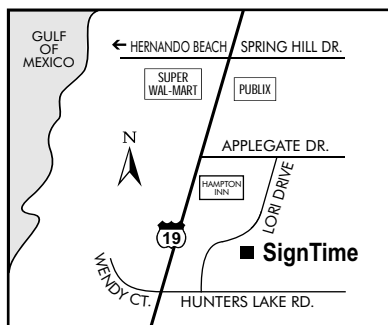

The IRS rollover and all bylaw changes were approved. All four of the Declarations on the ballot did not pass.

The overall vote tally on this years ballot exceeded last years results by a factor of over two meaning the newly innovative measures adopted by the Election Committee yielded increased voting. The Committee assisted residents and allowed for manual pick up of their ballots and this saved postage costs.

The optical ballot was a huge success as the entire voting document was condensed to one page thus saving the Association additional printing costs. I do recommend that future elections continue to use both the optical scan ballot and services of the Pasco County Supervisor of Elections so as to insure voting accuracy and ease of use for Heritage Pines Residents. The entire election came under budget by over two thousand five hundred dollars. Congratulations to the Elections Committee.

The HPCA Board and GM Committees are in the process of formation. Look for Committee Chairs to be approved at the March and April Board meetings.

The new Board is fully engaged with the new budget as we look at trending and are prepared to make decisions to keep HPCA on task with the 2015 budget.

LONG RANGE PLANNING

HERITAGE PINES "TOWS" THE COMMUNITY FORWARD WITH A "SWOT"

The Long Range Planning Committee invites **residents** to participate in this workshop on April 13, from 2:00-4:00 p.m. in the PAC Room. This is a great opportunity to share your ideas for 2015 strategic priorities.

Board members, Committee Chairs (*2014 and newly appointed*) and Council of Villages are also invited to participate. The working format is in tables of 10 people who will BRAINSTORM, SHARE and PRIORITIZE.

A **SWOT** analyzes our community internal strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. **SWOT** helps plan strategies to meet goals by maximizing strengths and opportunities. It also provides insight to plan and adjust our course to address any external weaknesses or threats.

SWOT is also used to evaluate goals and objectives from 2014-2015 to determine if we are "on the right road" for 2015-2016 planning.

Residents, Board Members, Committee Chairs and Council of Villages members will be in mixed groups. Each group will select a recorder and presenter. When

brainstorming, every idea is written down by the recorder, within a timed period. Every person's idea counts and is not judged. Presenters of each group do the talking when sharing results.

Ideas will be prioritized in order to narrow the focus on achievable goals and objectives.

You will be guided through each step of the **SWOT** by 2 facilitators using power point slides projected on the big screen.

SWOT = Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats

STRENGTHS – What makes Heritage Pines unique and great place to live?

WEAKNESSES – What do we need to improve or stop doing?

OPPORTUNITIES – What can we explore in terms of adding or expanding?

THREATS – What external factors will be a challenge to the community?

The results of the input from Residents, Board Members, Committee Chairs, and Council of Villages will be posted on the Heritage Pines website. If you wish to participate, you need to register in advance by April 9. There will be a sign-up sheet at the front desk or you can e-mail mryanwl@cogeco.ca. Residents who attend but are not registered are welcome as observers. The Long Range Planning team looks forward to facilitating “Talk Time” in our common responsibility of making Heritage Pines a successful 55+ community.

RESIDENT SERVICES & SUPPORT

Hello to all the residents and everyone in Heritage Pines Community. Spring is here and summer is on the way. The living is easy. And people are out and about enjoying our beautiful weather. We have avid walkers/joggers/bike riders/golfers year round. But during the spring and summer months, we have a lot more

company on the roads. We often see some interesting maneuvers from pedestrians, golf carts and motorists alike as we all try to share the road. People are also incredibly distracted

(ahem... texting or on cell phones, while driving!). How can we all share the road and be safe in the process?

What are some good spring and summer safety tips for walkers and runners, bike riders, golf carts?

- ✓ Visibility is key. Wearing reflective gear that can be seen by both bikers and drivers is a good idea. Pedestrians also need to anticipate what they think the driver can or cannot see. Many accidents involving pedestrians happen when, before the sun rises or when the sun is setting.

What are some other safety tips for pedestrians?

- ✓ Use crosswalks and don't dart into traffic. Something that pedestrians aren't aware of is that they get shielded by larger vehicles so while a truck may stop for you, the smaller car on the inside lane may not because they just can't see you. Also, make eye contact with a driver before crossing the street. I know this is harder to do in summer due to sunglasses, but making eye contact at an intersection is just good sense.

What about bicyclists?

