

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



The interest in and number of classic models on the road certainly casts doubts on old bikes being leaky, unreliable partdropping things from the dark ages. Properly sorted and well maintained, they add a new slant to the joys, fun and rewards that the classic Harley is also associated with. Advances in technology and the wealth of knowledge accumulated over the intervening decades mean that the weak points can be addressed quite easily and these bikes can be made as reliable and oil tight as newer models, giving you a bike for high days and Sundays or more - there are a number of rallies out there aimed solely at the vintage scene across Europe.

The Sporty is currently one of the cheapest ways into the whole classic ownership scene but, with the cult of the hipster/retro crowd growing faster than their beards, cheap classics are rapidly being snapped up. To assist those that endeavour to enter the classic scene, H.O.G.® has identified a prime resource of technical knowledge for the older models. H.O.G. and the H-D Riders Club of Great Britain, have collaborated to set up a contact point that can offer advice on sourcing spares and provide technical information. Whilst there are no guarantees that all your miles will be trouble free, with this resource you can rest assured that you've got good advice with those with Harley-Davidson® experience assisting you.

When a friend of mine went off to buy a Harley and came back with a Buell, his wife later confessed: "I just felt deflated. Then he got the Heritage, which was nice but when

he got the Shovel Chop - that's what I had in mind when he first said about getting one. I love the Shovel. I think he loves it more than me, the amount of time he spends out in the garage polishing and tinkering. It always makes him smile."



THE SKY'S THE LIMIT

Since 2012, a close bond of friendship has existed between the Hanover Chapter and the Kinder- & Jugendhaus, a residential care facility for children and young people here in Hanover. This facility is currently home to seven young people aged between 12 and 20, who live as though in a family and grow up under professional care.

We were quickly able to persuade the care facility management team and the young people under their care that riding a Harley® can be a whole load of fun. We equipped the young people with the safety clothing needed to ride a motorbike, and now every year we go on two or three one-day trips to

interesting destinations and always have enthusiastic passengers riding pillion with us. By way of a thank you, when we get them back home to the Kinderhaus, we are regaled with coffee and cake - baked by the residents themselves, of course.

For our ride in May this year, we had prepared a very special attraction: a member of our chapter has a private pilot's licence, is a member of a flying club and also owns shares in a small aircraft. The idea was to ride the 100km to the airfield where the plane would be waiting to take the children on a series of round-trip flights. One of the young people didn't really fancy a ride on a motorbike, so regularly gets a lift on

these excursions in another member's original Willys Jeep, built back in 1942.

After the two-hour ride to the airfield, the pilot gave us all a detailed briefing and introduced his aircraft and its functions. Of course, there were a lot of questions, all of which had to be answered. Then the flying got started. Three round-trip flights, each with three passengers over the foothills and the mountain peaks of the Harz, all in very good flying conditions. A bit of turbulence in places, perhaps, but that's all part of the fun! The beautiful landscape, mountains, reservoirs and the luminous yellow rapeseed fields all captured the imaginations of the passengers and kept them fascinated.

When we returned to the Kinderhaus to drop the children off, some of them were lost for words. The shared experience was simply so very powerful. IN SEARCH OF NESSIE

We were on the ferry from Belgium to the UK after a journey from Schaafheim at the foot of the Odenwald forest near Aschaffenburg, via Frankfurt, Cologne, Aachen and then right across Belgium. 550km with a fully laden bike, I was really tired and now I was stuck with this snoring champion.

The next morning we teamed up with our number three, 'Hansi', and

made our way straight to the Super Rally in Lincoln.

As always, the Super Rally was a great event, attended by all our friends; but we were here on a different mission! Two days later, Lagos, Hansi and I took leave of our friends and drove up the east coast until we reached the city of Edinburgh. It was a weird sensation at first to drive into the three-lane roundabout and keep to the left. However, it didn't take long to acclimatise. special place in the biker calendar: the biggest, the loudest, the most spectacular event, the season finale that opens its arms to all kinds of riders from all over the world and crushes them in a sweaty bear hug. It's a huge, high-spirited celebration of all things Harley-Davidson. And with a record 125,000 visitors, and all rooms within a 20-mile radius booked up in advance, this year's event was no exception...

Walking into the Harley-Davidson Village, the difficulty was knowing what to see first. H-D® Expo drew the crowds with a





gleaming display of new models including the updated Sportster® Iron 883™ and Forty-Eight®. Just across the H-D Plaza, official event


merchandise was on sale, and visitors could also pick up a free wristband for the chance to win a new Iron 883; the lucky winner, Konrad Wieselhuber from Germany, claimed his prize on the main stage as the event drew to a close on Saturday evening.

