### **Power**



Connect your TV after powering off the TV and the set-top box by pulling out the power plug.



The socket-outlet shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible



Do not insert the power plug before connecting the power cable to the product.

### Installation/Maintenance



### **Video Connection**

Using a video connector of Video & Audio cable, connect the VIDEO OUT port on the rear panel of the STB to the Video Input port on the TV.


### **Audio Connection**

Using an Audio cable or audio connectors of Video & Audio cable, connect the AUDIO OUT (L/R) ports on the rear panel of the STB to the Audio Input (L/R) ports on the TV.

Be sure to match the audio ports with the plugs of the same color.

### **HDMI Cable Connection**

This section describes how to connect a TV to the STB by using an HDMI cable.



\* Samsung does not supply a HDMI cable.

### **HDMI Connection**

Connect the **HDMI** port on the rear panel of the STB with the **HDMI** port of your digital TV by using an HDMI cable. As an HDMI cable carries audio signals, a separate audio connection to your TV is not needed.

### **DVI Connection**

Connect the **HDMI** port on the rear panel of the STB with the **DVI input** port of your digital TV by using the HDMI-DVI conversion cable.

If using a DVI cable, a separate audio connection must also be made.




### High Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI)

The HDMI port provides high-definition video and audio, and is the highest quality video connection.

### VCR Connection

This section describes how to connect a VCR to the STB.



### Video Connection

Using a video connector of Video & Audio cable, connect the VIDEO OUT port on the rear panel of the STB to the Video Input port on the VCR.

### **Audio Connection**

Using an Audio cable or audio connectors of Video & Audio cable, connect the AUDIO OUT (L/R) ports on the rear panel of the STB to the Audio Input (L/R) ports of the VCR.

Be sure to match the audio ports with the plugs of the same color.

### **Recommended Installation Notice**

If degraded picture quality is observed while viewing copy-protected pay-per-view programs, connect the set-top box directly to the TV set. Do not connect through a VCR.

#### Preamble

The licenses for most software are designed to take away your freedom to share and change it. By contrast, the GNU General Public Licenses are intended to guarantee your freedom to share and change free software--to make sure the software is free for all its users.

This license, the Lesser General Public License, applies to some specially designated software packages--typically libraries--of the Free Software Foundation and other authors who decide to use it. You can use it too, but we suggest you first think carefully about whether this license or the ordinary General Public License is the better strategy to use in any particular case, based on the explanations below.

When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom of use, not price.
