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1 Remove the battery cover.
2 Slide the SIM card into its holder with the gold contacts facing down.
3 Insert the battery with the label side up and the connectors facing in.
4 Slide the battery cover into place.

## To charge the battery



1 Connect the charger plug to the phone with the symbol facing upwards.
2 It may take 30 minutes before the battery icon appears.
3 Wait approximately 2.5 hours or until the battery icon indicates that the battery is fully charged. For an indication of charging, press $\rightarrow$ to activate the screen.
4 Remove the charger by pulling it out.
(i)- Talk time or standby time may become shorter due to wear and you may have to replace your battery. Only use approved batteries from Sony Ericsson $\Rightarrow 61$ Battery.

Save contacts to your SIM card before you remove it from another phone. Contacts may have been saved in the phone memory $\Rightarrow 20$ Contacts.

## To turn the phone on and off

Q) Your phone does not come with a memory card. You can buy a memory card to add more storage space to your phone.

If you use a memory card you can select to automatically save all pictures on the memory card $\Rightarrow 37$ Camera options.

To insert and remove the memory card


1 Remove the battery cover.
2 Insert the memory card in the slot.
3 Press the edge of the memory card to release it from the slot.

## PIN

You may need a PIN (Personal Identification Number) from your network operator to activate the services in your phone. Each PIN digit appears as *, unless it starts with emergency number digits, for example, 112 or 911 . This is so you can always make emergency calls. $\Rightarrow 20$ Emergency calls. Press © to correct mistakes.

- If you enter the wrong PIN three times in a row, the SIM card is blocked $\Rightarrow 53$ SIM card lock.


## Standby mode

After you have turned the phone on and entered your PIN, the name of the network operator will appear on the display. This is called standby mode.

## Navigating the menus

The main menus are shown as icons. Some submenus include tabs that appear on the screen.


- Press © to go to the main menu or to select items.
- Press (0), @, (0) or (?) to move through menus and tabs.
- Press $(5$ to go back one level in the menus or to end a function or application. Press and hold $(\Phi$ to return to standby.
- Press $\Theta$ to select the options shown immediately above these keys on the screen.
- Press (c) to delete items.
- Scroll to a menu item $>$ Info to get help on selected features.
- More to enter a list of options.


## Shortcuts

From standby, you can use ©, ©, (0) or (Q) to go directly to a function.

To edit a standby shortcut
3 From standby, select Menu $>$ Settings - General $>$ Shortcuts and select a shortcut $>$ Edit.
4 Scroll to a function $>$ Shortcut.
Activity menu
Use the activity menu to view and handle new events, and access bookmarks and shortcuts.

To open the activity menu
Press ( ) and use and (a) to select a tab.

Activity menu tabs

- New events - such as missed calls and messages.
- My shortcuts - applications that are running in the background and your shortcuts. You can add, delete and change the order of shortcuts.
- Bookmarks - your Internet bookmarks.
If you want new events to appear as pop-up text instead of in the activity menu, from standby, select Menu - Settings $>$ General $>$ New events - Popup.

To create a standby shortcut
1 Press @ and follow the instructions.
2 Scroll to a function $>$ Shortcut.

## Shut down menu

Use the shut down menu to turn off the phone, activate silent mode or activate a profile. For more information about profiles $\Rightarrow 50$ Profiles.

## To open the shut down menu

 Press (0) and select a menu item.
## File manager

Files such as pictures, videos, sounds, themes, games and applications are saved in folders in the phone memory. If you have inserted a memory card, you can save the files on it. Unrecognized files are saved in the Other folder.

## File manager menu tabs

The file manager has three tabs, with icons indicating where the files are saved.

- All files - all content in the phone and on the memory card.
- On Memory Stick - all content on the memory card.
- In phone - all content in the phone memory.


## File information

If a file is protected, you may not be able to copy or send the file. View file information by highlighting the file - More $>$ Information.

To move or copy a file
1 From standby, select Menu - File manager. Open a folder then scroll to a file $>$ More $>$ Manage files.
2 Select Move or Copy.
3 Memory Stick or $>$ Phone memory.
4 Select a folder or $>$ New folder, name the folder $>$ OK.
5 - Paste.

## To select several files

1 From standby, select Menu $~$ File manager. Open a folder then scroll to a file $>$ More $>$ Mark.
2 Mark several or Mark all. To select files, scroll and $\triangleright$ Mark.

## To check memory status

From standby, select Menu $>$ File manager $>$ More $>$ Memory status.

## Formatting the memory card

Format a memory card to clear it, or if it has been corrupted.

To format the memory card
From standby, select Menu - File manager $>$ More $>$ Format M.S. $>$ Yes and enter your phone lock code. For more information $\Rightarrow 54$ Phone lock.

