




SIM card

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

To install a SIM card:






battery

battery installation







battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the travel charger into your phone and an



electrical outlet. Your phone displays **Charge Complete** when finished.

Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

You can also charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's mini-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.

 It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold () for a few seconds or until the display turns on. If prompted, enter your six-digit SIM card PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.



Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn off your phone, press and hold () for two seconds.

make a call

Enter a phone number and press 💿 to make a call.

To "hang up," close the flip or press 💿.

answer a call

Note: Your phone cannot receive data over an EDGE network while it is playing videos or some sound files. The EDGE **€** status indicator appears at the top of your display when you can receive data over an EDGE network.

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press (5) to answer.

To "hang up," close the flip or press 💿.

your phone number

From the home screen, press $\hfill \boxdot$ to see your number.

Tip: Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press , then scroll to **My Tel. Number** and press **Select**.


To store or edit your name and phone number on your SIM card, press the **Edit** key while displaying it. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.

basics

See page 1 for a basic phone diagram.

display

The *home screen* displays when you turn on the phone.




Note: Your home screen may look different, depending on your service provider.

To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and then 💿.

The menu indicator \equiv shows that you can press \square to open the main menu. Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Press $\dot{\mathbf{O}}$ up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open menus (indicated by icons). You can show or hide menu icons in the home screen, and change the icons shown (see page 69). Your phone displays status indicators at the top of the home screen:



- Signal Strength Indicator Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when T or T⊘ displays.
- 2 EDGE/GPRS Indicator Shows when your phone is using a high-speed Enhanced Data for GSM Evolution (EDGE) or General Packet Radio

Service (GPRS) network connection. Indicators can include:

3 Data Indicator— Indicators can include:



text entry

Some features let you enter text.



Press *H* in a text entry screen to select an entry mode:

entry mode	
I or 1	Your Primary text entry mode can be set to any iTAP TM 🕮 or tap 1 mode.
⊇ or 2	Your Secondary text entry mode can be set to any iTAP I or tap 2 mode, or set to None if you don't want a secondary entry mode.
12	Numeric mode enters numbers only.
0	Symbol mode enters symbols only.


To set your primary and secondary text entry modes, press 🖃 and select Entry Setup in a text entry screen, then select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup.

Tip: WANT TO SHOUT YOUR MESSAGE? Press ① in a text entry screen to change text case to all capital letters (AB), no capital letters (ab) or mixed capitals (Ab).

$\mathsf{iTAP}^\mathsf{TM} \mathsf{mode}$

Press Press

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one key press per letter. The iTAP software combines your key presses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it. For example, if you press **7 7 6 4**, your phone displays:



- If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you

want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.

• Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.


tap and tap extended modes

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to tap mode. If you don't see **Ab1** or **Ab2**, press **E** > Entry Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

Tap mode lets you press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.


Tap extended mode cycles through additional special characters and symbols as you repeatedly press a keypad key. (For example, pressing **2** cycles through the following characters: a, b, c, 2, á, à, â, ã, ç, æ).

For example, if you press (8) once, your phone displays:



When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the

word. For example, if you enter **prog** your phone might display:



- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press •Ô• down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- Press to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- If you don't want to save your text or text edits, press (1) to go to Msg Abort

Options. Select **Abort Message** to exit without saving.

• *Tap extended* mode cycles through additional special characters and symbols as you repeatedly press a keypad key.

numeric mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see 12. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.

symbol mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see @. Press a keypad key to show its symbols at the bottom of the display. Highlight the symbol you want, then press the **Select** key.

volume

Press the volume keys to:

- turn off an incoming call alert
- change the earpiece volume during calls



• change the ringer volume from the home screen

Tip: Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Vibrate** or **Silent** by holding the down volume key in the home screen.

external display

When your phone is closed, the external display shows the time, date, status indicators, and notifications for incoming calls

and other events. For a list of phone status indicators, see page 18.

> External Display > Left Orientation or Right Orientation.

set phone ring style in external display

To set the phone ring style in the external display:

- 1 *With the flip closed*, press a volume key to display **Style**: *style name*.
- 2 Press the smart key repeatedly, until the style you want appears.
- **3** Press a volume key to return to the home screen.

return unanswered call in external display

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and the external display shows **X Missed Calls**, where **X** is the number of missed calls.

Tip: Since the microphone and earpiece are hidden when the phone flip is closed, you'll have to use a headset or other handsfree device to make and receive calls.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

1 Press the smart key (see illustration) to see the received calls list.



- 2 Press the volume keys to scroll to an unanswered call.
 - To call the number with a headset connected to your phone, press and hold the smart key.
 - To exit without calling, press the smart key briefly.

