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Phone Setup

Installing the SIM Card and Battery

Power off your phone before installing or replacing the battery or SIM card.

1 Remove the back cover as shown.



②Insert the SIM card into the card slot with the cut corner oriented as shown.



③ Insert the microSDHCTM(sold separately) with the gold-colored contacts facing down.



④Carefully insert the battery with the contacts located against the metal springs. Push down on the battery until it is fully seated.

⑤Replace the back cover

Charging the Battery

Note: For best performance, charge the battery fully prior to using the phone for the first time.

①Insert the charger's connector into

the charging port. Be sure to insert the connector in the correct orientation. Do not force the connector into the port.



- ⁽²⁾Plug the charger into a standard AC wall outlet.
- ⁽³⁾When the battery is fully charged, unplug the charger and disconnect it from the phone.

Switching Your Phone On/Off

Make sure the SIM card is in your phone and the battery is charged.

- Press and hold the **Power Key** to turn on your phone.
- To turn it off, press and hold the **Power Key** to open the options menu. Tap **Power off** > **OK**.

Setting Up Your Phone for the First Time

When you first power on your phone after you purchase it or reset it to factory settings (see *Phone Settings – Factory Reset*), you need to set up your phone settings before using it.

①Tap the language field to select the language you want to use and then tap ▶.
②Select a Wi-Fi network or tap Skip.

③If you've got a Google Account or Gmail, tap Yes to sign in to your account. Or tap No to get an account.

You can also tap **Not now** to set up an account later.

(4)Configure the Google location options and tap \blacktriangleright .

(5) If prompted, set the date, time, and time zone. Then tap \blacktriangleright .

⁽⁶⁾Enter your name which the phone uses to personalize some apps and tap \blacktriangleright .

(7) You will be prompted to accept the terms of Google service. Tap \blacktriangleright to complete the setup.

Switching to Sleep Mode

To save battery power, Sleep Mode suspends your phone in a low-powerconsumption state while the display is off. Your phone also goes into Sleep Mode by itself when the display is automatically turned off after a certain period of time, which you can set by pressing \implies > System settings > Display > Sleep from the home screen.

Press the Power Key to switch to Sleep Mode.

Waking Up Your Phone

①Press the Power Key to activate your screen display.

⁽²⁾Tap and hold a blank area to unlock the screen.

Note: If you have set an unlock pattern, PIN, or password for your phone (see *Settings – Security*) you'll need to draw the pattern or enter the PIN/password to unlock your screen.

Getting Around

Touch Control

Use the touchscreen to control your phone. The controls on your touchscreen change dynamically depending on the tasks you're performing.

①Tap the buttons, icons, or applications to select items or to open applications.

Keep your finger on an item to see the available options.


②Swipe the screen to scroll up, down, left, or right.


③Drag and drop to move particular items across the screen.

④Pinch with two fingers or double-tap the screen to zoom in/out on a web page or an image.

Note: You can view the phone screen in portrait or landscape orientation simply by holding it upright or turning it on its side.




Key Functions

Home Screens

You can customize your home screens. Set your own wallpaper, add the widgets or application shortcuts you need, or remove them as you like.



Navigating Your Home Screens

Your phone comes with five home screens, giving you more space to add more items. Simply swipe your finger to the left or right to see each home screen.

Choosing Your Wallpaper

① Tap and hold a blank part of the home screen and tap **Wallpaper**.

- (2) Tap Wallpaper for home screen or Wallpaper for lock screen.
- ③ Tap Gallery, Live, Photos or Wallpapers and choose the image or animation you want to use as the wallpaper.
- ④ Tap **OK** (for Gallery images) or **Set wallpaper**.

Note: Live wallpapers are not available for the lock screen.

Adding Items to Your Home Screen

① Tap and hold a blank part of the home screen and tap Widgets or Apps.

2 Tap and hold the icon of the item you wish to add and then drag it to a home screen thumbnail at the bottom.

Removing Items from Your Home Screen

(1) Tap and hold the item you want to delete until $\mathbf{\overline{III}}$ Delete appears on the screen.

②Drag the item to $\overline{10}$ Delete and release your finger.

