





battery

Battery Use & Battery Safety

 Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers.

The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers. **Caution:** Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. Improper battery

- use, or use of a damaged battery, may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries.
 If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:
 - Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;
 - If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
 - If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
 - If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.

- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle
- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool, dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.
- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a

hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center before using. Do **not** attempt to dry it with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.

Use care when handling a charged
battery—particularly when placing it inside a
pocket, purse, or other container with metal
objects. Contact with metal objects (such as
jewelry, keys, beaded chains) could complete
an electrical circuit (short circuit), causing the
battery to become very hot, which could



battery installation



battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. It might take several seconds to start charging. When finished, your phone displays a full battery icon .



Tip: Motorola batteries have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

If your battery is completely drained, you cannot use a **USB cable** plugged into a computer to charge your battery. You must use a wall charger or car charger. If your battery has some charge left, you can charge it by using a **USB cable** plugged into a computer. Note that some USB ports charge faster than others.

conserve battery charge

Using certain features can quickly deplete your battery's charge. These features can include downloading music, using the camera, replaying video clips, and using Bluetooth® wireless connections.

You can conserve your battery's charge:

- Reduce the backlight timeout (see page 47).
 When the backlight is off, the display is visible but dim.
- Close unused programs using the task manager (see page 30).
- Extend the interval between automatically sending and receiving e-mail (see page 70).
- If you have more than one e-mail account set up, choose only one account to automatically send and receive messages.

- Turn off Bluetooth power when you are not using it (see page 78).
- Remove your optional WiFi card when you are not using it.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and release the Power/End key (1).

Tip: If your phone does not turn on, take your battery out, put it back in, and try again.

To turn off your phone, press and hold the Power/

press and hold the Power/

End key (1) for three seconds, then release it.

make a call

From the home screen, enter a phone number and press the Send key (②) to make a call.

Note: To voice dial, press and hold the speaker key (). When prompted, say "Call," followed by a number or contact name. See page 88.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press the Send key () to answer.

To "hang up," press the Power/End key (10).

- If you are busy when a call comes in, press
 the right soft key () (Ignore) to send the call
 to voicemail.
- To put a call on hold, press the Send key (②).
 To return to the call, press the Send key (②) again.

 If you are on a call and another call comes in, you can ignore the new call to let it go to voicemail or answer the new call and put the current call on hold by pressing the Send key ().

store a phone number

To store a phone number in Contacts:

- From the home screen, press the right soft key
 (Contacts) to open Contacts.
- 2 Press the left soft key () (New).
- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number and press the left soft key (() (Done) to store the contact.

Tip: While entering the number, you can tell your phone to pause and then dial more digits (for example, for a voicemail password or PIN). Press the right soft key () (Menu) and scroll to Insert Pause to insert a

2-second pause (shows as a p) or scroll to **Insert Wait** to tell your phone to prompt you before dialing the remaining digits (shows as a w).

Tip: If you get a call from someone who isn't in your contacts, you can add them to your contacts from **Call History** by pressing the left soft key (() (Save).

call a stored number

- 2 Use the navigation key $(•\hat{\mathbf{Q}}•)$ to scroll to the number and press the center select key $(•\hat{\mathbf{Q}}•)$.
- **3** Press the Send key () to call the entry.

Tip: If you stored more than one number for a contact, select the contact to see all numbers. To dial a number, scroll to it and press the Send key ((©)).

see your phone number

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the navigation key (♠) to scroll to Settings and press the center select key (♠).
- 3 Scroll to Phone and press the center select key (⁴♠•).
- 4 Scroll to Call Options and press the center select key (♠).
- **5** Scroll to **Phone number** to view your phone number.

insert memory card

You can use a removable miniSD memory card with your phone to store content, such as music, pictures, videos, applications, and files.

Caution: Do not remove your memory card while your phone is using or writing files on it.

To insert a miniSD memory card:

Open the card slot cover by putting your fingernail on the ridge of cover and gently lifting it away from the phone. (The cover remains attached to the phone.)



Insert the memory card into the slot with the metal contacts facing down. Press the card until it clicks into place.



Put the memory slot cover back in place and push to close it. The cover clicks into place.

The memory card icon (
) appears at the top of your phone's display when you have correctly inserted your memory card. (The icon won't

appear if you are using a wired headset or Bluetooth headset although you can still access the content on your memory card.)

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your memory card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Note: Your phone supports miniSD cards up to 4 GB (up to 32 GB as cards are available). To save memory space on your phone, move media files (pictures, videos, music) to a memory card as often as possible.

send a text message

1 From the home screen, use the keypad to enter the phone number of the person you want to send a text message to.

Note: You can send a message to a contact by pressing the right soft key (\frown) (Contacts). Use the navigation key (\frown) to scroll the contact and press the center select key (\frown). Then, scroll to

Send text message and press the center select key (${\bf \hat{\Phi}}$).

- 2 Press the right soft key () (Menu).
- 3 Use the navigation key (••) to scroll to Send Text Message and press the center select key (••).
- 4 Use the keypad to enter your message.
- **5** When finished, press the left soft key (\bigcirc) (Send).

enter text

You can enter text and numbers using the keypad. When you select a field that requires text or numbers, the phone automatically selects the appropriate entry mode.

