


# Welcome

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### Safety and General Information

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

### Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

### **Operational Precautions**

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

#### External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorized antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

#### Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

#### **Body-Worn Operation**

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimeters) from your body when transmitting.

#### Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimeters) from your body.

#### **Approved Accessories**

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antennas, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.Motorola.com.

#### **RF Energy Interference/Compatibility**

**Note:** Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

#### Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

#### Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

#### Medical Devices

#### Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimeters) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimeters) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

#### **Hearing Aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### **Other Medical Devices**

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

### Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

### **Operational Warnings**

#### For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

#### Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

**Note:** The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

#### **Blasting Caps and Areas**

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

#### **Batteries**

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewelry, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola original batteries and chargers.** 

Your battery or phone may contain symbols, defined as follows:

### Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing

video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone. (The flashing-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

### **Repetitive Motion Injuries**

When you play games on your phone, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.



### **Installing the SIM Card**

**Optional Accessories** 

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, address book, and messages.

**Caution:** Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



### Installing a Memory Card



You can insert a *Secure Digital* (SD) memory card or *MultiMedia Card* (MMC) memory card into the game card slot on your phone, and use the memory card to store and retrieve

multimedia objects (such as photos, videos, and MP3 music files).

**Note:** Due to a known Microsoft® Windows® USB driver issue, a computer running Windows 2000 with Service Pack 1 or Service Pack 2 will not recognize a memory card inserted into your phone when you attempt to transfer or synchronize data between your phone and computer through a USB cable connection.

### **Battery Use**

Battery performance depends on many factors, including your wireless carrier's network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; accessory items attached to the phone; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

**Caution:** To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximize your battery's performance:

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.

- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for a long time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging.
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



The rechargeable batteries that power this phone must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery

type. Contact your local recycling center for proper disposal methods.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.




Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories. We recommend that you store batteries in their protective cases when not in use.

**Note:** Your phone battery may be enclosed in a protective clear plastic case. Remove the battery from the case before attempting to install it.

### **Charging the Battery**

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

1 Plug the travel charger into the USB connector port on your phone as shown.

**Note:** It may take up to 10 seconds for your phone to provide a visible or audible indication that the battery is charging.

- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, remove the travel charger.

**Tip:** You can safely leave the travel charger connected to the phone after charging is complete. This will **not** damage the battery.





### **Turning Your Phone On**

 Press and hold the power key in for 2 seconds to turn the phone on.

**Note:** It may take up to 4 seconds for the display to illuminate after you turn the phone on.



2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and tap **DK** to unlock the SIM card.

**Caution:** If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.

3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and tap **DK** to unlock the phone.

**Note:** If you do not insert a SIM card, your phone displays **No SIM Card**. You can select **Antenna On** (to make an emergency call) or **Antenna Off** (to play games or use your phone's personal organizer features).

### **Turning Your Phone Off**

Press and hold the power key  $\stackrel{\frown}{\_}$  for 2 seconds to turn the phone off.

### **Adjusting Volume**

Press the up or down volume keys to:

- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease volume when you play an audio file or have the radio playing in the background





**Tip:** At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

### Making a Call

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap the keypad keys to dial the phone number.
- 3 Tap Send to make the call.

Alternatively, you can press the send key  $\stackrel{\circ}{\frown}$  to make the call.



4 When you are finished, tap **End** to end the call.

Alternatively, you can press the end key  $\stackrel{\tiny \frown}{\frown}$  to end the call.

**Tip:** Tap **I is to select a number from a list of recent received or dialed calls.** 

### **Answering a Call**

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

1 Tap **Answer** to answer the call.

Alternatively, you can press the send key \_\_\_\_\_ to answer the call.

2 When you are finished, tap **End** to end the call.



Alternatively, you can press the end key  $\stackrel{\sim}{\frown}$  to end the call.

**Tip:** If you prefer not to answer the call, you can tap **Ignore** to hang up on the caller, or tap **Busy** to transmit a busy tone signal to the caller.

### **Changing the Call Alert**

Tap I in the bottom button bar in the home screen to change the call alert setting.

### Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number:

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap in the bottom button bar to open the phone menu.
- 3 Tap My Number to view your phone number.

While you are on a call, tap 🖪 and then tap My Number.