The maze of dealer and trader stalls offered enough branded gear for shoppers to dress themselves, their bikes, their children and their homes from top to toe >

in Harley-Davidson®; while those Austrian staples, beer and sausages, were in plentiful supply at the various food and drink stalls.

Just beyond the Village, the Demo area had the latest H-D® models available for test rides; while for those craving a taste of a different kind of adventure, the Jeep® Experience offered the chance to discover the capabilities of Jeep vehicles with a test drive or a gravity-defying crawl up and down a steep ramp.

As evening fell, the strains of new and classic rock rose over the constant rumble of engines, with bands including The Rainband, Graveltones and the unique sound of Celtica Pipes Rocks delighting the crowd at the main stage. More live music at the Hot Spot Bar got people up and dancing, with a fire-eating display also drawing admiring spectators. Meanwhile at the Team 412 Bar, revellers rocked out to covers of the likes of AC/DC and Guns N' Roses – and for something a little different, last year's surprise hit Prof. Washboard made a popular reappearance.

The international nature of the event was clear for all to see at the Custom Bike Show, with prizewinners hailing from



Germany, Austria, Slovenia, Italy, Poland, Greece, Switzerland, the Czech Republic, Denmark and the UAE. With almost 80 entries, the standard was once again incredibly high, particularly in the Custom and Radical categories, where the creativity and craftsmanship on show left the judges with a difficult task.

All afternoon, visitors had been admiring the bikes on display, but there were a few of the eventual winners that really caused jaws to drop. In the Antique category, Ole Callesen from Denmark was asked so many times about the model year of his immaculate entry that in the end he stuck a label on the bike simply saying '1919'. Dreamachine Motorcycles' minimalist creation 'Full Moon', winner in the Radical category, had to be seen to be believed; while the People's Choice award went to 'The Recidivist' from Poland's Game Over Cycles. Billed as 'The World's First Tattooed Motorcycle', the bike is based on a Softail® but has been drastically modified. Two Polish tattoo artists spent 250 hours inking the Recidivist's light-coloured leather for a truly stunning effect.

Best in Show, meanwhile, was won by Omar al-Tamimi, who had brought his hand-built big-wheel bobber all the way from Dubai.

On Saturday, in blazing sunshine, cheering crowds and outlandish costumes were out in force as a glittering convoy of bikes – 15,000 of them, stretching as far as the eye could see – took part in the spectacular parade.

See you next year for the 19th edition – September 6-11, 2016. ■







> A shuttle bus will run from the rally site for those who are staying a little further out.


> > As well as food and show and various activities on the rally site, there will be ride-outs to Laukvik and boat trips to the magnificent Trollfjord, where you can often



Review Thunder in the Glens' reputation as the 'Sturgis of the North' is spreading beyond the shores of the UK. This year had a truly international flavour as large contingents from Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Switzerland and further afield poured into the Macdonald Resort in Aviemore, Scotland.

TITG is the UK's biggest H.O.G.® rally with over 3,000 H.O.G. members registering. Organised by Dunedin Chapter, it's the perfect blend of entertainment and fantastic scenic rides.

The rally runs over three days, opening on the Friday before closing out on Sunday night with a top band. In between there's a plethora of activities to occupy your time both on and off the Macdonald resort with its health spas, varied restaurants and shops stocking classic Highland goods. Down in Aviemore itself the rally is welcomed and embraced by the business community and the local populace, with many of the shops going to the trouble of creating Harley® themed window displays, and restaurants and bars flying 'bikers welcome' banners.

Every bar and restaurant put on live entertainment, especially the Cairngorm Hotel with its traditional Hog Heaven area featuring a great mixture of traditional Scottish folk and rock music. Further up the main street is The Winking Owl, which also puts on live music. This year it was fully integrated into the TITG experience by hosting the Harley-Davidson® demo ride team.

Getting the party started

Friday night kicked off in the Osprey Arena with a heavy rock set from all female power trio The Amorettes, their intense stage presence and nifty guitar playing going down a storm. Upstairs, the Peregrine Suite hosted pop covers band Nae Danger, while elsewhere in the resort jam sessions and a comedy piano set by Matt Black added to the musical menu. Rounding off the night, and back by popular demand, were the 'Ballroom Gitz' with their 70s glam rock hits and camp spandex fun.