An indicator at the top right of the display shows the current entry mode.

Press the function key to switch the entry mode.

Flashing cursor shows where you are typing.

Press the function key to switch the entry mode.

Press the function key () in a text



entry screen to select an entry mode:

entry	modes
Abc	Enter the first letter of a sentence in uppercase. This is the default mode.
abc	Enter the letter on a key (such as ${\bf q}$).
Alt	Press the function key () once to enter the upper symbol or number on the next key pressed (such as !), then return to the previous entry mode.
ALT	Press the function key () twice to enter the upper symbols and numbers on the keys until you move to a new field.

Use these text entry keys:

text entry	
delete	Press the back key (←).

enter capital letters	Press the shift key (). Press it once for just the next letter or twice for all letters.

text prediction

As you enter letters, your phone might try to **predict** the word. For instance, when you enter "prog," it might predict "program."

To select a prediction, press down on the navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot)$ to highlight your selection and then press the center select key $(\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot)$. To enter a space after your


characters instead of using the predicted text, press the space bar.

To turn off text prediction:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Settings** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Text Input Settings and press the center select key (*.).
- 4 Uncheck Suggest words when typing, and press the left soft key () (Done).

access multimedia

Press the multimedia key () to access the media player, camera, video camera, and pictures & videos.



Note: Your phone has a system volume control that overrides the media player volume control. For details, see page 27.

browse the Web

You can browse the Web with Internet Explorer® Mobile.

- 1 Press the left soft key (/) (Start).



volume

Your phone has a system, media player, and call volume controls.

system volume (master)

System volume controls the earpiece, headset, or speakerphone volume.

System volume overrides other volume controls. If system volume is at 0%, adjusting media player or call volume won't effect the volume.



Note: If your phone is connected to a Bluetooth® audio device, speakerphone won't work.

To change system volume, press and hold the thumb wheel from either the multimedia home screen or the standard home screen.

media player volume

To change media player volume for videos and music, use the thumb wheel.

Tip: Before you adjust the media player volume, first adjust the system volume. If the system volume is off, you won't have any media player sound.

call volume

To change call volume while on a call, use the thumb wheel. Adjusting the volume on that screen changes only the call volume (not the system volume).

Tip: You can eliminate the ringer volume instantly when an incoming call comes in—just use the thumb wheel to turn the ringer off.

handsfree speaker

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't

concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

To use your phone's handsfree speaker, press the speakerphone key (). For key location, see page 2.

Note: The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a car kit or headset. With a Bluetooth headset press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Handsfree Off. Press the right soft key () (Menu) and scroll to Speakerphone On.

lock & unlock phone

You can manually lock your phone to prevent accidental key presses.

To lock your phone, press the home key (a) and then the space bar. Your left soft key becomes Unlock.

To unlock your phone, press the left soft key () (Unlock). Then, enter your password and press Unlock again. If you have not set a password, press the left soft key () (Unlock) and then .

To keep others from using your phone, change your password:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Settings and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- Scroll to Security and press the center select key (*\hat{\hat{\phi}}*).
- Scroll to Device Lock and press the center select key (*.).
- 5 Select Prompt if device unused for, and select the time you want the phone to be inactive before automatically locking.

- **6** Choose either a simple (4-digit number) or strong password (a mixture of at least 7 uppercase and lowercase letters, numbers, and punctuation).
- 7 Enter and confirm your password.
- 8 Press the left soft key () (Done).

Caution: Make your password something you remember! Without your password, you can reset your phone, but you will lose your personalized settings and all content stored in phone memory. To perform a hard reset, hold down the center select key (••) for 5 seconds while turning the phone on. Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Continue Rebooting and press the center select key (••).

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 52). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **and you do not need to unlock it to answer**.

flight mode

In flight mode, you **turn off your phone's network, Bluetooth, and WiFi (if applicable) services** to safely access your address book, games, camera, and music in areas where cellular network access is prohibited (such as during flights, when allowed, and in hospitals).

- 1 Press and hold the home key () until the Quick List appears.
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Wireless Manager and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to All and press the center select key (••••).
- 4 Press the left soft key () (Done).

Use the same steps to turn Bluetooth and phone mode on. After a pause, Bluetooth changes to 0n, and then Phone changes to 0n.

file manager

You can use the File Manager to sort, view, copy, and move files, such as text, pictures, music, and video files, on your phone or memory card.

To find the File Manager:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to File Manager and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.

task manager

Applications run on your phone until you use the Task Manager to kill them.

To find the Task Manager:

1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).

- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to System Tools and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it
- 3 Scroll to Task Manager and press the center select key (•••).

Tip: Need to kill a running program? In **Task Manager**, select the program and press the right soft key (\frown) (**Menu**), scroll to **Kill** and press the center select key (\spadesuit).

