# I. Getting Started

Congratuations on your purchase and welcome to Philips!

To fully benefit from the support that Philips offers, register your product at www.philips.com/welcome.

Please read the safety instructions in the "Precautions" section before using your phone.

To use your phone, you must insert a valid SIM card supplied by your network operator or retailer. The SIM card contains your subscription information, your mobile phone number and a memory in which you can store phone numbers and messages. For more information, see "Phone Book" on page 18.

# Insert the SIM card and Battery

Follow the steps below to insert your new SIM card.

Remember to switch off your mobile phone before removing the battery.

#### Remove the back cover

To insert SIM card, you must first remove the back cover. Push the back cover lock upwards with your thumb and lift up the back cover as shown below.



#### Remove the battery

Lift up the battery from the top to remove it.



#### Insert the SIM card

Insert the SIM card into the SIM card slot. Make sure that the clipped corner of the card is pointing the right direction and that the gold contacts are facing downwards.

#### Replace the battery

Place the battery into its slot, with the gold contacts of the battery facing the corresponding gold contacts on the side of the phone. Then lock it by pushing it downwards.



## Replace the back cover

Replace the back cover by sliding it down into its slot until it stops.



Remove the protective film covering the screen before using the phone.

# Switch on the phone

To switch on the phone, long press racktrightarrow key. Enter the PIN code if required. The PIN code is a 4- to 8-digit secret code of your SIM card. It is preconfigured and communicated to you by your network operator or retailer. For more information on PIN codes, see "Call Settings" on page 36.

If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times in succession, your SIM card will be locked. To unlock it, you must obtain the PUK code from your network operator.

# Charge the battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable battery. A new battery is partially charged and a sound alert will warn you when the battery reaches low. Once you have installed the battery, you can start charging the phone. Plug in the charger connector as shown below. Then plug the other end into a mains AC power socket.



The battery symbol indicates the state of charge. During charging, the charge indicators will scroll. It takes around 3 hours to fully charge the battery. When all the scroll bars are steady, the battery is fully charged. You can then disconnect the charger.

Depending on the network and condition of use, talk time and stand-by time can go up to 8 hours and 1 month respectively.

Keeping the charger plugged to the mobile phone when the battery is fully charged will not damage the battery. The only way to turn off the charger is to unplug it, so use an easily accessible AC power socket. You can connect the charger to an IT supply.

## Insert a micro-SD card

Your phone supports 2GB micro SD card.

- Gently slip the micro-SD card into the micro SD card slot, with the gold contacts facing upwards.
- Press the micro-SD card down until the card locks into place.



#### **Shortcuts function**

Your phone provides 10 quick access to the functions on your phone. You can modify the shortcuts according to your needs. For more information, see "Shortcuts" on page 35.

# 2. Calling

#### Make a call

#### From idle screen

- In idle mode, enter the phone number with the keypad. To correct an error, press 
  ☐ Clear.
- Press 

  to dial the number.

To make an international call, long press • to insert the international prefix "+".

#### Using the phonebook

- Press in idle mode.
- Select a contact from the list, press 

  to dial. To select a different number, press 

  Option, select View (see "Phone Book" for more information).

# IP Dial (China only)

You may select *IP dial*. When you select *IP dial* option, the mobile phone will automatically add the IP special service number preset by you in front of the phone number and then make IP dial. You can also long press to activate IP dial.

#### Answer and end a call

When there is an incoming call, the number of the caller may be displayed if the caller has chosen to display his or her identity. If the number is stored in the phonebook, the corresponding name will be displayed instead of the number.

- To reject the call: press 

   If you have activated Call Divert, the call will be diverted to another number or your voice mail.
- To hang up: press □.

The phone will not ring when it is in silent mode.

If you have selected Any Key in Customize > Answer Mode, you can answer a call by pressing any key, except  $\square$  and  $\square$ .

#### Call handsfree

For your own comfort and safety, ensure that you move the phone away from your ear when calling handsfree, especially when increasing the volume.

Press 
☐ Handsfree during a call to activate handsfree mode. To deactivate handsfree, press ☐ again to switch off handsfree mode.

# Options during a call

During a call, press options to access the following options:

- Put the call on Hold
- End the current call
- Make a New call
- Access Phone Book
- Send and Receive SMS messages
- Sound Recorder
- Mute/Unmute the call
- enabling DTMF (the touch tone dialing system)

#### Sound Recorder

In most countries, recording of telephone conversation is subject to legislation. We advise you to notify the caller if you intend to record the conversation and only do so if they agree. You should also ensure confidentiality of the recordings.

