Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

This model phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

This phone is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government:

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6W/kg. *Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the poser required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base

station antenna, the lower the power output.

The highest SAR value for the model phone as reported to the FCC when tested for use at the ear is 1.04 W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.37 W/kg (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available enhancements and FCC requirements.)

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets the FCC RF exposure guidelines for use with an accessory that contains no metal and the positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body. Use of other enhancements may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines. If you do no t use a body-worn accessory and are not holding the phone at the ear, position the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from your body when the phone is switched on.

When some wireless phones are used near

When some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate. The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be

compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that have been rated have a label on the box. Your F450 has been tested for hearing aid device compatibility and has an M3 and/or T3 rating.

These ratings are not guaranteed. Results will vary, depending on the level of immunity of your hearing device and the degree of your hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference with hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices contain telecoils.) The more immune your hearing aid device is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from your wireless phone.

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device.

Distraction

Driving

Full attention must be given to driving at all times in order to reduce the risk of an accident. 
Antenna



Do not touch the antenna unnecessarily.

Normal Use Position

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone to your ear, with the bottom towards your mouth.



Air Bags

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area.

Store the phone safely before driving your vehicle.

Seizures/ Blackouts

The phone can produce a bright or flashing light.

Repetitive Motion Injuries

To minimize the risk of RSI when texting or playing games with your phone:

Do not grip the phone too tightly.

Press the buttons lightly.

Use the special features which are designed to minimize the times of pressing buttons, such as Message Templates and Predictive Text.

Take lots of breaks to stretch and relax.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you must never rely solely on any wireless phone for emergency communications.

Loud Noise

This phone is capable of producing loud noises, which may damage your hearing. Turn down the volume before using headphones, Bluetooth stereo headsets or other audio devices.

Phone Heating

Your phone may become warm during charging and during normal use.

Electrical Safety

Accessories

Use only approved accessories.

Do not connect with incompatible products or accessories.

Take care not to touch or allow metal objects, such as coins or key rings, to contact or short-circuit in the battery terminals.

Connection to a Car

Seek professional advice when connecting a phone interface to the vehicle electrical system.

Faulty and Damaged Products

Do not attempt to disassemble the phone or its accessory.

Only qualified personnel can service or repair the phone or its accessory.

If your phone or its accessory has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you have taken it to be checked at an authorized service centre.

Interference

General Statement on Interface

Care must be taken when using the phone in close proximity to personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 cm be maintained between a mobile phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. To achieve this, use the phone on the opposite ear to your pacemaker and do not carry it in a breast pocket.

Hearing Aids

People with hearing aids or other cochlear implants may experience interfering noises when using wireless devices or when one is nearby.

The level of interference will depend on the type of hearing device and the distance from the interference source, increasing the separation between them may reduce the interference. You may also consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Medical Devices

Please consult your doctor and the device manufacturer

to determine if operation of your phone may interfere with the operation of your medical device.

Hospitals

Switch off your wireless device when requested to do so in hospitals, clinics or health care facilities. These requests are designed to prevent possible interference with sensitive medical equipment.

Aircraft

Switch off your wireless device whenever you are instructed to do so by airport or airline staff.

Consult the airline staff about the use of wireless devices on board the aircraft. If your device offers a 'flight mode', this must be enabled prior to boarding an aircraft.

Interference in Cars

Please note that because of possible interference to electronic equipment, some vehicle manufacturers forbid the use of mobile phones in their vehicles unless a hands-free kit with an external antenna is included in the installation.

Explosive Environments

Petrol Stations and Explosive Atmospheres

In locations with potentially explosive atmospheres, obey all posted signs to turn off wireless devices such as your phone or other radio equipment.


Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres include fuelling areas, below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.


Blasting Caps and Areas

Power off your mobile phone or wireless device when in a blasting area or in areas posted power off "two-way radios" or "electronic devices" to avoid interfering with blasting operations.

Starting up


Installing the SIM/microSD Card and Battery

Switch off your phone before installing or replacing the battery, SIM, or memory card.


1. Remove the back cover.



2. Hold the SIM with the cut corner oriented as shown and



3. Open the microSD card holder, hold your microSD card by the cut corner end and slide it in.



microSD logo is a trade mark of the SD Card Association.

4. Insert the battery by aligning the gold contacts on the

battery with the gold contacts in the battery compartment. Gently push down on the battery until it clicks into place.