**Note:** Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 52. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

### Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone to prevent accidental keypresses (for example, when carrying your phone in a purse or pocket).

- Slide the lock key to the **right** to lock the phone.
- Slide the lock key to the left to unlock the phone.

# **Highlight Features**




You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls! This section describes some of your phone's highlight features.

### **Using the Camera**

**Shortcut:** Press the camera key to activate the camera. Press the camera key again to take a photo.

To activate the camera from the main screen, tap **Samera**.

The active viewfinder image appears on your display.



#### Using the Viewfinder

Point the camera lens at the photo subject. Press O as indicated to zoom in/out and adjust image brightness.

The number in the lower-right corner of the viewfinder represents the number of additional photos, or the minutes and seconds of additional video, that can be stored in the current selected memory storage location.

### Taking a Photo

Tap Capture or press the camera key to take a photo.

**Tip:** If the camera is in video mode, tap **I**, then tap **Capture Photo** to put the camera in photo mode. The mode indicator in the upper-right corner of the viewfinder changes to **I** to show that the camera is in photo mode.

### Recording a Video

Tap , then tap **Record Video** to put the camera in video mode. The mode indicator in the upper-right corner of the viewfinder changes to to show that the camera is in video mode.

Tap **Record** to start recording a video. Tap **Done** to stop video recording.

#### Previewing a Photo or Video

Tap **†** to preview your new photo or video. When previewing a video, tap to play the video.

Tap or at the top of the display to view the previous or next photo or video.

To delete a photo or video, tap 💼.



Tap 📑 to perform various operations on your photo and 🛫 video files.

### Using Effects

Tap , then tap **Effects** to open the camera effects menu.

You can adjust the **Brightness** of your photo or video, specify the **Light** conditions, and select a photo **Style** (such as **Black and White** or **Sepia** tones).

### Adjusting Setup Options

Tap E, then tap Setup to open the camera setup menu.

You can set or adjust the following options:

Option	Description
Photo	Set the <b>Size</b> and image <b>Quality</b> of the photos you take.
Video	Set the <b>Size</b> and image <b>Quality</b> of the videos you record.
Default Name	Apply a date and time stamp, or specify a text prefix for the photos and videos you take.
Shutter Sound	Set the shutter sound.
Save To	Specify the location where your photos/videos are saved.

Tap , then tap **Delay Timer On** to activate the delay timer. The timer indicator displays in the upper-left corner of the viewfinder.

Tap **Start** to activate the timer. The timer counts down from 10 seconds, and then takes a photo. You can tap **Stop** to stop the timer at any time during the countdown.

**Tip:** To take a self-portrait: Activate the timer, and use the mirror to aim the camera lens. When you hear the camera click, tap **†**. to view your photo.

### Sending a Multimedia Message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service* (MMS) *multimedia message* contains one or more pages with text and embedded media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice

records, and/or video clips). You can send an MMS message to other wireless phone users, and to email addresses.



To compose and send an MMS message:



- 1 Tap rin the top application selector bar to go to the message center.
- 2 Tap Compose.
- 3 Tap the *message type* pull-down menu, then tap MMS to open the MMS message composition screen (shown at right).



- 4 Tap :, then tap a text entry method to enter text on the page. When you are finished, tap **lide Keyboard** to hide the text entry keyboard or pad.
- **5** Tap a button in the media toolbar at the bottom of the screen to insert media objects on the page or attach files to the message.
  - Tap to insert a picture, video, or new drawing on the page.
    - Tap to insert a sound file or new voice record on the page.
    - Tap to activate the **Camera**, take a photo, and insert it on the page.
- Tap to attach a contact, event, task, or file to the message.

Highlight Features

- 6 To add a new page after the current page, tap . Repeat steps 4 and 5 to enter contents for the new page.
- 7 To enter the message recipient(s), tap **To** to select numbers or addresses from your address book, or tap the direct line in the **To** field to enter a phone number or email address.
- 8 Tap **Cc**, **Bcc**, or **Subject** to enter additional recipients or a message subject. (Use the MMS menu, described below, to show or hide these fields.)
- 9 Tap Send to send the message.

