





First steps to operating your phone

#### USIM/SIM card information

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you receive a plug-in SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN and available optional services. For 3G services, you can purchase an USIM (Universal Subscriber Identity Module) card.





You can access a number of functions during a call.

### Adjusting the volume during a call

Use [ $\blacktriangle/\blacktriangledown$ ] to adjust the earpiece volume during a call.

Press [▲] to increase the volume level and [▼] to decrease the volume level.

### Placing a call on hold/Retrieving

Press < Hold > to place a call on hold, or press < Retrieve > to retrieve the call on hold.

### Making a second call

You can make another call if your network supports this function.

- 1. Press < Hold > to put the call on hold.
- 2. Make the second call in the normal way.
- 3. Press < Swap > to switch between the calls.
- Press < Options > and select End call to end the call on hold.
- 5. To end the current call, press [ ].

### Answering a second call

You can answer an incoming call while already on the phone, if your network supports this function and you have activated the call waiting feature.

### Using the speakerphone feature

Use your phone as a speaker phone to talk and listen with the phone a short distance away.

Press [Centre] and then <**Yes**> to activate the speakerphone feature. Press [Centre] again to switch back to the earpiece.

### **Using In-call options**

Press **Options** to access the following options during a call:

- Speaker on/Normal: turn on the speakerphone feature or switch back to Normal mode.
- Switch to headset/Switch to phone: switch the call to a Bluetooth headset or hands-free car kit or back to the phone. ▶ p. 71
- Conference call: set up a multi-party call by adding a caller on hold to a currently active call.
   You can include up to 5 people on a multi-party call.
- Private call: have a private conversation with one multi-party call participant. The other participants can converse with each other. After the private conversation, select Conference call to return both all private participants to the multi-party call.
- Swap: switch between calls, if a call is on hold.
- Transfer: transfer the currently active call to a caller on hold. The two callers can talk to each other, but you are disconnected from the call.

- Hold/Retrieve: place a call on hold or retrieve the call.
- Mute: access the following muting options:
   Voice: switch off the phone's microphone so

**Voice**: switch off the phone's microphone so that the other person on the phone cannot hear you, or switch it back on.

**Keypad tones**: turn the key tones off or on.



To communicate with answering machines or computerised telephone systems, **Keypad tones** must be selected.

- New call: make a new voice call.
- Create message: create a new SMS message.
- Contacts: locate or store contacts in Contacts.
- Add to Contacts: add the sender's number to Contacts
- View contact details: access the contact information, if the caller is saved in Contacts.
- Send DTMF: send DTMF (Dual tone multifrequency) tones as a group. The DTMF tones are the tones used in phones for tone dialling, sounding when you press the number keys. This option is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.
- Memo: create a memo.
- End call/End: disconnect the call currently on hold, active call, or all calls.

### Using the video call feature

In a 3G (UMTS) service area, your phone can make or receive a video call, allowing you to see another person on the screen during a conversation. The other person's phone must support the video call feature

### Making a video call

- In Idle mode, enter the area code and phone number.

### Answering a video call

When you receive a video call, answer a video call as receiving a voice call. When a "Allow own image to be shown?" message appears, select **Yes** to allow the caller to see you via the camera.

- Create text message: create a new text message.
- Send DTMF: send Dual tone multi-frequency (DTMF) tones as a group after entering the entire number you need to send or retrieving a number from Contacts.
- Memo: create a memo.
- Details: display the currently dialled number details, if saved in Contacts.

# Messaging (Menu 5)

Use the **Messaging** menu to send and receive short text messages, multimedia messages, and e-mails. You can also use Configuration message, Push message, Voicemail, Cell broadcast message, and postcard features.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Messaging.

#### Create message (Menu 5.1)

Use this menu to create and send text messages, multimedia messages, or e-mails. You can also send voice memos with a message.

## Message (Menu 5.1.1)

You can create and send text messages and multimedia messages.

If you add data or subject to a text message while composing, the phone will automatically send the message via MMS.

## Creating and sending an SMS message

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send or receive text messages.



The maximum number of characters allowed in a short message varies by Operator. If your message exceeds the maximum number of characters, the phone will split the message.

- Sending options: change the message sending settings. ▶ p. 53

- Save as template: save the message in the MMS templates box.

#### Voice message (Menu 5.1.2)

You can send a message after recording a voice memo.

- 3. Move to the message field.
- 4. Enter the message text.
- Create the message as you would create an MMS message.

#### live! Postcard (Menu 5.1.3)

Using this Vodafone service, you can send a photo as an actual postcard along with a simple greeting.

- 4. Select an attached file to view or play it.

### Using e-mail options

- Retrieve: retrieve the body of the e-mail from the e-mail server.
- Go to URL: connect to the URL in the message.
- Create message: send an SMS or MMS message to the selected number.
- Create email: send an e-mail to the highlighted e-mail address.
- Add to: add the highlighted web link to Bookmark list or save the selected number to Contacts.
- Add to Bookmarks: add the highlighted web link to Bookmark list.
- Add to Contacts: save the selected number or e-mail address to Contacts.

- · Reply: send a reply to the sender.
- Reply to all: reply to the sender and all of other recipients.
- Forward: forward the e-mail to other people.
- Delete: delete the selected e-mail from the phone's memory or from both the phone's memory and the e-mail server.
- · View/Play: view or play an attached file.
- Activate key: get a new license key when the key for the selected DRM file expires.
- Reactivate key: get another license key even when the key for the selected DRM file has not expired.
- Register to Contacts: save the selected number or e-mail address to Contacts.
- Register to Calendar: save the selected item to Calendar.
- Register to Bookmark: add the selected link to Bookmark list.
- Register to Memo: save the selected item to Memo.
- Save items: save media content from the e-mail to the phone's memory.
- Block by: add the sender's e-mail address or the e-mail subject to the blocking list.
- Print via Bluetooth: print the e-mail via a Bluetooth-compatible printer. Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.
- · Details: access the e-mail properties.

#### Drafts (Menu 5.4)

This folder stores messages you have saved to send them at a later time.

From the message list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the selected message.
- · Send: send the selected message.
- Delete: delete the selected message or all messages.
- Sort by: change the sort order of the message list.
- Details: access the message properties.

## Outbox (Menu 5.5)

This folder stores messages the phone is attempting to send or has failed to send.

The following icons on the message icons are available to show the message status:

- Being sent
- X Failed to be sent

From the message list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Cancel sending: cancel sending the message, if the message is being sent.
- Edit: edit the selected message.
- Send again: resend the message.

- Delete: delete the selected message or all messages.
- Sort by: change the sort order of the message list.
- Details: access the message properties.

# Sent message (Menu 5.6)

This folder stores messages that you have sent.