- ✓ The best thing a bicyclist can do is wear a helmet. And again, visibility is key, especially at dusk, so wear reflective gear. Mirrors are also good gear for bicyclists to have so you can see what is behind you.

What are some good tips for drivers?

- ✓ Be patient and extremely careful by watching our speed limits. Also when passing bicyclists and pedestrians. Drivers may not realize that novice cyclists look behind them when they hear a car, and that action of looking over their left shoulder steers them into traffic. Which is

GOLF COURSE MAINTENANCE

The growing season is upon us! The maintenance staff has been hard at work preparing the course for optimal growth this spring. Our focus is to improve fairway turf density via balanced soil chemistry and proper fertilization. A pre-emergent fertilizer with Ronstar was applied course wide to promote healthy turf growth and provide weed suppression. Our second greens aerification and topdressing was performed the week of March 9th. Our final pigment application was sprayed on fairways and tees to ensure sufficient color as we transition into warmer spring temperatures. Irrigation repairs this spring included the complete rebuild of pump #4 and the addition of new fertigation tanks that will allow us to alleviate some of the harmful effects of effluent water irrigation. The wet well at the pump house was also inspected and cleaned by M.R.I. Underwater Specialists, Inc. We are continuing our tree/hedge trimming and our pine bark mulch installation on landscape beds throughout the property. With our improvement in the weather we hope to see you more often on the course!

OTTER TAILS

Last month an otter family was spotted on the 9th fairway by some residents. One of the babies was lagging behind as the mother ran off with the others. Greg Ollivent, one of our maintenance workers was coming by and the resident flagged him down to help the otter pup. He was able to catch the otter with a towel and some gloves. I arrived just as he caught it. Another resident had a pet carrier and we put the pup into the cage, as much for our safety as the otter's.

The mother and other pups were heading toward the east and we thought they might be heading to the pond on #18. So I took the pup and headed out to see if I could find its family. After surveying the areas on #18 I didn't think it would be the proper habitat for the little guy so I thought about the sinkhole area to the right of #1 fairway, where the fence is. After walking around the area for a couple of minutes I decided to do some research on otter habitats. As I began to look at some information on my phone I was also contemplating calling the wildlife control and turn him over to them for relocation. I really did not want to do this, I wanted to reunite the pup with its family. As I read more I determined this area would at least give him the best chance to survive even if he didn't find his family. The area seemed like an ideal habitat for him based on what I read. Heavy cover, sandy soil and a nearby water source.

So I went to an area where the pup could get under the fence and let it go. The little guy eased his way down the steep slope and hesitated as he neared the water's edge. Just about that time the water stirred and my heart sank as I thought an alligator was getting ready for his breakfast. I felt horrible that this was going to be this little otter's fate. Then through the murky water I saw the tail of the little one's mother pop out of the water as they touched noses. The mother swam away with the pup following shortly behind. Oh how relieved and elated I was when I reunited the family.

A couple of weeks later some residents have seen the family running around through the neighborhood.



Update On Projects

Project 1001 was to look into the feasibility & cost of installing metal connectors between the cart path and sidewalk curbs to prevent bumps when carts are driven from one surface to the other. Roads are under the control of the CDD. The CDD did not approve of this method. The Green Committee is looking into an alternative solution(s).

Project 1003 – Flag Poles Painted Same Color As Flags

Nancy Suter suggested flag poles be changed to the same color as the flags to make it easier to determine the flag locations. To accomplish this suggestion new Flag Poles were purchased by our Course Superintendent and are now being used. PROJECT IS COMPLETED.

HP Golf Course Maintenance Manual

The maintenance standards contained in the former Valley Crest Contract were found to be inadequate. As a result, a new Manual was proposed by the former Ad Hoc Golf Committee and was approved by the Board of Directors.

The Maintenance Manual assigns some responsibilities to both the Green Committee and the Golf Professional. The two most important responsibilities the Green Committee is charged with are:

1. To Rate the condition of the golf course every 3 months. A rating of 1-4 (4 being the highest) to be applied to tees, fairways, greens, bunkers, other hazards, rough, and practice areas. An average score of 3 or above is expected to be achieved.
2. To inspect the golf course monthly and to advise the Golf superintendent in writing of any issues that need attention.

In carrying out these two functions the purpose of the Green Committee is not to criticize our maintenance staff, it is to assist them, to be another “set of eyes” to observe our course by identifying areas on the golf course that need attention to bring them up to standards identified in the Manual. In addition members of the committee should provide our members with a “sounding board,” and help to educate them how they too can help to keep our course in good shape.

