






This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.*

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

* The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to September 1, 2005.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not

complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body. Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so. These locations include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

Pacemakers

If you have a pacemaker, consult your physician before using this device.

Persons with pacemakers should observe the following precautions:

• ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimeters (8 inches) from your

pacemaker when the mobile device is turned ON.

- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital mobile devices may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer or physician to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult your physician or the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy.

Driving Precautions

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your mobile device while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a mobile device may be distracting. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas, such as health care facilities or blasting areas.

Automobile Air Bags

Do not place a mobile device in the air bag deployment area.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted, and can include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

When you are in such an area, turn off your mobile device, and do not remove, install, or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

Damaged Products

If your mobile device or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

Batteries and Chargers

If jewelry, keys, beaded chains, or other conductive materials touch exposed battery terminals, this could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), become very hot, and could cause damage or injury. Be careful when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original ™ batteries and chargers.**

Caution: To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

Your battery, charger, or mobile device may contain symbols, defined as follows:

Choking Hazards

Your mobile device or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking

hazard to small children. Keep your mobile device and its accessories away from small children.

Glass Parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service center.

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your physician before playing video games or enabling a flashing-lights feature (if available) on your mobile device.

Discontinue use and consult a physician if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation. It is always a good idea to hold the screen away from your eyes, leave the lights on in the room, take a 15-minute break every hour, and stop use if you are very tired.

Repetitive Motion

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. If you continue to have discomfort during or after such use, stop use and see a physician.

To care for your Motorola phone, please keep it away from:



liquids of any kind

Don't expose your phone to water, rain, extreme humidity, sweat, or other moisture.



dust and dirt

Don't expose your phone to dust, dirt, sand, food, or other inappropriate materials.

SIM card

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt. Turn off your phone before you install or remove the SIM card.

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries.

1 Press in the battery door release latch.



2 Lift up and remove the battery door.



3 Hold the SIM card with the notch in the lower right corner and the gold plate facing down. Slide the SIM card into the card slot as shown.

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

• Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place.

- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Before using your phone, read the battery safety information in the "Safety and General Information" section included in this guide.

battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into the mini-USB port on your phone, and plug the other



end into an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the battery. The battery charge indicator light shows when the battery is charging. The display shows **Charge Complete** when finished.

Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

Note: You can charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's mini-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your



phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

turn phone on & off

Caution: The phone may ask for your SIM card PIN code when you turn it on. If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times before the correct code, your SIM card is disabled, and your display shows **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider. To turn on your phone, press and hold the *power/end key* () until the keypad or display lights up. If prompted, enter your eight-digit



SIM card PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.

To turn off your phone, press and hold () for a few seconds.

make a call

Open the slider, then enter a phone number and press the *send key* (1) to make a call.

To **voice dial** a call, see page 53.

To "hang up," close the slider or press the *power/end key* ().

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the slider and press the *send key* (c) to answer.

To "hang up," close the slider or press the *power/end key* ③.

store a phone number

You can store a phone number in your **Phonebook**.

Find it: $|\hat{\phi}\rangle > \textcircled{C}$ Phonebook, then press Options > Create New > Phone Contact or SIM Contact

- 2 Press the Done key to store the number.

Notes about entries on your SIM card:

- You can store only a **Name** and **Number** for phonebook entries stored on the SIM card.
- Your phonebook can show the entries stored in phone memory or on the SIM

card. To choose which entries you see, press $(\mathbf{\hat{+}} > \mathbf{C})$ Phonebook, then press Options > View. You can select Phone & SIM Card, SIM Card, or Phone Contacts.



Your phone has a 2 megapixel digital camera that can take photos at up to 1200 x 1600 pixels resolution. The phone is designed to be used in camera mode when the slider is closed. Just aim and shoot to take a photo, then press **Send** to share it with your friends

With the slider closed, press the *camera key* **(**) to see the full-screen camera viewfinder. Your phone takes photos in the







Your phone can play and store MP3 music files. You can use an optional removable memory card with your phone to store more songs (see page 40).

Find it: ·♠· > (Multimedia > Music > song name

Press $\hat{\phi}$ up to play or pause. Press $\hat{\phi}$ down to stop. Press $\hat{\phi}$ right or left to play the next or previous song.



