User Manual Please read this manual before operating your phone and keep it for future reference.



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Section 1: Getting Started

This section allows you to quickly start using your Samsung SCH-R970C phone by installing the SIM and (optional) microSD cards, installing and charging the battery, activating your service, and setting up your voicemail account.

Understanding this User Manual

The sections of this manual generally follow the features of your phone. A robust index for features begins on page 248.

Also included is important safety information that you should know before using your phone. Most of this information is near the back of the guide, beginning on page 211.

This manual gives navigation instructions according to the default display settings. If you select other settings, navigation steps may be different.

Unless otherwise specified, all instructions in this manual assume that you are starting from the Home screen. To get to the Home screen, you may need to unlock the phone or keypad. (For more information, refer to *"Securing Your Phone"* on page 17.)

Note: Instructions in this manual are based on default settings, and may vary from your phone, depending on the software version on your phone, and any changes to the phone's Settings.

Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your phone and any changes to the phone's Settings.

Special Text

In this manual, you'll find text that is set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, share quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Presents alternative options for the current feature, menu, or sub-menu.
- Tips: Provides quick or innovative methods, or useful shortcuts.
- Example: Gives an example of the feature or procedure.
- **Important**: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance.
- Warning: Brings to your attention important information to prevent loss of data or functionality, or even prevent damage to your phone.

Text Conventions

This manual provides condensed information about how to use your phone. To make this possible, the following text conventions are used to represent often-used steps:

→ Arrows are used to represent the sequence of selecting successive options in longer, or repetitive, procedures.

Example: "Press 📃	— Home, then touch 🔲 Menu →	
Settings →	© Connections → Wi-Fi."	

Setting Up Your Phone

Before using your phone, you need to install the SIM card, the optional microSDTM card, and the battery.

Important! Before removing or replacing the battery cover, make sure the phone is switched off.

Removing the battery cover

1. Locate the cover removal opening.



 Place your fingernail in the opening and pry the cover away from the device.

Caution! Do not bend or twist the back cover excessively. Doing so may damage the cover.

Installing the battery cover

 Align the cover and press it firmly into place, making sure it snaps into place at the corners.



Installing the SIM Card

When you subscribe to a 4G LTE cellular network, you are provided with a plug-in SIM card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN, available optional services, and many others features. This SIM card will only work with this device.

- 1. Remove the battery cover. (See "Removing the battery cover" on page 6.)
- 2. Locate the SIM card slot on the top inside of the phone.

- Make sure the gold contacts of the SIM card face downward and that the notched corner of the card faces outward to the right (as shown).
- 4. Carefully slide the SIM card into the SIM card socket (as shown) until the card locks into place.



Note: If the SIM card is not inserted correctly, the phone cannot make a network connection.

Once the SIM card is inserted, do not remove it.

Removing the SIM Card

- 1. Remove the battery cover.
- 2. Remove the battery.
- **3.** Firmly press the card into the slot and release it. The card should pop partially out of the slot.
- 4. Remove the card from the slot.
- 5. Replace the battery cover.

Installing a Memory Card

Your device lets you install an (optional) microSD[™] (SD) or microSDHC[™] memory card to expand available memory to store images, videos, music, applications, and data.

- 1. Remove the battery cover. (See *"Removing the battery cover"* on page 6.)
- **2.** Locate the microSD card slot on the top inside of the phone.
- With the gold contacts facing down, carefully slide the memory card into the slot (as shown), pushing gently until it clicks into place.

Important! Be sure to align the gold contact pins on the memory card with the phone's contacts.



Removing a Memory Card

- Important! To prevent damage to information stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the phone.
 - Press → Home, then touch → Menu → Settings → More → Storage → Unmount SD card. (For more information, refer to "Storage" on page 207.)
 - 2. Remove the battery cover. (See *"Removing the battery cover"* on page 6.)
 - 3. Firmly press the Memory card into the slot and carefully release it. The card should pop partially out of the slot.
 - 4. Remove the card from the slot.
 - 5. Replace the battery cover. For more information, refer to *"Installing the battery cover"* on page 6.

Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable, standard Li-Ion battery. A Wall/USB Charger (Charging Head and USB cable) is included with the phone, for charging the battery.

Note: The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time.

After the first charge, you can use the phone while charging.

Warning! Use only Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

Note: Failure to unplug the wall charger before you remove the battery, can cause damage to the phone.

Battery Indicator

The battery icon in the Annunciator Line shows battery power level. Two to three minutes before the battery becomes too low to operate your phone, the empty battery icon will flash and a tone will sound. If you continue to operate the phone without charging the battery, the phone will power off.

Installing the Battery

- 1. Remove the battery cover. (See *"Removing the battery cover"* on page 6.)
- 2. Slide the battery into the compartment (1) so that the tabs on the end align with the slots at the bottom of the phone, making sure the connectors align.

3. Gently press down to secure the battery (2).



Removing the Battery

- 1. Remove the battery cover. (See *"Removing the battery cover"* on page 6.)
- **2.** Lift the battery up by the slot provided (1).



3. Lift the battery up and out of the phone (2).

Charging the Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. A wall charger, which is used for charging the battery, is included with your phone. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local Samsung dealer for further details. Before using your phone for the first time, you must fully charge the battery. A discharged battery recharges fully in approximately 4 hours.

Note: Verify that the battery is installed prior to connecting the wall charger. If both the wall charger is connected and the battery is not installed, the handset will power cycle continuously and prevent proper operation. Failure to unplug the wall charger before you remove the battery, can cause the phone to become damaged.

Important! It is recommended you fully charge the battery before using your device for the first time.

 Insert the USB cable into the device's Charger/ Accessory jack at the bottom of the device.



Caution! If the USB cable is incorrectly connected, damage to the accessory port will occur therefore voiding the phone's warranty.

2. Connect the USB cable to the charging head.



 Plug the charging head into a standard AC power outlet. The device turns on with the screen locked and indicates both its charge state and percent of charge.

Caution! While the device is charging, if the touch screen does not function due to an unstable power supply unplug the USB power adapter from the power outlet or unplug the USB cable from the device.

- 4. When charging is finished, first unplug the charger's power plug from the AC wall outlet, then disconnect the USB cable connector from the device.
- **Caution!** If your handset has a touch screen display, please note that a touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger or a non-metallic stylus. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. For more information, refer to *"Standard Limited Warranty"* on page 235.

Turning Your Phone On

 Press and hold the **Press** on **Power/Lock** key (on the upper right side of the phone) for three seconds. While powering on, the phone connects with the network, then displays the Locked screen and any active Notification alerts.

Note: Your phone's internal antenna is located along the bottom back of the phone. Do not block the antenna; doing so may affect call quality or cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than necessary.

Unlocking Your Phone

- 1. If needed, press Press Home to wake the screen.
- If there are no Notification alerts on your phone, swipe the screen in any direction to unlock it.
 If you purchased your phone online, the first time you power your phone on and unlock the screen, the Activation Wizard Welcome screen displays.

- 3. Follow the prompts to activate and set-up your phone.
- Note: You can choose to configure lock settings to prevent unauthorized use of your device. For more information, refer to *"Lock screen"* on page 167.

Turning Your Phone Off

- Press and hold the Power/Lock Key (on the upper right side of the device) for two seconds.
- 2. At the prompt, touch Power off. The Power off pop-up displays.
- 3. At the prompt, touch OK.

Initial Device Configuration

When you first turn on your device, you are asked to set up a few things. To complete setup, read and follow the instructions on the screen. You can touch Skip on some screens, while others require reading or other information (touch Next). Touch Back to re-display the information. Some screens display depending on the options you choose.

- 1. Select a language from the Select language pull down.
- If required, touch Accessibility to change the accessibility settings and tap Next.
- 3. Touch Next when the Activate device screen displays.
- Configure a Wi-Fi connection if you plan to use the device with Wi-Fi. For more information, refer to "Scanning and Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network" on page 139.
- 5. Sign in or create a Samsung account, or touch Skip.
- 6. Touch Yes when the Got Google screen displays if you have an account, or touch No to cancel.
- 7. Touch Get an account or Not Now when the Make it Google screen displays.

- 8. Select the appropriate check boxes on the Google and your location screen, then touch Next.
- **9.** Enter your name on the **This phone belongs to...** screen to personalize the phone, and then touch **Done**.
- **10.** Create a Dropbox account or touch **Sign in**, and read the disclaimer. Or touch **Skip**.
- Important! If you skip setting up the free 50 GB Dropbox account, your Dropbox account space is limited to 10 GB after initial configuration.
 - Tap each item on the Learn about key features screen to learn more about the feature, then tap Next. Your Device name and model code display.
 - Enter a new device name in this field if you want to change the device name.
 This information displays when you use Bluetooth, Wi-Fi Direct, tethering, and other features.
 - **13.** Touch **Done** \rightarrow **Finish**.

The Home screen displays.

TTY Mode

Your phone is fully TTY-compatible, allowing you to connect a TTY device to the phone's headset jack. Before you can use your phone with a TTY device, you'll need to enable TTY Mode.

(For more information, refer to *"Other call settings"* on page 76.)

Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are sent to voicemail, even if your phone is turned off, so you'll want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as you activate your phone.

Setting up Voicemail

- Press → Home, then touch Phone, then touch and hold 1∞.
- 2. Follow the automated instructions to set up your new password and record a greeting.

Important! Always use a password to protect against unauthorized access.

Checking Voicemail

- Press Home, then touch Phone, then touch and hold 1 .
- 2. Follow the automated instructions to create a password, greeting, and a display name.

Tip: You can also access Voicemail by dialing your phone number from any touch-tone phone.

Displaying Your Phone Number

- Press → Home, then touch Menu →
 - Settings \rightarrow \square More \rightarrow About device \rightarrow Status.

Your phone number displays under My phone number.

Your Google™ Account

Your new phone uses your Google account to fully utilize its Android features, including Gmail, Google Maps, Google Talk, and the Google™ Play apps. When you turn on your phone for the first time, you should set up a connection with your existing Google account, or create a new Google account.

1. Press \longrightarrow Home, then touch \implies Applications \rightarrow

树 Gmail.

The Add a Google Account screen displays.

- 2. Touch Existing or New to continue.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions to sign in if you already have a Google account, or to create a Google Account.

Creating a Samsung Account

An active Samsung account is required to use applications such as AllShare Play and Media Hub.

- 2. Touch Accounts \rightarrow Add account.
- Follow the on-screen instructions to complete your account.

Roaming

When you travel outside your home network's coverage area, your phone can roam to acquire service on other compatible digital networks. When Roaming is active, the Roaming icon () displays in the Status Bar of the display. For more information, refer to *"Mobile networks"* on page 160.

During roaming, some services may not be available. Depending on your coverage area and service plan, extra charges may apply when making or receiving calls.

Note: Contact your Wireless Provider for more information about your coverage area and service plan.

Securing Your Phone

By default, the phone locks automatically when the screen times out, or you can lock it manually. You can unlock the phone using one of the default Unlock screens, or for increased security, use a personal screen unlock pattern, a Personal Identification Number (PIN), or a password.

For more information about creating and enabling a Screen unlock pattern, see *"Lock screen"* on page 167.

Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

Locking the phone manually

Press the Over/Lock key on the top right side of the phone.

- 1. Press **Home** to wake the screen.



Front View



- 1. Earpiece: Use during calls to listen to callers.
- LED Indicator: Flashes or glows to alert you to alert notifications or phone status.
- 3. Menu Key: Press to display options for the current screen.
- 4. Home Key: Press to display the Home screen, or Lock screen if the phone is locked. Press and hold to display recent applications or to launch Task Manager.
- 5. Microphone: Use during calls to allow callers to hear your voice, and when recording.
- 6. Back Key: Press to return to the previous screen or option.
- 7. 2 Megapixel Front Camera: Use for taking pictures and recording video.
- 8. Proximity and Light Sensors: Detect the presence of nearby objects to control device functions or blank the screen display, such as when you hold the phone to your ear during a phone call. Detect ambient light to determine screen brightness when Brightness is set to Automatic brightness (see "Brightness" on page 170), and when taking pictures with the Front camera.

Side Views



- 1. Volume Key: From the Home screen, touch to adjust Master Volume. During calls or music playback, press to adjust volume. Press to mute the ringtone of an incoming call.
- USB Power/Accessory Port: Connect a USB cable for charging or to sync music and files.
- Power/Lock Key: Press and hold to turn the phone on or off. Press to lock the phone, or to wake the screen for unlocking.

Back View



- 1. Infrared Lens: Use when controlling media devices remotely.
- 13 Megapixel Camera Lens: Use when taking photos or recording videos.
- 3. Camera Flash: Use when taking photos.
- External Speaker: Play ringtones, call audio when in Speakerphone mode, media sounds (music and video), and other sounds.
- 5. 3.5mm Headset Jack: Plug in an optional headset or TTY equipment.
- 6. Noise cancelation microphone: Captures background noise that the phone uses to produce a quiet background during calls and video chats.

Google Search Bar

The Google Search Bar provides you an on-screen Internet search engine powered by Google^TM.

- From the main Home screen, tap the Google Search bar Google & .
- 2. Use the on-screen keypad to enter the item you want to search for, then tap **Q**.
- 3. Tap \oint to use Google Voice Search and follow the prompts.

Navigation

Navigate your phone's features using the command keys and the touch screen.

Warning! Please note that a touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger or a nonmetallic stylus. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. (For more information, see "Warranty Information" on page 235.)

Command Keys

Menu Key

Touch **Henu** to display a context-sensitive menu of options for the current screen or feature.

Home Key

Press the **Home Key** to display the Home screen.

Press and hold the **Home Key** to launch a menu of recent applications, or to launch Task Manager.

Back Key

Touch \bigcirc **Back** to return to the previous screen, option or step.

Finger motions

Touch

Touch items to select or launch them. For example:

- Touch the on-screen keyboard to enter characters or text.
- Touch an item to select it.
- Touch an app icon to launch the application.

Touch and hold

Activate on-screen items by a touch and hold gesture. For example:

- Touch and hold a widget or icon on the Home screen to move it.
- Touch and hold on a field to display a pop-up menu of options.

Swipe

Swipe your finger vertically or horizontally across the screen. For example:

- · Unlocking the screen
- Scrolling the Home screen or a menu
- Combine touch and hold with swipe to drag an item to a new location.

Pinch

Using two fingers, make a pinch motion on the screen. For example:

- Pinch in to zoom in on pictures or screens.
- Pinch out to zoom out on pictures or screens.

Swipe and Palm Swipe

To swipe, lightly drag your finger vertically or horizontally across the screen. Use swipe when:

· Unlocking the screen

· Scrolling through the Home screen or a menu

To palm swipe, swipe the side of your hand horizontally across the screen. Use palm swipe when:

· Capturing the screen

Motions and gestures

By activating the various motion and gesture features, you can access a variety of time saving functions.

Air gestures

Your phone recognizes motion near its screen. You can control several functions of your phone by moving your hand near the screen. (To enable Air gestures, see *"Motions and gestures"* on page 190.)

- Quick glance: When this option is set to On and your phone is lying on its back with the screen is off, you can see selected important information (such as the time and date, notification icons, missed calls, unread messages, battery charge level, and current music information) by reaching upward toward your phone's screen.
- Air jump: When this option is set to On, you can scroll web pages or email messages by moving the edge of your hand up or down near the screen.

- Air browse: When this option is set to On, you can browse pictures, pages, or music tracks by moving the edge of your hand left or right near the screen.
- Air move: When this option is set to On, you can move app shortcuts to other home screen panels or Apps screen panels by touching and holding a shortcut with one hand, then moving the edge of your hand left or right near the screen.
- Air call-accept: When this option is set to On, you can answer incoming calls by waving your hand left and right parallel to the screen.

Motions

Your phone can sense when you move it. You can navigate screens and access features by moving the phone in specific patterns.

To use motions to control your phone, enable the **Motion** settings. (For more information, see *"Motions and gestures"* on page 190.)

- Pick up:
 - Direct call: When this option is set to On, you can lift the phone to your ear to call a contact displayed in a Messaging, Contacts, or Call Log screen.
 - Smart alert: When this option is set to On, you can lift the phone to be automatically notified of missed calls, messages, and alerts that occurred while the phone was stationary.
- Tilt:
 - Zoom: When this option is set to 0n, touching and holding with your thumbs on the screen while in Gallery or Internet, then tilting the phone forward and back causes the screen to zoom in or out.

- Pan:
 - Browse an image: When this option is set to On, moving the phone in a panning motion while viewing an image moves focus around in the image.
- Turn over:
 - Mute/pause: When this option is set to On, turning the phone screen-down automatically mutes incoming call ringtones and alerts sounds.

Palm motions

Use your hand to swipe across the screen, or cover the screen.

- Capture screen: When this option is set to 0n, swiping the screen with the side of your hand (left to right, or right to left) captures a screen shot.
- **Mute/pause**: When this option is set to On, covering the screen with your hand mutes or pauses media playback.

Using Multi window

This feature allows you to run multiple applications on the current screen at the same time. This feature works with the phone in portrait or landscape mode.

Note: Only applications found within the Multi window tray can be active atop or beside another application currently running on the screen.

When running two applications that play multimedia files (music/video), audio from both applications will be played at the same time.

Enabling Multi Window

- **1.** Press \longrightarrow Home, then touch \implies Menu \rightarrow Settings.
- 2. Touch the My device tab. The My device menu displays.
- Under Personalization, touch Display, then touch Multi window to enable the feature. A check mark displays in the check box to indicate that the Multi window feature is enabled.

Displaying and hiding the Multi window tab

To display the Multi window tab and tray:

- With Multi window enabled, touch and hold Deck. The Multi window tray displays briefly (by default) on the left side of the screen, then closes, leaving only the Multi window tab (>) showing.
- 2. To open the Multi window tray, touch the tab . You can now browse and launch the apps.
- **3.** To browse the Multi window apps, Swipe the tray upwards.

To hide the Multi window tab:

With the Multi window tab showing, touch and hold
 Back. This action hides the Multi window tab from view.

Using Multi Window to run multiple apps on the same screen

You can run any of the apps found in the Multi window tray on the screen at the same time as another app.