To record a conversation during a call, press  $\square$  and select Sound Recorder. Recorded sound is saved in \*.amr format and stored in Sound Recorder of Audio menu. (see "Sound Recorder" on page 56).

#### Mute or unmute a call

During a call, press 
Options and select Mute or Unmute. If you select Mute, the microphone will be deactivated.

When you switch from one call to another, muting will be cancelled.

# Adjust earpiece volume

During a call, press the volume "+" or "-" side keys to increase or decrease the volume.

# **Speed Dial**

# Speed dial via SIM phonebook

If you know the memory location number of the contact you wish to call (for example: memory location 5), you can simply long press in idle mode to to display the pre-set contact, then press to call.

# Speed dial via call logs

In idle mode, press  $\sqsubseteq$  to access *Call Logs*. Select a number you wish to call and press  $\sqsubseteq$  to dial the number.

The default setting of Speed Dial is Off. To activate this function, you need to activate it in the phone general settings menu.

# Make an emergency call

You can make an emergency call anytime, irrespective of whether the mobile phone has been registered on the network.

- In idle mode, enter the emergency call number (specific number in the caller's country).
- 2. Press □.

Note that an emergency call will not be stored in the call record.

3. Alternatively, after switching on the mobile phone and entering the PIN number, press □ SOS to go to the emergency call screen. If there is no SIM card, pressing □ SOS can also bring you to the emergency call screen, displaying the call number. Then press □ or the OK softkey to directly make an emergency call and the dial animation will be displayed.

# Handle multiple calls (Network Dependent)

You can handle two or more calls at the same time, as well as make conference calls with your phone. The availability of this feature is dependent on your network operator and/or your subscription.

#### Make a second call

You can make a second call when there is an active call or with a call on hold. While on the phone, dial the number (or select a contact from the phonebook) and press □. The first call is put on hold and the second number is dialled. You can then press □ to access the following options:

- Swap to toggle between 2 calls.
- Conference to introduce the caller into a conference call.
- End Single to disconnect one party from the call.
- End All to disconnect all party from the call.
- Phone book to access the contact list.
- SMS to send and receive messages.
- Sound Recorder to record the phone conversation.
- Mute to deactivate the microphone.
- DTMF to activate the touch tone dialing system.

#### Answer a second call

When you receive a second call while already in communication, the phone will emit a beep tone and the screen displays information about the incoming call. You can then: Press \( \simeq \) To answer the call (the first one is put on hold).

Press \(\sigma\) or \(\sigma\)

Press □ or □ To reject the call.

Press □ To access the options list. You

Options can select End to end the current call and answer the incoming call.

To receive a second call, you must first deactivate Call Divert (see "Call Divert" on page 36) and activate Call Waiting (see "Call Waiting" on page 36).

# 3. Text or number Entry

# **Input Method**

Your phone supports 7 types of input methods:
Multitap ABC/abc
T9 ABC/Abc/abc
T9 PinYin
Simplified Chinese stroke
Traditional Chinese stroke
Numeric
Symbols

You can select in the option list the appropriate input method to enter English letters, words, symbols and numbers. Icons appearing on the screen indicate the active input mode.

# **Function keys**

- Delete the characters on the left of the cursor or exit from editing mode.
- ▲/▼/4/► Move the cursor, select a letter, word or symbol from the list, or scroll down a list.
- Return to idle mode.
- Select the highlighted word from the list or enter Options menu.

- Enter symbols.
- Switch input mode.

# Multitap ABC/abc Input

- Press once on the numeric key ( ) to ) to
  enter the first letter on the key, press twice to
  enter the second letter on the key, so on and so
  forth. If the letter you wish to enter and the one
  you have just entered are on the same key, just
  wait for a few seconds for the cursor to re-appear.
- Press = to delete the characters on the left of the cursor.

# Example: how to enter the word "home":

Press  $\stackrel{\leftarrow}{=}$ ,  $\stackrel{\leftarrow}{=}$  (GH/)  $\stackrel{\longleftarrow}{=}$ ,  $\stackrel{\longleftarrow}{=}$  (MNO),  $\stackrel{\longleftarrow}{=}$  (DEF). Press  $\stackrel{\bigcirc}{\otimes}$  when the message is completed.

You can press key . to insert a space in ABC/abc Multitap input mode.

# T9<sup>®</sup> text input



T9® Predictive Text Input is an intelligent editing mode for entering text on a mobile phone. It allows you to enter text more quickly by anticipating the word you want to enter based on the

keys you have pushed. You press once on the key corresponding to each letter needed to spell a word and T9<sup>®</sup> suggests a word based on your keystrokes. If several words are available, the first word in the list is displayed and highlighted. Press ◆/▼ or □ to browse the list and press ⊚ to insert the word.