Creating a Folder

①On a home screen, tap and hold an app icon and drag it to **Folder**.

2 You can add more apps to the folder by dragging icons to the folder.

③Tap the folder to open it and access items in the folder.

(4)To name the folder, open it and tap Unnamed Folder.

⁽⁵⁾ Enter a name and tap **Done**.

Deleting Items from a Folder

1 Tap a folder to open it.

⁽²⁾Tap and hold an icon and drag it to $\frac{1}{100}$ Delete.

Using the Notifications Panel

The Notifications panel provides quick access to alerts including new messages, emails, and software updates.

- To open the Notifications panel, tap the top of the home screen and swipe down with your finger.
- Swipe left or right to clear individual notifications or tap X to clear all.
- Tap 🔯 to access the full Settings menu.
- To close the Notifications panel, swipe up from the bottom of the screen or press

Reopen Recently Used Applications

 Press and hold = from any screen. The phone will display applications you used recently.

⁽²⁾Tap the application you want to open.



Phone Calls

How to Make Calls

There are many ways to make a call with your phone, and they're all easy to do.

Calling from the Dialer

(1)From the home screen, tap \searrow > \blacksquare .

②Enter the phone number with the on-screen

keypad. Tap \bigstar to delete wrong digits. (3) Tap \checkmark to place the call.

Tip: To make international calls, tap and hold the 0 Key to enter the "+".

Calling from Your Contacts

(1) From the home screen, tap 2 >Contacts.

②Swipe your finger to scroll the contacts list

and tap \checkmark next to the contact you want to call.

Tips:

- You can search for a contact by typing and entering the contact name.
- You can also access your contacts by



tapping **** > All contacts.

Calling from Your Call History

(1)From the home screen, tap $\searrow > \bigcirc$.

(2) Tap next to the number you want to call.

Calling from a Text Message

If a text message contains a phone number that you want to call, you can make the call while viewing the text message.

(1)From the home screen, tap \square .



⁽²⁾Tap the conversation and then the message that contains the phone number you need

^③Tap the number.

(4) Tap Call.

How to Receive Calls

Answering a Call

Slide **K** down to answer the call.

Rejecting a Call

Slide **U** up to reject the call.

Slide up to send a text message to the caller. Choose the default message or send a custom one.

Muting a Call

During a call, you can mute your microphone so that the person you are speaking to cannot hear you, but you can still hear them.

Tap **Mute** to turn your microphone off. To turn your microphone back on, tap **Mute** again.

Putting a Call on Hold

During a call, you can put it on hold by tapping More > Hold.

Tip: If you accept an incoming call while you're on another call, the first call automatically goes on hold. Tap **Swap** to switch between the two callers.

Turning the Speakerphone On/Off

Tap **Speaker** during a call to turn the speakerphone on. Tap **Speaker** again to turn off the speakerphone.

Adding a Call

During a call, tap **Add call** and dial a number. When you call another number, the first call automatically goes on hold.

Swapping Calls

To switch between callers, tap Swap.

Merging Calls

To merge two calls and create a conference call, tap Merge calls.

Note: The maximum number of callers on a call varies by carrier.

Ending a Call Tap **Find** to finish a call.

Contacts

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google account or other accounts that support contact syncing.

To see your contacts, tap $\frac{1}{2}$ > **Contacts** on the home screen. From there, you can tap the tabs on the top to quickly switch to **Favorites** or **Groups**.

Importing and Exporting Contacts

You can import or export contacts from/to your SIM card or microSDHC card. This is especially useful when you need to transfer contacts between different devices.

Importing Contacts from the SIM Card or Exporting to the Card (1)From the Contacts screen, press => Import/export.

⁽²⁾Choose to import or export contacts. If you have more than one account set up on your phone, you will need to select the account to which you'd like to import contacts. If not, your phone will automatically display the contacts.

⁽³⁾Tap the contacts you want to import or export.

• For import, just tap the contacts you needed one by one, or tap > import all.

• For export, tap the contacts you want to export and tap \square , or tap \square > \square to export all contacts.

Importing Contacts from microSDHC Card or Exporting to microSDHC Card

①From the Contacts screen, press => Import/export.

