## **Section 1: Getting Started**

This section allows you to quickly start using your Samsung Repp™ phone by installing and charging the battery, activating your service, and setting up voicemail.

#### **Understanding this User Manual**

The sections of this manual generally follow the features of your phone. For a robust index of features, see "Understanding Your Phone" on page 13.

Also included is important safety information that you should know before using your phone. For more information, refer to "Health and Safety Information" on page 101.

This manual gives navigation instructions according to the default display settings. If you select other settings, navigation steps may be different.

Unless otherwise specified, all instructions in this manual assume that you are starting from the Home screen. To get to the Home screen, you may need to unlock the phone or keypad. (For more information, refer to "Securing Your Phone" on page 12.)

Note: Instructions in this manual are based on default settings, and may vary from your phone, depending on the software version on your phone, and any changes to the phone's Settings.

Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your phone and any changes to the phone's Settings.

#### **Special Text**

In this manual, you'll find text that is set apart from the rest.

These are intended to point out important information, share quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more.

The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Presents alternative options for the current feature, menu, or sub-menu.
- **Tips**: Provides quick or innovative methods, or useful shortcuts.
- Example: Gives an example of the feature or procedure.
- Important: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance.
- Warning: Brings to your attention important information to prevent loss of data or functionality, or even prevent damage to your phone.

#### **Text Conventions**

This manual provides condensed information about how to use your phone. To make this possible, the following text conventions are used to represent often-used steps:

 Arrows are used to represent the sequence of selecting successive options in longer, or repetitive, procedures.

Example: "From the Home screen, touch ☐ Menu, then touch Settings → Wireless & networks → Wi-Fi settings."

## **Battery**

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable, standard Li-lon battery. A Wall/USB Charger (Charging Head and USB cable) are included with the phone, for charging the battery.

Note: The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time.

After the first charge, you can use the phone while charging.

Warning!: Use only Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

#### **Battery Indicator**

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, the battery icon ( ) blinks and the device sounds a warning tone at regular intervals. In this condition, your phone conserves its remaining battery power, not by turning off the backlight, but by entering the dimming mode. For a quick check of your battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of your device's display. Solid color ( ) indicates a full charge.

#### **Battery Cover**

The battery is under a removable cover on the back of the phone.

## Removing the battery cover

 Pull up using the slot provided (1), while lifting the cover off the phone (2 & 3).



## Installing the battery cover

► Align the cover (1) and press it firmly into place (2), making sure it snaps into place at the corners (3).



#### Installing the Battery

- Remove the battery cover. (For more information, see "Removing the battery cover".)
- Insert the battery into the phone, aligning the gold contacts on the battery with the gold contacts in the phone (1). Push down on the bottom of the battery until it snaps into place (2).



**3.** Install the battery cover. (For more information, see "Installing the battery cover".)

## **Removing the Battery**

- 1. Remove the battery cover. (For more information, refer to "Removing the battery cover" on page 6.)
- 2. Lift the battery up by the slot provided (1).



3. Lift the battery up and out of the phone (2).

#### **Charging the Battery**

Your phone comes with a Wall/USB Charger (Charging Head and USB cable) to rapidly charge your phone from any 120/220 VAC outlet.

Note: The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time.

After the first charge, you can use the phone while charging.

1. Connect the USB cable to the charging head.



2. Insert the USB cable into the port.



- 3. Plug the charging head into a standard AC power outlet.
- When charging is complete, unplug the charging head from the power outlet and remove the USB cable from the phone.

#### **Non-Supported Batteries**

Samsung handsets do not support the use of non-approved batteries.

Important!: Using a non-supported battery may damage to your phone.

When using a non-supported battery you will hear a series of beeps and see a warning message:

## "UNABLE TO CHARGE NON-SUPPORTED BATTERY. SEE USER MANUAL"

If you receive this warning, battery charging has been disabled.

Samsung charging accessories, such as the charging head and cigarette lighter adapter, will only charge Samsung-approved batteries.

Note: When using a non-supported battery, the phone can only be used for the duration of the life of the battery and cannot be recharged.

## **Turning Your Phone On and Off**

#### **Turning Your Phone On**

Press and hold the Power/Lock Key for three seconds.



Note: Your phone's internal antenna is located along the bottom back of the phone. Do not block the antenna; doing so may affect call quality or cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than is necessary.

#### **Turning Your Phone Off**

Press and hold the Power/Lock Key for two seconds  $\rightarrow$  Power off  $\rightarrow$  OK.

## **Your Google Account**

Your new phone uses your Google account to fully utilize its Android features, including Gmail, Google Maps, Google Talk and the Android Market. When you turn on your phone for the first time, set up a connection with your existing Google account, or create a new Google account.

To create a Google account, or set up your Google account on vour phone:

- Use Gmail. (For more information, refer to "Gmail" on page 70.)
- Use Accounts & sync settings (see "Accounts & sync" on page 94.)

## **Displaying Your Phone Number**

From the Home screen, touch | Menu, then touch Settings → About phone → Status.

Your phone number displays under My phone number.

#### Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are sent to voicemail, even if your phone is turned off, so you'll want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as you activate your phone.

#### Setting up Voicemail



- 1. Navigate to a Home screen panel, then touch then touch oo
- 2. Follow the automated instructions to set up your new password and record a greeting.

#### **Checking Voicemail**



- 1. Navigate to a Home screen panel, then touch then touch oo
- 2. Follow the automated instructions to manage voicemail.

Tip: You can also access Voicemail by dialing your phone number from any touch-tone phone.


#### **TTY Mode**

Your phone is fully TTY-compatible, allowing you to connect a TTY device to the phone's headset jack. Before you can use your phone with a TTY device, you'll need to enable TTY Mode.

For more information, refer to "TTY" on page 84.

#### **Roaming**

When you travel outside your home network's coverage area, your phone can roam to acquire service on other compatible digital networks. When Roaming is active, the Roaming icon appears in the Annunciator Line of the display.



During roaming, some services may not be available. Depending on your coverage area and service plan, extra charges may apply when making or receiving call.

Note: Contact your Wireless Provider for more information about your coverage area and service plan.

## **Memory Card**

Your phone includes a removable microSD™ memory card, for storage of music, pictures, and other files, and supports optional microSD™ or microSDHC™ memory cards of up to 32GB capacity.

Note: You can only store music files that you own (from a CD or purchased using the phone) on a memory card.

#### **Installing a Memory Card**

- Open the microSD cover, on the right side of the phone.
- With the gold contacts facing down, carefully slide the memory card into the slot, pushing gently until it clicks into place (1).







Replace the microSD cover.

#### Removing a Memory Card

**Important!:** To prevent damage to information stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the phone.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu, then touch Settings → Storage → Unmount SD card.
- 2. Open the microSD cover, on the right side of the phone.
- Gently press on the memory card, then release so that it pops out from the slot, and carefully pull the card out (2).
- 4. Replace the microSD cover.

## **Securing Your Phone**

By default, the phone locks automatically when the screen times out, or you can lock it manually. You can unlock the phone using one of the default Unlock screens, or for increased security, use a personal screen unlock pattern.

For more information about creating and enabling a Screen unlock pattern, see "Set up screen lock settings" on page 90.

For other settings related to securing your phone, see "Location & security" on page 89.

Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

#### Locking the phone manually

Press the Power/Lock key on the top, right of the phone.

#### **Unlocking the phone**

- 1. Press the Power/Lock key to wake the screen.
- Touch and drag the Unlock icon to the right to show the screen that was visible when the phone was locked.

#### **Unlocking with a Personal Screen Unlock Pattern**

- 1. Press the Power/Lock key to wake the screen.
- 2. Draw your personal unlock pattern on the screen.


#### **Front View**



#### **Features**

- Proximity Sensor: During a call, detects that the phone is next to your face and darkens the screen to save battery power.
- 2. Menu Key: Press to display options for the current screen.
- Microphone: Passes your voice to other parties in a call. Passes your voice to Voice Dialer and Voice Search. (For more information, refer to "Voice Dialer" on page 76 and "Voice Search" on page 77.)
- Home Key: Press to display the Home screen. Press and hold to display the Recent applications screen.
- 5. Back Key: Press to return to the previous screen or option.
- Earpiece: Listen to callers.

#### **Side Views**



#### **Features**

- Accessory Hook: Connect optional accessories, such as carrying straps, to the phone.
- Volume Key: From a Home screen, press to adjust Ringer Volume. During calls or music playback, press to adjust volume. Press to mute the ringtone of an incoming call.
- USB Power/Accessory Port: Plug in a USB cable for charging or to sync music and files.
- microSD (Memory Card) Slot: Lets you install and remove optional microSD Memory Card for additional image/photo storage and for music storage.
- Power/Lock key: Press and hold to power your phone on or off. With the phone on, press to lock your phone and blank or waken the display. With the phone on, press and hold, then select Silent mode, Airplane mode, or Power off.
- Headset/Headphone/TTY Jack: Connect a wired handsfree headset, stereo headphones, or a TTY device.

#### **Touch Screen Display**

Your phone's touch screen display is the interface to its features.



#### **Features**

- Annunciator Line: Presents icons to show network status, battery power, and connection details. (For more information, refer to "Annunciator Line" on page 17.)
- Home screen: The starting point for using your phone.
  Place icons, widgets, and other items to customize your
  phone to your needs. (For more information, refer to
  "Home Screen" on page 20.)
- 3. Shortcuts: Shortcuts to applications and folders on your phone. You can add more shortcuts by using the Add to Home screen menu. (For more information, refer to "Customizing the Home Screen Panels" on page 22 and For more information, refer to "Adding Shortcuts to a Home Screen panel" on page 22.)
- Primary Shortcuts: Shortcuts to your phone's common features. (For more information, refer to "Primary Shortcuts" on page 21.)
- Widget: Application that runs on a Home screen panel. This
  widget is found on this Home screen panel by default. (For
  more information, refer to "Adding Widgets to a Home
  Screen panel" on page 23.)

#### **Display settings**

You can customize display settings to your preferences. (For more information, refer to "Display settings" on page 88.)

#### **Annunciator Line**

The Annunciator line displays icons to show network status, battery power, and other details.



**Signal Strength**: Current signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.



**Airplane Mode Active**: All wireless communications are disabled. (See "Airplane mode" on page 78.)



Roaming: Your phone is outside of your home network.



System Alert: Check Notifications Panel for alerts.



Voice Call: A voice call is in progress.



Speakerphone: Speakerphone is enabled.



Missed Call: Displays when there is a missed call.



Battery Level: Shown fully charged.



Charging Indicator: Battery is charging.



**Device Power Critical**: Battery has only three percent power remaining. Charge immediately.



**1x Connection Active**: Phone is active on a 1x system (roaming).



**3G Connection Active**: Phone is active on a 3G system.



**USB Connected**: The phone is connected to a computer using a USB cable.



USB Debugging Connected: The phone is connected to a computer using a USB cable and Applications USB Debugging is enabled. (For more information, refer to "USB debugging" on page 93.)



New Text Message: You have new text message.



New Voicemail: You have new voicemail.



New Email Message: You have new email.



**Alarm Set**: An alarm is active. (For more information, refer to "Clock" on page 70.)



**Silent mode**: All sounds except media and alarms are silenced. (See "Silent mode" on page 86.)



**Vibrate mode**: All sounds are silenced, but the phone vibrates for alerts. (See "Volume" on page 86.)



**SD Card Preparing**: An optional memory card is installed.



SD Card Unmounted: A memory card was unmounted.



Bluetooth Active: Bluetooth is turned on.



**Bluetooth Connected**: The phone is connected to a Bluetooth headset.



**Wi-Fi Active**: Wi-Fi is connected, active, and communicating with a Wireless Access Point (WAP).



**Wi-Fi Action Needed**: Action needed to connect to Wireless Access Point (WAP).



TTY: TTY Mode is active.

## **Navigation**

Navigate your phone's features using the command keys and the touch screen.

Warning!: If your handset has a touch screen display, please note that a touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. (For more information, refer to "Warranty Information" on page 121.)

## **Command Keys**

#### Menu Key

Touch Menu to display a context-sensitive menu of options for the current screen or feature.

#### **Home Key**

Press Home to display the Home screen. Press and hold Home to display the Recent menu.

## **Back Key**

Touch **Back** to return to the previous screen, option or step.

#### Context-sensitive Menus

While using your phone, context-sensitive menus offer options for the feature or screen. To access context-sensitive menus:

- Press 🖃 Menu.
- Touch and hold on an item. If available, an item-specific menu popsup.

#### **Touch**

Touch items to select or launch them. For example:

- Touch the on screen keyboard to enter characters or text.
- . Touch a menu item to select it.
- Touch an application's icon to launch the application.

#### **Touch and Hold**

Activate on-screen items by a touch and hold gesture. For example:

- Touch and hold a widget on the home screen to move it.
- Touch and hold on a field to display a pop-up menu of options.

#### Sweep


To sweep, lightly drag your finger vertically or horizontally across the screen. Use sweep when:

- Unlocking the screen
- Scrolling the Home screen or a menu

#### **Notification Panel**

The Notification Panel shows information about connections, messages and other items.

Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen.
 To close Notification Panel, touch and drag upward or touch
 Back.



#### **Clearing Notifications**

- Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen to display the Notifications Panel.
- Touch Clear to clear all notifications.

#### **Home Screen**

The Home screen is the starting point for using your phone.



Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the phone unlocked, at the Home screen.

#### **Extended Home Screen**

The Home screen consists of the Home panel, plus 4 additional panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space for adding shortcuts, widgets, and folders.



Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the Navigation nodes at the bottom corners of the display indicate your current position.

You can also use the Navigation nodes at the bottom of the screen to move from panel to panel. (For more information, refer to "Navigation Nodes" on page 21.)

To return to the Home panel, press **Home**.

#### **Navigation Nodes**

The Navigation Nodes are visual indications of the currently active panel. These on-screen dots (located at the bottom left and right of the Home screen) indicate your current panel location.

When the Center panel is displayed, both Navigation Nodes have two dots (this indicates there are two panels at either side of the current panel).

- ▶ To access the left panels, touch the left Navigation Node.
- To access the right panels, touch the right Navigation Node.



#### **Primary Shortcuts**

Primary Shortcuts appear at the bottom of the display.

Note: When you access Applications, the Home shortcut replaces the Applications shortcut to provide quick return to the Home screen.

The default primary shortcuts are:.



Phone: Launch the phone screen. (See "Call Functions" on page 26.)



Applications: List and launch applications available on your phone. (See "Applications" on page 68.)



**Browser**: Access your Wireless Provider's portal web site and others on the Internet. (See "Browser" on page 49.)

Settings: Access your phone's Settings menu. (See "Settings" on page 78.)






Market: Browse, download, and install Android applications.

News & Weather: Combines multiple RSS news feeds and weather information.



Picture frame: Display a picture.



Power control: Set network and power settings.



Rate Places: Assign personal ratings to Places you have located



Traffic: Display traffic information for a particular destination



**Twitter (large)**: Access your Twitter account without launching the Browser.



**Twitter (small)**: Access your Twitter account without launching the Browser.



YouTube: Search YouTube and watch videos.

## Adding Folders to a Home Screen panel

Place Folders on the Home screen to organize items together on the Home screen.

- Touch Folders, then touch a selection to add it to the Home screen:



New folder: Create a new empty folder.



**All contacts**: Create a folder containing all contacts.



**Bluetooth received**: Create a folder containing a list of items received via Bluetooth.



**Contacts with phone numbers**: Create a folder containing contacts with stored phone numbers.



Facebook Phonebook: Create a folder containing contacts with phone numbers stored on Facebook.



**Google Contacts**: Create a folder containing contacts with phone numbers stored on Google.



**Recent documents**: List of the latest files stored to your phone.



**Starred contacts**: Create a folder containing contacts marked as Favorites.

#### **Removing Folders**

Touch and hold the Folder until the trash can icon () appears, then drag the Folder to the icon.

#### Changing the Wallpaper on a Home Screen panel

Choose a picture to display in the background of a Home screen panel. You can choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images, or select a picture you've taken with the Camera or downloaded.

- From a Home screen panel, touch and hold on the screen to display the Add to Home screen menu, then touch Wallpapers.
  - or -

From the Home screen, press Menu, then touch Wallpaper.

- 2. Choose a source for images:
  - Gallery: Access the Gallery to choose a picture from an optional installed memory card. Touch a picture to select it, then use the crop tool to resize the picture, if desired. Touch Save to save the picture as wallpaper.
  - Live wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded animated wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch Set wallpaper.

Note: Live wallpapers consume more battery power than Gallery images or Wallpapers.

 Wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch Set wallpaper.

#### **Adding Applications to a Home Screen panel**

You can add shortcuts to applications to a Home screen panel, for quick access to the application.

- 1. Navigate to a Home screen panel.
- Touch Applications. (For more information and a list of available applications, see "Applications" on page 68.)
- Touch and hold on an application icon. The Shortcut icon is automatically placed on the selected Home screen panel.

#### **Removing Applications**

► Touch and hold the Application shortcut until the trash can icon (♣) appears, then drag the shortcut to the ♣ icon.

This section describes how to make, answer or end calls.

#### **Making Calls**

## **Making Calls Using the Phone Dialer**

- From a Home screen panel, touch Phone.
- Touch the digits of the telephone or speed dial number on the Keypad screen.

While dialing, use these options:

- Touch Menu, then touch Add to contacts to add to the contacts list
- Touch Menu , then touch Add 2-sec pause to insert a 2-second pause in the telephone number.
- Touch Menu, then touch Add wait to insert a Wait pause in the telephone number, to pause dialing to wait for input from you.
- . Touch 🦵 Call.

#### **Dialing Emergency Numbers**

When you call an Emergency Number, such as 911, do not disconnect the call or make other calls until advised to do so by the emergency operator. This enables emergency operators to more easily dispatch aid, such as police, fire fighting, and emergency medical personnel.

- From a Home screen panel, touch Phone. The Keypad screen appears in the display.
- 2. Enter 911.
- 3. To place the call, touch 🌈 .

Important!: Emergency number 911 is preset into your phone.

If you call 911 an audible tone is heard and an Emergency prompt appears in the display for the duration of the call.

Important!: Because of various transmission methods, network parameters, and user settings necessary to complete a call from your wireless phone, a connection cannot always be guaranteed. Therefore, emergency calling may not be available on all wireless networks at all times.

Important!: DO NOT depend on this phone as a primary method of calling 911 or for any other essential or emergency communications.

Note: You can specify other numbers than 911 as emergency numbers using the Emergency Number settings. (For more information, refer to "Emergency Number" on page 85.)

#### **Making Calls from Contacts**

A contact is an entry that you have created to store the name, numbers, and other information for people or groups of interest.

(For more information, refer to "Contacts" on page 33.)

- 1. From a Home screen, touch Phone → Contacts.
- Find the Contact and touch the icon or ID image to the left of the contact name.
- Touch to dial the number for the Contact.If the Contact entry contains more than one number, a list of the numbers pops-up, then you can select the number to dial.

## **Making Calls using Favorites**

Favorites are contacts that you designate as favorites by starring them. (For more information about creating favorites, see "Favorite Contacts" on page 37.)

- From a Home screen, touch Phone → Favorites to display favorites.
- Find the contact and touch to dial the number for the Contact.

If the Contact entry contains more than one number, a list of the numbers pops-up, then you can select the number to dial.

#### **Making Calls using Voice Dialer**

Call a contact or telephone number by speaking the name or number. For more information, see "Voice Dialer" on page 29.

#### **Making Calls from Call Log**

Return a call, or call a number from a recent call stored in Call log. For more information about Call log, see "Call Log" on page 28.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Phone.
- 2. Touch Call log to display recent calls.
- 3. Find a call, then touch Call to dial the number.

## **Answering Calls**

To answer an incoming call:

 On the Incoming call screen, touch and drag to tl right.

## Sending Calls to Voicemail

When your phone alerts you to an incoming call, you can ignore the call by rejecting it to send the caller to voice mail, or reject the call and send a message to the caller.

#### Rejecting a call

When you reject a call, the caller is directed to leave a voice mail.

On the Incoming call screen, touch and drag to the left. The caller is directed to leave a voice mail.

#### **Answering Call-Waiting Calls**

When you receive a call while on a call:

- Touch and drag **Answer** to answer the incoming call. The original call is placed on hold, and remains on hold until you end the second call, or swap calls back to the original call.
- Touch **Swap** to place the second call on hold and return to the original call.

#### **Three-Way Calling**

Merge two calls to set up a three-way call between you and two other parties.

- 1. Establish a call, either by dialing or answering an incoming call.
- 2. Touch Add call. The first call is placed on hold, and the Phone screen displays.
- 3. Enter the second phone number or select a Call record or Contact, then press ......
- 4. Touch Merge calls. The two calls are joined into one. 3-way call.

## **In-Call Options**

While in a call, you can access these features:

- Add call: Display the Phone Dialer to set up a multi-party call.
- End: End the phone call.
- Dialpad: Display a dialpad to enter numbers.
- Bluetooth: Switch the call audio to a Bluetooth headset.
- . Mute: Mute or unmute your voice on the call.
- Speaker: Enable or disable speakerphone.

## Silencing an Incoming Call Ringtone

When your phone alerts you to an incoming call, you can silence the ringtone for the call by pressing the **Volume Key** down.

## **Ending a Call**

- 1. From the In-Call screen, touch
- 2. If you have navigated to another screen, pull down the Notifications Panel and touch the Current Call notification, then touch 🚮 .

## Call Log

When you place, answer, or miss a call, a record of the call is saved in the Call log.

#### **Accessing Call Log**

From the Home screen, touch Phone → Call log.

#### **Making Calls using Call Log**

Return a call, or call a number from a recent call stored in Call log. (For more information, refer to "Making Calls from Call Log" on page 27.)

## **Sending Messages using Call Log**

- From the Home screen, touch Phone → Call log.
- Touch and hold on a call record, then select Send text message from the pop-up menu to create a new message, with the call record phone number entered in the To list.
- Continue creating the message, as desired. (For more information, refer to "Creating and Sending Messages" on page 42.)

## **Creating or Updating Contacts Using Call Log**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch  $\bigwedge$  Phone  $\rightarrow$   $\bigcirc$  Call log.
- Touch and hold on a call record, then select Add to contacts from the pop-up menu.
- **4.** Continue entering contact information. (For more information, refer to "Contacts" on page 33.)

#### Managing the Call Log

#### **Deleting Call log records**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch  $\nearrow$  Phone  $\rightarrow$  Call log.
- While viewing the Call log, touch Menu, then select Clear call log. You are prompted to confirm the deletion.
- 3. To delete all call records, touch Yes.

## **Viewing call durations**

View the length of the Last call, all Dialed calls, all Received calls, or All calls.

- From the Home screen, touch Phone → Call log.
- While viewing the Call log, touch Menu, then select View call timer.

#### **Voice Dialer**

Voice dialer is a voice recognition application you can use to make calls, and to launch other phone features.

- From the Home screen, touch Applications → Voice Dialer.
- 2. The phone displays "Listening" and prompts you to speak a command. Speak one of the following commands:
  - Call <Name>: Call an entry in your Contacts list.
  - **Dial <Number>**: Call a spoken phone number.

#### Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are sent to voicemail, even if your phone is turned off, so you'll want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as you activate your phone.

#### **Setting up Voicemail**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Phone, then touch
- Follow the automated instructions to set up your new password and record a greeting.

#### **Checking Voicemail**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Phone, then touch
- Follow the automated instructions to listen to messages and manage your voicemail.

Tip: You can also access Voicemail by dialing your phone number from any touch-tone phone.

#### Sending Calls to Voicemail

You can send an incoming call directly to voicemail, or ignore a call to send it to voicemail and respond to the caller with a text message.

#### Sending a call to voicemail

When a call is incoming, touch and slide . The caller is directed to leave a voicemail message.

#### **Section 4: Accounts and Contacts**

This section explains how to manage your contacts and accounts.

#### **Accounts**

Your phone provides the ability to synchronize information from a variety of accounts, including Google, or a Corporate Exchange server. With synchronization, you can ensure that information on your phone is updated with any information that changes in your accounts.

Synchronize contacts with your Facebook, Twitter, and MySpace accounts.

Note: You must register your phone with your social network site before using the phone to access the networks.

With Corporate Exchange and Google accounts you can synchronize Calendar events and Contacts.

#### **Setting Up Your Accounts**

Set up and manage your synchronized accounts with the Accounts & sync setting.

For information about setting up other, non-synchronized email accounts, see "Configuring Email Accounts" on page 46.

#### **Adding a Google account**

- 2. Touch Add account → Google.
- At the Add a Google Account screen, touch Next to begin, then touch an option:
  - Create: Follow the prompts to create a new account.
  - Sign in: Enter your Google Username and Password, then touch Sign In.
- 4. The phone communicates with the Google server to set up your account. When complete, your Google account appears in the Manage accounts area of the Accounts & sync screen.

## **Managing a Google account**

- From the Home screen, touch Menu, then touch Settings → Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap your Google account to display the **Data &** synchronization screen.

- Tap a setting to enable or disable synchronization. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box:
  - Sync Books: When enabled, synchronizes your Google eBooks library's list with your phone's eBooks library list.
  - Sync Contacts: When enabled, synchronizes your Google contacts with your phone's Contacts.
  - Sync Gmail: When enabled, synchronizes your Gmail messages on your phone.
  - Sync Calendar: When enabled, synchronizes your Google calendar with your phone.

#### **Adding a Corporate Exchange account**

- Touch Add account → Corporate.
- At the Add an Exchange account screen, enter your Email address and Password, then touch Next.
- At the Server settings screen, enter/change server settings, then touch Next. The phone communicates with the server to confirm your account.
- At the Account options screen, select account settings, then touch Next.
- At the Set up email screen, enter a name for the account (this name will display on screen). Touch Done.