#### T9 ABC/Abc/abc Input

Smart English input method offers a faster way for you to enter English words.

- You only need to press once on the numeric key
   ( = ) corresponding to each letter needed
   to spell a word. As you enter the letters, the
   words displayed on the screen will be updated
   accordingly.
- Press = to delete the entries on the left of the cursor.

#### Examples: how to enter the word "home":

- Press , , , . The screen displays the first word of a list: Good.
- 2. Press ▼ to scroll and select Home.
- 3. Press ⊚ to confirm.

# T9 PinYin Input (China & Hong Kong only)

This is an intelligent editing mode that not only allows you to press only once on a key corresponding to each letter needed to form a character, but is also equipped with association input feature. Keystrokes are analysed and all the possible pinyin combinations will be displayed at the bottom of the screen.

#### Using T9 PinYin input method

- Enter the pinyin letters accordingly. Press once on the key corresponding to the pinyin letter without having to consider its position on the key. As you enter the letters using your keypad, the pinyin combinations on the screen will be updated accordingly.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to select your desired pinyin combination and press 

  to select the candidate line. Press or to select the character (the selected pinyin character will be highlighted) and press the 

  to enter the character. If the desired character is not on the current list, press or to check from the list.
- 3. Enter the association character: As soon as you have selected and entered a character, the candidate list will be updated and a list of association characters will be displayed. Use the navigation key to select the desired association character and press to □ confirm entry. If you do not need to enter the association character, simply press □ to exit, or enter the new pinyin letters directly.

# Simplified Chinese Stroke Input (China & Hong Kong only)

#### Using Stroke input method

- Enter the strokes: Enter the strokes of the chinese character according to its stroke sequence. When you press the keys corresponding to the required strokes, the strokes will display on the screen. The phone will display the candidate characters corresponding to the strokes you have entered. As you enter the strokes, the candidate characters on the screen will be updated accordingly.
- 2. Enter character: Use the navigation key to select the required chinese character from the candidate list. Press ≡ to input the chinese character and press ≡ to clear the strokes you have entered.
- 3. Enter associate character: As soon as you have selected and entered a character, the candidate list will be updated and a list of association characters will be displayed. Use the navigation key to select the desired association character and press to 

  confirm entry. If you do not need to enter the association character, simply press 

  to exit, or enter the new strokes directly.

The principle of stroke input is to dissect and separate every stroke of a chinese character according to sequence. When you wish to input the character, press the keys corresponding to the required strokes according to sequence to get the desired character.

The stroke input method in this phone classifies a chinese character into 5 basic strokes: (horizontal, vertical, left falling stroke, right falling stroke and over-down) as well as a special stroke. When the stroke you need does not correspond to the 5 basic strokes, replace it with the special stroke.

The examples below will give you a clearer understanding of how to use stroke input method:

5. 陈: 6- 7 + 2- | + 1- - + 6- 7 + 6- 7

Generally, you will be able to find a desired character before you finished entering all the strokes. After you have entered the name of the phonebook or SMS, press \subseteq Back to exit from the association character list and press \opin to confirm completion of text editing.

The input mode for Traditional chinese stroke and Simplified Chinese stroke are similar, with the exception of the character coding.

# **Numeric** input

- 1. Press the numeric keys ( on to on) to enter the numbers corresponding to the keys.
- 2. To delete a number, press □.

# Symbol Input

Select *Input Symbols* from the input method list or press to enter punctuation or symbols. Use the navigation keys to select the desired punctuation or symbol and press to enter it. Press to scroll down the list of punctuation or symbols.

#### 4. Phone Book



Contacts are stored in one of the two available phonebooks: SIM phonebook (located on your SIM card, by which the number of entries you can store depends on the card capacity) or the Smart Phonebook (located on your phone, which allows you to store up to 500 names). When adding new contacts, the contacts will only be added to the phonebook you have selected.

# Search for a contact in the phonebook

#### Quick Search option

- Select Phone Book in the main menu and select Quick Search or press • to access the Phone Book List.
- 2. Enter the name of the contact.

#### Search Entry option

- Enter Phone Book in the main menu and select Search Entry.

#### Phone Book List

Press • in idle mode to access phone book list and press the key that corresponds to the letter you wish to search (e.g. press • key three times to access the letter V). The first record starting with this letter in the list will be selected.

 Select Phone Book in the main menu and select Add New Entry. Select the storage location and press .

- If you select To SIM, you need to enter the Name and Number. After you have entered the name, press . Then enter the phone number and press .
- 3. If you select To Phone, the procedures will be the same as above. You can enter the contact's Name, Mobile Number, Home Number, Company Name, E-mail Address, Office Number, Fax Number and Birthday. You can also Associate Picture, Associate Sound, Associate video as well as Associate Caller Group to the contact. Press To confirm. The phone will display a notification to confirm that the contact has been saved.