Note: To completely remove a program from your phone, from the home screen, press the left soft key (\bigcirc) (Start), then scroll to and select Settings, and then scroll to Remove Programs. Select the program and press the right soft key (\bigcirc) (Menu) and then select Remove and press the center select key ($\widehat{-}$).

play songs & videos

Your phone has Microsoft® Windows® Media Player Mobile, which can play Windows Media Audio (WMA), Windows Media Video (WMV), MP3, AAC, and WAV files.

1 To start the media player, press the multimedia key (2), use the thumb wheel to scroll to Windows Media, and press the thumb wheel or center select key (**).

- **Tip:** You can also activate the media player by pressing the left soft key ($\boxed{\cdot}$) (**Start**). Scroll to **Windows Media** and press the center select key ($\boxed{\cdot}$).
- 2 To play files stored on your memory card, press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to and select Library, and then scroll to and select Storage Card.
 - To play files stored on your phone, press the right soft key (\frown) (Menu), scroll to and select Library, and then scroll to and select My Device.
- 3 Update your library to ensure that all your music is in your library by pressing the right soft key (å) (Menu), scrolling to Update Library, and pressing the thumb wheel or the center select key (•••) to select it.

- 4 After the update finishes, press the right soft key (\(\bullet\)) (Done).
- 5 Scroll to All Media and press the center select key (••).
- 6 Scroll to your file and press the center select key (♠) to play it.

- 4 Scroll to the media player action you want to assign a button or key press.

- Fress the right soft key (→) (Menu), scroll to Assign, Reset, or None, and press the center select key (•).
- 6 When you are done, press the left soft key (() (OK) and the left soft key () (Done) to complete the set up.

You can copy or download media files from your computer or the Internet onto your phone.

transfer files from your computer



You can transfer files from a computer to your phone with a USB cable connection. You can import songs from your CD collection.

Note: You need Windows Media Player 10 or later on your computer to transfer music. You can use

Windows Media Player 11 to transfer **music, picture,** and video files. You can use Windows Media Player 10 to transfer music files, but will need Microsoft® ActiveSync or Windows® Mobile Device Center to transfer video and picture files. See page "synchronize music & videos" on page 77 for steps.

computer system requirements

To transfer files from a computer to your phone, you need the Windows® XP operating system, Windows Media Player, and an active internet connection.

If you have the Windows XP operating system and an internet connection, you can download Windows Media Player. From your computer's Web browser, go to http://www.microsoft.com.

import songs from an audio CD

 On your computer, launch Windows Media Player.

- 2 Insert an audio CD into your computer's CD ROM drive.
- 3 Click on the "Rip" tab in the Windows Media Player window.
- 4 Highlight the songs you want to import and click on the "Rip Music" icon.

The songs are imported to the Windows Media Player Library.



To sync your computer with your phone using Windows Media Player and a USB cable, see "synchronize" on page 73.

take & send a photo

1 To start the camera, press the multimedia key (♠), use the thumb wheel to scroll to Camera, and press the thumb wheel or center select key (♠). **Tip:** You can also activate the camera by pressing the left soft key (\bigcirc) (Start). Scroll to Camera and press the center select key (\bigcirc).

After a pause, the camera opens in full screen. Press the left soft key () to see the regular viewfinder:



Tip: In either full screen or regular view, press the right soft key () (Menu) to adjust picture settings, such as Mode, Brightness, Resolution, Zoom, White Balance, and Flash or switch to the video camera.

2 Aim the camera lens at the photo subject.

To take a picture, press the center select key (♠). Your phone saves the picture and shows it in the viewfinder.

You can also see your stored pictures in the Pictures & Videos screen by pressing the left soft key () (Start) and selecting Pictures & Videos.





profiles

Each profile uses a different set of sounds, ring styles, earpiece volume settings, or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. For example, the **Outdoor** profile volume is much louder than the **Normal** profile.

You can choose from these profiles:

Silent	Outdoor	

To choose a profile:

- 1 From the home screen, press and hold the home key () to open the Quick List.
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to a profile and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.

Indicators can appear at the top of your home screen for the Silent $(\blacktriangleleft \times)$ and Vibrate $(\stackrel{!}{\cancel{\square}}:)$ profiles. The indicator $\stackrel{!}{\checkmark}$ means the speakerphone is on (see page 27).

Note: The **Automatic** profile is the same as **Normal**, except that it automatically switches to **Vibrate** during any event stored in your Calendar.

Note: Changes made to the alert settings have no effect when using the **Silent** profile.

time & date

Your service provider usually sets the time and date on your phone. However, if you change time zones while your phone is roaming, you might need to change your clock manually. To change it manually:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Settings and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Clock & Alarm and press the center select key (*.).
- Select Date and Time and press the center select key (♠).
- 5 Use the navigation key (•••) to scroll to Time Zone, Date, and Time to edit them.

- **Tip:** Update your time zone when you travel to make sure your phone's calendar events appear at the right time.
- **6** Press the left soft key () (Done) to save the time and date settings.

You can specify the date and time style by changing the regional settings. To find Regional Settings, select Regional Settings from the Settings screen.

backlight

To save battery life, your **backlight** turns off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns back on when you press a key.