Two New Projects Assigned

Project # 1006 – QUARTERLY COURSE RATING: Tom Aigotti & Lee Wittig presented a work sheet for the committee's approval which members of the committee will use to perform the rating. Three (3) members of the

committee will be assigned each quarter by Tom Aigotti to do the rating. A report based on those 3 work sheets will be compiled & given to the General Manager, the Golf Course Superintendent, and posted on the HP Website under Official Business/Committees/Green Committee. Project completed.

Project# 1007 – MONTHLY COURSE INSPECTIONS: Tom & Lee Wittig presented forms for the committee's approval which members of the committee will use to perform the inspections. A member of the committee will be assigned for each inspection period. The Golf Course Superintendent will be given a report by the Chairman, Tom Aigotti, to inform him of the result of the inspections. Project completed.

Project# 1008 – MAINTENANCE MANUAL CHANGES: Because the current Manual contains many references concerning Valley Crest, a Revision of the Manual is needed. Tom Aigotti & Lee Wittig presented a proposed revised Manual to the committee for consideration. Discussions by the committee should be concluded at this month's meeting. Changes recommended by the committee must be approved by the General Manager, and the Board of Directors prior to implementation.

In addition to the above responsibilities, the Manual assigns the following:

GREEN COMMITTEE: Determine mowing height of greens, fairways & rough.

GOLF PROFESSIONAL: Set Green's putting speed for tournaments, every day course set up of greens & tees, marking of the golf course and marking of water hazards and out of bounds.

GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENT: He has the primary responsibility to maintain the golf course in accordance with the Specifications and Standards as stated in the Manual. He is under the direct supervision of the General Manager.

increased our curbside recycling by approximately 75 households since we started on January 14th. The final recycling day that counts in the tournament is March 25th, and I'm sure the numbers will increase, as the villages push to be one of the winners (we already have one village reach the magic number of 100%!). This represents a significant number of residents that have committed to making our world a better place for our children and grandchildren; and their grandchildren.

The Award Party for the winners is still in the planning stage, but the winning villages' signs are made and look terrific. At this time we don't know which villages they will be, but all residents of the winning villages will be able to bask in the glory of victory (and have a great time as well). Look for an email announcement of the winners in early April.

Heritage Pines rose to the challenge, but don't stop now. We now have approximately 60% of all residents doing curbside recycling – there is no reason we can't continue to improve that to 70% or 80%, or more. Talk to your neighbors that are not recycling, and encourage them to start; tell them how easy it is and help them get started. Who knows, maybe next year, your village will win.

Note: We will soon be receiving new trash barrels from our trash hauler. If you don't already have a reusable container for your recyclables, just use your old trash barrel and convert it into your curbside recycle container; and stop using those blue bags.

COMMON GROUNDS ADVISORY

The Common Grounds Advisory Committee has been hard at work gathering information and data about our Common Grounds which will be utilized in the development of a master landscape plan for Heritage Pines. A large amount of work has been accomplished in the three meetings since January.

1. Visits and tours of the community with three landscape designers. One will be selected to prepare a master landscape plan for the community.
2. A map of Heritage Pines that shows the boundaries for common grounds, CDD areas, golf course, and maintained and self-maintained villages has been prepared by Gary Wind, Facilities Manager, and Kurt Heath, engineer. The map will be helpful as we plan landscape revisions and enhancements for different parts of the community.
3. The CDD has appointed Herb Elliott as liaison to the Common Grounds Advisory Committee. John Burns, golf course superintendent, Chris Ainsley, assistant golf course superintendent, and Gary Wind, facilities manager, are also working with the committee. It's important that all three landscaped community areas (common grounds, golf, and CDD) receive equal attention in order for Heritage Pines to achieve our goal of a well-maintained, environmentally healthy, and attractive community.
4. Reports from John Burns on common grounds activities.

New Action Items include:

1. Irrigation study of common grounds
2. Development of a common grounds maintenance manual
3. Establishing quarterly inspections of common grounds by the committee
4. Selection of a landscape designer. Once the plan has been accepted all work will be done by our own staff.

With the direction of Gene Estensen, committee chair, and Chuck Eade, general manager, the committee looks forward to making improvements to our Common Areas.

WIRELESS EMERGENCY ALERTS PROVIDED BY HP CERT TEAM

Have you ever noticed a unique sound and vibration coming from your cell phone? You may have received a *Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA)* - a nationwide emergency alert system notifying you of a pending emergency in your area. *These messages* provide information about extreme weather warnings, local emergencies, AMBER alerts, and Presidential Alerts during a national emergency.

WEAs look like a text message and show the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, and the agency issuing the alert. If you receive a WEA, follow any directions advised by the message and seek additional information from local media and authorities.