Grand Parade

Saturday is always the key day at TITG, the main feature of which is the Grand Parade Ride. The convoy departed Aviemore at noon in drizzly rain, although the sun soon appeared as the parade wound its way through the purple heather-clad hills to the waters of Lochindorb and its ruined fort. As evening drew in the outside stage was owned by TITG favourites Clanadonia, a traditional Scottish drumming band with pipes that deliver a visceral experience and drums that resonate deep within one's chest. An elaborate firework display

followed their performance before the audience flooded into the Osprey Arena to be treated to fantastic classic rock courtesy of Scottish band Strange Brew.

In the auditorium Keep It Cash delivered a faithful set of Johnny Cash songs to much acclaim, while upstairs in the Peregrine Suite a brilliant Ultimate Motown show went down a treat.

Saturday night was capped off by The Springsteen Sessions who are described as Europe's most authentic Bruce Springsteen tribute band. A better rendition of the 'E Street Band' you'd be hard pressed to find and the musicianship was second to none.

End in style

After Saturday night's partying Sunday morning was a chilled out affair, before the main Rocky Mountain High ride-out up Cairngorm Mountain departed at noon in dry sunny weather.

The final night's entertainment turned out to be the best of the weekend, including rockabilly band Uncle Red and Blondie tribute band Dirty Harry. However, the best was saved for last in the form of The Rick Parfitt Jnr Band, who swept onto the stage with such energy and personality that the whole place was rocking and dancing.

Thunder in the Glens 2015 was a great event notable for its large European presence, most of whom are sure to spread the word that this is the H.O.G. rally that everyone must attend. ■






are pretty well maintained, but now and again we'll be following what looks like a great road only to find it suddenly stops, either just in a dead end or in a farmer's field – another chance to practise those U-turns...

Not wanting to entirely give up what the UK has to offer, and wanting to keep our membership of the Hogsback Chapter up to date, we keep a little lodge nestled in the Surrey Hills, with a Dyna® Switchback for David and another SuperLow® for me – this one is black and white and named Humbug!

On hearing that the European H.O.G.® Rally this year was to be in Spain, we thought it would be a great idea to join in, and set about organising our holiday; but how should we do it? On our own; with Spanish friends; or, better still, with H-D® Authorized Tours operator Brettours?

We reminisced about years ago, when David and I knew Ron Brett, owner of Brettours, through riding sports bikes. Recalling that Ron had moved to Spain, we contacted him and met up. We chatted over vino and tapas and quickly remembered why we loved his tours - in fact why we had done more than 25 with him in our sports bike days. We had since swapped our sports bikes for Harleys®, thinking it was time for a change of pace - after all, we're not getting any younger!


We tried to work out where we could join the Brettours rally tour and just couldn't

come up with a suitable place to meet the group. We asked ourselves whether the comradeship would really be the same if we joined the group halfway through. Anyway, Dave wanted to stretch the legs of his Switchback, so the plan was set. We drove 600 miles back to the UK in June to collect our English bikes and joined the tour from the beginning; and we certainly didn't regret it.

So, the tour began, as a relatively small riding group of 16 people on 10 bikes set off from Portsmouth. Arriving in Santander the next evening, we had a short ride to Fuentes Carriones, overlooking a beautiful reservoir and surrounded by the Picos de Europa Mountains - it was stunning. As the tour continued, it was one highlight after another. One very memorable stage was riding through the Gredos Mountains to Trujillo, which, according to some, is the most attractive town in the province of Extremadura, a classic conquistador town that also boasts a castle from the Moorish era. Our hotel was a 16th-century former convent – what a treat!

That afternoon, we covered a 40km stretch of sweeping mountain roads and twisty bends, which was truly inspiring. On arriving at a café for refreshment, I wandered up to Ron. What I wanted to say was just a very big thank you for researching, exploring and then leading this fabulous route, but what came out was very tearful! The bar girl must have thought I was nuts (as Ron did)! Truly, though, these roads were awesome - some of the best I've ridden, and I live in Spain and have been riding for 16 years. That day my Sportster really earned its name, handling the terrain marvellously. Girl and machine, as one.

Every night we stayed in an exceptional hotel, with a two-night stop in Seville giving us a chance to explore this wonderful city and see the place where Game of Thrones was filmed for release this year. We then spent three nights in Jerez with the chance to visit the rally. Two weeks, 1,522 miles covered, riding across the back roads of Spain, through sleepy villages, and the best undiscovered roads you could ever wish for.