5. Press the cover gently back into place until you hear a

Removing the Battery and SIM/microSD Card

- 1. Make sure that your mobile phone is off.
- 2. Remove the back cover.
- 3. Lift the battery up and out.
- 4. Slide the SIM out.
- 5. Open the microSD card holder. Slide the microSD card down gently and remove it.

Charging the Battery

When you first get your new phone you'll need to charge the battery like this...

Connect the adapter to the charger jack. Ensure that the adapter is inserted with the correct orientation. Do not

force the connector into the charger jack.



- 2. Connect the charger to a standard AC wall outlet.
- 3. Disconnect the charger when the battery is fully charged.

Switching Your Phone On/Off

Make sure the SIM is in your device and the battery is charged.

- Hold **Power Key** to switch on your phone.
- To switch it off, hold **Power Key** to get the phone options. Select **Power off**, and then tap **OK**.

Setting Up Your Phone for the First Time

When you first power on your phone after you purchase it or reset it to factory settings (see *Sorting out Your Phone Settings – Privacy: Reset to Factory Settings*), you need to do some settings before using it.

1. Tap Change language to change the language you want

to use, if needed.

- 2. Tap the Android robot on the screen.
- 3. **Create** a Google Account or **Sign in** your account. You can also tap **Skip** to set up an account later.
- 4. Configure the Google location options and tap Next.
- 5. Configure the date and time options, and tap Next.

Switching to Sleep Mode

To save battery power, Sleep Mode suspends your device to a low-power-consumption state while the display is off. Your device also goes into Sleep Mode by itself when the display is automatically turned off after a certain period of time, which you can set in **Settings > Display > Screen timeout**.

Press Power Key to switch to Sleep Mode.

Waking up Your Phone

- 1. Press Power Key to activate your screen display.
- 2. Drag the ① icon to the right.

NOTE: If you have set an unlock pattern, PIN or password for your phone (see *Sorting out Your Phone Settings – Security Settings*) you'll need to draw the pattern or enter the PIN/password to unlock your screen.

Getting Around

Touch Control

You can use finger gestures to control your phone. The controls on your touch screen change dynamically depending on the tasks you're performing.

- Tap the buttons, icons, or applications to select items or to open applications.
- 2. Keep your finger on an item to see the available options.
- 3. Flick the screen to scroll up, down, left or right.
- 4. Point, drag and drop to move particular items across the screen
- 5. Pinch with two fingers, or double-tap the screen, to zoom in/out on a web page or an image.

NOTE: You can view the phone screen in portrait or landscape orientation simply by holding it upright or turning it on its side.

Home Screen

You choose what is shown on your Home Screen. Set your own wallpaper, add the widgets or application shortcuts you need, or remove them as you like.



Extended Home Screen

The Home Screen extends beyond the screen width, giving you loads more space to add more stuff. Simply slide your finger to the left or right, or tap the dots on the bottom corners of the screen, to see the extended Home Screen.

Choosing Your Wallpaper

- 6. Tap Home Key to return to the Home Screen.
- 7. Tap Menu Key and select Wallpaper.
- Tap Gallery, Live wallpapers, or Wallpapers and choose the image or animation you want to use as the wallpaper. Some cropping may be needed for Gallery images.
- 9. Tap Save or Set wallpaper.

Adding Things to Your Home Screen

- 1. Tap Home Key to return to the Home Screen.
- 2. Slide left or right to find a part of the Home Screen with free space.
- 3. Tap Menu Key and select Add.
 - You can also tap and hold the blank area of the Home Screen to get the **Add to Home screen** menu.
- 4. Select a category, either shortcuts, widgets, or folders.
- 5. Choose the item you want to add to the Home Screen.

Removing Things from Your Home Screen

- 1. Tap **Home Key** to return to the Home Screen.
- Tap and hold the item you want to delete until the icon appears on the screen.
- Drag the item to and release your finger when the item turns red.

Using the Notification Panel



Flick the status bar downwards from across the top of the screen to open the Notification Panel, where you can see your calendar events, new messages, and current settings – such as call forwarding or call status. From here you can also open new messages, reminders, etc.

TIPS: You can also open the Notification Panel by tapping **Menu Key > Notifications** from the Home Screen.

Re-open Recently-used Applications

- Hold **Home Key** from any screen. The phone will display icons of applications you used recently.
- 2. Tap the application you want to open.

Phone Calls

How to Make Calls

There are many ways to make a call with your phone. And they're all easy to do.

- Calling from the Dialer

 1. Tap Home Key > Ⅲ > Dialer or on the Home
- 2. Enter the phone number with the on-screen keypad. Tap to delete wrong digits.
- 3. Tap 🐔

TIPS: To make international calls, hold to enter the "+".

