




### SIM card

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries.





### battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start



Charge Complete when finished.

**Tip:** Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

You can charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's mini-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

### battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty



- does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

**Warning:** Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Before using your phone, read the battery safety information in the "Safety and General Information" section included in the gray-edged pages at the back of this guide.

### turn it on & off

**Caution:** Some phones ask for your SIM card PIN code when you turn them on. If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your display shows **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn on your phone, press and hold for a few seconds or until the display turns on. If prompted, enter your



6-digit SIM card PIN code and/or 4-digit unlock code.

To turn off your phone, press and hold for 2 seconds.

### make a call

Enter a phone number and press to make a call.

To "hang up," close the flip or press 3.

### answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press • to answer.

To "hang up," close the flip or press .

### store a phone number

You can store a phone number in your **Phonebook**:

- 1 Enter a phone number in the home screen.
- 2 Press the Store key.
- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press the *center key* .

**Note:** You can store a phonebook entry on your phone or on your SIM card. In the entry, select **Store To** and choose **Phone** or **SIM**. Entries stored on the SIM card can only include name and number details.

4 Press the Done key to store the number.

> Phonebook, then press
> New > Email Address

## call a stored phone number

1 Scroll to the phonebook entry.

**Shortcut:** In the phonebook, press keypad keys to enter the first letters of an entry you want. If necessary, press the **Search** key. To change the way your phonebook search works, see page 53.

2 Press • to call the entry.

### your phone number

From the home screen, press **[]** # to see your number.

**Tip:** Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press **T** > **My Tel. Numbers**.

You can edit the name and phone number stored on your SIM card. From the home screen, press (I) (#), select an entry, press the View key, and press the Edit key. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.

### main attractions

### digital audio player

Your phone can play and store MP3 and AAC song files. You can use a removable memory card with your phone to store more songs (see page 20).

**Note:** You cannot use the audio player with a USB cable connected to your phone.





- 4 Press the **Send** key to send the message.

### record & send a video

Press > Multimedia > Video Camera to see the video viewfinder.



**Note:** You can zoom only before you start recording. The number of clips remaining is an estimate.

If you want to send your video in a message, the video length must be set to MMS. To set length, press **3** > **Video Setup** > **Video Length**.

- **1** Press the **Capture** key to start recording the video in the viewfinder.
- 2 Press the Stop key to stop recording the video. You can:
  - Press the Store key to store or send the video.

To send the video in a text message, press the Store > Send in Message. Enter text and press Send To, then scroll to a recipient address and press the center key • to select it. To send the message, press the Send key.

 Press the **Discard** key to delete the video and return to the active viewfinder.

### memory card

You can use a removable memory card with your phone to store and retrieve multimedia objects (such as photos and sounds).



**Note:** If you download a copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.

### install a memory card

- Remove the battery door.
- 2 Press the memory card into its slot until it clicks into place.



3 Replace the battery door.

**To remove the memory card**, push it in until it clicks again. It begins to slide out, and you can slide it the rest of the way out.

Do not remove your memory card while your phone is using it or writing files on it.

## see and change memory card information

Find it: Settings > Phone Status > Storage Devices

- 1 Press • to scroll to the memory card that is installed.
- 2 Press the **Details** key to see the memory card information

#### or

Press to see the **Storage Device** menu, which lets you **Format** or **Rename** the memory card.

**To see memory card files**, select **Memory Card** in any file list (such as **Pictures**). To see files stored on your phone, select **Phone Memory** instead.

## connect the memory card to a computer

You can access your phone's memory card with a PC.

**Note:** When your phone is connected to a computer, you can only access the memory card through the computer.

#### On your phone:

Press Settings > Connection > USB Settings > Default Connection > Memory Card.

This directs the USB connection to your memory card. Attach the Motorola Original USB cable to the accessory port on your phone and to an available USB port on your computer. Then follow these steps:

#### On your computer:

- 1 Open your "My Computer" window, where your phone's memory card shows as a "Removable Disk" icon.
- 2 Click on the "Removable Disk" icon to access the files on your phone's memory card.

**3** To store the desired files onto the memory card, drag and drop them as follows:

MP3 or AAC files: > mobile > audio screen savers: > mobile > picture wallpapers: > mobile > picture video clips: > mobile > video

- 4 When you finish, remove the device by selecting the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray at the bottom of your computer screen. Then select "USB Mass Storage Devices" and "Stop."

### cable connections

Your phone has a mini-USB port so you can connect it to a computer to transfer data.

Original USB data cables and supporting software are sold separately. Check your computer or hand-held device to determine the type of cable you need. To transfer data between your phone and computer, you must install the software included with the Motorola Original data kit. See the data kit user's guide for more information. To make

### Bluetooth™ wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless connections. You can connect your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit to make handsfree calls. You can connect your phone with a phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections to exchange files.