Use the volume keys on

the left side of your phone (see illustration on page 2) to control music volume.

To download songs to your phone, see page 101. To copy files between your phone and a computer, see page 42. **Note:** Your phone may not play MP3 files that have a bit rate higher than 128 kbps. If you try to download or play one of these files, your phone might show you an error or ask you to delete the file.

Tip: You can listen to tunes on your way. Use *airplane mode* to make your phone safe to use even while you're on a plane. See page 102.

digital audio player

Your phone also has a digital audio player Java application that you can use to play music, create playlists, and organize your music files.

Your phone's camera shows a full-screen viewfinder and takes photos in the standard landscape format when the slider is closed. For instructions on how to use the camera, see page 24.

The video camera shows a full-screen viewfinder and records videos in the standard landscape format when the slider is open or closed. For instructions on how to use the video camera, see page 27.

lock & unlock keypad

You can lock the phone keypad and side keys to prevent accidental keypresses (for example, when carrying your phone in a purse or pocket).

To **manually lock** the keypad and side keys, press and hold ★ in the home screen. The keys remain locked until you close and re-open the slider.

You can set your phone to **automatically lock** the keypad and side keys when the phone is idle and the slider is closed. Press

To **unlock** the keypad and side keys: Press a key, then follow the on-screen instructions.

Note: Incoming calls and messages unlock the keypad.

Bluetooth[™] wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless connections. You can connect your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit to make handsfree calls. You can connect your phone with a phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections to exchange files.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

turn Bluetooth power on or off

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > Setup > Power > On

Note: To extend battery life, use this procedure to set Bluetooth power to **Off** when not in use. Your phone will not connect to another device until you set Bluetooth power back to **On** and connect your phone to the device again.

use a headset or handsfree car kit

Before you try to connect your phone with a handsfree device, make sure the device is on and ready in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the user's guide for the device). You can connect your phone with only one device at a time.

Find it: (.) > 8% Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > Audio Devices > [Look For Devices]

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- Scroll to a device in the list and press the center key .
- 2 Press the Yes or OK key to connect to the device.
- 3 If necessary, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and press the **OK** key.

When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator **3** shows in the home screen, and the Bluetooth indicator light flashes.

Shortcut: When Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device and move it near the phone.

copy files to another device

You can copy a media file, phonebook entry, datebook event, or bookmark to another phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections.

Note: You can't copy some copyrighted objects.

Before you try to copy a file to another

device, make sure the receiving device is **on** and **ready** in discoverable mode. Also, make

sure the device is not busy with another Bluetooth connection.

- 1 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press Options, then select:
 - Manage > Copy for a media file.
 - Send Contact > Bluetooth for a phonebook entry.
 - Send for a datebook event or bookmark.
- 3 Select a recognized device name, or [Look For Devices] to search for the device where you want to copy the object.

Note: Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, that device can start a similar Bluetooth connection with your phone. Your display shows the Bluetooth indicator when there is a Bluetooth connection.

receive files from another device

Before you try to receive a file from another device, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **on** (see page 34).

1 Place your phone near the device, and send the file from the device.

If your phone and the sending device don't recognize each other, place your phone in discoverable mode so the sending device can locate it. Press • > IS Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > [Find Me].

2 Press the **Accept** key on your phone to accept the file from the other device.

Your phone notifies you when file transfer is complete. If necessary, press the **Save** key to save the file.

send files to a printer

You can send a media file, phonebook entry, or datebook event from your phone to a printer that supports Bluetooth connections.

Note: You can print A4 or US Letter size pages. To print another size, copy the object to a linked computer, and print it from there.

 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to print, then press Options > Print.

Tip: If you see it, you can print it. After you capture a picture in the camera, you can press the **Store** key and select **Print and Store**.

- 2 If available, choose additional objects or print options, then choose **Print** to continue.
- Select a recognized printer name, or [Look For Devices] to search for the printer where you want to send the object.

A text message can contain text and (A) pictures, sounds, or other media obiects. You can add multiple pages to a message, and put text and media objects on each page. You can send a message to other compatible phones, or to email addresses.