⁽²⁾ Choose to import or export contacts. If you have more than one account set up on your phone, you will need to select the account to which you'd like to import contacts.

Note: Files will be saved to/pulled from the microSDHC card when one is inserted in the phone.

- For import, you should have vCard files saved on the microSDHC card. If there's more than one vCard file, choose to import one, multiple, or all vCard files. Tap the vCard file and tap **OK**.
- \bullet For export, select a vCard type and tap OK to create the file on the Phone/ microSDHC card.

Creating a Contact

(1)From the Contacts screen, tap \square to add a new contact.

⁽²⁾Tap **AT&T Address Book Contact** to choose where to save the contact.

③Enter the contact name, phone numbers, email addresses, postal addresses, and other information.

(4) Tap **DONE** to save the contact.

Adding a Contact to Favorites

(1)From the Contacts screen, tap the contact you want to add to **Favorites**. (2)Tap \swarrow next to the contact's name.

Searching for a Contact

(1) Tap \square at the bottom of the Contacts screen.

②Enter the contact name you want to search for. Matching contacts will be listed.

Creating a New Group

①From the Contacts screen, tap 🕾.

2)Tap 😤.

- (3) If you have added contact accounts other than the phone, tap to choose an account for the new group.
- ④Enter the group name.
- ^⑤Tap Add member and select the contacts you wish to be the group members.

⁽⁶⁾If necessary, tap **Default** below **RINGTONE** or **NOTIFICATION RINGTONE** to set a special ringtone for incoming calls or messages from the group members.

⑦Tap DONE.

To send messages to the group members, you can tap a group and then press \implies > Send group message.

Entering Text

When you tap a field that needs text or numbers, a keyboard automatically appears on the screen. Open the Notifications panel and tap Choose input method to change input method.

Android Keyboard

The Android keyboard provides a layout similar to a desktop computer keyboard. Turn the phone sideways and the keyboard will change from portrait to landscape.

To use the landscape keyboard, from the home screen, press => System settings > Display > Auto rotate screen.

Note: The landscape keyboard is not supported in all applications.



- Tap the alphabetic keys to enter letters. Tap and hold the keys to enter associated accented letters or numbers. For example, to enter È, tap and hold e and the available accented letters and number 3 appear. Then slide your finger to choose è
- Tap 🔮 to use uppercase or lowercase letters. This key also changes to indicate the

current case you are using: $\stackrel{\diamond}{\Rightarrow}$ for lowercase, $\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ for uppercase, and $\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ when locked in uppercase.

- Tap 🔤 to delete any text you have entered.
- Tap 2123 to select numbers and symbols. You can then tap $^{\pm 1\times}$ to access more.
- Tap 🖳 to use Google's networked voice input.

• Tap and hold and then release it to change the input language or the Android keyboard settings.

Google Voice Typing

Google Voice typing uses the Google voice recognition service to convert speech to text. You must have a data connection on a mobile or Wi-Fi network to use it.

①Flick down the status bar when entering text and tap Choose input method, and then select Google voice typing.

Or tap \blacksquare to access the voice typing feature when you are using the Android Keyboard. (2) When you see the microphone image, speak what you want to type.

⁽³⁾You can continue entering text to keep it or to delete it.

TIP: Say "comma," "period," "question mark," "exclamation mark," or "exclamation point" to enter punctuation.

TouchPal X Keyboard

The TouchPal keyboard offers three layouts: T26, T12 and T+.

To Switch the Keyboard Layout

You can tap **to** select a layout.

The T26 layout

- Tap the alphabetic keys to enter letters.

and **N** when locked in uppercase.

• Slide right on abc to enable word prediction. Slide left on abc to disable word prediction.



- Tap **EN** to change the input language.
- Tap **12**[#] to enter digits, symbols and emoticons. Tap **1/2** or **2/2** to access more. Tap **abc** to go back to entering letters.
- Tap or tap and hold 🚺 to delete text before the cursor.
- Tap 🕑 to access the quick settings of TouchPal keyboard.
- Tap Φ to open text editing options. You can select, cut, copy, paste, and delete text, or move the cursor.
- Tap 🛛 to use voice input.
- Tap \blacksquare to hide the on-screen keyboard. Tap the text field again to show the keyboard.