When composing an MMS message, you can tap 🔳 to perform various operations on the message prior to sending it. The MMS menu can include the following options:

Option	Description
Load	Insert a quick card, quick text note, or auto-signature on the page.
Save To	Save the message to the <b>Drafts</b> folder, or save it as a quick card.
Page Duration	Set the number of seconds each page is displayed.
Preview	Preview the MMS message.



Option	Description
Show	Show or hide the <b>Cc</b> , <b>Bcc</b> , and/or <b>Subject</b> header fields. Use <b>Cc</b> or <b>Bcc</b> to carbon-copy or blind-carbon-copy the message to additional recipients. Use <b>Subject</b> to specify a subject for the message.
Send Options	Receipt Request: Request a delivery report or read report for the message.Expire After: Set the expiration time for an undelivered message.
	Priority: Set message priority.
	<b>Send Later</b> : Set a time and date for your network server to send the message.
Delete	Delete the current page, delete an object on the page, or delete the message.

### Receiving a Multimedia Message



Your phone displays the **Prompt** icon in the top application selector bar to notify you that you have received a new MMS message.

Tap  $\bigcirc$  to display message details (sender, subject, time, and size). Tap **Download** to download the message to your phone. Tap  $\checkmark$  to return to the previous screen without downloading the message.

When you download an MMS message:

- Tap **I** to display message details (sender, subject, time, and size).
- Tap () to play the message.
- Tap Reply to send an MMS reply to the message.
- Tap 🔮 to perform various operations on the message. The received MMS message menu can include the following options:

Option	Description
Reply By SMS	Send an SMS reply to the
	message.
Save File	Save a media object in the
	message.
Save As Quick Card	Save the current MMS page as a quick card. You can insert the quick card into MMS messages that you compose.
Move To Folder	Move the message to another message center folder.
Delete Message	Delete the message.

### Using the RealOne Media Player



Your phone includes a RealOne Media Player that you can use to play audio and video files.

Tap (1) Media in the main screen to launch the media player.

Alternatively, you can press game key "A" at any time to launch the media player.

To play a media file, tap **E**, then tap **Open**. Tap **File** to play a media



file stored on your phone, or tap **URL** to download and play a media file from a Web site.


In the media player window:

- Tap b to play the current media file.
- Tap 

   to stop playing.
- Tap the volume slider to adjust the volume. Alternatively, you can press the volume keys to adjust volume.
- Tap 4 to mute the sound. Tap it again to resume.

Tap **Now Playing** to display the name of the current media file. When the now playing list is displayed, tap **My Lib**. to add other files to the now playing list. Tap **E** to play other media files, combine media files to create playlists, and perform other media-related operations.

### Using a Bluetooth® Wireless Connection



#### Turning Bluetooth On/Off

- 1 Tap Suctout in the main screen to display the device list.
- 2 Tap , then tap **Setup** to open the Bluetooth setup menu.
- 3 Tap Turn On or Turn Off to activate or deactivate Bluetooth.
- 4 Tap Done to save the setting.

#### Searching for Other Devices

To connect your phone to a headset accessory or handsfree device:

- 1 Tap 📑 Bluetooth in the main screen to display the device list.
- 2 If necessary, turn Bluetooth on.
- 3 Tap Search to search for available Bluetooth devices.

Your phone displays a list of device(s) located within range of the phone. If your phone is already connected to a device, your phone identifies the connected device.



To connect to a device, select it from the list. The device may request permission to bond with your phone. Enter the correct PIN code to create a secure connection with the device.

## Making Your Phone Visible to Other Devices

To allow an unknown Bluetooth device to discover and connect to your phone:

- 1 Tap **Bluetooth** in the main screen to display the device list.
- 2 If necessary, turn Bluetooth on.
- 3 Tap **Discoverable** to put your phone into discoverable mode until a connection is made, or until 60 seconds elapse.

The device may request permission to bond with your phone. Enter the correct PIN code to create a secure connection with the device.

#### Connecting to a Recognized Device,

Your phone stores the names of previously connected devices. The device list shows the recognized devices located within range of the phone. If your phone is already connected to a device, your phone identifies the connected device.

Tap a device name to view its details. Tap and hold the device name to open a pop-up menu from which you can choose to **Create Bond**, **Connect**, **Delete**, or **Lock/Unlock** the device.

For a Motorola headset or other audio device, your phone automatically attempts to connect to the device.

