Turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press Power (a) (on the top right).

To turn off your phone, press and hold Power ①, then touch **Power** off in the menu that opens.

Wi-Fi™ connect

If you want to use a Wi-Fi network for even faster Internet access, touch Menu 📳 > Settings > Wireless & networks. Touch WLAN to turn on, search for and connect to wireless networks. There's more in "Wi-FiTM" on page 36.

Touchscreen & keys

a few essentials

Touch tips

Here are some tips on how to navigate around your phone.

Touch

To choose an icon or option, touch it. Try it: In the home screen, touch La Contacts.

Touch & hold

To open special options, touch and hold an icon or other item. Try it: In the home screen, touch **Contacts**, then touch and hold a contact to open options.





Drag

To scroll through a list or move slowly, drag across the touchscreen. Try it: In the home screen, touch

Contacts, then drag your contacts list up or down.

Tip: When you drag or flick a list, a *scroll bar* appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - 7.



Flick

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

Tip: When you flick a long list, touch the screen to stop it from scrolling.

Phone covers

Your touchscreen might stay dark during calls if the sensor just above it is covered. Don't use covers or screen



protectors (even clear ones) that cover this sensor.

Screen protectors can also interfere with touchscreen performance.

Key tips

Menu, home, back & search



Touch Home to close any menu or app and return to the home screen. Touch and hold Home to show the last few apps you used, then touch an app to open it. In the home screen, touch Home to open or close the app menu.

Touch Menu 📳 to open menu options, or Back 🕥 to go back.

Touch Search $\boxed{\mathbf{Q}}$ to open the search field. See "Search" on page 9.

Sleep & wake up

To save your battery, prevent accidental touches, or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing Power ①.

To wake up the touchscreen, press Power ①, then drag the moving circle to the bottom left corner of the screen.

Tip: To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically, touch Menu 38 > Settings > Display > Screen timeout

Power key menu

Press and hold Power ① to turn off the phone (Power off), Reboot, or Enter airplane mode.

Adjust volume

Press the volume keys to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).



Rotate the screen

When you turn the phone, the touchscreen can rotate to stay right-side up:

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > Display > Auto-rotate screen

Home screen

quick access to the things you need most

Quick start: Home screen

The home screen gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or touch Home a from a menu. It's basically like this:



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

The home screen extends beyond what you see on the screen to give you more room for adding shortcuts, widgets, and more. Flick the home screen left and right to see more panels or to add widgets or shortcuts.



Widgets

A widget is small app on the home screen that typically displays information such as weather or news updates. You can add a widget, such as a clock, music player, or a calendar that shows upcoming appointments. To open a widget, touch it.

To add a widget, touch an empty spot on the home screen. (You can also touch Menu 🐻 > Add > Widgets.) If your home screen is full, you won't see the add option. You'll need to move or delete widgets or shortcuts to make room.

Note: If you install apps that have widgets, touch and hold the home screen, then select a widget to add to the home screen.

Shortcuts

To add shortcuts to the home screen, open the app menu, then touch and hold the shortcut you want. It will be added to the home screen. Or, touch Menu Relation > Add > Shortcuts

App menu

Quick start: App menu

The app menu shows you all of your applications. To open it from the home screen, touch the app tab . To close it, touch Home . Flick up and



down to see all of your apps. Any new apps that you download (see page "Apps for all" on page 34) are added to the app menu.

Note: The apps shown may vary.

Recent apps

Touch and hold Home (a) to see the last few apps you used, then touch the app you want. Touch Home (b) to close an app and return to the home screen.

Search

Touch Search \bigcirc on the front of the phone, then touch **Device** or **Web**. Enter text, then touch \bigcirc Search.



Type, then touch the icon for a text search.

Phone status & notifications

At the top of the screen, icons on the left notify you about new messages or events. Icons on the right tell you about phone status. To access a message,



email or meeting reminder, drag the status bar down and touch the notification.




Quick start: Calls

Dialing options

From the home screen, touch Phone.



In-call options



Note: Video call options may be different.

Tip: To use other features during a call, like **Gallery**, touch Home a or Back to hide the active call. To reopen it, touch Phone.

Make, answer & end calls

To make a call, touch **Phone**, enter a number, then touch **Voice call**.

To enter the international dialing code, touch and hold #.

To answer a call, drag 🕓 to the right.

To ignore a call, drag o to the left.

Touch the check box to send an SMS to decline call.

Note: Your phone includes a proximity sensor. When you hold the phone to your ear, the display goes dark to prevent accidental touches. When you move your phone away from your ear, the display lights up again.