The T12 layout

Tap a key repeatedly until the desired letter or symbol appears. If word prediction is enabled (abc), just tap the keys once and choose the right word.



The T+ layout

Tap to enter the left letter on the key; Double-tap to enter the desired letter/ symbol on the key. If word prediction is enabled (about), just tap the keys and choose the right word.



To Enable and Use TouchPal Curve

①On the TouchPal keyboard screen, tap , check the box next to **Curve**, and tap **OK**.

⁽²⁾Move your finger from letter to letter on the keyboard to trace a word without lifting the finger until you reach the end of the word.

Note: TouchPal Curve is only available in the **26-Key PhonePad** layout.



Tips:

- To enter a single letter, tap it.
- Lift your finger at the end of the word. A space is added automatically when you begin to trace the next word.

Choosing Touch Input Settings

Choose the tap input settings by pressing \equiv > System settings > Language & input from the home screen.

In the KEYBOARD & INPUT METHOS METHODS section, you can set the

default input method and choose the settings for input methods.

Messaging

Your SMS (text message) and MMS (multimedia message) are combined into one menu under

Message Box

Instead of an inbox and outbox your phone organizes all messages you sent and received into one box, where messages exchanged with the same number are grouped into one message thread on the Messaging screen. You can tap a thread to see the conversation you have had with someone.

Message threads are sorted in chronological order with the latest one on top.

Sending a Message

(1)From the home screen, tap \square .

2 Tap 2.

③Enter the recipient's number or name in the To field. As you type, matching contacts will appear. Tap a suggested contact to add as a recipient or

tap \leq to access your contacts or call logs.

④ Tap the **Type message** field and enter your message.

- Press = to insert a smiley, contact, or Quick Text.
- If you are sending an MMS, tap \mathbb{N} to attach a file to the message.

(5) Tap > to send your message.

Note: Add an attachment to a text message and it will be converted into an MMS automatically. Likewise, if you remove all attachments from an MMS, it will automatically become a text message.

Changing Message Settings

The phone's message settings are pre-configured for you to use immediately. To change them, press \implies > Settings from the Messaging screen.

SMS Enabled: Tap to set the default SMS app.

Storage settings:

- Delete old messages: Delete old messages as limits are reached.
- **Text message limit**: Set the maximum number of text messages allowed in a single thread.
- **Multimedia message limit**: Set the maximum number of multimedia messages allowed in a single thread.

Text (SMS) message settings:

- Manage SIM card messages: Manage the messages stored on your SIM card.
- Service Center: Enables you to view and edit the service center number.

Multimedia (MMS) message settings:

- Group messaging: Set to use MMS to send a single message when there are multiple recipients.
- Auto-retrieve: Automatically download multimedia messages.

Display settings:

• Bubble and background: Select a dialog bubble and background.

Notification settings:

- Notifications: Show message notifications in the status bar.
- Choose ringtone: Choose a ringtone for your incoming messages.

• **Vibrate**: Make your phone vibrate when a new message arrives. Signature settings:

- Edit signature: Edit your signature, which can be added automatically to outgoing messages.
- Add signature: Add the signature to all outgoing messages.

WAP push switch settings:

• Enable wap push receiving: Allow your phone to receive WAP push.

Emergency alert settings:

- Receive emergency alerts: Choose the types of alerts you'd like to receive.
- Notification for unread alerts: Set a notification reminder for every 10 minutes.
- Alerts notification preview: Preview settings for alert tones and vibration cadence.

Email

With the Email application, you can access your email from various providers, including Yahoo![®] and Gmail.

Creating an Email Account

(1)From the home screen, tap \longrightarrow > **Email**.

②Enter your email address and password.

③Tap Next to let the phone retrieve the network parameters automatically.

Note: You can also enter these details manually by tapping **Manual setup** or when automatic setup fails.

(4)Follow the on-screen instructions to finish the setup. Your phone will display your email inbox and start to download email messages.

Tip: To add more email accounts, open Email to get the Inbox screen and press => Settings > Add account.