For symbols such as @, /, . etc, press ....

# Copy all

You can copy all the contacts in your phone to your SIM card and vice-versa.

- Select *Phone Book* in the main menu, select *Copy All* and press
- 2. Select From SIM or From Phone, and press = 7.

When you copy telephone number entries from your mobile phone onto your SIM card, only the names and telephone numbers will be copied.

#### **Delete**

You can select *From SIM* or *From Phone* to delete all the entries in the SIM card or mobile phone phonebook respectively. You can select *One By One* to delete a telephone number.

You need to input a password before you can delete all the entries from the SIM card or phone. The default password is "1122".

# Caller Group

This option allows you to group the contacts in the phonebook for more efficient management of your contacts.

- Select Phone Book in the main menu and select Caller Group.
- Select a group and press
- Select the option for which you wish to modify its settings.

You can set the following options:

Group name Set the group name.

Ring type Set the ring tone for incoming calls

from the contacts in the caller group.

Picture Set the icon to be displayed on the screen when there is an incoming call

from the contacts in the caller group.

Video Set the video to be displayed on the

screen when there is an incoming call from the contacts in the caller group.

Member List Add or delete members of the caller

group.

# Special Number

#### My Number

The *My Number* option should contain your own phone number. If not, we recommend that you enter your own mobile phone number and other relevant information.

#### Service Number

This service is provided by your network operator. For more information regarding the corresponding function, please contact your network operator.

#### **SOS Number**

This SOS number will call the emergency services number in your country. In most cases, you can call this number even if you have not yet inserted a SIM card or entered your PIN.

Depending on your network operator, you may be able to dial the emergency number even without inserting the SIM card.

# **Settings**

#### **Memory Status**

Displays the total number of contacts you have stored in each phonebook.

#### **Preferred Storage**

Allows you to set the default phonebook in which you save your contacts.

#### **Fields**

Allows you to select the items such as Home Number, Company Name, Email Address, Office Number, Fax Number, Birthday, Associate Picture/Sound/Video and Caller Group to be displayed in the Smart Phonebook.

# My vcard

Allows you to edit or send your personal details.

#### vCard Version

Select the vCard version 2.1 or 3.0.

#### **Caller Picture**

Allows you to assign a picture from the picture folder in *File Manager* menu as the caller picture.

# **Caller Ring Tone**

Allows you to assign a ring tone saved in the mobile phone or delivered to you and saved in the *Profiles* menu as the caller ring tone.

#### Caller Video

Allows you to assign a video saved in the Video folder in File Manager menu as caller video.

# 5. Messages



# Messages

This menu allows you to send and receive text or multimedia messages, as well as manage the messages you have sent and received. In idle mode, press raphi to access the main menu. Then select <code>Messages</code> and press raphi OK to create, edit and send your messages.

# Write Message

When writing messages, you can toggle between T9 input, multitap and numeric by pressing .....

#### **SMS**

SMS enables you to send text messages to the other party, using Short Messaging Service (SMS). You can use the SMS menu to send messages to another handphone or a device that is capable of receiving SMS. To compose and send an SMS, follow the steps below:

When you send a message via the SMS network, your phone may display "Sent". This means the message has been sent to the SMS center which you have set in your SIM card. However, this does not imply that the message has been sent to its destination.

#### MMS

Your mobile phone can also send and receive MMS (Multimedia Messaging Service) messages. With MMS, you can send messages that contain pictures, sound and text.

When sending MMS messages, your recipient must also have an MMS-enabled phone in order to view your messages. Follow the steps described below to compose and send an MMS:

 Select Write Message > MMS and enter the following:

#### **General Settings**

Delivery Report When On, this option will notify you via SMS whether your recipient

When *On*, this option allows you to transmit the number of your SMS message center together with the message. The recipient can then reply using your SMS center and not theirs. This speeds up the rate of transmission. This feature is subscription dependent.

**Memory Status** 

This option can display the memory status of the messages saved in the SIM card and the phone.

**Preferred Storage Location** 

You can choose to save your messages to Phone or SIM.

#### **Preferred Bearer**

This option allows you to set the preferred transmission mode. You can select *Preferred GPRS*, *Preferred GSM* or *GSM Only*. For further details, please contact your network operator.

When you select MMS carry out the following configurations for sending or receiving MMS:

#### E-mail

If not included in your mobile phone contract, you will need to subscribe to an e-mail service in order to send and receive e-mails. In this case, all parameters are communicated to you by your operator.

