

This equipment is not designed to make emergency telephone calls during power failures.
Alternative arrangements should be made for access to emergency services.

### **Getting started**

### Warning

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

### Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture and low temperature.

- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals, unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.



### Handset range

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

### Signal strength


When out of range of the corded base, the screen shows **Out of range or no pwr at base**. If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within range. The cordless handset will automatically reconnect to the corded base.

### **Important**

The base must be plugged into an electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord to the telephone wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Only use the adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.




#### **Notes**

- In multi-handset packs, the power adapter with the smaller pin is for the charger.
- If you have DSL high-speed Internet service, a DSL filter (not included) is required. Contact your DSL service provider for more information.
- Use only the provided power adapter.
- Steps 3 and 4 should only be done once the handset is fully charged.








### Note

• Make sure the power outlet is not controlled by a wall switch.

# Installing and charging the handset battery pack





#### **Notes**

Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 12 hours.
Once charged, the battery icon on the the handset LCD will indicate fully charged.

### **Important**

• Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.



### Setting the date and time

After you install your phone or power returns following a power outage, the system will prompt you to set the date and time.

### Note

• If you're a subscriber to your network's Caller ID service, the date and time are automatically set when a call is received.

### To set the date and time manually:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to choose Set date/time, press SELECT.
- 3. Use the dialing keys (**0-9**) or press **CID/▼** or **△/♀** to edit the month, day and year. Then press **SELECT**.

- 4. Use the dialing keys (0-9) or press CID/▼ or ▲/♀ to edit the time in 12 HR format. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♀ to toggle AM/PM settings or press 2 for AM or 7 for PM.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save the settings. There is a confirmation tone and the screen returns to the previous menu.

# Setting the display language

The LCD language is preset to English. You can select English, French, or Spanish to be used in all screen displays.

1. Press **MENU**.

- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, press SELECT.
- 3. Press **SELECT** to choose **LCD Language**.
- 6. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥)
  to choose the desired
  language, then press SELECT.
- 7. Press **SELECT** again to confirm. There is a confirmation tone and the screen returns to the previous menu.

#### Note

• If you accidentally changed the LCD language to French or Spanish, you can reset it to the English easily by pressing **MENU** and then entering \*364#.

Your phone is now ready for use.



# Getting to know your phone

Overview of your handset



Get acquainted with the following buttons on your handset, and their multi-function tasks.

- 1. Receiver
- 2. LCD display
- 3. PUSH TO TALK
  - Press to initiate a oneto-one or one-to-group broadcast.
  - Press and hold to broadcast to a group of system devices.

### 4. MENU/SELECT

- Show the menu.
- While in a menu, press to select an item, or save an entry or setting.



### 5. SPEAKER

- Make or answer a call using the handset speakerphone.
- During a call, press to switch between the speakerphone and the handset.
- Lights on when the handset speakerphone is in use.

### 6. OFF/CANCEL

- Hang up a call.
- Silence the ringer temporarily while the handset is ringing.
- Press and hold to erase the missed call indicator while the phone is not in use.
- While in a menu, press to cancel an operation, return to the previous menu, or exit the menu display; or press and hold to return to idle mode.

### 7. **1**

- Press repeatedly to add 1
  in front of the caller ID log
  entry before dialing or saving
  it to the directory.
- Press and hold to set or dial your voicemail number.

### TONE/ ➤ TONE/a ► A

- While you have set the dial mode to pulse and on a call, press to switch to tone dialing temporarily.
- Press to toggle between upper and lower case of the next letters to be input.

### O OPER

 Press to add a space when entering names.

### **#QUIET**

• Press and hold to set **Quiet** mode when idle.

 Press repeatedly to show other dialing options when reviewing a caller ID log entry.

### 8. CALL BLOCK


- Press to show the call block menu when the handset is not in use.
- Press to block the incoming call when the phone is ringing.
- When on a call, press to block the call.

### 10. **CHARGE light**

• On when the handset is charging.





#### 11. **INT**

 Press to start an intercom conversation or transfer a call (for multi-handset models only).

### 12. **\CELL**

- Make or answer a cell call.
- Answer an incoming cell call when you hear a call waiting alert.

### 13. **▲/**♥

- Review the directory when the handset is not in use.
- Scroll up while in a menu, or in the directory, caller ID log, or redial list.
- Move the cursor to the right when entering numbers or names.
- Increase the listening volume during a call.

### CID/▼

- Review the caller ID log when the handset is not in use.
- Decrease the listening volume during a call.
- Scroll down while in a menu, or in the directory, caller ID log, or redial list.
- Move the cursor to the left when entering numbers or names.

### 14. HOME/FLASH

- Make or answer a home call.
- Answer an incoming home call when you hear a call waiting alert.
- During message playback, press to call back the caller if the caller's number is available.



### 15. **REDIAL/PAUSE**


- Press repeatedly to review the redial list.
- Press and hold to insert a dialing pause while entering numbers.


### 16. MUTE/DELETE

- Mute the microphone during a call.
- Silence the ringer temporarily while the handset is ringing.
- Delete digits or characters while using the dialing keys.
- Delete the displayed entry while reviewing the directory, caller ID log, redial list, allow list, call block list, or star name list.



### 1. **CELL**

- Make or answer a cell call.
- Answer an incoming cell call when you hear a call waiting alert.

### 2. **HOME**

- Make or answer a home call.
- Answer an incoming home call when you hear a call waiting alert.

#### 3. CALL BLOCK

- Press to show the call block menu when the handset is not in use.
- Press to block the incoming call when the phone is ringing.
- When on a call, press to block the call.


#### 4. **INT**

 Press to start an intercom conversation or transfer a call (for multi-handset models only).

### 5. **DELETE X**

- Delete digits or characters while using the dialing keys.
- Delete the displayed entry while reviewing the directory, caller ID log, redial list, allow list, call block list, or star name list.





### **REPEAT**

- Press to repeat the playing message during playback.
- Press twice to play the previous message during playback.

### **SKIP**

• Press to skip a message.

### PLAY / STOP

 Press to start or stop message playback.