- At the Activate account administration screen, follow the prompts and touch **Done**.
- Your Corporate account appears in the Manage accounts area of the Accounts & sync settings screen, and in the Email application.

#### **Managing a Corporate Exchange account**

- From the Home screen, touch Menu, then touch Settings → Accounts & sync.
- Touch your Corporate account to display settings, then touch Account settings for these settings:
  - General settings
    - Account name: Enter a name to identify the account.
    - Your name: Enter your name, to be used in outgoing emails.
    - Signature: Enter the signature you want to appear at the bottom of all
      of the emails you send.
    - Amount to synchronize: Choose a time period to determine how many days' email will synchronize.
    - Inbox check frequency: Choose a frequency for the phone to check the server for new emails.
  - Default account: Touch to assign or un-assign this account as the default account for sending email from your phone.
  - Notification settings
    - Email notifications: Enable or disable display of a new email icon in the Annunciator line when new mail arrives.

- Select ringtone: Assign a ringtone for new email notifications.
- Vibrate: Enable or disable vibration with new email notifications.
- · Server settings
  - Incoming settings: Modify server settings.
  - Sync contacts: When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange contacts with your phone's Contacts.
  - Sync Calendar: When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange calendar with your phone.
- 3. Under Data & synchronization, configure these settings:
  - Sync Contacts: When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange contacts with your phone's Contacts.
  - Sync Calendar: When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange contacts with your phone.
- To remove an account from your phone, tap Remove account.

► From the Home screen, touch Contacts

## **Creating Contacts**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch Menu → New contact.
- 3. At the Create contact under account prompt, touch an account for saving the contact to.

- . Touch contact fields to enter information:
  - Touch the contact.

    picture ID box to choose a picture to identify the contact.
  - Touch First name, then enter a first name for the contact.
  - Touch Last name, then enter a last name for the contact. After entering a last name, touch the down arrow to enter a Name Prefix, Middle name, Name suffix, Phonetic given name, Phonetic middle name, and/or Phonetic family name.
  - Touch Phone number to enter a phone number, then touch the Label button to choose a label, from Home, Mobile, Work, Work Fax, Home Fax, Pager, Other, or Custom to create a custom label.
     To add another number, touch (1).
  - Touch Email to enter an email address, then touch the Label button to choose a label, from Home, Work, Other, or Custom to create a custom label. To add another address, touch .
  - Touch Postal address to enter the contacts address. To add another Postal address, touch (1).
  - Touch Organization to enter the Contact's organization name and title.

- To add more fields, tap **More** to choose **IM** (touch the label button and select from AIM, Windows Live, Yahoo, Skype, QQ, Google Talk, ICQ, Jabber, or Custom), Notes, Nickname, Website, and Internet call.
- When you finish entering information, touch Done.

### **Creating Contacts from the Phone Dialer**

Enter a phone number with the Phone Dialer keypad, then save it.

- From a Home screen, touch **Phone**.
- Touch the digits of the phone number on the Dialer keypad.
- The create new contact from the pop-up menu.
- 4. Continue entering contact information. For more information, see "Creating Contacts" on page 33.

# **Creating Contacts from Call log**

Save a phone number from a recent call record to create a new contact, or update an existing contact,

### **Updating Contacts**

# **Contacts Display Options**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- Touch Menu, then touch Display options to set these options:
  - Touch Only contacts with phones to restrict display to contacts with phone numbers.
  - Touch Sort list by to select to list contacts by First name or Last name.
  - Touch View contact names as to select to show contact names
     First name first or Last name first.
  - Touch an account to choose contacts for display by group, if available, and/or to choose display categories.
- 3. Touch Done to save options.

#### **Joined Contacts**

Your phone can synchronize with multiple accounts, including Google, Corporate Exchange, and other email providers. When you synchronize contacts from these accounts with your phone, you may have multiple contacts for one person.

Linking imported contact records to a phone contact allows you to see all the contact's numbers and addresses together in one Contact entry. Linking also helps you keep your contacts updated, because any changes that your contacts make to their information in the respective accounts is automatically updated the next time you synchronize with the account.

Note: Phone contacts are always the primary contact for linking. You can link imported contacts to a Phone contact, but the Phone contact will always display; the imported contact will show as the linked contact.

## **Joining contacts**

- . From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch a Contact to display its information.
- 3. Touch Menu → Edit contact.
- 1. Touch 🖃 Menu → 👢 Joi
- 5. Touch another contact to link it to the Phone contact.
- 6. Touch Done to save the joined Contact.

### **Unjoining contacts**

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch a joined contact to display its information.
- 3. Touch Menu, then touch Edit contact.
- . Touch 🔳 Menu → 🜱 Separate → OK.

# Sending a Namecard (vCard)

You can send a contact namecard as a vCards via Bluetooth to other Bluetooth devices, or via Gmail as an attachment.

Important!: Not all Bluetooth devices will accept contacts, and not all devices support transfers of multiple contacts. Check the target device's documentation

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch a contact to display its information.
- 3. Touch Menu, then touch Share.
- 4. At the prompt, choose a sending method, then follow the prompts to send the namecard:
  - Bluetooth: For more information about sending via Bluetooth, see "Bluetooth" on page 64.
  - Email (when Email account defined): For more information about sending Email, see "Composing and Sending Email" on page 46 and see "Adding a Corporate Exchange account" on page 32.

 Gmail: For more information about sending Gmail, see "Composing and Sending Gmail" on page 44.

Tip: You can also send Contact namecards in Email messages, after you add an Email account. (For more information, refer to "Accounts & sync" on page 94.)

# **Exporting and Importing Contacts**

You can export your contact list to an optional installed memory card, or import a list of contacts (previously exported) from a memory card.

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts → Menu → Import/Export.
- Touch Import from SD card, Export to SD card, or Share visible contacts then follow the prompts to complete the operation.

#### **Favorite Contacts**

Mark Contacts with a star to identify them as Favorites.

Favorites are displayed on the **Favorites** tab in the **Phone** screen, for fast dialing or messaging.

### **Creating Favorite Contacts**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Find a Contact, then touch it to display its information.
- Touch the star at the top right of the screen. The star is illuminated in gold ( ) marking the Contact as a Favorite.

# **Additional Contact Options**

When you view a Contact's information, you have other options than to Edit, Share, or Delete it.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Find a Contact, then touch it to display its information.
- Touch Menu → Options. The following options are available:
  - Ringtone: Select a unique ringtone to identify calls from this Contact
  - Incoming calls: When enabled, sends calls from this Contact directly to your voice mailbox.

## **Deleting Multiple Contacts**

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts → Menu → Delete. The Contacts Delete list appears in the display.
- To delete selected Contacts, touch each Contact to be deleted. A checkmark appears in the check box for each Contact selected.
- To delete all Contacts, touch **Select all**. Checkmarks appear in the check boxes for all of your Contacts.
- Touch Delete. You are prompted to confirm your deletions.
- To delete the selected Contacts, touch OK.

# **Section 5: Entering Text**

This section describes how to enter words, letters, punctuation and numbers or ideographic characters when you need to enter text.

# **On-screen QWERTY Keyboard**

Your phone uses an on-screen QWERTY keyboard for text entry. Use the keyboard to enter letters, punctuation, numbers, and other characters into text entry fields or applications. Access the keyboard by touching any text entry field.

The on-screen QWERTY keyboard displays at the bottom of the screen. By default, when you rotate the phone, the screen orientation updates to display the keyboard at the bottom of the screen.

# **Text Input Methods**

Your phone offers four text input methods:

- Swype: Swype is a new text input method that allows you to enter words by gliding your finger over the on-screen QWERTY keyboard, lifting your finger between words. You can also enable Word prediction, which matches your key touches to common words.
- Android Keyboard: The Android Keyboard is a on-screen QWERTY keyboard that allows you to enter text by touching keys on the screen.
   Android Keyboard includes predictive text, which matches your key

touches to common words so that you can select the word to enter it into your text.

- Google Pinyin: Google Pinyin is a Chinese character keyboard.
- Korean keyboard: The Korean keyboard allows you to type Korean language characters.

# **Changing the Input Method**

When entering text, you can select the text input method.

- Touch and hold on a text input field, then select Input method. The following options are available:
  - · Android keyboard
  - Swype
- 2. Touch the desired input method. The selected keyboard appears at the bottom of the screen.

# **Entering Text Using Swype**

Swype is a new way to enter text on touch screens. Instead of touching each key, use your finger to trace over each letter of a word. For each word, place your finger on the first letter and glide to the subsequent letters, lifting on the last letter.

This example shows how to enter the word "this". Put your finger down on the "t", and without lifting, glide it to the "h", then to the "i" then over to the "s".



Here are a few tips to get you started:

- Spacing is automatic: When you finish a word, just lift your finger and start the next word.
- Double letters: Just "scribble" on the key.
- Capitalization: Swype recognizes and capitalizes the first word of sentences. If you want to capitalize a word that isn't at the beginning of a sentence, just glide above the keyboard before gliding over the next letter.

- Contractions: Swype recognizes most words that include an apostrophe; just swype the letters of the word, including the apostrophe.
- Punctuation: Tap and hold a key to view a punctuation menu and make a selection.
- Accented characters: Just glide through the letters of the word.
   Swype usually recognizes the word and correctly accents the letters.
- Error correction: If you make a mistake, double-tap on the word you want to change.

- Tap the Swype key → More Help to view Help.

### **Entering Symbols and Numbers**

Using the Swype Keyboard:

 Touch and hold on a key to enter the symbol or number at the top of the key.

- Touch and hold on a key until a menu of all characters available on that key appears, then touch a character to enter it.
- Touch switch to Symbol mode, then touch a key.
- Touch SYM → Shift, then touch the corresponding key.

## **Using the Numeric Keyboard**

Switch to a Numeric Keyboard, to quickly enter numbers and mathematical operators:

ightharpoonup Touch sym , then touch and hold  $^{123}_{ABC}$  .

To return to the alphabetic keyboard:

► Touch ABC

### **Editing Keyboard**

The Editing Keyboard provides a quick way to move the cursor and highlight text. If the application in which you are working supports editing, you can cut, copy or paste highlighted text.

To access the Editing Keyboard:

► Swype from the Swype key to the SYM key.

# **Using Swype Speech Recognition**

Enter text by speaking. Swype recognizes your speech and enters text for you.

To use Speech recognition:

► Touch the Speech Recognition key.

At the **Speak now** prompt, speak the text you want to enter.

# **Entering Text Using the Android Keyboard**

The Android Keyboard is a custom on-screen QWERTY keyboard, featuring predictive text. Input characters by tapping the on-screen keys with your finger, or use speech recognition.

As you enter characters, predictive text matches your key touches to common words and displays them. Select a word from the display to insert it into your text.

## **Entering Upper and Lower Case Letters**

The default case is lower case (abc). Enter upper and lower case alphabet letters by touching the Shift key to toggle the case, before touching the letter key(s).

- Touch once to switch from abc to Abc mode
- · Touch twice to switch from abc to ABC mode

## **Entering Symbols and Numbers**

To enter common symbols, touch to symbol mode, then touch the corresponding key.

To enter less-common symbols, touch  $^{2123}$   $\rightarrow$  ALT , then touch the corresponding key.

Enter numbers by touching ?123, then touching the number keys.

# **Using Android Speech Recognition**

Enter text by speaking. Android Keyboard recognizes your speech and enters text for you.

Note: Enable Speech Recognition in Android Keyboard settings. For more information, see "Android keyboard" on page 97

Touch the **Speech Recognition** key and say what you would normally type.

Tip: For best results, speak as you normally do and use Speech Recognition in a quiet environment.

# **Section 6: Messaging**

This section describes how to send and receive messages, and other features associated with messaging.

# **Types of Messages**

Your phone supports these types of messages:

- Text messages: Send and receive simple messages containing text to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as SMS).
- Multimedia messages: Send and receive text messages with pictures and/or sound to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as MMS).
- Email: Send and receive email from your email accounts, including Corporate Exchange mail.
- Gmail: Send and receive Gmail from your Google account.
- . Google Talk: Chat with other Google Talk users.

# **Text and Multimedia Messaging**

Your phone can send and receive text and multimedia messages to other mobile phones and to email addresses.

### **Creating and Sending Messages**

From a Home screen, touch Applications → Messaging → New message.

- 2. Tap the **To** field to enter recipients:
  - Enter contacts by name. As you enter a name, matching contacts appear on screen. Touch a contact to add it to the list.
  - Enter phone numbers. As you enter a number, matching contacts appear. Touch a contact to add it to the list.
  - Enter email addresses: As you enter addresses, matching contacts appear on screen. Touch a contact to add it to the list.
- 3. Touch the Type to compose field, or touch Next, and compose your message. While composing a message, touch menu for these options:
  - Add subject: Add a subject field to the message and enter a subject. (This option also converts the message to MMS.)
  - Attach: Add content to the message to convert it to MMS.
    - Pictures: Add a picture.
    - Capture picture: Take a new picture.
    - Videos: Add a video.
    - Capture video: Record a new video.
    - Audio: Add a sound clip.
    - Record audio: Create a new audio clip.
    - **Slideshow**: Add a slideshow of pictures to this message.
  - Insert smiley: Add a text emoticon to the message.
  - **Discard**: Cancel the message.

