Personnel Services Releases Statements Of EBAF And Gift Fund Operations

Don Kepler, Personnel Services manager, has released the financial figures for Employee's Beneficiary Assistance Fund and Gift Fund operations for fiscal year 1961-62.

The EBAF and Gift Fund were both created because of employees wishes, and the money comes entirely from the employees who participate. The EBAF provides immediate cash to a beneficiary when a member dies; the Gift Fund was set up to eliminate "hat-passing" among employee groups.

*Money and gifts, Don stressed, are given according to the rules which the employees themselves determine.

Personnel Services regularly provides statistical and financial information about EBAF and Gift Fund operations. Suggestions for changes may be passed on to the Group Representatives for discussion and approval by their groups. Such was the case in this year's change in Gift Fund policy to permit an enrollment deduction of \$1 from each new member.

Personnel Services acts as steward for both funds. The alternate group representatives are responsible for requesting gifts from Personnel Services.