### 6. FIND HS

 Press to page all system handsets.

#### 7. **ANS ON**

• Press to turn the built-in answering system on or off.

### 8. CELL 1 light

- On when the telephone base is paired with a Bluetooth device
- Flashes when the telephone base is in a discoverable mode.

### 9. CELL 2 / HEADSET light

- On when the telephone base is paired with a Bluetooth device.
- Flashes when the telephone base is in a discoverable mode.



### 10. CANCEL

- Silence the ringer temporarily while the handset is ringing.
- Press and hold to erase the missed call indicator while the phone is not in use.
- While in a menu, press to cancel an operation, return to the previous menu, or exit the menu display; or press and hold to return to idle mode.

### CID/▼

- Review the caller ID log when the handset is not in use.
- Scroll down while in a menu, or in the directory, caller ID log, or redial list.
- Move the cursor to the left when entering numbers or names.

#### MENU/SELECT

- Show the menu.
- While in a menu, press to select an item, or save an entry or setting.

### $\Delta/$

- Review the directory when the handset is not in use.
- Scroll up while in a menu, or in the directory, caller ID log, or redial list.
- Move the cursor to the right when entering numbers or names.

### PTT/FLASH

- Press to initiate a oneto-one or one-to-group broadcast.
- Press and hold to broadcast to a group of system devices.

- Answer an incoming home call when you hear a call waiting alert.
- During message playback, press to call back the caller if the caller's number is available.


### 11. REDIAL/PAUSE

- Press repeatedly to review the redial list.
- Press and hold to insert a dialing pause while entering numbers.

#### **VOLUME**

- While in idle mode, press to adjust the base ringer volume.
- When on a call, press to adjust the listening volume.
- During message playback or call screening, press to adjust the listening volume.





### **MUTE**

- Mute the microphone during a call.
- Silence the ringer temporarily while the handset is ringing.

### 12. **7**

- Press repeatedly to add 1 in front of the caller ID log entry before dialing or saving it to the directory.
- Press and hold to set or dial your voicemail number.

#### **TONE**

- While you have set the dial mode to pulse and on a call, press to switch to tone dialing temporarily.
- Press to toggle between upper and lower case of the next letters to be input.

### O OPER

• Press to add a space when entering names.


### **#QUIET**

- Press and hold to set **Quiet** mode when idle.
- Press repeatedly to show other dialing options when reviewing a caller ID log entry.






### Your RT802/RT803/RT804/ RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT

phone system with Bluetooth wireless technology has the following features:

- Pair and connect up to a maximum of two cell phones with the telephone base to make and receive cell calls.
   Only one cell phone can be active on a call at a time.
- Make and receive calls using your cell phone plan while utilizing the ease and comfort of your home telephone system.
- Receive directory entries from your cell phone.

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Refer to the user's manual of your Bluetooth enabled cell phone for more information about how that device uses Bluetooth connectivity.
- Bluetooth wireless technology operates within a short range (a maximum of approximately 15 feet) from the telephone base. Keep connected cell phones within this range. For optimal performance, place your cell phone next to the telephone base while using the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT cell line.



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- If your cell phone has poor reception in your home, the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT cannot improve the reception. However, if there is a location in your house with better reception, you can leave your cell phone at that location while using the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT805XT cell line.
- If you experience poor sound quality, place your cell phone closer to the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT804T/RT805XT to ensure strong Bluetooth signal strength.
   Make sure there are no physical obstacles between the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT and the cell phone, such as large furniture or thick walls.

- Charge your cell phone while it is connected to the telephone base. Your cell phone's battery will discharge faster while it is connected to the telephone base via Bluetooth wireless technology.
- Monitor your cell phone's usage because minutes are deducted from your cellular plan for the duration of all cell calls.

Refer to Bluetooth setup to learn how to set up and manage your Bluetooth enabled devices. Refer to Telephone operation on how to operate your Bluetooth devices with your new RT802/RT803/RT804/RT805XT telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology. Refer to Help if you experience difficulty using the telephone system.

### Bluetooth Setup


#### Note

• Make sure your cell phone has a good cell reception near the telephone base.

To use a Bluetooth enabled cell phone with your RT802/RT803/RT804/RT804T/RT805XT, you must first pair and connect it with the telephone base. All RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT handsets can be used to make or answer on the cell phone line.

Bluetooth wireless technology operates within a short range (15 feet). When you pair a Bluetooth cell phone to the telephone base, move closer to the telephone base to maintain sufficient signal strength.





#### **Notes**

- For optimal performance, place your cell phone next to the telephone base while using the cell line.
- To avoid interference from other electronic devices, place your telephone base far away from devices such as baby monitors, wireless routers, microwaves, and computers.

# Add a Bluetooth enabled cell phone

### To pair and connect a cell phone:

- Choose a slot to pair the cell phone. Press and hold
   CELL 1 and/or © CELL 2 on the telephone base for about four seconds until the
   CELL 1 and/or © CELL 2 light flashes.
  - If there is already a cell phone in the slot, the existing cell phone will be erased from the cell devices list.
- 2. Turn on the Bluetooth feature of your cell phone. Once your cell phone finds your phone (Motorola XT801/XT801/XT811/XT831), press the appropriate key on your cell phone to continue the pairing process.

- Your cell phone may prompt you to enter the PIN of the telephone base. The default PIN of the telephone base is **0000**.
- All cell phones that are connected to the telephone base are disconnected temporarily until the pairing process is complete.

When the cell phone is successfully paired and connected to the telephone base, the corresponding status icon (\$^1\$ or \$\frac{1}{2}\$) displays. The corresponding device light (\$\frac{1}{2}\$ CELL 1 and/or \$\frac{1}{2}\$ CELL 2) turns on.

The pairing process may take up to one minute. If the pairing process fails, turn off the Bluetooth feature on your cell phone and on the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT805XT by pressing



CELL 1/ CELL 2. Then repeat the steps above to pair and connect again. In some cases, it may take you a few attempts to complete the pairing process.

The steps for the pairing process may vary for different cell phones. If this happens, follow the prompts on your cell phone and your RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT to complete the pairing process.