Transferring files
For more information
$\Rightarrow 49$ Transferring files.

## Languages

Select the language to use in the phone menus or when writing text.

To change the phone language

- From standby, select Menu $>$ Settings - General $>$ Language $>$ Phone language, select a language.
- From standby, press (o) 0000 © for English, (a) 0008 @ for Chinese, or (a) 8888 @ for Automatic language.

To select writing languages
1 From standby, select Menu $>$ Settings

- General $>$ Language
- Writing language.

2 - Mark to select languages - Save.

## Entering characters

You can enter characters by handwriting recognition or by using the keypad.

Handwriting recognition
Scroll to a function where text input is possible. For example, from standby, select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Write new $>$ Text message. You can enter Chinese and English characters, numbers and punctuation marks

Use the stylus to write.
Writing languages
Before entering text using handwriting recognition, make sure you have selected the correct writing language. For example, to enter Numeric numbers, you should select Numeric as the writing language.

To switch writing languages
Tap the language icon to switch writing languages. For example, if the current writing language is Numeric, tap 12 to change the writing language.

Candidate and predictive characters As you write, candidate characters appear. Select one or accept the one that appears on the screen.

After you select a candidate character, predictive characters may appear. Select one from the predictive characters or write your own.

To enter symbols and punctuation marks
You have two ways of entering symbols and punctuation marks:

- Tap $\because$ to open the symbol table, then select with your stylus or naviagtion keys (0), (0), ©, (0) and (@).
- Use handwriting recognition to write commonly used punctuation marks and symbols, like the comma and full stop.


## Special gestures

You can use special gestures to perform functions like deleting characters and entering spaces.

## Text input

To enter text by using the keypad, press the key you want directly.
There are two ways to enter letters and characters using the keypad:

- Multitap text input
- T9™ Text Input

To enter letters using multitap text input

- Press (2) - 9 until the desired character appears.
- Press *aan to shift between capitals and lower-case letters.
- Press and hold $0+-(9)$ to enter numbers.
- Press (c) to delete letters and numbers.
- Press $\# \because \rightarrow$ to add a space.
- Press $\square$ for the most common punctuation marks.
- Press and hold $*_{* a A}$ to change writing method.
- Multitap input only applies when Latin characters are selected as the input language.


## T9 ${ }^{\text {тм }}$ Text Input

The T9 ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Text Input method uses a built-in dictionary to recognize the most commonly used word for each sequence of key presses. This way, you press each key only once, even if the letter you want is not the first letter on the key.

To enter letters using T9 Text Input
1 For example, if you want to write the word "Jane", press (5), (2), (6), (3).

2 If the word shown is not the one you want, press (0) or (8) repeatedly to view alternative words. To accept and add a space, press $\# \sim \rightarrow$. To accept a word without adding a space, press © .
3 Continue writing your message. To enter punctuation marks, press $\square$ and then (0) or (Q) repeatedly.

To add words to the T9 Text Input dictionary
1 While entering letters > More - Spell word.

2 Edit the word by using multitap input. Navigate between the letters with (0) and ©. To delete a character, press (c). To delete the entire word, press and hold (C).
3 When you have edited the word - Insert. The word is added to the T9 Text Input dictionary. Next time you enter this word using T9 Text Input, it will appear as one of the alternative words.

To select another writing method Before, or while entering letters, press and hold $* a(A)$ to select another writing method.

Options when entering letters - More to view options when entering letters.
Chinese input
Your phone has different input methods for entering Chinese characters using keypad input:

- Stroke input
- Pinyin input

You can use these methods, for example, to enter Chinese names and Chinese short messages.
Switching between Chinese input methods
When entering Chinese characters, you can select and switch to another input method by pressing and holding $\#_{2 a t}$.

## General instructions

Regardless of which input method you choose，your phone can speed up the input of Chinese characters． Whenever you enter a stroke or a Pinyin letter，a candidate row of the most frequently used characters containing that stroke or relating to that letter appear at the bottom of the screen．

If the character you want is not displayed in the candidate row，press（？）to view another candidate row．Continue pressing（Q）until the character you want is displayed．Alternatively，you can enter the next stroke or Pinyin letter and a new set of characters is displayed in the candidate row．To go back to the previous row，press（©）．To select a character in the candidate row，press © ．
Stroke input
A Chinese character is built up of strokes．There are more than 30 basic strokes，which are grouped into five stroke categories．Each category is represented on the keypad by one of the keys（1）－5．The wild card key （6），is used when you are not sure which stroke to use．

Components
The basic building units of Chinese characters are components that are made up of strokes. After you enter the first two strokes of the desired character, the component and character candidates that started with the stroke are displayed.

Using components is a fast method of entering complex characters.

- The smaller candidates surrounded by frames are components, and the bigger candidates without frames are characters.