From the message list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- · View: open the selected message.
- Forward: forward the message to other people.
- Delete: delete the selected message or all messages.
- Move to phone/Move to SIM: move the message between the phone's memory and the USIM/SIM card.
- Sort by: change the sort order of the message list.

### Templates (Menu 5.7)

Use this menu to make and use templates of frequently used messages or passages.

#### MMS templates (Menu 5.7.1)

You can access embedded MMS templates or ones you have saved so that you can use them in composing an MMS message.

#### Creating a template

- 1. Press < Options > and select Add new.
- Create a template as you would create an MMS message. ▶ p. 44
- 3. Move up to the subject field and enter the subject for the template.
- 4. When you have finished, press < Options > and select Save as template.

## Using template options

From the MMS template list, press < Options > to access the following options:

- View: open the selected template.
- Edit and send: edit and send the template via MMS.
- Add new: add a new template.
- Delete: delete the selected template or all templates, except for the embedded ones.

## Text templates (Menu 5.7.2)

You can create SMS templates with the sentences you use frequently so that you can retrieve and insert them when composing an SMS message.

#### live! Studio (Menu 5.10)

You can access your live! Studio web page and upload media files (such as images, video clips, sound files, and music files) and multimedia messages to safe storage on the web. Register on the Vodafone website or contact customer service to receive your free live! Studio.



- This menu may not be available, depending on the country.
  - · live! Studio may be labelled differently in some countries.

## Delete by folder (Menu 5.11)

Use this menu to delete all of the messages in each message folder one by one. You can also delete all of the messages in all folders at one time.

- 2. Press < Delete > and then < Yes > to confirm the deletion.

#### Settings (Menu 5.12)

Use this menu to set up various options for using messaging service.

Multimedia message (Menu 5.12.1)

You can configure the MMS settings.

Sending options: set up the options for sending MMS messages:

**Priority**: set the priority level of messages.

Validity period: set the length of time your messages are stored in the MMS server.

Delivery time: set a time delay before messages are sent.

Hide address: set your address to be hidden from the recipient's phone.

Request delivery report: set the network to inform you when your messages have been delivered.

Request read report: send a read-reply request along with your messages.

Keep a copy: leave copies of your messages in the **Sent message** folder after sending.

Receiving options: set up the options for receiving MMS messages:

Home network: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are in your home service area.

Roaming network: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are roaming in another network.

Reception within your home network or while roaming has the following options:

- Auto download: the phone automatically retrieves messages from the server.
- Manual: the phone receives notifications first from the server. Use the Retrieve option to manually retrieve new messages.

- Restricted: the phone receives notifications first from the server. When you attempt to download new messages, the phone informs you of additional charges.
- Reject: the phone rejects all messages.

**Send delivery report**: set the network to inform the sender when a message has been delivered to you.

**Reject anonymous**: reject messages from unknown senders.

Reject advertisement: reject advertisements.

- MMS profiles: select a connection profile to be used for MMS. You can also create or edit a profile. ▶ p. 89
- Message size: select the maximum file size of MMS attachment. This file size may vary, depending on the country.
- Creation mode: select MMS creation mode: Warning: the phone informs you when you create and send a message using unsupported file formats.

**Free**: you can create and send messages adding unsupported file formats.

**Restricted**: you are not able to create and send messages using unsupported file formats.

 Default style: customise the default settings for displaying a received MMS message on your phone:

Font colour: select a font colour. Font style: select a font style.

Background colour: select a background

colour.

**Page duration**: select a length of time the display shows one page in a message.

Text message (Menu 5.12.2)

You can configure the SMS settings.

 Sending options: set up the options for sending SMS messages:

**Network selection**: select **CS** (GSM) or **PS** (GPRS), depending on your network.

Character support: select a character encoding type. If you select Automatic, the phone switches the encoding type from GSM alphabet to Unicode if you enter a unicode character. Use of unicode encoding will reduce the maximum number of characters in a message to about half. If this menu is not shown, your phone provides the automatic encoding by default.

**Reply path**: allow recipients to reply to you through your SMS server.

**Request delivery report**: set the network to inform you when your message have been delivered.

**Keep a copy**: leave the copies of your messages in the Sent message folder after sending.

SMS centre settings: select a profile to be used for SMS or set up the SMS server. Press <Options> and select Edit to access the following properties:

Centre address: store or change the number of your message server.

Validity period: set the length of time your messages are stored in the SMS server.

**Default type:** set the default message type. The network can convert messages into the selected format.

Name: enter a profile name.

**E-mail** (Menu 5.12.3)

You can configure the e-mail settings.



You cannot change e-mail profile and account settings while an e-mail is being sent or retrieved.

**Sending options**: set up the options for sending e-mails:

From: enter a sender name.

**Sending account**: select the default account.

Priority: change the priority level of your e-mails.

Request delivery report: set the network to inform you when your e-mail has been delivered.

Request read report: request a report from each recipient as to when your e-mail was read by the recipient.

Include body when replying: set whether or not the phone includes the original e-mail text in a reply.

Keep in server: leave copies of e-mails in the server.

Add signature: allow your signature to be inserted to e-mails.

Add my contact details: allow your contact information to be attached to e-mails.

**Receiving options**: set up the options for receiving e-mails:

Home network: determine if your phone retrieves new e-mails automatically when you are in your home service area.

Roaming network: determine if your phone retrieves new e-mails automatically when you are roaming in another network.

Reception within your home network or while roaming has the following options:

- Auto download: the phone automatically retrieves e-mails from the server.
- Manual: the phone receives notifications first from the server. Use the Retrieve option to manually retrieve new e-mails.

Set download limit: determine the maximum size for incoming e-mails. Your phone will reject e-mails that exceed the specified size.

Send read report: determine whether or not the phone sends a read-report to a sender.

**Block address**: specify e-mail addresses to reject e-mails from those addresses, and activate or deactivate mail blocking.

**Block subject**: reject e-mails which contain subjects you specify, and activate or deactivate mail blocking.

- Email profiles: select a network connection profile to be used for sending and receiving e-mails. You can also create or edit a profile.

- Email accounts: select an account to be used and set up e-mail accounts. Press <Options> and select Edit to access the following options:

**Account name**: enter a name for the currently selected account.

**SMTP server**: enter the IP address or domain name of the outgoing e-mail server.

SMTP port: enter the SMTP port number.

**Use SSL**: use the SSL (Secure Sockets Layer) protocol for accessing the SMTP server.

**Retrieving server type**: select the protocol for the incoming e-mail server. The remaining options depend on the protocol type setting.

**POP3 server/IMAP4 server**: enter the IP address or domain name of the POP3 or IMAP4 server.

**POP3 port/IMAP4 port**: enter the POP or IMAP4 port number.

**Use SSL**: use the SSL (Secure Sockets Layer) protocol for accessing the POP3 or IMAP4 server.

**Keep in server**: leave copies of e-mails in the server after retrieving.

**IMAP4 retrieval option**: set whether the phone retrieves only new messages or all messages.

My address: enter your e-mail address.