- All threads: Displays all message threads and saves your current message as a Draft.
- 4. Touch Send to send the message.

# **Managing Messages**

### **Threaded View**

Messages you send and receive to the same contact, number or address are grouped together as a "thread". Threaded messages allow you to see all the messages you exchanged with a contact, or other recipient, with the latest message displayed first.

- From a Home screen, touch Applications → Messaging.
- Message threads display by contact, number, or address. While viewing message threads, you have these options:
  - Touch and hold a thread to choose from:
    - View thread: Display the entire message thread.
    - View contact / Add to contacts: View the sender's Contact information, or save the sender/recipient's information as a new contact, or to update an existing contact.
    - Delete thread: Erase the entire message thread.
  - Touch **Menu** for these options:
    - Compose: Create a new message.
    - Delete threads: Deletes all threads.
    - Search: Enter characters to search messages and recipient lists.

Settings: Configure message settings.

### **Message Settings**

Configure message settings.

- From a Home screen, touch Applications → Messaging.
- Touch Menu, then touch Settings to set:
  - Storage settings:
    - Delete old messages: Touch to enable or disable automatic erasure of messages when stored message reach default limits. When disabled, the phone will prompt you to delete old messages to make room.
    - Text message limit: Touch to set a limit for the number of text messages per thread.
    - Multimedia message limit: Touch to set a limit for the number of multimedia messages per thread.
  - Text message (SMS) settings:
    - Delivery reports: Touch to request delivery reports for each text message sent.
  - Multimedia message (MMS) settings:
    - Delivery reports: Touch to request delivery reports for each Picture/ Video message sent.
    - Read reports: Touch to request reports when Picture/Video messages sent are read.
    - Auto-retrieve: Touch to enable or disable automatic retrieval of MMS messages. When enabled, MMS messages download automatically.
       When disabled, the phone prompts to download new MMS messages.

Roaming auto-retrieve: Touch to enable or disable automatic retrieval
of MMS messages when in Roaming mode. When enabled, MMS
messages download and display automatically. When disabled, the
phone prompts you to download new MMS messages.

# Notification settings:

- Notifications: Touch to enable or disable alerts in the status bar.
- Select ringtone: Touch to select a ringtone for message alerts.
- Vibrate: Touch to enable or disable vibration for message alerts.

### Signature:

- Enable Signature: Touch to add a signature to the bottom of the messages that you send.
- Signature Text: Enter the text you want displayed in your signature at the bottom of messages that you send.

### **Gmail**

Send and receive emails via Gmail, Google's web-based email.

► From the Home screen, select ### Applications → CM Gmail.

# **Configuring Your Gmail Account**

Set up your Google account to synchronize contacts, calendars, and allow access to Gmail. (For more information, refer to "Adding a Google account" on page 31.)

### **Refreshing Your Gmail Account**

Refresh your account to update your phone from the Gmail servers.

- 2. Touch **Menu**, then touch **Refresh**.

## **Composing and Sending Gmail**

- Touch Menu, then touch Compose.
- Touch the To field to enter recipients. As you enter names or numbers, matching contacts display. Touch a contact to add it to the field.
- Touch the Subject field to enter a subject.
- 5. Touch Compose Mail to enter the text of your email.
- 6. While composing a message, Menu for these options:
  - Send: Send the message.
  - Save draft: Save the message as a draft.
  - Add Cc/Bcc / Remove Cc/Bcc: Create/remove Cc (copy) and Bcc (blind copy) fields in the message. After creating the fields, touch to enter recipients.
  - Attach: Launch Gallery to select a picture to add to the message.

- . Discard: Close the message without saving.
- Help: Launches Browser with Google Mobile Help.
- 7. Touch Menu → Send to send the message.

# **Gmail account settings**

- 2. Touch Menu for these options
  - Refresh: Update Gmail on your phone from the Google servers.
  - Compose: Create a new email.
  - . Accounts: View and choose from your Google account(s).
  - Go to labels: View Google content by label.
  - · Search: Find Gmail items.

Touch More → Settings for these additional options:

- · General preferences:
  - Message Actions: Choose whether message actions Always show at the top of the screen, Only show in portrait mode, or Don't show.
  - Clear search history: Erase all your previous searches from memory.
- Clear "Show pictures": Reset the "Show pictures" automatically setting for all senders to don't show pictures automatically.
- Account settings:
  - Priority Inbox: Make this the priority inbox for this account.
  - **Signature**: Create a text signature to add to outgoing messages.

- Confirm actions: Have your phone prompt you to confirm archivals, deletions, and messages sent.
- Reply all: When active, responding messages are sent to all addressees by default.
- Auto-advance: Choose whether to show a Newer or Older conversation or a Conversation list after you delete or archive a conversation.
- Message text size: Choose Tiny, Small, Normal, Large, or Huge text for your messages.
- Batch operations: Allow changes to labels on more than one conversation.
- Sync inboxes and labels: Choose which labels are synchronized.
- Email notifications: When enabled, notifications for new email appears in the Notifications Panel.
- Labels to notify: Select notification preferences for your synced Gmail labels.
- Touch More → Help to launch Browser with Google Mobile Help.
- Touch More → About to show Gmail version installed on your phone.

#### Email

Send and receive email using popular email services.

Note: Only some paid "Plus" accounts include POP access to allow this program to connect. If you are not able to sign in with your correct email address and password, you may not have a paid "Plus" account. Please launch the Web browser to access your account.

# **Configuring Email Accounts**

You can configure Email for most accounts in just a few steps.

# Configuring the first email account

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Penal
- Touch Email address to enter your email address, then touch Password or touch Next to enter your password.
- 3. Touch a setup option:
  - Manual setup: Configure the account manually. Touch POP3, IMAP or Exchange, then enter the account details.
  - Next: Connect to the server to set up the account automatically.
     Follow the prompts to complete set-up, then touch Done.

Tip: For more information on setting up your email, contact your Wireless Provider.

### **Configuring additional email accounts**

- Touch Menu. then touch Accounts.
- Touch Menu, then touch Add account.
- 4. Touch the Email address field to enter your email address.
- Touch the Password field or touch Next to enter your password.
- 6. Touch a setup option:
  - Manual setup: Configure the account manually. Touch POP3, IMAP or Exchange, then enter the account details.
  - Next: Connect to the server to set up the account automatically.
     Follow the prompts to complete set-up, then touch Done.

## **Composing and Sending Email**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Personal.
- For a single Email account, Touch Menu, then touch Compose.
  - If you have more than one Email account, touch and hold on an account, then touch **Compose**.
- Touch the To field to enter recipients. As you enter names or numbers, matching contacts display. Touch a contact to add it to the field.
- 4. Touch the Subject field to enter a subject.

- 5. Touch Compose Mail to enter the text of your email.
- **6.** While composing a message, touch Menu for these options:
  - Add Cc/Bcc: Create Cc (copy) and Bcc (blind copy) fields to the message. After creating the fields, touch to enter recipients.
  - Send: Send the message.
  - Save as draft: Close the message and save it in Drafts.
  - . Discard: Close the message without saving.
  - Add attachment: the follow options are available:
    - Pictures: Add a picture.
    - Capture picture: Take a new picture.
    - Videos: Add a video.
    - Capture video: Record a new video.
    - Audio: Add a sound clip.
    - Record audio: Create a new audio clip.
    - File: Add a file.
- 7. Touch Send to send the message.

### **Managing Emails**

### **Combined Inbox**

Emails you receive to all accounts are presented in the combined Inbox, or you can view email accounts individually.

1. Touch Menu, then touch Accounts.

2. Touch an account, or touch the **Combined Inbox**.

### **Refreshing Your Email Account**

Refresh your account to update your phone from the servers.

- From the Home screen, touch Person Email.
- . Touch 🔳 Menu, then touch Refresh.

# **Email Account Settings**

Use Account settings to configure handling of email from your accounts.

Note: Account settings may vary, depending on your email provider.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch
  - Email.
- 2. Touch an account to view it.
- Touch Menu, then touch Account settings.
- 4. Touch fields to configure the account:
  - General settings:
    - Account name: Enter a name for the account's display.
    - Your name: Enter your name, to be used on emails.
    - Signature: Add a standard signature to the bottom of the emails you send.
    - Amount to synchronize (Exchange accounts only): Choose the time period for which you would like to synchronize your emails.
    - Inbox check frequency: Choose an interval for checking for email.

- Default account: When enabled, this account is the default account for sending email from your phone.
- · Notification settings:
  - Email notifications: Enable or disable alerts in the Status Bar.
  - Select ringtone: Choose a ringtone to use for new email alerts.
  - Vibrate: Enable or disable vibration with new email alerts.
- · Server settings:
  - **Incoming settings**: Modify incoming email server settings.
  - Outgoing settings (Public Email accounts only): Modify outgoing email server settings.
  - Sync contacts (Exchange accounts only): When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange or Google contacts with your phone's Contacts.
  - Sync calendar (Exchange accounts only): When enabled, synchronizes your Exchange or Google calendar with your phone.

# **Google Talk**

Chat with other Google Talk users.

Tip: Talk requires that you have a Google account. For information on setting up a Google account, see "Adding a Google account" on page 31

- From the Home screen, select Applications → talk.
- If you have already set up your Google account, you are automatically logged in. If you do not have a Google account, you can touch Create to create a new Google account.
- Use the application's on-screen controls to chat with other Google Talk users.
- 4. Touch Menu to select All or Most Popular friends, Add friends, Search for friends, Sign out, Change Talk settings, Close all chats, or review lists of Invites that are pending or Blocked friends.

# **Section 7: Web and Social Networking**

### YouTube

View and upload YouTube videos, right from your phone.

Navigate to a Home screen panel, then touch YouTube.

### Voice Search

Voice Search offers voice-activated Google searches.

- 1. Navigate to a Home screen panel, then touch Applications → ,, Voice Search.
- 2. Voice Search uses your location to improve search results and offer other services. Touch Agree to allow locationbased searches, or Disagree to disallow.
- 3. At the Speak now prompt, speak your search criteria slowly and clearly. Google searches for the information and displays results.

### **Browser**

Your phone is equipped with a full HTML Browser, which allows you to access the internet.

▶ From any Home screen panel, touch Browser



### Navigating the web

### **Command Keys**

- Touch **Back** to return to the previous page.
- To go forward, touch Menu → Forward.

#### Zoom In - Zoom Out

- To zoom in on a page, with your thumb and index finger pressed together, touch the screen and drag your fingers apart.
- To zoom out from a page, with your thumb and index finger separated, touch the screen with both fingers and drag your fingers together.

### **Touching and dragging**

▶ Touch and drag your finger on the screen to navigate pages, and to reposition pages within the screen.

# **Entering text in a field**

While browsing with the keypad open, touch a text field. then enter text using the keypad.

While browsing with the keypad closed, touch a text field to display the virtual QWERTY keyboard to enter text.

### Selecting items on a page

While browsing pages, use gestures and menus to navigate links on pages:

- Touch an item or hyperlink to select it.
- Touch and hold on a hyperlink for these options:
  - Open: Go to the linked page.
  - Open in new window: Open a new window to display the linked page.
  - Bookmark link: Add a bookmark to linked page (without loading it).
- Save link: Save the linked page to Download history.
- Share link: Send the link via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, or Messaging.
- Copy link URL: Save the link's URL to the clipboard.

### **Entering a URL**

Access a web site quickly by entering the URL.

- 1. From any Home screen panel, touch ( Browser.
- Touch the **URL** field at the top of the screen, then enter the URL using the physical keypad or the on-screen QWERTY keyboard.
- 3. As you enter characters, potential matches display. Continue entering characters, or touch a match to complete the URL.
- Touch  $\rightarrow$  to load the page.

### **Using Browser Windows**

You can have up to four windows open at one time, switching between windows.

- From any Home screen panel, touch
- Browser.

- To open a new window, press  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  New window.
- To switch to another open window, press  **Menu** → Windows. Touch a window to display it.
- To close a window, press  **Menu → Windows**. Touch Close to close it.

# **Using Bookmarks**

While browsing, bookmark a site to guickly access it in the future.

### Creating a bookmark

Create a bookmark to a page, for later browsing.

- 1. From any Home screen panel, touch Browser.
- Browse to the desired web site, then touch Bookmarks next to the URL field.
- 3. The new web site is displayed as a thumbnail with the command Add. Touch the bookmark to add it.
- 4. At the Add bookmark prompt, confirm the Name and Location for the bookmark, then touch **OK** to save the bookmark.

### **Accessing bookmarks and history**

Launch a bookmarked page, or reload recent pages.