Receiving Email

When you are in an email account, tap \square to download recent emails.

You can adjust how often your account downloads new email by pressing => Settings > name of the account > Inbox check frequency. Tap an option to select it.

Composing and Sending an Email

After creating an email account, you can compose and send email messages.

①From your inbox, tap 🔼

②Tap the To field and enter the recipient's address or tap group. When you enter the address, matching contacts on the phone will be displayed. Separate each recipient with a comma. Tip: You can also press => Add Cc/Bcc to add more recipients.

③Enter the subject and the content of your email.

④Press \blacksquare > Attach file to add files to the email.

⁽⁵⁾Tap **Send** to send the message.

Replying to or Forwarding an Email

①From your inbox, open the email you want to reply to or forward

②Tap Solution or Control to reply to or forward the email. You can also tap Solution to reply to all recipients of the email.

③Enter the contents/recipients of your email.

④Tap Send.

Deleting an Email Account

(1)From your inbox, press \blacksquare > Settings.

T ap the account you want to delete and then tap **Remove account**. Tap

OK to confirm. All email messages in the account will be deleted.

Email Settings

General settings apply to all email accounts you add.

(1)From your inbox, press \blacksquare > Settings > General.

②Make the changes you want and press 🗢 when you're finished.

Connecting to the Internet

Your phone's impressive networking capabilities allow you to access the Internet or your corporate network with ease. You can use default connection settings to connect to the web via your mobile network (GPRS/EDGE/3G/4G/4G LTE) or Wi-Fi. The GPRS/EDGE/3G/4G/4G LTE connection can be enabled/disabled manually. From the home screen, press => System settings > Mobile networks and check or uncheck the Data enabled check box.

Adding a New GPRS/EDGE/3G/4G/4G LTE Connection

To get connected via GPRS/EDGE/3G/4G/4G LTE, you need a data plan with your service provider. If the GPRS/EDGE/3G/4G/4G LTE settings are not pre-configured on your phone, please contact your provider to get the necessary information.

①From the home screen, press => System settings > Mobile networks >

Access Point Names.

2 Тар .

3 Tap each item to enter the information you receive from your service provider.

(4) Tap Save to complete.

Tip: To set the APN to default settings, press \blacksquare > Reset to default.

Turning on Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi provides wireless Internet access over distances of up to 300 feet (90 meters).

Open the Notifications panel and tap \bigcirc > Wi-Fi.

Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network

- ①From the home screen, press => System settings > Wi-Fi. The Wi-Fi network points, or "hotspots," that your phone has detected are displayed with their names and security settings.
- ⁽²⁾Tap a network to connect to it. If security features are implemented, you'll need to enter a password and then tap **Connect**.
- ③To disconnect from a network, tap the network name and then tap Forget.

Checking the Wi-Fi Network Status

You can check the Wi-Fi network by looking at the icon in the status bar. Or, tap the network the phone is currently connected to on the Wi-Fi screen. You can then check the network status from the pop-up window.

Browsing the Internet

Your phone has two options for Internet access. Use the Browser or Google Chrome to view web pages and search for information.

From the home screen, tap 5.



Opening a Web Page

- Tap the address bar, enter the website you want to browse, and tap Go.
- Tap 🛃 beside the address bar or press == > Bookmarks. Tap a bookmark to open it.
- Press => Bookmarks. Choose an item from the HISTORY tab or SAVED PAGES tab.

Browsing Options

While viewing most web pages, you can do the following.

- · Scroll: Swipe the screen in any direction.
- Zoom out: Tap the screen or pinch two fingers together.
- Zoom in: Tap the screen or spread two fingers apart.
- Go back: Tap to return to the page you viewed previously.
- Go forward: Tap => Forward.
- Refresh the page: Tap C.
- Find text on the page: Press => Find on page and type the terms you want to search for

- Send the page URL to friends: Press => Share page and select how you want to send the URL.
- Follow a link: Tap a link on the web page to open it.
- Save the page for offline reading: Press => Save for offline read. To read saved pages, press => Bookmarks > SAVED PAGES.