Calling from Your Contacts

- 1. Tap Home Key > == > Contacts.
- 2. Slide your finger to scroll the contacts list and tap the contact you want to call.

You can search for a contact by tapping Menu Key > Search and entering the contact name.

3. Tap the phone number you wish to call.

Calling from Your Call History

1. Tap Home Key > ## > Call log.

2. Tap next to the number you want to call.

Calling from a Text Message

- 2. Tap the conversation and then the message that contains the phone number you need.
- 3. Tap the number.
- 4. Tap 🐔

Using Speed Dial

Press and hold 1 - 9 key from the dialer to call the corresponding speed dial number.

The number key 1 is reserved to speed dial your voicemail.

Assigning a speed dial key:

- 1. Tap Menu Key > Settings > Call settings > Speed dial from the Home Screen.
- 2. Tap a speed dial key.
- 3. Enter a phone number or tap \triangle to select one from the contact list.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

How to Receive Calls

Answering a Call

Drag oto the right to answer the call.



Rejecting a Call

Drag o to the left to reject the call.

Muting a Call

During a call, you can mute your microphone so that the person you are speaking to cannot hear you, but you can still hear them:

Tap **Mute** to turn your microphone off. The mute icon \P_{\times} will appear on the status bar. To turn your microphone back on, tap **Mute** again.

Putting a Call on Hold

During a call, you can put it on hold by tapping **Menu Key > Hold**. The \bigcap icon will appear on the screen.

TIPS: If you accept an incoming call while you're on another call, the first call automatically goes on hold. Just tap **Menu**

Turning the Speakerphone On/Off

Tap **Speaker** during a call to turn the speakerphone on. This icon will appear in the status bar. Tap **Speaker** again to turn off the speakerphone.

Ending a Call

Tap **to finish a call.**

Adjusting Your Call Settings

From the Home Screen, you can open the call settings menu by going from **Menu Key > Settings > Call settings**.

Voicemail service	Select a voicemail service provider.	
Voicemail settings	Specify a voicemail number.

Call barring settings	Forbid certain types of calls.

Contacts

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google account or other accounts that support contact syncing.

Importing and Exporting Contacts

You can import or export contacts from/to your SIM card or microSD card. This is especially useful when you need to transfer contacts between different devices.

Import Contacts from the SIM Card or Export to the Card

- Tap Menu Key > Import/Export from the Contacts Screen.
- 2. Choose to import or export contacts. Your phone will automatically display the contacts.
- 3. Tap the contacts you want to import or export. Or, just tap **Menu Key > Select all**.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

Import Contacts from the microSD Card or Export to the Card

- 1. Tap **Menu Key > Import/Export** from the Contacts Screen.
- 2. Choose to import or export contacts.
 - For export, the phone will prompt you with the name of the vCard file. Tap OK to create the file in the microSD card
 - For import, you should have vCard files saved in the microSD card. If there's more than one vCard file, you need to select the vCard file and tap OK.

Sharing Contacts Information

- Tap Menu Key > Import/Export > Share visible contacts from the Contacts Screen. Your phone will export all information of the contacts in the Contact Screen to a temporary vCard file.
- Choose how you want to send the vCard file. You can either send it via Bluetooth to another device, or as an attachment in an MMS, an Email or a Gmail message.

Creating a Contact

 Tap or Menu Key > New contact from the Contacts Screen.

- 2. Tap Contact type to choose where to save the contact.
- 3. Enter the contact name and phone numbers, emails, IM accounts, postal addresses, etc.
- 4. Tap **Done** to save the contact.

Adding a Contact to Favorites

- 1. In the Contact Screen, tap and hold the contact you want to add to **Favorites**.
- 2. Tap Add to favorites from the pop-up menu.

TIPS: You can also tap a contact and then tap next to the contact's name to add it to Favorites.

Searching for a Contact

- 1. Tap at the bottom of the Contacts Screen.
- 2. Input the contact name you want to search for.

The contacts matched will be listed.

Creating a New Group

- 3. Tap the **Groups** tab from the Contacts Screen.
- 4. Tap the Add Group icon at the bottom of the screen.
- 5. Enter the group name and tap **OK**.
- 6. Tap the new group and tap to add group members.
- 7. Tick the check boxes next to the contacts you want. Then

tap **OK**.

To send messages to the group members, you can tap present to the group and select message recipients from the listed group members.

Entering Text

When you enter a field that needs text or numbers, a keyboard automatically appears on the screen. Hold the input box and select **Input method** from the pop-up menu to change input method.