## Add a Bluetooth enabled headset

### To pair and connect a headset:

- 1. Press **MENU** on the phone when it is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Bluetooth, and then press SELECT.

- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Add BT headset, and then press SELECT. The screen displays Search headset....
  - If there is already a cell device in the slot, the existing cell phone will be erased from the cell devices list
- 4. Set your headset to discoverable mode (refer to the user's manual of your headset on the Bluetooth feature of your headset).
  Once your handset finds your headset, press **SELECT**.
  - Enter the PIN of your headset if required. The PIN for most Bluetooth devices is 0000 (refer to the user's manual of your headset), then press SELECT.

5. When the headset is successfully paired and connected to the telephone base, the \$\mathbb{2}\$ icon displays. The \$\mathbb{CELL 2}\$ device light turns on.

The pairing process may take up to one minute. If the pairing process fails, turn off the Bluetooth feature on your headset and on the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT by pressing CELL 2. Then repeat the steps above to pair and connect again. In some cases, it may take you a few attempts to complete the pairing process.

When a connected headset is charging, it may disconnect from the telephone base and the **CELL 2** light on the telephone



base turns off. For some headset models, you may need to turn on the headset and reconnect it to the telephone base again.

### **Auto connection**

A cell device may be disconnected from the telephone base when:

- The Bluetooth feature of your connected cell device is turned off.
- The power of your cell device is turned off.
- Your cell device is not within range of the telephone base.

After the cell device is disconnected, wait for about 1 minute. Then, power on the cell device, turn on the Bluetooth feature, or move it within range

of the base, the base will try to reconnect to the cell device. If you disconnect the cell device from the cell devices list, the base will not attempt to reconnect unless your cell device is moved out of range and back in range again.

#### Note

• If your cell device does not reconnect to the base automatically, follow the section below to connect it manually.

# Connect a paired cell phone or headset

If you need to connect your paired cell phone or headset to the telephone base manually:

1. Press **CELL 1** and/or **CELL 2** on the telephone base when it is not in use. The **CELL 1** and/or **CELL 2** light flashes.

2. When the cell phone or headset is connected to the telephone base, you hear two beeps. The corresponding status icon (\$^1\$ or \$\mathbb{s}\_2\$) displays. The corresponding device light (\$\mathbb{S}\$ CELL 1 and/or \$\mathbb{S}\$ CELL 2) turns on.

# Disconnect a paired cell phone or headset

If you need to disconnect a paired cell phone or headset from the telephone base, refer to the user's manuals of your cell phone or headset for instructions to disconnect a Bluetooth device.



If you press and hold CELL 1 and/or CELL 2 on the telephone base, the existing paired cell phone in that slot will be erased. See Add a Bluetooth enabled cell phone and Add a Bluetooth enabled headset on how to pair and connect a new cell phone or headset.

### Review the cell devices list

- 1. Press **MENU** on the handset when it is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Bluetooth, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Device list, and then press SELECT.

# Download directory contacts

You can download directory entries to your RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT telephone system via Bluetooth wireless technology. Each downloaded directory are stored in the handset directory with up to 24 digits for each phone number and 15 characters for each name.

Before downloading the directory, make sure the cell phone is paired and connected to the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT.

Make sure the handset battery is charged for at least 10 minutes.

Place your cell phone next to the telephone base while downloading.

## To download contacts from your Bluetooth cell phone:

- 1. Press **MENU** on the handset when it is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Bluetooth, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Download dir, and then press SELECT. The handset displays Select a device briefly.
  - If there is no cell phone paired to the system, the handset displays Pair cell first and then returns to the previous menu.



- 4. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose a desired device when necessary, and then press SELECT.
  - If the selected device is not available, the handset displays **DX not avail** and then returns to the previous menu.

During the download, the handset flashes **Downloading...**. All other idle system handsets display **Downloading...**.

5. When the downloading process completes or when the memory is full, the handset displays **Entries added: XXX**. Then the handset returns to the Bluetooth menu.

#### **Notes**

- Certain cell phones do not support SIM card download. If this is the case, try transferring the contacts from your SIM card to your cell phone memory first, and then download from your cell phone memory. For more information on how to transfer contacts from your SIM card to your cell phone memory, see the user's manual of your cell phone.
- When downloading the directory from your Bluetooth enabled cell phone, some data may not transfer. For example, if you have home, mobile and work numbers for a particular contact, the three categories may not transfer to your RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT.

Enter the phone number and then press **HOME** or **C SPEAKER** to dial the phone number.

• The handset displays **Unable** to call if the telephone line is in use.

Direct dialing

Press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** to get a line and enter the phone number.

• The handset displays **Unable** to call if the telephone line is in use.



### Dialing from the directory

- 1. Press 👀.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/❤️ to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
- 3. Press **HOME** or **G SPEAKER** to dial the number.

### Dialing from the redial list

- 1. Press **REDIAL**, and then **CID/▼** or **△/♥** to scroll and select an entry you want to redial.
- 2. Press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** to dial the number.

### Dialing from the caller ID log

1. Press CID and then
CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to select the entry you want to dial.

2. Press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** to dial the number.

# Making a cell call Predial

Enter the phone number and then press **CELL** to dial the phone number.

- If you have only one cell phone connected to the telephone base, it is automatically selected to make cell calls.
- If you have two cell phones connected to the telephone base, the handset displays
   Select a device. Press CID/▼ or 
   ▲/♥ to select a cell phone and then press SELECT.

### **Direct dialing**

- 1. Press **CELL**. The handset displays **Select a device**.
  - If you have only one cell phone connected to the telephone base, press
     SELECT to select the only device.
  - If you have two cell phones connected to the telephone base, press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to select a cell phone and then press SELECT.
- 2. Enter the telephone number, and then press **CELL** to dial.
  - The handset displays
     Unable to call if your cell phone is in use.



### Dialing from the directory

- 1. Press 👀.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or △/♥ to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
- 3. Press **CELL** to dial the number.