Opening Another Browser Window

You can have multiple windows open in the browser. While in the browser, tap \square > \blacksquare to open a new window. To view your open windows, tap \square . Tap \square on a window to close it.

Using Bookmarks

To bookmark a web page, open it and tap \mathbf{E} or \mathbf{E} , and then tap **Save to bookmarks**. Give the bookmark a name and tap **OK**.

Editing a Bookmark

①From the home screen, tap 5.

2 Press > Book marks.

③Tap and hold the bookmark you want to edit until the shortcut menu pops up.

(4) Tap Edit bookmark.

(5)Edit the name (Label) or location (Address), and then tap **OK** to save it.

Deleting a Bookmark

(1)From the home screen, tap \mathbf{S} .



③Tap and hold the bookmark you want to delete until the shortcut menu pops up.

④Tap Delete bookmark > OK.

Changing Browser Settings

Press => Settings from a browser window to change browser settings.

Using Google Chrome

Use Google Chrome to browse the Internet. Chrome on your AT&T Z830 can sync bookmarks, browsing history, and opened tabs from your Google account.

(1)From the home screen, tap \longrightarrow > Chrome.

2 Read the terms of service and tap Accept and Continue.

③You can choose to Sign in to Chrome to sync it with your open tabs, bookmarks, and omnibox data from your computer. If you choose No thanks, you can sign in later via the Settings menu.

(4) To enter a URL, tap the web address bar, enter an address and tap Go.

Scroll to navigate and tap links to open them. Use a pinching gesture to zoom out.
Spread your fingers apart to zoom in. Press = to access additional settings.
To open a new browser tob top = . New tob

OTo open a new browser tab, tap $\boxed{10}$ > New tab.

Syncing Chrome

From the home screen, tap \longrightarrow > Chrome > \implies > Settings > SIGN IN TO CHROME> Sign in.

Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communication technology. Phones or other devices with *Bluetooth* capabilities can exchange information wirelessly within a distance of about 32 feet (10 meters). The *Bluetooth* devices must be paired before the communication is performed.

Using Bluetooth

- (1)Before you begin, place the *Bluetooth* device in pairing mode. From the home screen, press = > System settings and slide the **Bluetooth** switch to turn on Bluetooth. When Bluetooth is on, the ₿ icon will appear in the status bar.
- ⁽²⁾Tap **Bluetooth**. Your phone will automatically search for Bluetooth devices and will show all visible devices in range.
- 3 Tap the device you want to pair with.
- ④If necessary, confirm that the Bluetooth passkeys are the same between the two devices and tap Pair. Alternately, enter a Bluetooth passkey and tap Pair. Pairing is successfully completed when the other device accepts the connection or the same passkey is entered.

Notes:

- The *Bluetooth* passkey may be fixed for certain devices, such as headsets or hands-free car kits. You can try entering 0000 or 1234 (the most common passkeys), or refer to the documents for that device.
- To allow compatible *Bluetooth* devices to find your phone for pairing, tap Z830 on the *Bluetooth* settings screen. Your device will be visible for 2 minutes.

Entertainment

Taking Pictures with Your Camera

Your phone has a 5-megapixel camera.

RF Exposure Information (SAR)

This phone is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the United States.

During SAR testing, this device was set to transmit at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands, and placed in positions that simulate RF exposure in usage against the head with no separation, and near the body with the separation of 10 mm. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the device while operating can be well below the maximum value. Driving

Full attention must be given to driving at all times in order to reduce the risk of an accident. Using a phone while driving (even with a hands-free kit) can cause distraction and lead to an accident. You must comply with local laws and regulations restricting the use of wireless devices while driving.

Operating Machinery

Full attention must be given to operating the machinery in order to reduce the risk of an accident.

Product Handling

General Statement on Handling and Use

You alone are responsible for how you use your phone and any consequences of its use.

You must always switch off your phone wherever the use of a phone is prohibited. Use of your phone is subject to safety measures designed to protect users and their environment.

- Always treat your phone and its accessories with care and keep it in a clean and dust-free place.
- Do not expose your phone or its accessories to open flames or lit tobacco products.
- Do not expose your phone or its accessories to liquid, moisture, or high humidity.
- Do not drop, throw, or try to bend your phone or its accessories.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or aerosols to clean the device or its accessories.