**User name**: enter the user name for POP3 or IMAP4 server connection.

**Password**: enter the password for POP3 or IMAP4 server connection.

#### Push message (Menu 5.12.4)

You can change the settings for receiving push messages from the wireless web server.

- Receiving option: set whether or not to receive push messages from the web server.
- Service loading: set whether or not your phone automatically launches the web brower to access a push message as it comes in.

#### Broadcast message (Menu 5.12.5)

Use this menu to change the settings for the broadcast message service.

- Receiving options: enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.
- Channel list: indicate the channels from which you wish to receive CB messages. To add a new channel, remove the check mark from All channels. Press <Options> and select Add channel and set the channel ID information and title.

Please contact your service provider for further details.

 Language: select the languages in which broadcast messages display.

#### Vodafone messenger (Menu 5.12.6)

Use this menu to set up options for using the Vodafone messenger service.

- Current Status: set the current status that will be shown on messenger.
- My Details: enter the following user information:
- · My Screen Name: enter the user name.
- First name: enter the first name.
- Last name: enter the last name.
- Notification: set whether the phone informs you when other people add you to their contact lists.
- Auto login: set whether you are automatically logged in to the service when you turn on messenger.
- Auto Logout: set the length of time when you are automatically logged out after nonuse of messenger.
- Watching Users: allows you to view the current status of the users assigned to your contact list, or vice versa.
- Blocked list: add contacts from which you want to reject messages.

- Server settings: set up the profile options for connecting the messenger service.
- Access point: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network gateway.
- · Messenger ID: enter the messenger user ID.
- Password: enter the password.
- Server Url: enter the URL address of the server.

#### Voice mail number (Menu 5.12.7)

Use this menu to set the number of your voicemail server.



You must store the voicemail server number before accessing the server. Your service provider can give you the number.

## Memory status (Menu 5.13)

Use this menu to view the memory status for MMS, SMS, e-mail, and push messages.

You can also access a message box by selecting it from this menu.

# My files (Menu 6)

The **My files** menu allows you to access images, videos, ringtones, sounds, and other files stored in the phone's memory or on a memory card.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select My files.

## **Tips for Digital Rights Management**

As a result of the DRM (Digital Rights Management) system, some of the media items you download from the Internet or receive by MMS may require a license key to access them. You can acquire the key from the website which owns the rights to the content; use the **Activate key** option.

Note the following icons on the list:

- A: Forwardable item with a valid key.
- X: Forwardable item without a valid key.
- — : Unforwardable item with a valid key.
- \( \mathbb{F} \): Unforwardable item without a valid key.

Your phone supports only count-based or unlimited access DRM files.

# Switching between the phone's memory and a memory card

You can access data stored on a memory card, if a memory card is inserted.

From the My files screen, scroll to the **On card** tab by pressing [Left] or [Right].

Select the folder you want and open files.

#### **Pictures**

Use this menu to access photos you have taken and images you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

## Viewing an image

Select an image. The selected image displays.

#### Viewing a slide show

You can view your images as a slide show, a sequential presentation of each image in the current folder.

- While viewing a file, press < Options > and select Slide show. The slide show begins.
- 2. Press < Back > to stop the slide show.

## Editing an image

- 1. Select an image.
- 2. Press < Options > and select Edit.
- Press < Options> and change the photo using the following options:
  - Effects: change the colour tone or apply a special effect.
  - Partial effects: access the following advanced editing options:

**Partial blur**: adjust the clarity of the image selected by a square box.

**Redeye repair**: remove the occurrence of red-eye on the image.

- Adjust: adjust the image brightness, contrast, or colour balance.
- Transform: change the image size or image orientation.

- Crop: select a variously sized and shaped section of the image.
- Insert: apply a decorative frame, or add an image clip, emoticon, or text.
- 4. When you have finished, press < Done >.
- Press < Options > and select Save as.
- 6. If a memory card is inserted, select a memory location to store the image.
- 7. Enter a name for the image and press < Save >.

#### Using image options

While viewing a file, press < Options > to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the image and save it as a different file.
- **Send**: send the selected file via MMS, postcard. e-mail, or Bluetooth. You can also send the file to the online media album, if provided.
- **Set as**: set the image as your wallpaper for the display, or a caller ID image for a Contacts entry.

## Vodafone (Menu 7.1)

This is available if you use a SIM card that supports SIM Application Toolkit menus and provides additional services, such as news, weather, sports, and location services. Available services may vary, depending on Vodafone's plans.

For further details, see your USIM/SIM card instructions or contact Vodafone.

#### Alarms (Menu 7.2)

Use this menu to set alarms to ring at specific times.

#### Setting an alarm

1. Select the type of alarm.

- 2. Specify the following alarm settings:
  - Name: (for a normal alarm) enter a name for the alarm.
  - Alarm activation: activate the alarm.
  - · Alarm time: enter the alarm time.
  - Alarm type: select an alert type for the alarm.
  - · Alert tone: select an alarm tone.
  - Alarm volume: select the volume for the alarm melody.
  - Alarm days: (for a normal alarm) select the days for the alarm.
  - Snooze: set the snooze interval you want.
- Press < Options > and select Save to save the alarm.

## Stopping an alarm

Press any key to stop the alarm.

If the snooze feature is set for alarms, press any key, except for **<OK>** and [Centre], to cause it to sound again after the specified interval. You can do this a maximum of 5 times.

## Deactivating an alarm

- 1. Select the alarm you want to deactivate.
- 2. Select Off on the Alarm activation line.
- 3. Press [Centre].

# Setting the alarm to sound even if the phone is off

From the Alarm screen, select **Auto power**  $\rightarrow$  **On**.

If the phone is off when it is time for the alarm to sound, the phone is switched on and sounds the alarm.

  - By day: select a specific day of the month for an item to recur.
  - Except weekends: select to set the alarm to sound except for weekends.
  - **Expiry**: set when the item will be removed from the calendar.
- Press < Options > and select Save to save the item.

## **Entering an anniversary**

- Select a date on the calendar.
- Press < Options > and select Create → Anniversary.

- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - Occasion: enter information about the anniversary.
  - · Date: enter the date.
  - Alarm: select to set an alarm for the anniversary.

## Bluetooth (Menu 7.5)

Using Bluetooth wireless, you can connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices and exchange data with them, talk hands-free, or control the phone remotely.

Bluetooth technology allows free wireless connections between all Bluetooth-compliant devices within a range of 10 metres. Since the devices communicate using radio waves, they do not need to be in line of sight to each other.



- If there are obstacles between the devices, the maximum operation distance may be reduced.
- It is recommended that you do not use the Bluetooth feature while using multimedia features such as voice recorder, camera, and media player, or vice versa, for better performance.
- Some devices may not be compatible with your phone.