To set how long your phone waits before the backlight turns off:

1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).

- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Settings** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Power Management and press the center select key (*.).
- 4 Edit the backlight setting fields and press the left soft key () (Done) to save the settings.

answer options

You can choose to use any key to answer a call.

- From the home screen, press the left soft key
 () (Start).

Your phone keeps a list of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

To see recent calls:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Call History and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*.) to select it.

You can select a call and then:

- To call the number, press the Send key (②).
- To see call details (like time and date), press the center select key (*.).

• To see options, press the right soft key (•) (Menu):

options	
Filter	Filter all calls in the Call History list.
	Filtering calls allows you to group calls

redial

- Press the Send key (() from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to the entry you want to call, then press the Send key ().

If you hear a **busy signal** and see **Call Failed**, **Number Busy**, press the Send key (() or the left soft key () (**Retry**) to redial the number.



When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, shows **Redial Successful**, and connects the call

view missed calls

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls.

To view your missed calls:

- 1 From the home screen, press the left soft key ((►) (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Call History and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Press the right soft key () (Menu).
- 4 Scroll to Filter and press the center select key (♠).
- 5 Scroll to Missed Calls and press the center select key (♠).

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call on your home screen



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture if you have stored a picture in your contacts, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available

Tip: You can set your phone to play a distinctive ringer ID for specific entries in your contacts (see page 89).

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone and keypad are locked.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may

not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- Press the Send key () to call the emergency number.

international calls

If your phone service includes international dialing, press and hold ① to insert your local international access code (indicated by +). Then, press the keypad keys to dial the country code and phone number.

speed dial

You can use speed dialing in two ways: quick access for up to 98 phone numbers and shortcuts to features

found in the Start menu including e-mail, calendar, and Bluetooth Manager.

To access speed dial entries, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for one second. If the speed dial is two digits, press the first digit, then press and hold the second digit. The phone dials or opens the assigned application.

speed dial phone numbers

You can set the speed dial to call the entries in your phone's contact list.

- 1 From the home screen, press the right soft key (\(\bullet \)) (Contacts).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to the desired contact and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•♠•) to select it.
- **3** Select the phone number or e-mail address you want to add to speed dial.

- 4 Press the right soft key () (Menu).
- 5 Scroll to Add to Speed Dial. and press the center select key $(\hat{-})$.

Note: Speed dial 1 is reserved for calling your voicemail.

To **delete** a speed dial entry, press the left soft key (\bigcirc) (Start) and select Speed dial. Scroll to the entry, press the right soft key (\bigcirc) (Menu), and select Delete.

speed dial feature shortcuts

voicemail

Note: Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive.



When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone shows the voicemail message indicator and New Voicemail

To check voicemail messages, press and hold 1.

three-way calling

While connected to a call:



1 Place your current call on hold by pressing the Send key (()).

- 2 Dial the number of the other person you want to connect to a three-way call and press the Send key ().
- After you are connected to the other call, press the Send key () to combine the calls.

3 Scroll to Text Messages, MMS, or (e-mail account) and press the center select key (*•).

To send a message:

- Open text messaging, MMS, or your e-mail account, and press the right soft key () (Menu).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **New** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (••) to select it.
- 3 For e-mail, in To, Cc, and/or Bcc, enter e-mail addresses. For text messages, enter the contact telephone number or e-mail address. Insert a semicolon (;) between multiple numbers or addresses.

Tip: You can quickly enter phone numbers or e-mail addresses from your contacts. In **To**, press the center select key (••) to see your contact list.

- 4 Use the keypad to compose a message.
- **5** Press the left soft key () (Send).

Tip: You can insert a picture, voice note or file in an e-mail or MMS message. When you are in a message, press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Insert, select Picture, Voice Note, or File.

To set the priority for an e-mail message, press the right soft key (\frown) (Menu) and scroll to Message Options. Use the navigation key (\frown) to set the priority, and then press the left soft key (\frown) (Done).

To cancel a message, press the right soft key () (Menu) and scroll to Cancel Message.

global address lookup



From your phone, you can search the global address list (GAL) stored on your company's Exchange Server.

This means that you can find a contact's phone number or e-mail without having to store the information directly to your phone.

Note: GAL information can only be viewed during a data transfer session; the entire GAL cannot be stored for viewing offline.

To search for a contact:

- 1 Press the right soft key (\(\bullet\)) (Contacts).
- 3 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Company Directory and press the thumb wheel or center select key (**) to select it.
- 4 Enter a name and press Search.

5 Scroll through the list of entries that appears. When you locate your contact, press the Send key ((a)) to make a call.

Note: Although the entire GAL cannot be stored on your phone, after you find the contact, you can add the single contact to your contact list.