Fourteen days of the most awe-inspiring roads, amazing and ever-changing landscapes and magnificent views.

One of the best things about this tour was how relaxed it all was. Each day started at around 9.30am on the road, with frequent stops at pavement cafés for a stretch, refreshment and a chat. This was something that really made the riding a pleasure. Who really wants to say they've been in the saddle for 12 hours and not seen anything? Not me. The well-planned stops always seemed to take in something of interest too, like at the Parque Nacional Reserva de la Biosfera in Montrague, where we witnessed hundreds of vultures flying high above us, soaring on the thermals and swooping down so low they almost touched our heads.

I can't say precisely what makes Brettours touring rides so good, but the research, planning and effort that goes into each tour means you can be sure of a unique experience. The hotels, the food and the company all made my holiday a truly memorable event and one to cherish for a lifetime what more could you want?

New models

Before a new Harley-Davidson® motorcycle settles into its place of honour in your garage, long before it arrives at your local dealership, and even before it rolls off the assembly line, the vision of what that motorcycle will look like begins as an idea in the mind of a designer. How does a machine go from a sketch on paper to real iron and steel? Where do the ideas come from that inspire the sketches?

Ben McGinley and Dais Nagao are two young members of the talented Styling team at Harley-Davidson's Product Development Center whose job it is to make that happen. For 2016, they have designed a pair of new motorcycles, the Iron 883™ and Forty-Eight,® that are on the cutting edge of Harley-Davidson's Dark Custom[™] styling movement. We asked each designer to describe the new models in their own words.

Dais Nagao was born in Tokyo and studied at the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California, the alma mater of H-D® Styling legend Willie G. Davidson. A fan of motorcycles and muscle cars since he was young, designing motorcycles combines Dais's love of machines and drawing.

The approach to the project to redesign the Iron 883™ motorcycle was to build a factory bobber with a bare-knuckle, rough-around-the-edges feel, but without the crudeness or imperfections you often find on garage builds.

When you walk into the dealer and see this bike on the floor, I'd like you to think how it would look after you have put your own miles on it. This is a bike that could look right with some patina on it brand new, but I think it's the privilege of the owner to put it there. The more you ride it, it may get some scratches or dings and dents, but those will make the bike look even better.

To me, the appeal of a



Sportster® motorcycle is the beauty and timelessness of its basic structure. It feels young, pure and sexy. It's nimble and agile, and everything comes together in a great package. We were given such a fantastic foundation to begin with, but we took it a couple of notches higher with a visual and performance upgrade.

The wheel design is a highlight of this project because we were able to reduce the weight by eight pounds in total, which is a big improvement in unsprung weight. From a design approach, I went back to a nine-spoke design, which is a familiar look for the Sportster family, with machine-cut spokes to give a new visual identity to the wheels. The engineering team then took that design and knew how to machine the spokes to reduce the weight. It was a big challenge, but it really adds to the agility for which the Iron 883 is known.

For the tank graphics, the eagle in particular, I worked very closely with Ted Turner, our graphic guy, and he started with the hand-sketched Harley-Davidson logo and turned that into the eagle. We had so many iterations and different sizes and placements, but the final version we came up with has the right balance, and it's located in the sweet spot on the tank.

One of the things we went after with the new Forty-Eight model was to give it an even more muscular look and a bit more performance with the front end. We've gone from the current model's 39mm forks to 49mm forks. They're really beefy, very tough-looking, and add a lot of stiffness. But even though the forks are larger and we've got new cast wheels and beefy triple clamps, the whole assembly is actually lighter than the current model, so it's not only about the look but also paying attention to how we can make it perform better, handle better and be more fun to ride.

functional look to it.

We drew some inspiration from '60s- and '70s-era Harley-Davidson graphics for the tank graphics for the Forty-Eight. The graphics echo that era without being totally literal. It's a new twist on a theme. The repeating slot pattern in the tank graphic you'll see elsewhere in the bike. It's in the belt guard and exhaust shields, too – it adds a little bit of lightness and also provides a sort of visual theme to carry across the bike. No one piece is designed on its own; it's all part of a larger whole.

Another thing that's really cool about the Forty-Eight is how compact it appears. To keep that feeling of mass centralisation, we blacked out the pipes and added slotted shields so it brings your eye toward the centre of the bike.



Choosing a vintage model is a challenging task, but well worth it, says Frank Sander



OLD-TIMERS



Over the past few years, increasing numbers of 'old-timers' have been appearing on the market; happily, they are not just standing in museums but are being ridden.

