



TIPS FOR TEACHING SYLLABLES

WHY TEACH SYLLABLES?

Knowledge of syllable types and syllable division rules is an essential skill for reading accurately and fluently. It provides a strategy for breaking words into manageable parts and correcity decoding those parts. When readers can recognize syllable types, they have a way to determine if a vowel has a lona, short, diphthona, or r-controlled or consonant-le sound. They can also draw on this knowledge to find correct spellings.

Before introducing syllable types, students should be familiar with consonants and vowels and have a solid knowledge of long and short vowel sounds.

TIPS FOR TEACHING SYLLABLES

During reading of this story, stop to discuss each page and provide examples additional words with this syllable type.

Have students complete the practice exercises. They can also create their own pictures and words in a notebook to help reinforce the concept