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on. Your phone displays

Spkrphone On. Press the **Speaker** key again to turn off the handsfree speaker.

Note: The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

Find it: 🖃 > 💱 Settings > Security > New Passwords

You can also change your **SIM PIN2** or call barring passwords.

If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password,

contact your service provider.

If you forget your unlock code:

At the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press \square and enter your six-digit security code instead.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

To manually lock your phone:

Find it: : Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now > unlock code

To automatically lock your phone whenever you turn it off:

Find it: $\square > \texttt{BS}$ Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > On > unlock code

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 37). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

battery meter

View a meter that shows your battery's charge level:

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Phone Status

Scroll to Battery Meter and press View.

phone updates



Sometimes we think of ways to make your phone's software faster or more efficient after you've purchased your phone. You can find out if your phone can be updated at: http://hellomoto.com/update

Note: Software updates do not affect your phonebook entries or other personal entries. If you receive a software update but want to install it later, see page 73.

customize

ring style

Each ring style profile uses a different set of sounds or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. You can select Loud, Soft, Vibrate, Vibe & Ring, Vibe Then Ring, or Silent.

The ring style s indicator displays at the top of your home screen (see page 20). To choose your ring style:

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Ring Styles

- 1 Scroll to Style and press Change.
- 2 Scroll to the style you want and press Select.

change alerts in a ring style

You can change the alerts for incoming calls and other events. Your changes are saved with the current ring style.

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Ring Styles

1 Scroll to *Style* **Detail** and press **Change**.

Note: *Style* represents the current ring style. You can't set an alert for the **Silent** ring style setting.

- 2 Scroll to Calls and press Change.
- 3 Scroll to the alert you want and press Select.
- 4 Press Back to save the alert setting.

time & date

You need to set your phone's time and date to use the datebook.

To change the time:

Find it: $\textcircled{\baselinetwidth} >$ $\fbox{\baselinetwidth}$ Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date

- 1 Scroll to the time and press **Change**.
- Press · \$\overline{\phi}\$ left or right to select the hour, minute, or display format (am, pm, or 24hr), and press · \$\overline{\phi}\$ up or down to change the settings for each. Press **Ok** when finished.
- 3 Press 💿 to return to the home screen.

To choose an analog or digital clock for

your home screen:

Find it: : > : Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Clock

To change the date:

Find it: $\textcircled{\baselinetwidth} > \mathbb{B}^{\otimes}$ Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date

- **1** Scroll to the date and press **Change**.

To change how the date is displayed, scroll to **Format** and press **Change**. Scroll to the format you want and press **Select**.

3 Press **1** to return to the home screen.

wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

option

Picture	Select an image for your wallpaper, or None for no wallpaper.
Layout	Select Center to center the image in the display, Tile to repeat the image across the display, or Fit-to-screen to stretch the image across the display.

screen saver

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver. The screen saver displays when the flip is open and no activity is detected for a specified time.

Tip: This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

Find it: -> B Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

option	1
Picture	Select an image for your screen saver, or None for no screen saver.
Delay	Select the length of inactivity before the screen saver displays.

display appearance

To choose a color style that sets the look of your phone's display:

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Personalize > Color Style

To adjust the brightness of your phone's display:

Find it: $\square > B$ Settings > Initial Setup > Brightness

To save battery life, your keypad backlight turns off when you're not using your phone.

The backlight turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the keypad backlight turns off:

To save battery life, the display can turn off when you're not using your phone. The display turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the display turns off:

Find it: => & Settings > Initial Setup > Display Timeout

answer options

You can use different ways to answer an incoming call. To turn on or turn off an answer option:

Find it: \bigcirc > By Settings > In-Call Setup > Answer Options

option	
Multi-Key	Answer by pressing any key.
Open To Answer	Answer by opening the flip.

calls

To make and answer calls, see page 16.

turn off a call alert

You can press the volume keys to turn off a call alert before answering the call.

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Shortcut: Press () from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.

Find it: $\square > \textcircled{\label{eq:Find} }$ Recent Calls

- 1 Scroll to Received Calls or Dialed Calls, then press Select.
- 2 Scroll to a call. A ✓ next to a call means the call connected.
 - To call the number, press 🙆.
 - To see call details (like time and date), press View.

• To see the Last Calls Menu, press \Box . This menu can include:

option	
Store	Create a phonebook entry with the number in the No. field. Store does not appear if the number is already stored.
Delete	Delete the entry.
Delete All	Delete all entries in the list.
Hide ID/Show ID	Hide or show your caller ID for the next call.
Send Message	Open a new text message with the number in the To field.
Add Digits	Add digits after the number.
Attach Number	Attach a number from the phonebook or recent calls lists.

option

Talk then Fax Talk and then send a fax (A) in the same call (see page 34).

redial

- Press () from the home screen to see 1 the dialed calls list
- 2 Scroll to the entry you want to call, then press 💽.