### Dialing from the redial list

- 1. Press **REDIAL**, and then **CID/▼** or **△/♡** to scroll and select an entry you want to redial.
- 2. Press **CELL** to dial the number.

### Dialing from the caller ID log

- 1. Press CID and then CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to select the entry you want to dial.
- 2. Press **CELL** to dial the number.

## Transfer a call from a handset to a Bluetooth headset

When you make or answer a home call or a cell call on a handset, you can transfer the call to your headset. The handset remains active, but the handset earpiece and microphone are muted. If you hang up the handset, the call will end.

- 1. During a call, press **MENU** on the handset.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Use Headset, and then press SELECT.
- The handset briefly displays
   Transferring, followed by
   Headset Used after the call is successfully transferred to the Bluetooth headset.

#### Notes

- When you answer a call from the headset, that call cannot be transferred to a handset.
- The handset will not show **Use Headset** when the Bluetooth
  headset is already in use, or there
  are no active Bluetooth headsets
  on the device list.

## Transfer a call from a headset back to the handset

- 1. Press **MENU** on the handset.
- 2. Press **SELECT** to select **Use Handset**.

#### Note

 When you answer a call using a headset, and you lose the Bluetooth connection or battery is depleted, the call will be lost.



### Answer a home call

Press **HOME**, **□**: **SPEAKER** or any dialing key (**0**-**9**, **★**TONE/**a** ► **A** or **#QUIET**) to answer.

### Answer a cell call

Press **\CELL**, **\CELL**, **\CELL**, **SPEAKER** or any dialing key (0-9, **\X** TONE/a ▶ A or **#QUIET**) to answer.

### End a home call

Press **OFF** on the handset, place the handset in the telephone base or handset charger.

### End a cell call

Press **OFF** on the handset, place the handset in the telephone base or handset charger.

### Speakerphone

When the handset is on a call, press **SPEAKER** to switch between the speakerphone and the handset receiver. When the speakerphone is active, the handset displays **Speaker**.

### Volume control

During a call, press CID/▼ or ▲/♥️.

### **Notes**

- The handset and speakerphone volume settings are independent.
- When the volume reaches the minimum or maximum setting, you hear two beeps.

### Mute

The mute function allows you to hear the other party but the other party cannot hear you.

During a call, press **MUTE**. The handset displays **Muted** until the mute function is turned off.

Press **MUTE** again to resume the conversation. The handset briefly displays **Microphone on**.

### Join a call in progress

Another handset can join you on a home call. That call continues until all parties hang up. You can share an outside call with up to two handsets at the same time.

### Join a call

1. When a handset is already on a call, press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** on another handset to join the call.



2. Press **CANCEL** or place the handset in the telephone base or handset charger to exit the call. The call continues on the other handset until both handsets hang up.

## Call waiting on the home line

When you subscribe to call waiting service with your telephone service provider, the handset flashes  $\stackrel{\bigstar}{\blacksquare}$  and you hear a beep if someone calls while you are already on a call.

Press **HOME** on the handset to put your current call on hold and take the new call.

Press **HOME** on the handset at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

## Call waiting on the cell line

When you subscribe to call waiting service with your cell phone service provider, the handset flashes (a) and you hear a beep if someone calls while you are already on a call.

Press **CELL** on the handset to put your current call on hold and take the new call.

Press **CELL** on the handset at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

### Chain dialing

Use this feature to initiate a dialing sequence from numbers stored in the directory, caller ID log, or redial list while you are on a call.

Chain dialing can be useful if you wish to access other numbers (such as bank account numbers or access codes) from the directory, caller ID log, or redial list.

## Access a number from the directory while on a call

- 1. Press **MENU**.
- 2. Press **SELECT** to choose **Directory**.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to scroll to the desired entry.
- 4. Press **SELECT** to dial the displayed number.

## Access a number from the caller ID log while on a call

1. Press MENU.



- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Caller ID log, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/❤️ to scroll to the desired entry.
- 4. Press **SELECT** to dial the displayed number.

## Access a number from the redial list while on a call

- 1. Press **REDIAL** to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ or REDIAL repeatedly to browse to the desired entry.
- 3. Press **SELECT** to dial the displayed number.

### Find handset

This feature helps you find misplaced handsets.

### Start the paging tone

• Press **FIND HS** on the telephone base. All idle handsets ring and their screens display \*\* Paging \*\*.

### Stop the paging tone

Press HOME

, CELL,

OFF/CANCEL,

SPEAKER or

any dialing key (0-9,

TONE/a

A

or #QUIET) on a handset.

#### -OR-

• Press **FIND HS** again on the telephone base.

#### -OR-

• Place the handset in the telephone base or charger.

### Intercom

Use the intercom feature for conversations between two devices. Your telephone base supports up to five devices. You can buy additional expansion handsets (XT8) or headsets for this telephone base.

- 1. Press INT when idle.
  -ORPress MENU when idle.
  Press CID/▼ or ▲/☒ to scroll to Intercom, then press SELECT.
- The screen displays **Intercom to:**.
- 2. Use the dialing keys to enter a handset number (**1**-**5**).
- The handset shows **Calling HS X**. The destination handset rings and shows **HS X** is **calling**.



- 3. To answer the intercom call on the destination handset, press HOME , CELL, ☐ SPEAKER, or any dialing key (0-9, ★TONE/a A or #QUIET). Both handsets now show Intercom.
- 4. To end the intercom call on either handset, one party presses **OFF** or places the handset back in the telephone base or handset charger.

#### **Notes**

- If the destination handset does not answer the intercom call within 100 seconds, is on a call or out of range, the originating handset displays **Unable to call** and returns to idle mode.

- Press 
   CANCEL or MUTE
   on the destination handset to
   temporarily silence the intercom
   ringer.
- Only one intercom call can be established at a time.

## Answering an incoming call during an intercom call

When you receive an incoming home call during an intercom call, you will hear an alert tone. Handsets flash and display the caller ID.

When you receive an incoming cell call during an intercom call, you will hear an alert tone. Handsets flash (2) and display the caller ID.