# Setting up the Bluetooth feature

The **Bluetooth** menu provides the following options:

- Activation: activate or deactivate the Bluetooth feature.
- My devices: search for connectable Bluetooth devices.
- My phone's visibility: allow other Bluetooth devices to locate your phone, or not.
- My phone's name: assign a Bluetooth device name to your phone, which is then displayed on other devices.
- Secure mode: determine if the phone asks for your confirmation when other devices access your data.

Bluetooth service: display available Bluetooth services.

# Searching for and pairing with a Bluetooth device

- From the Bluetooth setting options, select My devices.
- Select Search new device.

After searching, a list of devices to which you can connect displays. The following icons indicate the type of devices:

- Mobile phone
- PDA
- ® Computer
- Printer
- Headset or hands-free car kit
- Unknown device

- 3. Select a device.
- Enter a Bluetooth PIN and press < OK>. This PIN
  is used just once and you do not need to memorise
  it.

When the owner of the other device enters the same code, pairing is finished.

Some devices, especially headsets or hands-free car kits, may have a fixed Bluetooth PIN, such as **0000**. If the other device has one, you must enter the code.

# Using device options

- Connect: connect to a headset or hands-free car kit.
- Disconnect: end the connection with the device.
- Browse device: search for data from the selected device and import data directly to your phone.

- 3. Enter the second number.
- 4. Press [Centre] to view the result.
- If necessary, repeat from step 2 to continue the calculation.



You can access the Converter feature by pressing < Converter >

Use this menu for common conversions, such as currency and temperature.

# Performing a calculation

- Set as: set the voice memo as your ringtone for a voice call or video call, or as a ringtone for a Contacts entry.
- · Delete: delete the voice memo.
- Rename: change the name of the voice memo.
- Bluetooth visibility: share the file with other Bluetooth devices.
- Lock/Unlock: lock the voice memo to protect it from being deleted, or unlock the voice memo.

- Details: access the properties of the voice memo.
- Record settings: change the default settings for recording voice memos:

**Default name**: change the default prefix for voice memos.

**Recording time**: select a maximum recording time.

#### World clock (Menu 7.\*)

Use this menu to set your local time zone and find out the current time in another part of the world.

## Setting the local time zone

- From the world map, press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want on the upper line (<sup>®</sup><sub>1</sub>). As the time line moves, the time and date of the given zone display.
- Press [Centre] to save the city as your local time zone.

# Viewing world time

- From the world map, move to the lower line (<sup>®</sup><sub>2</sub>).
- Press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want.
- 3. Press [Centre] to save the time zone.

### Applying daylight savings time

 From the world map, press < Options > and select Daylight saving.

- Press [Centre] to select the time zone you want and then < Done >.
- 3. Press < Options > and select Save.

## Memory status (Menu 7.#)

Use this menu to access memory information for the items stored on the calendar, as well as for tasks and memos.

## Contacts (Menu 8)

You can store phone numbers on your USIM/SIM card and in your phone's memory. The USIM/SIM card and phone's memory are physically separate, but they are used as a single entity called Contacts. You can also manage your contact entries.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Contacts.

# Storing a new contact

You can add a new contact to Contacts.

# Storing a contact in the phone's memory

- 1. Scroll to the Contacts tab.
- Press < Options > and select Create contact → Phone.
- 3. Change the settings or enter information about the contact.
  - First name/Last name: assign a name.
  - · Display name: assign a display name.

- Mobile private: add a phone number.
- Landline private: enter a fixed phone number.
- Email: assign an e-mail address.
- **Group**: assign a caller group.
- Caller ID: assign a caller ID image.
- Ringtone: assign a ringtone to alert you to a call from the person.
- Note: enter the additional note of the person.
- 4. If necessary, press < Options > to access the following options:
  - Change type: change the selected number type.
  - Add more fields: add an additional category to the contact.
  - Delete field: remove the selected category from the contact.
- Press < Options> and select Save to save the contact.

# Storing a contact on the USIM/SIM card

- 1. Scroll to the Contacts tab.
- Press < Options > and select Create contact → SIM.
- 3. Change the settings or enter information about the contact.
  - · Name: assign a name.
  - Phone number: enter a phone number.
  - Group: (for USIM) assign a caller group.

- Location number: assign a location number.
- If you are using a USIM card, press < Options > to add additional information:
  - Add more fields: add an additional category to the contact.
  - Delete field: remove the selected category from the contact.
- Press < Options > and select Save to save the contact.

## Adding a contact to the FDN list

You can create a list of contacts to be used in FDN (Fixed Dialling Number) mode, in which the phone allows outgoing calls only to the specified phone numbers, if your USIM/SIM card supports this feature.

- Scroll to the FDN tab, or press < Options > and select FDN contacts.
- Press < Options > and select Create FDN contact.
- 3. Change the settings or enter information about the contact:
  - Name: assign a name.
  - Phone number: enter a phone number.
  - Location number: assign a location number.
- Press < Options > and select Save to to save the contact

### Finding a contact

You can search for numbers in Contacts.

- 1. Scroll to the Contacts tab.
- 2. Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find.
- 3. Select the contact you want from the Contacts list.
- Scroll to a number and press [ ] to dial or [Centre] and select Edit to edit the contact details.

# Using contact options

While viewing the contact list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- · View: access contact information.
- Create FDN contact: add a new FDN contact.
- Create contact: add a new contact in Contacts.
- · Voice call: make a voice call.
- Video call: make a video call.
- Create message: send an SMS, MMS, or e-mail.
- · Edit: edit contact information.
- Synchronise: synchronise Contacts with the web server you have specified. ▶ p. 78
- **Duplicate**: make a copy of the contact.
- Delete: delete the contact or all contacts.
- Save to My files: save the contact as a name card format in the Other documents folder.

- Send contact details: send the contact details via MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- My contact details: access your name card.
- Assign speed dial: assign a speed dial number.
  If the selected contact has more than one phone
  number, the speed dial number is assigned to the
  first saved number by default.
- Copy to phone/Copy to SIM: copy the selected contact or all contacts to the phone's memory or the USIM/SIM card.
- Move to phone/Move to SIM: move the selected contact or all contacts to the phone's memory or the USIM/SIM card.
- Service number: display the list of Service
  Dialling Numbers (SDN) assigned by Vodafone,
  including emergency numbers, directory
  enquiries, and voicemail server number. This
  option is available only when supported by your
  USIM/SIM card.
- FDN contacts: display the FDN contact list.
- Copy to FDN contacts: copy the selected contact to the FDN contact list.
- Print via Bluetooth: print contact information via a Bluetooth-compatible printer. Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.
- Settings: change the default settings for Contacts. ▶ p. 87
- Memory status: check the number of contacts you have stored in the phone's memory and on the USIM/SIM card.