This menu allows you to send e-mails to one or several recipients at a time, including with an attachment such as a JPEG picture. Once received, your messages can be forwarded and the attachments visualised with the appropriate software.

#### Create an e-mail account

Before you start using E-mail function, the phone will ask you to set Sender's e-mail address in E-mail profile. To create a new account, select E-mail > E-mail profile. Select a profile and press  $\sqsubseteq$ 7 to access the option menu. Select Edit and enter the account properties in Profile Settings, Outgoing Server, Incoming Server and Signature correctly. You can set up to three email accounts, one in each profile.

#### Send and Receive e-mail

To send an e-email, select *Options > Send*. This might bring up a message requesting airtime. Select *Yes* to continue and send the e-email. To receive new e-emails, select *Options > Receive mail*. This might bring

up a message requesting airtime. Select Yes to continue and receive new e-emails.

#### Write e-mail

To write an e-email, select *E-mail* > *Write E-mail*. Enter the address (*To*), a copy (*Cc*), Subject and Attachment (up to 3 files), and the e-mail content. When you have finished writing your e-mail, press □ to access the option menu. You can then select to *Send*, *Send and Save*, *Save to Draft* or *Quit without Saving*.

If you exit the Messaging > Write E-mail menu before sending your e-mail or if you cancel the sending while it takes place, the e-mail content is deleted without being stored.

You can only attach one file (JPEG, MID, JAR, TXT, MP3) or one sound at a time. If you accept an incoming call while writing an e-mail, the menu is closed and the phone goes back to idle mode when you hang up.

#### Inbox

This menu allows you to connect to your mailbox and download the e-mail headers (sender and subject lines) from the server. You may then select an e-mail header and press ⊕ to access the following options:

Reply without Reply to the sender without the email history. content Reply to all senders with the email Reply all history. Reply to all senders without the Reply all without email history. content **Forward** Forward the downloaded e-mail to someone else. Proceed as described in "Inbox" on page 29. Mark the e-mail to be deleted (select Delete this option again to unmark it). When you exit the E-mail menu, you will be asked to confirm deletion of the selected item(s) from the e-mail

#### Unsent

This menu allows you to list the e-email that were saved before sending or were not sent successfully. Select an e-mail from the Unsent box and press 

Options to: Edit and Delete.

#### Sent

This menu allows you to list the e-mail that were sent successfully and which you have chosen to save before sending.

Select an e-mail from the Sent box and press 

Options to: View and Delete. If you select View, the subsequent procedures would be similar to the Inbox operations.

#### Drafts

This menu allows you to list the e-mail that were created and saved but were not sent, and e-mail which were automatically saved before you were able to save or send them when you exit from the e-mail editor. Select an e-mail from the Draft box and press Deltons to: View, Edit, Delete, Delete all. If you select View, the subsequent procedures would be similar to the Inbox operations.

#### **Delete All Folders**

This menu allows you to delete all the messages in *Inbox*, *Unsent*, *Sent*, *Drafts* and all storage locations where the emails are saved.

# E-Mail Profile

This menu allows you to *Activate*, or *Edit* one of the available email profiles. Your mobile phone may have been pre-configured. To change the settings, choose an Email profile in the list and select *Edit* to access the settings decribed below.

If one of the accounts has been pre-configured, it may be locked, in which case it cannot be renamed.

#### Voice Mail

This menu allows you to set your voice mail server number, as well as retrieve your voice mails. When you receive a voice mail, your network operator will send a notification to your phone.

You can enter two sets of voice mail server numbers which are supplied by your network operator.

Select a voice mail box and press 
to access the following options:

Edit voice mail server number.

Connect to Voice Retrieve your voice mail.

You can quickly access your voice mail server by long pressing \_ key in idle mode.

#### Cell Broadcast

Broadcast messages are public messages broadcasted to a group of mobile users. The messages are broadcasted on coded channels. Generally, one broadcast channel can transmit one type of message. Please contact your network operator for a list of channel numbers and their respective broadcast information.

#### Receive Mode

This menu allows you to set the reception of broadcast messages. When *On*, you can receive broadcast messages. When *Off*, you cannot receive broadcast messages.

# Read Message

This menu allows you to read broadcast messages after you have activated receive mode.

#### Languages

This menu allows you to set the language of the broadcast messages that can be received.

#### **Channel Settings**

Press To access channel settings. You can Select, Add, Edit or Delete channels.

# 6. Call History



Your mobile phone can provide you with a list of outgoing and incoming calls, attempts at auto redialling, as well as call details. The different types of calls (Dialed Calls, Missed Calls and Received Calls) are represented by different icons. They are displayed in chronological order with the most recent call on top. If the correspondent is stored in your phonebook, the corresponding name is displayed.