Android Keyboard

The Android Keyboard provides a layout similar to a desktop computer keyboard. Turn the phone sideways and the keyboard will change from portrait to landscape.

To use the landscape keyboard, just tick the **Auto-rotate** screen check box in **Settings > Display**. (The landscape QWERTY keyboard is not supported in all applications.)



 Tap the alphabetic keys to enter letters. Tap and hold the keys to enter associated accented letters or numbers. For example, to enter è, tap and hold and the available accented letters and number 3 appear. Then slide to choose è.

- Tap to use uppercase or lowercase. This key also changes to indicate the current case you are using:
 for lowercase, for uppercase, and when locked
- displayed on top of the keyboard. Flick left or right to find the one you need and tap to enter.
- Tap to enter a smiley face; hold the key and swipe to choose more emoticons.
- Tap to change input method or set up Android keyboard.
- Tap I to use Google's networked voice input.

XT9 Text Input

XT9 Text Input can speed up text input by replacing the key tapping motion of input with a tracing gesture where you move your finger from letter to letter without lifting the finger until you reach the end of the word.


XT9 offers three keyboard layouts, Keyboard, Reduced keyboard, and Phone keypad.




Move your finger from letter to letter to trace a word without lifting the finger until you reach the end of the word.





Notes:

The picon is available when more than one language is activated. You can select more input languages by pressing Menu Key > Settings > Language & keyboard > XT9 Text Input > Languages and settings from Home Screen.

Tips for using XT9 Text Input:

- Ignore double letters XT9 Text Input will figure those out for you automatically.
- Lift your finger at the end of the word. A space is added automatically when you begin to trace the next word.

Choosing Touch Input Settings

Choose the touch input settings by tapping Menu Key > Settings > Language & keyboard from Home Screen. In the Keyboard settings section, you can choose the settings for Android keyboard and XT9.

Messaging

Your SMS (text message) and MMS (multimedia messaging service) are combined into one menu in **Home Key > Messaging**.

The Message Box

Instead of an inbox and outbox, your phone organizes all messages you sent and received into one box, where messages exchanged with the same party are grouped into a message thread in the Messaging Screen. You can tap a message thread to see the conversation you have had with someone.

Message threads are sorted in chronological order with the latest one on top.

Sending an Message

- 1. Tap Home Key > ## > Messaging.
- 2. Tap New message.
- Enter the recipient's number or name. As you type, matching contacts will appear. Tap a suggested contact to add as a recipient.
- 4. Tap **Type to compose** and type your message.
 - Tap Menu Key to insert Quick Text, signature, smiley, or contact.

- If you are sending an MMS, tap Menu Key to attach pictures, videos, audio, or slideshows.
- 5. Tap **Send** to send your text.

NOTE: Add an attachment to text message and it will be converted into an MMS automatically. Likewise if you remove all attachments from an MMS, it'll automatically become a text message.

Changing Message Settings

The phone's message settings are pre-configured for you to use immediately. To change them, tap **Menu Key > Settings** from the Messages Screen.

Storage settings:

Delete old messages: Select to delete old messages when your storage limits are reached.

Text message limit: Set the maximum number of text messages allowed in a single thread.

Multimedia message limit: Set the maximum number of multimedia messages allowed in a single thread.

Text message (SMS) settings:

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} \textbf{Manage SIM card messages}: Manage the messages saved in your SIM card. \end{tabular}$

Service Center: Enables you to view and edit the service center number.

Multimedia message (MMS) settings:

Tick the **Auto-retrieve** check box to automatically download MMS messages.

Notification settings:

Notifications: Show message notifications in the status bar. **Select ringtone**: Choose a ringtone for your incoming messages.

 $\begin{picture}{ll} \textbf{Vibrate} : Make your phone vibrate when a new message \\ \end{picture}$

arrives.

Signature settings:

Edit signature: Edit your signature, which can be added

automatically to outgoing messages.

Add signature: Add the signature to all outgoing messages.

NOTE: Tap Menu Key > Restore default settings to change all the message settings back to the original.

Email

Tap **Home Key** > **Email**. You can enter the Email Screen to setup your Email account and exchange Emails.

Creating an Email account

- When you open Email for the first time, enter your Email address and password. Then tap Next.
- 2. Select the type of your account and tap Next.
- 3. Edit the settings for incoming server and outgoing server. Then tap **Next** or **Next [Check]**.

Press **Next [Check]**, and your phone will connect to the Internet and verify the settings before proceeding to the next step. Please contact your mobile service provider and Email service provider for more help.