For example，to enter＂信息＂
Enter＂J＂，＂I＂and＂ l ＂．
Move the cursor to＂信＂，press ©（．
3 Move the cursor to＂息＂，press © again to select＂息＂．
Example of using the wild card key The wild card key（6）is used to supplement unclear strokes in entering characters．If you want to enter＂互＂，but you only know that＂一＂ is the first and the last stroke of the character and that the total number of strokes is four，enter（1），6，（5）， （1）．The character is displayed in the candidate row．

## Pinyin input

Press the keys containing the required Pinyin letters，and the phone will make various proposals on the screen， according to the pronunciation rules of Mandarin．
Below is the key mapping of Pinyin letters on the keypad．

combination，then press（c））．
3 Press © again to select＂息＂，when ＂息＂is highlighted．

Input punctuation，symbols and smilies
Under any Chinese input mode，press ＊＊a／A to see the table of punctuation marks，symbols and smilies．Use ©， （0），（a，（©）and（＠）to make a selection． Press $(\# \rightarrow \pi)$ to enter a space in the text．

## Calling

## Making and receiving calls

Turn on the phone and make sure that you are within range of a network $\Rightarrow 5$ To turn the phone on and off. If your subscription includes the Calling Line Identification service and the caller's number is identified, the number is displayed. If the number is saved in Contacts, the name, number, and picture are displayed. If the number is a restricted number, Withheld is displayed.

To make a call
1 Enter a phone number (with international country code and area code, if applicable).
$2-$ Call to make the call and $>$ End call to end the call.
To redial a number If the connection failed, Retry? is displayed $\triangleright$ Yes.

- Do not hold the phone to your ear while waiting. When a call connects, the phone gives a loud signal.

To answer a call
Open your phone or $>$ Answer if your phone is already open.

To reject a call
Close your phone $>$ Busy or press the volume button twice.
To change the ear speaker volume During a call, press $\oplus$ or $\Theta$ to increase or decrease the volume.

## To turn off the microphone

Press and hold $\subseteq$. To resume, press and hold (c) again.

To select more options during a call - More and select an option.

## Missed calls

A missed call appears in the activity menu if New events is set to Activity menu $\Rightarrow 10$ Activity menu. $>$ Call to call the missed number.
If New events is set to Popup, Missed calls: appears. $\downarrow$ Yes to view the missed calls or $>$ No to view them later.
Call list
Information about most recent calls is saved in the call list.
To call a number from the call list
1 From standby, select $>$ Calls and select a tab.
2 Scroll to the name or number to call $\rightarrow$ Call.

To add a call list number to contacts
1 From standby, select $\downarrow$ Calls and select a tab. Scroll to the number you want to add $>$ More $>$ Save number.
2 Select a contact to add the number to or $>$ New contact.

## Emergency calls

Your phone supports international emergency numbers such as 112 and 911. Use them to make an emergency call in any country, with or without a SIM card in the phone, if a GSM network is in range.

Q- In some countries, other emergency numbers may also be promoted. Your network operator may have saved additional local emergency numbers on your SIM card.

## To make an emergency call

 Enter, for example, 112 - Call.To view your local emergency numbers
From standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts - Options - Special numbers - Emergency nos..

## Contacts

Phone contacts contain detailed information saved in the phone memory. SIM contacts contain names and numbers saved on the SIM card.
To select default contacts
1 From standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts - Options 1 Advanced

Default contacts.
2 - Phone contacts or SIM contacts.

## To add a contact

1 From standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts - New contact 1 Add.
$2 \downarrow$ Name: $\downarrow$ Add enter the name $>$ OK.
$3>$ New number: $>$ Add enter the number 1 OK.
4 For phone contacts only, select a number type. Scroll between tabs and select fields to enter more information. To enter symbols such as @ $\quad$ More - Add symbol and select the symbol - Insert. To save the contact $>$ Save.

Enter the + sign and country code with all numbers.

To add a picture or a ringtone to a contact
1 From standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts and select the contact $>$ More $>$ Edit contact.
2 Select the relevant tab, then $>$ Picture or Ringtone $\downarrow$ Add. Select a file and - Save.

To set the default number for a contact
1 To set the phone number to be displayed first for a contact, from standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts and scroll to the contact.
$2-$ More - Default number and select a number.
To add your own business card From standby, select Menu - Contacts $>$ Options $>$ My business card and enter the information for your business card $>$ Save.
To send your business card From standby, select Menu - Contacts - Options - My business card $>$ Send my card.

Calling contacts when English is the phone language
To call contacts written in Chinese characters
1 From standby, select Menu - Contacts. Scroll to a contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or (a) to select a number $>$ Call.

To call contacts written in Latin characters
1 From standby, select Menu - Contacts. Scroll to, or enter the first letter of the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or (a) to select a number $>$ Call.