Once two apps are running on the same screen, you can then choose to swap their positions or to maximize a desired app.

Note: Only apps found in the Multi-window tray can be active on the screen at the same time as another app. If you run two apps that play multimedia files (music/


video), sound from both apps will play at the same time.

1. Launch an app.

Example: From the Home screen, touch 🛟 Internet.

- **2.** Position the phone in either portrait or landscape orientation.
- **3.** Display the Multi window tab. (See *"To display the Multi window tab and tray:"* on page 27.)
- 4. Touch the Multi window tab b to display the apps tray.
- 5. Touch and hold the desired app, such as **Maps**, until it detaches from the tray.

- Drag the new Multi window app over the currently running app and drop the new app onto one of the following screen areas, depending on your phone's orientation:
 - Top or bottom area (portrait orientation)
 - Left or right area (landscape orientation)



Note: Once two applications are running, the device displays a split screen view, containing both the initial app and the new Multi window app.

Each app runs independent of the other.

To swap the locations of the applications:

- 1. With the two
 - applications shown in a split screen, touch the Border bar to show the on-screen icons.
- 2. Touch the desired application area (top or bottom).
- 3. Touch Swap apps. The current apps swap places.

To increase the size of a desired application window:

 With the two applications shown in a split screen, touch and hold the Border bar, then drag it to resize the desired window.



To seperate the current applications:

- 1. With the two applications shown in a split screen, touch the Border bar to show the on-screen icons.
- 2. Touch the desired application area (top or bottom).
- Touch Maximize apps. The current apps are the both maximized.

To close an application:

- 1. With the two applications shown in a split screen, touch the Border bar to show the on-screen icons.
- 2. Touch the desired application area (top or bottom).
- 3. Touch \times Close app. The current apps swap places.

Moving the Multi Window tab

The Multi window feature has two components: the tab and the apps tray. You can move the tab along a side or move the tab to any other side of the screen (top, bottom, left, or right). This lets you launch the apps tray (containing the scrollable apps) from any side of the screen.

To move the tab along a side:

- 1. Display the Multi window tab. (See "To display the Multi window tab and tray:" on page 27.)
- Touch and hold the tab b for approximately one-second, then slowly drag it to its new location along the current screen edge.

Tip: This can get the tab out of the way of a button or option behind it.



To move the tab and tray to another side:

- 1. Display the Multi window tab. (See *"To display the Multi window tab and tray:"* on page 27.)
- 2. Touch the tab b to display the apps tray (containing the scrollable apps).

Note: Notice that when the apps are visible, touching and holding the tab turns it a dark grey. Its only then that you can move the Multi window tray to another side.

3. In a single motion, touch and hold the Multi window tab for approximately one-second to detach it from the screen (1), then slowly drag it to its new location along any other available screen edge (2). You can move it to the top, bottom, or either side.



Customizing the Multi Window tray

The applications found within the Multi window tray can be organized by either being rearranged or removed.

To rearrange the Multi window applications:

- 1. Activate the Multi window feature.
- **2.** Touch the tab to display the apps tray (containing the scrollable apps).
- 3. In a single motion, touch and hold a desired app until it detaches from the tray, then carefully drag it to a new location in the list of apps. Lift your finger or stylus off the screen to let go of the app and drop it into its new location.

To remove a Multi window application:


- **1.** Activate the Multi window feature.
- **2.** Touch the tab to display the Multi window tray (containing the scrollable apps).
- 3. Touch Edit (located at the bottom of the list).
- **4.** Follow the prompt to remove apps from the Multi window tray to the revealed staging area.
- 5. Tap **Done** once you have completed the removal process.

To restore a Multi window application:

- 1. Activate the Multi window feature.
- **2.** Tap the tab to display the apps panel (containing the scrollable apps).
- Tap the Edit button (located at the bottom of the list) to reveal the staging area containing any previously removed apps.
- 4. Locate the desired application.
- In a single motion, touch and hold a desired app until it detaches from the staging area, then carefully drag it to a new location in the current list of apps.

Notifications

Notifications shows information about connections, alerts and other items.



- 1. Touch and drag downward from the top of the screen to display notifications.
- 2. Touch an item to open that item, or to launch a related app or feature.
- 3. Touch Clear to clear all Notifications.

Quick Setting Bar

Touch the selected Quick Setting toggles at the top of the Notifications screen to enable or disable frequently used settings. The following toggles are the default Quick Setting toggles:

- Wi-Fi: Turn Wi-Fi On or Off. (For more information about using Wi-Fi, see "Wi-Fi" on page 138.)
- GPS: Turn Standalone GPS services on or off. (For more information, see "Location services" on page 202.)
- Sound: Touch to switch between your sound settings, and the two Silent modes, Mute and Vibrate. (For more information, see "Volume" on page 174.)
- Screen rotation: Enable or disable the Auto rotation setting, to control whether the screen automatically updates when you rotate the phone. (See "Auto-rotate screen" on page 171.)
- Bluetooth: Turn Bluetooth On or Off. (For more information about using Bluetooth, see "Bluetooth" on page 140.)
- Reading mode: allows you to activate an optimized reading mode for selected applications. This menu allows you to assign available applications (such as Calculator, Camera, Contacts, etc...) for enhancement using the Reader mode.

- Mobile data: Activate or deactivate your phone's access to mobile data. (For more information, see "Mobile networks" on page 160.)
- Blocking mode: Enable or disable the Blocking mode setting, to control which notifications you receive. (For more information, refer to "Blocking mode" on page 179.)
- **Power saving**: Enable or disable Power saving mode. (For more information, see "*Power saving mode*" on page 180.)
- Multi window: Enable or disable Multi window mode. (For more information, refer to "Using Multi window" on page 27.)

Changing Quick Settings Bar

You view and use all of the available Quick Setting buttons, and select which buttons appear at the top of the Notifications screen.

- 1. Display the notifications panel by touching and dragging downward from the top of the screen.
- 2. Touch 庄. The Notifications screen is replaced by an array of the available Quick Setting buttons.
- 3. Touch 🛃 Edit.
- Follow the instructions under Set the quick setting buttons.

Clearing Notifications

- 1. Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen to display Notifications.
- 2. Touch a notification to clear it, or to launch an app.

– or –

Touch Clear to clear all notifications.

Home Screen

The Home screen is the starting point for using your phone.



Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your phone and any changes to the phone's Settings.

- Status Bar: Presents icons to show network status, battery power, and connection details. (For a list of icons, see "Status Bar Icons" on page 36.)
- 2. Home screen: The starting point for using your phone. Place shortcut icons, widgets, and other items to customize your phone to your needs.
- 3. Multi window tab: Access Multi window tray. (See *"Using Multi window"* on page 27.)
- 4. Primary Shortcuts: Shortcuts to your phone's common apps. (See "Primary Shortcuts" on page 39.)
- 5. Panel Indicator: Shows what panel of 7 available Home screen panels displays.
- Shortcuts: Shortcuts to common apps. These shortcuts are found on the Home screen by default, and you can add more shortcuts to your favorite apps. (See "Shortcuts" on page 39.)
- Widget: Apps that run on the Home screen. This widget is found on the Home screen by default, and you can add your favorites. (See "Widgets" on page 40.)

Status Bar Icons


The Status Bar shows network and battery status and other details.



Airplane Mode Active: All wireless communications are disabled. See "Airplane mode" on page 160.



USB Connected: The phone is connected to a computer using a USB cable.





Speakerphone: Speakerphone is enabled.



 $\ensuremath{\textbf{Missed}}\xspace$ Call: Displays when there is a missed call.



Mute: Voice or playback volume is muted.



Battery Level: Shown fully charged.



Battery Charging: Battery is charging.



Device Power Critical: Battery has very little power remaining. Charge immediately.



GPS Location Active: One or more GPS location services are active. See *"Location services"* on page 202.



Missing SIM: No LTE SIM is installed.



No Network: No wireless network is available.



3G connection: Phone is active on a 3G system.

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4G LTE Connection: Phone is active on a 4G LTE system.



DLNA Active: Displays when your device is connected and being used to control streaming media. The device is connected to a Digital Living Network Alliance (DLNA) certified device using the Samsung Link application.



Signal Strength: Current signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.



New Message: You have new message(s).



New Voicemail: You have new voicemail. A number indicates the number of new messages.



New Email Message: You have new email.



Silent mode: All sounds except media and alarms are silenced, and Vibrate is not active. See "Volume" on page 174.



Vibrate: All sounds are silenced, and Vibrate is active. See *"Vibrations"* on page 175.



SD Card Ready: A memory card scan is underway, to prepare the card for use.



SD Card Removed: A memory card was un-installed.



Bluetooth Active: Bluetooth is turned on.



Bluetooth Headset Connected: Your device is connected with a Bluetooth headset.



Wi-Fi Active: Wi-Fi is active, and connected to a Wi-Fi network.



Wi-Fi Action Needed: Action needed to connect to Wi-Fi network. For more information about configuring Wi-Fi, see *"Wi-Fi Settings"* on page 154.



TTY: TTY Mode is active.

Display settings

You can customize display settings to your preferences. For more information, see "Display" on page 169.

Extended Home Screen

The Home screen consists of the Home panel, plus up to 5 additional panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space for adding shortcuts, widgets and folders.

Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the indicator at the bottom of the display shows your current position.

Customizing the Home Screen

Adding and removing Home screen panels

Your phone comes with 5 active Home screen panels. You can customize the Home screen to include up to the seven default panels, and set one panel as the Home panel.

1. From the Home screen, touch **Menu**, then touch Edit page.

Tip: You can also "pinch" the Home screen to display Edit options.

- 2. Use these controls to configure panels:
 - Remove: Touch and hold on a panel, then drag it to Remove.

Add: Touch a previously-removed panel to add it, up to the maximum of seven.



Home panel set: Touch to set an available panel as the Home panel.

3. To change the order the panels appear, touch and drag each panel you want moved in place of the panel in the desired sequence.

Primary Shortcuts

Primary Shortcuts appear at the bottom of the display. You can edit the Primary Shortcuts, except for **### Apps**.

Editing the Primary Shortcuts

To add Primary Shortcuts:

- To a Home screen panel, add a shortcut that you want to make a Primary Shortcut. (For more information, see "Shortcuts".)
- Touch and hold the added shortcut, then drag it from the Home screen to the Primary Shortcuts. If the Primary Shortcuts bar already holds five shortcuts, adding another shortcut automatically moves the closest existing Primary Shortcut to the Home screen.

To remove Primary Shortcuts:

 Touch and hold the shortcut until The Remove displays, then drag the shortcut to the Home screen panel or to the Remove icon.

Shortcuts

Use App shortcuts to launch applications from the Home screen. Your phone comes with app shortcuts already placed on the Home screen, and you can add your favorites.

Adding Shortcuts to the Home Screen Adding shortcuts from the Home screen

- Press the <u>Home key</u>, swipe to the desired Home Screen panel, then touch and hold on the screen to display the Home screen menu.
- Under Add to Home screen, touch Apps and widgets → Apps tab.
- **3.** Touch and hold on an app until it displays on the Home screen.

Adding Shortcuts from Apps

- 1. Press the **Home** key.
- 2. Touch Apps.
- **3.** Touch and hold on an app until it displays on the Home screen.

Removing Shortcuts

 Touch and hold the shortcut until I Remove displays, then drag the shortcut to the Remove icon.

Widgets

Widgets are self-contained applications that you can place on the Home screen for quick, direct access.

Adding Widgets to the Home screen

- 1. Press the **Home** key, swipe to a Home screen panel, then touch and hold on the screen to display the **Home screen** menu.
- Under Add to Home screen, touch Apps and widgets → Widgets tab.
- **3.** Touch a widget and follow the prompts to place and configure the widget on the Home screen.

Adding Widgets from Apps

- 1. Press the **Home** key, and swipe to a Home screen panel.
- 2. Touch **Apps**, then touch the **Widgets** tab.
- **3.** Touch a widget and follow the prompts to place and configure the widget on the Home screen.

Removing Widgets

Touch and hold the widget until Remove displays, then drag the widget to the Remove icon.

Folders

Place folders on the Home screen to organize items.

Adding Folders

- 1. Press the **Home** key.
- 2. Touch and hold on the screen to display the Home screen menu, then under Add to Home screen touch Folder.

– or –

3. The folder displays on the Home screen. Touch the folder to name it.

Removing Folders

 Touch and hold the folder until I Remove displays, then drag the folder to the Remove icon.

Wallpaper

Choose a picture to display in the background of the Home screen. You can choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images, or select a picture you've taken with the Camera or downloaded.

- Press the _____ Home key, touch and hold on the screen to display the Home screen menu, then select Set wallpaper → Home screen / Lock screen / Home and lock screens.
- 2. Choose a source:
 - Gallery: Choose a picture stored on your phone or on an optional installed memory card. Touch a picture to select it, then use the crop tool to resize the picture, if desired. Touch Done to save the picture as wallpaper.
 - Live wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded animated wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch Set wallpaper.
 - Wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch **Set wallpaper**.

Tip: You can also set Wallpaper in Settings. (For more information, see "Wallpaper" on page 169.)

Apps

Apps holds all applications installed on your phone. Applications that you download and install from the Google Play[™] Store or from the web are also added to Apps.

The Apps screen is like the Home screen, it consists of panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space. Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the indicator at the bottom of the display shows your current position.

(For more information about applications, see "Applications and Widgets" on page 86.)

You can place shortcuts to apps on the Home screen, for quick access to the app. (For more information, see *"Adding Shortcuts from Apps"* on page 39.)

- 1. Press the Home key, then touch **Here** Apps.
- 2. Slide your finger left or right to scroll the Apps screens.
- **3.** Touch an icon to launch the application.

Customizing the Apps Screens

Choosing a view

By default, app icons appear in Grid view. You can change the view to list view.

- 1. Press the **Home** key, then touch **Apps**.
- 2. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow View type.
- 3. Choose an option:
 - Customizable Grid: The default view, which allows you to touch and hold on apps to move them from screen to screen.
 - Alphabetical grid: Icons are arranged in a grid, in A-Z order.
 - Alphabetical list: Icons display in a list, sorted from A-Z.

Apps screen options

- 1. Press the Home key, then touch **###** Apps.
- 2. Touch F Menu for options:
 - Play Store: Launch Google Play™ Store, to browse for new apps to download.
 - Edit: Touch and hold an app icon for these options:
 - Drag it to a new location.
 - Drag it to 5 to create a new folder to contain the icon.
 - Drag it to to create a new apps screen and place the icon on it.
 - Drag it to 1 to launch Application manager to view information about the app. (For more information, refer to *"Application manager"* on page 206.)
 - Drag it to 🔄 (if available) to Uninstal the app.

Note: The 🛐 Uninstall icon is only available for your downloaded apps. Pre-loaded apps cannot be uninstalled.

• Create folder: Add folders in which to group your apps.

- Uninstall: Remove an app that you downloaded from your phone. Pre-loaded apps cannot be un-installed.
- **Downloaded applications**: Display all apps you've downloaded.
- View type: Configure the apps screen.
- Share apps: Select apps you've downloaded (not available for pre-loaded apps) to share via Bluetooth, ChatON, Dropbox, Email, Flipboard, Gmail, Google, Google+, Messaging, S Memo, Wi-Fi Direct.
- Hide applications / Show hidden applications: Control whether selected apps icons appear on Apps panels. Hiding an icon does not uninstall the app from your phone.

Entering Text

This sub-section describes how to enter words, letters, punctuation, and numbers when you need to enter text in a message, a note, or any other text entry field.

Keyboards and Input Methods

There are three text input methods available:

- Google Voice typing: Enter text by speaking.
- Samsung keyboard (default): Samsung's on-screen QWERTY keypad that can be used in both portrait and landscape orientation.
- Swype: Instead of touching each key, use your finger to trace over each letter of a word.

(To change the input method, see *"Keyboards and input methods"* on page 185.)

Using the Google Voice Typing Feature

You can use your voice to enter text using the Google Voice typing feature.

- 1. Touch 🥫 on the keyboard.
- 2. At the **Speak now** prompt, speak clearly and distinctly into the microphone.
- If the red microphone turns gray, the feature has timed out. To start again, touch the microphone icon. The text is displayed in the message as you are speaking.
- 4. Touch 🗮 to return to the keyboard.

Note: The feature works best when you break up your message into short segments.

Entering Text Using the Samsung Keyboard

From a screen where you can enter text, rotate your phone counterclockwise to a Landscape orientation. The on-screen QWERTY keypad will display.



Changing the Text Input Mode - Keypad

There are two main keypad layout keys that will change the on-screen keys within the QWERTY keypad.

The available Text Input modes are: **Symbol/Numeric** and **ABC**.



Symbol/Numeric Mode: Activates the number, symbol, and emoticon keys.



ABC Mode: Activates the default alphabet keys. Can also be set to Abc or abc by using the shift () key.

Note: When in Abc mode, the Sym button displays. When in Sym mode, the ABC button displays.

Using ABC Mode

- 1. If desired, rotate your phone counterclockwise to a Landscape orientation.
- When you touch a text entry field, such as the Enter message field for a new text message, the following keyboard image displays:



3. Touch the desired letter or number keys.

Note: The screen initially opens in Abc mode. After typing the first letter, the shift key () changes to) and succeeding letters are lower case. 4. Touch once to input another upper-case letter or touch twice to switch to ABC mode. The shift key will change to . All following letters will be upper case until you touch the shift key again.

Using Symbol/Numeric Mode

Use Symbol/Numeric Mode to add numbers or symbols.

- 1. Rotate your phone counterclockwise to a Landscape orientation.
- 2. Touch sym at the bottom of the keyboard. The following keyboard displays:



- 3. Touch the desired number or symbol.
- **4.** Touch the ^{1/2} button to access additional symbols.
- 5. Touch ABC to return to Abc mode.

Predictive Text

By using the Predictive Text option, you can have next-letter prediction and regional error correction, which compensates for pressing the wrong keys on the QWERTY keyboard.

Note: Predictive text is turned ON by default.