Find it: $\mathbf{\bullet} > \mathbf{\boxtimes}$ Messages > Create Message > Message

Press keypad keys to enter text on the page (for more information about text entry, see page 48).

To insert a **picture**, **sound**, **or other** media object on the page, press Options > Insert. Select the file type and the file.

To insert **another page** in the message, enter text or objects on the current page, and press **Options** > **Insert** > **New Page**. You can enter more text and objects on the new page.

- 2 When you finish the message, press Options > Sending Options to set message options (such as Subject and Priority).
- **3** When you finish setting message options, press the **Done** key.
- 4 Press the **Send To** key to select message recipients. You can:
 - Select one or more entries from your phonebook (press ·ô· to scroll to an entry, and press the center key ·ê· to select it).
 - Enter a new number or email address (press Options > Enter Number or Enter Email).

5 Press the **Send** key to send the message.

Your phone might tell you that this is a **Multimedia Msg**, if it contains multiple pages or media objects. Some phones or networks don't support picture messages. Press the **Yes** key to send the message.

To save or cancel the message, press **Options > Save to Drafts** or **Abort Message**.

receive a text message

When you receive a message, your phone plays an alert, and the display shows **New Message** with a message indicator (such as \square).



Press the **Read** key to open the message. If the message contains media objects:

• Pictures and animations show as you read the message.

- Sound files play as you read the message. Use the volume keys to adjust the sound volume.
- Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open an attachment, scroll to the file indicator/filename and press the **View** key (image), **Play** key (sound), or **Open** key (phonebook vCard, datebook vCalendar entry, or unknown file type).

memory card

You can use an optional removable memory card with your phone to store and retrieve multimedia objects (such as photos and songs).

Your phone supports memory cards up to 1 GB.

install a memory card

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your memory card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt. Turn off your phone before you install or remove the memory card.





Press the *navigation key* $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{o}} \cdot$ up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open basic features. You can show or hide icons for these features in the home screen, and change the icons that are shown (for more information about changing icons in the home screen, see page 90).







codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

You can also change your **SIM PIN** codes or call barring password.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press the center key $\hat{•}$ and enter your six-digit security code instead.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

To **manually lock** your phone: Press $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbb{R}$ Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now.

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press $\hat{•} > \mathbb{R}$ Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > On.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 65). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your phonebook, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

You can set your phone to play a different ringer ID for an entry stored in your phonebook (see page 80).

To show or hide **your phone number** for the next outgoing call, enter the phone number, then press **Options > Hide ID/Show ID**.

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- **1** Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- 2 Press 🕑 to call the emergency number.

voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number.



Note: Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone shows the voicemail message indicator (a) and **New Voicemail**.

To **check** voicemail messages:

Find it: $\boldsymbol{\cdot} \boldsymbol{\hat{\varphi}} \boldsymbol{\cdot} > \boldsymbol{\boxtimes}$ Messages > Voicemail

Your phone may prompt you to store your voicemail phone number. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider

Note: You can't store a **p** (pause), **w** (wait), or **n** (number) character in this number. If you want

to store a voicemail number with these characters, create a phonebook entry for it. Then, you can use the entry to call your voicemail.

To **change** your voicemail number or turn off voicemail notification, press $(.) > \square$ Messages, then press Options > Setup > Voicemail Setup.

push to talk (PTT)

Push to Talk (PTT) lets you talk walkie-talkie style with other PTT subscribers. You can talk to one person or a group.

PTT and the other related features indicated are network and subscription dependent features, and are not available in all areas. PTT connectivity requires PTT-compatible phones.

Note: To lock your PTT key or turn PTT on or off, see page 71.

make a PTT call

When ⊡ shows at the top of your home screen, you can make and receive PTT calls. To make a PTT call:

- 1 Enter a PTT subscriber's phone number in your home screen, or select a contact or group from a list:
 - PTT Contacts (press the PTT key to open the list)

Note: If you change your **Open To** setting, your PTT key does not open the contacts list (see page 71).

- PTT Quick Group (press the PTT key, then press Options > Quick Group). This lets you select more than one contact for the call.
- PTT Groups (press the PTT key, then press Options > Go To Groups).