NOTE: Your phone knows the client settings for lots of Email service providers. If the Email you use is from those providers, the phone will automatically configure the incoming and outgoing settings after you enter your Email address and password.

 Set the Email checking frequency, download options, account name and other settings. Tap **Done** when you finish.

Your phone will show the inbox of the Email account and start to download Email messages.

TIPS: To add more Email accounts, open Email to get the Inbox screen. Then tap Menu Key > More > Accounts > Menu Key > Add account.

Receiving Emails

Press **Menu Key > Refresh** to download recent Emails. You can select **Load more messages** at the bottom of the Email list to download earlier messages.

Composing and sending an Email

After creating an Email account, you can compose and send Email messages.

- 1. Tap **Menu Key > Compose** from the Inbox Screen.
- Tap To field if needed, and enter the recipient's address. When you enter the address, matching contacts on the phone will be displayed. Separate each recipient with a comma.
 - TIPS: You can also tap Menu Key > Add Cc/Bcc to add more recipients.
- 3. Enter the subject and the content of your Email. If necessary, change the email priority.
 - Tap **Menu Key > More > Add attachment** to add files to the Email.
- 4. Tap Send.

Replying to or Forwarding an Email

- Open the Email you want to reply to or forward from Inbox Screen.
- Tap Reply or Menu Key > Forward to reply to/forward the Email.
 - You can also tap **Reply all** to reply to all recipients of the Fmail
- 3. Enter the contents/recipients of your Email.
- 4. Tap Send.

Deleting an Account

- Open the Email application. If there is only one account, tap Menu Key > More > Accounts to get the Accounts list
- 2. Tap and hold the account you want to delete and select Remove account from the pop-up menu.
- Tap **OK** to confirm. All Email messages in the account will be deleted.

Email Settings

Tap the account you want to set from the Accounts Screen and tap Menu Key > More > Account settings. You can get the settings for the Email account. You can also tap Menu Key > More > System setting to set up storage, exchange and other

Getting Connected to the Internet

Your phone's impressive networking capabilities allow you to access the Internet or your corporate network with ease.
You can use default connection settings to connect to the web via your mobile network (GPRS/EDGE/3G), or Wi-Fi.
The GPRS/EDGE/3G connection can be enabled/disabled manually. Just select > Settings > Wireless & networks > Mobile networks from the Home Screen and tick or clear the Data enabled check box.

Adding a New GPRS/EDGE/3G Connection

To get connected via GPRS/EDGE/3G you need a data plan with your service provider. Also if the GPRS/EDGE/3G settings are not pre-configured on your phone, please contact your provider to get the necessary information.

- contact your provider to get the necessary information.
 Tap Home Key > Settings > Wireless & networks > Mobile networks > Access Point Names.
- 2. Tap Menu Key > New APN.
- Tap each item to enter the information you get from your provider.
- 4. Tap Menu Key > Save to complete.

TIPS: To set the APN to default settings, tap Menu Key > Reset to default.

Turning on Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi provides wireless Internet access over distances of up to 300 feet (100 meters).

- Tap Home Key > Settings > Wireless & networks.
- 2. Tick the Wi-Fi box to turn it on.

Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network

1. Tap Home Key > ## > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings.

The Wi-Fi access points, or "hotspots", that your phone has detected are displayed with their names and security settings.

2. Tap an access point to connect to it.

If security features are implemented, you'll need to enter a password.

Checking the Wi-Fi Network Status

You can check the Wi-Fi network by looking at the sicon in the status bar.

Or tap the access point that the phone is currently connected to in **Wi-Fi settings**. You can then check the network status from the pop-up window.

Using the Phone as a Modem

You can access the Internet on your PC via your phone as a modem. Note the function may result in data charges from your mobile phone carrier. Please contact them for detail.

Enabling the Phone as a Modem

- Make sure that USB storage is turned off before enabling the modem function. To turn off USB storage, flick down the notification panel and tap Turn off USB storage > Turn off USB storage.
- The PC accesses the Internet via the phone's mobile network. Therefore, set up the GPRS/EDGE/3G connection correctly before you try to use the phone as a modem.
- When you connect your phone to your PC with the provided USB cable for the first time, a window will pop up and prompt you to install the driver.
- 2. Double click the executable file (.exe) in the window and follow the prompt to finish the driver installation.
 - **NOTES:** If the window doesn't pop up automatically for some reason, please open the new CD-ROM drive on your PC manually and find the executable file to run it.
- 3. Tap on the phone Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Wireless & networks > Tethering & portable hotspot

and tick the **USB tethering** check box. A new network connection will be created on your PC.

