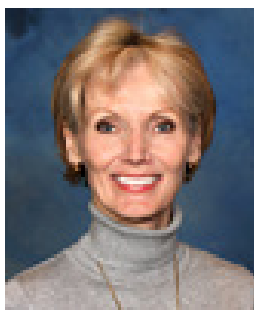

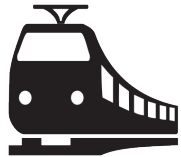


Using Bart