Turning Predictive Text ON:

- Touch and hold on the keyboard, then touch the Samsung keyboard settings screen displays.
- 2. Touch the Predictive text ON/OFF slider OFF

3. In the text portion of the message screen, begin typing a word. A list of word options is displayed. Touch one of the words to replace the word that has already been typed or scroll the line of words to the left for more word choices.

Note: You can also use Predictive Text mode with your phone in portrait orientation.

Entering Text Using Handwriting

You can enter text simply by using your finger to handwrite letters on your screen.

- 1. Touch and hold $\textcircled{\ }$ on the keyboard, then touch \square
- 2. Use your finger tip to write out each character. You can print or use cursive.
- 3. You can write out your entire message using the Handwriting feature or touch to switch back to Samsung keyboard mode.



Samsung Keyboard Settings

Entering Text Using Swype

Swype[™] is a text input method that allows you to enter a word by sliding your finger or stylus from letter to letter, lifting your finger between words. Swype uses error correcting algorithms and a language model to predict the next word. Swype also includes a predictive text system.

The following example shows how to enter the word "This". Put your finger down on the "T", and without lifting, glide it to the "h", then to the "i" then over to the "s".



Swype Text Entry Tips

You can access the SwypeTips application and watch a video or tutorial on using Swype. You can also use the following Swype text entry tips.

- Create a squiggle (like an S shape) to create a double letter (such as pp in apple).
- Touch and hold a key to view the punctuation menu then make a selection.
- Move your finger or stylus over the apostrophe to enter contractions.
- Double-tap on the word you want to change to correct a misspelled word, then tap the delete key to erase one character.
 Touch and hold the delete key to erase an entire word.

Enabling and Configuring Swype

The Samsung keyboard is the default text input method, so to use Swype, you must first change the default keyboard setting.

To enable Swype:

- 1. From a screen where you can enter text, touch a text input field.
- 2. Touch the Status Bar and drag down the Notifications screen.
- 3. Touch select input method. The Select input method menu pops up.
- 4. Touch the **Swype** radio button, which turns green. The Swype keyboard displays.

Swype Settings

For information on how you can configure your Swype settings, see *"Keyboards and input methods"* on page 185.

Accounts

Your phone provides the ability to synchronize information, from a variety of accounts, including Email, Facebook, Google, and your Samsung account. Depending on the account, you can choose to synchronize your calendar, contacts, and other types of content.

Contacts from your accounts appear in your phone's Contacts.

With synchronization, you can ensure that information on your phone is updated with any information that changes in your accounts.

Setting Up Your Accounts

Set up and manage your accounts with the **Accounts** settings.

(For information about setting up other, non-synchronized email accounts, see *"Configuring Email Accounts"* on page 82.)

Tip: For more information on setting up your email, contact your Wireless Provider.

Adding an account

1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu, then touch



- 2. Touch Add account.
- 3. Select an account type, then follow the prompts to enter your credentials and sign in.
- **4.** The phone communicates with the provider's server to set up your account on the phone.

Controlling Synchronization

You can choose to have your phone automatically synchronize with your accounts, or manually synchronize each account when you want to check messages.

You may also choose to limit automatic or background synchronization to extend battery life.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → B
 My device → Accounts.
- 2. Under **My accounts**, touch the desired account type. The related account type screen displays.
- Under Accounts, touch the desired account ID. The Sync settings screen for the selected account displays listing some or all of the following synchronization settings:
 - Sync Calendar
 - Sync Contacts
 - Sync Email
 - Sync Gmail
 - Sync Google Photos
 - Sync Google Play Books
 - Sync Google Play Magazines

- Sync Google Play Movies & TV
- Sync Google Play Music
- Sync Internet
- Sync Picasa Web Albums
- Sync Memos
- Sync Tasks
- Touch these settings to enable/disable synchronization of the associated file types. When enabled, a check mark displays in each setting check box.
 - With automatic synchronization enabled, your phone automatically synchronizes its related files with similar files on on-line file servers.
 - With automatic synchronization disabled, you can manually sync accounts by touching Sync all in the account type screen for each account.

Tip: You can control automatic synchronization using the Sync toggle in the Quick Settings menu on the Notifications screen. (For more information, refer to *"Quick Setting Bar"* on page 33.)

Google Account Privacy Settings

Personalize the Privacy settings for Google accounts:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow
 - ⊙ Settings → $\prod_{My \text{ device}}$ My device → Accounts.
- 2. Touch Google. The Google account type screen displays.
- 3. The following options are available:
 - **Search**: Manage Google accounts location histories and search histories.
 - Location settings: Choose whether Google apps can access location information for Google accounts.
 - Google+: Manage Google+ information for Google accounts.
 - Ads: Choose whether to personalize Google and AdMob advertisements for Google accounts.

Managing accounts

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → B
 My device → Accounts.
- 2. Under My accounts, touch the desired account type. The related account type screen displays.
- Under Accounts, touch the desired account ID. The Sync settings screen for the selected account displays. (For more information, refer to *"Controlling Synchronization"* on page 51.)
- To enable or disable a synchronization setting, touch it. When enabled, a check mark displays in the check box.
- 5. To invoke the enabled synchronization settings for the selected account, touch **Sync now**.
- To remove the selected account from your phone, touch Remove account. A Remove account? pop-up prompts you to confirm the removal.
 To remove the selected account, touch Remove account.

Contacts

To access Contacts:

From the Home screen, touch 🔼 Contacts.

Contact tips:

- Swipe your finger left-to-right across a contact to make a call to the contact.
- Swipe right-to-left across a contact to create a message addressed to the contact.

Adding Contacts

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \bigcirc **Contacts** \rightarrow
 - L Add contact.
 - If you have defined accounts (Google, Samsung, and so on), the Save contact to pop-up displays. Select Device or the account to receive the new Contact entry.
 - If you have not defined any accounts, the **Save contact** popup displays. The following options are available:
 - OK: Saves your contacts in "my device contacts".
 - Add new account: Lets you define an account to which your device will save your contacts. The Add new account screen displays. (For more information, refer to "Setting Up Your Accounts" on page 50.)

- 2. Touch contact fields to select or enter information:
 - Touch Add photo ID to choose a picture to identify the contact.
 - Touch Name to enter a name for the contact. Touch 🚫 to enter Name prefix, First name, Middle name, Last name, or Name suffix.
 - Touch Phone number to enter a phone number, then touch the Label button to choose a label, from Mobile, Home, Work, Work Fax, Home Fax, Pager, Other, Custom, or Callback. To add another number, touch (+).
 - Touch Groups to assign the contact to a group. (For more information about Groups, see "Groups" on page 59.)
 - Touch Ringtone to choose a ringtone for the contact.
 - Touch **Message alert** to select the alert tone to be played when you receive a message from this contact.
 - Touch Vibration pattern to choose a vibration pattern to play when you receive a call or message from this contact.
 - Touch Add another field to add more fields, including Phonetic Name, Organization, Email (displays after you setup an Email account), IM, Address, Notes, Nickname, Website, Events, or Relationship.

3. When you finish selecting and entering information, touch Save.

Save a phone number from a recent call to create a new contact, or update an existing contact.

Creating Contacts from the Phone Keypad

Enter a phone number with the Phone Keypad, then save it.

- 4. Continue entering contact information. (For more information, refer to "Adding Contacts" on page 53.)

Tip: While entering a phone number, you can add waits or pauses. Enter the number up to the pause or wait, then touch I Menu to select Add 2-sec pause or Add wait.

Updating Contacts

- Touch a contact to view its information, then touch

Touch and hold a contact, then select **Edit** from the menu.

 Continue entering contact information. (For more information, refer to "Adding Contacts" on page 53.)

Updating Contacts from the Phone Keypad

Enter a phone number with the Phone Keypad, then save it.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **[]** Phone.
- 2. Touch the digits of the phone number on the Keypad.
- 3. Touch Add to Contacts, then select Update existing from the pop-up menu.
- Select a contact to update, then continue entering contact information. (For more information, refer to "Adding Contacts" on page 53.)

Updating Contacts from Recent calls

Save a phone number from a recent call to create a new contact, or update an existing contact.

Choosing Contacts to Display

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🔼 Contacts.
- 2. Touch 🔲 Menu, then touch Contacts to display:
 - Choose All contacts to show all contacts.
 - Touch Device to show only show contacts saved to the phone.
 - Choose an account to only display contacts from that account.
 - Choose **Customized list** to select contact types for each account, or the phone.

Contacts Settings

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[2]** Contacts.
- 2. Touch I Menu, then touch Settings:
 - Select Only contacts with phones to show contacts with at least one stored phone number.
 - Touch List by to sort contacts by first or last name.
 - Touch Display contacts by to list contacts by first or last name.
 - Touch Contact sharing settings to set your preference for sending contacts namecards to other accounts or devices. (For more information about sending contacts, see "Sending Namecards" on page 58.)

Other Contacts Options

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🔼 Contacts.
- 2. Touch a contact to display it, then touch **I Menu**:
 - History: View calls and messages to and from this contact.
 - Edit: Modify contact information. (For more information, refer to "Updating Contacts" on page 54.)
 - Delete: Erase the contact record.
 - Join contact / Separate contact: Manage multiple contacts as one. (For more information, refer to "Joining Contacts" on page 57.)
 - Mark as default: Set a default phone number or other field (such as IM or email address). Defaults are the contact method used when creating a message or calling a contact. You can also set a default by touching and holding on a contact field.
 - Share namecard via: Send the namecard. (For more information, refer to "Sending Namecards" on page 58.)
 - Add to reject list: Mark the contact so that calls or messages from the contact are rejected automatically. To remove a contact from the reject list, touch and hold on the contact in the main contacts screen, then choose Remove from reject list.

- Print contact info: Print the namecard via Bluetooth to a compatible Samsung Bluetooth-enabled printer.
- Place to home screen: Add shortcut to this contact to Home screen.

My Local Profile

My local profile is your own contact record, listed under **ME** in Contacts. You can send My local profile as a vCard via Bluetooth or as an attachment to messages.

Creating My Local Profile

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[A]** Contacts.
- 2. Under ME touch your Google account name or Set up profile.
- **3.** Enter your information in the contact fields. (For more information, refer to *"Adding Contacts"* on page 53.)

Sending My Local Profile

You can send your profile as a vCard via Bluetooth to other Bluetooth devices, or as an attachment.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🔼 Contacts.
- 2. Touch your profile to display your contact information.
- 3. Touch I Menu, then touch Share namecard via.
- Choose a sending method or app from the Share namecard via pop-up, then follow the prompts to send the profile.

Joining Contacts

Your phone can synchronize with multiple accounts, including Google, Corporate, and other providers, plus social networking sites like Facebook. When you synchronize contacts from these accounts with your phone, you may have multiple contacts for one person.

Joining contact records allows you to see all the contact's numbers and addresses together. Joining also helps you keep your contacts updated, because any changes to information in the respective accounts is automatically updated the next time you synchronize with the account.

Joining contacts

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **2** Contacts.
- 2. Touch a contact to display its information.
- Touch Menu, then touch Join contact. A list of available contacts displays.
- **4.** Select a contact to join to the displayed contact. The joined contact displays.
- 5. To join another contact, touch the **Connection** field. The Joined contact screen displays.

Touch **Join another contact**. A list of available contacts displays.

Select a contact to join to the displayed contact. The joined contact displays.

Separating contacts

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch <u>S</u> Contacts.
- 2. Touch a contact to display its information.
- 3. Touch the Connection field to display joined contacts.
- 4. Touch to the right of a contact to remove it from the selected joined contact.

Exporting and Importing Contacts

You can export your contact list to an installed memory card, or import a list of contacts (previously exported) from a memory card.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 😣 Contacts.
- 2. Touch Fine Menu, then touch Import/Export.
- **3.** Select an option, then follow the prompts to complete the operation:
 - Import from USB storage: Copy contacts that are saved in installed mass storage.
 - Export to USB storage: Copy contacts to installed mass storage.
 - Import from SD card: Copy contacts that are saved on an installed memory card.
 - Export to SD card: Copy contacts to an installed memory card.
 - Share namecard via: Share contacts as Namecards. (For more information, refer to *"Sending Namecards"* on page 58.)

Sending Namecards

You can send a contact entry as a namecard using a Bluetooth connection to another device, or as an attachment to a Gmail or Email message.

Important! Not all Bluetooth devices will accept contacts, and not all devices support transfers of multiple contacts. Check the target device's documentation.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **1. Contacts**.
- Touch ■ Menu, then touch Import/Export → Share namecard via.
- Touch contacts to mark them for sending, or touch Select all to mark all contacts. A check mark displays in the check box for marked contacts.
- 4. Touch Done.
- 5. Choose a sending method from the Share namecard via pop-up, then follow the prompts to send the profile.

Favorites

Mark contacts with a $\uparrow \uparrow$ star to identify them as Favorites. Favorites display on the **Favorites** tab in the **Phone** and **Contacts** screens for fast dialing or messaging, and are indicated by the $\uparrow \uparrow$.

Creating Favorites

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **2** Contacts.
- Touch and hold on a contact, then select Add to favorites from the pop-up menu.

- or -

Touch a contact to display it, then touch chi = 1 at the top right of the screen, it changes color to $hereforemath{e}$.

Groups

Assign contacts to Groups to make searching for contacts faster, or to quickly call or send messages to group members. Your phone comes with pre-loaded groups you can use to add your contacts.

Adding a New Group

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **L** Contacts → **Groups**.
- 2. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Create, then enter information:
 - Touch Group name to enter a Group Name.
 - Touch **Group ringtone** to choose a ringtone for calls from members of this group.
 - Touch **Message alert** to choose the tone to play for messages from members of this group.
 - Touch Vibration pattern to choose a vibration to play for calls from members of this group.
 - Touch Add member to select members from Contacts.
- 3. Touch Save to save the new group.

Editing a Group

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **S** Contacts → **Groups**.
- 2. Touch a Group to display it.
- Touch ■ Menu → Edit, then update information for the group. For more information, see "Adding a New Group" on page 59.

Deleting a Group

Tip: You can only delete groups that you have created.

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts →
 Groups.
- 2. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Delete groups.
- Touch a Group to mark it for deletion, or touch Select all to mark all groups. When selected, a check mark displays in the check box. You cannot delete preloaded groups.
- 4. Touch Delete, then choose Group only or Group and group members.

Adding Contacts to a Group

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts →
 Groups.
- 2. Touch a Group to display it, then touch 🙎
- Touch contact(s) to mark them for addition, or touch Select all to mark all contacts. When selected, a check mark displays in the check box.
- 4. Touch Done to add the selected contact(s).

Removing Contacts from a Group

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts →
 Groups.
- 2. Touch a Group to display it.
- 3. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Remove member.
- Touch contact(s) to mark them for removal, or touch Select all to mark all contacts. When selected, a check mark displays in the check box.
- 5. Touch **Done** to remove the selected contact(s).

Sending a Message to Group Members

Create a new text or email message, addressed to the group's members.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \square Contacts \rightarrow Groups.
- 2. Touch and hold a Group, then touch Send message or Send email.
- 3. Touch contacts to mark them as recipients for the new message, then touch **Done**.
- The new message opens, with the marked contacts as recipients. Continue creating the message, as desired. (For more information, refer to *"Creating and Sending Messages"* on page 77, or *"Composing and Sending Email"* on page 82.)

Speed Dials

Speed dials are 1-, 2-, or 3-digit shortcuts (1 to 100) you assign to contacts, to allow you to quickly call the contact.

For more information about calling using speed dials, see *"Making Calls using Speed Dials"* on page 62.

Note: Speed dial 1 is reserved for Voicemail, and cannot be assigned.

Assigning Speed Dials

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **2** Contacts.
- 2. Touch 🔲 Menu, then touch Speed dial setting.
- 3. A list of speed dials displays.Touch a speed dial, then touch a contact to assign the speed dial to the contact.

Removing or Reassigning a Speed Dial

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[2]** Contacts.
- 2. Touch 🔲 Menu, then touch Speed dial setting.
- **3.** Touch and hold an assigned Speed dial setting, the following options pop-up:
 - **Replace**: Touch a new speed dial location to assign it to the contact.
 - Remove: Un-assign the speed dial from the contact.

Section 4: Calling

Making Calls

Your phone offers multiple ways to make calls:

- Use the touch screen Phone Keypad to enter the phone number or speed dial.
- Call a contact from Contacts.
- Call a contact from Favorites.
- Return a call, or call a recent caller, from Recent.
- Voice dial using Voice Dialer.

Making Calls Using the Phone Keypad

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[Contempt Phone**.
- 2. Touch the Keypad tab and then dial the digits of the telephone number on the Keypad.
- 3. Touch **[** to place the call.

Making Calls using Speed Dials

Speed Dials are 1-, 2-, or 3-digit shortcuts (1 to 100) you assign to contacts, to allow you to quickly call the contact.

(For more information about setting speed dials, see "Speed Dials" on page 61.)

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[Contempt Phone**.
- Touch the Keypad tab and then touch the digits of the speed dial number on the Keypad, holding the last digit until the number dials.

Making Calls from Contacts

A contact is an entry that you have created to store the name, numbers, and other information for people or groups of interest.

(For more information, refer to "Contacts" on page 53.)

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **C** Phone.
- 2. Touch the Contacts tab.
- Locate the contact and touch it to open the Contact entry.
- 4. Touch 🐛 next to the number to dial.

Making Calls using S Voice

Place a call by speaking the name or number.

From the Home screen, press **Home** twice in quick succession.

- 2. Read and respond to the prompts.
- 3. Say "Hi Galaxy" to wake up S voice.
- **4.** Follow the prompts to speak a command. You can say commands such as:
 - Call <Name >: Call an entry in your Contacts list.
 - Dial <Phone number>: Call a spoken phone number.
 - Redial: Repeat a recent call.

Making Calls using Favorites

Favorites are contacts that you designate as favorites by starring them. (For more information about creating favorites, see *"Favorites"* on page 59.)

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **C** Phone.
- 2. Touch **Favorites** to display favorites.
- 3. Find the contact and touch it to open the Contact entry.
- 4. Touch 🐛 next to the number to dial.

Recent Calls

When you place, answer, or miss a call, a record of the call is saved in Recent calls.

Accessing Recent calls

■ From the Home screen, touch Phone →

Recent to display recent calls.