 Go to Control Panel > Network on your PC to enable the new network connection.

Now you can launch the Internet browser on your PC and start surfing.

Disabling the Modem Function

Tap Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Wireless & networks > Tethering & portable hotspot and clear the USB tethering check box.

You can also just pull out the USB cable.

Using the Phone as a Wi-Fi Hotspot

You can use the phone as a portable WLAN router, providing Wi-Fi connection for one or multiple PC or other devices. The function need data connection on a mobile network and may result in data charges.

TIPS:

- The PC accesses the Internet via the phone's mobile network. Therefore, set up the GPRS/EDGE/3G connection correctly before you try to use the phone as a Wi-Fi hotspot.
- When the portable Wi-Fi hotspot function is enabled, you cannot access the internet with any application on your phone via its Wi-Fi connection.

Enabling the Wi-Fi Hotspot

- Tap Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Wireless & networks > Tethering & portable hotspot and tick the Portable Wi-Fi hotspot check box.
- 2. Tap Portable Wi-Fi hotspot settings > Configure Wi-Fi hotspot.
- Change the name of the hotspot and its security setting, if necessary.
 - The default hotspot is set as an open one. You can tap **Open** and choose **WPA/WPA2 PSK** to set up a password. The password must have at least 8 characters.
- 4. Tap **Save**. Now you can find the hotspot on other devices and connect to it.

Disabling the Wi-Fi Hotspot

Tap Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Wireless & networks > Tethering & portable hotspot and clear the Portable Wi-Fi hotspot check box.

Browsing the Internet

You can use your phone to get on the Internet via a GPRS, EDGE, 3G, or Wi-Fi connection.

Tap Home Key > ## > Browser.

There are different ways to open web pages:

Tap the address bar to enter the website you want to browse. Then tap $\mathbf{Go}. \\$

Tap beside the address bar or tap **Menu Key > Bookmarks**. Select a bookmark to open.

Tap Bookmarks. Choose an item from the Most visited tab or History tab.

Browsing Options

Press **Menu Key** to access the following options when browsing web pages.

Open a **New window** for web browsing.

Exit the Browser application.

Access Bookmarks, most visited web sites, and browsing history.

Switch browsing Windows.

Refresh the current web page.

Tap More to forward to the next web page, add bookmarks,

search for and select text, share page URL, check page info or download history, or configure browser settings.

Tap a URL link in a web page to open, bookmark, save, share the link, or to copy the link URL.

Using Bookmarks

To bookmark a web page, open it and tap or Menu Key > Bookmarks. Then tap Add or Add bookmark. Give the bookmark a name and tap OK.

TIPS: You can press Menu Key > List view/Thumbnail view to change how you view bookmarks on your phone screen

Editing a Bookmark

- 1. Open a Browser window.
- 2. Tap or Menu Key > Bookmarks.
- 3. Select an item you want to edit and hold on it until the shortcut menu pops up.
- 4. Select Edit bookmark.
- 5. Edit the name or location, and then tap **OK** to save it.

Deleting a Bookmark

- 1. Open a Browser window.
- 2. Tap or Menu Key > Bookmarks.
- 3. Select an item you want to delete and hold on it until the

shortcut menu pops up.

4. Select **Delete bookmark** and tap **OK** to confirm.

Changing Browser Settings

Tap **Menu Key > More > Settings** from a browser window to change browser settings.

Bluetooth[®]

Bluetooth[®] is a short-range wireless communication technology. Phones or other devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information wirelessly within a distance of about 10 meters. The Bluetooth devices must be paired before the communication is performed.

Using Bluetooth

- - When Bluetooth is on, the * icon will appear in the status bar
- 2. Tap Bluetooth settings > Scan for devices. Your phone will show all visible Bluetooth devices in range.
- 3. Tap the device you want to pair with and, if required, enter your PIN and tap **OK**.

If a PIN is required, the same PIN should be entered on the other device. Refer to the document for the other Bluetooth device for information on pairing mode and PIN.

Tick the **Discoverable** check box if the other device tries to pair with your phone.

Making the Most of Multimedia

Taking Pictures with Your Camera

Your phone has a 5-megapixel camera. Open it by tapping **Home Key > Samera**.

Tap to take a shot. To view it, just tap the picture in the right corner of the screen. Or select **Menu Key > Gallery** to view all your pictures.