# **Missed Calls**

This menu allows you to view the recent unanswered calls. You can view the date, time and the number of times you have missed in each call.

Select an item and press rightarrow to view the date, time and number. Press rightarrow Options to access the following options:

Delete Delete the number.

Save to Phone book Save the number.

Dial Dial the number.

IP Dial

If the IP number has been set, select IP Dial will automatically add the IP number before the number and dial it.

Send SMS

Send an SMS to the missed number.

Send MMS

Send an MMS to the missed number.

#### **Dialed Calls**

Fdit

This menu allows you to view the recent dialled calls, including dialling attempts or calls that were successfully connected.

Edit the missed number.

#### **Received Calls**

This menu allows you to view the recent calls received.

# **Delete Call Log**

This menu allows you to delete Missed Calls, Dialed Calls, Received Calls or Delete All.

#### **Call Time**

This menu allows you to view Last Call Time, Total Sent and Total Received (displayed in hours, minutes, seconds). You can select Reset All Time to reset all the call timers.

Depending on your network, rounding-off for billing purposes, taxes etc, the actual time invoiced for calls and services by your service provider may vary.

# Call Cost (Network dependent)

#### Last Call Cost

Displays the cost of the last call.

#### Total Cost

Displays the total cost of all calls since the cost counter was last reset. If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in the *Max Cost* option, you will not be able to make any more calls until you reset the counter.

#### Reset Cost

Allows you to reset the cost counter. You need to enter your PIN2 code and confirm.

#### Max Cost

Allows you to set the maximum cost of your calls (PIN2 code is required).

#### Price Per Unit

Allows you to set the unit price for the call cost. This unit price shall be used for calculating the cost of your calls (PIN2 code is required).

#### **SMS Counter**

Displays the number of messages that have been sent and received. You can press = to reset the counter.

#### **GPRS** Counter

Tabulates the amount of data sent and received via GPRS. You can also reset the counter. The unit of measurement is Byte.

# 7. Settings



This menu allows you to change the settings associated with each available option in your phone (time and date, security, call divert, etc.).

#### General

#### Time and Date

Allows you to set the time and date with the keypad or navigation keys. You can set the following:

Set Home City Select the city you are currently situated.

Set Time/Date Enter the time/date with the keypad or navigation keys.

Set Format Set Time Format and Date Format.

#### Auto Power On/Off

Set the time to power on or off your phone automatically. Select an item and press ractions to edit the *Status* and *On/Off* and enter the time with the keypad.

- Status: You can select Enable (Activate the setting) or Disable (Deactivate the setting).
- Disable: Select whether to power on or off your phone at the specified time.
- Time: Enter the time with the keypad.

#### Language

This menu allows you to select a language for all the menu texts. Press • or • to browse the list of languages and press  $restar{=}$  to select.

# Preferred Input Methods

This menu allows you to set the default input method.

# Display

Wallpaper

Set the background image of the main screen displayed in idle mode: Choose Default to select a predefined image or choose User Define to select a downloaded image.

Screen Saver

Select Settings to set the status and waiting time of the screen saver. Enter Select to choose Default or User Define. The operation of this function is similar to Wallpaper.

Show Date and Time

Set whether or not to display the date and time in idle mode by turning this option *On* or *Off*.

Show My Number If you have set the name and number in *Phone Book > Special Number > My Number* menu, then the name will be displayed in idle mode.

LCD Backlight This menu allows you to set the level of brightness from Level 1 to 5 and the time of the LCD Backlight from 5 to 60 seconds.

## **Greeting Text**

Turn On or Off, and edit the greeting text of the phone.

# Speed Dial

This menu allows you to quickly dial the number stored in your phonebook. You can set a maximum of 8 speed dial numbers, so that a long press on the numeric key will dial the number associated with that numeric key. You need to set Enable Speed Dial and Set Number.

# Fast keys

In idle mode, you can quickly access certain preset functions by pressing the navigation keys. This menu allows you to modify the preset functions according to your needs.

#### Shortcuts

This menu allows you to quickly enter the 10 preset menu items. You can also modify the preset menu items according to your needs.

To access the shortcuts menu, press • in idle mode. Select the shortcut item in the list and press © Options to access the following options:

Add To add a new shortcut.

Edit To edit an existing shortcut.

Delete To delete an existing shortcut.

Settings 35

Delete All To delete all the shortcuts.

Disable To disable the shortcut. You can press

this option a second time to enable the

shortcut.

Change To change the order of the shortcuts. For example, you can change the first shortcut

to become the third shortcut in the list.

# Auto Keypad Lock

This menu allows you to lock your keypad automatically. The default setting is Off.