- To answer a home call, press **HOME**. The intercom call ends automatically.
- To answer the cell call, press **OFF**. The telephone continues to ring. Then press **CELL**.

 To end the intercom call without answering the outside call, press OFF. The intercom call ends and the telephone continues to ring.

### Call transfer using intercom

While on an outside call, you can use the intercom feature to transfer the call from one device to another.

- 1. Press **INT** during a call.
  - -OR-

Press MENU during a call.

Press CID/▼ or ▲/鬮 to scroll to
Intercom, then press SELECT.

- The screen displays **Intercom to:**.
- 2. Use the dialing keys to enter a handset number (**1**-**5**).
- The handset shows Calling HS X.
   The destination handset rings and shows HS X is calling.



- 3. To answer the intercom call on the destination handset, press HOME \, \CELL, \C\\\\ SPEAKER, or any dialing key (0-9, \times TONE/a \times A or #QUIET). Both handsets now show Intercom.
- 4. To transfer the call, press **OFF** on the initiating handset or place the initiating handset back in the telephone base or charger.
- 5. To end the intercom call on either handset, one party presses **OFF** or places the handset back in the telephone base or handset charger.

### Notes

- If the destination handset does not answer within 100 seconds, is in use, on a call, or is out of range, the originating handset displays **Unable to call**, and then reconnects to the outside call.
- You can press **OFF** or **MUTE** on the destination handset to temporarily silence the intercom ringer.
- Only one intercom call can be established at a time.

### **Redial list**

Each handset stores the last 10 telephone numbers dialed (up to 30 digits). When there are already 10 entries, the oldest entry is deleted to make room for the new entry.

### Review a redial list entry

- 1. Press **REDIAL** to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press CID/▼, ▲/♥ or REDIAL repeatedly to browse until the desired entry displays.

### Dial a redial list entry

- 1. Press **REDIAL** to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press CID/▼, ▲/♥ or REDIAL repeatedly to browse until the desired entry displays.
- 3. Press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** to dial using the home line; or press **CELL** to dial using the cell line.

-OR-



- 1. Press **HOME** or **SPEAKER** to use the home line; or press **CELL** to use the cell line.
- 2. Press **REDIAL** to enter the redial list.
- 3. Press CID/▼, ▲/♥ or REDIAL repeatedly to browse until the desired entry displays.
- 4. Press **SELECT** to dial the displayed number.

### Delete a redial list entry

- 1. Press **REDIAL** to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press CID/▼, ▲/♥ or REDIAL repeatedly to browse until the desired entry displays.
- 3. When the handset displays the number you want to delete, press **DELETE**.

### Directory

The directory can store up to 1000 entries, which are shared by all handsets. Each entry may consist of a telephone number up to 30 digits, and a name up to 15 characters.

Any additions, deletions, or edits made on one handset will be reflected on other handsets.

If the telephone number in the directory exceeds 15 digits, a dash appears after the 14th digit and then the remaining digits are shown beginning with a dash alternately.


### Add a directory entry

- Enter the number when the handset is not in use, press

- 2. Press **SELECT** to select **Directory**.


### -OR-

Copy a number from the redial list by pressing **REDIAL**. Then press **CID**/▼, ▲/❤️ or **REDIAL** repeatedly to find the desired number. Press **SELECT** to copy the number.





- 5. Press **SELECT** to move on to the name.
- 6. When **Enter name** displays, use the dialing keys to enter a name (up to 15 characters). Each time you press a key, the character on that key appears. Additional key presses produce other characters on that key. Press the key repeatedly until the desired character appears. The first character of every word is capitalized.



7. Press **SELECT** to save. You hear a confirmation tone and then the handset returns to the previous menu.

## While entering names and numbers, you can:

- Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to move the cursor to the right or left.
- Press **DELETE** to erase a digit.
- Press and hold **DELETE** to erase all digits.

- Press and hold PAUSE to enter a dialing pause (a p appears).
- Press **0** to add a space.
- Press ➤ TONE/a ► A to change the next letter to upper or lower case.

### Review directory entries

Entries are sorted alphabetically.


- 1. Press when the handset is not in use. The screen displays the first entry in the directory.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to browse through the directory, or use the dialing keys to start a name search.

#### -OR-

1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.



- 2. Press **SELECT** to select **Directory**.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Review, and then press SELECT.



4. The screen displays the first entry in the directory. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to browse through the directory.

#### Note

• If the telephone number in the directory exceeds 15 digits, - appears in front of the telephone number and shows the remaining numbers alternately.

### Alphabetical search

- 1. Follow the steps in **Review** directory entries to enter the directory.
- 2. Use the dialing keys to enter the letter associated with the name. For example, if you have entries for Jenny, Jessie, Kristen and Laura in your directory, press 5 (JKL) once to see Jenny (when Jenny displays, press CID/▼ to see Jessie), twice to see Kristen, or three times to see Laura. If there is no name entry matching your search, the next closest match in alphabetical order appears. If necessary, press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to browse.

### Edit a directory entry

- 1. Search for the desired entry in the directory (see **Review directory entries** or **Alphabetical search**).
- 2. When the desired entry displays, press **SELECT**. The handset displays **Enter number**.
- 3. Use the dialing keys to edit the number, and then press **SELECT**. The handset displays **Enter name**.
- 4. Use the dialing keys to edit the name.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save the entry. You hear a confirmation tone. The handset displays the revised entry.




#### Dial a directory entry

- 1. Search for the desired entry in the directory (see Review directory entries or Alphabetical search).

#### Delete a directory entry

3. Press **SELECT** to confirm. The screen displays **Deleting...**. You hear a confirmation tone and then the handset returns to previous menu.

#### Delete all directory entries

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Directory, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to choose Delete all, and then press SFI FCT
- The handset displays **Delete all?**. Press **SELECT** to confirm. The screen displays **Deleting...**. You hear a confirmation tone and then the handset returns to previous menu.



#### Caller ID

If you subscribe to caller ID service, information about each caller appears after the first or second ring. If you answer a call before the caller information appears on the screen, it will not be saved in the caller ID log.

The caller ID log stores up to 50 entries. Each entry has up to 24 digits for the phone number and 15 characters for the name.