2 Hold the PTT key and speak after you hear the tone. Release the PTT key to let others speak.

To speak during a PTT call, hold your PTT key and speak after the tone. Only one person can speak at a time.

To end the call, press ①. If nobody speaks for 20 seconds, the call ends (actual timing varies between PTT servers).

To send a PTT alert instead of a standard PTT call, scroll to a PTT contact in PTT Contacts and press the Alert key. The contact's phone rings or vibrates, and the contact can speak first. If the contact does not respond, the call ends. You cannot send alerts to groups.

answer a PTT call

Note: Your phone cannot receive PTT calls while it is recording a video, and may not receive PTT calls while it is playing a video or some sound files. The PTT indicator **F** appears at the top of your display when you can receive PTT calls.

When you receive a PTT call, you hear a tone or alert followed by conversation from the caller.

- **To speak** when the caller stops speaking, hold your PTT key and speak after the tone. Only one person can speak at a time.
- To end the call, press 💿.

If you change your **My Answer Mode** setting to **Manual**, your phone does not automatically answer as described (see page 71).

When you receive a PTT alert, press the PTT key and speak after the tone. You can also press the **Ignore** key to cancel the call.

Your phone shows **Missed Call** if you miss a PTT alert. It does not show **Missed Call** when you miss a standard PTT call unless you set **My Answer Mode** to **Manual** (see page 71).

send a picture with push to view (PTV)

You can send a picture with PTT. You can either send a picture in a PTT call, or you can open the picture and start a call.

Note: You cannot send pictures in group calls or while someone is speaking. You can send pictures only to phones with push to view (PTV) capability. To send a picture during a PTT call, press

Options, then select **Camera** to capture a new picture or **Pictures** to send a stored picture.


Your phone plays a tone when the picture transfer completes. To speak after the picture transfers, hold the PTT key and speak after the tone.

PTT contacts and groups

You can store PTT **Contacts** to make one-to-one calls, or you can store PTT **Groups** to make group calls.

To store a contact, press the PTT key, then press Options > Add > New Contact. Enter the contact's Name and phone number (No.), then press the Done key. Your network stores the contact and your phone returns to the PTT Contacts list with the new contact shown.

To create a group of contacts that you can call at the same time, press the PTT key, then press Options > Go To Groups, then press Options > Add New Group. Enter the group's Name and select the Members, then press the Done key. Your network stores the group and your phone returns to the PTT Groups list with the new group shown. To see PTT contacts, press the PTT key. Scroll to a contact and press **Options** to **View**, **Edit**, or **Delete** it.



To see PTT groups, press the PTT key, then press Options > Go To Groups. Scroll to a group and press Options to View or Delete it. You cannot edit a group, but you can delete it and create a new one with the members you want.

lcons in the PTT contact and group lists indicate if someone is online (ভ, জ্ঞি) or offline

 $(\mathbf{s}^{\textcircled{G}}, \mathbf{s}^{\textcircled{G}})$. They also tell you if a contact is blocked $(\mathbf{s}^{\textcircled{G}})$.

To **block** a contact, scroll to the contact and press 0ptions > Edit > Block Mode > On. To unblock the contact, scroll to it and press the **Unblock** key.

To set an **online alert** (b) to tell you when a contact comes online, scroll to the contact, then press **Options** > **Enable Online Alert**. You can turn online alert tones on or off in your **PTT Setup** menu (see page 71).

To refresh the contact or group list from your network, press **Options > Refresh List**.

To see only your frequently used contacts or groups, press **Options > Frequently Used**.

PTT settings

To prevent accidental PTT calls, you can set your phone to **lock the PTT key** automatically when you haven't pressed it for a few minutes. To unlock the key, hold it for two seconds or open the phone. The PTT key unlocks when you receive a PTT call.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg1 Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worm on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.43 W/kg, and when worm on the body, as described in this user guide, is 0.78 W/kg. (Body-worm measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).2 While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the quidelines.

The World Health Organisation has stated that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile devices. They note that if you want to reduce your exposure then you can do so by limiting the length of calls or using a 'hands-free' device to keep the mobile phone away from the head and body.
