

Annual WESCON Exhibit Opens uesday In Los Angeles Arena

The annual WESCON (Western Electronics Show and Conference) exhibit opens Tuesday, August 21, at the Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena, and will continue through Friday, August 24.

Dick Rhiger (Instrument Engineering) said this week that prior to the opening, Teks will hold technical sessions (Sunday and Monday) and a marketing session (Saturday) at the Statler-Hilton hotel, for the Western Region field engineers. A Tektronix, Inc. display in the Hartford room at the hotel will be a duplicate of most of the WES-CON booth equipment.

Tek's booths (751-754) at the sports arena will feature the following instruments:

5. Type 565 Dual-Beam Oscilloscope—with two plug-in vertical amplifier systems and two independent and identical sweep amplifiers and time bases.

6. Type 581 Oscilloscope—with a Type 82 plug-in unit and Type 86 plug-in unit (similar to ½ of a Type 82).

7. Type 290 Transistor Switching-Time Tester—and a Type 291 Diode Switching-Time Tester.

8. Type 535A Oscilloscope—in a plastic cabinet will be placed on a Type 204 Scope-mobile and will feature a Type M plug-in unit. A C-12 camera will be attached.