Adjusting Camera Settings

From the Camera Screen tap on to set up focus mode, exposure, picture size/quality, color effect, ISO, anti-banding, saturation, contrast, sharpness, and camera reset.

Tap <u>to choose whether to save photo's geographic location.</u>

Tap _____ to change white balance.

Tap to turn on or off shutter sound.

Tap 1x to zoom in or out.

TIP: To change quickly from camera to camcorder or vice versa, use the switch icon. Use the bar to adjust the brightness.

Shooting Video with Your Camcorder

Open the camcorder by tapping **Home Key >** \$\overline{\overline{\text{Home Key}}}\$ > \$\overline{\text{Camcorder}}\$. Then select \$\overline{\text{O}}\$ to start shooting, and \$\overline{\text{O}}\$ to

stop. Select the picture in the right corner of the screen to view the video you've just shot. Or tap **Menu Key > Gallery** to see all your video clips.

Adjusting Your Video Settings

From the Camcorder Screen, tap to adjust color effect, video quality, video/audio encoder, video duration, and camcorder reset.

Tap to change white balance setting.

Tap **High/Low/MMS/YouTube/** to change video quality, video/audio encoder, and video duration together.

Playing Your Music

You can play digital audio files from your phone's memory card in ${\bf Music}.$

- 2. Select **Artists/Albums/Songs/Playlists** to find the songs you want to play.
- 3. Tap an item from the list to start playing.
- 4. Adjust the volume with Volume Keys.



Creating Playlists

Playlists help you organize your music files:

- 1. Select a music file you want to add to a new playlist.
- 2. Tap and hold on the file until a shortcut menu pops up.
- 3. Tap Add to playlist.
- 4. Tap New.
- 5. Type the playlist name and tap **Save**.

Managing Playlists

1. From the Music Screen tap Playlists to see them all.

- 2. Hold on the playlist you want to play or edit until a shortcut menu pops up.
- 3. Tap Play, Delete or Rename.

Adding a Song to a Playlist

- Open Music and find the song you need under Artists, Albums, Songs, or Playlists.
- 2. Hold on the song until a shortcut menu pops up.
- 3. Select Add to playlist.
- 4. Select a playlist.

Setting a Song as Ringtone

- 1. Find the music file under **Artists**, **Albums**, **Songs**, or **Playlists**.
- 2. Hold on the song until a shortcut menu pops up.
- 3. Select Use as phone ringtone.

Playing Your Videos

Opening Your Gallery

Gallery helps you view pictures and play videos. You can also do some basic editing of your pictures – such as setting them as wallpaper or contact icons, and sharing with friends.



Making Memorable Memos

Sound Recorder enables you to record your voice memos. You need a microSD card to use it.

1. Tap Home Key > Sound Recorder.

- 2. Tap oto start recording.
- Tap to stop recording.
 Tap to play back the voice recording.
- 5. Tap \mathbf{OK} to save the voice recording, or tap $\mathbf{Discard}$ to delete the recording.

TIPS: You can find your recordings in Home Key > | > Music > Playlists > My recordings.

Using Your Google™ Applications

Signing in to your Google Account lets you synchronize Gmail, Calendar, and Contacts between your phone and the web. And if you don't have an account, you can easily create one.

- Tap a Google application that need a Google account, such as Market.
- 2. Read the instructions and select Next.
- If you've got a Google account, tap Sign in. Enter your user name and password. Then tap Sign in. (Or tap Create if you don't have a Google account.)
- Set the backup and restore option, and tap Next > Finish setup.

Gmail

Gmail is a web-based email service that's configured when you sign in to your Google account. Depending on your synchronization settings, the Gmail on your phone can be automatically synchronized with your Gmail account on the

This is how you create and send a Gmail:

- 1. Open **Gmail** by tapping **Home Key > |||| > Gmail**.
- 2. Press Menu Key > Compose.
- 3. Enter the email address of the person you're contacting in

the 'To' field. If you're sending the email to several people, separate the email addresses with commas. You can add as many recipients as you want.

- 4. Enter the email subject, and then write your email.
- 5. Tap Menu Key > Send.

Using Google Talk

Google Talk is Google's instant messaging program, which enables you to communicate with other people who also use it.

Opening Google Talk
Tap Home Key > | > Talk.

Adding a New Friend

You can only add people who have a Google Account.

- 1. In the Friends list, press Menu Key > Add friend.
- 2. Enter the Google account of the friend you want to add.

Your friend will receive an invitation from Google. Press **Menu Key > More > Invites** to see pending invitation.

Changing Your Online Status

- 1. Tap the Talk status bar above the Friends list.
- Tap to change status and then enter your status message in the text box.