When it comes to old-timers, choosing a suitable bike is often complicated and requires quite a bit of expertise. Firstly, you should ask yourself the question: 'Am I looking for something that is also an investment, or do I simply want to ride a bike with an old motor or rigid frame?' When you are looking for an old original, you can no longer really expect to find a true bargain, except in the event of one of those legendary 'barn finds', which are becoming increasingly rare. With a real old-timer, you can be certain that the value of the vehicle will continue to increase, especially in the case of the pre-war models, if they are in original condition, are from certain model years or are race models, like the Peashooter, which can quickly command six-figure sums. If you get a Captain America or a legendary Wrecking Crew race bike offered to you in a barn somewhere, then common sense should tell you that it probably isn't an original.

Before buying an old-timer, you should check that the motor and the frame originated in the same model year and that as many original parts as possible have been retained. If the bike, for example, has a reproduction frame or an aftermarket motor housing, then the value drops enormously, even if the seller assures you that it matches the original one. Checking whether the frame is an original or not is a

task for a real expert, as Harleys® were identified by the motor number until 1969 and some manufacturers of accessory frames build parts that resemble the original ones very closely. One of the specialists, as far as pre-war models are concerned, is Thomas Trapp from the Harley Factory in Frankfurt, who once joked that it looked like there were more 'old-timers' of various model years on the road than Harley-Davidson® ever built.

If you are not looking for appreciation in value, but just want something cool to ride, then the search is considerably easier as many bikes have been rebuilt with reproduction frames, equipped with disc brakes and modified to have an electric starter and given a five-gear gearbox with new inner workings. These bikes, with an articulated or even a rigid frame, can be termed 'custom old-timers'. Their modern components have made them easier to handle, since a foot-operated clutch and manual gearbox are not everyone's cup of tea. With such bikes, however, it is just as important to make sure you know the origins of the bike.

Once you have found a custom old-timer, there are virtually no limits to your creativity, since depending on the model year, you can forgo indicators, there are almost no restrictions as far as the exhaust is concerned, and various other things can also be modified accordingly. A market has also developed for this and almost everything you may need to modify the bike is available as a reproduced part.

As difficult as selecting the right bike may be, the enjoyment of riding an old-timer is just huge; you can really feel and smell the history.



server', and the Hubble Space Telescope is launched into orbit. The decade promises great excitement and prosperity - and the Harley-Davidson Motor Company is, after a tough decade in the 1980s, a microcosm of this positivity.

Following the buyback from AMF in 1981 and the corresponding global recession, H-D® steadily started its renaissance: the launch of the Harley Owners Group® in 1983 and the introduction of the Evolution[™] engine in 1984 was followed in 1987 by the company's listing on the New York Stock Exchange, and by the turn of the decade

with the announcement of the 1990 model year line-up, one icon gave birth to another as the Willie G. Davidsondesigned FLSTF Fat Boy® swaggered on to the market.

Although the Fat Boy retained the nostalgic profile of the Heritage Softail®, Willie G. offered some more modern styling traits - the cast disc wheels, for example, were a first on a Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

These 16-inch solid wheels are one of the Fat Boy's most distinctive styling touches; and, for the first 18 years, it was the only model equipped with them. >

The rear tyre is also 200mm wide – the widest of any H-D® model at the time of launch, and the key to the overall 'fat' look.

The Fat Boy® is built on the Softail® frame, which hides shock absorbers beneath the transmission, allowing riders to benefit from the comfort of modern suspension while retaining the old-school hardtail look.

The original Fat Boy was powered by the 1340cc Evolution™ V-twin that had been introduced in 1984. In 2000 it got an upgrade to the new 1450cc Twin Cam 88B engine, and in 2007 the introduction of the 1584cc Twin Cam 96B V-twin added even more muscle to the fat.

There are certain bikes where look and feel go hand in hand, and the Fat Boy is

a classic example. While the heavy-duty appearance never fails to attract attention, wide footboards also ensure comfort on long rides, and the low-slung saddle feels just as cool as it looks.

The appearance of the Fat Boy in the 1991 film *Terminator 2: Judgment Day* cemented its position as one of the coolest, most desirable bikes around. The bike, ridden by Arnold Schwarzenegger (or his stunt double Peter Kent), completed one of the most famous jumps in cinema history, in which the Terminator jumps the bike into a storm drain. Kent did have a bit of help – the stunt was accomplished by supporting the Fat Boy on cables,

which effectively reduced the weight of bike and rider as they hit the ground. The cables were then erased in postproduction.