To end a call, touch **End**.

Note: Screen protectors can interfere with touchscreen performance. Aftermarket screen protectors must have an opening for the proximity sensor to operate properly. If not, abnormal function might occur if an after-market-protector or protective film covers proximity sensor area at the top of the phone.

Video calls

Make a call and see each other while you talk, you'll both need a 3G video phone. If your phone is roaming on a non-3G network, video calls will not work.

To make a video call, touch Phone, enter a number, then touch Menu ByVideo call. To end a video call. touch End.

Speed dial

Find it: Menu 🔠 > Settings > Call settings > Speed dial

- To clear entries, touch a number, then touch Discard.
- To call, touch Phone, then touch a number.

Go handsfree

Note: Using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

To use the speakerphone during a call, touch **Speaker**:

Recent calls

Find it: Phone > Call log

- · To call a number, touch it.
- To send a text message or contact, make voice or video call, or other options, touch and hold an entry.
- To clear the list, touch Menu > Delete.

Conference calls

To start a conference call, call the first number. After they answer, touch **Hold**, then **New call** and call the next number. When the next number answers, touch **Merge**.

Your phone number

Find it: Menu 😁 > Settings > Call settings > My caller number

Your caller ID

To hide your number from the people you call, touch Menu 📆 > Settings > Call settings > Other basic settings > Caller number.

Call forwarding & waiting

You can forward calls all the time, or only when your phone is busy, unanswered, or unreachable (not on the network):

Find it: Menu 😁 > Settings > Call settings > Voice call forwarding

When you're on a call and a second call comes in, **Call waiting** lets you answer it by touching **Answer**. You can turn off **Call waiting**, to send second calls straight to your voicemail:

Find it: Menu 😁 > Settings > Call settings > Other basic settings > Call waiting

Restrict outgoing calls

To restrict your phone so that it can only dial a few numbers:

Find it: Menu 🔠 > Settings > Call settings > Fixed dialing number

- To turn fixed dialing on, touch FDN is disabled.
- To add or delete the allowed numbers, touch Manage FDN list.

Emergency calls

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Touch Phone (if your phone is locked, touch **Emergency**).
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Touch Voice call to call the emergency number.

Note: Your mobile device can use GPS and AGPS signals to help emergency services find you. See "GPS & AGPS" in your legal and safety information.

Cool down


In very limited circumstances, such as where your phone has been exposed to extreme heat, "Cool Down" message screens will appear. To avoid possible damage to your battery and phone, you should follow these instructions until the phone is within its recommended temperature range. When your phone is in "Cool Down" mode, only emergency calls can be made

Tip: To search the list, touch \bigcirc then type a name. When you flick or drag this list, a scroll bar appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list faster.

Transfer contacts

Get all your contacts, all in one place. Here's a few helpful hints:

- Use Gmail™
 - All your Gmail contacts will automatically get synced to your phone. Various computer applications for mobile phones and email accounts allow you to export your contacts as a "CSV" file. You can then use Gmail to import the file. For more details, go to www.motorola.com/transfercontacts or log in to your Gmail account on your computer and select "Help".
- Use a SIM

You can transfer contacts from your old phone to your new Motorola phone using your SIM card—see "Transfer contacts using your SIM" on page 14.

Edit or delete contacts

Find it: <a>I Contacts

Touch the contact, then touch Menu 🔡 > Edit contact or Delete contact.

Synchronize contacts

When you change one of your **Contacts**, you can synchronize your contacts, see "Synchronize with Backup" on page 75.

Groups

You can put your **Contacts** into groups that you create (like "friends," "family," or "work"). Then, you can find contacts faster by showing one group at a time.

To create a group in your **Contacts**, touch **All Groups** > Menu 🔠 > **New Group**. Enter a group name, then touch Menu 📳 > **Save**. To add members, touch a group name, then touch Menu 📳 > **Add**.


To show only one group in your **Contacts**, touch **Groups** at the top of your screen and choose the group name.

Messaging

Quick start: Messaging

From the home screen, touch Messaging.



Tip: To switch between messaging and folder view touch Menu [] > Settings > View switch > Messaging View or Folder View. To see more messages, flick or drag up.

Read & reply to messages

Every text and email is automatically delivered to you, ready for your immediate reply. The best part is you don't have to dig through any apps, screens or menus—every message streams right to the phone, viewable exactly the way you want.

Find it: Messaging

- To open a message, touch it.
- To respond to a message, just open it and type your response, then touch Send.
- For email, touch Messaging > Menu 🔡 > Enter mail.