- From any Home screen panel, touch Browser.
- 2. Touch → Bookmarks next to the URL field.
- 3. On the Bookmarks tab, use these options:
  - · Touch a bookmark to load the page.
  - · Touch and hold on a bookmark for these options:
    - Open: Launch the bookmarked page.
    - Open in new window: Open the linked page in a new window.
    - Edit bookmark: Modify the URL.
    - Add shortcut to Home: Create a bookmark on the Home screen.
    - Share link: Send the link via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, or Messaging.
    - Copy link URL: Save the link's URL to the clipboard.
    - **Delete bookmark**: Remove the bookmark.
    - **Set as homepage**: Assign the bookmarked link as the home page.
  - - Bookmark last-viewed page: Add the URL of the last page you viewed to the Bookmarks list.
    - List / Thumbnail view to view bookmarks as a list/an array of small page images.
- 4. On the Most visited tab, use these options:
  - Touch a page to reload it.
  - Touch the star next to a page to bookmark it.

- Touch and hold on a page for these options:
  - Open: Launch the web page.
  - Open in new window: Launch the web page in a new window.
  - Add bookmark / Remove from bookmarks: Bookmark the page, or remove the bookmark for this page.
  - Share link: Send the link via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, or Messaging.
  - Copy link URL: Copy the page's URL to the clipboard for pasting.
  - Remove from history: Remove the record of this page.
  - Set as homepage: Set this page as the default first page when opening the Browser.
- 5. On the **History** tab, use these options:
  - Touch a page to load it.
  - . Touch the star next to a page to bookmark it.
  - To clear the history, press Menu → Clear history.
  - Touch and hold on a page for these options:
    - Open: Launch the web page.
    - Open in new window: Launch the web page in a new window.
    - Add bookmark / Remove from bookmarks: Bookmark the page, or remove the bookmark for this page.
    - Share link: Send the link via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, or Messaging.
    - Copy link URL: Copy the page's URL to the clipboard to paste in another location.
    - Remove from history: Remove the record of this page.

- **Set as homepage**: Set this page as the default first page when opening the Browser.

## Copying Fields or Text

Copy information from a web page to the clipboard for pasting.

### Copying text

- From any Home screen panel, touch (

Browser

- Browse to the desired web site.
- Touch and hold on some text you want to copy. The word you selected becomes highlighted in yellow and bracketed by text markers (
- If needed, touch and slide the text markers individually, left or right, to highlight additional text.
- Touch the highlighted text. The text is saved to Clipboard memory.
- To paste the copied text, navigate to the desired field (or to another application), then touch and hold in a text field and touch Paste.

## Copying a hyperlink or URL

- From any Home screen panel, touch
- Browser.
- Browse to the desired web site.
- Touch and hold on a hyperlink or URL for these options:
  - **Bookmark link**: Create a bookmark to the page (without loading it).

- Save link: Save the linked page to Download history.
- Share link: Send the page's URL via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, or Messaging.
- Copy link URL: Save the link's URL to the clipboard.

#### **Browser Menu**

While viewing a web page, press | Menu for these options:

- **New window**: Open a new browser window. The previous browser windows remain open in the background (use the Windows option to switch between windows).
- Bookmarks: Create a bookmark for the current page or view your current bookmarks
- Windows: Switch between windows, or open a new window.
- **Refresh**: Update the current page's content from the server.
- Forward: Move forward to a previously-viewed page.
- · More:
  - Add bookmark: Create a bookmark on the Home screen.
  - Find on page: Search for content on the current page.
- **Select text**: Select text to copy to your clipboard.
- Page info: View information about the current page, including the URL.
- Share page: Send the current page's URL via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail. or Messaging.
- Downloads: View a list of downloads
- Settings: Customize the Browser (see Browser Settings below).

### **Browser Settings**

- From any Home screen panel, touch Browser.
- Press Menu → More → Settings:
  - · Page content settings
    - Text size: Choose a size for text display.
    - **Default zoom**: Choose a default zoom level for web pages.
    - Open pages in overview: When enabled, displays an overview of newly-opened pages.
    - Text encoding: Choose a default character set for web pages.
    - Block pop-up windows: When enabled, blocks pop-up windows.
    - Load images: When enabled, images are automatically loaded when you visit a page. When disabled, images are indicated by a link, which you can touch to download the picture.
    - Auto-fit pages: When enabled, the browser automatically sizes web pages to fit your phone's display.
    - Landscape-only display: When enabled, Browser displays all pages in the wider landscape orientation (rotate your phone counterclockwise to view pages in landscape mode).
    - Enable JavaScript: When enabled, Browser will automatically run JavaScript scripts on pages you visit.
    - Enable plug-ins: When enabled, Browser will automatically load and run plug-ins on pages you visit.
    - Open in background: When enabled, new windows open behind the current window

- Set home page: View and set the default first page that displays when you launch Browser.
- · Privacy settings
  - Clear cache: Delete content and databases stored on the phone.
  - Clear history: Delete the list of previously-visited pages.
  - Accept cookies: When enabled, allows Browser to save and read cookie information used by web pages.
  - Clear all cookie data: Delete cookie information saved to the phone.
  - Remember form data: When enabled, stores information you enter into forms to make future forms easier.
  - Clear form data: Deletes saved form information.
  - Enable location: When enabled, sites you visit can request access to your location.
  - Clear location access: Clear location access for all web sites.

# Security settings

- Remember passwords: When enabled, saves usernames and passwords for sites you visit, to make future visits easier.
- Clear passwords: Clear all saved usernames and passwords.
- Show security warnings: When enabled, Browser will warn you if there is a problem with a site's security.

# · Advanced settings

- Set search engine: Select Google, Yahoo!, or Bing as the search engine for your Browser.
- Website settings: View and manage settings for individual websites.

 Reset to default: Clear all browser data and reset all settings to the factory defaults.

### Maps

Use Google Maps to find your current location, get directions, and other location-based information.

Note: You must enable location services to use Maps, and some features require Standalone or Google location services. (For more information, refer to "Location & security" on page 89.)

 Applications → Maps.

# Navigating the Map

#### Zooming

- . Double-tap on the screen to zoom in.
- Touch ⊕ Zoom in or ⊝ Zoom out.

### **Scrolling**

• Touch and drag on the screen to reposition the map in the display.

#### **Touch and Touch and hold**

- Touch and hold on an area of the map to display information about the location.
- . Touch an information balloon for these options:
- Map: Move the map's focus to this location.
- **Directions**: Get driving, public transport, or walking directions.
- Call: Call the number provided in the location information.
- Street view: Get a street-level view of this location (if available).
- Improve My Location accuracy (only appears for My Location):



# **Music Player**

Music Player plays music files stored on a microSD or microSDHC Memory Card. (For more information, refer to "Memory Card" on page 11.)

### **Playing Music**

- From the Home screen, touch Applications → Music.
- 2. Select a tab to display your music files, from **Artists**, **Albums**, **Songs**, or **Playlists**.
- 3. Browse through your available music to find songs.
- 4. Touch a song or playlist to begin playback.
- 5. During playback, use the sound and playlist controls:
  - Volume: Press the Volume key to adjust volume.
  - List: Display the list of songs by the artist.
  - Shuffle: Touch to enable or disable shuffle mode. when enabled, songs play in random order. When disabled, songs play in the order they appear.
  - Repeat: Touch to repeat the current song, repeat all songs, or disable repeat mode.

### **Creating a Playlist**

- 2. Press and hold a song that you want to add to a playlist.
- 3. Touch Add to playlist.
- 4. Touch New.
- **5.** Touch the Playlist name field and use the on-screen keyboard to enter a name.
- Touch Save.

- While viewing the picture, touch the zoom icons to zoom incrementally, or double-tap on the picture to zoom all the way in or out.
- 6. Touch Menu to access the following options:
  - Touch Share to send the picture via Bluetooth, Gmail, Picasa, Email, Facebook, Twitter, or Messaging.
  - Touch **Delete** to erase the picture.
  - Touch More to access the additional options: Details, Set as, Crop, Rotate left, Rotate right.
- Touch Back to return to the Camera to take more pictures.

### **Camera Options**

Configure the camera.

While in Camera mode, touch an option to configure:

- Scene mode: Choose a mode to match conditions (None, Landscape, Sports, Party/Indoor, Beach/Snow, Sunset, Dawn, Fall colour, Night, Backlight, Fireworks, or Candelight).
- Picture size: Set picture size (3M Pixels, 2M Pixels, 1M Pixels, or VGA Pixels).
- Picture quality: Choose a quality setting for photos (Super fine, Fine, or Normal).
- Color effect: Apply special color effects to your pictures / videos (None, Mono, Sepia, Negative, Aqua, or Sketch).
- Camera settings: Restore to default.
- Store location: Save location coordinates where pictures are taken. Lets you Show on Maps where you took a selected picture.
- White balance: Select how the camera responds to available light (Auto, Incandescent, Daylight, Fluorescent, or Cloudy).
- Metering: Set to Matrix, Center, or Spot.
- **Zoom**: Allows you to zoom in on an image (1x 4x).

#### Camcorder

Use your phone's built-in Camcorder to record video.



Important!: Do not take videos of people without their permission.

Do not take videos in places where cameras are not allowed.

Do not take videos in places where you may interfere with another person's privacy.

### **Capturing Video**

- From the Home screen, touch Applications → Camera → use the slider to select Camcorder.
- **2.** Using the display as a viewfinder, compose your shot by aiming the lens at the subject.

- After recording, touch Image Viewer to view the video. While viewing the video, use these options:

    - Touch Share to send the video via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, Messaging, or YouTube.
    - Touch **Delete** to erase the video
    - Touch More to access the additional option: Details.

### **Camcorder Options**

Configure the camcorder.

- While in Camcorder mode, touch an option to configure:
  - Settings
    - Color effect: Apply special color effects to your pictures / videos (None, Mono, Sepia, Negative, Aqua, or Sketch).
  - Camera settings: Restore to defaults.
  - White balance: Select how the camera responds to available light (Auto, Incandescent, Daylight, Fluorescent, or Cloudy).
  - Video Quality: Control video clarity and duration [High (30m), Low (30m), MMS (Low, 30s), or YouTube (High, 10m)].

# **Gallery**

Use Gallery to view, capture, and manage pictures and videos.

Note: To take pictures or record video, you must install an optional memory card in your phone. (For more information, refer to "Memory Card" on page 11.)

► From the Home screen, select Applications → Gallery.

### **Viewing Videos**

- From the Home screen, select Applications → Gallery.
- 2. Touch a category, then touch a video to play it.

- 3. While browsing videos, touch | Menu for these options:
  - Share: Send one or more videos using Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, Messaging, or YouTube. (To each video to select it for sending.)
  - Delete: Erase the selected video(s) from the Gallery. (To each video to select it for erasure.)
  - More:
- Details: View information about the video.

## **Viewing Pictures**

- From the Home screen, select Applications → Gallery.
- Touch a category (such as, Camera or sdcard), then touch a picture to view.
- While viewing a picture, tap on the screen or touch Menu for options:
  - Share: Share the selected picture via Bluetooth, Email, Facebook, Gmail, Messaging, Picasa, or Twitter.
  - Delete: Erase the picture.
  - More:
    - **Details**: Display information about the picture.
    - Set as: Assign the picture as a Wallpaper, or as Contact icon..
    - Crop: Drag the edges of the crop tool to select an area of the picture, then touch Save to save just the selected area, removing the rest of the picture.

- Rotate left: Change the orientation of the picture.
- Rotate right: Change the orientation of the picture.

# Sharing pictures and video

Share pictures and videos via Email, AllShare, Bluetooth, Messaging, Picasa, or Gmail.

- Touch a category (such as, Camera or sdcard), then touch a picture or video to select it.

Tip: To select multiple pictures or videos, touch Menu, touch thumbnails to mark them, then touch Share.

- Select a contact, or create a new contact, with the selected picture as the contact's icon.

### **Section 10: Connections**

Your phone includes features to connect to the internet and to other devices, via Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, and Dial Up Networking.

### Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that provides access to local area networks. Use your phone's Wi-Fi feature to:

- · Access the internet for browsing, or to send or receive email.
- Access your corporate network.
- Use hotspots provided by hotels or airports while traveling.

Wi-Fi communication requires access to an existing Wireless Access Point (WAP). WAPs can be Open (unsecured, as with most hotspots), or Secured (requiring you to provide login credentials). Your phone supports the 802.11 b/g Wi-Fi protocol.

# **Configuring Wi-Fi Settings**

Configure your phone's Wi-Fi settings. (For more information, refer to "Wi-Fi settings" on page 78.)

# Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

Turn your phone's Wi-Fi service on or off. When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your phone automatically searches for available, in-range WAPs (Wireless Access Points).

### **Turning Wi-Fi On or Off**

- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Settings → Wireless & networks.
- Touch Wi-Fi to turn Wi-Fi On or Off. A checkmark displays to indicate activation.

## Scanning and Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network

When you turn on Wi-Fi, your phone searches for available Wi-Fi connections, then displays them on screen.

- Turn on Wi-Fi. For more information, refer to "Turning Wi-Fi On or Off" on this page.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi settings.
- When your phone completes a scan, touch a Wi-Fi network to connect.
  - If the Wi-Fi network is open, you will be automatically connected.

Tip: Open Wi-Fi- networks often require that you next launch the Browser, then acknowlege your acceptance of those sites' limits on network usage.