#### Disconnecting From a Device

To disconnect from a device, tap and hold the device name to open a pop-up menu, then select **Drop** to drop the connection.

#### Exchanging Objects With Another Device

You can use a Bluetooth wireless connection to exchange a multimedia object or vObject (such as a vCard address book entry or vCalendar calendar event) with another phone, computer, or hand-held device.

#### Sending an Object

Turn on Bluetooth, then:

- 1 Tap and hold the object to open a pop-up menu, then select **Share** to display a list of share options.
- 2 Tap **Bluetooth** to display the device list.
- **3** Tap the device name on the list, or tap **Search** to locate the device.
- 4 Tap **Send** to send the object. If necessary, enter the correct PIN code to create a secure connection with the device.



#### **Receiving an Object**

Turn on Bluetooth. Your phone alerts you when it receives a data transfer request from the other device.

Tap **IX** to accept the data. If necessary, enter the correct PIN code to create a secure connection with the device.


Your phone notifies you when object transfer is complete, and may prompt you to specify the location where you wish to store the file.

#### Using the Touchscreen Display

*Main screen* page 1 is displayed when you turn on your phone.



You can use all of your phone's features by tapping on feature icons, buttons, and text with the provided stylus. Tap a page label on the left side of the screen to display main screen pages 1, 2, 3, or 4. Tap on a feature icon to select the feature.

**Note:** Your home screen may look different than the display shown above. For example, phone features can be displayed as a text-based list view instead of as feature icons, and the background image changes based on the phone theme you select.

#### **Application Selector Bar**

Icons in the application selector bar give you easy access to commonly used applications:

Main Screen	Go to the main screen
Address Book	Go to the address book
Message	Go to the message center
Phone	Display the phone keypad



#### Status Bar

The following indicators can display in the status bar:



**1. Signal Strength Indicator** – Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the  $\underline{A}$  (no signal) indicator or  $\underline{A} \times$  (no transmit) indicator is displayed.

**2. GPRS Indicator** – Shows that your phone is using a high-speed *General Packet Radio Service* (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. A darkened indicator shows that a GPRS connection is not available.

**3. Bluetooth® Indicator** – Shows that your phone has established a Bluetooth wireless connection with a headset accessory or other external device.

**4. Battery Level Indicator** – Vertical bars show the battery charge level. Recharge the battery when **Low Battery** displays and the battery alert sounds.

5. Clock – Shows the current time.

#### Button Bar

The button bar shows functions you can select in the active application.

**Note:** This guide describes how to use the stylus and touchscreen control to use phone features. In most cases, it does not include the equivalent navigation key for using the feature.

### **Using the Game Keys**

You can use the up/down volume keys and dedicated game keys "A" and "B" (see page 1) to control games that you play on your phone. See the game's playing instructions for additional information.

When you are **not** playing a game, you can perform the following actions:

- Press game key "A" at any time to launch the RealOne Media Player (see page 34).
- Press game key "B" at any time to to turn on the radio and/or access the radio controls (see page 83).

### **Opening Phone Features**

Your phone has many built-in features for communications, personal organization, and entertainment. Every feature has an associated icon.

You can open a feature in the following ways:


• Tap one of the icons in the application selector bar at the top of the screen. These icons are always visible on the screen.



Tap in the top application selector bar to go to the main screen. The main screen displays icons for all of your phone's features. Tap a page label on the left side of the screen to display main screen pages 1, 2, 3, or 4. Tap on a feature icon to select the feature.

The following icons identify features available on the main screens:





Your phone may contain additional Java<sup>™</sup> games or applications that add features and functionality to your phone. Java games and applications are accessed from the main screen on your phone.

**Tip:** You can set your phone to display the main screen features as a text-based list rather than graphic icons. Tap , then tap **List View** to change to list view. From list view, tap , then tap **Thumbhail View** to reset the graphic icons.

### **Entering Text**

Multiple text entry methods make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The method you select remains active until you select another method.

Tap a text entry area on the screen to bring up a text entry window. If necessary, tap the entry method button at the bottom of the screen to select a text entry method.

#### Handwriting

You can use the stylus as a pen to write letters, numbers, and punctuation directly on the screen.