# Organising contacts in a group

You can organise your contacts in caller groups.

# Creating a caller group

- Scroll to the Groups tab.
- 2. Press < Options > and select Create group.
- 3. Enter a name for the group and press < Save >.

# Adding members to a caller group

- Select a group.
- 2. Press < Options > and select Add member.
- Press [Centre] to select the contacts you want and then <Add>.

# Managing caller groups

While viewing the group list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- View: display the members of the selected group.
- Create group: add a new group.
- Create message: send an SMS or MMS message, or e-mail.
- Delete: delete the selected group. Group members, however, will not be deleted from Contacts.
- Rename: change the group name.
- Group settings: assign an image and ringtone to the selected group in the phone's memory.

# Synchronising contacts

You can synchronise your Contacts with the web server you have specified. First, you need to set up the profile to be used for synchronisation.

# Creating a synchronisation profile

- From the Contacts list, press < Options > and select Synchronise.
- 2. Press < Add >.
- 3. Specify profile parameters:
  - Profile name: enter a name for the profile.
  - Sync category: select the applications you want to synchronise with the server.
  - Sync type: select a synchronisation type.
  - **Sync server**: enter the web server address, or login ID and password.
  - Network profile: select a connection profile to be used for connecting to the web server.
     You can also create or edit a profile.

    p. 89
- 4. Press < Save > to save the profile.

# Starting synchronisation

- From the Contacts list, press < Options > and select Synchronise.
- 2. Press < Options > and select Start sync.
- Press < Continue > to start synchronisation with the web server you have specified.

#### Using synchronisation options

From the PIM sync screen, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Start sync: start a synchronisation for the selected profile.
- **View result**: show the result of the last synchronisation.
- New sync profile: add a new profile.
- Edit sync profile: change the properties of the profile.
- Delete: delete the selected profile or all profiles.

# Calls (Menu 9)

Use this menu to view the calls you have dialled, received, or missed, and the length of the calls. You can also check the cost of your calls, if your USIM/SIM card supports this function.

To access this menu, press < Menu > in Idle mode and select Calls

### Recent contacts (Menu 9.1)

This menu displays the most recent calls dialled, received, or missed.

### Accessing a call log

 Press [Left] or [Right] to move to another call type.

- Press [Up] or [Down] to scroll through the call list.
- 3. Press [Centre] to view the details of a call, or [ > ] to dial a number.

#### Using call log options

From the call list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- View: access the call details.
- Voice call: make a voice call to the number.
- Video call: make a video call to the number, if the 3G service is available.
- Copy to dialling screen: past the selected number to the normal dialling screen.
- Add to Contacts: save the selected number in Contacts.
- Create message: send an SMS or MMS message, or e-mail.
  - **Delete**: delete the selected call record or all records
- Add to reject list: add the selected number to the list of phone numbers from which calls are rejected.
- View contact details: access contact information, if the caller is saved in Contacts.
- Call manager: check the total amount of data you have sent or received, and the length of calls. You can also check the cost of calls, if supported by your USIM/SIM card.

#### Dialled calls (Menu 9.2)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have dialled.

### Missed calls (Menu 9.3)

This menu displays the most recent calls you did not answer.

# Received calls (Menu 9.4)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have received.

#### Call timers (Menu 9.5)

You can access the call time log for calls you have made and received. The actual time invoiced will vary.

The following options are available:

- Total dialled: check the total length of voice calls dialled.
- Total received: check the total length of voice calls received.
- Total video calls dialled: check the total length of video calls dialled.
- Total video calls received: check the total length of video calls received.

To reset a counter or all counters, press < Options > and select Reset or Reset all.



If the phone is locked, it will require the phone password. The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password. ▶ p. 91

## Data counter (Menu 9.6)

You can view the total amount of data you have sent or received.

Select Total sent or Total received.

To reset a counter or all counters, press < Options > and select Reset or Reset all.



If the phone is locked, it will require the phone password. The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password. ▶ p. 91

#### Call costs (Menu 9.7)

You can check the cost of calls, if your USIM/SIM card supports this network feature. Note that this is not intended to be used for billing purposes.

The following options are available:

- Total costs: check the total cost of all your calls. If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in Edit cost limit, you must reset the counter before you can make another call.
- · Last call cost: check the cost of your last call.
- · Cost limit: check the maximum cost set.

Press < Options > to access the following options:

- · Reset call cost: reset the cost counters.
- Edit cost limit: set the maximum cost authorised for your calls.
- Setup currency: set the currency that is applied when the cost of your call is calculated.

## Vodafone (Menu \*)

This is available if you use a SIM card that supports SIM Application Toolkit menus and provides additional services, such as news, weather, sports, and location services. Available services may vary, depending on Vodafone's plans.

For further details, see your USIM/SIM card instructions or contact Vodafone.

# Mobile TV (Menu 0)

Use this menu to access the Vodafone online TV service. You can watch TV and use various Mobile TV services. For further details, please contact Vodafone.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Mobile TV

# Settings (Menu #)

The **Settings** menu provides you with various setting options to customise the phone to your preferences and needs. You can also reset the settings to their default status.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Settings.

# Phone settings (Menu #.1)

Many different features of your phone's system can be customised to suit your preferences.

### Phone profiles (Menu #.1.1)

Your phone provides you with sound profiles that allow you to quickly and easily change the sound settings of the phone for different events or situations. Use this menu to adjust the properties of each profile and activate the profile you need.

# Editing a profile

- Scroll to the profile you want.
- Press < Options > and select Edit.
- 3. Change the sound settings. Press [Left] or [Right] to access the options in other taps:
  - Call alert type: select an alert type for the call ringer.
  - Voice call ringtone: select a ringtone for the call ringer of voice calls.
  - Video call ringtone: select a ringtone for the call ringer of video calls.

- Ringtone volume: adjust the volume for the call ringer.
- Auto reply: set whether your phone automatically sends a specified message to a caller when you do not answer the phone.
- Call answer mode: (for Car) select how to answer an incoming call.
- Message alert type: select an alert type for the message ringer.
- Message alert tone: select a ringtone for the message ringer.
- Message alert repetition: select if the phone repeats reminding you of a new message.
- Messenger alert tone: select a ringtone for the messenger ringer.
- Messenger alert repetition: select if the phone repeats reminding you of a new messenger.
- Alert tone volume: adjust the volume for the message ringer.
- **Keypad tones**: select a tone which sounds when you press a key
- Power on type: select an alert type for the power-on ringer.
- Power off type: select an alert type for the power-off ringer.
- Flip open/close tone: cause the phone to sound when you open or close the phone.

- Volume, phone sounds: adjust the phone volume for keytones and sound effect tones.
- When you have finished, press < Options > and select Save.

# Changing an active profile

From the profile list, select the profile you want.

# Phone language (Menu #.1.2)

Use this menu to select a language for the display text or the T9 input mode.