WEAs are sent by authorized government agencies through your mobile carrier. Government partners include local and state public safety agencies, FEMA, the Federal Communications Commission, the Department of Homeland Security, and the National Weather Service. **WEA messages can save lives!**

RESIDENT UPDATE: AD HOC LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

It is the committee's plan to publish updates each month on our progress, as we work through the process of determining the needs and wants of the current and future residents of Heritage Pines, and to be sure we offer adequate space to fulfill those needs.

To help us get a better handle on the utilization of the Clubhouse, a Room Utilization Study was performed for the PAC, Craft Room, Magnolia Room, Conference Room, and the Billiard Room. This document was useful in determining when these rooms are used the most, and if there may be some unused time for activities. However, further information needs to be gathered to include all events, particularly in the PAC and the Magnolia Room. The Room Utilization Report only showed the events that are scheduled by the 50 groups that use these rooms on a regular basis each month. It is the "Special Events", breakfasts, lunches, dinners, golf and mahjong tournaments, etc. that take place (especially in the PAC), that lend to the

overcrowding and cancellation of some of the regularly scheduled activities. With so many activities crowded into too few rooms, set-up and break-down times are effected as well.

Creative fund raising possibilities were discussed, in lieu of, or in addition to, standard financing for a new building. How can we make this as painless as possible to build a new activities facility?

Lastly, the committee unanimously decided the area to the East end of the Clubhouse is the preferred location of a new building. This location will enable residents to have direct access to the new facility from the existing Clubhouse through a walkway connector, and help hold down the costs as well. A ground stability analysis will need to be done to assure us of the feasibility of erecting a structure in this location.

Our next meeting will be used to develop a timeline, listing all the activities that need to be addressed, with a goal of when to accomplish them. Updates on meeting and activity cancellations in the PAC and Magnolia Room will be presented. The requirements of stairs and/or an elevator will be presented, and further ideas about fund raising will be discussed. Residents are welcome to attend our monthly meetings

Chuck Eade, General Manager, addressed the following questions:

1. During the February meeting it was stated that HP could not assume ownership of the village owned sidewalks because it would require approval of 2/3 of the 1406 residents of Heritage Pines. This was the opinion of the HPCA attorney. How does this opinion reconcile with the recent acquisition of the land on Heritage Point Drive to the west of the maintenance building? This land was acquired from Lennar via a Quick Claim deed without any vote from the residents. It would seem that with this precedent the village owed sidewalk can be transferred to HPCA via Quick Claim Deed If the attorney is correct the previously acquired land should be returned to Lennar until resident approval is received. **This land was acquired from Lennar via a Quit Claim deed. Chuck Eade will consult again with the attorney regarding the sidewalk situation.**
2. Should the kitchen be confined to just the F&B staff only? **Chuck Eade stated that employees are allowed to have coffee, tea and soft drinks and serve themselves.**
3. Any reference in the newsletter would make a resident believe that a new expensive building is already a “done deal” ... so my question is Do we the residents get a vote on this spending of our fees in this manner? **Not a done deal. AD HOC Committee (as part of Long Range Planning) is looking into expansion needs. Project is strictly exploratory and an idea at this time. Any borrowing or use of HP funds would be brought before the BOD and Community prior to commitment.**
4. What plans are happening for improving handicap parking as well as golf cart parking? Why would there be no parking area where golf carts have always parked?

There is no need to attempt a two lane exit by cars.

Options are being reviewed to increase handicap and golf cart parking, such as eliminating the yellow no parking on the Clubhouse curb.

6. Speeding what is being done about this problem? I think that a large part of the frustration is that there isn't any improvement to the problem and there doesn't seem to be either responsiveness or effective resolution to the problems brought to HPCA's attention. There is genuine concern that someone is going to get seriously hurt and close calls occur on a daily basis multiple times. **Management continues to send out notices and will enforce fines and loss of privileges. Residents should report license plates when observing violations.**
7. Why is the water in pond by 5th hole so muddy? **Divers are coming in to clean out pond in preparation to install new pump.**
8. When will lighting be improved in front of the Clubhouse and across the street? **The light posts across the street from the Clubhouse have been installed. Further plans are in the process to improve lighting, crosswalks, reflective markings and should move forward.**
9. Why do we burden HP workers with household chores, when they have jobs? Are they not busy enough? Will this mean more hires? Why not support the local people who do good work for Heritage Pines residents at a reasonable price . . . I feel with HP getting into this business they are undercutting the small business people. Will they also be in the housekeeping business? **Lifestyle recommended looking into various services such as repair items, meal delivery, etc. GM asked Gary to compile a list of items with suggested fees in order to evaluate implementation of a program and analyze corresponding labor requirements.**
10. The ACC committee wants to schedule a meeting in April, 2015 with any village that has attached villas so that the wording for a policy on roofing can be discussed. There is a sign up sheet to put your email address for notice of the date and location. **Sheet was available.**

Rosie Tilton Facts On The 2015 Election

- Thanked the committee for doing an outstanding job on evaluating every part of the paperwork from previous elections and made improvements for the future. It was obvious that HP is resistant to change.
- Emphasized improving the educational process especially regarding proxies.
- Residents could pick up voting packets at the Clubhouse

and speak one-on-one with volunteers who could answer specific questions.