Calling contacts when Chinese is the phone language
To call contacts written in Chinese characters
1 From standby, select Menu - Contacts. Press and hold $\#-\rightarrow$ to switch the search language to Chinese.
2 Enter the first stroke of the contact you want to call.
3 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or (@) to select a number $>$ Call.

To call contacts written in Latin characters
1 From standby, select Menu

- Contacts. Press and hold $\#-\infty$ to switch the search language to English.
2 Enter the first letter of the contact you want to call.
3 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or (a) to select a number $>$ Call.

To call a SIM contact

- If SIM contacts is default, from standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts and select a name and number from the list $>$ Call.
- If Phone contacts is default, from standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts - Options $~=$ SIM contacts and select a name and number from the list - Call.


## Managing contacts

Copy contacts to and from the phone memory and the SIM card.

To copy names and numbers to the SIM card

When copying all contacts from the phone to the SIM card, all existing SIM card information is replaced.

- Contacts > Options - Advanced

To back up contacts on the memory

To restore contacts from the memory

From standby, select Menu

## To send contacts

- To send a selected contact $>$ More - Send contact and select a transfer method.
- To send all contact, from standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Options - Advanced $\downarrow$ Send all contacts.


## To edit a phone contact

- Contacts and select a contact
- More - Edit contact.

2 Select a tab and edit the information - Save.

To edit a SIM contact
1 If SIM contacts is default $>$ Contacts or if Phone contacts is default

- Contacts $~$ Options
- SIM contacts.

2 Select the name and number to edit.
3 - More - Edit contact and edit the name and number.

## To delete contacts

- To delete a selected contact, press (c).
- To delete all contacts, from standby, select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Options - Advanced - Delete all contacts - Yes and $>$ Yes. Names and numbers on the SIM card are not deleted.

To check the memory status From standby, select Menu

- Contacts $>$ Options $>$ Advanced - Memory status.

The number of entries you can save in the phone or on the SIM card depends on available memory.

Synchronizing contacts
You can synchronize your phone contacts with similar programs in a computer. For more information, see $\Rightarrow 46$ Synchronizing.

## Speed dialling

Save numbers in positions 1-9 in your phone to access them easily.

To set or replace speed dialling numbers
1 From standby, select Menu

- Contacts $>$ Options $>$ Speed dial.

2 Scroll to a position $>$ Add or Replace and select a phone number.
To speed dial
From standby, enter a speed dial number (1-9) $>$ Call.

## (周) Voicemail

If your subscription includes an answering service, callers can leave a voice message when you cannot answer a call.

To enter your voicemail number Press and hold $\square$ - Yes enter the number $>$ OK. You get the number from your service provider.

## To call your voicemail service

 If you have entered your voicemail number, press and hold (1).To check your voicemail number From standby, select Menu

- Messaging $>$ Settings
- Voicemail number.


## Voice control

Manage calls with your voice by creating voice commands to:

- Voice dial - call someone by saying their name.
- Activate voice control by saying a "magic word".
- Answer and reject calls when using a handsfree.


## Before voice dialling

Activate the voice dialling function and record your voice commands. An icon appears next to a phone number that has a voice command.

To activate voice dialling and record names
1 From standby, select Menu - Settings $\boldsymbol{\nabla}$ General $>$ Voice control - Voice dialling $>$ Activate $>$ Yes New voice and select a contact.
2 If the contact has more than one number, use (0) and © to view the numbers. Select the number to add the voice command to. Record a voice command such as "John mobile".
3 Instructions appear. Wait for the tone and say the command to record. The voice command is played back to you.
4 If the recording sounds OK $>$ Yes. If not $\triangleright$ No and repeat step 3.
To record another voice command for a contact $>$ New voice $\downarrow$ Add and repeat steps 2-4 above.

## Caller name

Hear your recorded contact name when you receive a call from that contact.

To turn the caller name on or off From standby, select Menu - Settings $~$ - General $~-~ V o i c e ~ c o n t r o l ~$ - Play caller name.

## Voice dialling

Start voice dialling from standby using the phone, a portable handsfree, a Bluetooth ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ headset or by saying your magic word.

To make a call
1 From standby, press and hold one of the volume buttons.
2 Wait for the tone and say a recorded name, for example, "John mobile". The name is played back to you and the call is connected.

## To make a call with a handsfree

 From standby, press and hold the handsfree button, or press the Bluetooth headset button.
## The magic word

Record and use a voice command as a magic word to activate voice control without pressing any keys. The magic word can only be used with a handsfree.
© Choose a long, unusual word or phrase that can easily be distinguished from ordinary background speech.
To activate and record the magic word
1 From standby, select Menu - Settings $>$ General $\mid$ Voice control - Magic word $>$ Activate.