#### Short cuts (Menu #.1.3)

You can use the Navigation keys as shortcut keys to access specific menus directly from Idle mode. Use this menu to assign these shortcut assignments.

#### Assigning a shortcut to a key

- 1. Select the key to be used as a shortcut key.
- 2. Select the menu that will be assigned to the key.

### Using shortcut options

From the Shortcuts screen, press < Options > to access the following options:

- Assign: assign a shortcut menu.
- Change: change a shortcut menu assignment.
- Remove: deactivate the shortcut assignment to the selected key.
- Remove all: deactivate all shortcut assignments.

#### Time & date (Menu #.1.4)

Use this menu to change the current time and date displayed on your phone. Before setting the time and date, specify your time zone in the **World clock** menu. ▶ p. 75

- · Time: enter the current time.
- Date: enter the current date.
- Time format: select a 12-hour or 24-hour time format.
- Date format: select a date format.
- Home zone: select your home time zone. You
  can view the time difference between your home
  time zone and Green witch Mean Time (GMT). If
  you want to apply Daylight Savings Time (DST)
  to your time zone, select Daylight saving.
- Automatic update: select to receive time information from your network.

#### Side key (Menu #.1.5)

Use this menu to set whether the phone mutes the call ringer or rejects a call if you press and hold  $\lceil A/\overline{\gamma} \rceil$  when a call comes in.

#### Anykey answer (Menu #.1.6)

Use this menu to answer an incoming call by pressing any key, except for  $\langle \mathbf{Reject} \rangle$ , [ $\bigcirc$ ], and  $[ \triangle / \boxed{ }]$ .

#### Camera key (Menu #.1.7)

Use this menu to set a default function for the Camera/video call key. If you select **Always ask**, the phone will ask you to select the function each time you press and hold the key.

# Slide settings (Menu #.1.8)

Use this menu to set how the phone reacts when you open it for an incoming call, and when you close it while using a function.

- Slide up: set whether or not to answer a call by opening the phone.
- Slide down: set whether or not the phone maintains the menu you are using when you close the phone.



When you set **Slide down** to **Continue operation**, the keypad lock works just in Idle mode.

# Display settings (Menu #.2)

Use this menu to change the settings for the display and lighting.

#### Wallpaper (Menu #.2.1)

Select a wallpaper type for the display.

- **Pictures**: the phone displays the image you have set as wallpaper for the idle screen.
- Use theme: the phone uses the theme you have selected in the **Theme** menu.

- Photo slide: the phone displays a photo slide of your favourite images for the idle screen.
- None: the phone does not display wallpaper.

## Greeting message (Menu #.2.2)

Enter the greeting that is displayed on the display.

## Theme (Menu #.2.3)

Select a theme. The theme is a collection of Idle mode wallpaper, Menu mode wallpaper, power on/off image, voice/video call ringtone, and message alert tone assembled into one theme.

## Brightness (Menu #.2.4)

Adjust the brightness of the display for varying lighting conditions.

## Backlight time (Menu #.2.5)

Select the length of time the backlight or display stays on:

- On: select the length of time the backlight stays on
- Dim: select the length of time the display stays on in Dim mode after the backlight turns off.
   After a specified time, the display turns off.

### Dialling display (Menu #.2.6)

Select a font type, font colour and size for the numbers entered and background colour of the display while dialling.

# Main menu style (Menu #.2.7)

Select a display style for the main menu screen.

# Messaging settings (Menu #.3)

Use this menu to change the default settings for using the message feature. ▶ p. 53

## Call settings (Menu #.4)

Use this menu to set options for call functions.

### All calls (Menu #.4.1)

Use this menu to change the default settings for voice calls, video calls, and data calls.

- Show my number: hide your phone number from the person you are calling. If you select By network, the phone will use the default setting provided by the network.
  - Some networks do not allow the user to change this setting.
- Show caller information: set the phone to display missed call notifications with the most recently missed caller's information.
- Closed user group: set incoming and outgoing calls to be restricted to a selected user group.
   For details about how to create a closed user group, please contact Vodafone:

Use this user group: activate Closed User Group (CUG) index numbers.

**Outside access**: enable calls to numbers other than those in the Closed user group. This feature depends on the nature of your CUG subscription.

**Default group**: enable the default CUG, if you have set one with Vodafone. When making a call, you are given the option of using your default CUG, instead of selecting one from the list.

**Group index**: add, delete, or activate CUG index numbers.

- Auto redial: set the phone to make up to ten attempts to redial a phone number after an unsuccessful call.
- Auto reject: activate the Auto reject feature.
   You can also set the phone to reject a call from the unknown or specified numbers.
- Call status tones: select the various tones on the phone you want to turn on or off:

All: enable all tones

**Call connect tone**: cause the phone to beep when a call is connected to the system.

**Minute minder**: cause the phone to beep every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.

**Call end tone**: cause the phone to beep when a call is disconnected by the other person or the faded signal.

 Alerts on call: set the phone to beep when you receive a new message or when the time for an alarm comes during a call.

#### Voice call (Menu #.4.2)

Use this menu to access network services for voice calls.

#### Setting a call diverting option

This network service reroutes incoming calls to a different phone number that you specify.

- 1. From the Voice call screen, select **Diverts**.
- 2. Select a call diverting option:
  - Always: divert all calls.
  - Busy: divert calls when you are on another call
  - **No reply**: divert calls when you do not answer the phone.
  - Unreachable: divert calls when you are not in an area covered by Vodafone or when your phone is switched off.
  - Cancel all: cancel all call diverting options.
- Enter the number to which the calls will be diverted in the **Divert to** line.
- If you select **No reply**, move to the **Waiting** time line and select the length of time the network delays before diverting a call.
- Press < Options > and select Activate. To deactivate the call diverting, select Deactivate.

### Setting a call restriction option

This network service allows you to restrict your calls.

- 1. From the Voice call screen, select Restrict calls.
- 2. Select a call barring option:
  - · All outgoing calls: prohibit outgoing calls.
  - Outgoing int'l calls: prohibit international calls.
  - Int'l except home: only allow calls to numbers within the current country when you are abroad, and to your home country.
  - All incoming calls: prohibit incoming calls.
  - Incoming when roaming: prohibit incoming calls when you use your phone outside of your home country.
  - Cancel all: cancel all call barring settings, allowing calls to be sent and received normally.
- 3. Enter the call barring password supplied by Vodafone.
- Press < Options > and select Activate. To deactivate the call barring, select Deactivate.
- You can change the call barring password obtained from Vodafone. On the Restrict calls screen, press < Options > and select Change password.

## Setting a call waiting option

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you while you are on another call.

- 1. From the Voice call screen, select Waiting.
- Press < Options> and select Activate. To deactivate the call waiting, select Deactivate.