Several Fat Boys were used in the making of the film, but one that was actually ridden by Schwarzenegger was acquired in 2014 by the Harley-Davidson Museum[™], where it is now on display. The Fat Boy (not the same one, of course) reprises its role along with Arnie in the fifth instalment, *Terminator Genisys*, which hit cinemas earlier this year.

Following the success of *Terminator 2*, Universal Studios in Hollywood created the attraction Terminator 2: 3D, featuring a custom-built Fat Boy. ■

OVER THE YEARS



1990

The first Fat Boy appeared on showroom floors for the 1990 model year, and was an instant hit. Dubbed 'The Grey Ghost', since it was only available in grey, the Fat Boy had unique styling – and it was all about the fat. Solid wheels, a wide fuel tank, wide and heavy valanced mudguards and wide tyres made this a truly imposing, heavy-duty bike. The 'shotgun style' dual exhaust system also contributed to a unique look that sparked a wave of imitations.

2005

The Fat Boy got the CVO™ treatment for the first time for the 2005 model year.
The Screamin' Eagle Fat Boy boasted a 103ci Stroker Twin Cam engine, lowered rear suspension and a new steel pan-style seat, and came in three two-tone colour combinations with metal grind finish.



2015

A new front brake system on all Softail models delivers a 40 per cent reduction in the amount of lever force required at peak braking, and the handlebar master and front cylinders have been restyled. New paint colour options and mirrored chrome aluminium bullet-hole disc wheels ensure the Fat Boy continues to attract attention wherever it rolls.



2010

The 2010 Fat Boy Special (called the Fat Boy Lo in the USA) took all the style and swagger of the Fat Boy and brought it closer to the ground, with a seat height of 24.25 inches. The narrower seat and handlebars also helped to make this model instantly popular with riders of smaller stature. Half-moon footboards and painted fork tins also differentiated the Fat Boy Special's styling from that of the original Fat Boy.

2007

The legendary Fat Boy look got beefier than ever thanks to a 17-inch front wheel, increased from 16 inches, and a wider 200mm rear tyre. The signature aluminium disc front wheel gained new 'bullet' holes, while new graphics on the Fat Bob fuel tank and both fenders added another stylish touch.

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Harley-Davidson® Lebanon and the Lebanon H.O.G.® Chapter spearheaded a unique operation to build a new artificial reef off the Lebanese coast - made from three Harley-Davidson® motorcycles

As a H.O.G.® member, you've probably seen Harley-Davidson® motorcycles in all kinds of places: city and

country, mountain and plain, from the North Cape to Cape Town. But underwater?

On June 13, 2015, a crowd gathered at the busy Beirut Corniche promenade to watch three Harley-Davidson motorcycles being lowered deep into the Mediterranean Sea. Harley-Davidson flags were mounted on boats close to the shore, while a floating crane carrying a metal structure with the bikes on top was towed out to sea. An unusual sight – but the residents of Beirut are used to seeing the H.O.G. Lebanon Chapter engaged in a variety of social and community activities around the city.


This was a unique operation to create an artificial reef to help marine life and attract divers to the site. Once the necessary permits had been obtained from the local authorities, Harley-Davidson Lebanon donated the bikes and sponsored the construction of the four-tonne steel structure. A giant Bar & Shield® logo measuring eight by seven metres served as a base to mount the three Harley-Davidson Road King®

motorcycles, which had been stripped of all non-biodegradable material to ensure the project did not harm the environment.


A team of 23 divers, most of them H.O.G. members, helped to place the structure 34 metres deep near the American University of Beirut (AUB) canyon, a renowned diving location. The site will be marked on Google Maps as an official diving spot, and will also be recognised as an international diving site by the International Diving Schools Association (IDSA).

The Lebanese coast boasts several excellent diving spots, including the wrecks of HMS *Victoria*, which sank in 1893 but was not discovered until 2004, and the Vichy French submarine *Le Souffleur*, sunk by the British navy in 1941. There are also a number of spectacular natural reefs.

The project was led by Mohamad Dakroub, an experienced diver and active member of the Lebanon Chapter. "There are a lot of riders here who also like to dive, so a project that combined those two passions seemed like a great idea," he explains. "There are definitely similarities between the two. Riding a Harley-Davidson is all about the thrill of freedom and getting away from the constraints and

BEST SHOT Capturing the ride is easier than ever thanks to smartphones. Here's how to make your shots stand out


Several years ago, while on a commercial photo assignment, I was asked a question that has stuck with me ever since: "What's in your toolkit?" In other words, what do you need to get the job done?