Making Calls using Recent calls

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[C] Phone**.
- 2. Touch Calls. Recent to display recent calls.
- **3.** Swipe your finger from left to right across the call to redial.

– or –

4. Touch 🐛 next to the number to dial.

Sending Messages using Recent calls

1. From the Home screen, touch **C** Phone \rightarrow

Recent.

2. Swipe your finger from right to left across the call.

– or –

For a contact call, touch the picture ID icon, then touch to create a message to the number.

Creating or Updating Contacts Using Recent calls

- From the Home screen, touch C Phone →
 C Recent.
- 2. Touch and hold on a call, then select Add to Contacts from the pop-up menu.
- 3. Choose Create contact or Update existing.
- 4. Continue entering contact information. (For more information, see "Contacts" on page 53.)

Managing Recent calls

Deleting records

- 1. From the Home screen, touch C Phone →
- 2. While viewing the calls, touch **E** Menu, then touch **Delete**.
- 3. Touch call records to mark them for deletion, or touch **Select all**. A check indicates marked records.
- 4. Touch Delete to delete marked records.

Filtering records

- From the Home screen, touch Phone →
 Recent.
- 2. While viewing the calls, touch I Menu, then touch View.
- 3. Select a filter type, from All calls and messages, All calls, Missed calls, Dialed calls, Received calls, Rejected calls, All messages, Sent messages, or Received messages.

Answering a Call

When somebody calls you, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image. The caller's phone number, picture, or name if stored in Contacts List, displays.

- At the incoming call screen:
 - Touch and slide () in any direction to answer the call.
 - Touch and slide \dots in any direction to reject the call.
 - Touch and drag the Reject call with message tab upward and tap a predefined rejection message or tap Create new message to create a new custom outgoing response.

Pressing the Volume down button mutes the ringer.

Answering a call with Air Gesture

- Verify the Air Gestures feature is on and Air call-accept is active. For more information, refer to "Motions and gestures" on page 190.
- 2. At the incoming call screen, wave your hand over the screen to accept the incoming call.

Managing Reject Calls

This feature allows you to categorize both known and unknown callers as rejected contacts. These Contacts are then added to your Rejection list which can be managed for individual entries from within the Contacts list or as a whole from the Call rejection screen.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 【
- Press Menu and then tap Call settings → Call rejection.

- **3.** Tap the **Auto reject mode** field to configure your automatic rejection settings. Rejected calls are routed automatically to your voicemail. Choose from:
 - Off: disables the auto rejection feature.
 - All numbers: enables the features for all known and unknown numbers, including those contacts that are not assigned to the rejection list.
 - Auto reject numbers: automatically rejects all entries assigned to the Reject list/Blacklist.

Adding numbers to the rejection list

Entries can be added to the list via either the Contacts menu or via the Auto reject list menu. The Contacts menu option assigns all numbers for an individual as rejected. The Auto reject list allows to assign individual numbers.

To assign multiple numbers as rejected via Contacts:

- 1. From the Home screen, tap 👤 (Contacts).
- 2. Locate an entry and tap it to open the Contact Overview Screen (page 91).
- 3. Press Add to reject list. All phone numbers associated with this entry are then added to the reject list.

Viewing call durations

View the length of the Last call, all Dialed calls, all Received calls, or All calls.

- From the Home screen, touch Phone →
 Recent.
- 2. While viewing calls, touch **Example 1** Menu, then touch **Call duration**.

International Calls

- From the Home screen, touch and and then touch and hold + until the device displays "+" on the screen.
- **2.** Use the keypad to enter the country code, area code, and phone number.
- **3.** Touch once to delete a single digit.

Touch and hold <>> to delete all digits.

4. Touch 🔍

Pause Dialing

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or financial phone numbers.

- **2-Second Pause** automatically sends the next set of numbers after a two-second pause. This is indicated in the number string as a comma (,).
 - From the Home screen, touch and then touch the Keypad tab.
 - 2. Use the on-screen keypad to enter the phone number.
 - 3. Press Add 2-sec pause. This feature adds an automatic two-second pause.
 - **4.** Use the keypad to enter the additional numbers that will be dialed automatically after the second pause.

Tip: You can create pauses longer than two seconds by entering multiple 2 second pauses.

5. Tap 🔍

Wait Dialing

Inserting a Wait into your dialing sequence means that the phone waits until it hears a dial tone before proceeding with the next sequence of numbers.

• Wait sends the next set of numbers only after tapping Yes. This is indicated in the number string as a semicolon (;).

Note: Do not add multiple Waits (;) to a number string as this will continue to prompt you after each sequence.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch **C** and then touch the **Keypad** tab.
- 1. Use the keypad to enter the phone number.
- 2. Press Add wait. This feature causes the phone to require your acceptance before sending the next set of entered digits.

3. Tap 🔍

4. Once prompted to Send the following tones?, tap Yes to dial the remaining digits.

Multi-party Calling

Use multi-party call features to set up a call between multiple callers, such as for a conference call.

- 1. Establish the first call, by answering an incoming call or making a call.
- 2. Touch Add call. The first call is placed on hold.
- 4. Touch Merge to merge the calls into one conference call.
- 5. To end the call touch

Answering Calls

You can answer incoming calls when the phone is locked or unlocked.

Touch and drag the (Answer icon to the right.

Tip: To silence the ringtone for an incoming call, press the Volume key Up or Down.

Sending Calls to Voicemail

When your phone alerts you to an incoming call, you can reject the call to send the caller to voice mail, or reject the call and send a message to the caller.

Rejecting a call

■ Touch and drag the 👩 **Reject** icon to the left.

Rejecting a call with a message


 Touch and drag Reject call with message toward the middle of the screen, then select an existing message, or Create new message.

Answering Call-Waiting Calls

When you receive a call while on a call:

- Touch and drag the 🕓 **Answer** icon to the right to answer the incoming call. The original call is placed on hold, and remains on hold until you end the second call, or swap calls back to the original call.
- Touch Swap to place a call on hold and return to the original call.

Options During a Call



While in a call, you can use these features:

- Personalize call sound: Apply a sound equalizer to the call audio, in cases where you might need the sound softer or clear, or optimized for your right or left ear.
- Noise reduction: Enable or disable noise reduction, to improve call audio quality in noisy environments.
- Extra volume: Enable or disable increased volume in the earpiece. Compensates for low sound from the other caller.

- Add call: Display the Dialer to set up a multi-party call.
- Keypad: Display a keypad to enter numbers.
- End call: End the phone call.
- Speaker: Enable or disable speakerphone.
- Mute: Mute or unmute your voice on the call.
- Headset: Switch the call's audio to a Bluetooth headset.
- Touch 🔳 Menu for options:
 - Contacts: Launch Contacts.
 - Message: Launch Messaging to view or create messages.
 - Memo: Launch S Memo to take notes in text, or create a drawing.

Ending a Call

Touch
 Contended

Call Settings

Configure settings for calling with your phone.

To access Call settings, from the Home screen, touch
 Phone → I=I Menu → Call Settings.

Call rejection

Create and manage a list of phone numbers, to have your phone automatically reject calls you receive from those numbers.

- From the Call Settings screen, touch Call rejection for these options:
 - Auto reject mode: Choose Off, All numbers, or Auto reject numbers. When set to Auto reject numbers, calls from numbers on the Auto reject list will be rejected.
 - Auto reject list: Enter telephone numbers to be rejected when Auto reject mode is set to Auto reject numbers. Touch Create, then follow the prompts to enter numbers to reject, or select them from Contacts. Touch Match criteria to set options for using the reject number list. Enable Unavailable to reject calls with no caller ID (that is, Unknown callers).

Set up call rejection messages

Create and manage text messages to send to callers when you select **Reject call with message** in the **Incoming call** screen.

- 1. From the Call Settings screen, touch Set up call rejection messages.
- 2. Touch **Create** then follow the prompts.

Answering/ending calls

Manage settings for answering and ending calls.

- 1. From the Call Settings screen, touch Answering/ending calls. The following options are available:
 - The home key answers calls: When enabled, you can answer an incoming call by pressing **Home**.
 - Voice control: When enabled, you can answer calls using the S Voice wake-up command.
 - The power key ends calls: When enabled, pressing
 - Power/Lock ends a call.

Turn off screen during calls

When enabled, the screen automatically turns off during phone calls, and the proximity sensor on the front of the phone is used to turn the screen back on when the phone is moved or brought close to another surface, such as when you move the phone to your ear.

From the Call Settings screen, touch Turn off screen during calls to enable or disable this option.

When this option is enabled, a check mark displays in the check box.

Call alerts

Set options for sounds and vibrations to occur during calls.

- From the Call Settings screen, touch Call alerts. The following options are available:
 - Call vibrations: Enable Vibrate on connection to network to have your phone vibrate when it connects to the network.
 Enable on Call-end vibration to have the phone vibrate when the other caller ends the call.
 - Call status tones: Choose options for sounds to play during calls. Enable Call connect tone to have the phone play a tone when the other caller answers a call. Enable Minute minder to have a tone play once per minute during a call. Enable Call end tone to have the phone play a tone when the other caller ends the call.
 - Alerts on call: Enable to have notifications for alarms and new messages play during phone calls. When disabled, these notifications will be muted during a call.

Call accessories

Configure headset options for calls.

- From the Call Settings screen, touch Call accessories. The following options are available:
 - Headset settings for incoming calls:
 - Automatic answering: When enabled, and you have a headset connected to the Headset Jack, incoming calls are answered automatically after a delay, set at Automatic answering timer.
 - Automatic answering timer: Choose a time period to delay before automatically answering an incoming call when Automatic answering is enabled and a headset is connected to the phone.
 - Bluetooth headset settings:
 - Outgoing call conditions: When the phone is paired with a Bluetooth headset, you can choose to make calls even when the phone is locked.

Ringtones and keypad tones

Select incoming call ringtone and vibration, and enable or disable call vibration and keypad tones.

- From the Call Settings screen, under Ringtone and sound settings, touch Ringtones and keypad tones. The following options are available:
 - **Ringtones**: Select the ringtone your phone plays to alert you of incoming calls.
 - Vibrations: Select the vibration pattern your phone uses to alert you of incoming calls.
 - Vibrate when ringing: Touch to enable/disable use of your selected Vibrations. When enabled, a check mark displays in the check box.
 - Dialing Keypad tone: Touch to enable/disable playing of DTMF tones when you enter numbers with the Phone keypad. When enabled, a check mark displays in the check box.

Personalize call sound

When enabled, you can select a sound profile for use during calls.

From the Call Settings screen, under Ringtone and sound settings, touch Personalize call sound and select Adapt Sound, Soft sound, Clear sound, or Off (sound set with the Volume key).

Noise reduction

When enabled, the phone uses both of its microphones to detect background noise from your environment and suppress it during calls.

 From the Call Settings screen, under Ringtone and sound settings, touch Noise reduction to enable or disable the option.

Increase volume in pocket

When enabled, the phone uses the proximity sensor to detect when the phone is in a pocket or other close-fitting location such as a purse or bag, and increases the volume for incoming call ringtones.

From the Call Settings screen, touch Increase volume in pocket to enable or disable the option.

Voicemail

Configure options for voicemail.

- From the Call Settings screen, under Voicemail, the following options are available:
 - Voicemail service: By default, your phone uses your wireless service provider's voicemail service. If you have another option for voicemail installed, select it here.
 - Voicemail settings: By default, the speed dial for calling voicemail (speed dial 1) is set to your phone number. If you wish to use another Voicemail service, touch Voicemail number to set a new one.
 - Sound: Choose sound to play for a voicemail notification.
 - Vibrate: Choose an option for vibration to play for a voicemail notification.

Other call settings

- From the Call Settings screen, under Other call settings, the following options are available:
 - Auto retry: When enabled, the phone will automatically redial a call if it receives a busy signal from the network.
 - **TTY mode**: Choose a TTY mode to enable TTY mode, for use with optional TTY equipment.
 - **DTMF tones**: Set the length of Dual-tone Multi-frequency tones, which play when you use the keypad during a call, such as when navigating phone menus.
 - Voice privacy: Enable or disable Enhanced voice privacy, to improve the security of phone calls.

Section 5: Messaging

This section describes how to send and receive messages, and other features associated with messaging.

Types of Messages

Your phone supports these types of messages:

- Text messages: Send and receive simple messages containing text to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as SMS).
- Multimedia messages: Send and receive text messages with pictures, video, and/or sound to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as MMS).
- Mobile IMs: Exchange Instant Messages with other users of popular messaging sites.
- Email: Send and receive email from your email accounts, including Corporate mail.
- Gmail: Send and receive Gmail from your Google account.
- Hangouts: Chat with other Hangout users.
- ChatON: Chat, share pictures, videos, animation messages (Scribbles), audio, Contacts, Calendar entries, and Location information.

Text and Multimedia Messaging

Your phone can send and receive text and multimedia messages.

Creating and Sending Messages

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \longrightarrow Messaging \rightarrow **New message**.
- Touch Enter recipient and enter a name, phone number or email address, or touch to add recipients from the following:
 - Groups: to select a recipient from the Group list.
 - Favorites: to select a recipient from the Favorites list.
 - Contacts: to select a recipient from your Contacts list (valid entries must have a wireless phone number or email address).
 - Logs: to select a recipient from a list of recently sent messages.
- If adding a recipient from either Logs, Contacts, or Group, tap the contact to place a check mark then tap Done. The contact displays in the recipient field.

- Touch Enter message, then enter the message text. The following options are available (which options are available depends on whether you include an attachment):
 - Touch
 Attach to add media (Image, Take a picture, Video, Record video, Audio, Record audio files) or content (S Memo text, Calendar events, Locations, Contacts) to the message (converts the message to MMS).
 - Touch **I Menu** for options:
 - Insert smiley: Add a text emoticon to the message.
 - Add text: Select text from S Memo, Calendar, Location, Contacts or Text templates to add.
 - View contact: Displays contact information.
 - Add slide / Remove slide: Add or remove a slide. Slides hold pictures or other media (adding a slide converts the message to MMS).
 - Add subject: Add a subject field (converts the message to MMS.)
 - Scheduling: Select a delivery date and time.
 - Discard: Erase this message.

- Translate: Launches the Translator app.

5. Touch \mathbf{x} to send the message.

Managing Messages

Messages you send and receive to the same contact, number or address are grouped together as a "conversation". Threads allow you to see all the messages you exchanged with a recipient in one place.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch <u>Messaging</u>.
- Message threads display by contact, number, or address. While viewing message threads, you have these options:
 - Touch and hold a thread to choose options, including:
 - Delete: Erase the entire message thread.
 - View Contact / Add to Contacts: View the contact record, or save the sender/recipient's information.
 - Add to spam numbers: Add this number to message reject list. Messages from this number are automatically placed in the Spam messages folder.
 - Touch **I** Menu for options, including:
 - Search: Enter characters to search messages and recipients.

- Delete threads: Touch message threads to mark them for erasure, or touch Select all to mark all message threads.
- Draft messages: Messages you have composed and saved for later reuse and/or to be sent to a recipient.
- Locked messages: Messages you have locked to protect them from accidental deletion.
- Scheduled messages: Messages you have set to be delivered at a selected date and time.
- Spam messages: Messages received from numbers you have registered as spam senders.
- Settings: Configure Messaging settings.

Messaging Settings

Configure settings for message storage, delivery, or alerts.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch <u>Messaging</u>.
- 2. Touch For Menu, then touch Settings for options:
 - General settings:
 - Delete old messages: When enabled, messages are automatically erased when storage reaches default limits. When disabled, the phone will prompt you to delete old messages to make room.
 - Text message limit: Set the number of SMS messages per conversation.
 - Multimedia message limit: Set the number of MMS messages per thread.
 - Text templates: Text templates are phrases that you can add to your messages. Use a pre-loaded text template, or create your own.
 - Text message (SMS) settings:
 - Delivery reports: When enabled, you receive a delivery report for text messages you send.

- Multimedia message (MMS) settings:
 - Group messaging: When enabled, you can send a single message to multiple recipients.
 - Delivery reports: When enabled, you receive a delivery report for multimedia messages you send.
 - Auto-retrieve: When enabled, MMS messages download automatically. When disabled, the phone prompts for download.
 - Roaming auto-retrieve: When enabled, MMS messages download and display automatically when roaming. When disabled, the phone prompts you to download new MMS messages.
 - MMS alert: When enabled, alerts you when a message changes mode to MMS.
- Display:
 - Bubble style: Choose the appearance of messages in a message thread. Touch a bubble style for each side of the conversation, then touch Save.
 - Background style: Choose the appearance of the screen behind message threads. Touch a style, then touch Save.
 - Use the volume key: When enabled, you can change the size of message text while viewing by pressing the Volume Key.

- Notification settings:
 - Notifications: When enabled, message alerts display in the Status bar.
 - Select ringtone: Choose a sound for message alerts.
 - Vibrate: Configure vibration for message alerts.
 - Message alert repetition: Choose to have message alert repeat Once, Every 2 minutes, or Every 10 minutes.
 - Preview message: When enabled, a preview of a received message displays in the Status bar.
- Emergency message settings:
 - Emergency alerts: This device is designed to receive Wireless Emergency Alerts from the Commercial Mobile Alert Service (CMAS), including Presidential Alerts, Imminent Alerts (Severe or Extreme), and AMBER Alerts (missing persons). You may choose not to receive Imminent and AMBER alerts, but Presidential Alerts cannot be disabled. All alerts are enabled by default (check mark shown). For more information about Emergency Alerts see "Emergency alerts" on page 81.
 - Emergency notification preview: Listen to an example of a Emergency Alert tone (and vibration, if enabled). The Emergency Alert tone plays at the same volume as your call ringtone.

- Vibrate: Configure vibration for Emergency Alerts.
- Alert sound: When enabled, a sound plays for emergency alerts.
- Alert reminder: Choose whether, and at what interval, your phone plays a sound to notify you of a Emergency Alert after the Emergency Alert tone has stopped.
- Signature settings:
 - Add signature: When enabled, adds your signature text to the end of your outgoing messages.
 - Signature text: Enter text to be added to the end of your outgoing messages.
- Spam message settings:
 - Spam settings: When enabled, the Spam message settings are activated.
 - Add to spam numbers: Enter sender numbers whose messages are blocked automatically.
 - Add to spam phrases: Enter message text phrases that will cause messages to be blocked automatically.
 - Block unknown senders: When enabled, messages from "Unknown" senders are blocked automatically.