In a text entry window, tap and tap **Handwriting** to open the handwriting pad (shown at right). Tap a button on the handwriting pad to select



Chinese characters, English text, or numbers as the type of text you want to enter.

Use the stylus to write in one of the 2 writing spaces. For best performance, alternate between the writing spaces so

that recognition can occur in one while you are writing in the other.

Write a text character, then wait for your phone to recognize and place it in the text entry window. If your phone places an incorrect character, tap the character in the choice area that you want to replace it.

Your phone uses a predictive text function to predict the word you are writing. Tap a word in the prediction area to place it in the text entry window.



To enter special characters or edit text, use the function buttons described on page 47.

#### Pinyin Keyboard

Use the Pinyin keyboard (shown at right) to enter Chinese characters. Tap keyboard characters in sequence to spell the pinyin. The letters you enter



display in the pinyin area, and corresponding Chinese characters display in the choice area. To see additional characters, tap the previous button I or next button I. Tap the desired character to place it at the cursor location in the entry window.

Your phone predicts the pinyin you are spelling, and highlights the next letters you can type to finish the word.

#### Zhuyin Keyboard

Use the Zhuyin keyboard (shown at right) to enter Chinese characters using Zhuyin symbols. Keyboard operation is similar to the Pinyin keyboard described above.



#### English Keyboard

Use the English keyboard (shown at right) to enter letters and numbers at the cursor location in the text entry window.

#### Numeric Pad

Use the numeric pad (shown at right) to enter digits and/or numeric symbols at the cursor location in the text entry window.

#### **Function Buttons**

Tap with any text entry method to open the symbol pad, to enter a symbol at the cursor location. Tap a to lock or hide the symbol pad.



To move the cursor to the next line, tap -.

To enter a space at the cursor location, tap -.

**Tip:** Tap a location in the text entry window to move the cursor to that location.

### Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.



Tap **Spkr** to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call. The handsfree speaker remains on until you tap **Spkr** again or turn the phone off.

**Note:** The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

### Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has **not** reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, and/or call barring password if necessary.

To change a code or password, tap **Security** in the main screen, tap the **Security** button in the bottom button bar, then tap **Password** to open the change passwords screen.

### Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone to prevent unauthorized use.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you must unlock it to answer**.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 60).

#### Locking Your Phone

Tap **Security** in the main screen, then tap **Phone Lock On**. Your phone prompts you to enter the unlock code. Enter your unlock code to lock the phone.

#### **Unlocking Your Phone**

When you see the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt, enter your unlock code to unlock the phone.

**Tip:** Your phone's unlock code is originally set to 1234. Many service providers reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number.

### If You Forget a Code, PIN, or Password

**Note:** Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Many service providers reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number before you receive your phone.



If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, do the following at the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt: Tap to display the unlock code bypass screen. Enter your security code, then tap **OK** to submit the security code.

If you forget your security code, SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

### **Using the Address Book**

This section describes basic address book operations. For more information about using the address book, see page 70 and the *More Here* guide (described on page 15).

#### Viewing Your Contact List

Tap Or in the top application selector bar. To change the way your contact list is displayed, tap e and select List View or Thumbhall View.

#### Adding a New Contact

Tap : in the top application selector bar. Tap :, then tap New Contact. Tap the direct line in each field to enter contact details. Tap Done to store the contact.

#### Calling a Number

Tap  $\bigcirc$  in the top application selector bar. Tap a contact name to display its details. Tap the phone number next to the call indicator  $\square$  to call the number.

#### Viewing Entries By Category

Tap fin the top application selector bar. Tap the *category* button in the bottom button bar and select a category name (All, Unfiled, or SIM Card) to display only the contacts in that category.

#### Searching For a Contact

Tap  $\bigcirc$  in the top application selector bar. Tap  $\blacksquare$ , then tap **Find Contacts**. Select **Contact's Name**, **Number**, or **Other**, enter the desired information in the **Find For** field, then tap **Find**.



## **Setting Up Your Phone**

### **Storing Your Name and Phone Number**

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap in the bottom button bar to open the phone menu.
- 3 Tap Setup to open the phone setup menu.
  - 4 Tap My Number to open the number editor.
  - 5 Enter your name and number (for line 1 and line 2, if applicable), then tap **Done** to store the information.