If the telephone number has more than 15 digits, only the last 15 digits appear.

If the name has more than 15 characters, only the first 15 characters are shown and saved in the caller ID log.

Entries appear in reverse chronological order. When the caller ID log is full, the oldest entry is deleted to make room for new incoming call information.

Caller ID log entries are shared by all system handsets (for multiple handset models only). Any deletions made on one handset are reflected on all other handsets.

#### Note

• This product can provide information only if both you and the caller are in areas offering caller ID service and if both telephone service providers use compatible equipment. The time and date are sent by your telephone service provider along with the call information.

#### Review the caller ID log

- 1. Press **CID** when the handset is not in use. The screen displays the first entry in the caller ID log.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to browse.

#### -OR-

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥️ to scroll to Caller ID log, and then press SELECT twice to choose Review. The handset displays the first entry.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to browse.

#### Note

 You hear a double beep when you reach the beginning or end of the caller ID log.

# Using the phone

#### Memory match

When the incoming telephone number matches the last seven digits of a telephone number in your directory, the screen displays the stored name of the directory entry.

For example, if Mike Smith calls, his name appears as **Mike** if this is how you entered it into your directory.

#### Note

• The number shown in the caller ID log will be in the format sent by the telephone service provider. The telephone service provider usually delivers 10-digit phone numbers (area code plus telephone number). If the phone number of the caller does not match a number in your

directory, the name will appear as it is delivered by the telephone service provider.

#### Missed call indicator

When there are calls that have not been reviewed in the caller ID log, the handsets display **XX missed** calls.



Each time you review a caller ID log entry marked **NEW**, the number of missed calls decreases by one.



When you have reviewed all the missed calls, the missed call indicator disappears.


the missed calls one by one, press and hold **CANCEL** on the handset when not in use to clear the missed call indicator. All the entries are then considered old.

#### View dialing options

Although the caller ID log entries received have 10 digits (the area code plus the seven-digit number), in some areas, you may need to dial only the seven digits, or 1 plus the seven digits, or 1 plus the area code plus the seven digits. You can change the number of digits that you dial from the caller ID log and store the new number to the directory.

While reviewing the caller ID log, press # (pound key) repeatedly to display different dialing options for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving the telephone number in the directory.

Press 1 repeatedly if you need to add 1 in front of the telephone number before dialing or saving it in the directory.



When the number is displayed in the correct format for dialing, press **HOME**, **CELL** or **SPEAKER** to dial.

#### Note

If you have programmed the home area code, only the last seven digits of the incoming phone numbers from that area code will be displayed while reviewing the caller ID log. Press # repeatedly to display all possible dialing options.

#### Dial a caller ID log entry

- 1. Search for the desired caller ID log entry (see **Review the Caller ID log**).
- 2. When the desired entry displays, press **HOME**, **CELL** or **SPEAKER** to dial.



# Save a caller ID log entry to the directory

- 1. Search for the desired caller ID log entry (see **Review the Caller ID log**).
- 2. When the desired entry displays, press **SELECT**.
- 3. Press **SELECT** again to choose **Directory**. Then the handset displays **Enter number**.
- 4. Use the dialing keys to edit the number, when necessary. Press **SELECT** to move to the name. The handset displays **Enter name**.
- 5. Use the dialing keys to add or edit the name.
- 6. Press **SELECT** when done and you hear a confirmation tone.

# While entering names and numbers, you can:

- Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to move the cursor to the right or left.
- Press **DELETE** to erase a digit.
- Press and hold **DELETE** to erase all digits.
- Press and hold **PAUSE** to enter a dialing pause (a **p** appears).
- Press **0** to add a space while editing a name or number.
- Press ★ TONE/a ► A to change the next letter to upper or lower case.

#### Note

 If you save an entry which already exists in the directory, the handset displays **Number** repeated and then returns to the previous screen.

#### Delete a caller ID log entry

- 1. Search for the desired caller ID log entry (see **Review the Caller ID log**).
- 2. Press **DELETE** to delete the displayed entry.

#### Delete all caller ID log entries

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to scroll to Caller ID log, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to scroll to Delete all, and then press SELECT.





4. When the screen shows

Delete all? Press SELECT to
confirm. The screen displays

Deleting... and then you hear a
confirmation tone.



#### Call block

If you have subscribed to caller ID service, you can set the telephone to block unknown calls and certain undesired calls. The call block list stores up to 20 entries.

When a home line is blocked, the caller will hear a simulated busy tone for one ring cycle. You may pick up the call during the first ring when there is no caller ID information. Otherwise, the call is disconnected.

#### Block unknown calls

All incoming calls with unknown numbers will be blocked.

- 1. Press **CALL BLOCK** when the handset is not in use.
  - -OR-

Press MENU when the handset is not in use. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to choose Call Block, and then press SELECT.

2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Calls w/o num, and then press SELECT.

3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Unblock or Block, then press SELECT. You hear a confirmation tone.

#### Add a call block list entry

- 1. Press **CALL BLOCK** when the handset is not in use.
  - -OR-

Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use. Press **CID/▼** or **△/♥** to choose **Call Block**, and then press **SELECT**.

- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to choose Block list, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Add new entry, and then press SELECT.



4. When **Enter number** displays, use the dialing keys to enter a number (up to 30 digits).

#### -OR-

Copy a number from the redial list by pressing **REDIAL**. Then press **CID/▼**, **△/♥** or **REDIAL** repeatedly to find the desired number. Press **SELECT** to copy the number.

- 5. Press **SELECT** to move on to the name.
- 6. When **Enter name** displays, use the dialing keys to enter a name (up to 15 characters). Additional key presses produce other characters on that key. The first character of every word is capitalized.

7. Press **SELECT** to save. You hear a confirmation tone and then the screen returns to the previous menu.

# While entering names and numbers, you can:

- Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to move the cursor to the left or right.
- Press **DELETE** to erase a digit.
- Press and hold **DELETE** to erase all digits.
- Press and hold PAUSE to enter a dialing pause (a p appears).
- Press 0 to add a space (for entering names only).
- Press ➤ TONE/a ➤ A to change the next letter to upper or lower case.