**Note:** The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

**For maximum Bluetooth security**, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

### turn Bluetooth power on or off

Find it:  $\blacksquare > \$  Bluetooth Link > Setup > Power > On

**Note:** To extend battery life, use this procedure to set Bluetooth power to **Off** when not in use. Your phone will not connect to devices until you set Bluetooth power back to **On** and connect your phone with the device again.

## use a headset or handsfree car kit

Before you try to connect your phone with a handsfree device, make sure the device is on and ready in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the user's guide for the device). You can connect your phone with only one device at a time.

## Find it: **■** > **③** Bluetooth Link > Handsfree > [Look For Devices]



Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- 1 Scroll to a device in the list and press the center key .
- **2** Press the **Yes** or **OK** key to connect to the device.
- 3 If necessary, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and press the **OK** key.

When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator § shows in the home screen.

**Shortcut:** When Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone.

**Tip:** We can't see the device you're holding. For specific information about a device, refer to the instructions that came with it.

### copy files to another device

You can copy a media file, phonebook entry, datebook event, or Web shortcut from your phone to a computer or other device.



**Note:** You can't copy some copyrighted objects.

**Before you try to copy files to another device**, make sure the device is **on** and **ready** in *discoverable* mode (see the user's guide for the device).

- 1 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press 🔳, then select:
  - Copy for media files.

- Share Phonebook Entry for phonebook entries.
- Send for datebook events.
- 3 Select a recognized device name, or [Look For Devices] to search for the device where you want to copy the file.

**Note:** Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, that device can start similar Bluetooth connections with your phone. Your display shows the Bluetooth indicator 3 at the top when there is a Bluetooth connection.

## receive files from another device

**Before you try to receive files from another device**, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **on** (see page 24).

1 Place your phone near the device, and send the file from the device.

If your phone and the sending device don't recognize each other, place your phone in discoverable mode so the sending device can locate it. Press

> Bluetooth Link > Setup > Find Me

2 Press the Accept key on your phone to accept the file from the other device.

Your phone notifies you when file transfer is complete. If necessary, press the **Save** key to save the file.


### basics

### display

The *home screen* shows when you turn on the phone. To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and **©**.


**Note:** Your home screen may look different from the one below, depending on your service provider.



The Menu Indicator shows that you can press to open the menu. Soft Key Labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Your home screen might show headlines from your service provider at the bottom. To change this headline view, press Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Headlines.

Status indicators can show at the top of the home screen:



- Signal Strength Indicator Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when in or in shows.
- **2 EDGE/GPRS Indicator Shows** when your phone is using a high-speed Enhanced Data for GSM Evolution (EDGE) or General Packet Radio



### text entry

Some features let you enter text.


**Tip:** WANT TO SHOUT YOUR MESSAGE? Press ① in a text entry view to change text case to all capital letters (ABC), no capitals (abc), or next letter capital (Abc).

#### iTAP® mode

Press # in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see or , press > Entry Setup to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your display shows:



 If you want a different word (such as Progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.


- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.
- Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.

### tap mode

Press # in a text entry view to switch to tap mode. If you don't see Abcl or Abcl, press > Entry Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

For example, if you press **3** one time, your display shows:



When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the

word. For example, if you enter **prog** your display might show:



 The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press •ô• down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.

- Press to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- If you don't want to save your text or text edits, press and select Abort Message.
- Tap extended mode cycles through additional special characters and symbols as you repeatedly press a keypad key.

#### numeric mode

Press # in a text entry view until you see 123. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.


### symbol mode

Press # in a text entry view until you see @. Press a keypad key to show its symbols at the bottom of the display. Scroll to the symbol you want, then press the *center key* .

### volume

Press the volume keys to:





- change the earpiece volume during calls
- change the ringer volume from the home screen

**Tip:** Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Vibrate** or **Silent** by holding the down volume key in the home screen.

## navigation key

Press the navigation key •• up, down, left, or right to scroll to items in the display. When you scroll to something, press the center key •• to select it.



## smart key

The smart key gives you another way to do things. For example, when you scroll to a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it (instead of pressing the center key ••). The smart key usually does the same thing as pressing the center key ••. To find the smart key, see page 1. To change what the smart key does in the home screen, see page 59.

## external display

When your phone is closed, the external display shows the time, date, status indicators, and notifications for incoming calls and other events. For a list of phone status indicators, see page 29.

## handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on. Your display shows **Spkrphone On** until you turn it off or end the call.

**Note:** The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset.

## codes & passwords

Your phone's 4-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The 6-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

You can also change your **SIM PIN** or call barring passwords.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press and enter your 6-digit security code instead.

**If you forget other codes:** If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

## lock & unlock phone



## Specific Absorption Rate Data

# This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. 1 Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and

certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.28 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 0.27 W/kg. The SAR value for this product in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.12 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).2

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

- In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.
- The SAR information includes the Motorola testing protocol, assessment procedure, and measurement uncertainty range for this product.