It really got me thinking. A camera is a tool, and a powerful one at that. But taking good pictures is not so much about the camera as it is about how it's used. Good photographs require the photographer to slow down, to see and personally express the world in front of them. This is true no matter what type of camera you're using.

How do you do this when travelling on a motorcycle? The answer, as it so often is on two wheels, is to keep it simple and travel light. It's just like with the toolkit you probably keep on your motorcycle for emergency repairs. A basic set can meet most of the challenges you encounter on the road.

It's the same with your camera. These days, chances are the smartphone you carry comes with a pretty good camera. And if you use it well, that can be all you need to capture memorable images from any journey you take.

Here are a few tips for using your phone camera (or a simple point-and-shoot) to improve your picture-taking and capture your next ride.









MIDDAY


SEEING THE LIGHT

As the sun rises in the morning, travels overhead, begins to fade, and slowly turns to night, the quality and feeling of light changes. Our eyes adjust to

the changes quickly. The camera can record the changes and colours in ways our eyes may miss. Try taking photos first thing in the morning, at midday, twilight and evening. Practise taking pictures after dark; the results will amaze you.







FRAMING – FOCUS – EXPOSURE

There's an old saying in photography: the photographer is responsible





MOVE IT Moving the phone and reframing changes the composition to include more foreground or sky. Note that the two trees have remained the same size, and only their position within the frame has changed.

GAINING SOME PERSPECTIVE

The distance of objects from your camera and from each other affects perspective. The closer your subject is to the camera, the larger it will appear. Colour can affect perspective too. Warm colours (reds and oranges) often appear to come forward, while cool colours (blues and greens) appear to recede. In addition, light-toned objects often appear to be closer than dark ones.

Your point of view or vantage point can also have a strong influence on perspective. Looking up at a building can increase the feeling of height. When you approach a scene to photograph it, try not to always shoot at eye level. Look at the subject of your photograph standing at your normal height, cut the height in half, then in half again. Look for angles and elements that can add interest.









LEFT PICTURES: (TOP) Getting closer to the tyres makes them appear larger. (BOTTOM) Warm colours against cool colours create dimension.

RIGHT PICTURES: (TOP). Holding the phone about three feet off the ground. (BOTTOM) Holding the phone above my head. Notice how the road in the second photograph opens up with the change in camera height.











GETTING CLOSE


Riding to Sturgis last year, my route led me directly through acres and acres of sunflowers. The view from the road at 65mph was a blur of yellow and green. Then I stopped, turned around, and parked by the field. I realised it was all about slowing down, seeing, framing and getting close. The closer I got, the more I saw.

Try using your phone camera close up. It's better not to zoom in with the camera, as it may degrade the quality of your photograph. Simply walk closer to the subject you're photographing.

IMPORTANCE OF SCALE

One reason landscape photographs may not turn out as expected is that they lack scale. To create scale, use familiar objects in your photographs. Small objects make the landscape appear wide and big. Large objects in the foreground make it appear smaller. As you frame your next landscape picture, try adding a familiar object - maybe your bike or a fellow rider.







TOP: The motorcycle helps create a sense of scale and depth in the landscape. LEFT: Placing the house in the frame at a suitable distance from the camera can control the impression of scale. RIGHT: The rider in the foreground provides dimension in the surrounding environment.

RAIN OR SHINE

If you're like me, you sure are happy when the sun is out and the road ahead is dry. But the weather will change - always. And weather, rain or shine, can help create interesting photographs. When you stop to put on the rain gear, remember to pull out your phone and take some pictures. A zip-lock bag with a small hole cut for the lens makes an inexpensive waterproof case for your phone.

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THERMOREGULATIC

Fighting the effects of excess heat on two wheels



The human body has a remarkable thermoregulation system. Under most circumstances, it does a great job of keeping your innards at an ideal 37°C. When things outside your body get too hot or too cold, it has ways to adapt.

Your body is hot

Understanding how to cool your body properly starts with understanding how it maintains such a consistent inner temperature. You might wonder: if our

body temperature is 37°C, why are we so comfortable at 'room temperature'? Simply put, it's because the chemical reactions occurring inside your body are continuously producing heat, which must be dissipated. At approximately 21°C, wearing a modest amount of clothing, your body sheds heat at the same rate it produces it.