If you hear a **busy signal** and see Call Failed, Number Busy, press () or Retry to redial the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates once, displays Redial Successful, and connects the call.



return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and displays *X* **Missed Calls**, where *X* is the number of missed calls.

- 1 Press View to see the received calls list.
- 2 Scroll to the call you want to return, then press .

notepad

The last set of digits entered on the keypad are stored in *notepad* memory. This can be the last phone number you called, or a number that you "jot down" during a call for later use. To see the number stored in the notepad:

Find it: Press $\square > \textcircled{Recent Calls} > Notepad$

• To call the number, press 🙆.

- To create a phonebook entry with the number in the No. field, press STORE.

hold or transfer a call

To put all active calls on hold:

- 1 Press 🖃.
- 2 Scroll to Hold and press Select.
- **3** Press **Resume** to take the call off hold.

To transfer a call:

- 1 Press 🖃.
- 2 Enter the number to receive the call and press **0k**.
 - or

Press Browse, then scroll to Phonebook, Dialed Calls, or Received Calls, and press Select. Scroll to the number to receive the call and press Select, then press Ok.

call waiting

When you're on a call, you'll hear an alert if you receive a second call.



To answer the new call, press 💽.

To switch between calls, press Switch.

To connect the two calls, press Link.

To end the call on hold, press —, then select End Call On Hold.

To turn the call waiting feature on or off:

Find it: $\textcircled{\baselinetwidth} >$ $\rag{settings} >$ In-Call Setup > Call Waiting

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.

Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your phonebook, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

emergency calls

Your service provider programs 1 or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

international calls

If your phone service includes (A) international dialing, press and hold **O** to insert your local international access code (indicated by +). Then, press the keypad keys to dial the country code and phone number.

1-touch dial

To call phonebook entries 1 through 9, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for one second.

push to talk (PTT)

Push to Talk (PTT) lets you talk walkie-talkie style with other PTT subscribers. You can talk to one person or a group.

PTT and the other related features indicated are network and subscription dependent features, and are not available in all areas. PTT connectivity requires PTT-compatible phones.

Note: To lock your PTT key or turn PTT on or off, see page 43.

make a PTT call

When I appears at the top of your home screen, you can make and receive PTT calls. To make a PTT:

- Enter a PTT subscriber's phone number in your home screen, or select a contact or group from a list:
 - PTT Contacts (press the PTT key to open the list)

Note: If you change the **Open To** setting, pressing the PTT key does not open the contacts list (see page 43).

• PTT Quick Group (press the PTT key, press , then select Quick Group)

This lets you select more than one contact for the call.

• PTT Groups (press the PTT key, press , then select Go To Groups.

2 Hold the PTT key and speak after you hear the tone. Release the PTT key to let others speak.

To speak during a PTT call, hold the PTT key and speak after the tone. Only one person can speak at a time.

To end the call, press ①. If no one speaks for 20 seconds, the call ends (actual timing varies by network).

To send a PTT alert instead of a standard PTT call, scroll to a PTT contact in **PTT Contacts** and press **Alert**. The contact's phone rings or vibrates, and the contact can speak first. If the contact does not respond, the call ends. You cannot send alerts to groups.

answer a PTT call

Note: Your phone cannot receive PTT calls while it is recording videos, and may not

receive PTT calls while it is playing videos or some sound files. The PTT indicator appears at the top of your display when you can receive PTT calls.

When you receive a PTT call, you hear a tone or alert followed by conversation from the caller.

- **To speak** when the caller stops speaking, hold the PTT key and speak after the tone. Only one person can speak at a time.
- To end the call, press 💿.

If you change your **My Answer Mode** setting to **Manual**, your phone does not automatically answer as described (see page 44).

When you receive a PTT alert, press the PTT key and speak after the tone. You can also press lgnore to cancel the call.

Your display shows **Missed Call** if you miss a PTT alert. It does not show **Missed Call** when you miss a standard PTT call unless you set **My Answer Mode** to **Manual** (see page 44).

send a picture with push to view (PTV)

You can send a picture during a PTT call, or you can open a picture and start a PTT call to send it.

Note: You cannot send pictures in group calls or while someone is speaking. You can send pictures only to phones with push to view (PTV) capability.

To send a picture during a PTT call, press Options, then select Camera to capture a new picture or Pictures to send a stored picture.

To send a stored picture:

To take a photo and send it:
