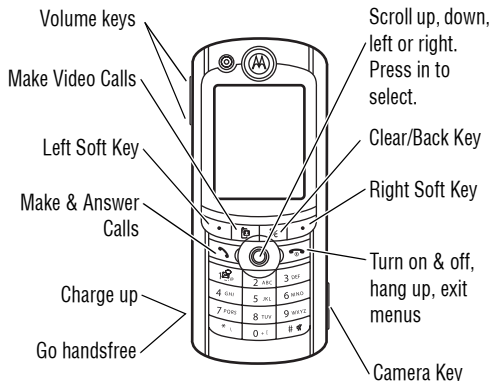

## 3.1 Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

## 3.2 Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following instructions.

### 3.2.1 External Antenna Care

If your phone has an external antenna, use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and/or may result in non-compliance with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

### 3.2.2 Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a fixed line phone.

### 3.2.3 Body-Worn Operation: Voice Communication

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting voice communications, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines.

If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

### 3.2.4 Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

### 3.2.5 Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries, antennas, and convertible covers, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at [www.motorola.com](http://www.motorola.com).

### 3.3 RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

**Note:** *Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.*

**Note:** *This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.*

#### 3.3.1 Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

### 3.3.2 Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your device offers a flight mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about use in flight. If your device offers a feature that automatically turns on the phone, then turn off this feature before boarding an aeroplane or entering an area where the use of wireless devices is restricted.

### 3.3.3 Medical Devices

#### Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 centimetres (6 inches) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 15 centimetres (6 inches) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.

- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

#### Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

### 3.4 Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a phone may be distracting in certain circumstances. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.

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- Always use handsfree operation.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

### 3.5 Operational Warnings

#### 3.5.1 For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

#### 3.5.2 Gas or Petrol Stations

Obey all posted signs with respect to the use of radio equipment in gas or petrol stations. Turn off your wireless device if instructed by authorised staff.

#### 3.5.3 Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

**Note:** *The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.*

#### 3.5.4 Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted “Turn off electronic devices.” Obey all signs and instructions.

## 3.5.5 Damaged Products






If your phone or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorised Service Centre to determine if it has been damaged. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

## 3.5.6 Batteries and Chargers

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become hot. Take care when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original™ batteries and chargers.**

**Caution:** To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

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### 3.7 Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone. (The flashing-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video games or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.

- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

### 3.8 Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

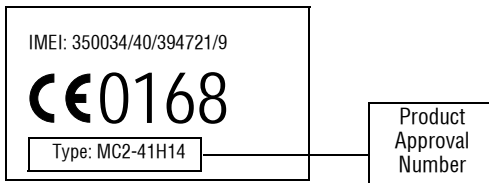
- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.

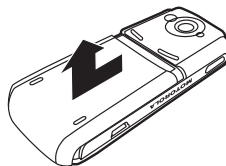

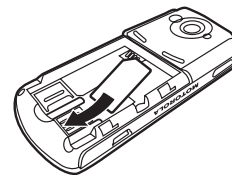
## 6.2 Installing the USIM, SIM, or Memory Cards

**Caution:** Do not bend or scratch your card. Avoid exposing your card to static electricity, water, or dirt.

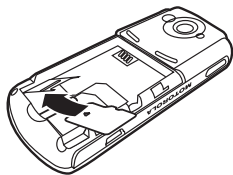
Your 3G USIM (Universal IC Card) contains your phone number, service details, and contacts list/message memory. Your phone can use GSM SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) cards, but not all features will be available.



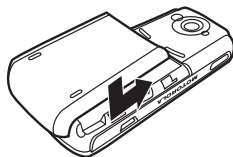

## 6.3 Memory Card

Insert the Memory Card next to the SIM card (see above) underneath the phone battery.

The Memory Card provides you with a larger storage capacity than the Phone Memory. When you download for example pictures, sounds, video clips or Java applications, they will be saved to the Memory Card.

**Note:** If you download a copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.

**Note:** A key over the icon indicates that the file has a copyright lock that keeps you from saving it on external memory, forwarding it, or editing it.



If you have a TransFlash removable memory card, the use of an SD adapter allows you to use it in other devices that are compatible with SD cards (for example, digital cameras, laptops, mp3-players).

## 6.4 User Memory

Your phone stores any content that you add, like ringtones or games, in *user memory*. Your service provider may store some content in user memory before you receive the phone.

## 6.5 Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.



- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling centre for proper battery disposal.

**Warning:** Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

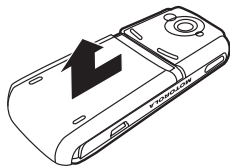

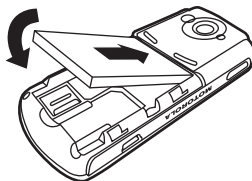

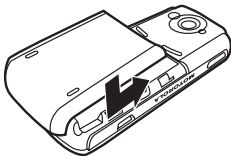

## 6.7 Using Your Charger

The battery charger shipped with this device is specifically designed for use with Motorola 3G mobile phones. Other chargers might take longer to charge your battery or cause your calls to fail during charging.

For best performance, please use the following charger kits with this device:

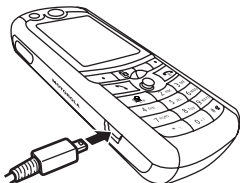

## 6.8 Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before using your phone, please install and **fully charge the battery as described below**. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

### Action

- 1 Plug the charger into your phone.




- 2 Plug the other end of the charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, press the release tab and remove the charger.


**Tip:** You can safely leave the charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

## 6.9 Turning Your Phone On

### Action

- 1 Press and hold  for 2 seconds or until the display turns on.




- 2 If necessary, select whether to start in **Flight Mode** or not. See “Flight Mode” on page 89 for more details.
- 3 If necessary, press  to scroll to the User Account you want. Then press the **Select** key to select the account from the list (stored on the SIM card).
- 4 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the **Ok** key to unlock the SIM card.

**Caution:** If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.

- 5 If necessary, enter your four-digit unlock code and press **Ok** key to unlock the phone.

**Tip:** The unlock code is originally set to 1234. Your service provider may change this number before you receive your phone.

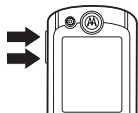
**Action**

- 6** To turn off your phone at any stage, press and hold the  for 2 seconds.

**6.10 Adjusting Volume**

Press the up or down volume keys to:



- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease speakerphone volume during a call
- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible



**Tip:** At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

**Note:** You can make an emergency call even when the phone is locked, or when a SIM card is not inserted (see page 67).

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

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

To set your **Ring Style**, press  > **Ring Styles** or **Settings** > **Ring Styles** (see page 59).

**Shortcut:** In the home screen, press the down volume key to switch the alert for incoming calls and other events to vibrate alert, then silent alert. Press the up volume key to reset ring alert.

**Shortcut:** Press and hold  to quickly change to silent style. Press and hold  again to change back to previous ring style.

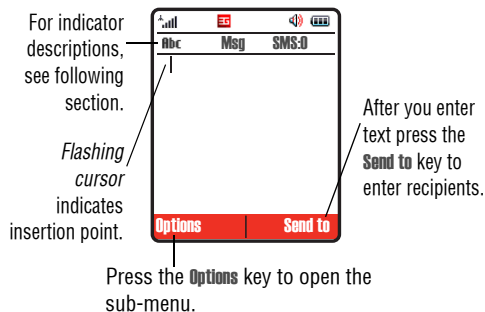
To view your phone number from the home screen, press  .

While you are on a call, press **Options** > **My Tel. Numbers**.

**Note:** Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 59. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

Some features require you to enter information. The message centre lets you compose and send text messages.

## Choosing a Text Entry Mode

### 6.15.1 Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press **#** in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

**1** or Your **Primary** text entry mode can be set to any iTAP **1** or tap **1** mode.

**2** or Your **Secondary** text entry mode can be set to any iTAP **2** or tap **2** mode, or set to **None** if you don't want a secondary entry mode.

**123** **Numeric** mode enters numbers only.

**&** **Symbol** mode enters symbols only.

### 6.15.2 Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

To set your primary and secondary text entry modes, press **Options > Text Setup** in a text entry view and select **Primary Text** or **Secondary Text**, and choose:

**iTAP** Let the phone predict each word as you press keys (see page 23).

**Tap** Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.

**Tap Extended** Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.

**None** Hide the Secondary setting (only available for Secondary Setup).

### Using Capitalisation

Press **0** in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalisation status:







**abc** = no capital letters

**Abc** = capitalise next letter only

**ABC** = all capital letters

## Text Entry Mode Indicators

When you select the **Primary** or **Secondary** text entry mode, the following indicators identify the text entry setting:

Two other indicators identify **Numeric (123)** or **Symbol (&)** entry modes.



## 6.15.3 Using Tap Mode


This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

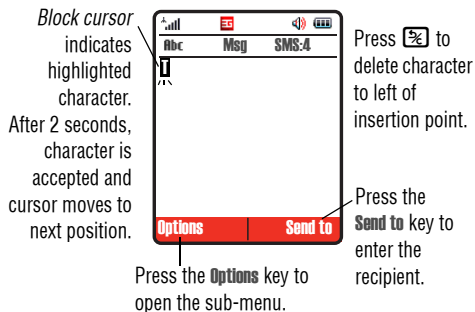
Regular **Tap** mode cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. **Tap Extended** also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 23.

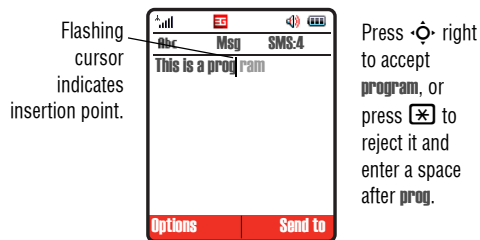
**Tip:** Press  right to accept a word completion, or  to insert a space.

In a text entry screen, you can press  to switch entry mode. If you don't see **Abc1** or **Abc2** then press **Options** > **Text Setup** to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.



To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog** you might see:



If you want a different word (such as **progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

- Press **[left arrow]** or **[right arrow]** to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press **[down arrow]** to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press **[end call]** to exit without saving.

## 6.15.4 Using iTAP™ Mode

Press # in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see # or # , press **Options** > **Text Setup** to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP™ software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than Tap, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.

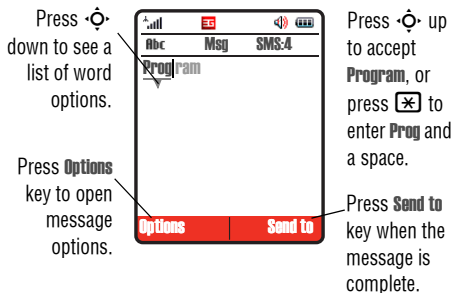
**Tip:** Your phone has a text tutorial which should help you with any problems..

For example, if you press **[7][7][6][4]**, letter combinations that match your key presses display:



- If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.
- Press **[1]** to enter punctuation or other characters.

### Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press **[#]** to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which mode is active (see page 21). If iTAP mode is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 20.

If alternative combinations are available then an arrow appears below the letters.

- 2 **⬆** up or down

go to the previous or next available predicted words

Press and hold **⬆** up or down to display a popup window showing the next four predicted words. You can scroll up and down through this list and then press **Select** to accept the highlighted word.

- 3 **⬆** right

accept the predicted word

You can press keypad keys to add more letters to the end of the combination.

A space is automatically inserted after the word.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognise, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognised words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

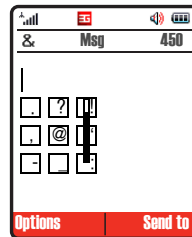
## 6.15.5 Using Numeric Mode

In a text entry screen, press  to switch entry modes until the **123 (Numeric)** indicator displays.


Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press  to switch to another entry mode.

In a text entry screen, press  to switch entry modes until the **& (Symbol)** indicator displays.

Copy All Text	Copy all text in the editor.
Cut All Text	Cut all text in the editor.
Paste	Paste the text you cut or copied.
Delete	Delete the selected text.
Undo	Undo the last copy, cut, or paste in the current text editor.

#### Note:



- **Paste** only displays once you have cut or copied some text.
- **Undo** only displays once you have cut, copied or pasted some text.
- **Copy All Text** also displays in the menu (press Options) when you are viewing details for a Contacts entry, Calendar event, Vodafone Live! page, text message, or Call Log entry.

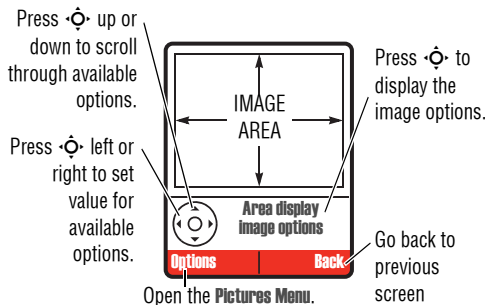

## 7.1 Taking and Sending a Photo

To activate your phone's camera, press the camera key on the bottom right of your phone (see page 1 for exact location), or select the camera icon on the main menu.

Switch Storage Device	Choose to store and see pictures on your phone or memory card.  <b>Note:</b> <i>High resolution photos can be stored only on your memory card.</i>
View Free Space	View memory space available for storing pictures.
Exposure	Adjust exposure of the picture.

**Tip:** To assign a stored picture to a contact entry, open the entry and press **Options** > **Edit** > **Customise** > **Picture**. You cannot assign pictures to entries stored on your SIM card.

### 7.2 Using Photos and Pictures

You can send your photos to other mobile phone users or email addresses, assign photos to specific contact entries, and use them as wallpaper or screen saver images.

#### 7.2.1 Downloading Pictures

Your phone may contain predefined photos, pictures, and animations. You can download and store additional images on your phone.

If you are unable to establish a network connection with Vodafone live!, contact your service provider.

## 7.3 Sending a Postcard

The Vodafone live! Postcard service allows you to send a picture as an MMS, which will be delivered as a real postcard to a street address. You can send a picture that you have just taken, or a picture already saved to your phone. You can also include a personal greeting to the postcard.

Your phone also has a **Sounds** player that can play songs and ring tones, but it cannot store playlists or other song information. To use the **Sounds** player, press  > **My Files** > **Sounds** and select the file you want to play.

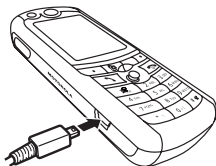
### 8.6.1 Setting Up a Cable Connection

Attach a Motorola Original™ USB cable to the phone and external device as follows.

**Note:** Check your computer or hand-held device to determine the type of cable you need.

#### Action

- 1 Plug the end of the cable with the Motorola logo into the phone's accessory connector port. Make sure that the logo and the phone are both facing you.



- 2 Plug the other end—the USB connection—into the USB port on the device.

### 8.6.2 Setting Up a Wireless Connection

For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always pair Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment. Your phone supports Bluetooth® wireless *pairing* (also called *linking* or *bonding*). You can pair your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or pair your phone with a computer to exchange and synchronise files.

**Note:** The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

#### Turning Bluetooth Power On or Off

##### Find the Feature



> Connectivity > Bluetooth  
> Setup > Power > On

If Bluetooth **Power** is **On**, your phone can automatically pair with the handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone.

Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, your phone "recognizes" that device in the future. If a recognized device starts a Bluetooth link with your phone, the Bluetooth status icon appears at the top of your display.

**Note:** To extend battery life, use the above procedure and set **Bluetooth Power** to **Off** when not in use. Your phone will not pair with devices until you set **Bluetooth Power** back to **On** and pair your phone with the devices again.

### Pairing With a Headset or Handsfree Device


Before you try to pair your phone with a device, make sure the device is on and ready in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the user's guide for the device).

#### Find the Feature



Your phone lists the devices it finds within range. Highlight a device in the list and:

Press	To
1 <b>Select</b>	select the device
2 <b>Yes</b> or <b>Ok</b>	pair with the device
3 keypad keys	enter the device passkey (such as 0000) if necessary, and then press the <b>Ok</b> key

When your phone is paired, the Bluetooth indicator  shows in the home screen.

**Shortcut:** After you paired with a device, you can pair with it again by pressing **Options** > **Use Bluetooth** during a phone call or while playing a sound file.

**Note:** You can't play some copyrighted files over a Bluetooth connection.

**Tip:** We can't see the device you're holding. For specific information about a device, refer to the instructions that came with it.

### Copying Objects to Another Device

You can use Bluetooth pairing to copy a media object, contact entry, calendar event, or bookmark from your phone to a computer or other device.



**Note:** You cannot copy a copyrighted object.

- 1 Highlight the object on your phone that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press **Options** and select **Copy** (for media objects), **Send** (for calendar events), or **Share Contact Entry** (for contact entries).

### Sending Objects to a Printer

If you see an  (in-call) indicator during a Vodafone live! session, your phone is using a standard voice connection. The type of network connection your phone uses depends on your service provider's network. Your network connection charges may vary depending on the type of connection used.





- If you receive a call during the download, press the **Swap** key to answer the call without ending the download.
- To end a download in progress, press .

### 9.1.4 Running Vodafone live! in the Background

Some phones are set up to run Vodafone live! in the background when the phone registers with a network. This lets your phone display information services messages sent by your service provider (such as stock updates, news headlines, or sports scores). These types of services typically are available through subscription from your service provider.

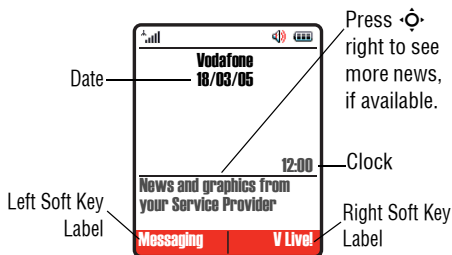

## 10.1 Using the Display

The *home screen* is displayed when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number. To dial a number from the home screen, press the number keys and .



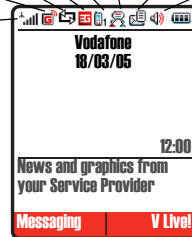

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left soft key or right soft key to



perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label. For soft key locations see page 1.

The following status indicators can display:

### 1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the  (no signal) indicator or  (no transmit) indicator is displayed.


## 2. GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

 = GPRS attach


 = GPRS packet data available


## 3. Data Transmission Indicator


Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

 = secure packet data transfer

 = unsecure packet data transfer

 = secure application connection

 = Bluetooth® connection is active


## 4. Roam Indicator




Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

## 5. Active Line Indicator




Shows  to indicate an active call, or  to indicate when call diverting is on. Icons for dual-line SIM cards can include:

## 6. Messaging Presence Indicator




Shows when Instant Messaging (IM) is active. Indicators can include:

 = IM active

 = invisible to IM


 = busy

When a Java application is active,  can display here.


## 7. Message Indicator



Displays when you receive a new message. Indicators can include:

 = text message

 = voicemail message


 = voice and text message

 = IM message

## 8. Ring Style Indicator

Shows the ring style setting.

 = loud ring

 = soft ring

 = vibrate and ring

 = vibrate then ring

 = vibrate

 = silent

## 9. Battery Level Indicator

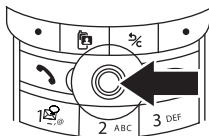
Vertical bars show the battery charge level. Recharge the battery when **Low Battery** displays and the battery alert sounds.

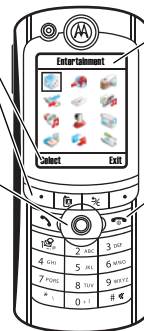

Press the navigation key () up, down, left or right to highlight items, and press it in () to select items. Press the left/right soft keys to select the functions listed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

## 10.3.2 Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



- Press to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.
- When an option has a list of possible values, press left or right to scroll through and select a value.

## Using the Handsfree Speaker

- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

### 10.4 Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speakerphone On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **Speaker** key again or turn the phone off.