If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

### **Setting the Date and Time**

You must set the date and time to use the calendar application.

- 1 Tap Y Setup in the main screen, then tap Date and Time.
- 2 Tap **Date** to set the date on the date setup calendar (shown at right).
- 3 Tap Time to set the current time. When you are finished, tap **Done** to return to the setup screen.



### **Setting a Ring Style**


Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

You can select one of 3 different ring styles, or turn off the incoming call alert. To set a ring style, tap the *ring style* button in the main screen and select one of the ring styles described on page 42.

### **Setting a Phone Theme**

A *phone theme* consists of a set of images, sounds, and user interface settings that you can apply collectively to your phone. A phone theme includes the following components:

- wallpaper image
- screen font size
- incoming call ring tones (lines 1 and 2)
- incoming message ring tone
- general alert tone
- power up screen image



The *wallpaper* image is a photo, picture, or animation that appears in your phone's display when no feature or application is selected.

*Ring tones* are alerts that notify you of incoming calls, messages, and phone events.

You can modify a theme's components to customize the theme for your phone.

Your phone includes several preloaded themes. You can download and install additional themes on your phone.

**Note:** The background image that appears in your phone's main screen changes based on the phone theme you select. You cannot change the background image for a selected theme.

#### Downloading a Theme

To download a theme from the micro-browser, see page 82.

#### Selecting a Theme

You can apply any of the themes installed on your phone.

- 1 Tap Theme in the main screen to display the theme screen.
- 2 Tap and hold the *theme name* to open a pop-up menu, then tap **Set to Current**.

#### **Configuring a Theme**

You can change a theme's settings to customize the theme for your phone.

- 1 Tap Theme in the main screen to display the theme screen.
- 2 Tap the *theme name* to open the theme edit menu.
- 3 Edit theme settings as desired, then tap **Done** to save your changes.

**Tip:** To reset the default theme settings, tap and hold the *theme name* to open a pop-up menu, then tap **Reset to Default**.




#### Deleting a Theme



You cannot delete the preloaded themes on your phone. To delete a theme that you have downloaded and installed:

- 1 Tap Theme in the main screen to display the theme screen.
- 2 Tap and hold the *theme name* to open a pop-up menu, then tap **Delete**.

### Setting Backlight Brightness and Duration



- 2 Tap d and b to decrease or increase backlight brightness.
- 3 Tap LCD Sleep Time to set the amount of time that the backlight remains on.
- 4 Tap Done to save your settings.

**Tip:** Tap  $\leftarrow$  to return to the setup screen without saving your changes.

**Note:** Your phone's display normally is visible only when the display backlight is on, or when the display is viewed in direct sunlight. To extend battery life, the backlight turns off automatically when no activity is detected for a period of time. The backlight turns back on when you tap the screen or press any key.

### **Conserving Battery Power**

Your phone includes several features designed to help extend battery life.

Tap  $f_{\mathbf{C}}$  Setup in the main screen, then tap Power Management. Your phone displays a battery charge meter that indicates the remaining battery power.

The **Battery Save** feature automatically adjusts phone settings to maximize battery life. Set **Battery Save** to **On** or **Off** to activate or deactivate the feature.

The **Auto Power Off** feature automatically turns your phone off after a period of inactivity. Tap **On** to activate the feature, then tap Off Time to specify the period of inactivity, in hours and minutes, after which your phone turns itself off.

Tap **Done** to save your settings and return to the setup screen.

### **Changing the Active Line**



Change the active phone line to make and receive calls from your other phone number.

**Note:** This feature is available only for dual-line-enabled SIM cards.

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap in the bottom button bar to open the phone menu.
- 3 Tap Switch to Line 2 (or Line 1) to switch to the other line.



### **Redialing a Number**

- 1 Tap tin the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap **E**, then tap **Dialed Calls** to go to the dialed calls list.
- 3 Tap the number you want to redial.

#### **Using Automatic Redial**



When you receive a busy signal, your phone displays **Call Falled, Number Busy**.

To redial the phone number, tap Redial.

Your phone automatically redials the number.

### **Using Caller ID**

#### Incoming Calls



*Calling line identification* (caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls in your phone's external and internal displays.

The phone displays the caller's name (and picture ID, if available) when the name is stored in your address book, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information is not available.