#### Review the call block list

1. Press **CALL BLOCK** when the handset is not in use.

#### -OR-

Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use. Press **CID/▼** or **△/♥** to choose **Call Block**, and then press **SELECT**.

- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Block list, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press **SELECT** to choose **Review**.
- 4. When an entry displays, press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to browse. You hear a double beep when you reach the beginning or end of the caller block list.



#### Note

• When you access the call block list without records, the screen shows **List empty**.

#### Edit a call block list entry

- 1. Search for the desired block list entry (see **Review the call block list**).
- 2. When the desired entry displays, press **SELECT**. The handset displays **Enter number**.
- 3. Use the dialing keys to edit the number.
- 4. Press **SELECT** to move to the name. The handset displays **Enter name**.
- 5. Use the dialing keys to add or edit the name.

6. Press **SELECT** to save the entry. You hear a confirmation tone.

# Save a caller ID log entry to the call block list

- 1. Search for the desired caller ID log entry (see **Review the caller ID log**).
- 2. When the desired entry displays, press **SELECT**.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose To Call block, and then press SELECT. Then the handset displays Enter number.
- 4. Use the dialing keys to edit the number, when necessary.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to move to the name. The handset displays **Enter name**.
- 6. Use the dialing keys to add or edit the name.

7. Press **SELECT** when done.

#### Note

 If you save an entry which already exists in the call block list, the handset displays **Number** repeated and then returns to previous screen.

#### Delete a call block list entry

- 1. Search for the desired block list entry (see **Review the call block list**).
- 2. Press **DELETE**. You hear a confirmation tone and the handset displays the next entry.

#### Note

• If the call block list is empty after an entry is deleted, the handset displays **List empty**. You hear a confirmation tone.



#### Mute first ring

Your telephone rings once for blocked calls. You can choose to mute the first ring for all incoming calls, so that there will be no ring for blocked calls. By default, the first ring is set to **On**.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press **7464#** on the handset.
- 3. Scroll to choose **First ring:On** to keep the first ring, or **First ring:Off** to mute the first ring.
- 4. Press **SELECT** to save.

#### Note

 When you have muted the first ring, you will hear one ring less before the answering system and voicemail answer the incoming calls.

### Sound settings

#### Key tone

You can turn the key tone on or off for each handset. If you turn the key tone off, there are no beeps when you press the handset keys.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose **Key tone**, and then press **SELECT**.
- 4. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose On or Off.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.

#### Ringer tone

You can choose from different ringer tones for each handset.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Ringers, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Home ringtone or Cell ringtone, and then press SELECT.
- 4. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to sample each ringer tone.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.



#### Note

• If you turn off the ringer volume, you will not hear ringer tone samples.

#### Handset ringer volume

You can set the ringer volume or turn the ringer off on each handset. When the ringer is off, appears on the screen.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Ringers, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press **SELECT** to choose **Home volume** or **Cell volume**, and then press **SELECT**.
- 4. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to sample each volume level.

5. Press **SELECT** to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.

#### Note

• The ringer volume also determines the ringer volume for intercom calls. If the ringer volume is set to off, that handset is silenced for all incoming calls except paging tone.

#### Temporary ringer silencing

When the telephone is ringing, you can temporarily silence the ringer of the handset without disconnecting the call. The next call rings normally at the preset volume.

#### Silence the handset ringer

Press **CANCEL** or **MUTE** on the handset and it displays **Ringer muted** and **\(\Omega\)**.

#### Note

 Each handset and the base ring when there is an incoming call unless the ringer volume of that device is turned off.

#### Quiet mode

You can turn on the quiet mode for a period of time (1-12 hours). During this period, all tones (except paging tone) are muted.

- 1. Press and hold #QUIET when the handset is not in use.
- 2. The handset displays

  Quiet: \_\_ hours. Use the dialing keys (0-9) to enter the desired duration (1-12).
- 3. Press **SELECT** to save. You hear a confirmation tone.
  The handset displays **Quiet**mode on and **\(\Delta\)**.



#### Turn off the quiet mode

Press and hold #QUIET when the handset is not in use. The handset displays Quiet mode off briefly and then returns to idle.

#### Note

 When you change the settings of the ringer tone or ringer volume, you can still hear the samples even if the quiet mode is on.

#### Other settings

#### Home area code

When you dial your local calls using only seven digits (area code not required), you can program your home area code so that when you receive a call within your local area, the telephone number is automatically stored without the area code in the caller ID log.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Home area code, and then press SFLECT
- 4. Use the dialing keys to enter a three-digit home area code.
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.

#### Note

• If, in the future, your telephone service provider requires you to dial the area code when making a local call, or, if you move to a location that requires it, delete the home area code you have

already programmed, following the steps above. After you have deleted the home area code, will appear on the display.

#### Dial mode

The dial mode is preset to touch-tone dialing. If you have pulse (rotary) service, you must change the dial mode to pulse dialing before using the telephone to make a call.

- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Dial mode, and then press SELECT.
- 4. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Touch-tone or Pulse.

5. Press **SELECT** to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.

#### Temporary tone dialing

If you have pulse (rotary) service only, you can switch from pulse to touch-tone dialing temporarily during a call. This is useful if you need to send touch-tone signals to access your telephone banking or long distance services.

- 1. During a call, press **★ TONE/a ▶ A**.
- 2. Use the dialing keys to enter the number you wish to dial.
- 3. The telephone sends touch-tone signals. The telephone automatically returns to pulse dialing mode after you end the call.

# Retrieve voicemail from telephone service

Voicemail is a feature available from most telephone service providers. It may be included with your telephone service, or may be optional. Fees may apply.

#### Retrieve voicemail

When you received a voicemail, the handset displays **New voicemail** and **M**.



To retrieve, you typically dial an access number provided by your telephone service provider, and then enter a security code. Contact your telephone service provider for instructions on how to configure the voicemail settings and listen to messages.

#### Note

 After you have listened to all new voicemail messages, the indicators on the handset turn off automatically.