Starting a Chat

- 1. Tap a friend in the Friends list.
- 2. Chat with your friend by entering text in the message box.
- Tap Send

Places

Google Places helps you find all kinds of businesses near vou.

- Tap Home Key > > Settings > Location & security and tick the Use GPS satellites or Use wireless networks check box.
- Tap Home Key > ## > Places. Wait while you are being located. Your location, when found, is shown at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. Select a business category and the information of that

type of business near you will be displayed. You can also use the Find places search box on the top to find the business you need.

NOTES: Tap Add to add new business categories.

4. Tap a result you are interested in and check out the details and reviews about that place. You can also see the place on Google Maps, find out how to get there, or give that business a call.

Latitude

Google's Latitude service is a social tool for sharing your

location information with selected friends.

Tap **Home Key** > **#** > **Latitude** to enable Latitude service. Each time you launch Maps application, your location will be determined using GPS or the phone network, and your Latitude status will be updated. You can tap Menu Key > Latitude in Maps or Home Key > Latitude to see your status as well as that of your selected friends. In Latitude, tap Menu Key to refresh friends status, see them on Maps, add new friends, or change privacy settings.

You can also turn off Latitude service by tapping Sign out of Latitude in Privacy settings of Latitude.

Sorting out Your Phone Settings

Setting Time and Date

- 1. Tap Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Date & time.
- Clear the Automatic check box if you want to set the time and date by yourself.
- 3. Set date, time, time zone, and date/time format.

Changing Display Settings

By tapping **Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Display**, you can adjust the display settings as you like:

- Brightness: Adjust brightness of the screen.
- Auto-rotate screen: Rotate the screen display as you rotate the phone.
- Animation: Choose window animation.
- Screen timeout: Set the delay for the screen to automatically turn off.

Sound Settings

By tapping **Home Key > Menu Key > Settings > Sound**, you can adjust the sound settings, such as setting ringtones and volume, turning on silent mode or vibration, allowing sound feedback for touching keys, making selections and

locking the screen.

- Turn to forbid phone ring: Mute the incoming call ringtone when flip the phone over.
- Phone ringtone / Notification ringtone: Select the default ringtones for incoming calls and notifications.
- Haptic feedback: Vibrate when pressing soft keys or on certain user interface interactions.

To quickly switch to silent mode, press **Volume -** or, if the screen is locked, drag \bigcirc to the left.

Creating Your Screen Unlock Pattern

- 2. Read the instructions and tap Next.
- 3. Watch the example pattern and tap **Next**.

- 4. With a finger, draw your own pattern and tap Continue.
- 5. Draw the pattern again and tap Confirm.
- 6. Press Power Key to lock the screen.

TIPS: Clear the **Use visible pattern** box if you want to hide the pattern as you draw it on the screen.

Unlocking the Screen with Your Pattern

- 1. Press Power Key to wake up the screen.
- 2. Draw the pattern you set to unlock the screen.

If you make a mistake, your phone will ask you to try again.

Cannot recall your screen unlock pattern?

You have up to five attempts to unlock your phone. If you still cannot recall the screen unlock pattern, you can tap **Forgot pattern?** and enter your Google account user name and password to reset the screen unlock pattern.

- 1. Press **Power Key** to wake up the phone.
- 2. Drag the 🕕 icon to the right.
- 3. Enter the PIN or password you set.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

Disabling Screen Unlock Security

If you have created an unlock pattern, PIN or password, you can disable it.

- Draw the screen unlock pattern or enter your PIN/ password you have created.
- 3. Tap None.

Protecting Your SIM with a PIN

Every SIM card comes with a PIN. The initial PIN is provided by your mobile phone carrier. It's best to lock your SIM as soon as you can.

- 2. Tick the Lock SIM card check box.
- 3. Enter the PIN you've been given and tap OK.

Changing Your SIM PIN

You can change the PIN you've been given to one easier for you to remember and <u>har</u>der for others to guess.

Restoring a Locked SIM Card

Put all your confidential passwords in a safe place for future use. If you enter the wrong SIM PIN more times than allowed, your SIM card will be locked and you cannot access the mobile phone network. Contact your operator for a PIN Unlock Key (PUK) to restore the SIM card.

This lets you select applications to access secure certificates and other credentials.

Enabling Secure Credentials

- 2. Tap **Set password** and create a password for the credential storage.
- 3. Tick the Use secure credentials box.

TIPS: You can also install encrypted certificates from your microSD card by tapping **Install from SD card**.