> If the Wi-Fi network is secured, enter the password at the prompt to connect.

### Adding a Wi-Fi Network Manually

- Turn on Wi-Fi. For more information, refer to "Turning Wi-Fi On or Off" on page 63.
- Touch Wi-Fi settings.
- 3. Touch Add Wi-Fi network, then enter values for these fields:
  - Network SSID: Enter the name of the Wi-Fi Wireless Access Point.
  - Security: Select the type of security used by the WAP.
  - Password or Key: If the WAP is secured, enter the password or hex key.
- 4. Touch Save to save your settings.

### **Bluetooth**

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology for exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet.

You don't need to line up the devices to send information with Bluetooth. If the devices are in range, you can exchange information between them, even if they are in different rooms.

# **Configuring Bluetooth Settings**

Configure your phone's Bluetooth settings. (For more information, refer to "Bluetooth settings" on page 79.)

# **Turning Bluetooth On or Off**

### **Turning Bluetooth On**

### Pairing with a Bluetooth Device

Search for a Bluetooth device and pair with it, to exchange information between your phone and the device.

- 3. Activate the target device's discoverable mode.
- Touch Scan for devices.

- 6. At the prompt, enter the passkey for the target device and touch **OK**. Your phone is now paired with the target device, and ready to transfer information via Bluetooth.

#### **Mobile AP**

Use Mobile AP to share your phone's internet connection with a PC or other device through Wi-Fi.

**Note:** To use Mobile AP, you need the Mobile AP feature from your wirelesss provider. Contact your wireless provider for more information.

Mobile AP consumes battery power and uses data service. While the Mobile AP is active, your phone's applications will use the Mobile AP data feature allowance.

### **Mobile AP On or Off**

- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Settings → Wireless & networks → Mobile AP.
- Touch Mobile AP to turn Mobile AP On or Off. When on, a check appears in the checkbox.

Note: Using your phone as a mobile hotspot consumes battery power and increases your data usage. Roaming while using your phone as a mobile hotspot will incur extra data charges.

## **Connecting to Your Mobile AP**

 From a Wi-Fi compatible device, scan for Wi-Fi hotspots. By default, your phone's Mobile AP SSID appears as SCH-R680xxx. (To change your phone's SSID, see "Mobile AP Settings" on page 81.) Select your phone's Mobile AP. You are prompted to enter a password.

Tip: By default, your phone's Mobile AP password is your phone number.

The Wi-Fi compatible device can now access the Internet through your phone's Mobile AP.

### **Mobile AP Settings**

# **Tethering**

Use Tethering to share your device's 3G internet connection with another device that connects to your device via USB cable.

- From the Home screen, touch Menu → Settings → Wireless & networks → Tethering.
- Connect another device (such as a personal computer) to the phone using the USB data cable.
- Touch USB Tethering to turn tethering On or Off. When On, a check appears in the checkbox.
- With USB Tethering set to On, your connected device can now access the Internet through your phone.

#### VPN

You can connect your phone to an enterprise VPN (Virtual Private Network), such as your employer's, to access your e-mail.

   →Wireless & network → VPN settings → Add VPN. The
   screen displays on the screen with the following VPN

**Important!:** To prevent damage to information stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the phone.

# **Erasing a Memory Card**

Erasing prepares a used Memory Card for use with your phone by erasing all content and adding required folders.

Caution!: Do not routinely erase Memory Cards when you simply wish to delete some files. Repeated erasing of a Memory Card can shorten its useful life.

#### Clock

#### Latitude

With Google Latitude, you can see the location of all of your friends on a map or on a list. You can also share or hide your location.

Your location is displayed on the Latitude map screen, accurate to 1700 meters.

# **Sharing your Location with Friends**

- 1. From the Latitude map screen, tap to display your Latitude friends. At first, only your name is displayed.
- 2. Press , then touch Add friends.
- Touch Select from Contacts or Add via email address.
- Touch a Contact or enter an email address, then touch Add friends
- 5. At the Send sharing requests prompt, touch Yes.

Your friend will receive an email or text message with your location marked on a map. They will also receive instructions on how to view your location from the web or use Latitude on their phone or tablet provided it is available. Once they acknowledge your request, their location will display on your phone. They can share their location from their computer, phone, or tablet.

# **Maps Options**

- 1. Press to display the following options:
  - Search: allows you to search for a place of interest.
  - Directions: displays navigation directions to a location from a starting point.
  - My Places: shows you locations you have marked as favorites. such as restaurants, museums, parks, and so on.
  - Clear Map: after viewing or following directions, this option resets the map.
  - Join Latitude: lets you and your friends share locations and status messages with each other. It also lets you send instant messages and emails and get directions to your friends' locations.
  - More: allows you to select the following additional options:
    - Labs: this is a testing ground for experimental features that aren't ready for prime time. They may change, break or disappear at any time. Click on a Lab to enable or disable it
    - Cache Settings: Enable/disable Prefetch on mobile, or Clear the map tile cache.
    - **Help**: displays the Google Mobile Help web page where you can receive help on Google Maps.

- Terms, Privacy & Notices: displays the Terms and Conditions, Privacy Policy, or Legal Notices information. Select the desired information from the pop-up menu.
- About: displays general information about Google maps such as Version, Platform, Locale, Total data sent, Total data received. Free memory, etc.
- Tap the following icons for the following additional options:



Places: Uses Google Maps and your location to help you find Restaurants, Coffee, Bars, Hotels, Attractions, ATMs, and Gas Stations, You can also add your own locations.



Layers: Additional items that you can have displayed on your map. They include:

- . Traffic: Displays real-time traffic conditions so you can plan the fastest route.
- Satellite: Lets you see your map as a satellite image.
- Terrain: Displays terrain features such as hills and mountains.
- . Transit Lines: Lets you see railway lines and other mass transit systems.
- . Latitude: Lets you see your friend's locations and share your location with them.

- . My Maps: Lets you see maps you have created and stored.
- Bicvcling: Displays bike trails on your map.
- Wikipedia: Displays links to Wikipedia descriptions of places on your map.



My Location: When selected, the location displays on the map with a blinking blue arrow.

#### Market

Browse for new Android applications, games or downloads for vour phone.

You'll need to have a Google account set up on your phone to download a new application.

From the **Applications** menu, touch **Market**.



- The first time you open Market, read the Terms of Service. then touch Accept to continue.
- 3. Browse for items to install or upgrade downloads:
  - Apps: New applications.
  - Games: New games.
  - My apps: Display requested downloads, plus available updates to applications installed on your phone.

## **Voice Dialer**

Voice Commands is advanced speech recognition software that recognizes your spoken commands to dial phone numbers, create messages, and launch phone features such as Contacts, Calendar and Mv Music.

To use Voice Commands, speak naturally into your phone, at a distance of 3-12 inches. There is no need to "train" Voice Commands, it is designed to recognize natural speech.

From the **Applications** menu, touch Voice Dialer.

Note: At each step, Voice Commands displays a list of available commands. If Voice Commands does not recognize your command, it will prompt you to confirm.

#### Call <Name>

Place a call by speaking a contact name or telephone number.

- From the **Applications** menu, touch **Wolce Dialer**. A list of commands pops-up.
- 2. Say "Call", followed by a Contact name as it appears in your Contacts list.

- If the Contact has only one stored number, your phone automatically dials it.
- If the Contact has more thant one stored number, a list pops-up. Select the number to call.

#### Dial < Number>

Place a call by speaking a contact name or telephone number.

- 2. Say "Dial", followed by a phone number. Your phone automatically dials it.

The **Settings** menu appears in the display.

## Wireless & networks

Control your phone's wireless connections.

# Airplane mode

When airplane mode is activated, all your phone's wireless connections are disabled, and you cannot make or receive calls or messages or connect to networks. While in airplane mode, you can use other features of your phone, such as playing music, watching videos, or other applications.

- From the **Settings** menu, touch **Wireless & networks**.
- Touch Airplane mode to activate or deactivate airplane mode. When activated, a check appears in the check box.

# Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

For more information, refer to "Turning Wi-Fi On or Off" on page 78.

## Wi-Fi settings

Set up and manage wireless access points. Your phone supports Wi-Fi 802.11 b/g/n.

- From the Settings menu, touch Wireless & networks → Wi-Fi settings.
- Touch the following settings to configure:
  - Wi-Fi: Touch to turn Wi-Fi On or Off. When on, a check appears in the check hox
  - Network notification: A list of nearby Network Access Points (NAPs) detected by your phone.
  - Add Wi-Fi Network: Manually add a new Wi-Fi connection.

#### **Bluetooth**

Your phone supports Bluetooth® 3.0.

# **Bluetooth profiles**

Bluetooth profiles are specifications for services supported by individual devices. Profiles improve the ability of different devices to work together. Your phone supports these Bluetooth profiles:

- Headset: HSP v1.1 profile supports use of a compatible Bluetooth headset for mono voice.
- Handsfree: HFP v1.5 profile supports Bluetooth headsets, and may also support other installed compatible Bluetooth devices with speakerphone capabilities.
- Stereo: A2DP v1.0 and AVRCP v1.0 profiles support delivery of stereo audio to a compatible Bluetooth device.
- Phonebook Access: PBAP v1.0 profile allows sharing of multiple name card and phonebook entries with a compatible Bluetooth device.
- Object Push: OPP v1.1 profile allows sending and receiving of contact name cards (vCard 2.1) and calendar events (vCalendar) between devices.

Note: This device does not support all Bluetooth profiles. For vehicle/ accessory compatibility, contact your Wireless Provider.

## **Turning Bluetooth On or Off**

Turn your device's Bluetooth service On or Off. For more information about using Bluetooth to exchange information with other Bluetooth devices, see "Bluetooth" on page 64

- From the Settings menu, touch Wireless & networks.
- Touch Bluetooth to turn Bluetooth On or Off. When On, a check appears in the check box.

# **Bluetooth settings**

Use Bluetooth settings to manage Bluetooth connections, set your device's name, and control your device's visibility to other devices.

Note: Bluetooth must be turned On to access some settings.

- From the Settings menu, touch Wireless & networks → Bluetooth settings.
- 2. Touch a setting to configure Bluetooth:
  - Bluetooth: Touch to turn Bluetooth On or Off. When On, a check appears in the check box.
  - Device name: Your device's default name appears on screen.
     Touch to change the device name. Available when Bluetooth is turned On.

- Discoverable: Control your phone's visibility to other devices' Bluetooth searches. Touch to turn On or Off. Available when Bluetooth is turned On.
- Discoverable timeout: Select when your Bluetooth will stop your phone being discoverable (2 minutes, 5 minutes, 1 hour, Never).
- Scan for devices: Touch to scan for nearby discoverable devices.
   After searching, touch a device to pair with it. For more information, see see "Pairing with a Bluetooth Device" on page 64.

#### Mobile AP

Use Mobile AP to share your phone's 3G internet connection with a PC or other device through Wi-Fi.

Note: To use Mobile AP, you need the Mobile AP feature from your wireless carrier. Contact your wireless carrier for more information.

Mobile AP consumes battery power and uses data service. While the Mobile AP is active, your phone's applications will use the Mobile AP data feature allowance.

# **Turning Mobile AP On or Off**

- From the Settings screen, touch Wireless & network → Mobile AP.
- Touch Mobile AP to turn Mobile AP On or Off. When on, a check appears in the checkbox.

Note: Using your phone as a mobile hotspot consumes battery power and increases your data usage. Roaming while using your phone as a mobile hotspot will incur extra data charges.

#### **Mobile AP Settings**

- From the Settings screen, touch Wireless & network → Mobile AP.
- Touch Mobile AP to turn on mobile hotspot. Mobile AP must be turned on to access settings.
- Touch Mobile AP Settings to configure your Mobile AP:
  - Router name (SSID): View and edit your phone's name, used by other devices when connecting to your mobile hotspot.
  - Security: Choose a security level.
  - Password: Enter a password to require a password to access your phone as a hotspot.
  - Show password: Touch to enable display of your password in the Password field. When disabled, the password is not shown.

**Tip:** By default, your phone's mobile hotspot password is your phone number.

Note: Using your phone as a mobile hotspot consumes battery power and increases your data usage. Roaming while using your phone as a mobile hotspot will incur extra data charges.

## **Tethering**

Use Tethering to share your device's 3G internet connection with another device that connects to your device via USB cable.

- From the Settings screen, touch Wireless & networks → Tethering.
- 2. Connect the other device to the phone via USB cable.
- Touch USB Tethering to turn tethering On or Off. When On, a check appears in the checkbox.

#### **VPN** settings

The VPN settings menu allows you to set up and manage Virtual Private Networks (VPNs).

Important!: Before you can use a VPN you must establish and configure one.

# Adding a VPN

Before you add a VPN you must determine which VPN protocol to use: PPTP (Point-to-Point Tunneling Protocol), L2TP (Layer 2 Tunneling Protocol), L2TP/IPSec PSK (Pre-shared key based L2TP/IPSec), or L2TP/IPSec CRT (Certificate based L2TP/IPSec).