Tip: To send a message, SMS, or e-mail to a contact found using GAL, open the company directory, scroll to the contact name, and press the center select key (�). The e-mail information is populated into the **To:** field.

messaging shortcuts

You can use these shortcuts when you have an inbox or a message open:

messaging reference

Note: Some features might not work if you set up your e-mail account manually (without the e-mail setup wizard). Also, some menu items might not be available depending on your e-mail configuration and e-mail server.

send a text message



- Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*.**) to select it.
- Scroll to **Text Messages** and press the center select key $(\hat{\bullet})$.
- Press the right soft key (å) (Menu), scroll to New, and press the center select key (••).
- **5** Enter a recipient and enter your message.

6 When you are finished, press the left soft key (→) (Send).

get text message delivery report

While composing a text message:

- 1 Press the right soft key (\(\bar{\cdot}\) (Menu).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Message Options and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•♠•) to select it.
- 3 Check Request message delivery notification and press the left soft key (()) (Done).

create & send e-mail

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it

- Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (★♠).
- 4 Press the right soft key (\frown) (Menu), scroll to New and press the center select key (\bullet).

Note: To set up your e-mail account, see page 56.

To add a picture, voice note, or file to an e-mail message, open the message area and press the right soft key (••) (Menu), scroll to Insert, and then select to Picture, Voice Note, or File to choose a file.

Tip: You can save a draft of a message that you are composing to finish and send later. Press the right soft key (\subseteq \cdot) (Menu) and select Save to Drafts. A draft of the message is stored in the Drafts folder of the account you are in.

create and add an e-mail signature

1 Press the left soft key (•) (Start).

- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (♠).
- 4 Press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Tools and press the center select key (••).
- Scroll to Options and press the center select key (<0.).</p>
- 6 Scroll to Signatures and press the center select key ('♠).
- 7 Scroll to the account for which you are creating the signature and check Use signature with this account.
- 8 Scroll the **Signature** box, enter your signature, and press the left soft key $(\boxed{\cdot})$ (Done).

Tip: To insert a signature in every message you send, select **Include when replying and forwarding**.

Otherwise, a signature is inserted only in new messages.

read new messages

To quickly view new messages, scroll to the message notification area on the home screen and press the center select key (•••).

view attachment



While viewing a message, use the center select key (••) to select the attachment.

Note: You can view attachments only for file types that are supported by the phone.

read old messages



- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.

3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (♣).

Icons next to each message show if it is read, unread, urgent, or has an attachment (read or unread).

4 Scroll to a message and press the center select key (•••) to open it.

reply, reply all, or forward messages



- 1 From your inbox or an open message, press the right soft key (\(\sigma^*\)) (Menu).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Reply and press the thumb wheel or center select key (·♠·) to select it.
- 3 Select Reply, Reply All, or Forward and press the center select key (*\hat{\Phi}*).

Compose your message and the left soft key ((►) (Send).

Tip: If you are replying to an e-mail message, you will send less data if you do not edit the original message. This may reduce data transfer costs based on your rate plan.

download message objects



If an e-mail message includes an attachment, the name of the attachment is highlighted when you open the message. To download the attachment, press the center select key (••) to select the highlighted attachment name. Your phone tries to connect and download the attachment immediately. If your phone cannot connect or download the attachment, it tries again the next time you synchronize or connect to your e-mail server.

Note: If there are multiple attachments in the message, all attachments are downloaded.

insert a media object in an e-mail

To add a picture, voice note, or file in an e-mail message:

- 1 In the composing message area of the message, press the right soft key $(\overline{ } \cdot)$ (Menu).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Insert and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- Scroll to Picture, Voice Note, or File and press the center select key (*.).
- **4** Scroll to **Picture** or **File** and press the center select key (**·••**), or follow the on-screen prompts to record a voice note.

download complete e-mail messages



- 1 Press the left soft key (/) (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 4 Scroll to the message and press the right soft key (\(\bullet\)) (Menu).
- 5 Scroll to Download Message and press the center select key (*...............................).

Your phone tries to connect and download the message immediately. If it cannot connect or download the message, it retrieves the complete message the next time you synchronize or connect to your e-mail server.

mark a folder for synchronization



When you synchronize your e-mail account with your computer, the same inbox folders that are in Outlook on your computer are created on your phone.

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (••).
- Press the right soft key (å) (Menu), scroll to Folders and press the center select key (••).
- Fress the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Manage Folders and press the center select key ().
- 6 Highlight each folder you want to synchronize and press the right soft key (\(\subseteq\)) (Sync).

Note: Be sure to mark your e-mail sent folder for synchronization, or you won't be able to view sent message status.

view status of sent e-mail

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (*\hat{\hat{\phi}}\).
- 4 Press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Folders and press the center select key (•).

Messages in the outbox have not been sent. To send a message, scroll to it and press the right soft key (•) (Menu) and select Send/Receive.

receive e-mail

Scroll to the message and press the center select key $(\hat{-})$ to read it.

delete e-mail

From the inbox, press the left soft key () (Delete).