You can also set your phone to play a distinctive ring tone for specific contacts stored in your address book. For more information, see page 70.

#### **Outgoing Calls**



You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap 🗾 in the bottom button bar to open the phone menu.

- 3 Tap Setup to open the setup menu.
- 4 Tap **Show ID**, then tap **On** or **Off** to show or hide your caller ID with outgoing phone calls.

**Tip:** Select **Network Controlled** to let the network determine your caller ID status.

### **Canceling an Incoming Call**



While the phone is ringing or vibrating, tap **Ignore** to cancel the incoming call.

Depending on your phone settings and/or service subscription, the call may be forwarded to another number, or the caller may hear a busy signal.

### **Turning Off a Call Alert**

You can turn off your phone's incoming call alert before answering the call.

Press either volume key to turn off the alert.

### **7** Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

**Note:** Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be

placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- 3 Tap Send to make the call.

### **Dialing International Numbers**

When the phone keypad is displayed, tap and hold **10** to insert the local international access code (+) for the country from which you are calling.

Alternatively, you can tap , tap **Insert**, then select **Insert** + to insert the local international access code.

### Direct Dialing an Extension or Voicemail Number

To dial an extension or voicemail number directly, you can insert a pause  $(\mathbf{P})$  character into the dialing sequence.

- 1 Use the keypad to dial the phone number.
- 2 When you need to insert a pause, tap , tap Insert, then select Insert Pause to insert a P at the cursor location.
- 3 Dial the extension number.
- 4 Tap **Send** to make the call.

Your phone dials the phone number, waits for the call to connect, then dials the remaining digits.

**Tip:** Use the same procedure to insert a wait (W) character in the dialing sequence. Your phone dials the number, waits for the call to collect, then prompts you for confirmation before it dials the remaining digits.

### Dialing an Extension Number During a Call

- 1 Tap the keypad button iii to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Dial the extension number.
- 3 Tap 🕉 to return to the on-call status screen.

### **Dialing Recent Calls**

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialed, even if the calls did not connect. The lists are

sorted from newest to oldest entries. The oldest entries are deleted as new entries are added.

- 1 Tap 🚯 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap 💽 to open the recent calls menu.
- 3 Tap Answered Calls, Missed Calls, or Dialed Calls to view the corresponding call list.
- 4 Tap an entry to call the entry's number.

#### **Calling With Turbo Dial**

You can store up to 9 frequently used phone numbers in the turbo dial list, then dial the numbers by tapping and holding a single keypad number key.

To turbo dial a phone number:

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap and hold a keypad key to dial the phone number assigned to the key.

If no number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a phone number in the turbo dial list.

To setup the turbo dial numbers list:

- 1 Tap 🚱 in the top application selector bar to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap 1, then tap Setup to open the setup menu.
- 3 Tap Turbo Dialing to open the turbo dial list.
- 4 Enter phone numbers in the turbo dial list.

### **Putting a Call On Hold**

During a call, tap **Hold** to put the call on hold. Tap **Hold** again to resume the call.

### Muting a Call

During a call, tap **Mute** to turn off your phone's microphone. Tap **Mute** again to resume the call.

# Dialing Another Number During a Call



During a call, you can make a call to another phone number.

- 1 Tap the keypad button iii to display the phone keypad.
- 2 Tap the keypad keys to dial the phone number.
- 3 Tap Send to make the call.

When the new call connects, the first call is put on hold while you talk to the third party.

To switch between the 2 calls:

- 1 Tap , then tap **Switch** to put the current active call on hold and switch to the other call.
- 2 Tap End to end the current active call.

### Transferring a Call



You can announce that you are transferring an active call to another party, or you can directly transfer the call.

#### Announce the Call Transfer

- 1 Tap Hold to put the call on hold.
- 2 Tap the keypad button iii to display the phone keypad.
- **3** Tap the keypad keys to dial the number where you are transferring the call.
- 4 Tap **Send** to make the call and speak to the person who answers.
- 5 Tap 📑, then tap Transfer to Hold.

#### Do Not Announce the Call Transfer

- 1 Tap 📑, then tap Transfer.
- 2 Tap the keypad keys to dial the number where you are transferring the call.
- 3 Tap Send to transfer the call.