- From the Settings menu, touch Wireless & networks → VPN settings.
- 2. Tap Add VPN.

# To establish a PPTP (Point-to-Point Tunneling Protocol):

- 1. Tap Add PPTP VPN.
- Tap VPN name, add a name for this connection using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Set VPN server, add a name using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Enable Encryption to make a checkmark (if desired).
- Tap DNS search domains, add a name for DNS search using the keypad, then tap OK.

# To establish a L2TP (Layer 2 Tunneling Protocol):

- Tap Add L2TP VPN.
  - Tap VPN name, add a name for this connection using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Set VPN server, add a name using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Enable L2TP Secret to make a checkmark (if desired).
- Tap Set L2TP Secret and enter a password (if desired), then tap 0K.
- Tap DNS search domains, add a name for DNS search using the keypad, then tap OK.

# To establish a L2TP/IPSec PSK (Pre-shared key based L2TP/IPSec):

- Tap Add L2TP/IPSec PSK VPN.
- Tap VPN name, add a name for this connection using the keypad, then tap 0K.
- Tap Set VPN server, add a name using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Set IPsec pre-shared key, enter a key and tap OK.
- Tap Enable L2TP Secret to make a checkmark (if desired).
- Tap Set L2TP Secret and enter a password (if desired), then tap OK.

Tap DNS search domains, add a name for DNS search using the keypad, then tap OK.

# To establish a L2TP/IPSec CRT (Certificate based L2TP/IPSec):

- Tap Add L2TP/IPSec CRT VPN.
- Tap VPN name, add a name for this connection using the keypad, then tap OK.
- Tap Set VPN server, add a name using the keypad, then tap OK.
- 4. Tap Enable L2TP Secret to make a checkmark (if desired).
- Tap Set L2TP Secret and enter a password (if desired), then tap OK.
- **6.** Tap **Set user certificate**, then tap **OK**.
- Tap Set CA certificate, then tap OK.
- Tap DNS search domains, add a name for DNS search using the keypad, then tap OK.

#### Mobile networks

Set options for network selection and data services while roaming.

Important!: Depending on your service plan, changes you make to Mobile Networks settings may incur extra charges. Contact your Wireless Provider for more information.

- From the Settings menu, touch Wireless & networks → Mobile networks.
- Set these options:
  - 3G data: To activate the data network, this option must be selected.
     It is set on by default.
  - Data roaming: Enable or disable connections to data services when your device is roaming on another network. For more information about roaming, see "Roaming" on page 11.
  - System select: Change the roaming mode for CDMA networks.
    - Home Only: Restrict your phone to your home network's coverage area. When outside the coverage area, your phone will not roam, and call functions and other wireless features will not be available.
    - Automatic: Allow your phone to automatically acquire service based on default settings, using your Wireless Provider's network and the networks of roaming partners.

# **Call settings**

To access the Call settings menu:

From the Settings menu, touch Call settings.

## Voicemail service

Choose the voicemail service you wish to use.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → Voicemail service.
- 2. Select the desired service.

# Voicemail settings

Enter or change the Voicemail number for accessing your Voice mailbox.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → Voicemail settings.
- 2. Enter or change the Voicemail number, then touch OK.

# **North American dialing**

When enabled, this setting replaces + with the International dialing code except +1.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings.
- Touch North American dialing to add a checkmark and activate the feature.

# International dialing

This setting allows you to change the international dialing prefix that is used to make international calls.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings.
- 2. Touch North American dialing to remove the checkmark.
- Touch International dialing.
- Enter the international dialing prefix you want to use. The default is 011.
- 5. Touch OK.

# **Auto Retry**

When enabled, your phone will automatically re-attempt a call when it encounters a network busy signal.

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Call settings.
- Touch Auto retry to enable or disable automatic call retry.When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

### TTY

When enabled, TTY Mode allows your phone to work with a TTY device attached to the Headset Jack. Before using your phone with a TTY device, you'll need to enable TTY Mode.

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → TTY.
- 2. At the TTY prompt, touch Yes to continue.

3. Touch TTY Off, TTY HCO, TTY VCO, or TTY Full.

## **Voice Privacy**

When enabled, Voice privacy encrypts your voice calls for enhanced privacy.

- 1. From the **Settings** menu, touch **Call settings**.
- Touch **Voice privacy** to enable or disable voice privacy. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

# View call timer

View your phone's call time counters.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → View call timer. The Last Call, Outgoing Calls, Incoming Calls, Roaming Calls, All Calls, Last Reset, Lifetime Calls, All Data, Sent Data, Received Data, and Lifetime Data timers appear.
- 2. To reset all timers except lifetime Calls, touch Menu → Reset all timer.



#### Call Restrictions

Call Restrictions lets you limit calls made with and to you phone

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → Call Restrictions.
- 2. Touch Incoming to choose to Allow All Incoming calls, Allow Contacts Incoming calls only, or to Allow None.

3. Touch Outgoing to choose to Allow All Outgoing calls, Allow Contacts Outgoing calls only, or to Allow None.

## **Emergency Number**

Emergency Numbers lets you set up to 3 numbers that your phone will be able to call with your phone in Airplane Mode or locked. (For more information, refer to "Dialing Emergency" Numbers" on page 26.)

Note: 911 is preset as one of the Emergence numbers.

- From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → **Emergency Number.**
- Touch one of the default emergency numbers to change it or enter a new value.
- To save your changes, touch **Save**.

#### **Auto Answer**

When enabled Auto Answer lets you set your phone to automatically answer calls when you receive them or after a few seconds delay.

- 1. From the **Settings** menu, touch **Call settings**.
- Touch Auto Answer, then select Off, After 1 Second, After 3 Second. or After 5 Second.

#### Hearing aids

Enable/disable your phone's Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) function.

From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → Hearing aids to enable or disable HAC.

#### **DTMF** tones

Set the length of DTMF (Dual Tone Multiple Frequency) tones that your phone sends. DTMF tones are used as input by some automated call systems.

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Call settings → DTMF tones.
- 2. Touch Normal or Long.

# **Sound settings**

#### Silent mode

Temporarily silence all the sounds your phone makes except for media playback and alarms.

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings.
- Touch Silent mode to enable or disable silent mode. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

#### **Vibrate**

When enabled, your phone vibrates to alert you to incoming calls, as well as playing the call ringtone.

From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings → Vibrate to set your phone to Always vibrate, Never vibrate, vibrate Only in Silent mode, or Only when not in Silent mode.

Note: The Phone vibrate setting is independent of other call sounds settings. For example, if you have Silent mode enabled with Phone vibrate, your phone won't play a ringtone, but will vibrate for an incoming call.

#### Volume

Adjust the volume levels for incoming call ringtones, media, and alarms.

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings → Volume.
- 2. Touch and drag the slider to set **Ringtone** volume.

Note: You can also adjust Ringtone volume from the Home screen by pressing the Volume Key.

3. Touch and drag the slider to set Media volume.

Note: You can set Media volume during playback by pressing the Volume Key.

Touch and drag the slider, or press the Volume key, to set Alarm volume. Touch Use incoming call volume for notifications to set notification tones to the same volume as the incoming call ringer. (When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.)

- or -

Touch and drag the slider to set **Notification** volume.

Touch OK to save your setting(s).

# Phone ringtone

Choose a default ringtone for incoming voice calls.

Tip: You can also set songs as ringtones for all calls, or for a selected contact. (For more information, refer to "Settling a Song as a Ringtone" on page 57.)

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings → Phone ringtone.
- Touch a ringtone to hear a sample and select it.
- 3. Touch **OK** to save the setting.

# **Notification ringtone**

Select a default ringtone for message, alarm, and other notifications.

Tip: You can also set songs as alarm ringtones. (For more information, see "Setting a Song as a Ringtone" on page 57.)

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings → Notification ringtone.
- Touch a ringtone to hear a sample and select it.
- Touch OK to save the setting.

#### **Audible touch tones**

When enabled, tones play for when you dial numbers on the Phone Dialer.

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings.
- Touch Audible touch tones to enable or disable tones. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

#### **Audible selection**

When enabled, tones play when you touch the screen for selections (other than the Phone Dialer).

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings.
- Touch Audible selection to enable or disable tones. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

#### Screen lock sounds

When enabled, sounds play when you lock or unlock the screen. (For more information, refer to "Securing Your Phone" on page 12.)

- From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings.
- Touch Screen lock sounds to enable or disable screen lock sounds. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

## **Emergency tone**

When enabled (the default setting) and during an Emergency (911) Call, the phone plays a tone that emergency personnel can use to locate your phone.

Caution!: When you are endangered by intruders, you should disable Emergency tone before placing an Emergency Call.

- ► From the Settings menu, touch Sound settings → Emergency tone. The following options are available:
  - Off: Disables Emergency tone playback.
  - Alert: Enables Emergency tone playback.
  - Vibrate: Your phone vibrates when you place an Emergency Call.

# **Display settings**

# **Brightness**

Set the default screen brightness.

- From the Settings menu, touch Display settings → Brightness.
- Touch and drag the slider to set the brightness.
- 3. Touch **OK** to save the setting.

#### Auto-rotate screen

Enable or disable automatic rotation of the screen when you turn the phone clockwise or counterclockwise.

- From the Settings menu, touch Display settings.
- Touch Auto-rotate screen to enable or disable automatic screen orientation. When enabled, a check appears in the box.

#### **Animation**

Set the level of animations for transitions from one window to another.

- From the Settings menu, touch Display settings → Animation.
- 2. Touch No animations, Some animations, or All animations.

## **Screen timeout**

Set the length of delay between the last key press or screen touch and the automatic screen timeout (dim and lock).

- From the Settings menu, touch Display settings → Screen timeout.
- Touch a setting (15 seconds / 30 seconds / 1 minute / 2 minutes / 10 minutes) to select it.

# **Location & security**

# **Mv Location**

#### **Use Wireless networks**

Enable or disable location service from your Wireless Provider.

Note: Network location services must be enabled to use some applications.

Important!: By selecting Network location services, you are enabling your Wireless Provider and third-parry authenticated and validated location-enabled services access to certain location information available through this network or device.

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Location & security.
- Touch Use wireless networks to enable or disable Network location services. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

# **Use GPS satellites**

Enable or disable location service from Standalone GPS services.

**Note:** Standalone location services must be enabled to use some applications.

Important!: By selecting Standalone GPS services, you are allowing access to all location information by any third party through web access or any software or peripheral components you choose to install, download, add or attach to the device or any other means. Enabling this functionality could pose certain risks to users of this device.

- 1. From the Settings menu, touch Location & security.
- Touch Use GPS satellites to enable or disable Standalone GPS services. When enabled, a check mark appears in the check box.

# Set up screen lock settings

The default lock screen prevents accidental call dialing or activation of features or applications.

To protect your phone from unauthorized use, use a personal screen unlock pattern, a Personal Identification Number (PIN), or a password.

For more information about using the lock and unlock features of your phone, see "Securing Your Phone" on page 12.

- From the Settings menu, touch Location & security.
- Touch Set up screen lock to select the desired method of unlocking the screen on your phone.

The following subsections describe the available options.

#### Set unlock pattern/Change unlock pattern

A screen unlock pattern is a touch gesture you create and use to unlock your phone.

- From the Settings menu, touch Location & security → Set up screen lock or Change screen lock.
- 2. Touch Pattern.
- Follow the prompts to create or change your screen unlock pattern.

## Set unlock PIN/Change unlock PIN

A screen unlock PIN is a Personal Identification Number that you can store and then use to unlock your phone.

- From the Settings menu, touch Location & security → Set up screen lock or Change screen lock.
- 2. Touch PIN. A phone-style keypad appears on the screen.
- Follow the prompts to create or change your screen unlock PIN.

#### Set unlock Password/Change unlock Password

A screen unlock Password is a word or series of 4 or more characters that you can store and then use to unlock your phone.

# **Section 13: Health and Safety Information**

This section outlines the safety precautions associated with using your phone. The terms "mobile device" or "cell phone" are used in this section to refer to your phone. Read this information before using your mobile device.

# **Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals**

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published information for consumers relating to Radio Frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

# Do cell phones pose a health hazard?

Many people are concerned that cell phone radiation will cause cancer or other serious health hazards. The weight of scientific evidence has not linked cell phones with any health problems.

Cell phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Over the past 15 years, scientists have conducted hundreds of studies looking at the biological effects of the radio frequency energy emitted by cell phones. While some researchers have reported biological changes associated with RF energy, these studies have failed to be replicated. The majority of studies published have failed to show an association between exposure to radio frequency from a cell phone and health problems.

The low levels of RF cell phones emit while in use are in the microwave frequency range. They also emit RF at substantially reduced time intervals when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects.

The biological effects of radio frequency energy should not be confused with the effects from other types of electromagnetic energy.

Very high levels of electromagnetic energy, such as is found in X-rays and gamma rays, can ionize biological tissues. Ionization is a process where electrons are stripped away from their normal locations in atoms and molecules. It can permanently damage biological tissues including DNA, the genetic material.