From an open message, press the right soft key (\frown) (**Menu**), scroll to **Delete**, and press the center select key (\bullet).

extend interval for automatically sending & receiving e-mail



- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- **3** Scroll to your e-mail account to highlight it, press the right soft key (\frown) (Menu), scroll to Settings, and press the center select key (- $\hat{•}$).
- 4 Press the right soft key () (Next) until you see the option for Automatic Send/Receive.
- 5 Scroll to the setting under Automatic Send/Receive and press right on the navigation key (*Q*) to select a larger interval.
- Press the right soft key () (Next) and then press the right soft key () (Finish) to save your changes.

manually send & receive e-mail



- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (•).

call a phone number in e-mail



Highlight a phone number in a message and press the Send key (().

move e-mail to personal folder

1 After you've read the message, press the right soft key (•) (Menu).

- 3 Scroll to the folder you want to move the message to and press the center select key (•).

delete an e-mail account

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the right soft key () (Menu).
- 4 Scroll to **Delete** and press the center select key (•••).

empty deleted items folder

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Messaging and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to your e-mail account and press the center select key (♠).
- 4 Press the right soft key (å) (Menu), scroll to Folders, and press the center select key (•••).
- 5 Scroll to **Deleted Items** and press the center select key (•••).
- 6 Press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Tools and press the center select key ().
- 7 Scroll to Empty Deleted Items and press the center select key (••).

connections

synchronize

To synchronize files between your phone and computer, you can use Microsoft® Windows Mobile Device Center or Microsoft ActiveSync®.

set up Mobile® Device Center on Windows Vista™

Microsoft Windows Mobile Device Center is the replacement for Microsoft ActiveSync on Windows Vista.

Note: Some versions of Windows Vista come with Windows Mobile Device Center already installed. If Windows Mobile Device Center is not available on your Windows Vista, you can install it from the Getting Started Disc that came with your phone.

To set up synchronization in Windows Mobile Device Center:

- Connect your phone to your computer. Windows Mobile Device Center configures itself and then opens.
- 2 On the license agreement screen, click "Accept."
- 3 On the Windows Mobile Device Center's Home screen, click "Set up your device."

Note: Choose "Connect without setting up your device" if you only want to transfer media files, check for updates, and explore your phone but not sync Outlook information.

Select the items that you want to synchronize then click "Next." **5** Enter a device name for your phone and click "Set Up."

When you finish the wizard, Windows Mobile Device Center synchronizes your phone automatically. Outlook e-mail messages and other information appear on your phone after synchronization.

set up ActiveSync® on Windows XP

The Getting Started Disc that comes with your phone contains Microsoft ActiveSync 4.5 or later.

Note: You can also download ActiveSync 4.5 or later from the Web: http://www.microsoft.com/ windowsmobile/activesync/activesync45.mspx. This Web site also lists the system requirements.

To install ActiveSync:

 Insert the Getting Started Disc into the disc drive on your computer.

- 2 Click "Setup and Installation."
- 3 Select the ActiveSync and click "Install."
- 4 Read the license terms and click "Accept."
- 5 When installation is complete, click "Done."
- **6** On the Getting Started with Windows Mobile screen, click "Close."

To set up synchronization in ActiveSync:

- Connect your phone to your computer. The Synchronization Setup Wizard automatically starts and guides you to create a synchronization relationship. Click "Next" to proceed.
- 2 To synchronize your phone with your computer, clear the Synchronize directly with a server running Microsoft Exchange Server check box then click "Next."
- 3 Select the items that you want to synchronize and then click "Next."

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- 4 Select or clear the Allow wireless data connections check box according to your preference.
- 5 Click "Finish."

When you finish the wizard, ActiveSync synchronizes your phone automatically. Notice that Outlook e-mail messages and other information appear on your phone after synchronization.

change which files to synchronize

You can change which files or types of information you want to synchronize.

- Before changing synchronization settings on your phone, disconnect your phone from your computer.
- On your phone, press the left soft key () (Start), use the thumb wheel to scroll to ActiveSync, and press the thumb wheel or the center select key (*•) to select it.

- 3 Press the right soft key () (Menu), scroll to Options and press the center select key ().
- 4 Select or clear the items you want to synchronize or not synchronize. If you cannot select a check box, you might have to clear the check box for the same information type elsewhere in the list.

Note: A computer can have partnerships with many different devices, but a device can have sync partnerships with two computers at the most. To ensure that your phone synchronizes properly, set up the second computer using the same synchronization settings as the first computer.

troubleshoot sync connections

Sometimes when a computer is connected to the Internet or a local network, the computer may disconnect the ActiveSync connection with your phone in favor of the Internet or network connection.

- 1 On your phone, press the left soft key () (Start), use the thumb wheel to scroll to Settings, and press the thumb wheel or the center select key (••) to select it.
- 2 Scroll to Connections and press the center select key (*••).
- 4 Clear the Enable advanced network functionality check box (to force ActiveSync to use a serial USB connection with your phone).

synchronize via Bluetooth

After you install Microsoft ActiveSync or Windows Mobile Device Center on your computer, you can connect it to your phone and sync with a Bluetooth connection.

Note: To use this feature, your computer must be equipped with Bluetooth wireless or a Bluetooth PC adaptor accessory.