- Do not paint your phone or its accessories.
- Do not attempt to disassemble your phone or its accessories. Only authorized personnel can do so.
- Do not expose your phone or its accessories to extreme temperatures, minimum 23 F and maximum 122 F (minimum -5 C and maximum +50 C).
- Please check local regulations for disposal of electronic products.
- Do not carry your phone in your back pocket as it could break when you sit down.

Small Children

Do not leave your phone and its accessories within the reach of small children or allow them to play with it. They could hurt themselves or others, or could accidentally damage the phone.

Your phone contains small parts with sharp edges that may cause an injury or may become detached and create a choking hazard.

Demagnetization

To avoid the risk of demagnetization, do not allow electronic devices or magnetic media close to your phone for a long time.

Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)

Do not touch the SIM card's metal connectors.

Antenna

Do not touch the antenna unnecessarily.

Normal Use Position

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone to your ear, with the bottom toward your mouth.

Air Bags

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area as an airbag inflates with great force and serious injury could result.

Store the phone safely before driving your vehicle.

Seizures/Blackouts

The phone can produce a bright or flashing light. A small percentage of people may be susceptible to blackouts or seizures (even if they have never had one before) when exposed to flashing lights or light patterns such as when playing games or watching video. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts or have a family history of such occurrences, please consult a physician.

Repetitive Strain Injuries

To minimize the risk of Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI) when texting or playing games with your phone:

- Do not grip the phone too tightly.
- Press the keys lightly.
- Use the special features that are designed to minimize the times of pressing buttons, such as Message Templates and Predictive Text.
- Take lots of breaks to stretch and relax.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you must never rely solely on any wireless phone for emergency communications.

Loud Noise

This phone is capable of producing loud noises, which may damage your hearing. Turn down the volume before using headphones, *Bluetooth* stereo headsets or other audio devices.

Phone Heating

Your phone may become warm during charging and during normal use.

Electrical Safety

Accessories

Use only approved accessories.

Do not connect with incompatible products or accessories.

Take care not to touch or allow metal objects, such as coins or key rings, to contact or short-circuit in the battery terminals.

Connection to a Car

Seek professional advice when connecting a phone interface to the vehicle electrical system.

Faulty and Damaged Products

Do not attempt to disassemble the phone or its accessories.

Only qualified personnel can service or repair the phone or its accessories.

If your phone (or its accessories) has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you have taken it to be checked at an authorized service center.

Interference

General Statement on Interference

Care must be taken when using the phone in close proximity to personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 cm) be maintained between a mobile phone and a pacemaker

to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. To achieve this, use the phone on the opposite ear to your pacemaker and do not carry it in a breast pocket.

Hearing Aids

People with hearing aids or other cochlear implants may experience interfering noises when using wireless devices or when one is nearby.

The level of interference will depend on the type of hearing device and the distance from the interference source, increasing the separation between them may reduce the interference. You may also consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Medical Devices

Please consult your doctor and the device manufacturer to determine if operation of your phone may interfere with the operation of your medical device.

Hospitals

Switch off your wireless device when requested to do so in hospitals, clinics, or health care facilities. These requests are designed to prevent possible interference with sensitive medical equipment.

Aircraft

Switch off your wireless device whenever you are instructed to do so by airport or airline staff.

Consult the airline staff about the use of wireless devices on board the aircraft. If your device offers a 'flight mode', this must be enabled prior to boarding an aircraft.

Interference in Cars

Please note that because of possible interference to electronic equipment, some vehicle manufacturers forbid the use of mobile phones in their vehicles unless a hands-free kit with an external antenna is included in the installation.

Explosive Environments

Gas Stations and Explosive Atmospheres

In locations with potentially explosive atmospheres, obey all posted signs to turn off wireless devices such as your phone or other radio equipment.

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres include fueling areas, below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, and areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

Blasting Caps and Areas

Power off your mobile phone or wireless device when in a blasting area or in areas posted with power off "two-way radios" or "electronic devices" notices to avoid interfering with blasting operations.