The energy levels associated with radio frequency energy, including both radio waves and microwaves, are not great enough to cause ionization of atoms and molecules. Therefore, RF energy is a type of non-ionizing radiation. Other types of non-ionizing radiation include visible light, infrared radiation (heat), and other forms of electromagnetic radiation with relatively low frequencies.

While RF energy does not ionize particles, large amounts can increase body temperatures and cause tissue damage. Two areas of the body, the eyes and the testes, are particularly vulnerable to RF heating because there is relatively little blood flow in them to carry away excess heat.

# Research Results to Date: Is there a connection between RF and certain health problems?

The results of most studies conducted to date say no. In addition, attempts to replicate and confirm the few studies that have shown a connection have failed.

The scientific community at large therefore believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community has supported additional research to address gaps in knowledge. Some of these studies are described below.

# **Interphone Study**

Interphone is a large international study designed to determine whether cell phones increase the risk of head and neck cancer. A report published in the International Journal of Epidemiology (June, 2010) compared cell phone usage for more than 5,000 people with brain tumors (glioma and meningioma) and a similar number of healthy controls.

Results of this study did NOT show that cell phones caused brain cancer. In this study, most people had no increased risk of brain cancer from using cell phones. For people with the heaviest use of cell phones (an average of more than ½ hour per day, every day, for over 10 years) the study suggested a slight increase in brain cancer. However, the authors determined that biases and errors prevented any conclusions being drawn from this data. Interphone is the largest cell phone study to date, but it did not answer all questions about cell phone safety. Additional research is being conducted around the world, and the FDA continues to monitor developments in this field.

# International Cohort Study on Mobile Phone Users (COSMOS)

The COSMOS study aims to conduct long-term health monitoring of a large group of people to determine if there are any health issues linked to long-term exposure to radio frequency energy from cell phone use. The COSMOS study will follow approximately 300,000 adult cell phone users in Europe for 20 to 30 years. # Risk of Brain Cancer from Exposure to Radio Frequency Fields in Childhood and Adolescence (MOBI-KIDS)

MOBI-KIDS is an international study investigating the relationship between exposure to radio frequency energy from communication technologies including cell phones and brain cancer in young people. This is an international multi-center study involving 14 European and non-European countries. # Surveillance, Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER) Program of the National Cancer Institute

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) actively follows cancer statistics in the United States to detect any change in rates of new cases for brain cancer. If cell phones play a role in risk for brain cancer, rates should go up, because heavy cell phone use has been common for quite some time in the U.S. Between 1987 and 2005, the overall age-adjusted incidence of brain cancer did not increase. # **Cell Phone Industry Actions**

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the cell phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support-needed research on possible biological effects of RF for the type of signal emitted by cell phones;
- Design cell phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user; and
- Cooperate in providing users of cell phones with the current information on cell phone use and human health concerns.

The FDA also is working with voluntary standard-setting bodies such as the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection (ICNIRP), and others to assure that safety standards continue to adequately protect the public.

# Reducing Exposure: Hands-Free Kits and Other Accessories

# Steps to Reduce Exposure to Radio Frequency Energy

If there is a risk from being exposed to radio frequency energy (RF) from cell phones - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But, if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your RF exposure.

Reduce the amount of time spent using your cell phone;

 Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between your head and the cell phone.

## **Hands-Free Kits**

Hands-free kits may include audio or Bluetooth® headsets and various types of body-worn accessories such as belt-clips and holsters. Combinations of these can be used to reduce RF energy absorption from cell phones.

Headsets can substantially reduce exposure because the phone is held away from the head in the user's hand or in approved body-worn accessories. Cell phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet RF exposure compliance requirements when used against the head and against the body.

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used for convenience and comfort. They are also required by law in many states if you want to use your phone while driving.

# Cell Phone Accessories that Claim to Shield the Head from RF Radiation

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories which claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF

absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hands-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption.

#### **Children and Cell Phones**

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to any users of cell phones from RF exposure, including children and teenagers. The steps adults can take to reduce RF exposure apply to children and teenagers as well.

- · Reduce the amount of time spent on the cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between the head and the cell phone.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using cell phones at all. For example, The Stewart Report from the United Kingdom made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report, a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

# Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) Certification Information

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for Radio Frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government.

These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations: the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE).

In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg).

The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC.

For body-worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the mobile device a minimum of 1.0 cm from the body.

Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure quidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported in the FCC equipment authorization grant are:

- Head: 0.98 W/kg.

- Body : 0.95 W/kg.

- Product Specific: 0.75W/kg.

- Simultaneous Transmission: 1.07 W/kg.

- Simultaneous Transmission: 1.07 W/kg.

To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone.

Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. # **Smart Practices While Driving**

#### On the Road - Off the Phone

Responsible drivers understand that no secondary task should be performed while driving whether it be eating, drinking, talking to passengers, or talking on a mobile phone - unless the driver has assessed the driving conditions and is confident that the secondary task will not interfere with their primary responsibility. Do not engage in any activity while driving a moving vehicle which may cause you to take your eyes off the road or become so absorbed in the activity that your ability to concentrate on the act of driving becomes impaired. Samsung is committed to promoting responsible driving and giving drivers the tools they need to understand and address distractions.

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. For example, only hands-free use may be permitted in certain areas.

Before answering calls, consider your circumstances. Let the call go to voicemail when driving conditions require. Remember, driving comes first, not the call!

If you consider a call necessary and appropriate, follow these tips:

- Use a hands-free device:
- · Secure your phone within easy reach;
- Place calls when you are not moving;
- Plan calls when your car will be stationary;
- · Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations;
- Let the person with whom you are speaking know that you are driving and will suspend the call if necessary;
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving;

Notice regarding legal restrictions on mounting this device in an automobile:

Laws in some states may prohibit mounting this device on or near the windshield of an automobile. In other states, the law may permit mounting this device only in specific locations in the automobile. Be sure to consult the state and local laws or ordinances where you drive before mounting this device in an automobile. Failure to comply with these restrictions could result in fines, penalties, or other damages.

Never mount this device in a manner that will obstruct the driver's clear view of the street and traffic.

Never use wireless data services such as text messaging, Web browsing, or e-mail while operating a vehicle.

## **Battery Use and Safety**

Important!: Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage.

Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries and, particularly, from the continued use of damaged batteries.

- Do not disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery. Do not put a high degree of pressure on the battery. This can cause leakage or an internal shortcircuit, resulting in overheating.
- Do not let the phone or battery come in contact with liquids.
  Liquids can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. Even
  when the phone appears to be dry and appears to operate normally,
  the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard. If the
  phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your service
  provider or contact Samsung, even if they appear to be working
  properly.

- Do not place your battery in or near a heat source. Excessive
  heating can damage the phone or the battery and could cause the
  phone or the battery to explode. Do not dry a wet or damp battery with
  an appliance or heat source such as a microwave oven, hair dryer,
  iron, or radiator. Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high
  temperatures.

### **GPS & AGPS**

Certain Samsung mobile devices can use a Global Positioning System (GPS) signal for location-based applications. A GPS uses satellites controlled by the U.S. Government that are subject to changes implemented in accordance with the Department of Defense policy and the 2008 Federal Radio navigation Plan (FRP). Changes may affect the performance of location-based technology on your mobile device.

Certain Samsung mobile devices can also use an Assisted Global Positioning System (AGPS), which obtains information from the cellular network to improve GPS performance. AGPS uses your wireless service provider's network and therefore airtime, data charges, and/or additional charges may apply in accordance with your service plan. Contact your wireless service provider for details.

### **Your Location**

Location-based information includes information that can be used to determine the approximate location of a mobile device. Mobile devices which are connected to a wireless network transmit location-based information. Additionally, if you use applications that require location-based information (e.g. driving directions), such applications transmit location-based information. The location-based information may be shared with third-parties, including your wireless service provider,

applications providers, Samsung, and other third-parties providing services.

## **Use of AGPS in Emergency Calls**

When you make an emergency call, the cellular network may activate AGPS technology in your mobile device to tell the emergency responders your approximate location.

AGPS has limitations and might not work in your area. Therefore:

- Always tell the emergency responder your location to the best of your ability; and
- Remain on the mobile device for as long as the emergency responder instructs you.

## **Navigation**

Maps, directions, and other navigation data may contain inaccurate or incomplete data, and circumstances can and do change over time. In some areas, complete information may not be available. Therefore, you should always visually confirm that the navigational instructions are consistent with what you see before following them. All users should pay attention to road conditions, closures, traffic, and all other factors that may impact safe driving or walking. Always obey posted road signs.

# **Emergency Calls**

This mobile device, like any wireless mobile device, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks, as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions, areas, or circumstances. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless mobile device for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example). Before traveling in remote or underdeveloped areas, plan an alternate method of contacting emergency services personnel. Remember, to make or receive any calls, the mobile device must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength.

- From the Home screen, touch . The dialer is displayed.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number).
   Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 4. Touch the key.

If certain features are in use (call blocking, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult your User Manual and your local cellular service provider. When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your mobile device may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

### **Care and Maintenance**

Your mobile device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years:

# Keep your Samsung Mobile Device away from:

# Liquids of any kind

Keep the mobile device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If the mobile device does get wet, do not accelerate drying with the use of an oven, microwave, or dryer, because this may damage the mobile device and could cause a fire or explosion. Do not use the mobile device with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the mobile device.

### Extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below 0°C / 32°F or above 45°C / 113°F.

### Microwaves

Do not try to dry your mobile device in a microwave oven. Doing so may cause a fire or explosion.

### **Dust and dirt**

Do not expose your mobile device to dust, dirt, or sand.

## Cleaning solutions

Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the mobile device. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.

### Shock or vibration

Do not drop, knock, or shake the mobile device. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.

#### Paint

Do not paint the mobile device. Paint can clog the device's moving parts or ventilation openings and prevent proper operation.

# **Responsible Listening**

Caution!: Avoid potential hearing loss.

Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cell phones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth® or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound, and distorted hearing, Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings, and equipment.

You should follow some common sense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Always turn the volume down before plugging the earphones into an audio source.
- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- Be aware that you can adapt to higher volume settings over time, not realizing that the higher volume may be harmful to your hearing.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the
  people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear
  what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you
  choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use
  noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental
  noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling
  headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than
  when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech, or experience

any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

# **Operating Environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area, and always switch your mobile device off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the mobile device or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

# **Using Your Mobile Device Near Other Electronic Devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from Radio Frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless mobile device. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## **Implantable Medical Devices**

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless mobile device and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.

Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON;
- Should not carry the mobile device in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the mobile device OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place;
- Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your wireless mobile device with an implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

### **Other Medical Devices**

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your mobile device off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

### **Vehicles**

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle before using your mobile device in a motor vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### **Posted Facilities**

Switch your mobile device off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

## **Potentially Explosive Environments**

Switch your mobile device off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Users are advised to switch the mobile device off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

# FCC Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

On July 10, 2003, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Report and Order in WT Docket 01-309 modified the exception of wireless mobile devices under the Hearing Aid Compatibility Act of 1988 (HAC Act) to require digital wireless mobile devices be compatible with hearing aids.

The intent of the HAC Act is to ensure reasonable access to telecommunications services for persons with hearing disabilities. While some wireless mobile devices are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and mobile devices also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless mobile devices to assist hearing device users find mobile devices that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all mobile devices have been rated. Mobile devices that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated mobile device successfully. Trying out the mobile device with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Mobile devices rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

**T-Ratings**: Mobile devices rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless mobile device rating values are then added together.

A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use.



In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless mobile device meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This is synonymous for T ratings. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while using their hearing aid with the particular wireless mobile device.

"Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that is acceptable for normal operation. The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark. The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules.

The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

## **HAC/Wi-Fi for Newer Technologies**

This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing aids for some of the wireless technologies that it uses. However, there may be some newer wireless technologies used in this phone that have not been tested yet for use with hearing aids. It is important to try the different features of this phone thoroughly and in different locations, using your hearing aid or cochlear implant, to determine if you hear any interfering noise. Consult your service provider or the manufacturer of this phone for information on hearing aid compatibility. If you have questions about return or exchange policies, consult your service provider or phone retailer.

# Restricting Children's Access to Your Mobile Device

Your mobile device is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the mobile device, or make calls that increase your mobile device bill.

Keep the mobile device and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.

### **FCC Notice and Cautions**

### **FCC Notice**

The mobile device may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the mobile device if such interference cannot be eliminated. Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association.

#### **Cautions**

Any changes or modifications to your mobile device not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas, and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the mobile device warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the mobile device. Although your mobile device is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.

# **Other Important Safety Information**

- Only qualified personnel should service the mobile device or install the mobile device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Ensure that any mobile devices or related equipment installed in your vehicle are securely mounted.
- Check regularly that all wireless mobile device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the mobile device, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment near or in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your mobile device off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless mobile devices in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation. Check with appropriate authorities before using any function of a mobile device while on an aircraft.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of cell phone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

### What is not covered?

This Limited Warranty is conditioned upon proper use of the Product.