Select the time interval after which the keypad will be locked and press restartion to confirm.

# Call Settings

#### Caller ID

Depending on your network, you may choose to show or hide your identity from your correspondent by selecting Set By Network, Hide ID or Send ID.

#### **Call Waiting**

This option allows you to *Activate* or *Deactivate* call waiting. When this option is active, you will hear a beep tone when someone tries to call you while you are already on the phone. If this option is inactive, your phone will not emit any alert and the caller will

hear a busy tone. If you have activated *Divert If Busy* option, the call will be diverted to another phone. Select *Status* to check the status of the call waiting option.

#### Call Divert

To divert incoming calls to your voice mailbox or to another phone number (regardless of whether or not the number is in your phonebook).

All Voice Calls Divert all incoming calls. If you select

this option, you will not receive any

calls until you deactivate it.

If Unreachable Divert when your phone is switched

off or out of the service area.

If No Answer Divert when you did not answer the

call.

If Busy Divert when you are already on the

phone.

All Data Calls Divert all data calls.

Cancel All Cancel all call divert options.

Select *Activate* and enter the number to forward your calls to. Select *Status* to check the status of the corresponding call divert options.

Before diverting your calls to your voice mailbox, you must enter your voice mailbox number. This feature is subscription dependent.

#### Call Barring

Allows you to limit the use of your phone to specific calls. This can be applied to Outgoing Calls (All Calls, International Calls or International Except Home) and/or to Incoming Calls (All Calls or When Roaming). In both cases, Cancel All option applies to all calls at once. Change Barring PW allows you to change the call barring password. Status allows you to check whether or not a particular type of call has been barred.

This feature is network dependent and requires a specific call barring password supplied by your service provider.

#### Call Time Reminder

This menu allows you to set whether or not the phone will emit a beep tone after a certain call duration. You can select Off (does not emit a beep tone), Single (select a value from 1 to 3000 seconds, which is the duration after which the phone will emit a beep tone) or Periodic (select a value from 30 to 60 seconds, which is the periodic time after which the phone will emit a beep tone. The phone will emit a beep tone after each periodic time during a call).

#### Call Time Display

This menu allows you to set whether or not to display the call time during a call.

#### **Auto Redial**

If the call you have dialled is not answered, your phone will automatically redial this number at intervals. Press (3) or 3 or ancel auto redial.

#### Closed User Group

This menu is a network dependent service which allows you to define a group of users within which outgoing and incoming call restrictions can be made by the network (for example only calls to numbers within the group are possible). The same group of users is then permitted to communicate with each other but not with users outside the group. Select Closed User Group and press  $\square$  Add, then you can press  $\square$  Options to Edit, Add, Activate, Deactivate, Delete the user group.

#### IP Number

This menu allows you to store 3 groups of IP number so that you need not enter the number before you make an IP call. Press 
Option to Activate or Edit the IP Number.

The IP number has to be supported by your network operator before you can make an IP call. When you change a new SIM card, the IP number you have stored will be cleared. The phone does not validate the IP number you have entered. Therefore, please ensure that the numbers are correct.

#### Black list

This menu displays the list of contacts whose calls will be rejected. You can select to set the *Status*. To add the corresponding number to the list, select and enter the *Black List Number* then confirm by saving it.

You cannot add a name to the blacklist directly from the Phonebook, the Calls list and the SMS Inbox.

# **Security Settings**

#### SIM Lock

This menu allows you to set the PIN code On or Off. The default setting is Off. If set to On, you have to enter your PIN code when switching your phone on. If the enter the wrong PIN code, you will not be able to use most of the features in this phone. Press  $\odot$  to activate. Make sure that you have entered the correct PIN code before you can enable this feature.

#### Phone Lock

This menu allows you to set a password for your phone. The default setting is *Off.* Once you have set Phone Lock, you must enter the password each time you switch on your phone.

Enter the password and press . If Phone Lock is currently Off, the status will change to On and vice-versa.

The default phone lock code is 1122.

#### Fixed Dial

This menu allows you to restrict your outgoing calls. You need to enter PIN2 code, which has to be supplied / supported by your network operator.

Mode There are two modes: On (you only dial the numbers stored in the Fixed Dial List) and Off (you can dial any number).

Fixed Dial Displays the fixed dial list. Press 
Add, List enter the name and phone number, then press 
new, enter PIN2 code and press 
new.

Not all SIM cards support PIN2 code. If your SIM card does not have a PIN2 code, this option is not available.

#### **Barred Dial**

This menu allows you to restrict different types of outgoing calls. You can activate or deactivate this feature if your SIM card supports it.