**Note:** *The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.*

### 10.5 Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code or PIN2 code, if necessary. Your *Personal Identification Number* (PIN) code protects the information stored on your SIM card.

To change a code or password:

**Find the Feature**



> **Settings** > **Security**  
> **New Passwords**

### 10.6 Locking and Unlocking Your Phone


You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 67).



To manually set the time and date, turn off **Autoupdate**, then, press  > **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Time and Date** > *time* or *date*.

To choose an analogue or digital clock for your home screen, press  > **Settings** > **Personalise** > **Home Screen** > **Clock**.

To turn the date on or off on your home screen, press  > **Settings** > **Personalise** > **Home Screen** > **Date**.

## 11.3 Setting a Ring Style

Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.



### 11.4 Setting a Wallpaper Image

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your phone's home screen. The wallpaper image displays as a faint watermark in text and menu displays.

When you set an animation as a wallpaper image, only the first frame of the animation displays.

The screen saver image displays when the phone is on and no activity is detected for a specified time period.

**Tip:** This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image. The image shrinks to fill the display, if necessary. An animation repeats for one minute, then the first frame of the animation displays.

## 11.6 Setting a Theme

A *theme* is a group of image and sound files that you can apply to your phone. Most themes include a wallpaper image, screen saver image, and ringtone. Your phone may come with some themes, and you can download or create more.

To apply a theme, press  > My Files > Themes > *theme*.

To create a theme, press  > My Files > Themes, then press **Options** > **Create New**.

The Multi-Key option lets you answer incoming calls by pressing any key.

When automatic redial is turned off, you can manually activate the feature to redial a phone number. When you hear a busy signal and see **Number Busy**:

## 12.10 Using Caller ID

### 12.10.1 Incoming Calls

Calling line identification (Caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls.

The phone displays the caller's name (and picture, if available) if the name is stored in your contacts, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information is not available.

You can also set your phone to play a distinctive **Ringer ID** for specific entries stored in your contacts. For more information, see page 78.

### 12.10.2 Outgoing Calls

You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.


While dialling (with digits visible in the display), press **Options > Hide Caller ID/Show Caller ID**.

## 12.11 Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 999, that you can call under any

circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted. Your service provider can program additional emergency numbers into your SIM card. *However, your SIM card must be inserted in your phone in order to use the numbers stored on it.* See your service provider for additional information on this issue.

**Note:** *Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.*

Press	To
1 keypad keys	dial the emergency number
2 	call the emergency number


## 12.12 Dialling International Numbers


Press and hold **0** to insert the local international access code (+) from which you are calling. Then press the keypad keys to enter the country code and number.

## 12.13 Calling With Speed Dial

To call contact entries 1 to 9, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for one second.

You can set speed dial to call the entries in your phone's contacts list or Fixed Dial list.

> Speed Dial > Phone or Fixed Dial

To add a new contact entry, see page 77 To edit the **Location Number** for a contact entry, press  > Contacts, highlight the entry, and press **Options** > Edit.

## 12.14 Using Voicemail

Voicemail messages that you receive are stored on the network. To listen to your messages, you must call your voicemail phone number.


**Note:** Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

### 12.14.1 Listening to Voicemail Messages

**Find the Feature**  > Messaging > Call Voicemail

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number, see page 69. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider.

### 12.14.2 Receiving a Voicemail Message

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone displays  (voicemail message indicator) and **New Voicemail**.

**Note:** The icon may vary depending on your service provider.


Press	To
Call key	listen to the message

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number.

## 12.14.3 Storing Your Voicemail Number

If necessary, use the following procedure to store your voicemail phone number on your phone. Usually, your service provider has already done this for you.

## THIS MODEL MEETS INTERNATIONAL GUIDELINES FOR EXPOSURE TO RADIO WAVES

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.36 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 0.61 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).<sup>2</sup>

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

The World Health Organisation has stated that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile devices. They note that if you want to reduce your exposure then you can do so by limiting the length of calls or using a 'hands-free' device to keep the mobile phone away from the head and body.