Emergency alerts

This device is designed to receive Wireless Emergency Alerts from the Commercial Mobile Alert Service (CMAS). Emergency Alerts are geographically-targeted, and alert customers of imminent threats to their safety within their area. There is no charge for receiving an Emergency Alert. There are four types of Emergency Alerts:

- Presidential
- Extreme
- Severe
- · AMBER Alerts (missing person alert)

You may choose not to receive Extreme Alerts, Sever Alerts, and AMBER Alerts. Presidential Alerts, however, cannot be disabled. To disable Extreme and Severe Threat Alerts and AMBER Alerts, do the following:

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch <u>Messaging</u>.
- 2. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Emergency alerts.
- All alerts except Emergency alert test message are enabled by default (check mark showing). To disable alerts, touch an alert to remove the check mark.

Email

Send and receive email using popular email services.

Configuring Email Accounts

You can configure Email for most accounts in just a few steps.

Tip: For better management of Microsoft Exchange[®] ActiveSync email accounts, configure them using the Accounts setting. (See *"Microsoft Exchange ActiveSync"* on page 199.)

Configuring the first email account

- **1.** From the Home screen, select \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow **(a)** Email.
- Touch account@example.com to enter your email address, then touch Password or touch Next to enter your password.
- 3. Touch a setup option:
 - Manual setup: Configure the account manually. Touch POP3, IMAP or Exchange, then enter the account details. (For account details, contact your Email service provider or your organization's IT support.

- Next: Connect to the server to set up the account automatically. Follow the prompts to complete set-up, then touch Done.
- Tip: For more information on setting up your email, contact your Wireless Provider and your Email Service Provider.

Adding More Email Accounts

Composing and Sending Email

- **1.** From the Home screen, select \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow O Email \rightarrow O Compose.

- 5. Touch 💾 to save this message as a Draft.
- **6.** Touch **\boxtimes** Send to send the message.

Managing Emails

Refreshing Your Email Account

Refresh your account to update your phone from the servers.

- 2. Touch Refresh.

Email Account Settings

Use Account settings to configure handling of your email.

Note: Available settings depend on the email provider.

- **1.** From the Home screen, select \blacksquare Apps $\rightarrow \bigcirc$ Email.
- Touch an account to view it, then touch ■ Menu → Settings → General settings for options.

Gmail

Send and receive emails via Gmail, Google's web-based email.

From the Home screen, select \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow Market Gmail.

Setting Up Your Gmail Account

The first time you launch Gmail, your phone will prompt you to set up your Google account.

- **1.** From the Home screen, select \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow Market Gmail.
- 2. Follow the prompts to sign in, or create a new account.
- Touch Sync now. The phone communicates with the Google server to set up your account and synchronize your email.

Note: You can use more than one Google account on your phone. To add another account, from within Gmail, touch □ Menu → Settings → ADD ACCOUNT option.

Refreshing Your Gmail Account

Refresh your account to update messages on your phone.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow
 - 💙 Gmail.
- 2. Touch 🤤 Refresh.

Managing Your Gmail Account

Use menu options to manage your Gmail.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow \blacksquare Gmail.
- 2. Touch 🔲 Menu for options.

Composing and Sending Gmail

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Apps → Small → \blacksquare_+ New message.
- 2. Touch fields and to compose the message. While composing, touch I Menu for options.
- 3. When your message is complete, touch \gg Send.

Hangouts

Previously known as Google Talk[™], is an updated free web-based application for instant messaging offered by Google. Conversation logs are automatically saved to a Chats area in your Gmail account. This allows you to search a chat log and store them in your Gmail accounts.

- Log on to your Google account if you have not already done so. (For more information, refer to "Your Google™ Account" on page 16.)
- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Apps → U Hangouts.
- Press = → Help for more information on using Hangouts.

ChatON

Provides a global service where you can chat with more than 2 buddies using a group chat. Share things such as pictures, videos, animation messages (Scribbles), audio, Contacts, Calendar entries, and Location information.

Important! Your Samsung account manages the access information (username/password) to several applications, such as AllShare Play, ChatON, and Media Hub.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Apps
 - → 🜔 ChatON.

Section 6: Applications and Widgets

This section contains a description of each application and widget that is available in the Apps and Widget menus, the function, and how to navigate through that particular application or widget. If the application or widget is already described in another section of this user manual, then a cross reference to that particular section is provided.

This section contains a description of each application available in the Apps menu and how to launch it. For applications provided by Samsung, this section also describes functions and navigation.

If an application is described in another section of this user manual, a cross reference to that particular section is provided.

Note: This manual only addresses applications that have been loaded on your device as of the date of purchase. Information concerning third party applications that you may choose to download from the Google Play Store or other sources should be obtained from the application provider directly and not from Samsung. Tip: To open applications quickly, add the icons of frequentlyused applications to one of the Home screens. (For details, see *"Customizing the Home Screen"* on page 38.) You can also add an application icon as a Primary Shortcut that will display on all Home screens. If you add an application as a primary shortcut, the application icon will not be displayed in the Apps menu. (For more information, refer to *"Editing the Primary Shortcuts"* on page 39.)

Accessing Applications

- 2. Sweep your finger right or left to scroll the Apps screens.
- 3. To launch an application, touch the application's icon.

Customizing the Applications Screens

Choosing a view

By default, application icons appear in Customizable grid view. You can change the view to Alphabetical grid view or Alphabetical list view.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps.
- Touch ■ Menu → View type. The available options are:
 - **Customizable grid**: Arrange application icons in the order you prefer.
 - Alphabetical grid: Application icons automatically arranged in alphabetical order.
 - Alphabetical list: Application icons automatically listed in alphabetical order.

Moving Application icons

With the **Apps** screen in Customizable grid view, you can arrange the application icons to suit yourself.

Note: The Edit option is not available with the Apps screen View type set to Alphabetical list.

- **3.** Touch and hold an application icon, then drag it to a new location.
- 4. Touch Save when you are finished.

Filtering Application icons

You can select which icons appear in the Apps screen.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Apps.
- 2. Touch **I** Menu, then touch either of the following options:
 - **Downloaded applications**: Shows only those applications you have downloaded and installed on your phone.
 - Hide applications: Mark those applications you do not want to appear on the Apps screen by touching their icons (check marks appear in their check boxes), then touch Done. The Apps screen displays without the hidden applications.

Applications List

Calculator

Use your phone's Calculator to perform arithmetical calculations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division).

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - $\rightarrow \bigotimes_{\otimes \bigcirc}^{\oplus \bigcirc}$ Calculator.
- 2. To clear the calculator history, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Clear history.

- **4.** Rotate your phone to the landscape position to display the scientific calculator.

Calendar

Record events and appointments to manage your schedule.

- Tip: A Calendar widget is available in Widgets. (For more information about placing widgets on the Home screen, see *"Widgets"* on page 40.)
 - 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow \bigcirc 31 Calendar.
- Important! You should add an account (Facebook, Microsoft Exchange ActiveSync, or Google) prior to using the Calendar.
 - 2. Touch a tab to choose a calendar view:
 - Year: Display the current year and scroll to other years.
 - Month: Display the current month and scroll to other months.
 - Week: Display the current week, and scroll to other weeks.

- Day: Display today's schedule, and scroll to other days.
- List: Display events and tasks in a chronological list.
- Task: Display tasks in a chronological list.
- 3. Touch **Menu** for these options:
 - Go to: Display a specific date.
 - Delete: Delete an event.
 - Delete memo: Removes a memo saved to a specific calendar date.
 - Search: Search for calendar events.
 - Sync: Synchronize your phones calendar with your account calendars. (For more information, refer to "Setting Up Your Accounts" on page 50.)
 - Calendars: Select calendars to display.
 - Settings: Customize the calendar.

Customizing the Calendar

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow \square Apps \rightarrow \square Calendar.
- Touch ■ Menu → Settings to configure these settings:
 - View settings:
 - View styles: Choose Month view styles (Calendar view + list, Calendar view +pop-up), or Week view (Timeline or Analog).
 - First day of week: Choose a day to begin each week.
 - Hide declined events: Enable or disable display of events.
 - Lock time zone: When enabled, sets event times and dates to a specified time zone, so that times and dates will not change if you move to another time zone.
 - Select time zone: When Lock time zone is enabled, specify the time zone for all events.
 - Show week number: Display the number of the week (1 52) in a W column to the left of Sun.
 - Weather: Displays an Accuweather forecast for the next 5 days (including the selected day).

- Event notification:
 - Set alerts & notifications: Choose Alert to receive alerts, Status bar notification to display notifications in the Status bar, or Off for no notifications or alerts.
 - Select ringtone: Choose a ringtone for event notifications, then touch OK.
 - Vibration: Enable/disable vibration for event notifications.
 - Quick responses: Pre-composed text to include with email notifications to meeting attendees, guests, and so on.

Sending Events

Send events as vCalendar files to other compatible devices.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - \rightarrow 31 Calendar.
- 2. Touch an event to display its details.
- 3. Touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow Share via.
- 4. Select the desired Sharing method from the Share via pop-up.
- Follow the prompts to send a copy of a Calendar event to another device. (For more information, refer to *"Connections"* on page 138.)

Camera

Use your 13.0 megapixel Camera feature to take photos and save them in JPEG format. Your phone also functions as a camcorder to record videos and save them in MPEG format.

Note: When taking a photo in direct sunlight or in bright conditions, shadows may appear on the photo.


- **Note:** On your initial activation of the camera, firmware configuration can take up to 1 minute. This is a one time process.

 Before you take a picture, use the Up and Down Volume keys to zoom in or out. You can magnify the picture up to x4 (400 percent).

– or –

Pinch the screen to zoom out or pinch outwards to zoom in.

- **3.** If desired, before taking the photo, touch on-screen icons to access various camera options and settings.
- 4. Touch the screen to move the focus to a desired area of interest.
- 5. Touch (Camera) until the shutter sounds.



Camera Options

Options are represented by icons across both sides of the screen.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - → 💽 Camera.
- 2. Touch the Mode button (1) to change the mode to one of the following:
 - Auto: Use this mode to automatically adjust the exposure, color, and brightness settings. This mode allows single image shots or burst shots.
 - Beauty face: Use this to take photos with lightened faces for gentler images.
 - Best photo: Use this to take multiple photos in a short time, and then choose the best photos among them. Press the Shutter button to take multiple photos. When Gallery opens, touch and hold thumbnails of photos to save, and then touch Done.

- Best face: Use this to take multiple group shots at the same time and combine them to create the best possible image. Press the Shutter button to take multiple photos. When Gallery opens, touch the yellow frame on each face, and choose the best individual face for the subject. After choosing a pose for each individual, touch Done to merge the images into a single photo, and touch Save.
- Sound & shot: Use this mode to enrich pictures by adding background sounds for a few seconds. The background sound is recorded for up to 9 seconds after taking the photo.
- Drama: Use this to take a series of photos of a moving object and then merge them together into one image.
- Animated photo: Use this to create a picture in which a few selected static objects move by animating objects detected by the device.
- Rich tone (HDR): Use this to take photos with richer colors and contrasts by merging images taken at different exposure levels.
- Eraser: Saves the best of 5 taken pictures and removes any passers by.

- Panorama: Use this to take wide panoramic photos. Press the Shutter button to take a photo, and then move the camera in any direction. When the blue frame aligns with the preview screen, the camera automatically takes another shot in the panoramic sequence. To stop shooting, press the Shutter button again.
- Sports: Use this to take fast action photos.
- Night: Use this to take brighter, clearer pictures in low light settings without the use of the flash.
- **3.** From the top of the camera, the following shortcuts are available for the camera:



Focus area: displays the area of the image used as the main focus area. If the image is too close, the square will turn red.



Self portrait: allows you to set the front camera so you can take pictures of yourself.



Front Camera/Dual Camera: allows you to activate both the front and rear cameras simultaneously. For more information, refer to *"Taking Dual Camera Photos"* on page 94



Quick Settings: activates the Quick Settings menu bar from where you can select several additional settings.



Night detection: use this activate/deactivate night detection.



Image viewer: allows you to access the Image viewer and the various viewing options for a selected picture. The last picture you took, displays as a thumbnail in the Image viewer icon.



Effects/Downloads: provides access to pre-installed and downloaded effects. Default effects include: No effect, Vignette, Grayscale, Sepia, Vintage, Faded color, Turquoise, Tint, Cartoon, Moody, Rugged, Oil pastel, and Fisheye.



Camcorder button: shoots a video when pressed.



Camera button: takes a photo when pressed in Camera mode.



Mode button: allows you to select from different camera modes.

Taking Dual Camera Photos

With the Dual Camera feature, you can take a picture with both the front and rear cameras at the same time.

To take a Dual Camera picture:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - → 💽 Camera.
- Touch Dual Camera located at the top left side of the screen. The camera viewfinder displays an image from the front-facing camera within a mini picture frame on top of the main image displayed from the rear-facing camera.
- **3.** Touch **Camera** until the shutter sounds.

To resize the front camera image:

 Touch and hold the mini picture frame until the resize handles appear, then drag a corner to enlarge the image.

To reposition the front camera image:

Touch and hold the mini picture frame to detach it and then place it in a desired location.

Camera and Camcorder Settings

This section describes the different settings that you can configure on your camera. Not all of the following options are available in both still camera and video camera modes. The available options vary by mode.

- 1. From the Home scr<u>een, touch</u> \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - → 💽 Camera → 🚺 Quick Settings →

2. The follow settings are located under the Camera, Camcorder, and General tabs. The settings that are displayed will depend on what camera mode you are in.

Camera:

- **Photo size**: Select a resolution for photos. Use higher resolution for higher quality. Higher resolution photos take up more memory.
- Burst shot: allows several photographs to be captured in quick succession by touching and holding the Camera button.
- Face detection: allows you to adjust the camera focus based on face detection technology.
- Metering: allows you to set how the camera measures or meters the light source: Center-weighted, Matrix, or Spot.
- ISO: determines how sensitive the light meter is on your digital camera. Choose from Auto, 100, 200, 400, or 800. Use a lower ISO number to make your camera less sensitive to light, a higher ISO number to take photos with less light, or Auto to let the camera automatically adjust the ISO for each of your shots.
- Anti-shake: compensates for camera movement.

- Auto night detection: activates or deactivates the night detection feature.
- Save as: allows you to assign rich tone usage to an image. Camcorder:
- Video size: Select a resolution for videos. Use higher resolution for higher quality. Higher resolution videos take up more memory.
- Video stabilization: Activate or deactivate Optical Image Stabilization.

Settings:

- Location tag: attach a GPS location tag to the photo. To improve GPS signals, avoid shooting in locations where the signal may be obstructed, such as between buildings or in lowlying areas, or in poor weather conditions. Your location may appear on your photos when you upload them to the Internet. To avoid this, deactivate the GPS tag setting.
- **Review**: set this option if you want to view each picture after you take it. Select a time value.
- Volume key: assigns a function to the volume key. Choose from The zoom key, The camera key, or The record key.

- **Timer**: Use this for delayed-time shots. You can set the timer to Off, 2 sec, 5 sec, or 10 sec.
- White balance: Select an appropriate white balance, so images have a true-to-life color range. The settings are designed for specific lighting situations. These settings are similar to the heat range for white-balance exposure in professional cameras.
- Exposure value: allows you to adjust the brightness level by moving the slider.
- **Guidelines**: Display viewfinder guides to help composition when selecting subjects.
- Flash: activate or deactivate the flash.
- Voice control: activates/deactivates voice control feature that allows you to verbally take a photo.
- Contextual filename: allows you to have your location added as part of the filename. You must first activate GPS tag described above.
- Save as flipped: when set to On, this option allows you to take and save a mirror-image video when using self-recording mode.
- Storage: Select the memory location for storage.

- Shutter sound: Turn the shutter sound on or off.
- Reset: Reset the camera settings.

Launching the Camcorder

- Tip: When shooting video in direct sunlight or in bright conditions, it is recommended that you provide your subject with sufficient light by having the light source behind you.
- **Note:** The camera may not be able to properly record videos to a memory card with a slow transfer speed.
 - Using the camera's main display screen as a viewfinder, adjust the image by aiming the camcorder at the subject.
 - Before you take a video, use the Volume control buttons to zoom in or out. You can magnify the video up to x4 (400 percent).

- Note: Use either the Up and Down volume keys or spread/ pinch the screen to zoom in or out. For more information, refer to *"Navigating Through the Screens"* on page 40
 - **4.** Touch the Video key () to begin shooting video. The red light will blink while recording.
 - Touch anywhere on the screen to re-focus the camera on that object. The camcorder auto-focuses on the new target area.
 - 6. To capture an image from the video while recording, touch (a). This feature is not available while the anti-shake feature is activated.
 - Touch the Stop key () to stop the recording and save the video file to your Camera folder. - or –

Touch the Pause key (()) to pause the recording.

- Once the file has been saved, touch the image viewer, then touch (Play) to playback your video for review.
- 9. Press \leq to return to the viewer.

Accessing Videos

When you shoot a video, the file is saved in the Camera folder. You can view your videos immediately or view them anytime in the Camera folder.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps \rightarrow \blacksquare Gallery.
- 2. Select a folder location and touch a video icon to begin video playback.
- Touch (Play) to begin video playback.
 or -

Touch and hold the video icon from the main Gallery to select the video (indicated by a colored border) and display the following video menu context options:

- Share via : allows you to share the video via ChatON, Add to Dropbox, Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, Google+, Messaging, Picasa, Wi-Fi Direct, or YouTube.
- Delete : allows you to delete the current video. Choose either OK or Cancel.

– or –

Touch and hold a listed video file to place a checkmark alongside and then press real for additional options:

- Slideshow: allows you to see your files in a slideshow or access the slideshow settings.
- Copy: allows you to create a duplicate of the currently selected file.
- Move: allows you to move a selected file to a new location.
- Hide items: allows you to hide selected items.
- Show hidden items: allows you to show selected items that were previously hidden.
- Rename: allows you to rename the filename of the currently selected video.
- Details: displays video file information.