#### **Change Password**

This menu allows you to change the PIN code, PIN2 code and Phone Lock Password.

#### PIN

It is supplied together with the SIM card. The default PIN code is supplied by your network operator.

If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times in succession, the PIN code of your SIM card will be locked automatically and you will be prompted to enter the PUK code to unlock it. You can obtain the PUK code from your network operator. If you enter an incorrect PUK code ten times in succession, the SIM card will be locked permanently. When this happens, please contact your network operator or retailer.

#### PIN<sub>2</sub>

It is used to access certain network functions such as call charges or fixed dial, etc. If you enter an incorrect PIN2 code three times in succession, the PIN2 code of your SIM card will be locked. To unlock PIN2 code, you need to obtain the PUK2 code from your network operator. If you enter an incorrect PUK2

code ten times in succession, the SIM card will be locked permanently. When this happens, contact your network operator or retailer.

#### **Sound Effects**

#### Equalizer

This menu allows you to set the audio frequency when playing music.

#### 3D Surround

This feature allows you to activate the left and right two-way speakers to produce 3D surround effects. You can press • or • to select a sound effect.

# **Restore Factory Settings**

This menu allows you to reset some settings in your phone to its factory settings.

Once you have entered the correct password (same as your Phone Lock Password, default value is 1122), your phone will be restored to its factory settings.

## 8. Multimedia



Your phone features a built-in digital camera. You can take pictures, store them in your phone or transfer them to your PC via a data cable, use them as wallpaper or send them to your friends via MMS.

In areas where you are requested to turn off radio transmitting devices, such as quarries or other areas where blasting operations are in progress.



Check with the vehicle in your vehicle electronic equipment used in your vehicle Check with the vehicle manufacturer that will not be affected by radio energy.

#### **Pacemakers**

If you have a pacemaker:

- Always keep the phone more than 15 cm from your pacemaker when the phone is switched on, in order to avoid potential interference.

- Use the ear opposite to the pacemaker to minimise the potential interference.

• Switch off your phone if you suspect that interference is taking place.

# Hearing aids

# Improved performance

In order to improve the performance of your phone, reduce radio energy emission, reduce battery consumption and ensure safe operation adhere to the following guidelines:



For the optimal and satisfactory operation of the phone you are recommended to use the phone in the normal operating position (when not using in hands-free mode or with a hands-free accessory).

- Do not expose your phone to extreme temperatures.

- Do not immerse the phone in any liquid; if your phone is damp, switch it off, remove the battery and let them dry for 24hrs before using them again.
- To clean the phone, wipe it with a soft cloth.

 Placing and receiving calls consumes the same amount of battery energy. However, the mobile consumes less energy in idle screen when kept in the same place. When in idle screen and while you are moving, your phone consumes energy to transmit updated location information to the network. Setting the backlight for a shorter period of time as well as avoiding unnecessary navigating in the menus will also help to save the battery's energy for longer phoning and stand-by performances.

# **Battery information**

# **Troubleshooting**

#### The phone does not switch on

Remove/reinstall the battery. Then charge the phone until the battery icon stops scrolling. Unplug the charger and try to switch on the phone.

#### Your phone doesn't return to idle screen

Long press the hangup key or switch off the phone, check that the SIM card and the battery are installed correctly and switch it on again.

#### The network symbol is not displayed

The network connection is lost. Either you are in a radio shadow (in a tunnel or between tall buildings) or you are outside the network coverage area. Try from another place, try to reconnect to the network (especially when abroad), check that the antenna is in place if your mobile phone has an external antenna, or contact your network operator for assistance/information.

# The display doesn't respond (or the display responds slowly) to key presses

The display responds more slowly at very low temperatures. This is normal and does not affect the operation of the phone. Take the phone to a warmer place and try again. In other cases, please contact your phone supplier.

#### Your battery seems to over heat

You might be using a charger that was not intended for your phone. Make sure you always use the Philips authentic accessory shipped with your phone.

# Specific Absorption Rate Information International standards

THIS MOBILE PHONE MEETS THE INTERNATIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS FOR EXPOSURE TO RADIO WAVES

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy defined by the international standards. These recommendations have been established by the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection (ICNIRP) and, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) that forecast a substantial safety margin for assuring the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the international protection standards for exposure to radio waves.

The highest SAR value for this Philips Xenium 9@9u model phone when tested for compliance against the standard was 0,277 W/kg for ICNIRP recommendation and 0,925 W/kg for IEEE Std 1528.

For limiting the radio waves exposure, it is recommended to reduce the mobile phone call duration or to use a headset. The purpose of those precautions is to take the mobile phone away from the head and the body.

For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used whit an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

# Limited warranty
