to use as 1 of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognized words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

Using Numeric Mode

From a text entry screen, specify Numeric mode by pressing the **Abc** key, then selecting **123**.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press K to switch to another entry method.

Using Symbol Mode

From a text entry screen, specify Symbols mode by pressing the **Abc** key, then selecting **Symbols**.

Scroll to the desired symbol on the SYMBOLS screen, then press $\text{OK}\left(\cdot \hat{\bullet} \cdot\right)$ to select it.

Press the **Next** key on the **SYMBOLS** screen to page down to the next set of symbols, and press the **Prev** key to page up to the previous set.

Deleting Letters and Words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

- Press 🖙 to delete 1 letter at a time.
- Hold 🖙 to delete the entire message.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

Note: You must open your phone's flip to activate the speakerphone.

Your phone's integrated handsfree speaker allows you to talk to another party without holding the phone to your ear.

Turning Handsfree Speaker On/Off

To activate the speakerphone during a call, press and hold the speakerphone key.

Turning On Airplane Mode

Note: Consult airline staff about the use of **Airplane Mode** in flight. Turn off your phone whenever instructed to do so by airline staff.

Airplane Mode allows you to disable your phone's radio frequency functions and still use other applications (such as the calculator or datebook functions). This may enable you to use these applications while on an airplane.

Hiding or Showing Location Information



Your phone can use the *automatic location information* (ALI) feature to tell the network where you are physically located.

bank). Your phone prompts you when the network or a service asks for your location. You can refuse at this point.

When ALI is set to **911 0nly**, your phone displays the \oplus (ALI off) indicator, and the phone does not send location information unless you call the emergency phone number (such as 911).

Limitations of AGPS

Sometimes adequate signals from multiple satellites are unavailable, usually because your AGPS phone's antenna cannot establish a view of a wide area of open sky. In these cases, the AGPS feature **will not work**. Such situations include, but are not limited to, the following:

- in underground locations
- inside of buildings, trains, or other covered vehicles
- under any other metal or concrete roof or structure
- between tall buildings or under dense tree cover
- near a powerful radio or television tower
- when your AGPS antenna is covered (for example, by your hand or other object) or facing the ground
- when there are temperature extremes outside the operating limits of the phone

Even where location information can be calculated in such situations, it may take more time than usual, and your location estimate may not be as accurate.

Even where adequate signals from multiple satellites are available, your AGPS feature will provide only an approximate location, often within 150 feet (45 meters) but sometimes much farther from your actual location.

The satellites used by your phone's AGPS feature are controlled by the U.S. government and are subject to changes implemented in accordance with the Department of Defense AGPS user policy and the Federal Radio Navigation Plan. These changes may affect the performance of your phone's AGPS feature.

Conserving Battery Power

Your phone includes an ambient light sensor and battery save setting to extend battery life. When this feature is activated, it automatically turns off the keypad backlight when it detects that enough ambient light is available. Inhibiting or covering the sensor can cause intermittent backlighting.

Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs 1 or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Enter the emergency number.
- 2 Press 💿 to call the emergency number.

Using AGPS During an **Emergency Call**



When you make an emergency call, your phone's assisted-Global Positioning System (AGPS) feature can calculate your approximate location and help emergency service personnel find you.

Notes:

- This feature can work only if the emergency response center can receive and process location information. If you are concerned about whether your local emergency response center can receive AGPS location information, contact your local authorities.
- In order for the AGPS feature to work when making emergency calls, the

service must be turned on. See page 43.

For best results, you should be located where vour phone's antenna can establish a clear view of the open sky. This allows your phone to access AGPS satellite signals. Even under good conditions, it may take 30 seconds or more to determine your approximate location. This time increases and the accuracy of the results decreases with reduced access to satellite signals.

If your phone does not have adequate access to AGPS satellite signals, the location of the nearest cell tower in contact with your phone is automatically provided to the emergency response center.

Because of the limitations of the AGPS feature, always provide your best knowledge of your location to the emergency response center, just as you would when using a phone without AGPS capabilities. Also, remain on

the phone for as long as the emergency response center instructs you.

Viewing Recent Calls

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialed, even if the calls did not connect. The lists are sorted from newest to oldest entries. The oldest entries are deleted as new entries are added.

Shortcut: Press (c) from the home screen to view the **All Calls** list.

The model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the

Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is

1.6 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government

for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.14 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.56 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.