#### Set your voicemail number

You can save your access number on each handset for easy access to your voicemail number, you can press and hold  $1 \le 1$  to retrieve voicemail.




- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, and then press SELECT.
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose Settings, and then press SELECT.
- 4. Use the dialing keys to enter the voicemail number (up to 30 digits).
- 5. Press **SELECT** to save.

# Turn off the new voicemail indicators

When you have retrieved your voicemail while away from home, and the handset still displays the new voicemail indicators, use this feature to turn off the indicators.

#### Note.

- This feature turns off the indicators only, it does not delete your voicemail messages.
- 1. Press **MENU** when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press CID/▼ or ▲/蚥 to choose Settings, and then press SFI FCT
- 3. Press CID/▼ or ▲/♥ to choose CIr voicemail, and then press SELECT. You hear a confirmation tone.



#### Cell phone voicemail

If you have voicemail service active on your cell phone, and you do not answer the incoming cell call, the call will be answered by your cell phone's voicemail. Contact your cell phone service provider for more information about voicemail service.

# Expand your telephone system

You can add new handset (XT8) to your telephone system. All accessories are sold separately. Your telephone base supports a maximum of five devices.

My telephone does not work at all.

Make sure the telephone base is installed properly, and battery is installed and charged correctly. For optimum daily performance, return the handset to the telephone base after use.

#### The display shows Low battery.

Place the handset in the telephone base or charger for charging.



#### I cannot dial out.

- Make sure there is a dial tone before dialing. It is normal if the handset takes a second or two to synchronize with the telephone base before producing a dial tone. Wait an extra second before dialing.
- Eliminate any background noise. Mute the handset before dialing, or dial from another room in your home with less background noise.

# The display shows No line. I cannot hear the dial tone.

- Disconnect the telephone line cord from your telephone and connect it to another telephone. If there is no dial tone on that other telephone either, then the telephone line cord may be defective. Try installing a new telephone line cord. If changing telephone line cord does not help, the wall jack (or the wiring to this wall jack) may be defective. Contact your telephone service provider.
- You may be using a new cable or VoIP service, the existing telephone jacks in your home may no longer work. Contact your service provider for solutions.

# The display shows To register HS... and ...see manual alternately. The handset does not work at all.

The handset is deregistered from the telephone base.

Place the handset in the telephone base to register it back.

After about 10 seconds, the handset displays **Registering...**. When the registration process completes, the handset displays **Registered** and you hear a beep. The registration process takes about 90 seconds.



#### I cannot add and connect my cell phone or headset to the telephone base

- Make sure you have cellular coverage and the Bluetooth function of your cell phone or headset is turned on. See the user's manual of your cell phone or headset for more information.
- Make sure that the telephone base is in discoverable mode.
- Carefully follow the instructions in this manual.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth cell phone headset is not connected to any other Bluetooth device, and is connected to the telephone base and active on the device list.

• Turn off your cell phone or headset, and then turn it on again.

The cell phone reception in my house is poor and I cannot connect it to my RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT.

If there is a location in your house with better reception, you can leave your cell phone at that location while you use the RT802/RT803/RT804/RT803XT/RT804T/RT805XT cell line. In order for this to work, the telephone base must be within 15 feet of the cell phone.

#### The battery does not charge in the handset or the handset battery does not accept charge.

- Make sure the handset is placed in the telephone base or charger correctly.
- If the battery is completely depleted, charge the battery for at least 30 minutes before use.
- You may need to purchase a new battery.

# The telephone does not ring when there is an incoming call.

- Make sure the ringer volume is not set to off.
- The handset may be too far from the telephone base. Move it closer to the telephone base.



# My handset beeps and is not performing normally.

Move the handset closer to the telephone base. It may be out of range.

# I hear other calls when using the telephone.

Disconnect the telephone base from the telephone wall jack. Plug in a different telephone. If you still hear other calls, the problem is probably in the wiring or telephone service. Contact your telephone service provider.

# I hear noise on the cordless handset and the keys do not work.

Make sure the telephone line cord is plugged in securely.

# There is interference during a telephone conversation. My calls fade out when I am using the cordless handset.

- The handset may be out of range. Move it closer to the telephone base.
- If you subscribe to high-speed Internet service (DSL digital subscriber line) through your telephone line, you must install a DSL filter between the telephone line cord and the telephone wall jack. The filter prevents noise and caller ID problems caused by DSL interference. Contact your DSL service provider for more information about DSL filters.
- Appliances or other cordless telephones plugged into the same circuit as the telephone base can cause interference. Try moving the appliance or telephone base to another outlet.
- The location of your telephone base can impact the performance of your cordless phone. For better reception, install the telephone base in a centralized location within your home or office, away from walls or other obstructions. In many environments, elevating the telephone base improves overall performance.



# The telephone does not receive caller ID or the telephone does not show caller ID during call waiting.

- Caller ID is a subscription service. You must subscribe to this service from your telephone service provider for this feature to work on your telephone.
- Both your and the caller's telephone service providers must use equipment compatible with the caller ID service.
- The caller may not be calling from an area which supports caller ID.
- The caller ID information displays after the first or second ring.

# The display shows Out of range or no pwr at base.

- The handset may be out of range. Move it closer to the telephone base.
- Make sure the power cord is securely plugged into the telephone base. Use a working electrical outlet not controlled by a wall switch.

#### I subscribe to a nontraditional telephone service that uses my computer to establish connections, and my telephone doesn't work.

- Make sure your computer is powered on, and your Internet is working properly.
- Make sure to plug your USB telephone adapter into a dedicated USB port on your computer. Do not plug into a multiple port USB hub (USB splitter) that is not powered.
- In a few rare instances, the USB port on your computer may not have enough power.
   In these instances, try using a USB hub with its own external power supply.



• If you are using a firewall, it may prevent access to your nontraditional telephone service. Contact your service provider for more information.

I accidentally set my LCD language to Spanish or French, and I don't know how to change it back to English.

While the handset is not in use or is on a call, press **MENU** and then enter \*364# to change the handset LCD language back to English.
