ExposuretoRadioFrequency(RF)Signals

Certification Information (SAR)

Yourwirelessphoneisaradiotransmitterandreceiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposurelimitsforradiofrequency(RF) energy setby theFederalCommunicationsCommission(FCC) of the U.S. government. TheseFCCexposurelimitsarederived fromtherecommendationsoftwoexpertorganizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). Inboth cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawnfromindustry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of wattsperkilogram (W/kg). The FCC

requireswirelessphonestocomplywithasafetylimit of 1.6wattsperkilogram(1.6W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all testedfrequencybands. Althoughthe SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC.

The highest SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are GSM 1900 Head: 0.272 W/Kg, Body: 0.082 W/Kg.

Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure fromwirelessphones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wirelessphoneswithbuilt-inantennas, oftencalled "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. Thesetypesofwirelessphones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between thephoneandtheuser' shead. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commissions afety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because aperson's RF

exposuredecreasesrapidlywithincreasingdistancefrom the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested

that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- •"Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- •"Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- "Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- •"National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- "Environmental Protection Agency

- "Federal Communications Commission
- •"Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- "National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phoneswiththe Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCCs afety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCCalsoregulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their researchmethods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristicofwirelessphoneshavevieldedconflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. Afewanimal studies, however, have suggested that low levelsofRFcouldacceleratethedevelopmentofcancer inlaboratorvanimals. However, many of the studies that showedincreasedtumordevelopmentusedanimals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causingchemicalssoastobepre-disposedto developcancerinabsenceofRFexposure. Otherstudies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know withcertaintywhattheresultsofsuchstudiesmeanfor human health

Threelargeepidemiologystudieshavebeenpublished

since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigatedanypossibleassociationbetweentheuse ofwirelessphonesandprimarybraincancer, glioma, meningioma, oracousticneuroma, tumorsofthebrain orsalivarygland, leukemia, orothercancers. Noneofthe studiesdemonstratedtheexistenceofanyharmfulhealth effectsfromwirelessphones RF exposures. However, noneofthestudiescan answerquestions aboutlong-termexposures, sincetheaverageperiodofphoneusein these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

Acombinationoflaboratorystudiesandepidemiological studiesofpeopleactually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbersofanimal swould be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effectifone exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but

tenormoreyears' follow-upmaybeneededtoprovide answersaboutsomehealtheffects, suchascancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to acancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop-if they do-maybe many, manyyears. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposured uring day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF? FDAisworkingwiththeU.S.NationalToxicologyProgram and with groups of investigators around the world to ensurethathighpriorityanimalstudiesareconducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDAhasbeenaleadingparticipantintheWorldHealth OrganizationinternationalElectromagneticFields(EMF) Projectsinceitsinceptionin1996.Aninfluentialresultof thisworkhasbeenthedevelopmentofadetailedagenda ofresearchneedsthathasdriventheestablishmentof newresearchprogramsaroundtheworld. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on FMF issues

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association(CTIA)haveaformalCooperativeResearch andDevelopmentAgreement(CRADA)todoresearch onwirelessphonesafety. FDAprovidesthescientific oversight, obtaining input from expertsing overnment, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded researchisconducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone? If there is a risk from these products—and at this point we do not know that there is—it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

•"If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those

described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

Thescientificevidencedoesnotshowadangertousers of wirelessphones, including children and teen agers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teen agers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Somegroupssponsoredbyothernationalgovernments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such are commendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other illeffects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientifice vidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands—free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands—free kits reducer isks. Hands—free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meets afety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Dowirelessphoneaccessoriesthatclaimtoshield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claimtoshieldtheuserfromRFabsorptionusespecial phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallicaccessorvattachedtothephone.Studieshave shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits. theseso-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phonemaybeforcedtoboostitspowertocompensate. leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002.theFederaltradeCommission(FTC)chargedtwo companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wirelessphoneusersfromradiationwithmakingfalse and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendantslackedareasonablebasistosubstantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radiofrequencyenergy(RF)fromwirelessphonescan interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDAhelpeddevelopadetailedtestmethodtomeasure electromagneticinterference(EMI)ofimplantedcardiac pacemakersanddefibrillatorsfromwirelesstelephones This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA. medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allowmanufacturerstoensurethatcardiacpacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifiestestmethodsandperformancerequirementsfor hearingaidsandwirelessphonessothatnointerference occurswhenapersonusesacompatiblephoneanda compatiblehearingaidatthesametime. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDAcontinues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference befound to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate byvoice, almost anywhere, any time. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

Whendriving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
- 3 Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- 4 Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.

- 5 Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6 Dialsensiblyandassessthetraffic;ifpossible,place callswhenyouarenotmovingorbeforepullinginto traffic.Trytoplancallswhenyourcarwillbestationary. Ifyouneed to make a call while moving, dial only a fewnumbers, checktheroadandyourmirrors, then continue
- 7 Donotengageinstressfuloremotionalconversations thatmaybe distracting. Makepeopleyouaretalking withawareyouaredrivingandsuspendconversations thathavethepotentialto divertyour attention from the road.
- 8 Useyourwirelessphonetocallforhelp. Dial9-1-1 orotherlocalemergencynumberinthecase of fire, trafficaccidentormedicalemergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!

- 9 Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10 Call roadside assistance or a special nonemergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Operating Environment

Rememberto followany special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone of fwhenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect in compatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

Persons with pacemakers:

- •should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on
- •should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- •shouldusetheearoppositethepacemakertominimize potential interference.

Ifyou have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

Ifyou use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your

physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switchyourphone of finhealth care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.