When you start moving around, your body generates more heat. You start to feel warm as your body tries to cool down. The same thing happens when the ambient temperature goes up. If the air conditioning breaks, and the room temperature rises to, say, 30°C, your skin doesn't cool as effectively, so your body finds other ways to shed the excess heat.

The first thing it does is sweat. Glands in the skin secrete moisture, which draws heat from the body through evaporation. That's why the phrase 'it's a dry heat' really does have meaning. In the desert, this process works quite efficiently. Sweat

evaporates from your skin before you even know it's there, taking excess heat with it. If you find yourself thinking "I'm not even sweating!" – you are, you just don't feel it.

In more humid environments, your body sweats, but the air is already so moist it can't evaporate easily. And if it can't evaporate, it can't do its job. The sweat stays on your body, along with the heat, making you feel hot, sticky and uncomfortable.

Your body is also cooled through convection. Scientifically speaking, this means the removal of heat through the circulation of air. Motorcycle-ly speaking, this is that wind-in-your-face feeling we all love. And in the heat, the wind can be a lifesaver.

In the heat of the day

Let's say your plan for the day is a 500-mile ride across the desert. Your first heatfighting measure is to start early, when it's cooler. In fact, you may even need to bundle up a little to start; it can get really chilly overnight in the desert. Dress in layers that can be shed easily as things heat up. Ideally, the layer next to your skin should be a breathable synthetic that will draw moisture from your skin. A longsleeved (more on that in a moment) synthetic T-shirt is a great choice. Layer up from there as needed. If it's nice and chilly, a top layer that breaks the wind may be necessary. In warm weather, a mesh jacket over-layered with a rain jacket in cooler morning air works well.

Now, as the temperature rises throughout the day, you can shed layers as needed. But don't take off too much. In blazing heat, it may be tempting to strip down to your T-shirt, but covering up can actually help you stay cool.

For starters, exposed skin dries out very quickly in the sun and wind. Yes, this can help with the cooling effect, but it also makes it harder to keep your body hydrated. Keeping your arms covered (remember that synthetic long-sleeved T-shirt) helps reflect the heat of the sun, prevents sunburn and helps keep your sweat from evaporating too quickly.

Fabulous fluids

Which brings up another crucial point: stay hydrated! This may be the single most important thing you must do when riding in the heat – not just to keep you comfortable but to keep you safe. When your body becomes dehydrated, bad things start to happen.

So always pack water or a good thirst quencher, like a sports drink. I like to start with a big bottle of sports drink and then refill that with water when it's empty. Stop more frequently than you otherwise might and drink each time. The cliché is that you should "drink before you feel thirsty" – but it's a cliché because it's true. The effects of heat stress can sneak up on you.

With that in mind, if you start feeling a little weary, hang out in the air conditioning for a while; it's best not to hurry when the heat's on. And be alert for other signs of heat stress. These can include:

- Heavy sweating
- Extreme weakness or fatigue
- Dizziness or confusion
- Nausea
- Clammy, moist skin
- Pale or flushed complexion
- Muscle cramps
- Slightly elevated body temperature
- Fast and shallow breathing

If you ever start to feel dizzy or lightheaded while riding, pull over safely as quickly as you can. Find some shade or air conditioning, and get hydrated. If symptoms persist, pour water over your head and neck. Elevate your feet to help increase blood flow to your brain. Get help if you need it. And don't go back out on the road until you're 100 per cent sure you're recovered. If your symptoms are serious, it's probably best to stop for the night.

Tools of the trade

Beyond the mesh jacket and long-sleeved T-shirt, other gear choices can help you keep cool. Something as simple as a wet bandana around your neck or under your helmet can do wonders. Soaking your T-shirt helps a lot. If you ride in high temperatures frequently, consider investing in a 'hydration vest' lined with crystals that absorb and hold water to keep you cool while you ride.

Many of the newer Harley-Davidson® Touring models have vents that open and close, allowing you to control the amount of air that flows across your body. Many full-face helmets also have adjustable vents.

Remember, both you and your Harley® motorcycle are air-cooled. When you're stuck in traffic, the air flow stops. If it looks like a long delay, sometimes it's best to get off the road and wait it out. And make sure to keep up with your oil changes to protect your engine.

Finally, don't forget to use sunscreen on any exposed skin, especially covering spots like the back of your neck, the backs of your hands, or that little gap you might have between your gloves and the ends of your sleeves.

Your body does a great job of cooling itself. With a little help, it can do even better – and make the hottest rides safer and more comfortable. ■