#### Video call (Menu #.4.3)

Use this menu to change the default settings for using the video call feature.

- Show my image: set whether or not the phone displays your image on the other's phone via the camera. If you select Always ask, the phone will ask you to turn on the camera.
- Select still picture: select an image to be displayed on the other's phone if you will not show your image via the camera.
- Retry with: set what to do when a video call does not connect:

**Always ask**: the phone always asks you to whether or not to retry.

Voice call: the phone retries with a voice call.

**Camera**: the phone turns on the camera and switches to Record mode so that you can record a video and send it as an MMS message.

**Messages**: the phone retries with an SMS or MMS message.

**None**: the phone does not retry.

- Diverts: reroute incoming video calls to a different phone number that you specify. ▶ p. 85
- Restrict calls: restrict video calls. ▶ p. 86

#### Data call (Menu #.4.4)

Use this menu to change the default settings for using the data call feature.

- Diverts: reroute incoming data calls to a different phone number that you specify. ▶ p. 85
- Restrict calls: restrict data calls. ▶ p. 86
- Waiting: set the network to inform you when someone is trying to reach you while on another call. ▶ p. 86

## Contact settings (Menu #.5)

Use this menu to set up the default contact settings.

# Speed dialing (Menu #.5.1)

Use this menu to assign speed dial numbers (2 to 9) to eight of your most frequently dialled numbers.

# Assigning speed dial entries

- Select a key location from 2 to 9. Key 1 is reserved for your voicemail server.
- 2. Select the contact you want from the contact list.
- Select a number, if the contact has more than one number.

#### Managing speed dial entries

From the Speed dial screen, press < Options > to access the following options:

- · Assign: assign a number to an unassigned key.
- View: check the name and number assigned to a key.

- Voice call: make a voice call.
- Video call: make a video call.
- Change: assign a different number to a key.
- Remove: clear the speed dial setting for a key.

# Dialling speed dial numbers

In Idle mode, press and hold the appropriate key.

### Save new contacts to (Menu #.5.2)

Use this menu to select the default memory location for saving contacts. If you select **Always ask**, the phone will ask you to select a memory location each time you save a number.

## View contacts from (Menu #.5.3)

Use this menu to set the memory location from which Contacts shows entries.

#### Own number (Menu #.5.4)

Use this feature to check your phone numbers, or to assign a name to each of the numbers. Changes made here do not affect the actual subscriber numbers on your USIM/SIM card.

# Calendar settings (Menu #.6)

Use this menu to change the default settings for the calendar.

- Starting day: select which day of the week the calendar starts with.
- Default view mode: select the default calendar view mode

# live cast settings (Menu #.7)

Use this menu to change the settings for using the live! Cast feature.

- Activation: set whether or not the phone receives live! Cast messages from the live! Cast server.
- Edit channel: edit the channels from which the phone receives live! Cast messages.
- Ticker speed: set the speed at which the live!
   Cast headlines scroll across the screen.
- Number of message ticker viewer: set the number of headlines the thicker will display.
- Use in roaming: set whether or not the phone receives live! Cast messages while roaming outside of your phone area.
- Connection: create and customise the profiles containing the settings for receiving live! Cast messages.

## Camera settings (Menu #.8)

Use this menu to customise the settings for using the camera.

- Camera settings: change the default settings for taking photos. ▶ p. 40
- Camcorder settings: change the default settings for recording video clips. ▶ p. 42

# Network settings (Menu #.9)

Use this menu to customise settings for connecting to a network.

#### Network selection (Menu #.9.1)

This network service allows you to manually select the network to be used while roaming outside of your home area, or to let the network be chosen automatically.

You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

#### Network mode (Menu #.9.2)

Use this menu to select the network you use.

- Automatic: the phone scans for available networks.
- GSM 900/1800: the phone operates in the combined GSM 900/1800 network.
- GSM 1900: the phone operates in the GSM 1900 network. This option is only available in the U.S.A.
- UMTS: the phone operates in UMTS (3G network) networks. You can get a higher speed quality than on lower generation networks, and use advanced data and information services, such as video calls.

#### Preferred networks (Menu #.9.3)

Use this menu to add a new network to your preferred network list, if your USIM/SIM card supports it.

# Adding a network from the network list

- 1. From the network list, press < Options > and select Insert or Add → Network list.
- 2. Scroll to the network you want and press <Insert > or <Add>...

### Creating a network

- 1. From the network list, press < Options >.
- Select Insert or Add → New network.
- 3. Specify network parameters:
  - Country code: enter the country code.
  - **Network code**: enter the network code provided by the network operator.
  - Network name: enter the name for the network.
- Press < Insert > or < Add > to add the network

#### Connections (Menu #.9.4)

Use this menu to create and customise the profiles containing the settings for connecting your phone to the network. You need these settings to use the web browser or send MMS messages or e-mails.

Your phone is set up by default connecting to the network. If you change the settings without first checking with your service provider, the web browser, MMS, and e-mail features may not work properly.

#### Creating a profile

- Press < Options > and select New.
- 2. Specify profile parameters:
  - Set name: enter a profile name.
  - · Access name: edit the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network gateway.
  - Authorisation type: choose the type of authentication used.
  - User ID: enter the user ID.
  - Password: enter the user password.
  - **Protocol**: select the protocol from among WAP, HTTP, and Other.
  - Home URL: enter the URL address of the page to be used as your homepage.
  - Gateway address: (WAP only) enter the gateway address of the proxy server.
  - Proxy address/Port: (HTTP only) set the proxy server address and port.
  - Secure connection: (WAP only) turn the secure mode on or off.
  - Log-in timeout (sec.): set a time period after which the network is disconnected if there has been no new data traffic in that time
  - · Advanced settings: provide you with the following options:

**Static IP**: specify if you want to manually enter an IP address; see the Local phone IP option. If you want the IP address to be automatically assigned by the server, remove the check mark.

**Local phone IP**: enter the IP address obtained from the network operator, if you checked the Static IP option.

Static DNS: specify if you want to manually enter the Domain Name Server (DNS) address; see the Server 1/Server 2 option. If you want the address to be automatically assigned by the server, remove the check mark.

**Server 1**: enter the Domain Name Server (DNS) addresses.

**Server 2**: enter the Domain Name Server (DNS) addresses.

Traffic class: select the traffic class.

3. Press < Save > to save the profile.

#### Using profile options

From the profile list, press **Options**> to access the following options:

· Edit: edit the selected profile.

New: add a new profile.

· Rename: change the profile name.

• Delete: delete the profile.

### Streaming settings (Menu #.9.6)

Use this menu to activate a connection profile to be used for accessing streaming servers. You can also create or edit a profile. > p. 89

# Security (Menu #.0)

Use this menu to protect the phone against unauthorised use by managing the several access codes of your phone and the USIM/SIM card.