– or –

With the video displayed on-screen (but not playing), press real for additional options:

- Favorite: tags the current video as a favorite file.
- Slideshow: allows you to see your files in a slideshow or access the slideshow settings.

- Rename: allows you to rename the filename of the currently selected video.
- Details: displays video file information.
- Settings: provide access to the Galley settings page. From this
 page you can configure the SNS data management, Tags, and
 Sound & shot.

Sharing Pictures

Pictures are the best way of remembering the moment, but an even better treat is to share them with others.

Two new features allow you to either instantly share a series of pictures as they are taken or quickly share a picture without using email or messaging.

 Share Shot is a great way to instantly share a series of pictures among a group of users. The best example for this feature is having multiple users instantly sharing each others pictures at a company or family gathering. As each person takes a separate picture with their own device, they are all pooled together and instantly appear in each user's Gallery.

No more "Email your pictures to me later". Each person walks out of the event with all the pictures taken by everyone.

This method of image transfer requires that both devices have Wi-Fi Direct active and be paired prior to use.

Note: You can only share a shot with other external users who also have their Wi-Fi Direct feature active.

Enabling Share Shot

Share shot is a Wi-Fi Direct group sharing feature where multiple users can Wi-Fi connect their devices and then all share each others pictures in real-time. This is really useful in group events (ex: family gathering or company party) where you don't want to have to email everyone later and make sure you all can share your pics at a later date.

For more information, refer to *"Wi-Fi Direct Setup and Settings"* on page 247

The general process is:

- Enable Wi-Fi Direct communication
- Pair your device with other users
- Enable Share shot

To enable Wi-Fi Direct:

Important! The target device must already be connected to the same Wi-Fi and have its Wi-Fi Direct feature active and scanning before you can your pairing.

1. From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow



Settings \rightarrow Connections tab.

- 2. Touch and slide the Wi-Fi slider to the right to turn it on. The slider color indicates the activation status.
- 3. Touch Wi-Fi Direct.
- Touch Scan and select the single device name to begin the connection process to another Wi-Fi Direct compatible device.

– or –

Touch **Multi-connect** \rightarrow **Scan** and select all the device names to begin the connection process to these Wi-Fi Direct compatible devices.

- Note: The target device must also have Wi-Fi Direct service active and running before it can be detected by your device.
 - Touch Done. The direct connection is then established. Confirm appears in the Status bar.
 - When prompted to complete the connection, the recipient should touch OK. Your status field now reads "Connected" and your connected device is listed within the Wi-Fi Direct devices listing.

 Each partner (including yourself) must then touch Accept to consent to the new Wi-Fi Direct pairing.

To enable Share shot on Camera:

- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Apps
 → O Camera → Ouck Settings → Correct Share → Share shot.
- If you are prompted to activate your Wi-Fi Direct connection, touch **0K** and follow the activation procedures for Wi-Fi Direct.

To configure your Share Shot options:

- 1. Confirm the Share Shot viewfinder is active (
- Touch
 (Devices for sharing with) to display list of current share shot participants.
 - Stop sharing images with select participants by touching the entry and removing the green check mark.
- 3. Touch (Shooting modes) to regain access to the Share menu.
- Touch → Off to disable share shot while maintaining a Wi-Fi Direct connection.

To take share shot images:

- 1. Touch (Camera) until the shutter sounds.
- From the Home screen, touch Apps → (Gallery) to locate your newly shot images located in their default storage location.
 - External users will be able to locate their images in either a downloaded or **RECV** (received) folder.
- Confirm D (Share shot images delivered/received) appears in the Notifications area of the screen.

Using S Beam to Share Pictures

This feature (when activated via NFC) allows you to beam large files directly to another compatible device that is in direct contact. These files can be larger, such as Videos, HD pictures, and other large files.You can beam images and videos from your gallery, music files from your music player, and more.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow
 - Settings → Connections tab.
- 2. If not already active, in a single motion touch and slide the NFC slider to the right to turn it on.
- 3. Touch S Beam and make sure the feature is turned on.
- 4. If not already active, in a single motion touch and slide the **S Beam** slider to the right to turn it on.
- On the source device (containing the desired image or video), touch Apps → Gallery.
- Locate and touch the selected image to open it in the preview window.

Important! Neither device must be in Lock mode or displaying the Lock screen. They must both be active and unlocked. It is recommended that the target device be on the Home screen.

- 7. Place the two active NFC-enabled devices back to back to begin.
- Note: If the Touch to beam screen does not appear on the source device:
 - Pull them apart
 - Verify the image is visible in the preview window on the source device (providing the file)
 - Place them together again
 - 8. From the **Touch to beam** screen, touch the reduced image preview to begin the transfer. After a few seconds (depending on file size) the recipient with then see the transferred file displayed on their screen.

Taking a Screen Shot

Also known as a screen capture, this feature allows you to mimic the print screen function on most computers.

- 2. In a single motion touch and slide the **Palm motion** slider to the right to turn it on.
- 3. Read the on-screen notification and touch OK.

Note: At least one feature must be activated before Palm motion can be activated.

- **4.** In a single motion, slide a feature's activation slider to the on position.
- 5. With the current screen showing the desired image, in a single motion, place the side of your palm along the one side of the device and then slowly swipe it in the opposite direction over the screen.

ChatON

Provides a global service where you can chat with more than 2 buddies using a group chat. Share things such as pictures, videos, animation messages (Scribbles), audio, Contacts, Calendar entries, and Location information.

Important! Your Samsung account manages the access information (username/password) to several applications, such as AllShare Play, ChatON, and Media Hub.

Chrome

Clock

The Clock application includes these features:

- Alarm: Create alarms to go off once, or to repeat.
- World clock: Display the time and date in any time zone.
- Stopwatch: Record lap times.
- Timer: Measure elapsed time.
- Desk clock: Choose whether the clock calendar and weather displays, and what outputs are active, when you connect your phone to an optional dock.
 - From the Home screen, touch \square Menu → \square Apps → \bigcirc Clock.

Alarm

This feature lets you set an alarm to ring at a specific time.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - → \bigotimes Clock → Alarm → Create alarm. The following options are available:
- 2. Use the arrow symbols to enter adjust the hour, and minutes, then touch **AM** or **PM** (toggles depending on which was last selected).
- Touch the Alarm repeat field and touch the number of times you want this alarm to repeat. Selections are: day blocks or Repeat Weekly. Selected day blocks turn blue when active.
- 4. Tap the Alarm type field and select one of the following: Melody, Vibration, Vibration and melody, or Briefing.
- Tap the Alarm tone field and either select an available tone or select Add to use locate a sound to use as an alarm ringtone. Tap OK to activate the ringtone.
- 6. Slide the slider bar left or right in the Alarm volume field to decrease or increase the alarm volume. A sample of the volume level plays.

- **7.** Touch the slider next to one of the following options to activate the option:
 - Location alarm: When activated, the alarm only sounds when you are at a specific location. Touch and slide the slider to the right to turn it on the normal then follow the on-screen instructions to enter a location.
 - Snooze: Use this option to set Snooze Interval (3, 5, 10, 15, or 30 Minutes) and Snooze repeat (1, 2, 3, 5, or 10 Times). Touch the ON/OFF slider to activate.
 - Smart alarm: Tracks body movements and calculates the best time for sounding the alarm. Place the phone somewhere on your bed then the phone's movement sensor (also known as accelerometer) is sensitive enough to work from any part of the bed. Set the Interval and the Tone. Touch the ON/OFF slider to activate.
- 8. Touch Name to set a specific name for the alarm. The name displays on the screen when the alarm activates.

Turning Off an Alarm

Touch and slide x ... any direction to stop an alarm when it sounds.

Setting the Snooze Feature

Deleting Alarms

To delete multiple alarms, follow these steps:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps

World Clock

Stopwatch

You can use this option to measure intervals of time.

- 2. Touch Start to start the stopwatch and touch Lap to mark a unit of time per lap.
- 3. Touch Stop to stop the stopwatch.
- Touch Restart to continue or touch Reset to erase all times recorded.

Timer

You can use this option to set a countdown timer. Use a timer to count down to an event based on a preset time length (hours, minutes, and seconds).

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow \blacksquare Apps
 - \rightarrow \bigcirc Clock \rightarrow Timer.

Desk clock

 Settings: provides access to the Desk clock settings menu from where you can alter the following: Hide status bar, Wallpaper, Calendar, Weather, and Dock.

Contacts lets you access and manage your Contacts list, Contacts Groups, Favorites list, and Speed dial settings (see *"Contacts"* on page 53).

Editing a Photo

Save: stores the currently edited photo.



Rotate: allows you to rotate a photo in all 4 directions. You can also mirror image a photo.



Crop: allows you to crop (cut-out) an area of a photo.

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Color: allows you to Auto adjust color, Brightness, Contrast, Saturation, Adjust RGB, Temperature, Exposure, and Hue of a photo.

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Effects: allows you to add various effects to your photo.

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Portrait: allows you to apply various face correction effects such as: Redeye fix, Airbrush face, Face brightness, Out-of-focus, Beauty face, Face reshaping, or Spot healing.

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Sticker: allows you to place various pre-created on-screen stickers atop your current image.



Drawing: allows you to add draw directly on your current picture by using either a brush/pen or eraser.



Frame: places a pre-created border style atop your current image.

- 6. Press = to access the following options:
 - Save as: allows you to rename your current image and save it to your gallery.
 - Select image: allows you to select a new image for editing.
 - Take picture: allows you to activate the camera and take a new image for editing.
 - Share via: allows you to share your saved photo via Add to Dropbox, Bluetooth, ChatON, Email, Flipboard, Gmail, Google+, Group Play, Hangouts, Messaging, Picasa, S Memo, or Wi-Fi Direct.
 - Set as: assigns the currently saved image as either a: Contact photo, Home and lock screens, Home screen, or Lock screen.

Viewing Videos

- 2. Select an album. A matrix or list of available videos displays.
- 3. To play a video, touch its thumbnail or list entry.
- 4. While viewing a video, touch on the screen for options:
 - Touch 🧱 Gallery to return to the album view.
 - Touch Share to send the picture using ChatON, Bluetooth, Dropbox, Email, Gmail, Google+, Messaging, Picasa, Wi-Fi Direct, or YouTube.
 - Touch \swarrow Trim to remove selected frames from the video.
 - Touch III Delete to erase the picture.
 - Touch
 Menu for the following additional options:
 - Favorite: Add this video to your Favorites.
 - Rename: Change the video's filename.
 - Scan for nearby devices: Scan for in-range devices that can be connected with and sent the current image.
 - Details: View information about the video.

 Settings: Select an Account for synchronization, enable/disable Sync only via Wi-Fi, turn Tag Buddy ON or OFF, and/or enable/ disable Face tag.

Replays the current list when the list ends.

Shuffles the current list of songs randomly.

Songs play in order and are not shuffled.

Lists the current playlist songs.

Returns the user to the music category screen.



Assign the current song as a Favorite.

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Streams the current music file to another device via Samsung Link.

To access additional options, follow these steps:

- - Via Bluetooth: Scans for devices and pairs with a Bluetooth headset.
 - Delete: Allows you to delete songs or albums.
 - Search: Search the phone for music files.
 - Scan for nearby devices: Search for nearby Wi-Fi devices for sharing your music (available when Wi-Fi is turned On). (For more information, refer to "Turning Wi-Fi On" on page 138.)
 - Settings: Change your Music Player settings. For more information, refer to "Music Player Settings" on page 121.
 - End: Close the Music Player app.

Music Player Settings

The Music Player Settings menu allows you to set preferences for the music player such as whether you want the music to play in the background, sound effects, and how the music menu displays.

- While in Music playback, touch ■ Menu → Settings. The follow settings are available:

 - **SoundAlive**: Set a type of equalization such as Normal, Pop, Rock, Jazz, Dance, Classic, etc.
 - Adapt Sound: Adjust the sound playback characteristics to match your headphones.
 - **Play speed**: Set the play speed anywhere between 0.5X and 2.0X using the slider.
 - Music auto off: When activated, music will automatically turn off after a set interval.

- Lyrics: When activated, the lyrics of the song are displayed if available.
- Smart volume: When enabled, automatically adjusts volume of each track to a common level.
- Voice control: When enabled, you can use voice commands to control music playback.

Using Playlists

Playlists are used to assign songs to a list of preferred media which can then be grouped into a list for later playback. These Playlists can be created via either the handset's Music Player options menu or from within a 3rd party music application (such as Windows Media Player) and then downloaded to the handset.

Creating a Playlist

- 2. Touch the Playlists tab.
- 4. Enter a name for this playlist in the field and touch OK.

Adding Music to a Playlist

To add files to the playlist:

- 2. Touch the Playlists tab.
- 3. Touch the playlist name in which to add music.
- 4. Touch + Add music.

Removing Music from a Playlist

Muve Music

Create playlists, Ringtones and more, and edit them all right on the phone. Browse or download playlists and share music with your friends.

Section 7: Connections

Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that provides access to local area networks.

Wi-Fi communication requires access to an existing Wi-Fi network. Wi-Fi networks can be Open (unsecured), or Secured (requiring you to provide login credentials).

Your phone supports the 802.11 a/b/g/n Wi-Fi protocols.

Configuring Wi-Fi Settings

Configure your phone's Wi-Fi settings. (For more information, see "Wi-Fi Settings" on page 154.)

Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your phone automatically searches for available, in-range "hotspots" [also termed WAPs (Wireless Access Points)].

Turning Wi-Fi On

- 1. From the top of the Home screen, sweep your finger downward to display the Notifications screen.
- At the top of the Notifications screen, touch Wi-Fi to turn Wi-Fi On.

– or –

From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab → Wi-Fi
 OFF

Turning Wi-Fi Off

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow
 - or Settings \rightarrow Connections tab \rightarrow Wi-Fi .
- 2. Touch and slide the Wi-Fi slider to turn it Off.

Scanning and Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network

- Turn Wi-Fi on (see *"Turning Wi-Fi On"* on page 138). Your phone scans for available hotspots and pops-up a list of any it finds.
- 2. To connect to a hotspot, touch it on the pop-up list.
 - If the Wi-Fi network is open, you will be automatically connected.
 - If the Wi-Fi network is secured, enter the password at the prompt to connect.

Adding a Wi-Fi Network Manually

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow
 - Settings → $\boxed{\bigcirc}$ Connections tab → Wi-Fi.
- The Wi-Fi options screen displays. (For more information, refer to "Accessing Settings" on page 151.)
- 3. Touch Wi-Fi OFF to turn on Wi-Fi.
- 4. Touch Add Wi-Fi network, then enter the following values:
 - Network SSID: Enter the name of the WAP (Wireless Access Point).
 - Security: Select the type of security used by the WAP.

• Password: If the WAP is secured, enter the password or key.

5. Tap Connect.

Wi-Fi Direct

Wi-Fi Direct allows devices to connect to each other directly via Wi-Fi, without a Wi-Fi network or hotspot, and without having to set up the connection. For example, some printers support Wi-Fi Direct, and you could print from your phone via Wi-Fi Direct.

Establishing Wi-Fi Direct Connections

Settings \rightarrow Connections tab \rightarrow Wi-Fi.

2. Touch Wi-Fi Direct.

The Wi-Fi Direct screen displays, and your phone scans for available Wi-Fi Direct devices and lists them under Available devices.

- 3. To connect to a single Wi-Fi Direct device, touch its name in the list.
- 4. To connect to multiple Wi-Fi Direct devices, touch Multi-connect, next touch Select all or individual devices, then touch Done.

Bluetooth

Note: For Hearing Aid Compatibility Information, see page 211.

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology for exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet.

You don't need to line up the devices to send information with Bluetooth. If the devices are in range, you can exchange information between them, even if they are in different rooms.

Configuring Bluetooth Settings

Configure your phone's Bluetooth settings. For more information, see "Bluetooth settings" on page 157.

Note: Bluetooth profiles are specifications for services supported by individual devices. For a list of profiles your phone supports, see "Bluetooth profiles" on page 156.

Turning Bluetooth On or Off

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow

 \bigcirc Settings \rightarrow \bigcirc Connections tab.

2. Touch and slide the Bluetooth OFF slider to turn it 0n.

- or -

From the Home screen, sweep your finger from the top of the screen downward to display Notifications.

- Touch Bluetooth to turn Bluetooth On.
- Touch Relation Bluetooth to turn Bluetooth Off.

Pairing with a Bluetooth Device

Search for a Bluetooth device and pair with it. to exchange information between your phone and the device.

After pairing, your phone and the target device will connect with each other and exchange information without a passcode or PIN.

- Note: When connected, the 🔊 Bluetooth connected icon displays in the Status Bar. If you receive a new request for connection while connected with a Bluetooth headset, a new Bluetooth icon displays at the left of the Status bar and Notifications displays the connection request.
 - 1. Activate the target device's discoverable mode.
 - From the Bluetooth settings page, tap the Visibility field 2. (shown by the device name). The device must be visible to pair with an external device.
 - 3. Tap Scan. Your device displays a list of discovered inrange Bluetooth devices.
 - 4. Tap a device from the list to initiate pairing.
 - 5. Enter the passkey or PIN code, if needed, and tap **OK**.
 - 6. The external device must accept the connection and enter your device's PIN code.
- Tip: Some devices use a default passcode of 0000. Refer to the target device's user manual for more information.

 When prompted to connect with the target device, touch OK to complete the connection, touch Cancel to retain the pairing only.

Enable Downloading for Web Applications

Important! Before you can download a web application you must insert an SD into the phone and enable the Unknown sources feature (enables downloading).

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Or Settings → Connections tab → More →
 Security → Unknown sources check box.
- Tap OK to allow install of non-Play Store applications. Tap again to remove the check mark and disable the installation of non-Play Store applications.

Warning! Not all web applications are safe to download. In order to protect your phone and data, use the Play Store to install web applications.

VPN

You can use your phone's VPN (Virtual Private Network) feature to connect to VPNs.