- Snowbirds who were on property were able to pick up their packets.
- # of votes on amendments was double the # received in prior years.
- Introduced use of 1 page optical scan ballots through Pasco County.
- Reduced cost in printing and postage by condensing the size of the packets from 18 pages to 12 pages and using smaller envelopes.
- The 2015 Election budget was \$6200 vs actually spent \$3,616.48.
- Printing costs this year \$2,025.42 vs \$2900 in the past.
- Expense to Pasco County \$452.10.
- Cost for postage to mail packets after Clubhouse pickup was \$1138.96 vs \$2700 previously.
- Savings of \$2,583.52 (under budget) for 2015.
- The majority of voters dropped their own ballots in the ballot box

HERITAGE PINES CAT SITTERS GROUP

April is that time of year when the snowbirds begin their arduous trek back north. We hope they arrive to no or little snow on the ground and temperatures above freezing. For those of us hardy enough to endure the warmth of the sun, days at the beach or poolside, and the luxury of air conditioning, we may still plan a weekend or week long trip to exotic places. For those with cats we offer to care for them so you may journey assured your cats are happy in your absence. The Heritage Pines Cat Sitters volunteers stand ready to assist you. And it's all free! We have included some universal Cat Laws for your entertainment.



Law of Cat Inertia - A cat at rest will tend to remain at rest, unless acted upon by some outside force - such as the opening of cat food, or a nearby scurrying mouse.

Law of Cat Motion -A cat will move in a straight line, unless there is a really good reason to change direction.

Law of Magnetism - All Blue blazers and colorful sweaters attract cat hair in direct proportion to the darkness of the fabric.

Law of Pill Rejection - Any pill given to a cat has the potential energy to reach explosive escape velocity.

Law of Composition - A cat is composed of Matter + Anti-Matter + It Doesn't Matter.

ASK THE TECHIE



Q: Can you provide some guidelines to help me know when it is safe to open email messages? A neighbor received a message they thought was from a friend and when she opened it her computer got infected with a virus that was very difficult to remove.

A: Even when using the best antivirus protection program available one has to be careful opening email. I suggest you pay attention to the **Sender** and **Subject** information before you even open an email. If you see a message from a source you don't recognize, delete and don't open it. Another clue that a message may not be safe is the wording in the email **Subject**. If the **Subject** contains misspellings, doesn't make sense or is inconsistent with what you'd expect from the sender be wary.

If you decide to open an email, think about whether the message is consistent with the sender's character. If there is no text just a link, clicking could result in a download that will infect your computer. Recently, I've had clients receiving messages from friends with no subject and just a link in the email body. Several clicked on the link and their computers were infected requiring my assistance to remove the infection. Upon investigation, these emails were never actually from the friend. In one case, the friend's computer was infected sending out virus emails without their knowledge.

As an email sender you should always enter appropriate information in the **Subject**. If you're including a link to a web site, include some descriptive text so the recipient will know it's from you. I always include some sort of a signature too.

Q: When using my mouse, I am sometimes confused as to when to Right-Click or Left-Click. Can you explain the difference and help me understand when to Right or Left Click?

A: For most Windows functions and programs the **Right-Click** button lists the Options available, while the **Left-Click** button selects the Action.

For example: if you **Left-Click** on a Link in an Internet Explorer Browser window, the associated link will open in the current Window. If you **Right-Click** on the Link, a list of choices will appear. To select one of these choices, move the mouse pointer down the list to the item and **Left-Click**. I often use this method when I don't want to have the new link open in a new Window instead of over the top of the current Window.

Try a **Right-Click** on Desktop Icons or within documents, Picture Files etc. as an easy way to explore what options are available within Windows. Remember that nothing happens until you **Left-Click**.

In **Windows 8/8.1**, **Right-Click** plays an even more important role. If you **Right-Click** after starting any **Windows 8** app, you will see many choices which may display additional information or program options. As I tell my clients and class students, Right-Click is your friend.