If you enter an incorrect PIN/PIN2 three times in succession, the USIM/SIM card is blocked. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK/PUK2 (Personal Unblocking Key). The codes are supplied by your network operator.

#### Phone lock (Menu #.0.1)

The Phone lock feature locks the phone from unauthorised use

When this feature is enabled, you must enter a 4- to 8-digit phone password each time the phone is switched on

The password is preset to **00000000**. To change the password, use the **Change phone password** menu

#### SIM lock (Menu #.0.2)

The USIM/SIM lock feature allows your phone to work only with the current USIM/SIM by assigning a USIM/SIM lock code. You must enter the USIM/SIM lock code to use a different USIM/SIM card.

### PIN lock (Menu #.0.3)

The 4- to 8-digit PIN (Personal Identification Number) protects your USIM/SIM card against unauthorised use. When this feature is enabled, the phone requires your PIN each time it is switched on.

### Fixed dialling mode (Menu #.0.4)

If supported by your USIM/SIM card, Fixed Dialling Number (FDN) mode restricts your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers. When this feature is enabled, you can make calls only to phone numbers specified in the USIM/SIM card.

#### Change phone password (Menu #.0.5)

Use this menu to change your phone password. The password is preset to **00000000**.

## Privacy lock (Menu #.0.6)

Use this menu to lock access to messages, media files, call records, Calendar items, or Contacts entries. When a lock option is enabled, you must enter the phone password to access the locked items.

### Change PIN code (Menu #.0.7)

Use this menu to change your PIN. The PIN lock feature must be enabled to use this feature.

### Change PIN2 code (Menu #.0.8)

If supported by your USIM/SIM card, the Change PIN2 code feature changes your current PIN2.

#### Mobile tracker (Menu #.0.9)

When someone tries to use your phone with another USIM/SIM card, the phone will automatically send the preset tracking message to your family or friends. You can check the phone number from which the messages are sent and then track your phone. This feature is useful when the phone is stolen or lost

- Enter the phone password and press < Confirm >.
- 2. Specify the following options:
  - Activation: activate the Mobile tracker feature.

#### Resetting the phone

You can reset the phone to its default settings.

### Memory card (Menu #. \*.2)

Use this menu to customise settings for using a memory card. This menu is shown only when a memory card is inserted into the phone.

- Memory card details: check the name of the memory card and amount of memory being used.
- Format memory card: format the memory card.
- Rename memory card: change the name of the memory card.
- AutoRun activation: set whether or not the phone automatically runs the Vodafone services when you insert a memory card into the phone.

## Set default memory (Menu #. \*.3)

Use this menu to select the default memory location for saving messages and media files received from other phone or downloaded from the Internet. If you select **Always ask**, the phone will ask you to select a memory location each time you save an item.

### Memory status (Menu #. \*.4)

# Solve problems

#### Help and personal needs

To save the time and expense of an unnecessary service call, perform the simple checks in this section before contacting a service professional.

# When you switch on your phone, the following messages may appear:

"Please insert SIM card"

Be sure that the USIM/SIM card is correctly installed.

#### "Phone lock"

 The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.

#### "PIN lock"

- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the PIN supplied with the USIM/SIM card.
- The PIN lock feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered.
   To disable this feature, use the PIN lock menu.

#### "PUK lock"

 The PIN was entered incorrectly three times in succession, and the USIM/SIM card is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.

# "No service," "Network failure," or "Not done" displays

- The network connection has been lost. You may be in a weak signal area. Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have no subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.

# You have entered a number but it was not dialled

- Be sure that you have pressed [ ↑].
- Be sure that you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.

#### Your correspondent cannot reach you

- Be sure that your phone is switched on. ([6] pressed for more than one second.)
- Be sure that you are accessing the correct cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an incoming call barring option.

# Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Be sure that you have switched on the microphone.
- Be sure that you are holding the phone close enough to your mouth. The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

# The phone starts beeping and "Low battery" flashes on the display

 Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.

## The audio quality of the call is poor

- Check the signal strength indicator on the display ( \( \preceq\_{\text{aidl}} \)). The number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong ( \( \preceq\_{\text{aidl}} \)) to weak ( \( \preceq\_{\text{a}} \)).
- Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.

# No number is dialled when you re-call a Contacts entry

- Use the Contacts feature to ensure the number has been stored correctly.
- · Re-store the number, if necessary.

# The battery doesn't charge properly or the phone sometimes turns itself off

 Wipe the charging contacts both on the phone and on the battery with a clean soft cloth.

## If the above guidelines do not help you to solve the problem, take note of:

- The model and serial numbers of your phone
- Your warranty details
- A clear description of the problem

# Health and safety information

# Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

#### Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC.

The highest SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are Head: 0.446 W/Kg, Bodyworn: 0.380 W/Kg.

For body worn operation, this model phone has been tested and meets the FCC RF exposure guidelines whenused with a Samsung accessory designated for this product or when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body.

Non-compliance with the above restrictions may result in violation of FCC RF exposure guidelines.

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed on-line at www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid. This site uses the phone FCC ID number, A3LSGHZ400V. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. Additional product specific SAR information can also be obtained at www.fcc.gov/cgb/sar.

# **Consumer Information on Wireless Phones**

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

# What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

## Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

# What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard

and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- "Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- "Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- "Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- "National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- "Environmental Protection Agency
- "Federal Communications Commission
- "Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- "National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document

# What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed

increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancercausing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

# What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide

reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

# What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

Settings

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

### What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

"If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

### What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

# Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Handsfree kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

# Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields"

may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

# What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and

wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur. FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

# **Road Safety**

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.

- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- Call roadside assistance or a special nonemergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle

posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

# **Operating Environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

# Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### **Pacemakers**

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker.

These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

# Persons with pacemakers:

- should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

## **Hearing Aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

# Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### **Posted Facilities**

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

# **Potentially Explosive Environments**

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

# **Emergency Calls**

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone

for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

# Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

# Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- · Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.

# Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

## **Understanding the Power Save Feature**

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

# **Understanding How Your Phone Operates**

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

### Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fullyextended and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

# Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

# **Battery Standby and Talk Time**

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

# **Battery Precautions**

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.

- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsungapproved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F).
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be

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prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-Ion batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

#### Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.

- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Do not put the phone in or on heating devices. such as a microwave oven, a stove or a radiator. The phone may explode when overheated.
- When the phone or battery gets wet, the label indicating water damage inside the phone changes color. In this case, phone repairs are no longer guaranteed by the manufacturer's warranty, even if the warranty for your phone has not expired.
- If your phone has a flash or light, do not use it too close to the eyes of people or animals. This may cause damage to their eyes.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas or modified accessories may damage the phone and violate regulations governing radio devices.
- If the phone, battery, charger or any accessory is not working properly, take it to your nearest qualified service facility. The personnel there will assist you, and if necessary, arrange for service.

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