- 2. Enter a password for credential storage.
- **3.** Touch a VPN and follow any prompts to access the network.

PC Connections

You can connect your device to a PC using an optional PC data cable using various USB connection modes.

Media device (MTP): allows you to transfer media files in Windows, or using an Android file transfer on a Mac.

Camera (PTP): allows you to transfer photos using the camera software, and transfer any files onto a PC that does not support MTP.

Note: To sync your device to your computer it is highly recommended that you install Samsung Kies which is available at http://www.samsung.com/kies (for Windows/ Mac).

If you are a Windows XP user, ensure that you have Windows XP Service Pack 3 or higher installed on your computer. Also, ensure that you have Samsung Kies 2.0 or Windows Media Player 10 or higher installed on your computer.

Connecting as a Storage Device

You can connect your device to a personal computer, have your device appear as a removable disk, and access your device's file directory. If you insert a memory card in the device, you can also access the files directory on the memory card by using the device as a memory card reader.

Note: The file directory of the memory card displays as a removable disk, separate from the internal memory.

- Connect the USB cable to the device and connect the cable to the computer. After a few seconds, a pop-up displays on the PC.
- 2. Open the folder to view files.
- 3. Copy files from the PC to the memory card.

Tethering

Use Tethering to share your phone's internet connection with a computer that connects to your device via USB cable, or by Bluetooth.

1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow

Settings \rightarrow **Event** Connections tab \rightarrow More networks \rightarrow Tethering and portable hotspot. The Tethering and portable hotspot screen displays.

- 2. Choose a tethering method:
 - **USB tethering**: Connect the computer to the phone via USB cable, then touch **USB Tethering** to turn tethering On or Off. When On, a check displays in the check box.
 - Bluetooth tethering: Pair your phone with the computer via Bluetooth. Consult the computer's documentation for more information about configuring your computer to pair via Bluetooth. Touch Bluetooth Tethering to turn tethering On or Off. When On, a check displays in the check box.
 - **Help**: Provides helpful Portable Wi-Fi hotspot, USB tethering, and Bluetooth tethering information.

Note: Using Tethering requires a subscription to your Wireless Provider's mobile data service.

To connect using USB Tethering:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch \blacksquare Menu \rightarrow
 - Settings \rightarrow Connections tab \rightarrow More networks \rightarrow Tethering and portable hotspot.
- 2. Plug in the USB cable between your computer and your device.
- 3. Tap USB tethering from the Tethering menu. This places a green check mark next to the entry and activates the feature. A Tethering or HotSpot active notification briefly appears on the screen.
- 4. Read the on-screen notification regarding data use and tap **OK**.

Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot

Use Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot to share your phone's internet connection with a PC or other device through Wi-Fi, using your phone as the mobile hotspot.

Note: Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot requires a subscription to the applicable service to use the application.

Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot consumes battery power and uses data service. While the Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot is active, your phone's applications will use the Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot data feature allowance.

Configuring Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot Settings

Configure your phone's Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot settings, including your phone's name and password, and set the visibility of your phone's Wi-Fi hotspot.

Tip: By default, your device's mobile hotspot has no security applied, and any device can connect. (For more information about configuring your mobile hotspot, see *"Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot"* on page 161.)

Activating Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot

Activate your phone's Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot application to allow other devices to use your phone's internet connection.

- 2. Touch Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot OFF and follow the prompts to turn Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot On.

Connecting a Device via Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot

Use the other device's Wi-Fi control to connect to your phone's Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot.

- Activate Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot on your phone. (For more information, see "Activating Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot" on page 145.)
- 2. Activate Wi-Fi on the other device, using that device's Wi-Fi control.
- Scan for Wi-Fi hotspots, and select your phone from the list. (To find your phone's name, see "Configuring Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot" on page 162.)
- 4. At the prompt, enter your phone's Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot password.

By default, the password is your phone's telephone number. (For information on changing your phone's Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot password, see *"Configuring Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot"* on page 162.)

Beaming

NFC

NFC (Near Field Communication) allows data exchange when you touch your device with another compatible device. This is used for applications such as Android Beam and S Beam.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab.
- 2. Touch the NFC OFF slider to enable or disable NFC.

Note: NFC must be turned on to use Android Beam or S Beam.

Android Beam

When Android Beam is activated, you can beam application content to another NFC-capable device by holding the devices close together. You can beam browser pages, YouTube videos, contacts, and more.

Turning Android Beam On or Off

- From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab.
- 2. Turn NFC ON. (For more information, see "NFC".)
- 3. Touch NFC.
 - Touch the **Android Beam** slider **OFF** to turn Android Beam ON.
 - Touch the Android Beam slider to turn Android Beam OFF.

Using Android Beam

- 1. Turn Android Beam ON. (See "Turning Android Beam On or Off" on page 147.)
- Launch the desired feature or application or browse to the desired web page (See "Applications and Widgets" on page 86.)
- 3. Place your phone back-to-back with the device to receive your "beamed" content, then touch the screen on your phone. The receiving device prompts the user to accept your "beamed" content.
- Once the user of the receiving device accepts your "beamed" content, it displays on the screen of that device.

S Beam

When S Beam is activated, you can beam files to another NFC-capable device by holding the devices close together. You can beam images and videos from your gallery, music files from your music player, and more.

Turning S Beam On or Off

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow Settings → 🥵 Connections tab.
- 2. Under Connect and Share, touch NFC OFF to enable NFC, NFC must be enabled to use S Beam. When enabled, a check mark displays in the check box.
- 3. Touch S Beam OFF to turn S Beam On. or touch S Beam to turn S Beam Off.

Using S Beam

- 1. Turn S Beam On. (See "Turning S Beam On or Off".)
- 2. Launch 📷 Camera, 💽 Music, or 💥 Gallery (see "Applications and Widgets" on page 86). When using Gallery, you can select multiple files to S Beam.
- 3. Place your phone back-to-back with the device to receive your "beamed" content, then touch the screen on your phone. The receiving device prompts the user to accept your "beamed" content.
- 4. Once the user of the receiving device accepts your "beamed" content, it displays on the screen of that device.

Nearby devices

Share files with nearby DLNA certified devices over Wi-Fi. (For information on configuring Nearby devices, For more information, refer to *"Nearby devices"* on page 166.)

- Note: To use Nearby devices for sharing, you must have set up a connection with another Wi-Fi device that supports DLNA.
 - Connect your phone and another DLNA certified device to the same Wi-Fi network. (For more information, refer to "Wi-Fi" on page 138.)
 - 2. On your phone press → Home, then touch → Menu → Settings → Connections.
 - Touch Nearby devices. The Nearby devices screen displays.
 - Touch File sharing to turn file sharing via DLNA On or Off. When On, a check mark displays in the check box.

Screen Mirroring

Screen Mirroring lets your phone share the contents of its display with other Digital Living Network Alliance (DLNA) certified devices, such as Smart televisions.

- Note: To view more information about DLNA certified products visit http://www.dlna.org/home.
 - Connect your phone and another DLNA certified device to the same Wi-Fi network. (For more information, refer to "Wi-Fi" on page 138.)
 - 2. On your phone press → Home, then touch → Menu → Settings → Connections.
 - 3. If not already on, tap the Screen Mirroring and then move the slider to the right to turn it on. The slider color indicates the activation status.
 - Touch the desired device to establish a connection. You can now view the contents of your phone's display on the connected device.

Memory Card

Your phone supports removable microSD[™] or microSDHC[™] memory cards of up to 64GB capacity, for storage of music, pictures, videos, and other files.

Installing and Removing a Memory Card

(For more information about installing and removing a memory card, see *"Installing a Memory Card"* on page 7.)

Important! To prevent damage to information stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the phone.

Formatting a Memory Card

Use the Erase SD card setting to remove all content from an installed memory card.

My device: Lock screen, Display, LED indicator, Sound, Home screen mode, Call, Blocking mode, Hands-free mode, Power saving mode, Accessory, Accessibility, Language and input, Motions and gestures, Smart screen, Air view, and Voice control.

- Accounts: My accounts (Dropbox, Google, ~ Samsung account, and Add account) and Backup Accounts options (Cloud and Backup and reset).
 - More: Location services, Security, Application •••• manager, Battery, Storage, Date and time, and More About device.

Using Setting Sliders

To enable or disable a setting, touch the setting slider as shown.

Connections

To access your phone's Connections settings:

Wi-Fi

Set up and manage your phone's connections to Wi-Fi networks. Your phone supports Wi-Fi a/b/g/n.

Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

Turn your phone's Wi-Fi service on or off. When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your phone automatically searches for nearby available Wi-Fi networks.

Tip: When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your phone automatically searches for available networks and displays them. You can also turn Wi-Fi On or Off from the Notifications

panel.

Wi-Fi Settings

Configure and manage connections to Wi-Fi access points.

Settings \rightarrow Connections tab \rightarrow Wi-Fi. The Wi-Fi options screen displays.

- 2. Touch options to configure:
 - Add Wi-Fi network: Connect to a new Wi-Fi network (see "Adding a Wi-Fi Network Manually" on page 139).
 - Scan: Search for available Wi-Fi networks.
 - Wi-Fi Direct: Access Wi-Fi Direct settings (see "Wi-Fi Direct" on page 155.)
- Touch
 Menu to access the following additional options:
 - Advanced: View and configure your phone's Advanced Wi-Fi settings.
 - WPS push button: Record/send the signal from the Wi-Fi Protected Set-up push button on your Wi-Fi router.
 - WPS PIN entry: Record/send the Wi-Fi Protected Set-up Personal Identification Number for your Wi-Fi router.
 - **Help**: Provides on-line assistance to perform Wi-Fi interface tasks.

Advanced Wi-Fi settings

- 2. Configure settings:
 - Network notification: When enabled, your phone notifies you of nearby Wi-Fi networks when you launch a high data-usage application.
 - **Passpoint**: When set to ON, your phone automatically connects to passpoint-enabled hotspots.
 - Sort by: allows you to sort by alphabet or Signal strength.
 - Keep Wi-Fi on during sleep: Specify when to switch from Wi-Fi to mobile data for data communications, when the phone goes to sleep (when the backlight goes out). This setting can affect your data usage, and the behavior of devices you connect to your phone, such as when tethering or using Mobile Hotspot.
 - Always allow scanning: Allows the Google location service and other apps to scan for networks, even when Wi-Fi is turned off.

- Auto network switch: Allows the device to automatically switch between a Wi-Fi network or a cellular network.
- Install certificates: Allows you to install security certificates
- that you have on a MicroSD card.
- MAC address: (Not configurable) View your phone's MAC address, needed for connecting to some secured networks (only shows when Wi-Fi is active).
- **IP address**: (Not configurable) View your phone's IP address (only shows when connected to a Wi-Fi network).

Wi-Fi Direct

Wi-Fi Direct allows devices to connect to each other directly via Wi-Fi, without a Wi-Fi network or hotspot, and without having to set up the connection. For example, some printers support Wi-Fi Direct, and you could print from your phone via Wi-Fi Direct.

Turning Wi-Fi Direct On or Off

■ From the Home screen, touch ■ Menu →
Osettings →
Connections tab → Wi-Fi →
Wi-Fi Direct.

The **Wi-Fi Direct** screen displays, and your phone scans for available Wi-Fi Direct devices and lists them under **Available devices**.

Bluetooth

Your phone supports $\mathsf{Bluetooth}^{\mathbb{R}}$ 4.0.

Bluetooth profiles

Bluetooth profiles are specifications for services supported by individual devices. Profiles improve the ability of different devices to work together. Your phone supports these Bluetooth profiles:

- Headset: HSP v1.2 profile supports use of compatible Bluetooth headsets for mono voice.
- Handsfree: HFP v1.5 profile supports Bluetooth headsets, and may also support other compatible Bluetooth devices with speakerphone capabilities.
- Stereo: A2DP v1.2, AVRCP v1.0, GAVDP 1.2, AVCTP 1.3 and AVDTP 1.2 profiles support delivery of stereo audio to compatible Bluetooth devices.
- Object Exchange: OPP v1.0 profile allows sending and receiving of contact name cards (vCard 2.1) and calendar events (vCalendar) between devices. PBAP v1.2 supports exchange of Phone Book Objects.
- Human Interface Devices: HID v1.0 profile supports certain interface devices.

- Personal Area Networking: PAN 1.0 supports exchange of data with other devices.
- Message Access Profile: MAP 1.0 allows exchange of messages between devices, such as with an automotive hands-free device.

Turning Bluetooth On or Off

Turn Bluetooth On:

■ From the Home screen, touch Menu →
O Settings → Connections tab → Bluetooth OFF

Turn Bluetooth Off:

From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab → Bluetooth

Tip: You can also turn Bluetooth On or Off at the Notifications Panel.

Bluetooth settings

Pair and connect with other Bluetooth devices, manage your Bluetooth connections, and control your device's visibility to other devices.

Note: Bluetooth must be turned On to access Bluetooth settings.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch \square Menu \rightarrow
 - **Settings** \rightarrow **Settings** \rightarrow **Bluetooth**.
- 2. Touch a setting to configure Bluetooth:
 - Touch Bluetooth OFF to turn Bluetooth On, or touch Bluetooth OFF. to turn Bluetooth Off.
 - Under My device, touch your phone's name to enable/disable its visibility to other devices' Bluetooth searches. Available when Bluetooth is ON.
 - Touch Scan to search for visible Bluetooth devices. Touch a detected device to pair with it (see "Pairing with a Bluetooth Device" on page 141).

- Touch **Menu** to access the following options:
 - Visibility timeout: Select how long your phone will remain visible to other devices.
 - Received files: Lists files received from other devices over Bluetooth connections.
 - Help: Provides on-line instructions for using your phone's Bluetooth interface.


Data usage

Control your device's connection to your Wireless Provider's data service, and monitor your data usage.

Setting a mobile data limit

Setting a mobile data limit causes your phone to automatically disable the Mobile data connection when the limit is reached. You can set a warning threshold, to have your device alert you when data usage nears your set limit.

Data usage is measure by your device, and your service provider may account for usage differently, so you may want to consider using a conservative limit. Contact your service provider for more information on actual data usage. From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab →
 Data usage. The Data usage screen displays.



2. Touch Mobile data to enable it.

- 3. Touch Set mobile data limit to enable the limit. A red limit line displays in the Data usage screen.
- Touch and drag the vertical usage cycle lines left or right on the graph to adjust the mobile Data usage cycle.
- Touch and drag the horizontal warning line up or down on the graph to adjust the mobile data usage warning level.
- 6. Touch and drag the horizontal **limit** line up or down on the graph to adjust the mobile data usage limit level.

Viewing data usage by app or process

- Scroll down the page to see the top three processes or apps using mobile data service. Touch a process or app to see data usage for the process or app, and to configure specific settings.



More Wireless and Network Settings Airplane mode

When airplane mode is enabled, all your phone's wireless connections are disabled, and you cannot make or receive calls [except for Emergency (E911) calls] or messages. You can, however, make Wi-Fi and Bluetooth connections.

While in airplane mode, you can use other features of your phone, such as playing music, watching videos, or using other applications.

From the Home screen, touch Menu →
Settings → Connections tab → More networks → Airplane mode to enable or disable airplane mode.

Mobile networks

Set options for network selection, data service, and roaming behavior.

- 2. Set these options:
 - Mobile data: Enable or disable your phone's connection to the mobile data network.

Tip: You can also enable or disable Mobile data at the Notifications panel. (For more information, refer to "Notifications" on page 32.)

 Data roaming: Enable or disable connection to data services when your device is roaming on another network. (For more information about roaming, see "Roaming" on page 16.)

- Network mode: Configure roaming for CDMA, LTE, and EV-DO networks.
 - LTE/CDMA: Lets your phone automatically access LTE, CDMA, and/or EV-DO mobile networks when available.
 - CDMA: Restricts your phone to CDMA mobile networks.
- System select: Configure CDMA roaming mode.
 - Home only: Restricts your phone to your Wireless Provider's network.
 - Automatic: Permits your phone to automatically roam to networks other than that provided by your Wireless Provider.

Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot

Use Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot to share your phone's internet connection with up to 5 other devices, through Wi-Fi.

You can control whether devices connect to your Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot with the Allowed device list.

(For more information about using your phone as a mobile hotspot, see *"Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot"* on page 145.)

Note: Using Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot requires a subscription to data service. For more information, contact your Wireless Provider.

Using your phone as a mobile hotspot consumes battery power and uses data service. While Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot is active, your phone's applications will use your Wireless Provider's data service. Roaming while using your phone as a mobile hotspot will incur extra data charges.

Turning Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot On or Off

- 2. Touch Portable Wi-Fi hotspot OFF and follow the prompts to turn Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot On, or touch Portable Wi-Fi hotspot ON to turn Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot Off.

 - Network SSID: View and change the name of your Mobile Hotspot.
 - Hide my device: When enabled, your Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot is not visible to other Wi-Fi devices during a scan. Other devices can still connect to your Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot, but will have to set up the connection manually with your Network SSID and Password.
 - Security: Choose the security level for your Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot.
 - Password: If you choose a security level that uses a password, enter the password. By default, the password is your mobile telephone number.
 - Show password: Enable to make the Password field visible.
 - Show advanced options: Enable to access advanced options, including Broadcast channel, to specify the channel your device uses for Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot.

Allowed Device List

Control whether devices connect to your Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot with the Allowed device list. After you add devices to the list, they can scan for your device and connect using your device's Wi-Fi hotspot name (SSID) and password.

- Note: Using your phone as a mobile hotspot consumes battery power and uses data service. While Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot is active, your phone's applications will use your Wireless Provider's data service. Roaming while using your phone as a mobile hotspot will incur extra data charges.
 - From the Home screen, touch Menu →
 Settings → Connections tab → More networks → Tethering and portable hotspot → Portable Wi-Fi hotspot. The Portable Wi-Fi hotspot screen displays.
 - Touch Allowed devices → + Add, then enter the other device's Device name and MAC address.
 - 3. Touch OK to add the device to the Allowed devices list.

Tethering





Encryption

This section outlines the safety precautions associated with using your phone. The terms "mobile device" or "cell phone" are used in this section to refer to your phone. **Read this information before using your mobile device**.