Create messages

Find it: Messaging >

Choose a message type, then enter the recipient and message. In text messages and emails, touch Menu [1] for options, like **Add subject**, **Add page**, or **Discard**.

Send & receive attachments

To send a file in a message, open a new message and touch Menu 🔠 Attachment.

When you receive a message with an attachment, open the message and touch the file name to download it. Then, touch the name again to open it. Some file formats can be converted to HTML for faster viewing, and your phone will show a button that says **Get HTML version**.

Tip: To send and receive large attachments faster, use a Wi-Fi connection, in "Wi-FiTM" on page 36.

Set up messaging

To add email accounts, touch Home (a) > (a) Email.

Email is for personal email accounts. For account details, contact the account provider.

To change your settings, touch Messaging > Menu 📆 > Settings.

Instant messages

To send and receive instant messages, you can use **Fetion** or your browser.

- To use the instant messaging app, touch
 > Fetion.
- To use your browser, touch Browser >
 Menu Settings, then enter your provider's website and touch Go. Once you're there, follow the link to sign in.

Note: Your IM options will depend on your IM provider. To browse instant messaging apps, go to www.android.com/market.

Voicemail



Touchscreen keypad

To open the keypad, touch a text field. To close the keypad, touch Back .



Text entry settings

When you use the touchscreen keypad, your phone suggests words from your dictionary and chosen language. Your phone also automatically enters apostrophes in some words, like "don't."

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > Language & input

To change the language and the style for your touchscreen keypad, touch **Select language**.

Battery tips

Your phone is like a small computer, giving you a lot of information and apps, at 3G speed, with a touch display! Depending on what you use, that can take a lot of power. So, if you want to save battery life between charges, you could reduce:

- recording or watching videos, listening to music, or taking pictures.
- Wi-Fi™, and Bluetooth™ use: Touch Menu : >
 Settings > Wireless & networks, then touch
 Bluetooth or WLAN to turn them off or on.
- network searching: If you are out of coverage, to stop your phone from looking for networks, press and hold Power ① to open the Power key menu, then touch Enter airplane mode.
- display brightness: Menu > Settings > Display > Brightness > (dimmer setting).
- display timeout delay: Menu > Settings > Display > Screen timeout > (shorter setting).

Create widgets

- 1 Find an empty spot on your home screen where you want to add a widget. You can flick left or right to open other panels on your home screen.
- 2 Touch and hold the empty spot until you see the Add to Home screen menu.
- 3 Touch Widgets.
- 4 Touch the type of widget. If necessary, enter the widget settings.

Set up widgets

You can customize some widgets. Touch a widget to open it, then touch Menu ().

You may already have several useful widgets on your home screen:

- Messages: Change the widget name or choose how long it shows new messages. To add email accounts, "Set up messaging" on page 17.
- Music: Set this widget to an artist, album, song, playlist. There's more about "Music" on page 26.
- News: Change the widget name, choose how long it shows new stories, or choose a news source. To

choose a source, touch , then choose preset **Bundles** or **Channels**, or choose **Custom** to enter a URL for a **Webpage** or an **RSS feed**.

 Weather: Change temperature units or add locations. To add locations, touch , enter a city, and touch Search. When you open the weather widget, flick left to see other locations you added.

To personalize your ringtones:

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > Sound > Phone ringtone or Notification ringtone

To set your vibrate options:

Find it: Menu > Settings > Sound > Vibrate

Wallpaper

To apply a new wallpaper:

- 1 Touch and hold an empty spot on your home screen.
- 2 Touch Wallpapers.
- 3 Touch Gallery, Live wallpapers, or Wallpaper gallery, Wallpapers, and choose a wallpaper.

Sounds

- To play tones when using dial pad, touch Menu > Settings > Sound > Audible touch tones.

Display settings

- To set display brightness, touch Menu > Settings > Display > Brightness.
- To set animation, touch Menu > Settings
 Display > Auto-rotate screen.







What music transfer tools do I need?

To put music on your computer and then load it on your phone, you need:

- A MicrosoftTM WindowsTMPC.
- A USB data cable.

Do I need a memory card?

Your music can be stored on phone's internal memory (206.5 MB) or your memory card. Your phone supports removable microSD memory cards up to 32 GB capacity. To make sure your memory card is installed, go to "Assemble & charge" on page 3.

Tip: To see the available memory on your phone and memory card, touch Menu 3 > Settings > Storage information.

What music file formats can I play?

Your phone can play many types of files: MP3, M4A, AAC, ACC+, MIDI, WAV, and OGG Vorbis.

Note: Your phone does not support any DRM protected files.

What headphones can I use?

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Exposure to RF Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver.