- 1 Follow the instructions in ActiveSync Help for configuring Bluetooth connections on your computer to support ActiveSync.
- 2 Turn on the phone and verify that Bluetooth wireless is turned on (see page 78).
- 3 Press the left soft key (() (Start), use the thumb wheel to scroll to ActiveSync, and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•) to select it.
- 4 Select the right soft key (→) (Menu), scroll to Connect via Bluetooth, and press the center select key (• •).

Ensure that the phone and computer are near each other. If this is the first time you have connected to this computer using Bluetooth wireless, you must complete the

Bluetooth wizard on the phone and set up a Bluetooth partnership with the computer before synchronizing.

- 5 Select the left soft key () (Sync).
- 6 When finished, select the right soft key (å) (Menu), scroll to Disconnect Bluetooth, and press the center select key (••).

Note: To conserve battery power on your phone, turn off Bluetooth power (see page 78).

synchronize music & videos

If you want to carry your music or other digital media along with you while you travel, set up Microsoft Windows Media Player on your computer to synchronize music and video with your phone.

Select the Media information type in ActiveSync to synchronize. Set all media synchronization settings in Windows Media Player.

Before media can be synchronized, you must:

- Install Windows Media Player 11 on the computer. (Windows Media Player 11 works only in Windows XP or later versions).
- Connect your phone to the computer with a USB cable.
- Set up a sync partnership between the phone and your computer's Windows Media Player.
- On your computer, launch Windows Media Player.
- On your computer, drag the desired file(s) from the Library to the Sync list in the Windows Media Player window.
- **3** Connect the USB cable to your phone and to an available USB port on your computer.
 - If this is the first time you have connected the phone to a computer with a USB cable, additional software drivers may be required and installed.

- (For more details about using a USB cable connection, see page 85.)
- 4 Resync your phone and computer (see page 73).
- **5** Disconnect the cable from the phone and the computer.

Note: Use Windows Media Player 11 to properly transfer digitally protected music files from your computer to your phone. If you do not use Windows Media Player 11 to synchronize the files, you will not be able to play them on your phone.

Bluetooth® wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless *pairing* (also called *linking* or *bonding*). You can pair your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or pair your phone with a computer to exchange and synchronize files.

Note: Your phone's Bluetooth features and Bluetooth Class 1 power levels are not allowed for outdoor operation in France. To avoid unlawful interference with radio signals, do not use the Bluetooth features in France unless you are indoors.

turn Bluetooth power on or off

If Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically pair with the handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone.

To turn Bluetooth on:

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Bluetooth and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Bluetooth Manager and press the center select key (*.).
- Scroll to Settings and press the center select key (♠).

Toggle Status to Bluetooth ON and press the left soft key () (Done).

The Bluetooth indicator **3** appears in the home screen.

Note: To extend battery life, set Bluetooth **Power** to **OFF** when not in use. Your phone will not pair with devices until you set Bluetooth **Power** back to **ON** and pair your phone with the devices again.

pair with a headset or handsfree device

Before you try to pair your phone with a device, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **on** and the device is **on** and **ready** in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the device user's guide). You can pair your phone with multiple devices, but only use it with one headset device at a time.

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

1 Press the left soft key () (Start).

- 3 Scroll to Bluetoth Manager and press the center select key (♠).
- 4 Select the device type (handsfree headset, stereo headset, keyboard, etc.) and press the center select key (•♠•).
- **5** Put the device in pairing mode.
- 6 Press the left soft key () (Add). The phone prompts you to verify your device is ready.
- 7 Press the left soft key () (Search).
- 8 Select the device from the list.
- 9 If prompted, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and press the left soft key ((Accept)).

When the devices are paired, an icon appears on the home screen.

Tip: For specific information about the Bluetooth device you are using with your phone, refer to the instructions that came with it.

send objects to another device

You can use Bluetooth pairing to send e-mail, contacts, tasks, calendar items, audio, ring tones, pictures, video, and voice notes from your phone to a computer or other device.

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Bluetoth** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to BT Send Object and press the center select key (♠).
- 4 Press left or right on the navigation key (•Q•) to select the object type and then scroll down to select the object you want to send.

- 5 To select an item, press the center select key (-♠).
- 6 Press the left soft key () (Send).
- 7 Select the name of the device to send the file and press the center select key (*\hat{\hat{\phi}}\).

Tip: To cancel sending an item, press the right soft key $(\underbrace{{}^{\bullet}})$ (Menu) and scroll to Cancel.

use your phone as a computer remote

You can use Bluetooth wireless and your phone as a remote control for your computer. For example, want to watch a video on your computer and use your phone as a remote control? Use PC Remote to control when the video plays, stops, or pauses.

- 1 On your computer, turn Bluetooth power on.
- 2 On your phone, press the left soft key ((Start).

- 3 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Bluetooth and press the thumb wheel or center select key (⋅•) to select it.
- 4 Scroll to BT PC Remote and press the center select key (*•). If necessary, press Yes to turn on Bluetooth power.
- **5** Press the left soft key ((/) (Add).
- 6 On your computer, right-click the Bluetooth indicator
 in the system tray in the lower right corner of your display and select Bluetooth Setup Wizard.

Note: Your computer might be a little different.