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published information for consumers relating to Radio Frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

Do cell phones pose a health hazard?

Many people are concerned that cell phone radiation will cause cancer or other serious health hazards. The weight of scientific evidence has not linked cell phones with any health problems.

Cell phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Over the past 15 years, scientists have conducted hundreds of studies looking at the biological effects of the radio frequency energy emitted by cell phones. While some researchers have reported biological changes associated with RF energy, these studies have failed to be replicated. The majority of studies published have failed to show an association between exposure to radio frequency from a cell phone and health problems.

The low levels of RF cell phones emit while in use are in the microwave frequency range. They also emit RF at substantially reduced time intervals when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects.

The biological effects of radio frequency energy should not be confused with the effects from other types of electromagnetic energy.

Very high levels of electromagnetic energy, such as is found in X-rays and gamma rays, can ionize biological tissues. Ionization is a process where electrons are stripped away from their normal locations in atoms and molecules. It can permanently damage biological tissues including DNA, the genetic material.

The energy levels associated with radio frequency energy, including both radio waves and microwaves, are not great enough to cause ionization of atoms and molecules. Therefore, RF energy is a type of non-ionizing radiation. Other types of non-ionizing radiation include visible light, infrared radiation (heat), and other forms of electromagnetic radiation with relatively low frequencies.

While RF energy does not ionize particles, large amounts can increase body temperatures and cause tissue damage. Two areas of the body, the eyes and the testes, are particularly vulnerable to RF heating because there is relatively little blood flow in them to carry away excess heat.

Research Results to Date: Is there a connection between RF and certain health problems?

The results of most studies conducted to date say no. In addition, attempts to replicate and confirm the few studies that have shown a connection have failed.

The scientific community at large therefore believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community has supported additional research to address gaps in knowledge. Some of these studies are described below.

Interphone Study

Interphone is a large international study designed to determine whether cell phones increase the risk of head and neck cancer. A report published in the International Journal of Epidemiology (June, 2010) compared cell phone usage for more than 5,000 people with brain tumors (glioma and meningioma) and a similar number of healthy controls.

Results of this study did NOT show that cell phones caused brain cancer. In this study, most people had no increased risk of brain cancer from using cell phones. For people with the heaviest use of cell phones (an average of more than $\frac{1}{2}$ hour per day, every day, for over 10 years) the study suggested a

slight increase in brain cancer. However, the authors determined that biases and errors prevented any conclusions being drawn from this data. Additional information about Interphone can be found at

Interphone is the largest cell phone study to date, but it did not answer all questions about cell phone safety. Additional research is being conducted around the world, and the FDA continues to monitor developments in this field.

International Cohort Study on Mobile Phone Users (COSMOS)

The COSMOS study aims to conduct long-term health monitoring of a large group of people to determine if there are any health issues linked to long-term exposure to radio frequency energy from cell phone use. The COSMOS study will follow approximately 300,000 adult cell phone users in Europe for 20 to 30 years. Additional information about the COSMOS study can be found at

Risk of Brain Cancer from Exposure to Radio Frequency Fields in Childhood and Adolescence (MOBI-KIDS)

MOBI-KIDS is an international study investigating the relationship between exposure to radio frequency energy from communication technologies including cell phones and brain cancer in young people. Surveillance, Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER) Program of the National Cancer Institute

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) actively follows cancer statistics in the United States to detect any change in rates of new cases for brain cancer. If cell phones play a role in risk for brain cancer, rates should go up, because heavy cell phone use has been common for quite some time in the U.S. Between 1987 and 2005, the overall age-adjusted incidence of brain cancer did not increase. Cell Phone Industry Actions

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the cell phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support-needed research on possible biological effects of RF for the type of signal emitted by cell phones;
- Design cell phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user; and
- Cooperate in providing users of cell phones with the current information on cell phone use and human health concerns.

The FDA also is working with voluntary standard-setting bodies such as the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection (ICNIRP), and others to assure that safety standards continue to adequately protect the public.

Reducing Exposure: Hands-Free Kits and Other Accessories

Steps to Reduce Exposure to Radio Frequency Energy

If there is a risk from being exposed to radio frequency energy (RF) from cell phones - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But, if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your RF exposure.

- · Reduce the amount of time spent using your cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between your head and the cell phone.

Hands-Free Kits

Hands-free kits may include audio or Bluetooth[®] headsets and various types of body-worn accessories such as belt-clips and holsters. Combinations of these can be used to reduce RF energy absorption from cell phones.

Headsets can substantially reduce exposure because the phone is held away from the head in the user's hand or in approved body-worn accessories. Cell phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet RF exposure compliance requirements when used against the head and against the body.

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used for convenience and comfort. They are also required by law in many states if you want to use your phone while driving.

Cell Phone Accessories that Claim to Shield the Head from RF Radiation

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories which claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone.

Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hands-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption.

Children and Cell Phones

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to any users of cell phones from RF exposure, including children and teenagers. The steps adults can take to reduce RF exposure apply to children and teenagers as well.

- Reduce the amount of time spent on the cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between the head and the cell phone.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using cell phones at all. For example, The Stewart Report from the United Kingdom made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report, a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) Certification Information

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for Radio Frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government.

These FCC RF exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations: the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The RF exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC SAR limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum reported value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the SAR limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. For body-worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the mobile device a minimum of 1.0 cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines. The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile device with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. This mobile phone has a FCC ID number: A3LSCHR970C [Model Number: SCH-R970C] and the specific SAR levels for this mobile phone can be found at the following FCC website:

Responsible drivers understand that no secondary task should be performed while driving whether it be eating, drinking, talking to passengers, or talking on a mobile phone - unless the driver has assessed the driving conditions and is confident that the secondary task will not interfere with their primary responsibility. Do not engage in any activity while driving a moving vehicle which may cause you to take your eyes off the road or become so absorbed in the activity that your ability to concentrate on the act of driving becomes impaired. Samsung is committed to promoting responsible driving and giving drivers the tools they need to understand and address distractions.

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. For example, only hands-free use may be permitted in certain areas. Before answering calls, consider your circumstances. Let the call go to voicemail when driving conditions require. Remember, driving comes first, not the call!

• Do not disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery. Do not put a high degree of pressure on the battery. This can cause leakage or an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.

- Do not let the phone or battery come in contact with liquids. Liquids can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion.
 Even when the phone appears to be dry and appears to operate normally, the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard. If the phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your service provider or contact Samsung, even if they appear to be working properly.
- Do not place your battery in or near a heat source. Excessive heating can damage the phone or the battery and could cause the phone or the battery to explode. Do not dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source such as a microwave oven, hair dryer, iron, or radiator. Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high temperatures.
- Do not dispose of the phone or the battery in a fire. The phone or the battery may explode when overheated.
- Do not handle a damaged or leaking battery. Do not let leaking battery fluid come in contact with your eyes, skin or clothing. For safe disposal options, contact your nearest Samsung-authorized service center.

- Avoid dropping the cell phone. Dropping the phone or the battery, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage to the phone and battery. If you suspect damage to the phone or battery, take it to a service center for inspection.

Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.

- Do not use incompatible cell phone batteries and chargers. Some websites and second-hand dealers not associated with reputable manufacturers and carriers, might be selling incompatible or even counterfeit batteries and chargers. Consumers should purchase manufacturer or carrier-recommended products and accessories. If unsure about whether a replacement battery or charger is compatible, contact the manufacturer of the battery or charger.
- Misuse or use of incompatible phones, batteries, and charging devices could result in damage to the equipment and a possible risk of fire, explosion, or leakage, leading to serious injuries, damages to your phone, or other serious hazard.

GPS & AGPS

Certain Samsung mobile devices can use a Global Positioning System (GPS) signal for location-based applications. A GPS uses satellites controlled by the U.S. Government that are subject to changes implemented in accordance with the Department of Defense policy and the 2008 Federal Radio navigation Plan (FRP). Changes may affect the performance of location-based technology on your mobile device.

Certain Samsung mobile devices can also use an Assisted Global Positioning System (AGPS), which obtains information from the cellular network to improve GPS performance. AGPS uses your wireless service provider's network and therefore airtime, data charges, and/or additional charges may apply in accordance with your service plan. Contact your wireless service provider for details.

Your Location

Location-based information includes information that can be used to determine the approximate location of a mobile device. Mobile devices which are connected to a wireless network transmit location-based information. Additionally, if you use applications that require location-based information (e.g. driving directions), such applications transmit location-based information. The location-based information may be shared with third-parties, including your wireless service provider, applications providers, Samsung, and other third-parties providing services.

Use of AGPS in Emergency Calls

When you make an emergency call, the cellular network may activate AGPS technology in your mobile device to tell the emergency responders your approximate location.

AGPS has limitations and **might not work in your area**. Therefore:

- Always tell the emergency responder your location to the best of your ability; and
- Remain on the mobile device for as long as the emergency responder instructs you.

Navigation

Maps, directions, and other navigation-data, including data relating to your current location, may contain inaccurate or incomplete data, and circumstances can and do change over time. In some areas, complete information may not be available. Therefore, you should always visually confirm that the navigational instructions are consistent with what you see before following them. All users should pay attention to road conditions, closures, traffic, and all other factors that may impact safe driving or walking. Always obey posted road signs.

Emergency Calls

This mobile device, like any wireless mobile device, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks, as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions, areas, or circumstances.

Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless mobile device for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example). Before traveling in remote or underdeveloped areas, plan an alternate method of contacting emergency services personnel. Remember, to make or receive any calls, the mobile device must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength.

Care and Maintenance

Your mobile device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years:

Keep your Samsung Mobile Device away from:

Liquids of any kind

Keep the mobile device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If the mobile device does get wet, do not accelerate drying with the use of an oven, microwave, or dryer, because this may damage the mobile device and could cause a fire or explosion.

Do not use the mobile device with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the mobile device.

Extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below 0°C / 32°F or above 45°C / 113°F.

Microwaves

Do not try to dry your mobile device in a microwave oven. Doing so may cause a fire or explosion.

Dust and dirt

Do not expose your mobile device to dust, dirt, or sand.

Cleaning solutions

Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the mobile device. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution. If the mobile device has a retractable camera lens, do not use soap and water to clean the lens. Use a blower or brush or lens cleaning paper dampened in a lens cleaning solution.

Shock or vibration

Do not drop, knock, or shake the mobile device. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.

Paint

Do not paint the mobile device. Paint can clog the device's moving parts or ventilation openings and prevent proper operation.

Responsible Listening

Caution! Avoid potential hearing loss.

Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cell phones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss.

This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth[®] or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound, and distorted hearing. Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings, and equipment.

You should follow some common sense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Always turn the volume down before plugging the earphones into an audio source.
- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- Be aware that you can adapt to higher volume settings over time, not realizing that the higher volume may be harmful to your hearing.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.

- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech, or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area, and always switch your mobile device off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the mobile device or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

Using Your Mobile Device Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from Radio Frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless mobile device. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Implantable Medical Devices

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless mobile device and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.

Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON;
- Should not carry the mobile device in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the mobile device OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place;

 Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your wireless mobile device with an implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your mobile device off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle before using your mobile device in a motor vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your mobile device off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your mobile device off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Users are advised to switch the mobile device off while at a refueling point (service station).

Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine. Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association.

When your Device is Wet

Do not turn on your device if it is wet. If your device is already on, turn it off and remove the battery immediately (if the device will not turn off or you cannot remove the battery, leave it as-is). Then, dry the device with a towel and take it to a service center.

FCC Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

The U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has established requirements for digital wireless mobile devices to be compatible with hearing aids and other assistive hearing devices.

When individuals employing some assistive hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants) use wireless mobile devices, they may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and mobile devices also vary in the amount of interference they generate. The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless mobile devices to assist hearing device users find mobile devices that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all mobile devices have been rated. Mobile devices that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated mobile device successfully. Trying out the mobile device with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Wireless mobile devices rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. M-ratings refer to enabling acoustic coupling with hearing aids that do not operate in telecoil mode.

T-Ratings: Mobile devices rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. T4

is the better/higher of the two ratings. T-ratings refer to enabling inductive coupling with hearing aids operating in telecoil mode.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing aid manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise.

Under the current industry standard, American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19, the hearing aid and wireless mobile device rating values are added together to indicate how usable they are together. For example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless mobile device meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equals M5.

Under the standard, this should provide the hearing aid user with normal use while using the hearing aid with the particular wireless mobile device. A sum of 6 or more would indicate excellent performance.

However, these are not guarantees that all users will be satisfied. T ratings work similarly.



The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

HAC for Newer Technologies

This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing aids for some of the wireless technologies that it uses. However, there may be some newer wireless technologies used in this phone that have not been tested yet for use with hearing aids.

It is important to try the different features of this phone thoroughly and in different locations, using your hearing aid or cochlear implant, to determine if you hear any interfering noise. Consult your service provider or the manufacturer of this phone for information on hearing aid compatibility. If you have questions about return or exchange policies, consult your service provider or phone retailer.

Restricting Children's Access to Your Mobile Device

Your mobile device is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the mobile device, or make calls that increase your mobile device bill.

Keep the mobile device and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The mobile device may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the mobile device if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your mobile device not expressly approved by Samsung could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas, and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the mobile device warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the mobile device.

Although your mobile device is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the mobile device or install the mobile device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Ensure that any mobile devices or related equipment installed in your vehicle are securely mounted.
- Check regularly that all wireless mobile device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- When using a headset in dry environments, static electricity can build up in the headset and cause a small quick static electrical shock. To minimize the risk of electrostatic discharge from the headset avoid using the headset in extremely dry environments or touch a grounded unpainted metal object to discharge static electricity before inserting the headset.

- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the mobile device, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment near or in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your mobile device off before boarding an aircraft. The use

- Seizures or blackouts can occur when you are exposed to flashing lights while watching videos or playing games for extended periods. If you feel any discomfort, stop using the device immediately.
- Reduce risk of repetitive motion injuries. When you repetitively
 perform actions, such as pressing keys, drawing characters on a
 touch screen with your fingers, or playing games, you may
 experience occasional discomfort in your hands, neck, shoulders,
 or other parts of your body. When using your device for extended
 periods, hold the device with a relaxed grip, press the keys lightly,
 and take frequent breaks. If you continue to have discomfort
 during or after such use, stop use and see a physician.

What is not covered?

This Limited Warranty is conditioned upon proper use of the Product.

This Limited Warranty does not cover: (a) defects or damage resulting from accident, misuse, abnormal use, abnormal conditions, improper storage, exposure to liquid, moisture, dampness, sand or dirt, neglect, or unusual physical, electrical or electromechanical stress; (b) scratches, dents and cosmetic damage, unless caused by SAMSUNG: (c) defects or damage resulting from excessive force or use of a metallic object when pressing on a touch screen; (d) equipment that has the serial number or the enhancement data code removed, defaced, damaged, altered or made illegible; (e) ordinary wear and tear; (f) defects or damage resulting from the use of Product in conjunction or connection with accessories, products, or ancillary/peripheral equipment not furnished or approved by SAMSUNG: (a) defects or damage resulting from improper testing, operation, maintenance, installation, service, or adjustment not furnished or approved by SAMSUNG; (h) defects or damage resulting from external causes such as collision with an object, fire, flooding, dirt, windstorm, lightning, earthquake, exposure to weather conditions, theft, blown fuse, or improper use of any electrical source: (i) defects or damage resulting from cellular signal reception

ALL DISPUTES WITH SAMSUNG ARISING IN ANY WAY FROM THIS LIMITED WARRANTY OR THE SALE, CONDITION OR PERFORMANCE OF THE PRODUCTS SHALL BE RESOLVED EXCLUSIVELY THROUGH FINAL AND BINDING ARBITRATION, AND NOT BY A COURT OR JURY.

Any such dispute shall not be combined or consolidated with a dispute involving any other person's or entity's Product or claim, and specifically, without limitation of the foregoing, shall not under any circumstances proceed as part of a class action. The arbitration shall be conducted before a single arbitrator, whose award may not exceed, in form or amount, the relief allowed by the applicable law. The arbitration shall be conducted according to the American Arbitration Association (AAA) Commercial Arbitration Rules applicable to consumer disputes. This arbitration provision is entered pursuant to the Federal Arbitration Act. The laws of the State of Texas, without reference to its choice of laws principles, shall govern the interpretation of the Limited Warranty and all disputes that are subject to this arbitration provision. The arbitrator shall decide all issues of interpretation and application of this arbitration provision and the Limited Warranty.

For any arbitration in which your total damage claims. exclusive of attorney fees and expert witness fees, are \$5,000.00 or less ("Small Claim"), the arbitrator may, if you prevail, award your reasonable attorney fees, expert witness fees and costs as part of any award, but may not grant SAMSUNG its attorney fees, expert witness fees or costs unless it is determined that the claim was brought in bad faith. In a Small Claim case, you shall be required to pay no more than half of the total administrative, facility and arbitrator fees, or \$50.00 of such fees, whichever is less, and SAMSUNG shall pay the remainder of such fees. Administrative, facility and arbitrator fees for arbitrations in which your total damage claims, exclusive of attorney fees and expert witness fees, exceed \$5,000.00 ("Large Claim") shall be determined according to AAA rules. In a Large Claim case, the arbitrator may grant to the prevailing party, or apportion among the parties, reasonable attorney fees, expert witness fees and costs. Judgment may be entered on the arbitrator's award in any court of competent jurisdiction. 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You may opt out of this dispute resolution procedure by providing notice to SAMSUNG no later than 30 calendar days from the date of the first consumer purchaser's purchase of the Product. Alternatively, you may opt out by calling 1-888-987-4357 no later than 30 calendar days from the date of the first consumer purchaser's purchase of the Product and providing the same information. These are the only two forms of notice that will be effective to opt out of this dispute resolution procedure. Opting out of this dispute resolution procedure will not affect the coverage of the Limited Warranty in any way, and you will continue to enjoy the benefits of the Limited Warranty.

Severability

If any portion of this Limited Warranty is held to be illegal or unenforceable, such partial illegality or unenforceability shall not affect the enforceability of the remainder of the Limited Warranty.

Precautions for Transfer and Disposal