- 7 In the wizard, indicate that you know the service you want to use, and you want to find a Bluetooth device that provides the service. Click "Next."
- 8 In the next window, choose Human Interface Device and click "Next."

- 9 In the next window, make sure that "Show all devices" selected. Your computer should find your "SmartPhone." Select your phone, and click "Next."
- **10** If prompted, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and click "Accept."

When PC Remote is connected, your phone display shows a key map that tells you what your keys control on the computer. To determine which program on your computer to control, on your phone, press the right soft key (•) (Menu) and select a program.

advanced Bluetooth features make phone visible to other devices



Allow a Bluetooth device to discover your phone:

1 Press the left soft key (•) (Start).

- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Bluetouth** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Bluetooth Manager and press the center select key (*.).
- Select Settings and press the center select key (*.).
- 5 Check Allow other Bluetooth devices to see this phone and press the left soft key () (Done).

connect to recognized device

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Bluetouth** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Bluetooth Manager and press the center select key (*.).

- **5** Put the device in pairing mode.
- 6 Select the device name and press the center select key (♣).

drop pairing with device



- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Bluetoth** and press the thumb wheel or center select key (•••) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to **Bluetooth Manager** and press the center select key (•••).
- Select the device type (handsfree headset, stereo headset, keyboard, etc.) and press the center select key (-♠•).

5 Select the device name and press the left soft key () (Disconnect).

edit device properties & change device name



Edit the properties of a recognized device:

- 1 Press the left soft key () (Start).
- Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Bluetooth and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*.*) to select it.
- 3 Scroll to Bluetooth Manager and press the center select key (*•).
- Select the device type (handsfree headset, stereo headset, keyboard, etc.) and press the center select key (*•).
- 5 Select the device name and press the right soft key () (Menu).

- 6 Scroll to Properties and press the center select key (-♠-).
- 7 Scroll to Nickname and press the center select key (••).

Tip: To change the Bluetooth name of your phone, from the Bluetooth Manager screen, scroll to and select **Settings**, enter the name in **My Bluetooth name**, and press the right soft key (•) (**Done**).

cable connections



If you cannot sync your phone over the air, you can use a USB cable connection. First, install Microsoft ActiveSync or Windows Mobile Device Center on your computer.



Connect your phone to your computer using a USB cable.

Note: For more detailed information, see "Connecting a mobile device to a PC" in ActiveSync Help on your computer, the Microsoft Web Site for ActiveSync or the **MOTO** Q 9c Support Web site at www.motorola.com/support/q9c.

modem link

With BroadbandAccess Connect, you can use your phone as a modem for your computer when you connect using a USB cable. Visit http://b2b.vzw.com/productsservices/wirelessinternet/ broadbandaccessconnect.html for details.

You can use your phone as a modem to dial in to a network. You can do this using Bluetooth or using a USB cable. When your phone is a modem, e-mail, web browsing, ActiveSync, and text messaging services are suspended until the modem link is deactivated. Any data calls interrupt the modem link.

Note: Your phone has Multiple Network Access Identifier (MNAI) software. The MNAI service must be enabled in your account for dial up networking functionality to work on your phone. Call your phone service provider for more information regarding account services.

using Bluetooth

To use Bluetooth to link to a network:

Note: You must have a computer that has Bluetooth capabilities for modem link.

- 1 On your phone, make sure Bluetooth is turned on.
- 2 On your computer, launch the Bluetooth devices applet from the task bar.

Note: Not all computers have the same procedure to locate the Bluetooth window and set up dial-up networking.

- 3 On your computer, in the Bluetooth window menu bar, select the "Connections" menu, "Dial-up Networking" and then "Find devices."
- 4 The computer finds your phone and displays the dial up networking window.

using a cable

To use a USB cable with your phone to connect with modem link to a network, first install networking drivers onto your computer:

- Place the provided Companion CD into the CD Drive on your computer. The Companion CD Installation wizard window automatically displays.
- On your computer, click "Applications" and then "Dial-Up Networking Software."
- Follow the prompts as directed to install the drivers onto your computer.

Next, enable modem link on your phone and install phone drivers:

- On your phone, press the left soft key () (Start).
- 2 Use the thumb wheel to scroll to Accessories and press the thumb wheel or center select key (*•) to select it.

- 3 Scroll to Modem Link and press the center select key (⁴♠•).
- 4 Press the right soft key () (Activate).
- **5** Using the USB data cable, connect the phone to your PC.
- **6** When a window displays prompting for the device driver, select "Install the software automatically" and press "Next."

The driver is installed on your computer and ready for setting up a network connection.

Note: If you do not have the Companion CD, or want the latest version of the device and computer drivers, go to http://www.motorola.com/support/Q9c and the User Support Dial-up Networking section.

To establish a new network connection, on your computer:





This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.30 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.30 W/kg. The SAR value for this product in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.51 W/kg. 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Hearing Aid Compatibility with Mobile Phones

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile phones. If you are concerned, you may want to limit your own or your children's RF

exposure by limiting the length of calls or by using handsfree devices to keep mobile phones away from your head and body.
